Russian Peace Terms go to England

REPARATIONS ALMOST COMPLETE FOR CONSTRUCTION OF BIG NEW WHARF

Soviet Armistice Terms are Received by British Premier

Bolshevik Demand Demobilization of Army and War Industries and Free Land for Soldiers and Families

LONDON, August 11.—Lloyd George today received from the Soviet their terms for an armistice with Poland. They demand the demobilization of the Polish army, and all war industries and the stoppage of importation of war materials from Poland.

They also ask for free land for soldiers and their families and withdrawal of Russian Ukrainian troops from the Polish borders.

Lloyd George stated yesterday that he was hopeful of peace since the submission of the armistice terms, has not expressed opinion.

United States Declares Against Dismemberment of Poland by Russians

LONDON, August 11.—The United States Government today declared itself for the maintenance of the territorial integrity of Poland and against dismemberment by Russia. The administration here is not opposed to the efforts of the Poles towards an armistice or to the recognition of a socialist regime. The form of government they have or the party that controls the destinies of the country is no concern of ours.

ANCE HELP SOUTH RUSSIA AGAINST REDS

Reports Call Anti-War Conference in London.

FRANCE, August 11.—France has called on military support for General Wangel, head of the Democratic Government of South Russia against the Bolsheviks. The government here is convinced the Reds propose harsh terms in connection with the Polish question.

London, Aug. 11.—The laborers are calling a national anti-war conference.

TO STRUCK BY A TRAIN

Men Killed When Car Stalled in Front of Express.

ONTARIO, Aug. 11.—H. L. Langdon, manufacturer, and E. J. Jackson were both killed at St. Hyacinthe when their auto was struck by a train. They were crossing the railway when their car stalled and the express struck them, killing both and shattering the machine.

VANCOUVER, August 11.—It was Elizabeth Sheridan who was drowned in the Shuswap lake yesterday and not Helena, when Rosie Clifford was also drowned. The family were advised by telegram which was not clear and was misread.

DAVID RAY FINED \$150

Assaulted Police Officer and Must Pay or Serve Six Months

Yesterday afternoon I before Judge Young, David Ray was fined \$150 or six months in default of payment for assaulting police constable Wm. Wisley in a fight at the Fire Hall on Monday evening. This concludes the happenings in connection with the melee at the Fire Hall in which four of the firemen appeared before Magistrate McMordie yesterday morning and were fined according to the degree in which they had taken part.

The places of the offending firemen, who were dismissed at once, are being filled and James Parks is temporarily in charge.

PERSIAN SHAH HAS ABDICATED

MONTREAL, Aug. 11.—A Persian cable to the Star here reports that the Shah of Persia has abdicated the throne and a republic is being formed.

Excellent Progress with New Hays Cove School

Cement Work should be all complete in five or six weeks; Brick arriving in large quantities

The new school building is making excellent progress. Most of the basement concrete is already laid and the first story is rising fast and most of it will be ready this month. Contractor Basson-Bert says he will be away from there in five or six weeks.

Brick is arriving fast. Just now teams are hauling facing brick and as soon as the present consignment is on the ground there will be 100,000 at the site and a lot of them already laid.

Few people realize what a fine building this school will be. Architect Potter yesterday went over the plans with a Daily News representative. With the building laid out and the walls going up it is easy to see what the capes provided so that there will be no danger in case of fire. Also there will be little in the building of an inflammable nature as all the hallways are of concrete.

Complete in Spring.

Colonel McMordie, the contractor for the job, says that there is no hope of having the building ready by the end of the year, but given reasonable weather and with no serious holdup he thinks at least part of it will be ready for occupancy by Easter. In the meantime they will work hard to get the roof on before the bad weather comes, if possible.

Possibly Swimming Bath.

On the lower floor are the domestic science, manual training and kindergarten rooms, while below that again and outside the main building is the furnace room and coal sheds with a suitable place for a swimming bath should there be money enough to build it.

The school faces down Sixth Avenue and will, when complete, be a very imposing structure that will be a credit to the city. The main entrance leads direct to the second floor and there are plenty of emergency exits and fire es-

Commence Dock when Tug Arrives

is on way now with Dredge and Scows preparatory to commencing active operations; Magoffin in City

"Just as soon as the tug with the dredge and scows arrives in port, we will be able to commence work at once," said S. S. Magoffin, the contractor for the new G. T. P. dock. The tug referred to with the dredge and other supplies left Vancouver some time ago and when last heard of was in the neighborhood of Swanson Bay about 100 miles south. Since that time the storm of the past two evenings has very likely tied up the north-bound outfit, but they are expected in at any time now. This is the only thing which now holds up the immediate procedure with the preliminary dredging and filling.

