LABOR LEADERS ARE ALL FOR PROHIBITION ACT

RUSSIAN GUN RUNNERS TAKEN BY BRITISH IN BLACK SEA AIDING TURKS

Labor Favors Prohibition Says Tom Richardson, ex-M.P.

Speaker for Tonight's Meeting has been on Tour throughout Province and says Sentiment is with Present Law and Strict Enforcement

That the leaders of the labor movements throughout the province as well as most of the rank and file are in favor of the prohibition law was the statement made to the Daily News this morning by Tom Richardson, formerly member of the British House of Commons for Whitehaven, who is to speak on prohibition tonight at McIntyre Hall in this city.

Mr. Richardson has been on tour throughout a large part of British Columbia. He visited all the centres in the Kootenay and other mining districts and he says that everywhere he had meetings and the people were keenly in favor of not only the continuance of the present law but its strict enforcement.

The speaker for tonight says there has been a wonderful change in sentiment among labor men. They were opposed to prohibition when it was first introduced and the "Federalist" also worked against it. Now all were in favor of it.

There is only one danger in connection with the coming prohibition, continued Mr. Richardson, "and that is that the people who favor prohibition may not work hard enough."

Mayor McGlynn will preside at the meeting tonight.

U. S. destroyer Rathbone dropped into the harbor yesterday afternoon on the way south from Alaska and remained at anchor all night, leaving this morning. The officers were visited by U. S. Consul E. A. Wakefield and in the evening several of the officers spent the evening at the home of the consul, being entertained at music and dancing by Mrs. and Miss Wakefield and their guests, Misses Munn and a few friends.

Capt. J. H. Hoover is in charge of the destroyer and with him are Lieut. Shick, Lieut. Butler and Chief Engineer Butler. They drove around the city and were extremely pleased and surprised at the progress they saw here.

TORONTO HYDRO PAYS DIVIDEND

Estimated that Big System has Saved City \$20,000,000

TORONTO, July 30.—Toronto has saved at least \$20,000,000 in eight years of operation of the local hydro system. The report issued by the Toronto electric commissioners covers a period from the inception of the service in 1912 to the end of 1919. Briefly, the report shows that the cost and value of the plant is \$10,000,000, the accumulated funds \$3,000,000, and the saving to the consumers on current used \$17,000,000. The showing of a surplus of \$1,151 is very creditable when it is taken into consideration that wage increases cost \$150,000, exchange on bonds sold in the United States cost \$18,000, and that \$100,000 was paid for power bought from the Provincial Hydro and not resold.

The gross income for 1919 was \$2,564,758.32. The cost in current expenditure on operation and maintenance, including repairs, was \$1,577,120.81. Interest, depreciation, exchange, sinking fund and debenture retirement accounted for \$923,484.29, leaving the surplus of \$1,151 for 1919. This would give earnings sufficient to pay a dividend of 7 per cent. to a commercial concern in which no paying off on capital account would be necessary.

ORE BODIES, RICH LAND AND SCENERY

That is the Headquarters of the Stikine as Described by A. St. Clair Brindle.

GREAT POSSIBILITIES FOR NORTH INTERIOR

Mining Engineer Went North from Dease Lake and Brings Back Glowing Report.

Confirmation in regard to the rich country found in the northern interior of British Columbia at the head waters of the Stikine River is brought by A. St. Clair Brindle of Victoria who is in the city and who recently returned from that wonderful country. As a mining engineer Mr. Brindle was particularly interested in the mineral formations. He says there are large bodies of copper ore, silver-gold ore and the rarer minerals such as tungsten, nickel, manganese and cobalt. The geological conditions are very favorable for ore possibilities.

Mr. Brindle went in to McDames Creek off Dease Lake with Amos Godfrey and a gang of men representing the Princess May Mining Co. of Vancouver, who took in hydraulic outfit with them. They went up from Wrangell to Telegraph Creek by gas boat. At Dease Lake they whip-sawed one lumber and made themselves a boat with which to navigate the lake and adjacent streams. This boat was capable of carrying nine men and their traps as well as an immense moose carcass. At Dease Lake Mr. Brindle left the rest of the party to wash gold from the gravel, while he went northward a considerable distance.

