GRAND TRUNK PACIFIC RAILWAY PASSES TO NEW GENERAL MANAGEMENT

Birdmen Await Arrival of Repair Parts for Aeroplanes

Visitors to Prince George are being entertained by citizens; Grand Ball last night Honor of Fliers

PRINCE GEORGE, August 5.—The birdmen are still here and expected that they will remain for some time. Repairs to the number 3 have been completed but the parts for number 1 are coming from San Francisco and will take a week to arrive here. The unusual visitors are being freely entertained. Last night there was a grand ball given in their honor and other events are taking place.

Speeding Up Work on Ships Being Built in Local Yards

Good Progress being made and machinery is beginning to arrive; Boilers Ready at Vancouver

Much better progress is being made on the shipbuilding at local yards since the four derricks have been installed for lifting the plates and other heavy steel. Approximately 100 tons of material arrived in the city last week and are at work there. A double boiler is working in the machine shop and everything seems to be running smoothly. The bulkheads are all completed and the lower deck plates are being put in place. In all probability the tanks will be tested out two weeks' time by the government inspector and the representative of the British Corporation. The machinery for the new ships is commencing to arrive. The engines are completed at the Vancouver Works, Vancouver, and the engines are practically completed at the works of John Inglis in Toronto. VANCOUVER, August 5.—Low Sin of Strathcona Cannery, Rivers Inlet, was fined \$300 or six months in jail. He elected to go to jail and arrived here en route to prison. To his surprise a friend here paid his fine for him and he is again free.

BROKE WINDOW

Alex. Grant Must Pay for Damage and Fine of \$50.

In the police court this morning Magistrate McMordie on the charge of breaking a plate glass window in the Elite Cafe. He was arrested last evening by Constables Leek and Wisely and was found guilty this morning. The magistrate ordered him to be held until the window has been replaced and then released on the payment of \$50. In default of payment he will remain for thirty days in the cell.

SITUATION IN POLAND GRAVE

British Mobilizing Troops—Reds Driving Toward Warsaw.

LONDON, August 5.—The Polish armistice delegates have left for Minsk. The Red drive toward Warsaw is being continued. Great Britain is reported to be mobilizing troops. A high official here said: "In Poland the situation is as grave as it was in 1914."

INSPECTORS ARE SATISFIED AND COMPANY PLEASD

VANCOUVER, August 4.—It is stated here that Lloyd's inspector is entirely satisfied with the Prince Rupert shipyard repairs to the Prince George. The serious damage was repaired perfectly in 114 hours. The company is lavish in its praise of the work of Superintendent J. H. Pillsbury and the employees of the yard for their speed and workmanship. They repaired the steering gear so that it worked splendidly during the docking here on Tuesday afternoon. The company has no regrets at their decision to have the work done at Prince Rupert instead of bringing the vessel to Vancouver or Victoria.

CALGARY WOMAN IS FATALLY INJURED

Warren is General Manager for West

New Official has had charge of Western Lines of Canadian National Railway and shown much energy

A. E. Warren has been appointed general manager of western lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern railways. This appointment has been forecasted several times, the first intimation having been received by the local Board of Trade from Colonel Peck some months ago. Last night a short despatch was received from Vancouver saying that the appointment had been made.

Mr. Warren is not known here, but he has been general manager of the Canadian Northern since it was taken over by the Government and has done much to improve the service on that line. A daily train service has been inaugurated and gradually the road is being brought into a condition such that it may compete with the C. P. R., the only other existing Canadian line to the Pacific with the exception of the G. T. P.

A Fierce Fire is Sweeping Over the Town of Coquitlam

Many Buildings Already Destroyed by Flames including Firehall, Post Office and Hotel; Fire Wagon Saved

FIRES NEAR HAZELTON

VANCOUVER, August 5.—It is reported here that forestry officials have been kept busy for two weeks controlling and dealing with the bush fires in the neighborhood of New Hazelton.

PORT COQUITLAM, August 5.—This city early this afternoon was swept by a devastating fire. The Coquitlam Hotel, fire hall, Wilson's pool room, blacksmith shop, and the C. P. R. freight shed at the west end of the Dewdney trunk road on the main street of the city are all either wiped out or attacked by flames. The fire engine is saved.

The scene of the outbreak is immediately adjacent to the Westminster Junction C. P. R. depot, twenty miles from Vancouver on the C. P. R. main line. All the inhabitants are out fighting the flames. Calls have been sent in to the New Westminster and Port Moody fire brigades for assistance.