Mr. Magoffin, who arrived from Prince George last evening, says that the instructions are to rush the dock as quickly as possible. It is a sore need and the well known contractor smiled at the remark of the ministers who visited here recently, when they used the word "advisability" in regard to the building of a new wharf here.

Alexander in Charge.

At the present time Major Alexander who will be in direct charge of the new work is in Vancouver where he is busily engaged in assembling two more outfits. These will be brought north at the earliest possible date and will continue with the dredging and filling which will be commenced by the outfit. For the past few weeks piles and logs have been arriving and have been discharged at the coal dock.

In regard to the letting of the contract for the building of the warehouse, which will be given separate to the erection of the dock, no announcement can yet be made. The tenders were called for August 2, but the letting of the contract has been held up.

BOWSER COMING MONDAY NEXT

Will Discuss Affairs of Province Here From Point of View of Opposition.

W. J. Bowser, leader of the opposition in the Provincial Legislature, is expected here on Sunday night and will address the people of Prince Rupert on the public affairs of the province as he sees them on Monday evening in the Empress Theatre.

Mr. Bowser was premier of the province from the time the late Sir Richard McBride resigned until he was defeated by the late Mr. Brewster. At that time people were much dissatisfied with his government and he went back to the Legislature with very few followers. Now he is looking forward to another election and is touring the country telling the people of what he considers to be the sins of the present government and what he would do if he were in power again.

Mr. Bowser is a good speaker and is always entertaining. Doubtless there will be a good crowd out to hear him.

Wendt was chased two blocks through the circus crowds before he was caught. He is now out on bail in the sum of \$10,000. Mrs. Carter was not seriously injured but might have been had not the bullet from the revolver glanced from the corset steel.

Smithers Making Good Headway.

The Smithers Citizens' Association with A. Kilpatrick president and Charles Reid secretary, has published a leaflet containing a business directory and sketch of the activities and possibilities of this centre. The leaflet shows that Smithers is the first passenger and second freight divisional point on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. It is situated at the foot of Hudson Bay Mountain, whose snow-capped peaks rise 7,000 feet above the town. It is 226 miles east of Prince Rupert.

Smithers is the centre of government administration for Omineca district and is the payroll town of the Bulkley Valley. It has excellent schools, a modern hospital, good hotels, a fine railway station, several churches, and a public hall. It is in the centre of a rich farming country, and close by are mineralized areas that are being prospected and in which there are a number of mines. Lumbering is in progress and in fact there is everything in the neighborhood which makes for progress. Add to this an excellent climate and it is easy to see that Smithers has a future which warrants the optimistic spirit of the residents.

The leaflet is published from the presses of the Interior News and is very attractively printed and well written. It should prove valuable advertising to the community.

Industrial Features Of Exhibition.

The Prince Rupert Fall Fair will be held next month and the directors and officials are busily engaged in getting things into shape so that this year's event may be more attractive than any in the past. Already good work has been done in providing for amusements and in advertising and arranging for agricultural and horticultural exhibits. What is necessary, however, to a successful fair is a good industrial exhibit. As an advertising medium this should be worth a good deal, and from a public spirited point of view it should attract everyone.

The fair without an industrial exhibit does not amount to much. It should give some idea of the resources of the vast district and show the work that is being done. This is where people gather from east and west, north and south, and if any industry is not represented it leaves a gap that cannot otherwise be filled.

Sauce for Goose Suits Gander Too.

British labor leaders seem to think it is all right for the Soviet troops to invade Poland. They fail to realize that the military activities of Russia are becoming a menace to the world and that we may have fastened on us a system of militarism worse than that against which the same labor leaders have always protested. The matter of name does not count. Let the military spirit dominate the civil authorities and a condition is bound to develop similar to that in Germany which caused the great war. Militarism is always arrogant. It is bad where the military leaders are educated and cultured. Let the military spirit get hold of the uneducated and uncultured and the condition becomes intolerable to everyone.

The labor leaders, as reported by wire yesterday, say that it would be "an intolerable crime against humanity" for the Allies to go to war to save Poland, yet it does not seem to them to be a crime to subdue Poland. If one is a crime, why not the other?

