## Big Holdup on C.P.R. in Mountains NEW YORK TO NOME AEROPLANES DELAYED FEW DAYS AT PRINCE GEORGE

### Three Bandits Rob Train in Crows Nest Pass District

Each man for Cash and Valuables but leave women and children unmolested; Officials herded into rear car

PRINCE GEORGE, August 3.—The Canadian Pacific Railway local train between Lethbridge and Cranbrook was held up by three bandits on Monday afternoon in the Rockies. The men, two foreigners, boarded the train at Lethbridge and left Cranbrook at 10:30 a.m. The women and children were unmolested but some of the men were searched even to the undergarments. There were 100 passengers aboard the train when the holdup occurred. Sam Jones of Lethbridge, was ordered by a stranger to get down. He refused and a bullet passed his ear. One bandit ordered the train officials into the rear car, a second guarded the train while the third robbed the passengers and then ordered the train to proceed. The bandits who disappeared into the hills in the Crows' Nest Pass.

### STEALING WAS NOT PROVEN

Accused J. S. MacKenzie said he bought the Barrel of Herring

In the speedy trial before Judge Young in the County Court yesterday afternoon the charge against J. S. MacKenzie of stealing a barrel of herring from the steamer Tillamook was dismissed on the ground that the crown had not satisfied the court beyond a doubt that the accused was guilty. The man held on the charge was a deck hand on the ship and, owing to the serious nature of the charge, the proof had to be sure. W. O. Fulton appeared for the Grand Trunk, T. B. Hooper for the Crown and M. Gonzalez for the accused. Evidence was given by the pursuer that the fish came on the boat. Shed foreman Welford and a checker stated that stealing was remotely possible during the unloading. The Chinese cook of the boat saw a man with a barrel at 2 a.m., and although only a short distance away could not identify the man. The accused claimed that he had bought the barrel of herring from another fisherman and here it was proved that anyone bent on stealing could easily have got away with one of the barrels from the ship. The trial lasted from 2:30 to 6:35.

### LORD FRENCH MAY RESIGN

His Secretary Has Already Quit and Viceroy May Follow.

DUBLIN, August 3.—Edward Sanderson, secretary to General French, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, has resigned his position and it is commonly reported that Lord French is himself proposing to drop out. The famous general finds the job more difficult than he expected.

### HOLDING FISH EXPECTING CARS

No Sale at Exchange This Morning Until News Arrives Regarding Refrigerators.

At the Fish Exchange this morning little business was done. It was decided that the fishermen in with catches would fare just as well by holding their fish until tomorrow when cars might arrive by the freight. There are no refrigerator cars due on this evening's passenger train from the east but a time freight is due in tomorrow afternoon. No word has been obtained as to what this train is bringing, so there is just a chance that one or two cars might arrive. John Dybhavn created quite a stir amongst the buyers and fishermen alike when he came away from the phone after a session with Mr. Haines and said "There are nine due tonight." Everyone thought that nine fish cars were meant, for after the windfall of last week when a total of fourteen arrived, anything might be expected. However, it was merely the information that nine coaches made up the passenger train tonight. The fishermen waiting will not lose very much and will gain a lot if the cars are forthcoming. They are reluctant in letting their good fish go at freezing prices. The following boats are in from the banks: Mira 41,000 lbs., Nidaros 9,000, Hippo 16,000, Marguerite 11,000, Agnes B. 9,500, Stanley B. 2,000, Kouyasu 6,000, and Mab 4,500 lbs. The Foster has arrived in port with 60,000 lbs. of halibut and 40,000 lbs. of sable fish for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

### CEMENT CONCRETE IS IDEAL PAVING

Tar Macadam May be Used as Temporary Expedient—Granite Better Than Local Rock.