VANCOUVER, August 5.—(Later.)—The office of the defunct Coquitlam Star and the post office are both burned down. The former building was unoccupied.

PORT COQUITLAM, August 5.—(2:30 p. m.)—For a quarter of a mile the stores and business places on the main street have been destroyed. The C. P. R. station baggage room is wiped out and the station itself threatened.

VANCOUVER turned out in large force with fire engines. The great hope is to confine the fire to the west end of the wooden road bridge over the Coquitlam river.

NICHOLSON APPOINTED

Is Made Member of World's Board of Aeronautic Commissioners

VANCOUVER, Aug. 5.—Captain Nicholson, general manager of the G.T.P. coast steamships, has been honored by appointment to the world's board of aeronautical commissioners. He will officiate at international flying events. Sixty countries are represented in the board.

HOME SECURED FOR NURSES

D. H. Morrison's House Has Been Leased for Use of General Hospital.

NEW HOME MAY BE ERECTED IN SPRING

The directors of the general hospital have leased the house adjoining the institution until recently occupied by D. H. Morrison and will use it as a nurses' home until such time as a new building for that purpose can be erected on the hospital grounds. Possession will be obtained on the fifteenth of the present month and it will be at once furnished and the nurses will move in.

The nurses have not in the past had adequate accommodation. A number have slept in the same room and night nurses have been unable to sleep in the day time owing to the noise. This has not made for efficiency. The directors are trying to make the life as attractive as possible in order that pupil nurses may be induced to take up the work. Only recently the pay of the pupil nurses was increased.

It is expected to commence the new nurses' home in the spring, but in the meantime the house now secured will answer the purpose.

GOVERNMENT AT OTTAWA

Outlook Not Very Cheerful Says Ottawa Writer

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—The Nova Scotia electors furnish food for a deal of political speculation at Ottawa. No one disguises the fact that the outlook is ominous for the present Federal Conservative Government.

Of the twelve constituencies in the Province which in 1917 returned supporters of the Government, all went either to the Liberals or Farmers or Labor. The inroad made by the third party by electing thirteen members at one shot in a field where heretofore they have never had so much as a look-in causes some reflection as to how the Federal elections, when they come on, will be affected.

Not Inspire Confidence. The situation is one that is not calculated to inspire much optimism in the ranks of the Federal Government, though they are viewing it with what courage they can command and relying on the hope of being able to hold on for a couple of years.

One thing which in Government circles is described as "a pity" is the fact that Quebec, normally the most staid and conservative province of all, is hopelessly alienated under present conditions, with not the remotest prospect of being won over, despite the great industrial boom now in progress there, and the belief that this may favor the protectionist party.

By-elections. The main question now is as to how long a general election can be avoided. If the plans of the Government carry there will be none for two years yet.

LABOR LEADER'S WIFE SAYS LENIN OUTFIT GOVERNMENT BY SIX

Mrs. Philip Snowden, who was in Russia with other Labor delegates, in conversation with a press representative said: "I went into Russia with an open mind, but I have returned with the following decided objections to Lenin's Government. In the first place, it is not Socialism. There is no Socialism in Russia. Nor is it Communism as I understand the word. All the Socialism and Communism of Soviet Russia appears to be in their manifestoes. The land is supposed to be owned by the State, but the peasants pay no rent, and their eldest sons inherit the property. Apparently it is all a matter of labels.

"In the second place the Soviet is not democratic and makes no pretence of being so. Speaking politically, they think democracy is an outworn theory. They believe, of course, in what they call the dictatorship of the proletariat, but they have not even got that. They have only got the dictatorship of the Communist Party. As the Communist Party in Russia numbers at the most 600,000, it is obvious that it is the dictatorship of a small section. It does not stop there. The Communist Party is dictated to by a handful of people inside the party. When you get down to the bottom, the dictatorship of the proletariat means the dictatorship of about six men, aided by an Extraordinary Commission."

PLANS COMMISSION SAN SEBASTIAN, Spain, Aug. 5.—The League of Nations plans to form a blockade commission to act in future wars.

