## INQUEST HELD ON VICTIM OF GERMAN MURDERER STRIKE AT PREMIER TO BE FOLLOWED BY INSTALLING CYANIDE PLANT

### Cyanide Process Plant to be Installed at Premier Mine

R. K. Neill announces that gold and silver bars will be made on ground instead of shipping to Tacoma Smelter

VANCOUVER, July 31.—R. K. Neill, part owner of the Premier Mine on Salmon River in the Stewart Country, states that Premier Company will instal at great cost a cyanide process plant with a capacity of one hundred tons a day to refine the gold and silver ore taken from the Premier mine into gold and silver at the mine. This will save the cost of shipping the ore to Tacoma Smelter.  
The installation of the new plant will mean that there will be a large force of men employed at Premier, the settlement which is springing up around the mine.

### PRINCE GEORGE IS COMPLETED

Is Being Inspected and Launched This Afternoon and Leaves for South Tomorrow Night.

### FAVORABLE COMMENT ON EXPERT REPAIRS

The G. T. P. steamer Prince George is finished and this afternoon tests are being made by Mr. Edwards, a representative of Lloyds, who arrived this morning to inspect the work. She is expected to sail tomorrow night for Vancouver and Victoria, leaving at midnight. The Prince John leaves for Stewart tonight at 8 o'clock and the Prince Albert for Southern Queen Charlotte Islands tonight at midnight.

The manner in which the work on the Prince George has been done is the subject of a good deal of favorable comment. Superintendent Pillsbury is very modest in regard to the job, but in answer to questions he says that there were eleven new plates, a new stem bar and ten frames put in, as well as work on the floors, in order to get this done the men had to work night and day. It is record work and is deserving of great commendation.

### WIRELESS FOR CANADIAN YUKON

Dr. Thompson Urging Government to Establish Station at Mayo

VANCOUVER, July 31.—Dr. A. Thompson, M.P. for Yukon Territory, is pressing upon the Dominion Government the desirability of establishing a wireless station at Mayo on the Stewart River in order to connect the Canadian Yukon with the United States wireless system in Alaska.  
The Government is objecting on account of the large expenditure, the estimated cost being \$42,500.

### CANADIAN GOES TO LEAGUE OF NATIONS

OTTAWA, July 31.—R. H. Coates, chief of the Dominion Government statistical department, has been appointed a member of the statistical commission of the League of Nations.

### Big Vein in Premier Mine Struck at 600 Feet Depth

People of Stewart Much Elated over Finding of Good Ore that Depth as it Insures Permanency of Camp

Word received this morning from Stewart is to the effect that a rich ore strike has been made in Number 2 tunnel at the Premier mine. This is the culmination that has been eagerly looked for, as on the finding of good ore at that depth depended to some extent the resources of this rich mine.

The finding of the ore in the tunnel gives the Premier a proved depth of 600 feet in rich ore body and insures the continuing of operations indefinitely.

It is thought that this strike is responsible for the announcement in Vancouver that a cyanide plant is to be installed to refine the ore at the mine.

Naturally the people of Stewart are much pleased at the outcome as it means so much to them in the way of permanency and prosperity. It will have a good effect on mining operations generally on the Salmon River.

### PAID ROYALTY ON PELT OF FISHER ALLOWED TO GO

Y. Ornheim appeared in police court this morning before Magistrate McMorde on the charge of having a fisher skin unlawfully in his possession, on which the royalty had not been paid. He was charged under Section 30 of the Game Act. It was a provincial police case but came under the jurisdiction of the city magistrate as the pelt was turned over to a local fur dealer.

VANCOUVER, July 31.—Vancouver yesterday beat New Westminster in a closely-contested and exciting lacrosse match by a score of 9 to 7.

Word was received in the city today that an explosion took place on Thursday at the Red Top mine, Stewart, and an Italian, Marco Vial, was killed and another Italian, Agostino, injured.

### REFUSE TO CARRY ARCHBISHOP MANNIX

NEW YORK, July 31.—Dissension has spread amongst the crew of the steamer Battie over the carrying of Archbishop Mannix to Britain. He is an alleged anti-Britisher.

### Murderer at Large Police After Him

Ogle has Taken to Woods, but Indian Trackers being used to Run Him Down

Ogle's Wife Collapses at Inquest; Children give evidence that man kicked victim after death.

