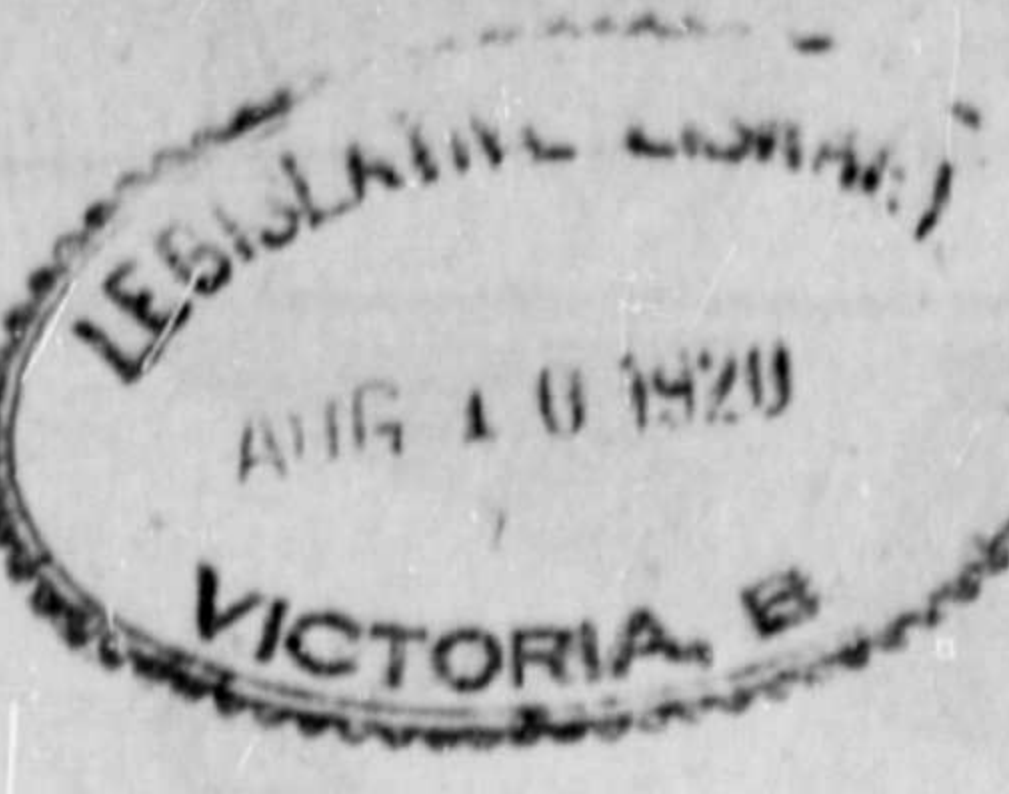

Planning to Build More Ships Here

TERRIFIC THUNDER STORM IN MANITOBA INCONVENIENCES THE RESIDENTS

Reports Favor of Building Tankers at Prince Rupert

W. T. Donnelly commissioned to Investigate Conditions here and is Reporting Favorably to Newman Erb regarding Local Plant

Many Docks Being Built Similar to One at This Port

With and Development of Water Transportation in Next Few Years will be Very Great

William T. Donnelly, consulting engineer of New York, who has been in charge of the drydock and ship repairing plant here and a number of other ones elsewhere, and who is here valuing the local plant of the Grand Trunk Railway, has been commissioned by Newman Erb, lessee of the local yards, to report on the possibilities of building tankers here.

When seen this morning by a Daily News representative, Mr. Donnelly said that a number of oil carrying vessels were required and he had reason to believe that Prince Rupert would get her share of the contracts.

He was conferring with superintendent J. H. Pillsbury in regard to the capacity of the plant and its general condition.

In view of the satisfactory progress being made on the ships here, Mr. Donnelly said he felt justified in recommending to Mr. Erb that the local yard would be able to handle the contracts and as a result he felt sure that they would come here.