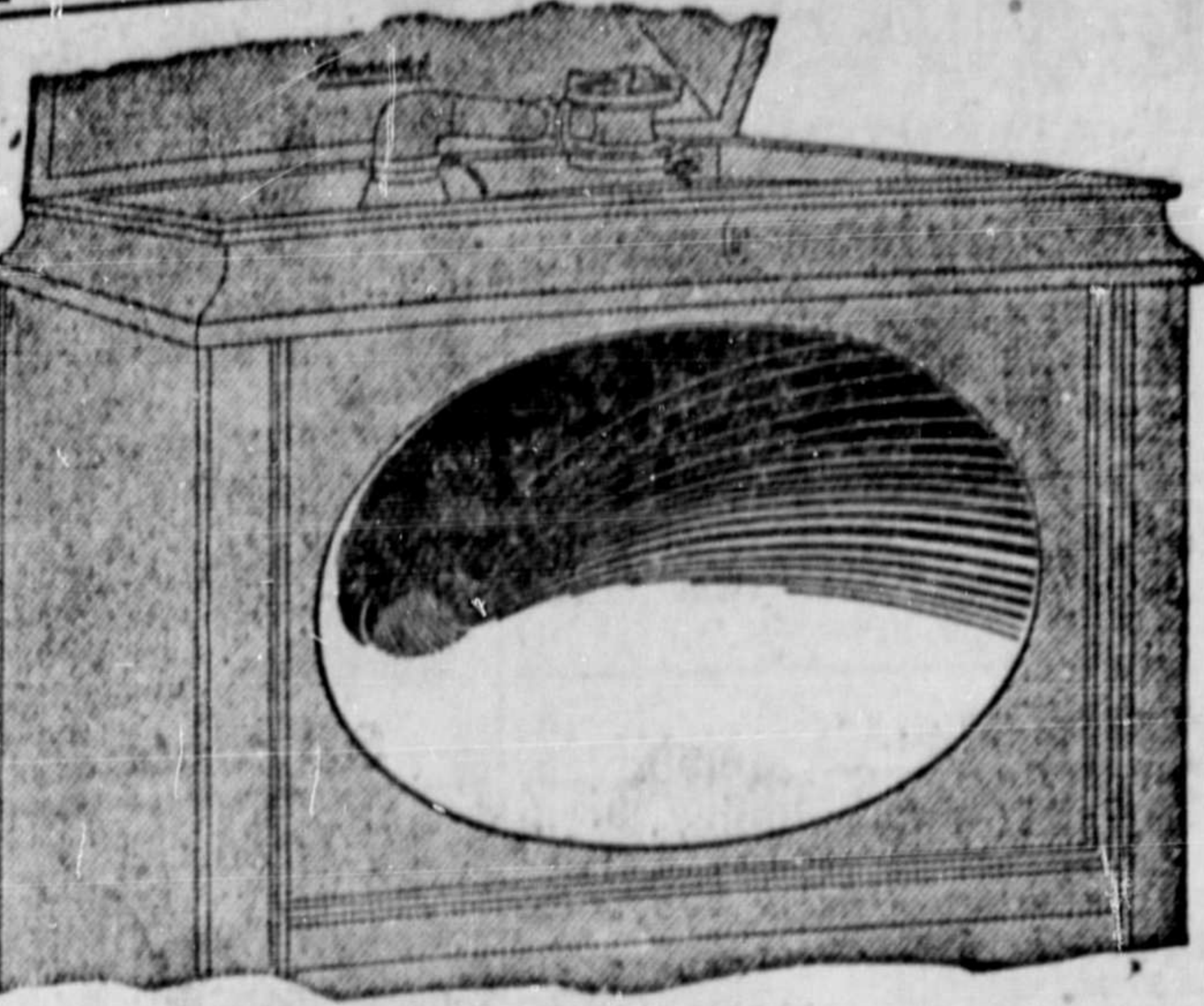
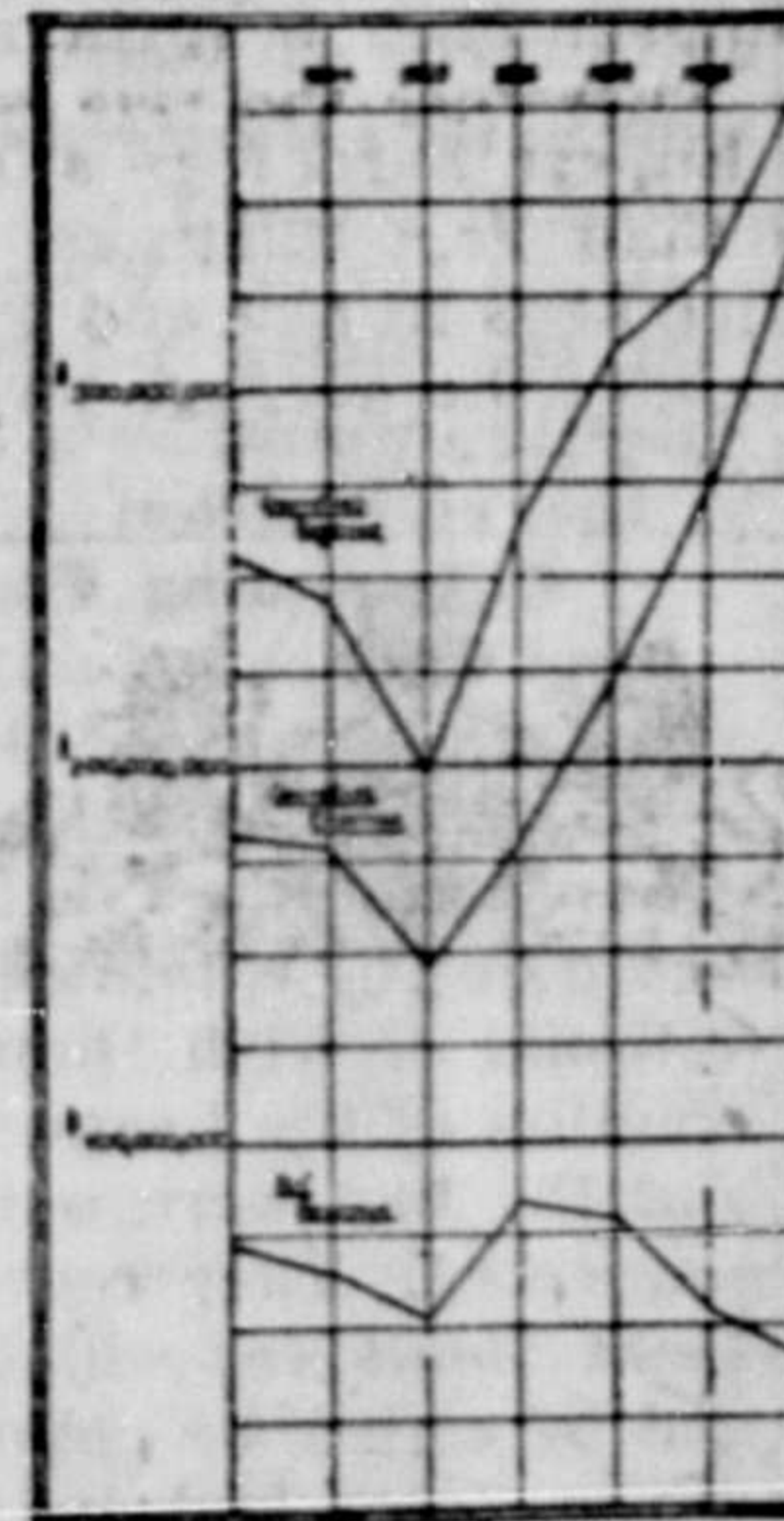