That under the present financial condition of the city and country it might be wise to construct the roads here of tar macadam rather than cement, was the suggestion made to the city council last night by H. L. Wighton, a civil engineer and road building expert, who is in the city today and who had a long talk with the members of the council last night. Mr. Wighton says that undoubtedly cement concrete is the material for road making. It is permanent and satisfactory if properly laid. It is costly, however, and these are other materials that answer the purpose temporarily. He says that tar macadam is being used extensively and if kept in repair lasts for some time. The tar macadam he suggests for use here is an ordinary macadam road made from coarse crushed rock, with a layer of finer crushed rock over it. This is covered with a layer of tarvia, covered with a thin layer of sand, rolled, and is then ready for use. The tarvia can be renewed at any time. In reply to a question from the mayor, Mr. Wighton said he would not suggest this would last for four years, because so much depended on the wear it got. This class of road would have to be repaired whenever a bad place appeared. Cement Concrete. The cement concrete used for paving should be about six inches thick and consisted of a mixture of one part cement, two parts sand and three parts crushed rock. It had to be put down during dry weather, but a shower would not injure it. In discussing the question of rock, Mr. Wighton said the local rock was of a salty nature and ground into mud easily. The granite from Smith Island was much superior to it, although not as good as hard trap rock. In the absence of better rock the Smith Island granite would make good material. Comparative Cost. Mr. Wighton thought concrete would possibly cost about \$2.75 a square yard but tar macadam would cost only 25c a yard more than plain macadam. The tar would give the macadam at least twice its ordinary life. It might be worth while testing it with native rock although he confessed the native rock did not appeal to him as being much good except as a temporary expedient. The granite would be easily 100 per cent better than the rock here.

### COL. HIAM ON BIG MISSION

Goes to Europe under Council of League of Nations

Lieut.-Col. T. A. Hiam, who has been appointed to an important office in connection with the regulation of transportation in Europe under the Council of the League of Nations, reached the city from Stewart Thursday morning, says the Vancouver World. Together with his mother he will leave for the east in the immediate future and will sail from Montreal next week. Many people will remember Colonel Hiam years ago when he used to visit the coast often as private secretary to Sir Donald Mann. During the war he served with an infantry battalion, holding the post of adjutant in the 5th Division before that force was broken up. Thereafter he held important appointments in France and Belgium. Lately he has been looking after the interests of Sir Donald Mann in the Stewart district, particularly with reference to the building of transportation facilities.

### FINED FOR HAVING LIQUOR IN POSSESSION

In the police court this morning M. D. Sweet pleaded guilty to having liquor in possession other than according to the prohibition act. He was fined \$50 by Magistrate McMordeie. \* In the case of Jean Johnson, who is facing a similar charge, adjournment was made until tomorrow.

### POOR SALMON PACK IN SOME CANNERIES

KETCHIKAN, Aug. 3.—"There are some twelve canneries in the vicinity of Icy Straits and Chatham Straits and all of these but two are putting up short packs," said Captain James Cunnane, of the tug Maryland, who came to Ketchikan this morning for a cargo of fish for the Pyramid Packing Company of Sitka. Captain Cunnane attributes the shortage of fish there this year to the weather, which, he thinks, as kept the fish offshore until they got farther south.

### Big Engine is Rebuilt in Local G. T. P. Shops

Trial Trip of Number 621 this afternoon preparatory to her going on one of the Passenger Trains of this Division

This afternoon the big engine, Number 621, is being given her trial trip following her rebuilding in the local locomotive shops. She is practically a new engine from the ground up and the work is exactly similar to that being done at Montreal and the other big shops. She will be put on one of the passenger runs as soon as she is properly painted and cleaned up. This is a type of the work that is going on at the local G. T. P. shops, which are in charge of J. W. McAuley, locomotive foreman, who has charge of this division. Several engines are overhauled here every month and a staff of something like eighty men is employed continuously carrying on the work. The work is done in some rough sheds, through the apertures of which daylight can be seen almost everywhere. Naturally this is a handicap, yet real work is done and done well. The pay-roll in these shops amounts to between twelve and thirteen thousand dollars a month and naturally this is an important industry, even though it is often almost forgotten when speaking of the industries of the port. As the business of the line increases the work done in the local shops will increase and the number of employees will be greater.

