Trained Sceptics In This City.

The people of this city have been trained to be sceptics. They have been often disappointed. The early residents came expecting to have a big city within a few years but in this, they were of course disappointed. It could not have been otherwise. Even if the plans of the founders of the city had been carried out, there would have been setbacks and the course of development would not have been as smooth as the outlook warranted. It never is.

It was natural that even in so small a thing as the building of a new wharf there should have been scepticism. For this reason it was good news that was published in this paper yesterday that work was about to begin, just as soon as the equipment now on the way north should arrive. We need the dock badly. We were promised it would be ready for business this year, but we are glad to know now that it is likely to be ready for business next year. It is a good deal to know that much of the material is on the ground and that actual construction work will commence in a few days.

British Columbia House in London.

The report of an auditor in regard to the upkeep of British Columbia House in London has just been received. It shows that the cost of upkeep is approximately \$30,000 a year and the net cost of the building itself to the province is about \$12,000. This makes a total cost of the institution of \$42,000 and it will probably be even less in future as the amount included the time when Mr. Turner was drawing a salary as well as Mr. Wade.

There is a difference of opinion as to the advisability of keeping up this institution in London. It is claimed that it is not worth that much to the average taxpayer. The difficulty, so far as the present Government is concerned, is that they have the building and cannot easily get rid of it.

Since Mr. Wade has been agent-general we have occasionally heard of some of the activities of the agent-general in looking after British Columbia interests. It would be a good thing perhaps to have a complete report on the work of the institution in order that the people whose money is spent there may know what is being done to earn that money.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

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In the Letter Box

Cow Bay Development.
 To the Editor—
 There is no doubt that Cow Bay is an asset to the city as it stands. It might well be developed so as to be a greater asset. Whether opened or closed it should be in order that we may get the advantage of its development.
 If the decision is to close Cow Bay, some proper provision should be made to take care of the various little plants already established there. We cannot hope to build a city on dishonor, and it would be dishonorable to destroy the little fellow who is trying to do something.
 During the time of the location survey, I tried to get the locating engineer to place the railway six feet higher than it now is. This would have saved the railway many thousands of dollars on the first hundred miles of grading and the water would not have been over the tracks as it now is at times during our freshets.
 Even now I contend that it would pay the company to raise the tracks eight feet, which would give us all under-track instead of level or overhead crossings. It would save the shifting of hundreds of thousands of yards of rock and give them dumping ground for their yard rock. It would also mean that a larger boat could enter Cow Bay under the tracks.
 As for the wholesale houses, the railway company has many thousands of feet of waterfront. It is not necessary that Cow Bay be used for that purpose. We have over 100 miles of waterfront. It is, therefore, not vitally necessary to the growth of the city that Cow Bay be destroyed to make room for another class of building until all our other waterfront is nearly occupied.
 If all the various people who are interested in Cow Bay development would lay all their cards on the table we would then be able to discuss the matter from a more sensible standpoint. The day of "secret diplomacy" should be past.