PRINCE GEORGE, July 31.—That Thomas Dodd came to his death by kicks and blows delivered by Orville Ogle, rancher, was the verdict of the coroner's jury at the inquest held over the body of Thomas Dodd at the Corless Undertaking rooms in this city Thursday afternoon.

Dodd was brutally murdered on the road to his home by Ogle who had a grudge against him and who had sworn "to get him and get him good."

Two young boys who saw Ogle beside the body after the assault told at the inquest how, when Ogle saw them, he asked them what they thought of the old man now, and that before leaving the body he brutally kicked the dead man's face to an unrecognizable pulp.

Dodd was a well known and respected citizen of this community and the entire district is thoroughly aroused over the killing, and every step possible will be taken to apprehend the murderer.

The provincial police are scouring the country for the man. In spite of the heavy character of the country in which he is thought to have gone, they hope by the aid of Indian trackers to get him soon.

After Ogle had killed Dodd, according to the testimony of the boys, he walked with them to a neighbor's, where he talked with one of the men for about fifteen minutes. Then he disappeared. (By way of Vancouver.)

PRINCE GEORGE, July 31.—No trace has yet been found of Ogle, the alleged murderer of Thomas Dodds. It is said that the fugitive knows every inch of the timbered country which is full of swamps and streams. He has trapped in the country for the past ten years and it will be a most difficult matter to capture him. With plenty of ammunition he can live from hunting and fishing for a long time, but he must eventually get supplies.

The two children, Diamond and Kaska, who saw the murder, gave evidence at the inquest. They swore that Ogle kicked the victim's face twice after he was dead.

There was a tense scene at the inquest when Ogle's wife collapsed.

### PRINCE ABDUL HAS RENOUNCED TURKISH THRONE

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 31.—Prince Abdul the heir apparent of the Turkish throne has renounced his rights. He told the Sultan that he was "undermined, his name empty, and his territory robbed under the terms of the treaty."

### CROWDS AT RACES

Hundreds of People Come to Vancouver From Seattle.

VANCOUVER, July 31.—Horse racing was resumed today at Brighthouse Park for the first time since 1914. The races are all the more interesting with entries numbering 150. Large crowds attended the finals and hundreds of people came over from Seattle.

### SURRENDERED

FERNIE, July 31.—John Viehuk, who pointed a gun at his wife here, fled to the bush. Later he surrendered to the police.

### DIED SUDDENLY

LULU ISLAND, July 31.—W. J. Scratchley, a pioneer farmer of the district, died very suddenly at his home here this morning.

### MORE TROUBLE IN IRELAND TODAY

BELFAST, July 30.—An economic war has started in the city with regard to the neighboring Sinn Fein territory. The chief break was the refusal of food supplies. More men were wounded today in a Dublin street fight. The Charlemont Fort which was erected in the time of Queen Elizabeth was burned by armed raiders.

DUBLIN, July 31.—Military police have been posted at the Bank of Ireland to prevent a coup by Sinn Feiners. Soldiers were wounded in the struggle.

### THIEF ENTERS WOODLAND HOME

Occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Graham Also Pillaged.

Yesterday afternoon housebreakers entered the homes on Store Circle of G. A. Woodland and H. Graham. It is not known whether they were entered simultaneously or whether both were entered by the same party. The first word of the crime was given when Miss Graham returned from work and found all the doors in the house wide open. Nothing was topsy turvy and furniture was all out of place. Immediately on going outside she noticed the doors of Woodland's house were open. Here conditions were the same but it is not known if anything of value was removed. Five dollars in cash was taken from a drawer in the Graham home.

### INDIAN IS BURNED WHEN STOVE EXPLODES ON BOARD GAS BOAT

Yesterday afternoon Robert Sankey, an Indian, was admitted to the Hospital here suffering from very severe burning about the face ears and arms. The cause of the accident was the explosion of a coal oil stove on board the boat in which he was fishing with his uncle, Isaac Sankey. The latter is also severely burned on one side of the face.

### ORGANIZE SUPPORT FOR PROHIBITION

Four Clergymen and Labor Representatives to be Nucleus of Committee.

After the address of Tom Richardson at the prohibition meeting in McIntyre Hall last night, it was decided to form a committee to manage the prohibition campaign in this city. The committee is to be formed of four local clergymen and representatives from the local labor organizations, men and women, in addition to other citizens to be named later.

### ROUTE TO PEACE RIVER OUTLINED

Survey Already in Progress with View to Construction of Railway.