Agricultural Land.

Speaking of the agricultural prospects of that country, Mr. Brindle is most impressed. He says that the famous geologist and explorer reported 50,000 square miles of agricultural land covered largely with white poplar and willow. The soil is black and rich and the growth immense. He believes that Dawson's estimate

must have been well within the mark for he explored large valleys which he believes Mr. Dawson never saw. The whole country is at present alive with big game, especially caribou and moose and it is easy to shoot enough to live on the country. In fact that is what his party did.

That this is really agricultural land is shown, Mr. Brindle says, by the fact that at Telegraph Creek Mr. Calbraith raises oats to feed his large stock of horses and that a number of Hudson's Bay horses wintered in the country without any provision, at the head waters of the Liard river.

Transportation.

The question of transportation is of course a difficult one, but Mr. Brindle is of opinion that the tapping of the Ground Hog and Klappan coal fields would be fully justified. The railway, he thinks, could come out at Stewart by way of a tunnel through from the Naas to the Bear River a distance of a mile and a half, but it may also come out by way of the Kitsumkalem River to Terrace.

The trip up the Stikine and into the interior is the finest scenic trip he has ever made, Mr. Brindle says. There is nothing to equal it. It is not difficult of access and as a tourist resort he thinks it will some day become very popular.

BRITAIN SEIZES RUSSIAN SHIP

Was Carrying Arms to Turkish Nationalists When Taken

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 30.—Great Britain has seized a Russian ship which was carrying arms to Turkish Nationalists. It has been generally known that the revolt of the Turks has been fomented by the Bolsheviks of Russia with a view to causing an upheaval in India.

SKATE OF GEAR IS RETURNED TO OWNER, ACCUSED IS FREE

In the police court this morning Magistrate McMordie dismissed the charge against Bert Voge of the theft of a skate of gear from the fishing boat Bringold. When the crew of the Bringold returned from up town on Wednesday evening they noticed that a skate of gear was missing and the following day reported to the police. Sergeant Adams and Constable McGlinchey went aboard the fishing boat Eise and there found the skate of gear which was this morning identified as being the one taken from the Bringold.

The magistrate thought that there was insufficient evidence to send the accused up for trial. L. W. Patmore defended and City Solicitor Hooper acted for the prosecution. The skate of gear was restored to Captain Peter W. Hansen of the Bringold.

SHELL CONTRIBUTION WAS VERY IMPORTANT

President of Press Conference Deplored President Wilson's Failure

HALIFAX, July 30.—"Canada's shell contribution was one of the biggest things of its kind in the late war," said Robert Donald, chairman of the Imperial Press Conference, when interviewed after his arrival here with the British delegates.

Mr. Donald spoke with appreciation of the work Canada had done, but deplored President Wilson's failure to carry through his policy.

NEW POLICY FOR HOSPITALS

Report Being Prepared by Dr. Arthur for Submission to Legislature.

LOCAL INSTITUTION LOSES \$400 A MONTH

That the Provincial Government is formulating a new hospital policy for the whole province, was reported to the hospital board last night by the president, D. G. Stewart, at the meeting held last night. Dr. Arthur was here recently in the course of a visit to all the hospitals of the province and following his report the Legislature at session will be asked to pass necessary legislation. At the present time all the hospitals are in bad shape financially owing to the high cost of supplies.

In order to cope with the financial situation locally it was decided that the rates will have to be increased, but it is left for the finance committee to make a definite recommendation.

Some pruning of expenses will also have to take place and efforts in this direction are to be made. Just now the institution is running behind at the rate of something like \$400 a month.

TAKE MOVIES ON FAIR WEEK

Provincial Bureau Invited to Send Man Here for Occasion—Other Business.