WHITE FISH SUPPLY IS BEING CUT DOWN

Government of Ontario Sells Catch in Own Province Only

Having exceeded the Ontario demand for whitefish, the Department of Fisheries of the Ontario Government has been obliged to cut down production by the fishermen in Lakes Nipissing and Nipigon. Half a ton a day has been knocked off the catch for the present and until the demand improves and the catch of outside and private fishing firms decreases.

The department easily disposes of the surplus to the United States, but such action is contrary to the policy which is to supply Ontario people with fresh fish at uniform and low prices. The catch of whitefish has been very good. The department has been getting and selling about 2 1/2 tons of whitefish and trout every two days. Now it has taken half a ton of whitefish off, but no limit has been placed on trout, for which there is a keen demand. The Government fishing men in Lakes Nipissing and Nipigon have had a good season. A change of policy this year does not allow the department to buy from outside fisheries.

While supplying Ontario with good and cheap fish, the department must also attain another object and that is to preserve the fish. That is one of the reasons why only the Ontario demand is met and no attempt made to get into the outside market. The scarcity of trout in the two lakes fished by the Government hampers the sale somewhat. There are no trout in Lake Nipissing and only about one-quarter of the fish caught in Nipigon are trout. The fishermen are now reducing the number of whitefish nets to keep within the limits set by the department.

JEWS' POSITION IN PALESTINE

Mon. A. J. Balfour and Lord Robert Cecil Address Zionist Federation.

At a demonstration held at the Albert Hall, London, under the auspices of the English Zionist Federation, to celebrate the acceptance by Great Britain of the mandate for Palestine, Mr. Balfour said that for long he had been a convinced Zionist, but in his most sanguine moments he never conceived the possibility that the great work of Palestinian reconstruction would happen so soon.