Mr. Donnelly said that he was pleased to see the additions that had been made to the yards since he completed his part of the work three and a half years ago. The plant looked in just as good condition as when he left. He was also pleased to see the work that was being done. The repair work recently completed was excellent and done in quick time.

Similar Docks
As soon as Mr. Donnelly left here he designed a similar dock for the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, that concern having decided that it was part of the work of a big concern to maintain ships in service as well as to overhaul them. He had been at work but two months when he received two more orders, one for a dock of 10,000 tons capacity and the other 6,000 tons. He also closed a contract for an 8,000 ton dock to the U.S. Steel Corporation at New York and W. A. Fletcher Co. of New York opened an 8,000 ton dock the day before he left and since that time five ships have been docked there in ten days. It was significant that two of the biggest corporations in the country had built docks similar to the one here since this one was built.

Possibilities.
Mr. Donnelly says that the growth and development of water transportation in the next few years will be beyond anything most people imagine. Industries now were all looking for waterfront locations and business on the water was bound to increase rapidly.

F. Jeaner, wharfinger for the G. T. P., arrived back this morning from a visit to Vancouver and Victoria.

Alex. Storey, formerly a machinist at the Grand Trunk shops, arrived back from Vancouver by the Grand Trunk steamer this morning. Present conditions of employment are not of the very best in the south according to Mr. Storey.

CHAUTAUQUA COMING SOON

All Canadian Company to be Here Early in September With Varied Program.

On September 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 the Canadian Chautauquas Ltd., under the management and ownership of Harold R. Peat will give a series of performances in the city. This is the first Canadian firm to enter the Chautauqua field in Canada. Mr. Peat needs no introduction to the people of this country. He has become known as an author since the publication of his book called Private Peat, a narrative of his experiences overseas with the first contingent and as a lecturer in the United States and Canada. This is an entirely different company from that which was here last year.

A large and varied program will be presented although all the details of the various performances have not been arranged. Included in the program is Count Sebada, an Italian-Polish violinist, whose reputation is worldwide. Elsie May Gordon who will go on the Orpheum circuit during the winter will also make an appearance with the company. She will present a number of delightful southern impersonations. Col. N. P. Purdy of the Dominion Great War Veterans will also be here, as well as a soldier quartette, a harpist and a duo from the Chicago Opera Co.

UNCHARTERED ROCK DISCOVERED ON ALASKAN COAST
Captain Charles MacGregor, master of the steamship Norwood, reports the discovery of an uncharted rock at a point approximately thirty miles south of the Semidi Islands, South-western Alaska. The rock lies in the way of the cannery vessels of the Western Alaska fishing fleets. MacGregor reports the location of the rock in latitude 55.23, longitude 107.08, the top of the rock bearing 151 degrees, true from Lighthouse Rock, 24 miles distant from the uncharted menace.

TEN THOUSAND WATCH FUNERAL OF PET CANARY
"Jimmie" Laid to Rest at Cost of \$400 at Newark.

NEWARK, N. J., August 4.—Ten thousand people witnessed the funeral of Jimmie, an old cobbler's pet canary that was well known as a wonderful singer. A band led the procession.

The body of the dead bird was enclosed in a tiny casket and carried in an ordinary hearse bedecked with flowers. The cobbler and his friends followed in a coach.

LONGSHOREMEN GET INCREASE

Wages Now to be 90c an Hour for Day Work and \$1.10 Overtime.

The board of arbitration considering the labor dispute between the Longshoremen and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway has arrived at a unanimous decision and has sent its report to Ottawa. It is that there was considerable giving and taking and it covers a number of points in addition to that of wages.

While the arbitrators are not giving out any information until their report has reached Ottawa, it is understood that the men are to receive an increase in pay amounting to ten cents an hour for straight time and five cents for overtime. The rate now to be paid here is 90c and \$1.10. This is somewhat in the nature of a compromise.

Judge Young is chairman of the arbitration board with F. G. Dawson representing the company and W. E. Thompson the men.

