Birdmen Arrive Safely at Hazelton

ALLIED NATIONS ARE ONE IN REGARD TO PRESENT SITUATION IN POLAND

Four Aeroplanes Land Safely at Hazelton Just After Noon

Leave for Wrangell Tomorrow Morning on Long Flight to Nome; Machines all in good order

PRINCE GEORGE, August 13.—(Early).—Local mechanics repaired the Nome aeroplanes, most of the new parts shipped from the south not being needed. They could have left but the landing field at Hazelton was not ready. It is stated that the hardest part of their trip is ahead of them. The planes got away from here this morning at 9.

OTHERS, August 13.—Four aeroplanes passed over here morning en route to Hazelton.

HAZELTON, August 13.—The four planes landed here at 4:40 in good shape and will stay over until tomorrow morning. The weather is fine and in perfect condition for flying. The planes made the trip and landed safely on the Mission grounds. All the people of the city and countryside were to greet the visitors and they will be given a big banquet.

Repairs made at Prince George have held well and the machines are in perfect condition. The next stop is at Wrangell.

EMPT MADE RECK TRAIN SECOND TIME

Spikes Placed on Track Purpose of Throwing Train Off.

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 13.—A second attempt was made today to wreck the C. P. R. train near the scene of the hold-up last week near Sentinel. Spikes were found on the track and placed there evidently for the purpose of throwing the train off.

Effort is being made to catch the perpetrators of the foul play.

TRAGIC DEED OF LOCAL GIRL

Companion From Death Railroad Track at Haysport.

VICE-CONSUL HILL COMING TO CONSULATE

Will Take Place of David Donaldson in This City Under E. A. Wakefield.

VANCOUVER, August 13.—Under a reorganization of the American consulate here James M. Hill, vice-consul, will be transferred with the same rank to Prince Rupert to succeed David Donaldson, who is appointed to the office here.

Mr. Hill is going north in ten days. He came here from Washington in November and was married here to Miss Norma Moran, a charming girl.

George J. Crosby of Washington is coming here, the change being due to the increase of trade between the United States and the Orient by way of this city.

KING ASKS FOR AN ELECTION

Declares New Government Should Have New Mandate From the People.

NEWMARKET, Ont., August 13.—The need of a representative parliament and a responsible ministry was the theme of an address delivered here Saturday by Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal opposition in the House of Commons.

Aylesworth Also Speaks.
Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux and Sir Allan Aylesworth were the other speakers.

Asserting that the most important question at the present time is the right of the people to govern themselves through a representative parliament and responsible ministers, the Liberal leader made a demand for an immediate general election, on the ground that either the government is an entirely new administration, in which event it ought to get the approval of the people, or that it is an old administration, in which event it has long exhausted its mandate and has lost its original complexion and personnel.

Mr. Lemieux spoke at length of the olive branch held out by Premier Meighen to the Liberals of Quebec. "We from Quebec thank him very much for his language and hope that his acts will correspond with his words, but should Quebec Liberals decide to throw in their lot with the English-speaking Liberals instead of the Tories, I am very much afraid it would be vastly different sentiments which he would express," said Mr. Lemieux.

PONZI HAS SURRENDERED TO MARSHAL

Says Persecution is Unwarranted and Unjust.

BOSTON, August 13.—Charles Ponzi, the wizard financier, has surrendered to the United States marshal because he feels unable to carry out the promise to redeem outstanding notes. The bank is probably ruined.

Ponzi admits the 1907 conviction but condemns today's persecution as unwarranted and unjust.

BOSTON, August 13.—Ponzi's arrest was on the charge of "using the United States mails with intent to defraud." It is said that his debts may total millions.

SMITHERS FOOTBALL TEAM DEFEATED THE G.T.P. OF THAT TOWN

In an excellent and exciting game of football played on the local field last Sunday, the Smithers team took sweet and decisive revenge on the G.T.P. eleven for the drubbing received on the occasion of their former meeting, the score being 8-2, says the Interior News. Lord for the winners played a great game and was largely responsible for the big score, although there were several players on both sides who caused their opponents lots of worry. Both teams were togged out in new uniforms and presented a bright appearance to the spectators.

Allies Continue to Act In Unison on the Polish Question says Millerand

PARIS, August 13.—The Allies remain united but the "unity bond has been formed amidst severe trials," declared Premier Millerand of France in a speech referring to the crisis with Poland.

The speech was made to offset the report which had become current to the effect that the Allies were not in accord in regard to certain policies. Naturally there must be a good deal of difference in viewpoint. The announcement of the Premier is reassuring to the people here.

LONDON, August 13.—The statement from Premier Millerand to the effect that the Allies were still acting in accord, was received here with a great deal of satisfaction. A good many people had been worried over the Polish situation.

Yet there were twelve refrigerator cars waiting in the yards to be immediately put into commission. More cars are expected before Sunday morning so that if the fishermen hear about it they will probably throng in for that day.