VICTORIA, July 1.—It is announced here officially that a survey is already in progress with a view to construction of the P. G. E. to connect with the Edmonton, Dunvegan and B. C. line. It will follow the Nechaco River to Fort St. James, across Choochi Lake to Nation River, thence to Manson River, along the valley to Findlay Forks and down the Peace River.

Quiet Times in the City.

Business is a little quiet in the city. In fact business is rather quiet everywhere. The rather unsettled money market, more unsettled than most of us realize, is touching us even in this remote spot. On the whole, however, business conditions are in a healthy state.

Many people today have become so tired of paying the increasingly higher prices that they have stopped buying and the result has not been good for business.

Will Prices Go Much Lower?

One of the subjects which is continually discussed in business circles is whether prices will go much lower in the near future or will they go higher? In discussing the matter the Financial Post of Toronto says:

"Both in the United States and Canada official attention is drawn to there being a decline in wholesale prices, but that retail figures are still maintained and the long-suffering retailer is thus charged with profiteering by thoughtless people.

Silver and Gold Bricks at Stewart.

A dispatch from Vancouver this morning states that a cyanide mill will be put in at the Premier mine near Stewart. This plant will refine the gold and silver into bars right at the camp and will add much to the permanency of that section as a mining centre and will tend to make the town of Stewart more stable.

Hospital Policy of Government.

The provincial government is investigating the matter of hospitals throughout the province. Dr. Arthur, an expert in that line, is going from place to place and will make a comprehensive report to the government on which they will base a policy to be introduced at the next session of the legislature.

The conduct of a hospital is always difficult. If hospitals are free, as many think they should be, there are so many people who are ready to impose on the hospital authorities in order to secure a few days' rest and free treatment.

FLUCTUATIONS IN WHALEN PULP STOCKS

MONTREAL, July 31.—Whalen Pulp has had an interesting movement in the unlisted department of the Montreal exchange for some weeks past, although the bullish developments have largely subsided. About the beginning of July the stock was selling around 48 in the unlisted market. Just prior to the announcement of the annual statement the stock rose to 66. Since July 12, when the highest point was reached bull tips on this stock have failed to stimulate any favorable response, the stock suffering a gradual decline, reaching 54 this week. One report from Vancouver forwarded by Canadian press despatch was to the effect that earnings of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Company amounted to \$850,000 for the month of June, equivalent to over \$10,000,000 per annum. Apparently the public regards this news as propaganda, in view of the earnings of the company for the past year.