### Plane Damaged on Way from Jasper

Fought Thunderstorms on way and Broke Wing and Tail when Landing; Delayed at Prince George

PRINCE GEORGE, August 3.—Three out of the four aeroplanes en route to Nome from New York state, arrived here shortly after eleven yesterday. Number 3 plane burst a tire when landing, otherwise all is well and the weather is ideal. One plane will leave for Hazelton this morning. Cheering crowds of people from all the surrounding country were here to watch the landing and they gave the visitors an ovation. Many people saw aeroplanes yesterday for the first time. The birdmen say they have been impressed with the reception they have been given in Canada. Everywhere they have been received with enthusiasm and have been royally entertained at many points. PRINCE GEORGE, August 3.—A storm he seriously damaged his machine, the left wing and tail being smashed. It is doubtful if he can repair it here. From Jasper to Prince George, a distance of 445 miles, was covered in four hours, fifteen minutes.

### LOADING OIL G. T. P. DOCK

Liquid Being Transferred From Barrels to Tank Cars.

A very interesting project is in progress at the Grand Trunk wharf this morning. Two tank cars on the shed track are being filled with herring oil which the Tillamook has brought in barrels from Alaska. The barrels are rolled up an inclined plane and emptied into a tin lined wooden box. This receptacle is large enough to allow three barrels to drain at the same time. As soon as one barrel is empty it is taken off and a new one put in its place. A pump is used to force the oil into the tank. All grades of the herring oil are mixed in to fill the 8,000 gals. capacity cars. This method of loading is not new but by a few recent improvements the work has been lightened considerably.

### MORSE CREEK BRIDGE

Plans Had to go Back for Revision—Money Shortage.

At the City Council meeting last night Alderman Murray asked what progress was being made with Section 2 bridge. Mayor McClymont: "Perhaps the Board of Works would like to know who is prodding you up, Alderman Murray." Alderman Kerr explained that the G. T. P. engineers had not accepted the revised plans and as a result they had to go back again for revision. Also there was a shortage of cash. If anyone wanted to buy some bridge bonds they could get them now.