He hoped they would remember that while we desired under the aegis of Great Britain to establish this home for the Jewish people many of the Great Powers, especially Great Britain, had freed the Arab race from the tyranny of their brutal conqueror who had kept them under his heel for many centuries.

Great Adventure. "We are embarked on a great adventure," concluded Mr. Balfour, "and I say 'we' advisedly, and by 'we' I mean on the one side the Jewish people and on the other the mandatory Power of Palestine. We are partners in this great enterprise.

Outstanding Features. Lord Robert Cecil said that when the history of the war came to be written he believed that the two outstanding features of it would be the establishment of the national Jewish home and the creation of the League of Nations.

DARING DEED OF BRITISH AT ZEEBRUGGE

Lieut. Helmsing Holds Large Audience Spell-bound at the Empress Last Night.

There was a large gathering at the Empress Theatre last night to hear Lieut. Helmsing tell of the deeds of daring of the British navy in connection with the blocking of Zeebrugge canal. Everyone knows what was done but few people can realize how it was done, what difficulties had to be overcome in doing it and what success was achieved. The speaker made everything clear and illustrated it all with pictures and maps.

The canal leading to Bruges was a safe resort for German submarines. The Admiralty decided that it must be stopped. It was planned to sink three ships in its entrance in order to prevent its use for submarine activities. Preparations were made, a time was set and the ships passed through a mine field, sailed close to batteries of enemy guns, navigated the difficult channel of the harbor which was protected from the weather by a big mole, sank the ships in the canal, and most of the men engaged in the operation got safely away and returned to their base.

1,600 Volunteers.
It is impossible to tell the incidents of the involved action so that it will be understood. The Vindictive, supported by two Mersey River steamers, landed troops on the mole and they destroyed some big guns that were a special danger to the expedition. There were 1,600 volunteers who took part. A viaduct leading to the mole was blown up by a submarine that sailed right in and exploded tons of T.N.T. beneath it. All these things have been told before. It is not a new story, but it is one that will never die for it was one of the cleverest and most daring in the annals of the war. This was particularly brought home to the audience last night as for an hour and a half they sat spell bound. The action took place before their eyes. They shared the tenseness, the excitement, the dangers and the triumph. What the speaker did not mention was that one of Prince Rupert's citizens, Alex. Young, son of Judge Young who presided at the meeting, was one of the motor boats that laid the smoke screen for the operations and that helped to rescue the men from the ships after they had been sunk in the canal.

Meeting Friday.
In introducing the speaker, Judge Young explained that Lieut. Helmsing was trying to secure the co-operation of the people in re-organizing the Navy League here and in forming a naval brigade here. Already the League had placed a dozen of their cadets on ocean going vessels. He showed pictures of hundreds of the naval cadets training at Victoria and he thought there should be a corps here.

A meeting of those interested is to be held in the Court House on Friday evening for the purpose of reorganizing the local Navy League.