YOUNG BOYS UP FOR TRIAL

Frank Lozon Fined \$100 for Breaking Window of Cafe.

The three boys who were gathered in by the police a few days ago on a series of robbery charges were committed for trial on two of these charges this morning in the police court before Magistrate McMordie. The first charge is that of breaking open a post letter box situated at Hays Cove Circle and removing two letters. The other charge is that of breaking and entering the dwelling of R. McCook and taking money to the amount of \$40 as well as a gold watch. They have also admitted being the guilty parties to the other outrages which have been worrying the police for some time.

Frank Lozon, who was taken in by Sergeant Adams and Constable McGlinchey last evening, appeared under the vagrancy act for breaking a plate glass window in the Elite Cafe. The magistrate fined him \$100 in spite of the prisoner's protests that breaking was accidental and also ordered him to pay for the window which was valued at \$95.

Joe Yip, a Chinaman, was fined the customary \$50 for having liquor in his possession other than in a private dwelling house. He was arrested by Sergt. Adams at the corner of Ninth Avenue and Fulton Street.

In the case of Jean Johnson who was held on a similar charge on an adjourned case, she was set back to the amount of \$50.

Prince Rupert Able To Build Engines.

The buildings are so unpretentious and the men go about their work so quietly that it is only by chance the thing comes to light. The foreman and men at the G. T. P. shops are all to be congratulated on the excellent results obtained.


Manchester Guardian On Sir Robert Borden.

In an editorial article under the heading "Sir Robert Borden Resigns" the Manchester Guardian says:

The retirement of Sir Robert Borden as Prime Minister of Canada, which is now officially announced, brings to an end a distinguished Premiership, and marks the end of an epoch of the first importance in Canadian politics. The Government which he formed in 1917 was, like our own Coalition, a war device, necessary no doubt, but as abnormal to the political life of the country as the circumstances that gave it birth. It was based on a fusion of the Conservative party with certain members of the various sections of the Opposition. Predominantly it was composed of Conservatives, but it numbered some stalwart Liberals, Mr. Rowell among them, who put the claim of national unity in war above that of political principle. The Union Government served its turn, and history will not deny to Sir Robert Borden his place as an able, sincere, and dignified representative of Canada at war. Nor will it fail to recognize the imagination with which he seized upon the chances the war offered to advance the autonomy and independence of his country, in asserting her right to debate the Peace Treaty for herself and to affix her signature to it, and more recently her case for having an ambassador of her own at Washington.

Value of Union Is at End.

But with this great work done, the value of the Union Government comes to an end. It cannot fit itself to face the normal issues of political life in time of peace. The tariff question, to mention one only, cuts too deeply across it. Already on that issue some of its ablest members, such as Mr. Crepar, have resigned, and if Mr. Rowell, as seems likely, goes to Washington and a sound Protectionist, such as Sir George Foster or Hon. Arthur Meighen, succeeds to the Premiership, then it is clear that by whatever name the remnant of the "Union" Government may call itself it will in fact be a party government of the old sort. As such it cannot have either a long or a comfortable life. The growing strength of the Farmers, with insistence on Free Trade as their main plank, is rolling up against it, and with them and their strongly reforming program Labor is at least temporarily allied. The old Liberal party, under its able young leader, Mr. Mackenzie King, is still active, and the recent Budget debate saw a Liberal-Agrarian alliance that bodes no good for the Protectionist interests. Sir Robert Borden's successor will have a hard task, and it is little wonder that the difficulty of finding anyone willing for the post should have delayed till now a resignation which failing health as well as failing policy thus for some months made inevitable.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

MINISTER OF MINES VISITS THE INTERIOR

Expresses Himself Pleased with Progress Made at Different Camps

Having attended the Third International Mining Convention held at Nelson, B.C., between July 20 and 24, Hon. Wm. Sloan, Minister of Mines, has returned to his departmental duties at Victoria. While in the Kootenays he took advantage of the opportunity to visit Fernie, Kaslo and other of the mining centres of Eastern British Columbia and was impressed with the healthy activity evidenced not only in mining but as well in the lumber and other industries. In the Sloan many of the mines, it is true, were affected by labor troubles, but the prospects were that these differences would be adjusted shortly and that the producing mines would be operating normally before long.