At the meeting of the Exhibition Association in their rooms last night, President George Bryant presiding, it was decided to invite the Provincial Government Educational Service to send their movie man here for the fair this year in order that a record of the activities may be shown at other points in Canada.

A number of applications for space in the exhibition building during the fair were made, from Kelly Douglas Co., A. J. Phillipson, A. E. McMaster of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Mills, Ormes' Ltd., J. S. Roberts Co., and Pattinson & Ling. The matter of securing an exhibit from the Whalen company will be taken up further with Swanson Bay.

It was decided to ask the minister of finance for exemption from amusement taxes for the fair.

Tenders are to be called for concessions for sale of various articles either inside the building or outside.

The time for receiving entries for the utility garden competition has been extended to August 5 to enable anyone wishing to have an opportunity to enter.

MAIL IS HELD AT VANCOUVER

Dispute Between Post Office and C. P. R. Regarding Subsidy.

VANCOUVER, July 30.—Pending a settlement of the difference regarding to a subsidy agreement between the Ottawa Government and the C. P. R. for transportation of mail to and from the Orient, post office officials here yesterday had a crisis by refusing to handle American mail for the express of Russia. As a result C. P. R. was forced to transport and load the sacks, British and Canadian mails, meanwhile being at the post office here.

Football Series Very Interesting.

The Grand Trunk football team is to be congratulated on its success in winning the Mobley Cup for the championship of the city. The series has been a most interesting one owing largely to the fact that the teams were so nearly matched. This sport is one of the best there is and it is worth a great deal to the city. Great interest has been taken in it by many who are not themselves players.

Imports from States Continue to Increase.

Imports into Canada are still increasing and their chief source is the United States, though the premium on New York funds during July averaged 13 1/2 per cent. For the twelve months ending May last the value of merchandise imported was \$1,151,000,000, of which \$834,000,000 represented imports from the United States. Exports to that country for the same period were valued at \$472,500,000.

Wool Prices Are Stiffening Slightly.

Recent despatches from the central wool markets of Europe indicate a slightly better demand, but as yet there is no established price. The outlook for growers is not, however, wholly pessimistic, as stocks of finished textiles are being rapidly depleted, and slightly lower prices are hastening that process. In a short time manufacturers will be compelled to obtain raw wool; and as they again become buyers, a price will be set that may not approximate that of last year, but will nevertheless be relatively high as compared with the prices current prior to the war. On the basis of 1919 prices, Canadian woolen mills use materials to the value of \$15,500,000, to obtain a finished product valued at \$25,000,000. The range of goods is extensive, including tweed suitings, serges, broadcloth, homespuns, cloakings and overcoatings. Those in close touch with the industry look with confidence to the future, and have no doubt but that their home trade will be retained even should pre-war conditions return, with intensive competition from European mills.

Northern Interior Shows Great Promise.

An interview in another place with A. St. Clair Brindle in regard to the northern interior of British Columbia around the head waters of the Stikine River makes most interesting reading. Perhaps some people already know about that country, but to most it is an unknown land. Perhaps the most surprising feature is its agricultural possibilities. Some day it will be inhabited by thousands of prosperous farmers and the destinies of the province will be controlled by the country north of the Skeena River. Transportation is the difficulty. When it comes there will be a rush into the country such as has not been known. Possibly too there will be a movement there prior to the advent of a railway. At any rate the railway cannot long be delayed as with a second Pennsylvania awaiting capital, brains and energy to bring it to the fore, something is sure to be doing there before long.

Need of City And District Now.

The need of Prince Rupert and district just now is men and women who will devote their time to building up, not pulling down. We have much to do here and there is not time for pettiness. It is difficult for some of us to see beyond our little two by four offices, but happily there are people coming in who have a vision and they will save us from ourselves.

SEA SLED'S VISIT

Craft at Victoria Makes Speed of Fifty Miles an Hour.