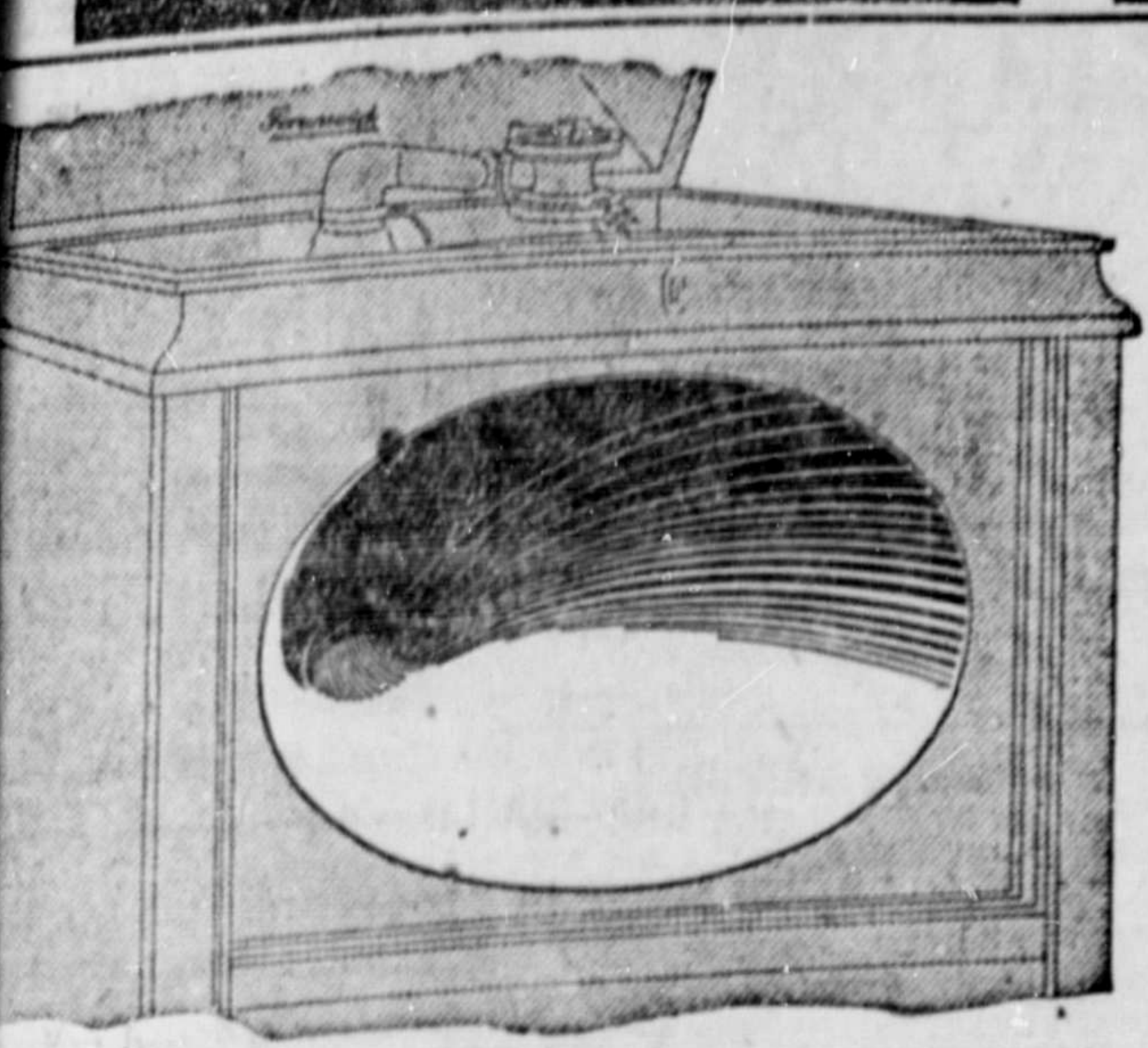
### MILITARY RULE

### BOY DROWNED AT JERICHO BEACH

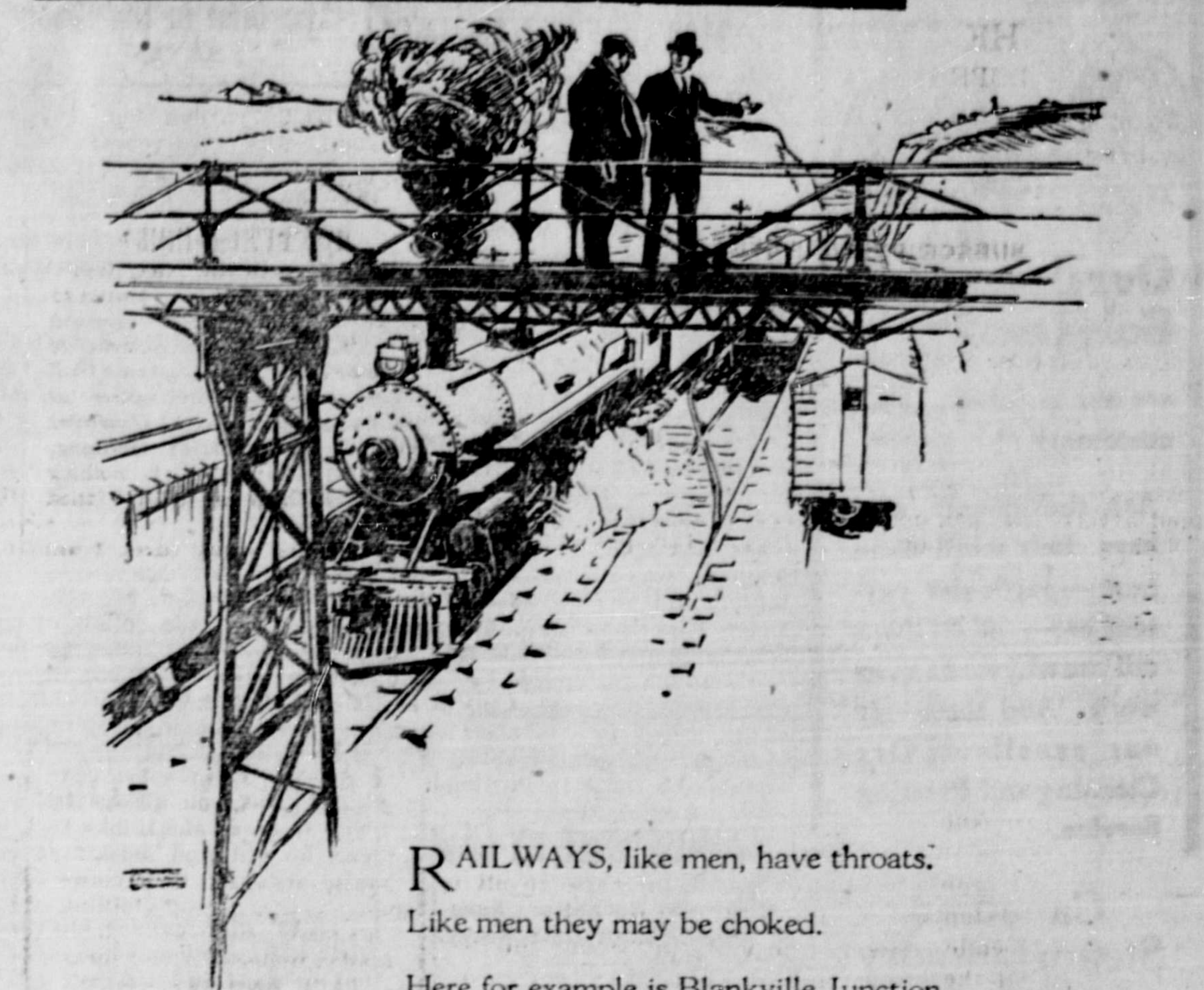
VANCOUVER, Aug. 3.—Arthur Hay, twelve years of age, dived from a raft at Jericho Beach and was drowned yesterday.

