Murderer at Large Police After Him

Ogle has Taken to Woods, but Indian Trackers being used to Run Him

Og'e's Wife Collapses at Inquest; Children , ive et idence that man kicked victim after death.

PRINCE GEORGE, July 31 .- "That Thomas Dodd came to his death by kicks and blows delivered by Orville_Ogle, rancher, was the verdict of the coroner's jury at the inquest held over the body of Thomas Dodd at the Corless Undertaking rooms in this city Thursday afternoon.

Dodd was brutally murdered on the road to his home by Ogle who had a grudge against him and who had sworn "to get him and get him good."

Two young boys who saw Ogle beside the body after the assault told at the inquest how, when Ogle saw them, he asked them what they thought of the old man now, and that before leaving the body he brutally kicked the dead man's face to an unrecognizable pulp.

Dodd was a well known and respected citizen of this community and the entire district is thoroughly aroused over the killing, and every step possible will be taken to apprehend the murderer.

The provincial police are scouring the country for the man-In spite of the heavy character of the country in which he is thought to have gone, they hope by the aid of Indian trackers to

get him soon. After Ogle had killed Dodd, according to the testimony of the boys, he walked with them to a neighbor's, where he talked with one of the men for about fifteen minutes. Then he disappeared.

Quiet Times In the City. .

Business is a little quiet in the city. In fact business, is rather quiet everywhere. The rather unsettled money market, more unsettled than most of us realize, is touching, us even in this remote spot. On the whole, however, business conditions are in a healthy state. Local wholesalers have done more business this summer than ever before and the end is not yet. There are developments still going on and local people need not fear as long as they carry on along safe lines.

Many people today have become so tired of paying the increasingly higher prices that they have stopped buying and the result has not been good for business. The storekeepers, too, have in many cases stopped buying and this is hitting the manufacturers and tending to bring prices down.

Will Prices

Go Much Lower?

One of the subjects which is continually discussed in business circles is whether prices will go much lower in the near future or will they go higher? In discussing the matter the Financial Post of Toronto says:

"Both in the United States and Canada official attention is drawn to there being a decline in wholesale prices, but that retail figures are still maintained and the long-suffering retailer is thus charged with profiteering by thoughtless people. They overlook the fact that the retailer is usually carrying stock purchased weeks and perhaps months ago at the higher prices then prevailing. When wholesale prices advance, retailers do not im-sell stock on hand at the lower prices, based on the figures they paid. Equally they should not be expected to reduce prices on ******* any sudden drop, which is often temporary-in wholesale or manufacturing prices."

Silver and Gold Bricks at Stewart.

A dispatch from Vancouver this morning states that a cyanide mill will be put in at the Premier mine near Stewart. As it is, many of the hospitals have a number of more or less permanent boarders, people who are unable to help themselves and are incurable. This adds much to the cost of upkeep. Government institutions are usually conducted extravagantly, while charity organizations are usually starved. It is a difficult problem for solution.