A boat capable of making fifty miles an hour entered Cadboro Bay near Victoria a few days ago. It was a Hickman sea sled, a craft with a bow like a scow, which skims the water under the impetus of two 200 horsepower engines turning over 1,500 revolutions per minute on the average. In travelling in a heavy swell the sled actually leaps from roll to roll, leaving the surface at times. The twin engines drive two thirty inch three-bladed propellers of the shallow draft type, which are partially out of the water.

The usual displacement boats which make high speed are mere racing shells which can stand no sea at all. The sled will ride out heavy seas and remain comparatively dry. It is a Boeing Airplane Company product and H. C. Berg company sales and advertising agent made the trip over to Victoria with Captain A. Hume of W. E. Boeing's "Tacoma." They described having been warned from speeding in Vancouver harbor. The new type craft ran rings round the Princess Charlotte and Princess Patricia.

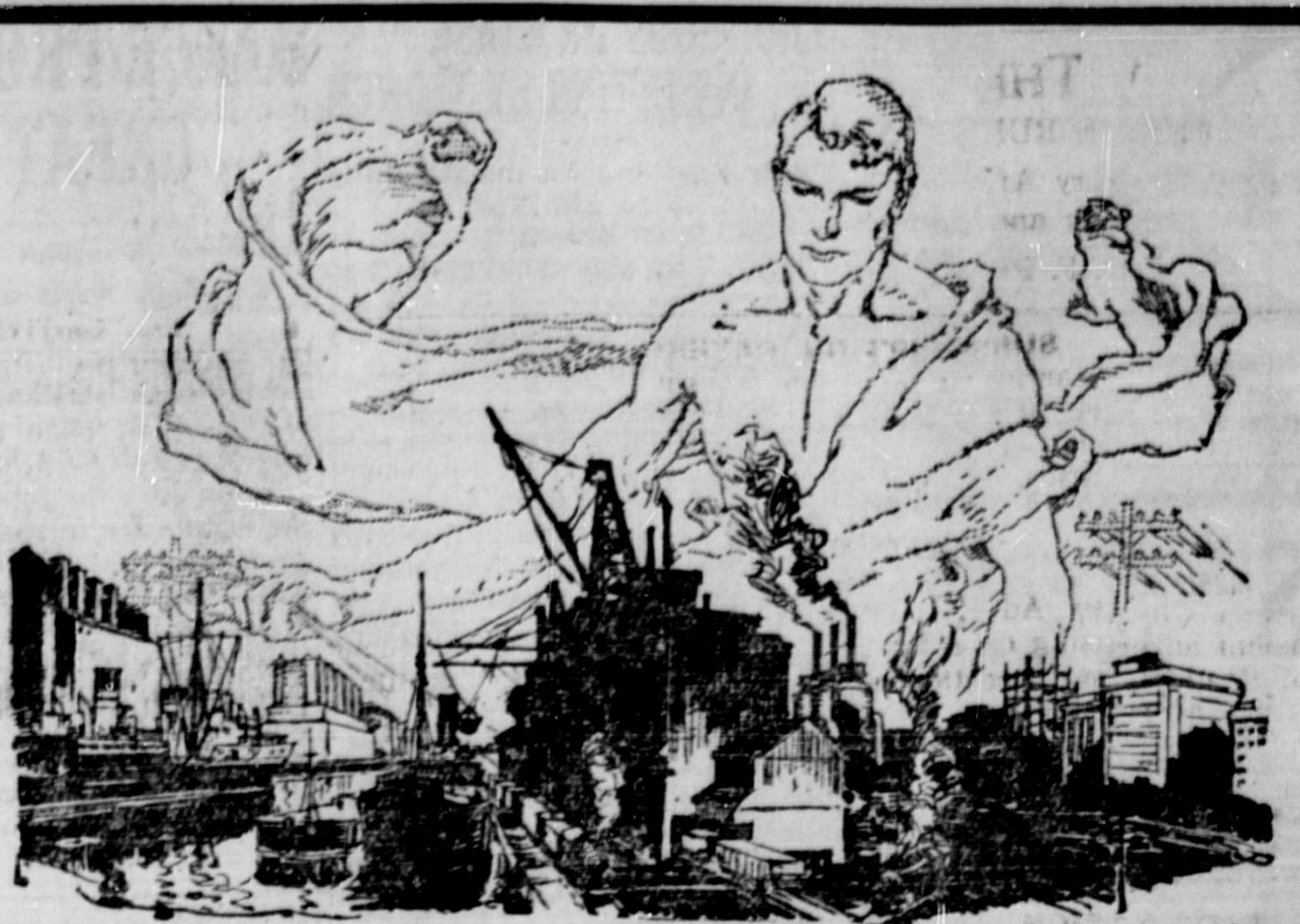

ENORMOUS INCREASE IN BETTING BY WOMEN

Study Anything Having Anything to do with Turf

LONDON, July 30.—There has been an enormous increase in the number of women backing horses since the Armistice. The excitement of the war have given place to the excitement of civil life; "action" had not sufficient thrills, and betting on a very extensive scale has practically taken its place with the younger women as well as the elder.

Women are the bookmakers' best friends, for the simple reason that they bet in many cases without knowledge or judgment and for sentimental reasons. Their tips are taken from anywhere; and they prefer the verbal to the printed suggestion. Their attitude to betting is quite different from a man's; "both ways" is their method of hedging, while the wiser man will bet to win on two different horses. The bookmakers know the psychology of their women clients. They know that a "win" excites them to further efforts, and that if they have a balance in hand they will invariably play with it further. There is one bookmaker who treats his women clients as he would never dare to treat a man; he never pays a "win" in full, but retains a proportion "on account," and he finds this method very good for business.