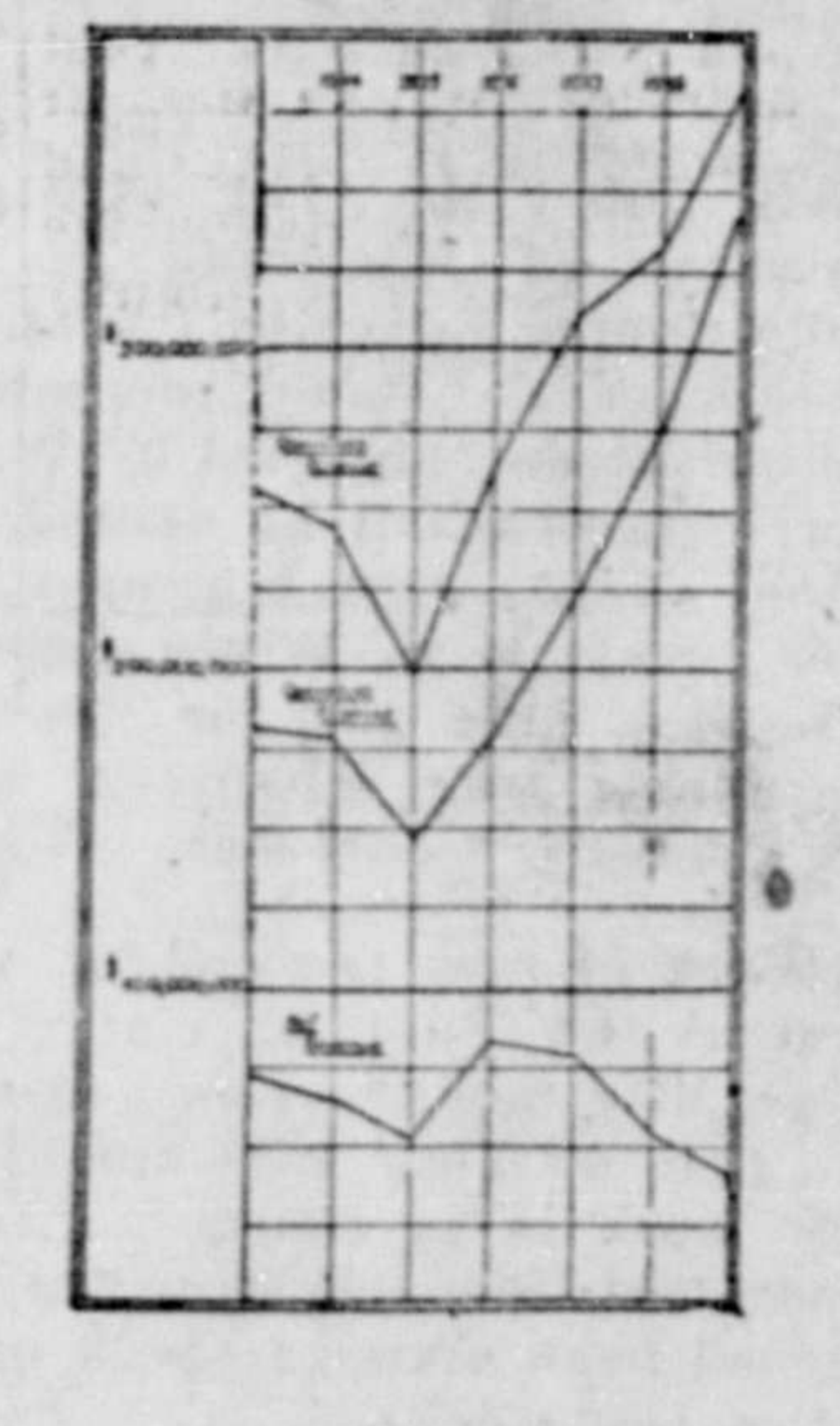
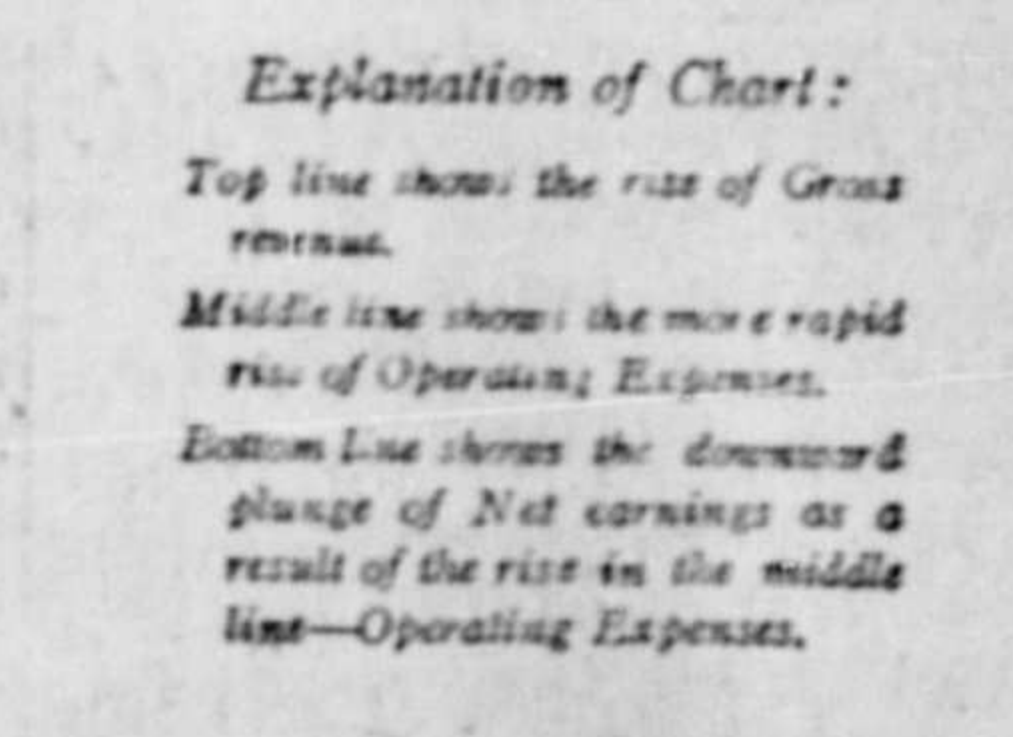