FINED \$300 FOR HAVING HALF BOTTLES

Proprietors of Windsor Hotel Had Bell for Warning Kitchen.

GEORGE SMITH FINED FOR COMMON ASSAULT

In the police court this morning Black & Olsen, proprietors of the Windsor Hotel, were fined \$300 for having liquor in possession other than in a private dwelling. It was a breach of the Prohibition Act for which the maximum fine is \$500. It was brought out at the court this morning that by an electric buzzer attachment behind the bar, parties in the kitchen could be warned of the approach of the police.

When George Leek and Constable Adams entered the establishment last evening George's keen ear detected the noise of the buzzer and the two officers rushed round to the kitchen and found two half bottles of whiskey. This was not brought out in the evidence this morning as a plea of guilty was entered by the accused, but was explained to the Magistrate by City Solicitor Hooper.

George Smith, colored, was fined \$10 on a charge of common assault in which he had attempted to settle financial difficulties with C. K. Ytreberg. The Magistrate warned him against using fistieff methods for settling difficulties whether personal or otherwise and said that such an offence might easily mean a term in the penitentiary.

FAINTED IN POLICE COURT

Windsor Man Convicted of Having in Possession Half a Pint of Whiskey.

WINDSOR, Ont., August 13.—W. R. Brown fainted when leaving the court room after having been convicted of having in his possession a half pint of whiskey. Sentence was deferred.

Brown is liable to a fine of \$2,000 and imprisonment for six months, and Attorney-General Roney has recently sent out a circular letter to the magistrates of the province asking for heavier sentences in order to put a stop to the illicit liquor dealing which has been going on.

KENORA TO SELL HER POWER PLANT

No Opposition to Deal by Which Backus Interests Acquire Rights.

KENORA, Aug. 13.—The agreement for the sale of the municipal power plant to the Backus interests was discussed at a public meeting here, at which Mayor George A. Toole and Peter Heenan, M.P.P., were the chief speakers. There was no opposition either at this or a previous meeting, and the indications are that the by-law will meet with almost unanimous approval at the hands of the ratepayers. In the negotiations Mayor Toole said that the town had taken nothing for granted; expert engineers and chartered accountants had been engaged, with the result that the town knew its position regarding the power.

During the past six years the plant had lost \$50,000, whereas, had the town been purchasing power for \$20 per horsepower, as per agreement with Backus, for a like period, the profit for the lighting plant would have been \$30,000. As there will be another power plant here, the town services will also be better protected it was asserted.

URGES HEAVIER PUNISHMENT OF LAW BREAKERS

Attorney-General W. E. Raney of Ontario has sent out a letter to all magistrates of the province calling attention to the fact that many minimum fines of \$200 have been imposed and that the \$2,000 fine has been imposed for the sale of scores of cases of liquor.

"The object of prosecutions under the Ontario Temperance Act is not revenue, but prevention," says the letter, in remarking that the high and low fines merely constituted a high and low license fee. This is regarded as calculated to bring the magistrates and administration of justice into public contempt and derision. Attention is then called to the act of the last session under which magistrates are given power to order imprisonment for first violations of the act, and urging the magistrates to exercise this discretion. Replies and suggestions for better enforcement of the law are asked from the magistrates.