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

TIDES FAVORABLE FOR ROUND ISLAND TRIP IN LAUNCHES

The tides of Friday and Saturday nights are quite ideal for a trip around Kain Island. It is surprising how few boat owners have made this most delightful trip in their craft. In order to catch the falls at Shawatlans and again at Zenardi at the right time the tides must be fairly high or low. Entry can be made by going in on one tide at either of the stretches of fast running water. Then by going directly around to the other it is still possible to get through on high water. The distance from the one to the other can easily be made in plenty of time to catch the tide favorably. In the same way the circuit may be made at low tide by bucking tide in at one rapid and getting around in time to run out at the other, also against the tide. It is very likely that more than one party of enthusiasts will make the trip before the week ends. It is a pleasant trip after supper and an ordinary speed launch can make it in about two and a half to three hours.

Within a few years this farm

should be shipping produce to Prince Rupert regularly. Dairying and fruit and vegetable raising will be taken up on a large scale.

this place, a number of other people have taken up land adjoining and very soon there will be a thriving settlement at Woodcock.

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





MUST SPEND MONEY ON G.T.P. ROADBED

So Says Hon. Dr. Reid on His
Return to Ottawa.

OTTAWA, August 10.—Hon. J. D. Reid, minister of railways and canals, on his return from a trip over the Canadian National railway system in western Canada, states that the Grand Trunk Pacific will require considerable expenditure to bring its roadbed up to standard, including the rebuilding and filling in of a number of wooden bridges. The Canadian Northern, he found to be in good condition. The work of co-ordinating the two government lines is in progress.

The minister believes that it is in the interest of Ontario and Quebec that some action should be taken to supply these provinces with coal from western Canada, as well as from Nova Scotia, for industrial purposes, in view of the possible shortage of that commodity this coming winter. He is of the opinion that a large number of coal cars and locomotives may have to be supplied by the government to the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific railways for this special purpose, in order that commercial coal may be delivered in Ontario and Quebec at the lowest possible price. The long haul and cost of equipment is what adds to the cost, and Dr. Reid feels that every effort should be made to reduce this cost to the minimum.



ALBERTA LOSES TAXATION CASE

Unable to Recover \$339,524 from Canadian National Railway

EDMONTON, Aug. 11.—The judgment of Mr. Justice Hyndman in the Supreme Civil Court dismisses the action of the King and the Provincial Treasurer against the Canadian National Railway, in which there was involved the sum of over \$339,524. This amount the province claimed, was due in taxes on the line of railway running from Lloydminster to Edmonton and the line from Edmonton to Strathcona.

Action to recover this money was started March 15th, and involved a big legal fight over the meaning of the provincial statute passed in 1906 governing the taxation of lines within the province. After a period of nearly five months, the judgment of Mr. Justice Hyndman is handed down and means that the provincial treasury will not be enriched to the extent anticipated.

The province claimed in this action the right to taxes, double taxes and penalties alleged to be due and owing in respect to the 176 and 23 miles of railway owned and operated by the C. N. company for the years 1913 to 1919 inclusive, under the provisions of chapter 30 of the Statutes of the province in 1906.

Synopsis of

Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.44 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timbered land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptees with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 3 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted immediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$10 per acre and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate for forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 6 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he resides in it in conjunction with his farm, without making improvements, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased by pre-emptees: title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes only, areas not exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial plant on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Nature preserves inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person to three years, and until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by pre-emptors on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1918, for payment of premiums, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Armed Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from entitlement to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest where no original purchase is made, and where no original purchase, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry providing grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners.

Stock-owners may form Associations, range management.

Free, or partially free, grazing permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to one mile.

PROSPECTOR DROWNS

Body of Robert Wilson is Recovered From Athabasca River.

EDMONTON, August 7.—The body of Robert Wilson, a prospector of the north country, who was drowned in the Athabasca river a few days ago, was recovered by Constable McDonald, of the Alberta Provincial police at a point about 48 miles below Fort McMurray. Immediately after the body was recovered it was brought back to Fort McMurray, where it was buried.

Little information has been received by the provincial police here as to who Wilson was. Supposedly he was a man well known in the McMurray neighborhood, but information as to the location of his relatives has not reached provincial police headquarters, located in this city.

All local engineers and mining equipment dealers have been interviewed but information is lacking from these sources as to Wilson's complete identification. Inspector Piper, of the Alberta provincial police, reports that a full account of the death of Wilson is expected to reach headquarters at an early hour.

That he was a prospector who had gone north to take over a drilling outfit twenty miles north of Fort McMurray, has been established. The outfit he proposed taking to Great Slave Lake, there to work on the claims of the Aurora Gold Company.