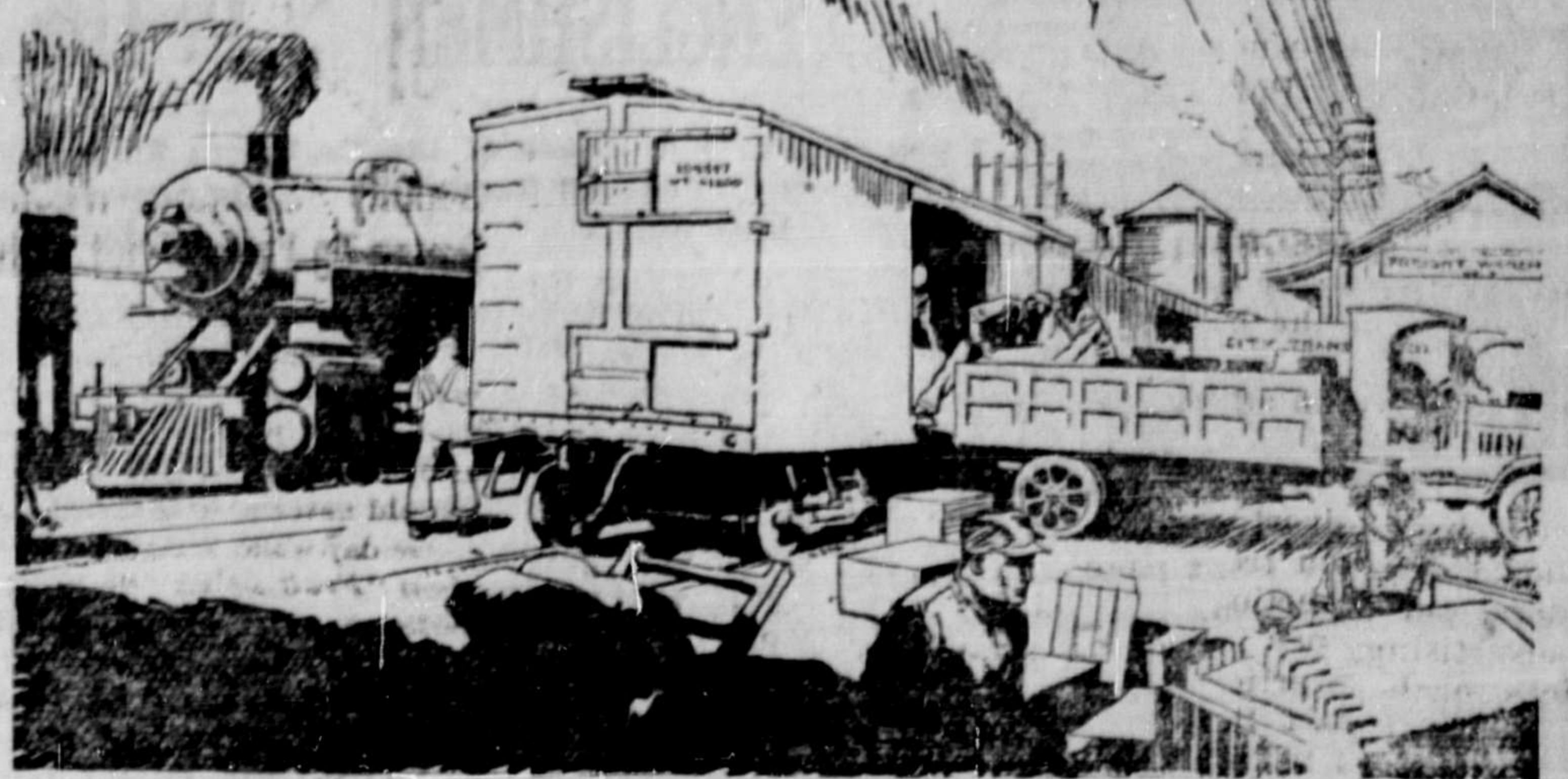

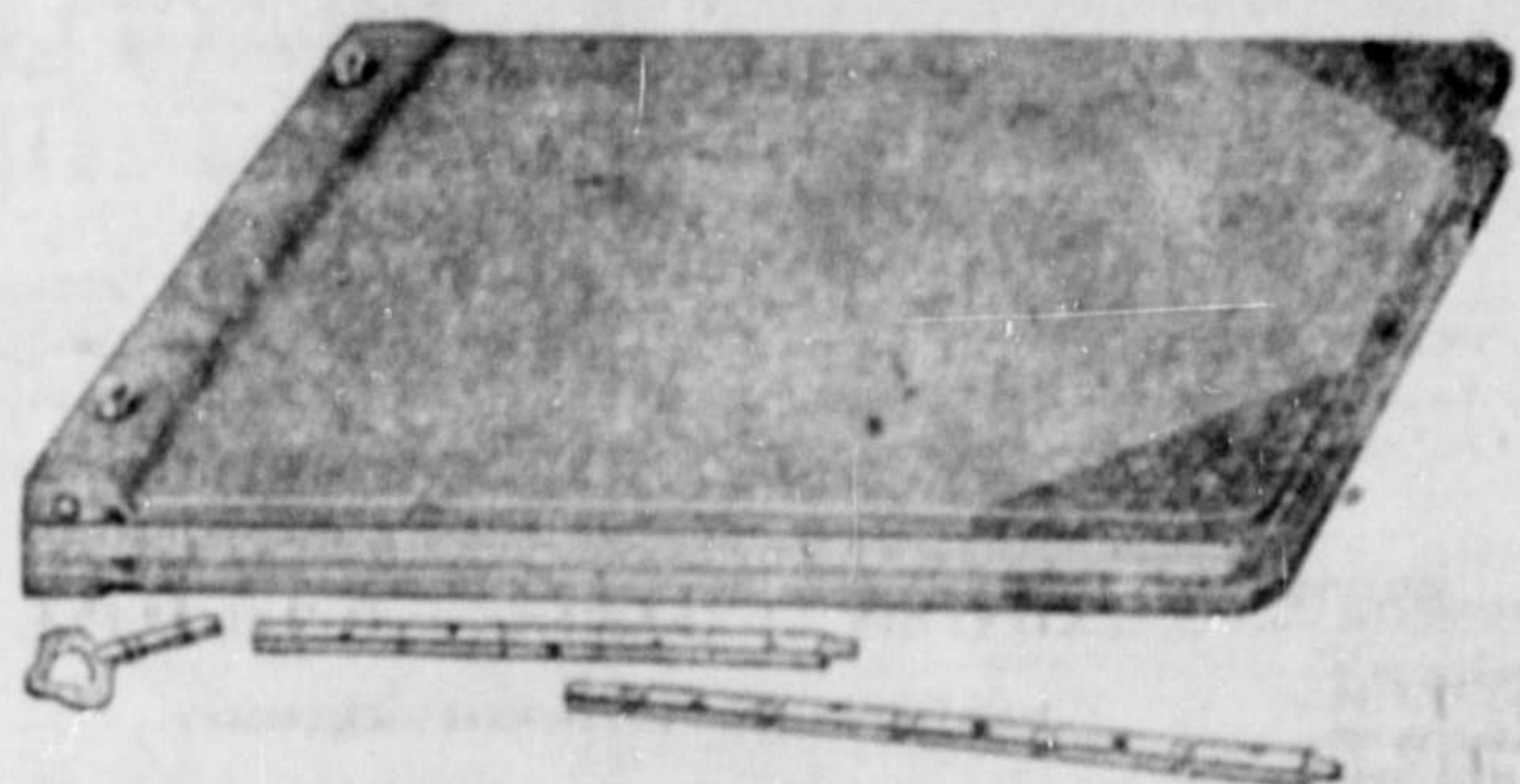

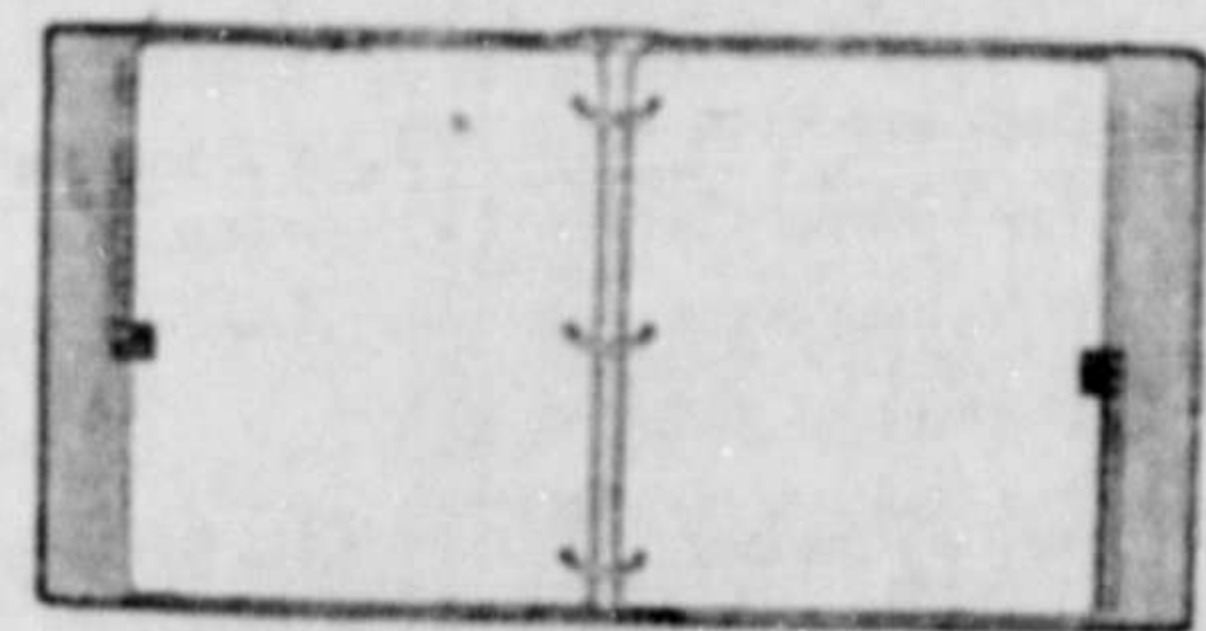

CALLIES BEAT ENGLISHMEN

Score of 2 to 0 in Favor of the Scotsmen in Football Game Last Night.

Last night the Sons of England went down to defeat before the Callies to the score of 2 to 0. The English players were late in arriving on the grounds and they played with but ten men. Their star forward, Percy Tinker, and back, Bert Warrmouth, were unable to play and some of the Sons' supporters had a hunch how the match would swing without the assistance of two such stalwarts. The Callies were not playing up to their usual tone of football, which may have been due in part to the apparent weakness of the team against which they were contesting.

The game started off with the Englishmen playing down hill and some good tries were made by the boys in red but the Callies could not stand back all the time so the ball was passed out to Tommy Black. Tommy waited for position and then scored an easy goal. Just before the closing whistle there was a scrimmage in front of the Callie goal but little was gained. It was here that Fred Hardy got knocked out.

In the second half the play still remained with the Callies for so long did the ball come near Bill Martin, the Scotch goal tender. The Callies pressed hard and the leather was passed to Black at outside left who tore in and tallied. This ended the scoring for the game. On the whole the match was rather listless with a kick here, kick there air shown by many of the players.