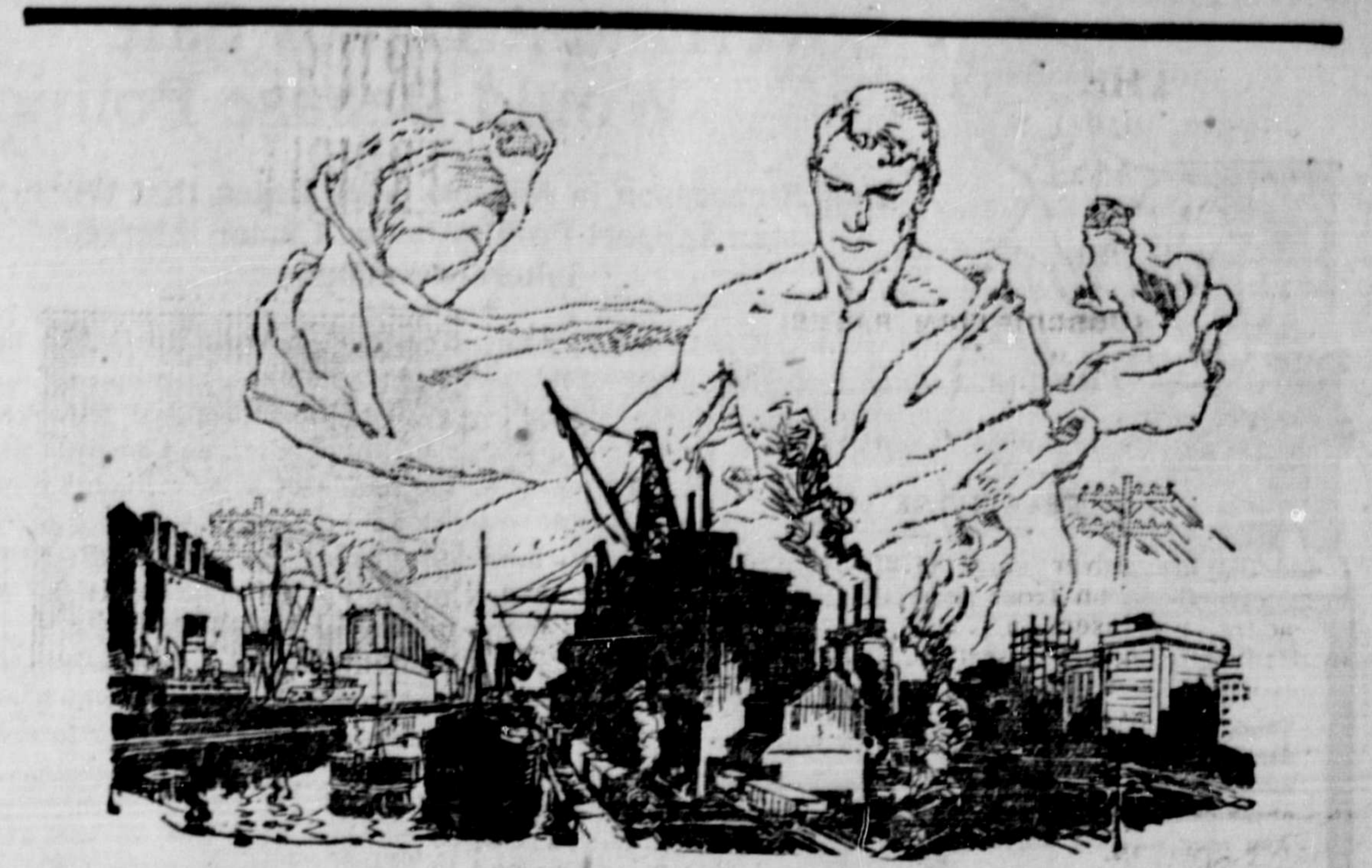

# Government Liquor Sale Would Debase Politics

### Tom Richardson in Address here Urges that Workingmen Support Prohibition as Liquor Interests Inherent Enemies

"If all the resourcefulness of the liquor interests had been requisitioned they could not have produced a proposal more threatening than the one suggested. The proposal leaves untouched the important question of importation and manufacture. It leaves the sale of liquor in the hands of a government vendor and all purchases would require to be made from the government." So said Tom Richardson, formerly member of the British Parliament, who addressed a rather sparse meeting at the McIntyre Hall last night on the question of prohibition.

Mr. Richardson suggested that the tendency of government control of liquor sales would tend to debase politics, which even now was bad enough. He showed how strong the liquor interests were in the Old Country, so strong that they were able to control the policy of Premier Lloyd George contrary to his principles and to his expressed opinion when he declared that the liquor traffic was the greatest enemy Britain possessed. During the war those interests were willing to sell out for £100,000,000 but now they had increased their demand to £1,200,000,000, or an advance of 300 per cent.

The speaker declared that the revenue effect was demoralizing. Instead of turning to government sale of liquor he would advise that prohibition was enforced.

#### Moderation League.

Referring to the claims of the Moderation League and the Liberty League, Mr. Richardson asked had they ever heard of the liquor interests being on the side of the workingmen. The liquor interests, he declared, had always been the inherent enemy of the classes. The workingmen were painfully sensitive of the fact that they were inherent enemies. Why then this newborn interest in the workingmen. Now they were told it was a crime to rob the workingman of his beer. "Did booze ever help them to get shorter hours or more money," he asked. "It was always the reverse."

#### Inherent Enemy.

The claim that the liquor men were friends of the workers was an unwarranted one and not according to fact. The representatives of labor were with prohibition.