Two cars of ore concentrates were shipped from the Silver Standard mine at New Hazelton last week.

Messrs. Honeyman and Barnwell who have been working on the geology of the Stewart section for the past few weeks and who passed through the city over the week-end report that everything is progressing very favorably at the mining camp. The town has nothing of the appearance or spirit of being a boom town and mine owners and operators are working on the assurance which many samples and projects have established by satisfactory results. A recent find in the Marmot section raised a great deal of excitement as it assayed from the specimen well over the \$700 mark.

More development work will likely follow the visit of W. H. Hargrave of Edmonton to the Delta Copper Company's holdings at Roche de Boule mountain, last week accompanied by W. G. Norrie-Lowenthal he visited the mine where some ten men are now employed. While on the ground a program for further operations was discussed with the company's engineer.

Petition Presented to City Council  
Last Night From Residents  
of Section 2.

A petition signed by H. Ward and 22 others living in Section 2 asking that the garbage scow be moved to some other place, as it was injurious to health and obnoxious in breeding flies and pervading the district with a bad odor, was presented to the City Council at its meeting last night. Alderman Dybhavn remarked that the scow used to start dumping before it left Section 2 and turn when it was empty.

Alderman Kerr thought the explanation given by the mayor last week was the correct one. It was a question of choosing the correct time for the work when the tides were right.

### CLUBS SELL NEAR BEER

Delegation to Attorney-General  
Takes Exception to  
Privilege.

VANCOUVER, July 31.—A civic deputation, joined by representatives of the Hotelmen's Association, learned from Attorney-General J. W. deB. Farris in a conference at the Hotel Vancouver Friday afternoon the official opinion that the city was almost powerless to curb the so-called "clubs" selling near beer. The only suggestion accepted was that the Vancouver council apply for a charter amendment before the next legislature, to obtain powers of regulation and control over these clubs within the city limits.

Hotelmen have protested repeatedly to the City Council the unfairness of rigidly controlling them under a \$500 annual licence fee, compelling Sunday closing of bars, while these clubs were permitted to remain open and sell near beer at all hours and all day Sunday. The hotel proprietors were not fighting the clubs but thought they, as standard hotel keepers, were being discriminated against.

Attorney-General Farris said if Vancouver would apply for a charter amendment to obtain control of "club" operations next year, the move would have his hearty support.

It is stated that the bar proprietors will press for a refund of \$250 on their near-beer license fees, upon the ground that the clubs operating under a \$10 annual provincial license fee under the Benevolent Society Act are granted privileges which the bar proprietors can not secure under a \$500 fee.

### PROPOSE TRIP PEACE RIVER

Vancouver Board of Trade Circularized  
Regarding Visit Calling  
at Prince Rupert.

VANCOUVER, August 2.—The members of the Board of Trade here were circularized today regarding a proposed trip up the coast to Prince Rupert and east to Peace River, calling at Terrace, Smithers, Prince George and Edmonton.

If the trip is made the party will start from here about the middle of September and be away two weeks.

### FORMER RESIDENT OF PRINCE RUPERT PLAYS FINAL GAME

JOHANNESBURG, Aug. 2.—Percy Sholto Douglas, Marquis of Queensbury, the sporting peer, is dead. He was the descendant of the nobleman who drew up the rules for fighting which have been standards for the game.