Sid Thompson refereed the game with S. L. Warrior and Ed. Crages on the side-lines.

The Callies were as follows: Martin; Menzie and Stewart; Currie, Murray and Campbell; Booth, Wiggins, Marnell, White and Black.

The Sons of England were as follows: Wingly; Darton, Tarrum, Crisp and Quayle; Hardy, Shimmens, Lambe, Fanthorpe and Farquhar.

IRISH SPLIT IN THE STATES

De Valera Sidelacked, According to Letters Taken in England.

LONDON, August 11.—At Bow-street Police Court before Sir Charles Jirion, William Barry, 34, fireman in the steamship New York, living at Shrewbury-road, Octon, Birkenhead, was charged on remand under the Defence of the Realm Act with bringing into the United Kingdom and having in his possession two automatic pistols and 277 cartridges; and, further, with being in possession of eight letters for transmission otherwise than through the post. The defendant pleaded "Guilty." Sir Archibald Bodkin conducted the case for the Director of Public Prosecutions; J. H. MacDonnell defended.

Sir Archibald Bodkin, said that the ship in which the defendant worked as a fireman on New York on June 21 and arrived at Southampton on July 2. On that day Police Constable Gardener saw the defendant in close conversation with another man in Southampton Docks. Noticing that the defendant's pockets were bulky, he took him to the station, where the police found in his pockets and belt two pistols and 277 rounds of ammunition. Distributed about his clothing were also 17 packets and two envelopes, one containing cuttings from newspapers published in America, and the other a number of letters.

Sending Revolvers.

Asked to account for his possession of these things, he said that they had been given to him by a man he did not know to take from New York to Liverpool, but he had lost the address. In one of the letters there was this passage: "It is now 2 a. m. and the man is waiting, so I will finish. Another man will be going to London on Wednesday, and I will send more news then." This letter was signed "John," and was believed to have been written by a man named John Noonans. A passage from another letter was: "I am sending by this delivery two parcels, one containing 400 rounds of 9mm. auto; the other 3 auto revolvers and 48 rounds of filling for the same, two spare magazines, and a leather case. I will send more on Wednesday."

De Valera Sidelacked.
Counsel gathered that the supporters of and those connected with De Valera in America had met with considerable opposition from Judge Coahalan, whose supporters had taken action independently of the wishes of De Valera, and that the latter had been put on one side, or "sidelacked," according to the expression used in the letters.