It is curious to note how the women who do make money at betting manage to hear the gossip of the stables and pick up information as to trainers and jockeys. They study "Ruff's Guide" and know pedigrees and form and memorize little details of racing. At the same time many women are influenced by such accidental circumstances as the name of a horse. There was one, for instance, who would not back Cigna for the Oaks because the name sounded like "Singer" and she therefore backed Charlebelle and won. Other women dream the night before of what they will back.

It is a significant fact that women who lose in betting almost invariably receive a quantity of moneylenders' circulars on settling day.

NEW LIGHT ON SOPHIA WRECK

Evidence Given at Investigation Indicates Sea was Not Very Rough

FAIR DORY WEATHER SAYS CAPT. J. V. DAVIS

Evidence given in regard to the sinking of the Princess Sophia by Captain J. V. Davis of the Estebeth before Special Commissioner Bruce Morbourg, shed a somewhat new light on the sinking of the C.P.R. steamer. Witness, as reported in the Juneau Empire, said that when he arrived at the scene of the wreck at Vanderbilt Reef on the morning of October 24, 1918, the weather was sufficiently moderate to have permitted the transfer of passengers from the Princess Sophia to the Estebeth or other boats.

Asked to describe the weather, he said, "it was what fishermen call fair dory weather," not rough but neither was the sea flat or calm. It was snowing with a 15-mile wind blowing northerly.

Converses With Captain.

He said that he was notified of the wreck by Mrs. E. H. Kaser about 2 or 2:30 in the morning of October 24 and after talking with F. F. W. Lowe, at that time agent at Juneau for the Canadian Pacific Railway company, he took the Estebeth to Lynn canal and the Vanderbilt Reef. Arriving there, he dropped the Estebeth down under the stern of the Princess Sophia, according to his testimony, expecting to take the passengers off the ship.

"Did you have any conversation with Captain Locke?" asked Mr. Martin. "And if so, what was it?" "Well," answered Mr. Davis, "when we dropped down to the boat, Captain Locke, using a megaphone, asked me if I thought the wind was going down. I replied, 'Hell, no!'" He testified further that Captain Locke repeated his question and, thinking that he could not hear from that distance, he (Davis) shook his head in negation. This concluded the conversation at the time.