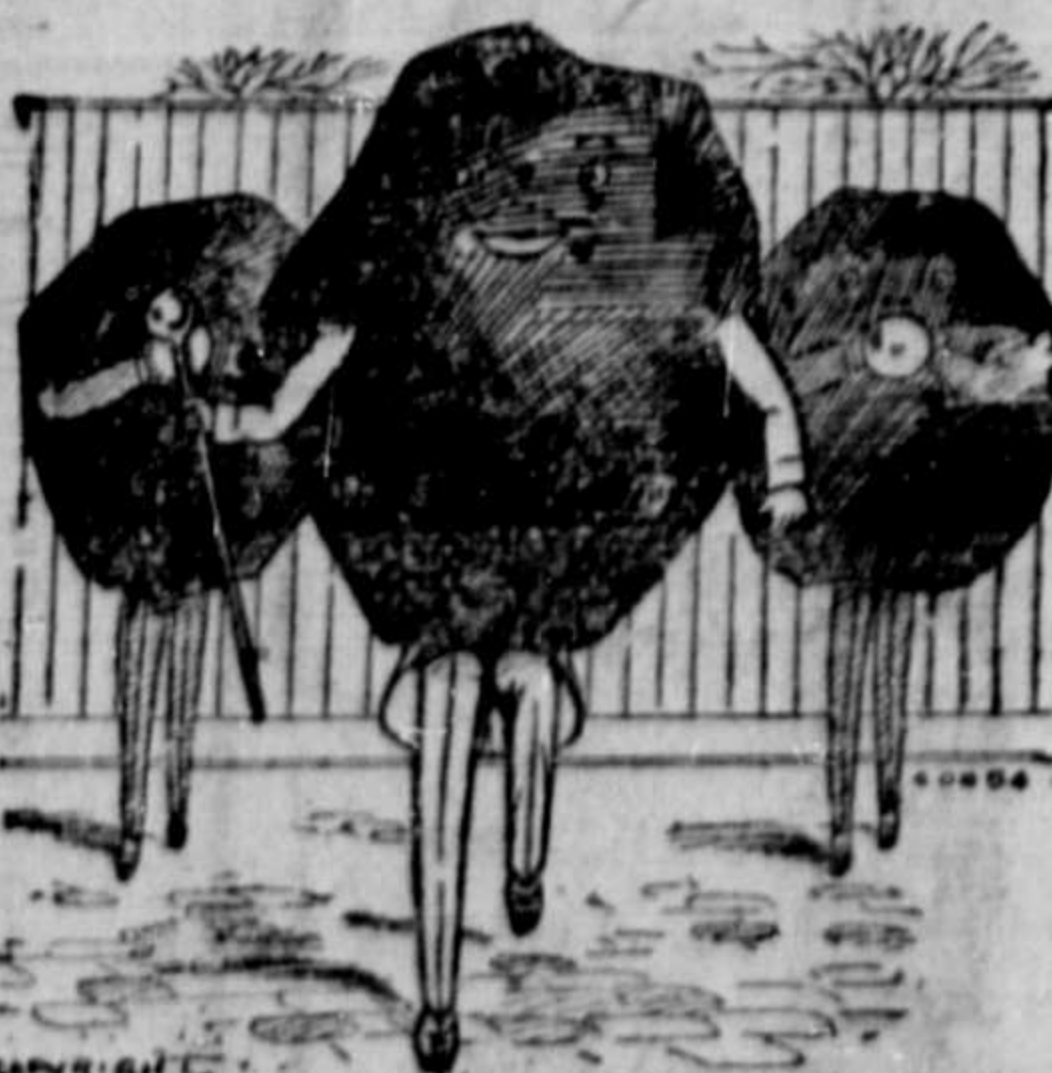

## GOOD CROPS IN NORTH ALBERTA

Everything Looks Well—Cutting Barley Has Commenced.

EDMONTON, August 3.—Farmers in the Edmonton district are watching with supreme satisfaction the rapid growth of the best grain crops in years, according to reports received from many communities north, south, east and west. Almost without exception the districts seem to have been favored with splendid rains; growing conditions are ideal and the morale of the farmer seems to be good at this time. Their report of the situation ranges from "good average," "good," and "a bumper crop," when speaking of the prospective yield in wheat and other grains. In the districts close to the city ideal conditions prevail and in no case is a scanty crop or a failure reported.

#### Wheat Well Headed.

Wheat headed out is beginning to fill nicely and it is estimated will be ready for the binder in the course of three or four weeks.

The prospects for a bumper crop throughout the Hyley district are improving daily," says the report. "A bigger crop of grain will be harvested this fall than ever before. All wheat and oats, seeded reasonably early, are out in head, filling rapidly and from the standpoint of uniformity can be little improved upon." That seems to be the general condition at points east of the city. As far east as Chauvin the crops are ideal, the stand high and the wheat and oats are very healthy.

#### Bumper at Leduc.

Leduc report says: "A sufficient supply of rain has fallen to ensure a bumper crop again this year.

"The crops in the Alliance district are doing exceptionally well under ideal weather conditions. Samples of wheat are five feet high. The only crop that compares with this one since the settlement of the district, is the bumper crop of 1915."

Towards the north, including the Peace River territory, it is the general opinion that crops are in excellent condition after refreshing rains, and the farmers feel richer by thousands of dollars.

#### Some Hail Damage.

Hail is reported in one or two sections of the country, but little damage is spoken of except at Wetaskiwin, where a more damaging storm than fell Monday night has not been experienced for years.

The barley and rye crop appears to be exceptionally good and the cutting of these grains has been started in some districts.

The cutting of hay appears to be general. A most luxuriant growth is reported and farmers appear to be putting up large quantities this year.

## NEW HAZELTON