Mr. MacDonnell objected to counsel putting his own interpretation on the letters, and Sir Archibald quoted a passage from a letter of a man in America to his brother, which said: "You will probably have seen by now that things have become more serious since — has openly charged De Valera with spending \$50,000 subscribed for the fund." In the same letter there were these passages: "De Valera refuses to be the puppet of any clique." "It is hoped that the split which has taken place here will not affect Ireland."

Not Terrible.

Mr. MacDonnell urged in mitigation that the defendant was a young man who until six or seven years ago was employed as a farm laborer. With regard to the letters, there was no proof that he knew what the contents were, and they contained nothing of a terrible nature.

Mr. MacDonnell said that the letters would have been delivered in the ordinary course of post, but this method was adopted because they could be delivered more quickly. The defendant admitted that the story he told on arrest was untrue. The real fact was that another man employed in his vessel had the letters, and as he was not going ashore so soon as the defendant he got him to take them for him. The defendant refused to give away the man's name.

Two Months.

The magistrate said it might be that the contents of the letters were not known to the defendant, but he was certainly responsible for the introduction of letters into this country and any harm they might do. He passed sentence of two months' imprisonment in the second division.

LAND POLICY OF GOVERNMENT IS A SUCCESS

Hon. T. D. Pattullo Issues State-
ment in regard to What has
been Done and Future
Proposals

Dealing with some phases of
the provincial land policy, Hon.
T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands,
gave out a statement to the Vic-
toria papers in reply to a pre-
vious article published, as fol-
lows:

"It has been suggested that the
Government is mysteriously con-
sidering a huge colonization
policy, and it was also suggested
that this course was being fol-
lowed by reason of an alleged
failure of the Government's land
settlement policy and the cessa-
tion of the Housing Scheme.

Must Extend Scheme.
"Whatever any one may think
of the individual areas which
have been set aside by the Land
Settlement Board, there is no
doubt whatever of the signal
success of the policy undertaken
by the Land Settlement and De-
velopment Act.

"When the Government came
into office, it found that practi-
cally all the areas of land con-
tiguous to transportation had
been alienated. Huge blocks, es-
pecially in central and northern
British Columbia, were in the
hands of people who were not
using them.

"The policy laid down by the
Government was not designed to
force these lands back into the
hands of the Government but to
force the holders of these lands
either to use them or to make
way for somebody who would.
The policy adopted by the Govern-
ment has really been the means
of making the owners of these
lands colonizing agents. They
are today getting busy endeavor-
ing to get settlers on them and
they are succeeding.

"In certain localities the Govern-
ment thought it wise to es-
tablish land settlement areas un-
der the terms of the Act, and
these areas are rapidly being
taken up by settlers. There is
no doubt that what we need and
what we must have in British Co-
lumbia, as indeed in the whole of
Canada, is a larger population.
British Columbia covers a huge
area, with a comparatively sparse
population, and we must get more
people, both for economy of ad-
ministration and for the develop-
ment of our resources.

Major Clark Has Post.
"We know, from evidence visi-
ble to the eye, that the population
of the province is increasing and
that a large amount of develop-
ment is taking place. We have
not, however, the definite infor-
mation which we should have as
to the number of people coming
into the province, and for this
reason, as was announced some
time ago, it is proposed to take
means to secure specific infor-
mation as to the number of peo-
ple arriving in the province, where
they are locating and what they
are doing. We wish, also, to be
in a position to render all pos-
sible assistance to new settlers.

A satisfied new settler is the best
advertisement to secure further
settlers, while a dissatisfied new
settler will have the opposite ef-
fect. Major Clark, of the Depart-

ment of Lands, is in immediate
charge of the work.

"While the one big necessity in
this province is more people, we
have no desire that people shall
come here faster than they can
be assimilated. We want to get
people here just as fast as they
can be accommodated to the life
of the province, and to this end
we must bend our best energies.

Housing Plan Finished.
"Speaking of the housing ques-
tion, within the limits of the ap-
propriation it has been entirely
successful, in spite of the fact
that it was opposed by a number
of the municipalities in the be-
ginning. The entire appropriation
has been used up and applica-
tions were received for consid-
erably more than the amount
available, showing the popularity
of the scheme.

"Generally speaking, I believe
that the people of the province
are of the opinion that the Govern-
ment are carrying out new
undertakings and pursuing a for-
ward policy on as ample scale as
the financial situation will justify.
Prudence would suggest and pub-
lic opinion would support it."