His knowledge of the weather along Lynn canal convinced him that instead of dying down, the wind was due to increase and that a hard blow from the north was coming up.

Small Boat Launched.

Mr. Davis stated that after his conversation with Captain Locke, he dropped down to a buoy about 300 yards from the Vanderbilt Reef, threw a headline over it and tied up there for a number of hours. After tying up to the buoy a skiff was lowered off the Estebeth on the water and Captain Davis alone entered the boat, managing it without assistance. He testified that he was short of food supplies and wanted to get some coffee from the Sophia. The boat used, he said, was 14 feet long and 3½ feet across the beam. He was on the water some time and returned to the Estebeth without making water at all, which he said would have been impossible had the sea been rough. Life boats and rafts, he said, in his opinion, could have navigated the sea at that time without danger to passengers.

Sophia Boat Lowered.

After tying up to the buoy, the Army came up and tied alongside the Estebeth. The Peterson was also near at hand, ready to give assistance. About that time, he said, a boat was lowered over the side of the Princess Sophia and a number of persons, between 12 and 15, entered it. He was unable to state whether or not members of the crew or if they were passengers. Almost immediately however, a ladder was lowered from the ship and those in the boat returned to it.

With the rising of the tide, Captain Davis stated, he took the Estebeth from its moorings at the buoy and approached closer to the Sophia. Greeting him, Captain Locke, according to the witness, said the stranded ship was resting safe and sound and did not think it necessary to take the passengers off. He asked Captain Davis to remain nearby so he could land the passengers when the wind died down. The Sophia, declared the witness, at high tide was apparently floating clear of the reef as it seemed to respond to the motion of the water and wind. So far as he could see, there was no effort made to back the Princess Sophia off the reef at that time, no motion of the wheel was noticed. When the

tide turned, the wind increased, and a strong current from Berner's bay set in, producing a sloppy sea.

Easy for Boats.

There would have been no difficulty in taking the passengers off the ship at any time during the day of October 24, 1918, declared Captain Davis. At low tide on that day, said the witness, no water was breaking over the reef. Boats from the vessel, said Mr. Davis, could have been lowered either on the reef or in open water into which the passengers could have been taken off. The easiest and most practical way, in his opinion, would have been to have lowered them into the water and transferred those aboard to the smaller vessels nearby. There was no chance of losing any lives in such transfer, nor in fact, any danger from the sea, declared the witness. In fact, he said a boat from the vessel was in the water when he arrived at the scene, and he saw it raised and lowered again. He also observed three or four men making an examination of the hull from this boat, which rowed from the bow to the stern without any difficulty.

Driven Away.

He left the wreck late in the afternoon of October 24, going to Mab Island, in sight of the Princess Sophia. He remained there at anchor as long as possible, but was finally driven to Bridget Cove by a blizzard which set in. The storm kept him there all of the following day. He returned to Mab Island Saturday afternoon, landed a small boat there and walked across the beach until he

came in sight of Vanderbilt Reef where he saw only the masts of the Princess Sophia above the water.

He circled the wreck with the Estebeth, in search of possible survivors or bodies of victims. He then took his vessel down by Raiston Island, Lincoln Island and to Shelter Island.

Cross Examined.

Cross examination of Captain Davis occupied practically all of the afternoon session of the hearings. Attorneys for the Canadian Pacific company questioned the witness closely regarding his purported conversation with Captain Locke, but failed to shake his story as given on direct examination. Asked if it was his belief that a small boat could have been operated between the Princess Sophia and the Estebeth on October 24, 1918, the day of the wreck, Captain Davis replied, "you could have operated between the Princess Sophia and the Estebeth in a Peterborough canoe."

He stated that he was in the vicinity of the reef from 10:30 a.m. until about 6 p.m. on that day. He repeatedly asserted that at any time during the day and until late in the evening, by use of boats and life rafts aboard the Canadian ship, all passengers could have been transferred off the wreck.

Record Introduced.