No Labor Trouble

At Fernie, and throughout the Crow's Nest Pass Coalfield, the outlook was bright, which was important in view of the present necessity for a maximum production of coal. The management and the employees of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company, Ltd., had entered into an agreement in respect of wages and general conditions, the life of which was two years. It was satisfactory to find that a basis had been found for an amicable settlement of all outstanding differences. This would permit the coal mines of that district to proceed, uninterrupted, with the development of the coal measures and the production of fuel, material which, according to every indication, would be needed in Canada this winter to such an extent that every effort should be made to bring the collieries of Western Canada to the point of their maximum capacity.

The Nelson convention Mr. Sloan described as a gathering of representatives of the prospectors and operators of Eastern British Columbia, together with delegates from other sections of the Province, as well as a large number of visitors from the adjacent United States. The papers and addresses on mining and kindred subjects had been instructive and the exhibit of samples of the minerals produced in the Kootenays had been an education to those unacquainted with the variety of the resources of this section of the Province.

Of the addresses Mr. Sloan referred specially to the valuable contribution of A. G. Langley, resident mining engineer, on the developments of the past year in the Kootenays; to the practical suggestions given the prospector by Glenville A. Collins on the subject of obtaining finances for the opening up of mining claims; to the very interesting and instructive talk of S. S. Fowler, of the Blue Bell Mine, Riondell, B.C., on oxidized lead ores; and to the illuminating paper of T. W. Binney, comptroller of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company of Canada, on the extended operations of that company at Tadnac and elsewhere in the Province.

Satisfaction

Viewing the conditions generally Mr. Sloan declared that they could not but be considered as satisfactory and that there was no doubt that in the East, as in the North and, in fact, in all parts of the Province, the mining industry was assuming such importance that it could not be long before British Columbia would take first place in Canada as a producer of industrial metals.



It promises to be a very spectacular and interesting event as there has always been considerable rivalry between the two places, but lacrosse has given a new opening for competition.

Owing to the inclement nature of the weather last evening there was no baseball game between the senior team and the Colts as had been arranged.

Last Wednesday a baseball game of considerable interest was played in Vanderhoof between the married and single ladies' teams. It ended in an 8 to 8 draw. It was stopped at the sixth on account of darkness. These games are now becoming a weekly event of interest and many turn out to see the fair sex at play.

The Vanderhoof baseball club has received a challenge to again play for the cup presented by H. A. Carney of Prince George. It will be remembered that this cup was played for recently and the Vanderhoof men were under the impression that they were entitled to hold the trophy for a year as the donor had sent it to the creamery town where it has remained. But the American buyers added: "Shipments must be made in refrigerator cars to avoid danger from frost!" Such cars are not common equipment. Hundreds would be needed by the small local railway which in other years had required only box cars for the short run to the nearby ocean ports. The demand for refrigerator cars in other parts of Canada was heavy. American lines—to whom the apples were destined—could send none! The success or failure of the apple growers' whole year's work hung in uncertainty!

Yet the railways of the Dominion, co-operating through the Railway Association of Canada, were able to meet the situation.

Authority was obtained to commandeer any empty foreign refrigerator car found in Canada.

Across three transcontinental lines and in every siding, yard or terminal these cars were hunted out.

Every carrier in Canada helped rush them East to a point where they could be fed into the overflowing orchard lands.

Over a million barrels were loaded and moved successfully to market without injury from frost.

This illustrates the spirit behind the railway service of Canada.