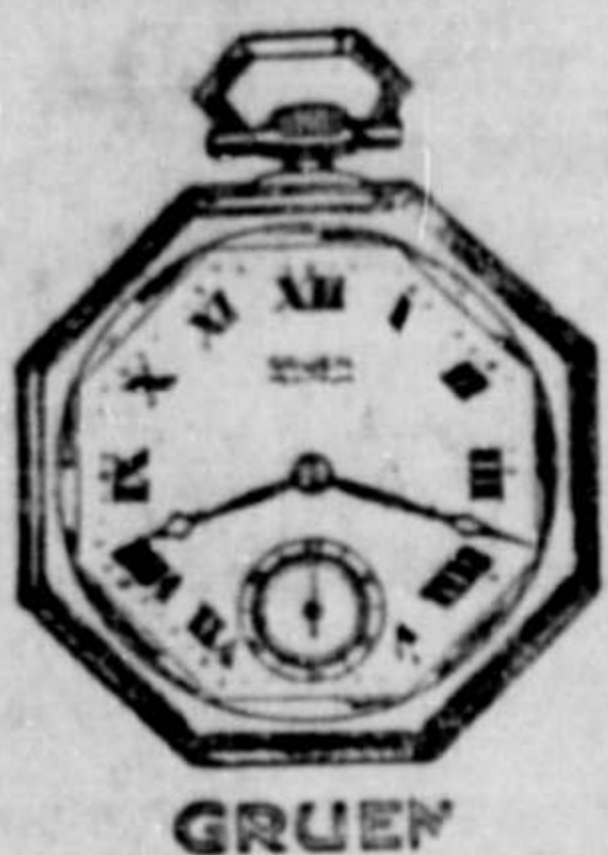

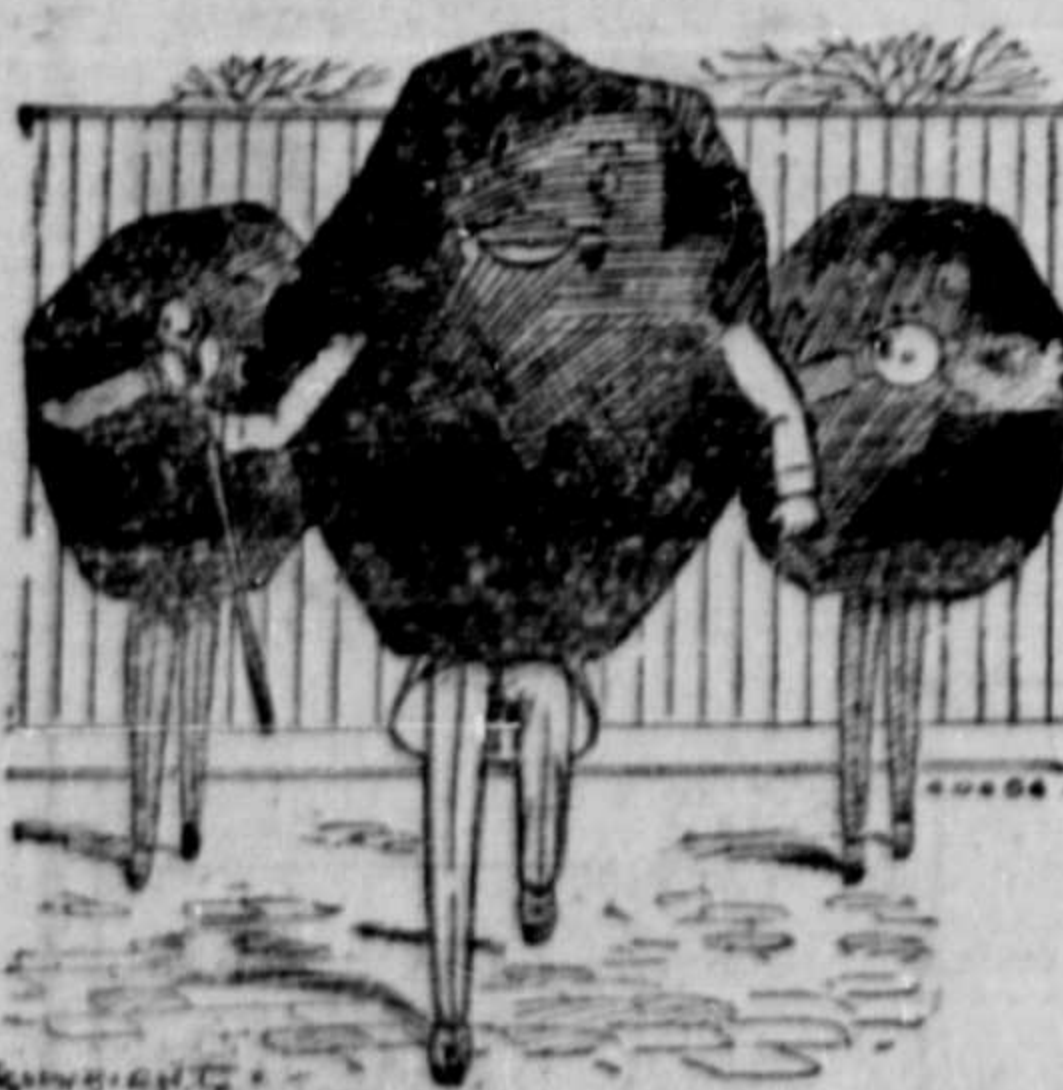

AMALGAMATION OF FARMERS' INSTITUTES WITH U.F. OPPOSED

VICTORIA, Aug. 12.—An important meeting was held here today when five of the presidents of Farmers' Institutes from the southern end of Vancouver Island were present in addition to secretaries and members from the Salt Spring Island, Pender Island, Victoria district, Saanich and Metchoin Farmers' Institutes.

A report was given to the meeting by the advisory board member, Mr. Whitney Griffiths, covering the Kelowna convention, and after a very thorough discussion the following resolution was passed by the meeting:

"This meeting strongly disapproves of the proposed amalgamation of the Farmers' Institutes with the United Farmers, but will welcome their co-operation by their becoming members of the farmers' institutes, and that they will aid in all such other ways as will advance the interests of farmers generally."

CHACKAWANA HAS GUN ON PILOT HOUSE

Picture of Boat and Crew Published in Vancouver.

In the Vancouver Sunday Sun issue of August 8 there appears a picture of the R. C. M. P. patrol boat Chackawana with her crew and commander, mustered on the fore deck. The paper goes on to say that the Chackawana has given splendid service in patrol work, fisheries protection, running down smugglers and bootleggers on the northern coast. With headquarters at Prince Rupert, the Chackawana has covered over 7,000 miles in the last year on almost continual patrol work. Her territory extends from Alert Bay, on the south, to Stewart, and the Alaskan boundary on the north. In that vast extent of coast line she is practically the sole representative of law and order for months at a time. What the timely presence of the Chackawana and her "horse marines," as they are sometimes humorously called, has meant at critical moments at various points along the coast, will probably never be told in words or measured in dollars and cents.

Carries Machine Gun.