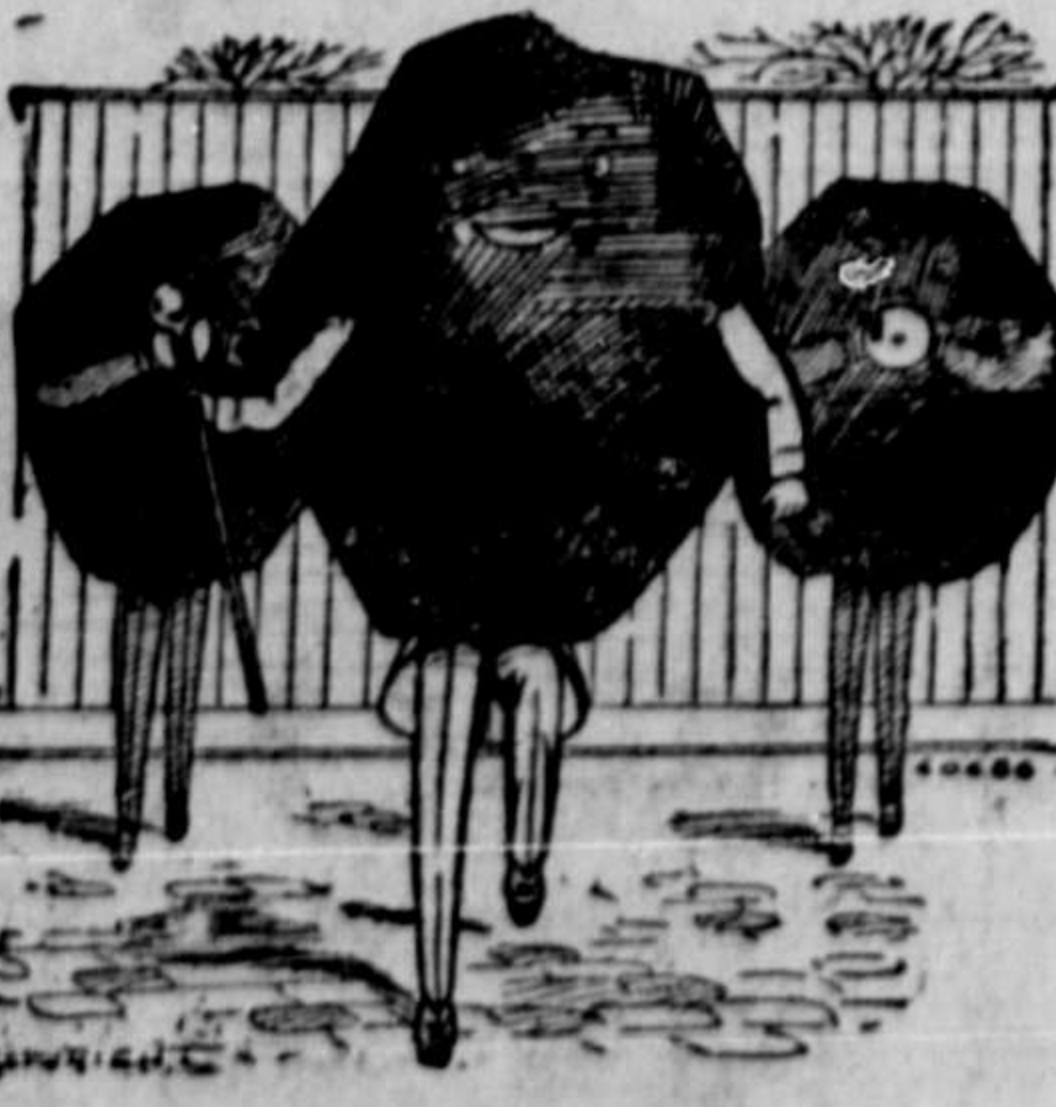

KEEP PRIZE LISTS

Dear Mr. Editor—It has already been a matter of comment and may be one of business for future Directorates of our Annual Industrial Exhibition to gather up the data and experience of the Association since its inception and get out a prize list that might be repeated for several years. Supplementary items and information could be issued in small bulk and at minimum cost. There is no logical reason, in the opinion of some, why an expensive booklet such as the one now in the mails should not be kept carefully by each and every exhibitor. Economy in a matter of this kind is well within our reach, and practice of it will mean a saving to all interested.

For the possible adoption of such a course I would ask you therefore to suggest to your readers that they keep their prize lists. The next effort may get something of a more or less permanent nature. The present one is faulty, and no one, perhaps, knows it any better than the Secretary. I would suggest that common sense criticism be encouraged and that for the public good a yet earlier commencement be made on the premium lists. I repeat: advise your readers to consider the time and effort of the Committee in doing what has been done and to put the lists on their book shelves for future reference.

BRITISH POLICY IN PALESTINE

Outline Given at Ex-Kaiser's Palace on Mount of Olives

LONDON, Aug. 5.—While the Zionist policy was being discussed at a Congress in London, Sir Herbert Samuel, the High Commissioner, formally inaugurated the British mandatory administration of Palestine. To the Palestinian notables assembled at the Government House, the palace of the ex-Emperor of Germany, on the Mount of Olives, he first read the message of His Majesty, and then outlined the principles which are to direct his administration.

No revenue, he declared, will be drawn by Great Britain from Palestine. The Civil Service is to be open to all Palestinians irrespective of creed. "The ports and frontiers will shortly be opened to limited immigration and its numbers will be proportioned to the employment and housing accommodation available in the country." Pilgrims and travellers will be encouraged. For the safeguarding of existing settlements a cadastral survey is to be undertaken, while a land commission and special banks will devote themselves to the progress of agriculture.

Sir Herbert also mentioned an ambitious programme of contemplated public works, among them the construction of a harbor at Haifa. The King's message expressly stated that the terms of the mandate have to "be finally approved by the League of Nations."

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to 10 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1/2 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 1/2 acre cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his claim, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependants, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

PRE-EMPTORS, FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commission.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers raised; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to 100 head.