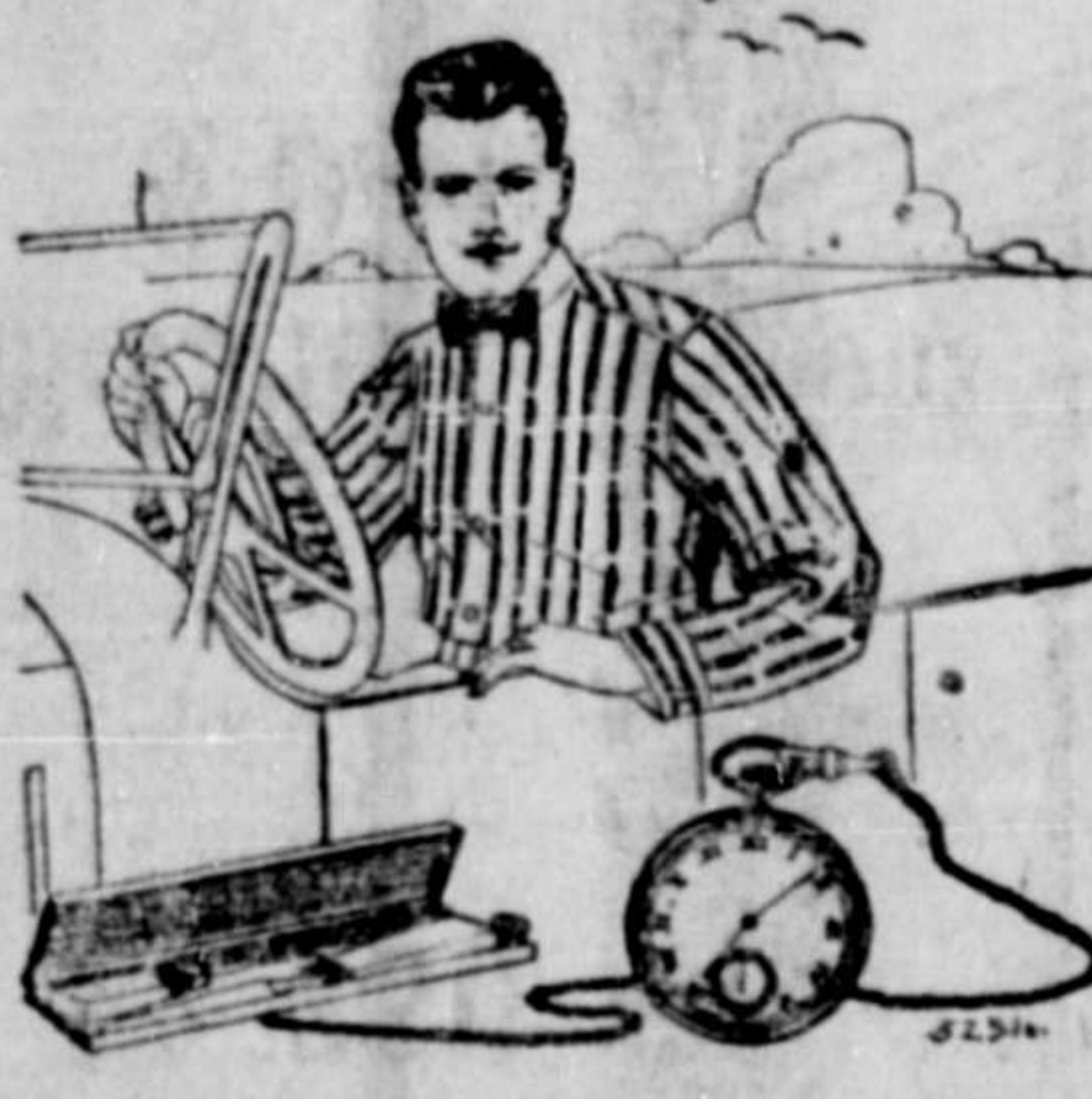

### MANY BRIDES MUST AGAIN GO TO SCHOOL

Young Girls at Detroit Marry But Are Hooked by Official.

DETROIT, July 30.—Twenty-six brides, all under 16 years, will have to forsake their domestic duties and return to school, according to a ruling of the Chief Attendance Officer of the Board of Education. Judge Hullburt, in Probate Court, has also ruled that under the State law all children must attend school until they are 16, and he can see no reason why marriage should make a difference.

Judge Hullburt in a few days will give his decision in the case of Agnes Bauer, 15-year-old bride, who was married in Windsor in April, and who this Attendance Officer says must go to school. Since the first of the year there have been 26 girls attending Detroit grade schools who have been married. Except in cases where physicians have made affidavits to the effect that they are not in a physical condition to attend school, the Attendance Department has taken the case into court, and as a result they have been ordered back to school. "We have gone into the matter thoroughly and while there is nothing in the school law to prevent girls under 16 from getting married, young brides of this character must go to school the full time the same as their unmarried sisters," the Attendance Officer stated today.

### SMITHERS TO HAVE ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION

Meeting Held Few Days Ago to Make Arrangements.

An athletic association is to be formed in Smithers. A meeting was held there on Friday night for the purpose of organizing and it was decided to have it include all branches of sport in the town. A. A. Hutchinson was chosen secretary-treasurer and a committee will support him composed of G. H. Gazely, James Stockman, G. M. New, and E. R. Grech.