Its effectiveness will be broken, however, if railway net revenues continue to fall. Increased freight rates are essential

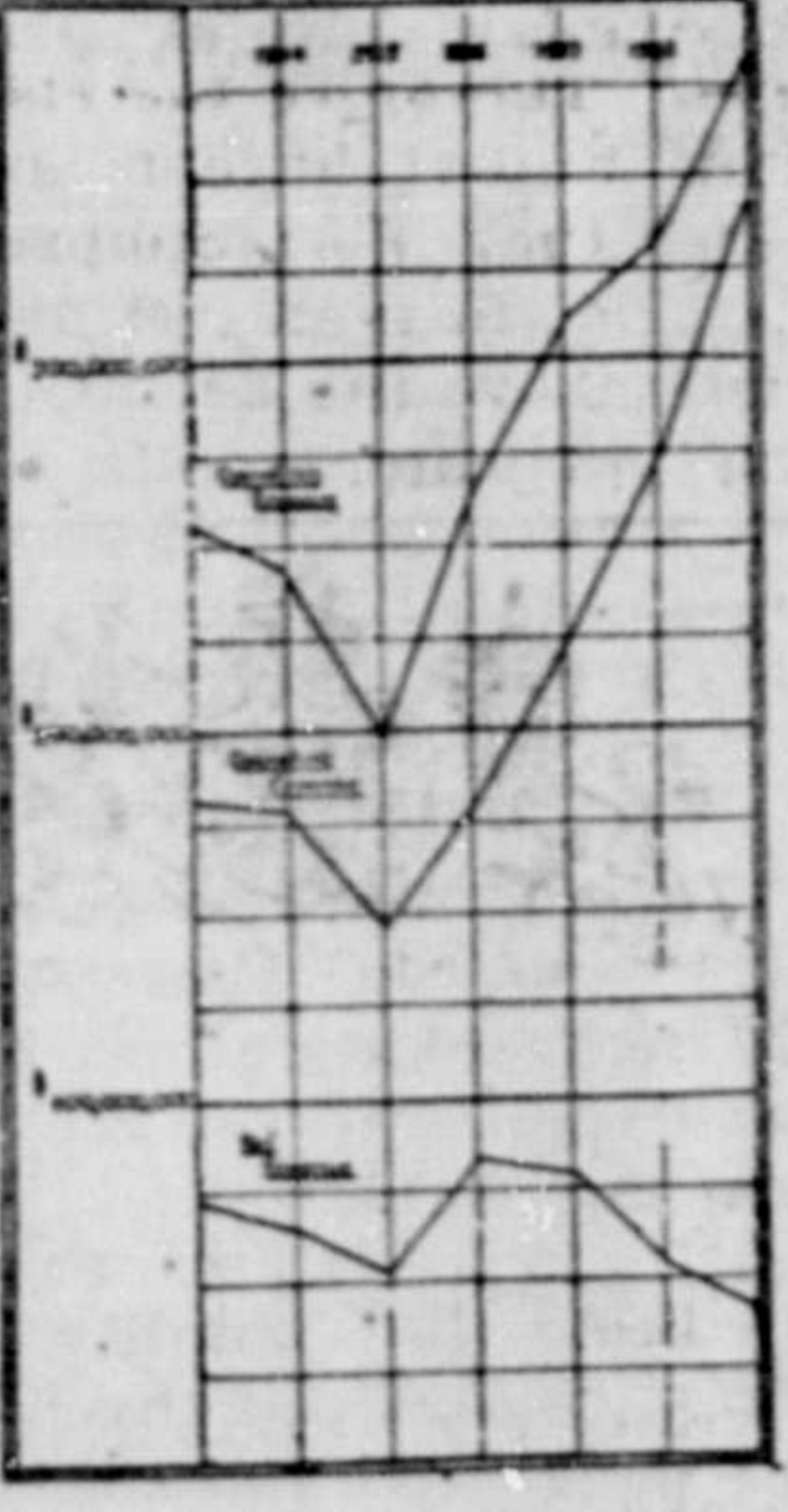

POTATOES TAKE DROP IN PRICE

More Raspberries Expected Soon and Preserving Apricots.