During the first day's hearing log books and records from the naval radio station were introduced in connection with the wreck. Messages passing between the wreck and local Canadian Pacific officials and Victoria offices were also introduced, telling of conditions aboard the ship, the sending of many gas boats to assist, the ordering of the Princess Alice to give all possible aid, and of the expectation of Captain Locke that he would be able to float the ship off at high tide.

Word has been received by local wholesalers that there is no longer any restrictions whatever on the supplying of sugar. Up to this time there has been a proportional allotment of the supply among the various dealers.

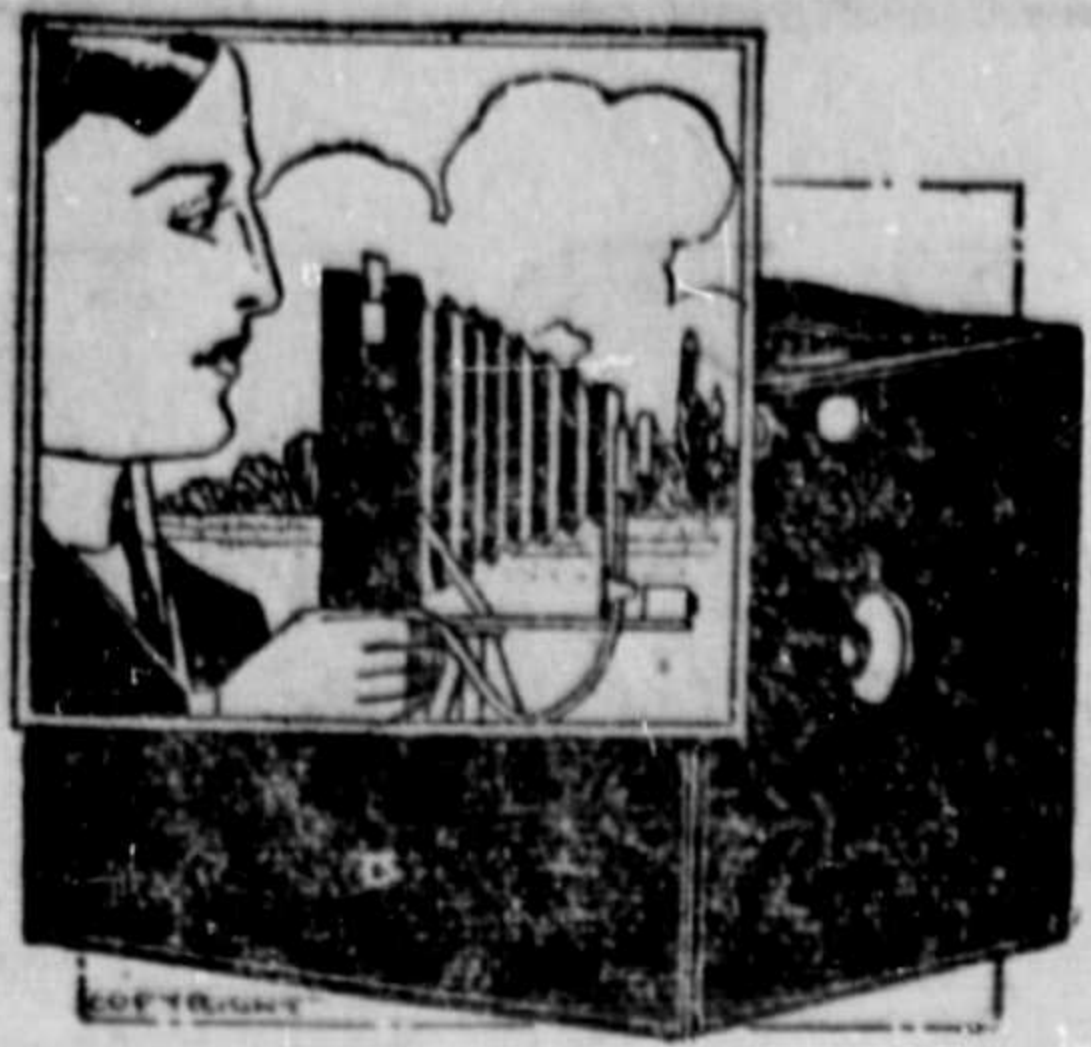

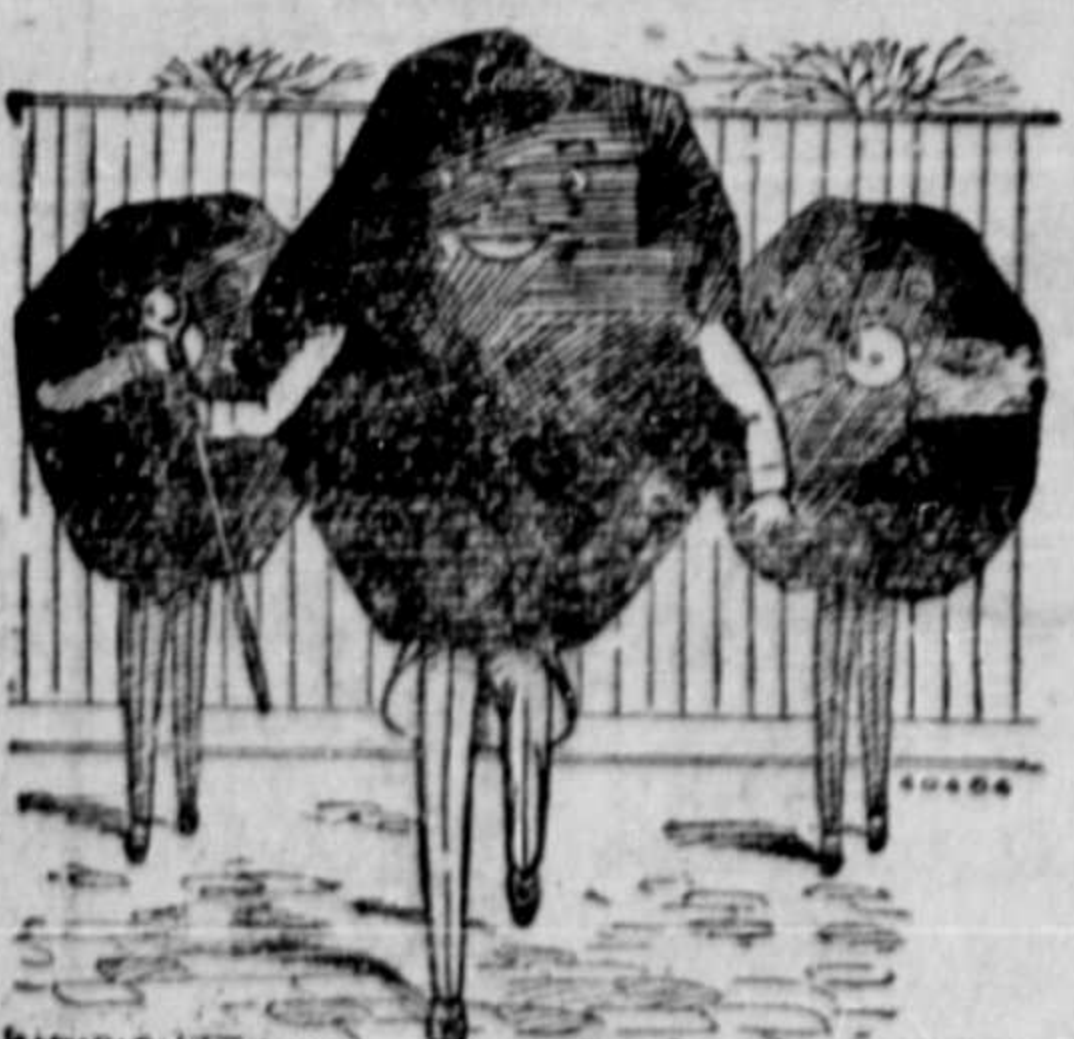