The Chackawana carries a very businesslike machine gun mounted on the top of her pilot house. A crew of five is carried in addition to the commander and, in this connection the R. C. M. P., through Lieut. Davidson, is doing useful work in training a number of the scarlet-coated riders of the plains in the mysteries of sea lore and nautical skill in addition to what some of them have acquired of the knowledge of life on the plains.

RED HOT TIME AT POUCE COUPE BETWEEN PREMIER AND BOWSER

Presumably with the object of relieving the monotony of a tour exclusively devoted to the examination of railway conditions, Premier Oliver has been able to devote a little time to engineering while in the Pouce Coupe section of the province, says the Victoria Times.

According to a wire received at the Parliament Buildings both the Leader of the Government and the Leader of the Opposition—who traveled together northwestward on the E. D. & B. C. train the other day—have appeared on the same platform for the special declaration of the northern central electorate.

Mr. Oliver's message indicates that he and his gladiatorial opponent went to the mat for three hours on Thursday evening in what the Premier describes as a "red hot" time, the tournament being one in which railways—and the Government's policy, presumably—predominated.

The message filed at Pouce Coupe, however, indicates definitely, in the Government Leader's opinion, that the sentiment of the interested spectators "overwhelmingly favored the Government." The last four are Mr. Oliver's own words.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 2 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown Grant land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditionally upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or assigns of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1913. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole original purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commission. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Block-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to last head.