Fruit buyers are on the lookout for shipments of raspberries. Housewives should not be slow in getting these berries as they were in the case of the strawberries for many were left without preserves which they desired. The raspberries expected will be mostly from local plantations and ought to be in good condition. Preserving apricots are also expected in and will probably run from \$2.75 to \$3.00 per crate. Black currants will soon appear amongst the fruit displays.

Potatoes have dropped considerably during the past week and green peas are on sale at 2 lbs. for a quarter. Wax and string beans are arriving in small quantities but are rather high in price. Celery is coming in at 15c and 20c per bunch. Vegetable marrow and egg plants have made their appearance at the beginning of their rather short season.

There have been a few reductions in meat prices since last week. Fish remains about the same except that shrimps, crabs and herring are now fairly well off the market.

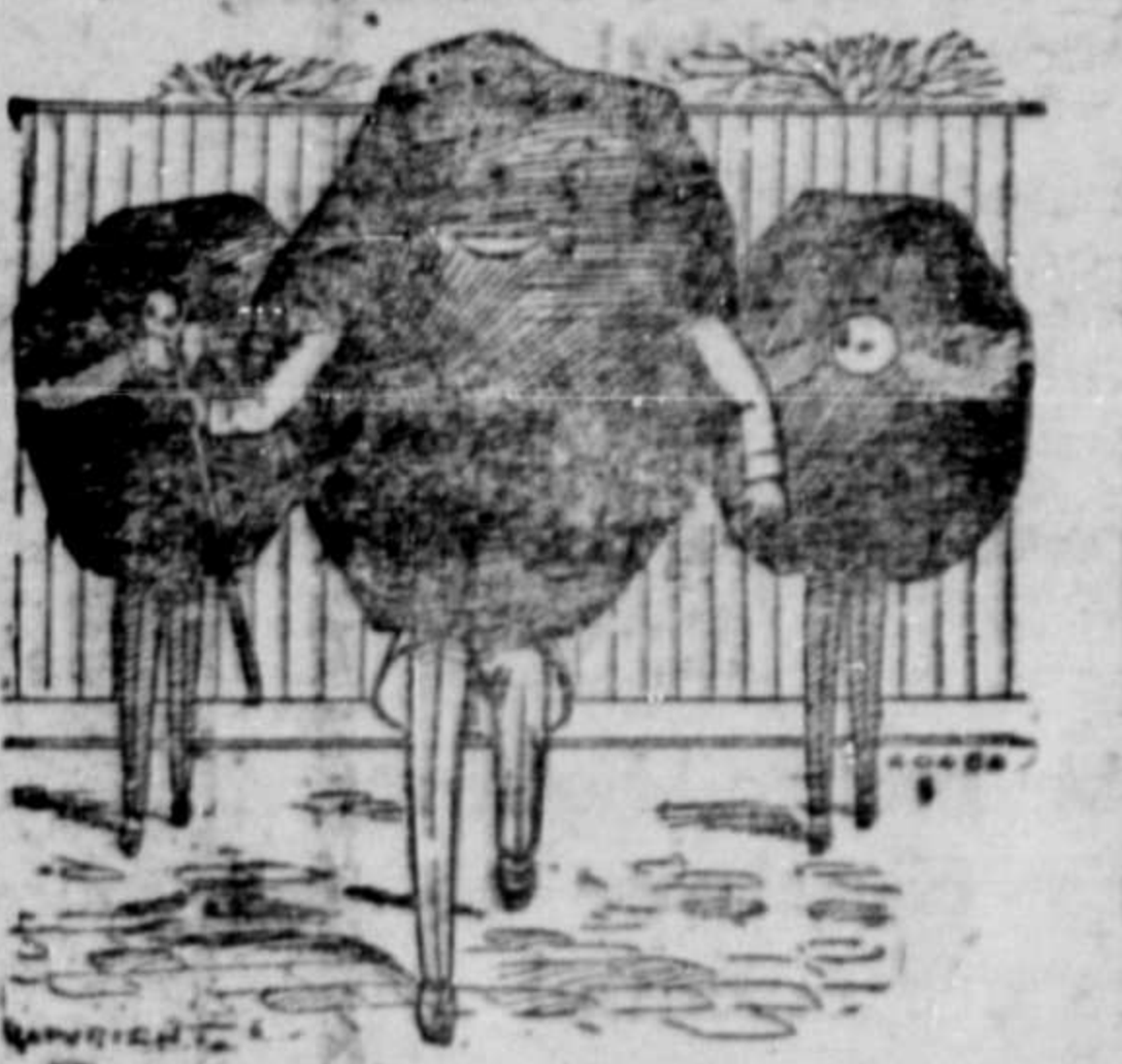

PRINCE RUPERT IN A NUT SHELL

Board of Trade Advertising Gets Lot of Good Publicity for City

The Canadian Gazette contains an illustrated article on Prince Rupert written from material supplied in the booklet recently issued by the Board of Trade. Because of its condensed form and usefulness for publicity purposes, it is reproduced here:

"Much has been said concerning Northern British Columbia in the past, and sometimes perhaps enthusiasm has been allowed to conflict with truth. But there is nothing like statistics and tabulated facts which cannot be gainsaid to convince the most sceptical. The booklet just issued by the Board of Trade of Prince Rupert, copies of which have been received by Mr. F. C. Wade, Agent-General for British Columbia, shows that the district in the campaign of production is doing more than its share in post-war reconstruction and renewal of that wealth in the Empire which, under the stress of war, carried an almost impossible burden. The following summary of twelve years' history of Prince Rupert tells its own story: 1908—A wilderness, bush and scrub. 1909—A tent town. 1910—An incorporated city. 1914—The Pacific terminus of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. 1915—Raised a battalion for overseas service. 