### TEN PER CENT INCREASE

Telephone Rates in the East are Advanced.

TORONTO, July 30.—Final sanction and approval of a 10 per cent increase in telephone rates by the Bell Telephone Company, which was authorized over a year ago by the Dominion Railway Board, has been given by the Governor-General in Council. The new rates will, by this approval, remain permanent, because the Cabinet has refused to grant the appeal of Toronto and other municipalities in which the request was made that the board's order be rescinded as unjustified, and there is no higher court to which to appeal.

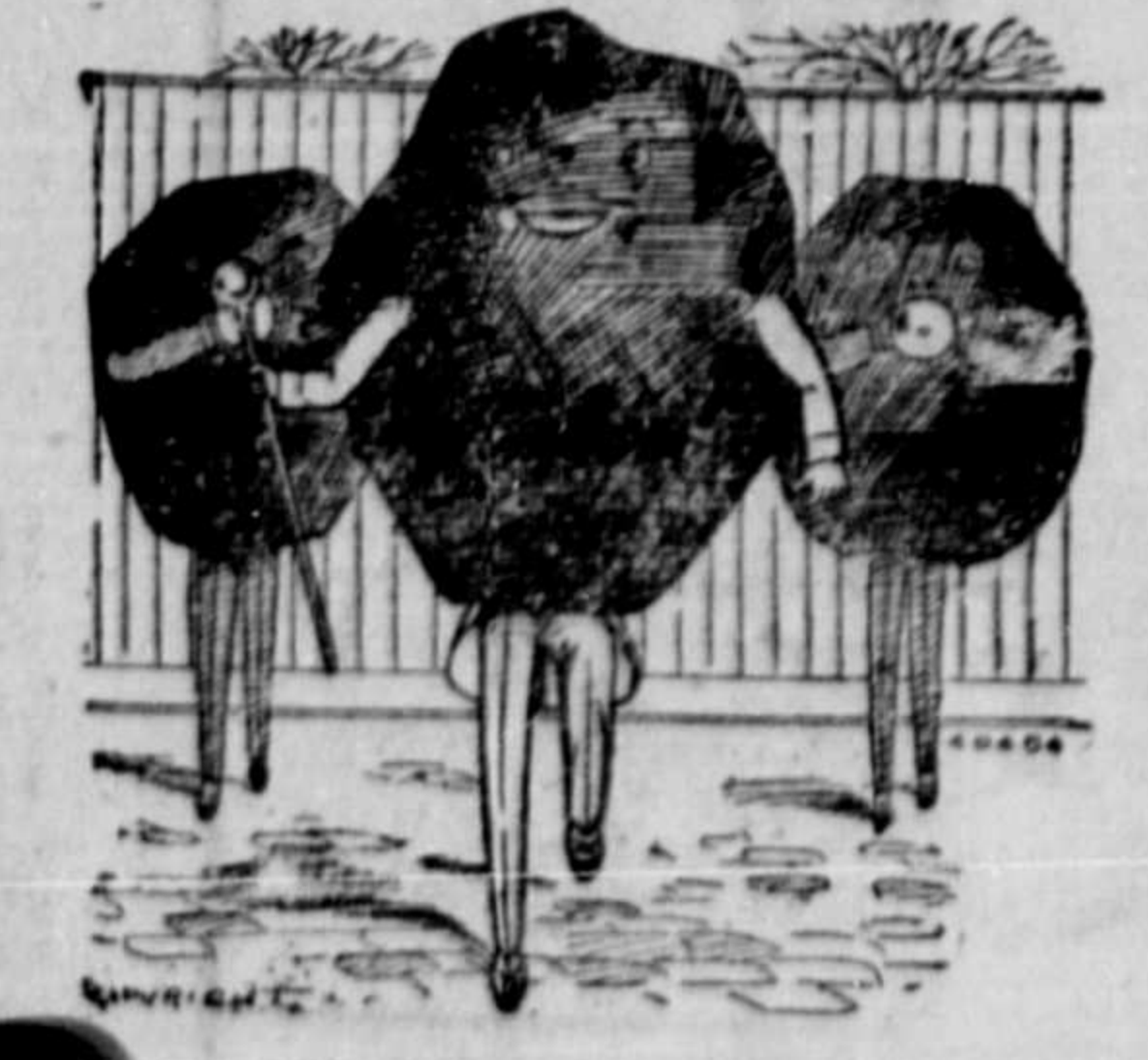