1916—Drydocked and repaired three 22,000-ton war vessels. Captured the deep-sea fishing trade of the North Pacific. 1918—Shipped aeroplane spruce to the front; copper, fish and lumber to the markets of the world. 1919—Building two 8,400-ton steel ships; handled 46 million feet of lumber, 4 1/2 million dollars' worth of fish products; and built half a million dollars' worth of new buildings and homes. The population has grown from 6,000 in 1914 to 7,500 in 1919. The production of timber in the district of which Prince Rupert is the centre has increased from 20 million feet in 1914 to 218 million in 1919. Prince Rupert again is the centre of the deep-sea fishing industry of the Pacific Coast, a position which it has won in the past four years. It also contributes 80 per cent of the raw salmon and canned salmon exported or consumed in Canada.

All Red Route

Again Northern British Columbia, of which Prince Rupert may be regarded as the capital, contributed 90 per cent of the placer gold, 40 per cent of the lode gold, 28 per cent of the silver and 47 per cent of the copper mined in British Columbia in 1919. Prince Rupert is proud of the fact that the shortest all-red-route from Europe to the Orient is via Canadian National-Prince Rupert. The route, it is claimed, saves twenty-four hours' sailing on the Pacific, or 436 sea miles. With the opening up of the Groundhog anthracite coalfields lying adjacent to Prince Rupert the port will be able to afford a good coal service. The harbor is well located and has a drydock and repairing service. Its wharfrage is being rapidly extended and equipped with all modern facilities for handling foreign cargoes.

Outlook

The outlook for 1920 is very bright. Capital is rapidly flowing into the district and an influx of prospectors and mining men is assured. The district possesses good water powers. The developed power is estimated at 25,540 horse-power, the partially developed at 55,300 and the undeveloped at 272,755. There is ample room for agricultural settlement and good opportunities awaiting manufacturers who will locate plants in the district. Something the writer might have added is that two-thirds of the available arable land of the Province lies along the line of the G.T.P. of which Prince Rupert is the outlet.