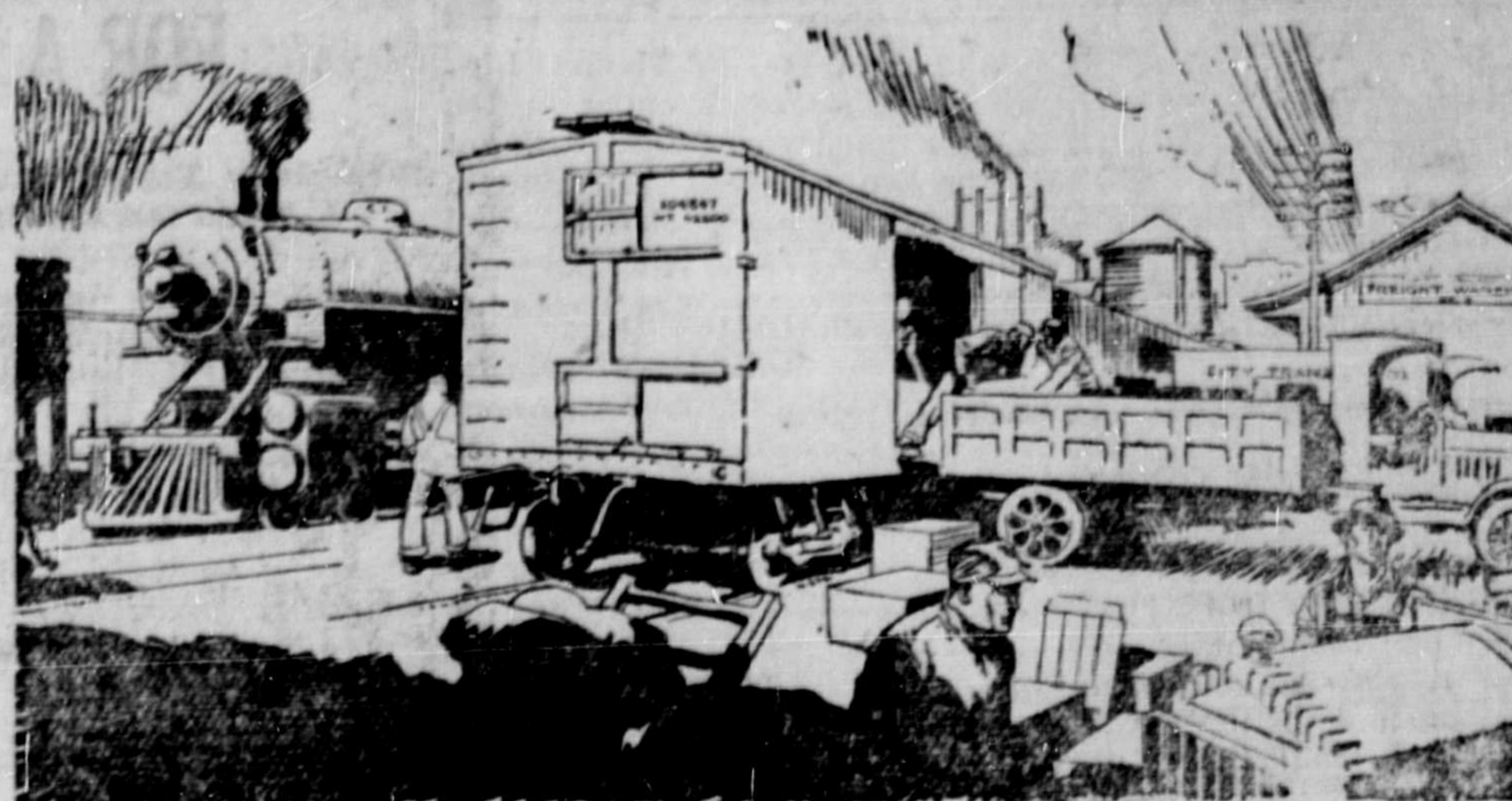

SHOT FRIEND FOR A BEAR

Blow Away Top of Skull of Pal
When Out Hunting.

EDMONTON, August 12.—A verdict of accidental death was the result of the enquiry conducted at Mountain Park in regard to the demise of Obed C. Baillie, who was shot dead by his friend, Wm. W. Gregory, on August 3, when Gregory mistook Baillie for a bear.

Testimony brought out the information that the two men were the closest friends; they had served overseas together and at the time of the fatality both were out on a little hunting trip in quest of bear.

It was in the course of the bear hunting tour and at a late hour in the evening when the two separated, as hunters usually do. Gregory heard three shots fired and proceeding in the direction from which the reports came, he saw a black object moving stealthily in the bushes. He watched the object which seemed to jump and Gregory was sure it was a bear. He raised his rifle and red once and the object began to run. He fired again and it fell to the ground.

Gregory immediately re-loaded his rifle and proceeded toward the dark object with the full expectation of finding a wounded bear. What he saw was the body of his pal Baillie with the top of his skull blown away and the man just breathing his last. "Speak to me! Speak to me!" was the frantic cry of Gregory as he raised the battered head of his friend. But Baillie died during the utterance.

PLENTY OF FISH IN NORTH FOR INDIANS

Shortage of Last Year Will Not be
Repeated this Season

JUNEAU, August 10.—"Fish, along the Yukon and its tributaries, will be both abundant and cheap this year, and the Indians will have a prosperous season," according to Dr. F. L. Forbes, superintendent of the Bureau of Education in the Upper Yukon District, who is in Juneau visiting his daughter, Miss Ethel Forbes.

"The catch, by the middle of July was as large as that of the whole season last year and the big run is expected in August and September," Dr. Forbes explained. "The shortage of fish last year was serious, not only because it left the Indians poor, but because it extended to the spawning grounds and the catch four years from now will thus be correspondingly small."

"The financial depression among the natives resulting from the poor fishing season last year was saved by the muskrat catch this spring. The merchants, who had carried the natives on credit for as much as \$30,000 during the winter, bought quantities of the skins. In Port Yukon, the natives sold 75,000 for \$1.50 and \$2.00.

"After Christmas, with the shortage of fish and an abundance of potatoes, it looked as though the Indians would be destitute for food. However, because of the deep snow, the moose and caribou were unable to range in the hills or run in the lower lands and killing moose was like going into a slaughter house to kill beef. If it had not been for the illicit slaughter of moose, the people, whites as well as natives, would have been short of proper food."

In this case the three-cornered issue would surely bring out some very peppery matches.

Austin Chamberlain is Optimistic as to Future

Calamity had threatened but so far they had come through without great difficulty. War ravages would heal in time.

LONDON, August 12.—At the Mansion House in an address Austin Chamberlain said that after the great cataclysm which had shaken the world the working of the forces of nature must for a long time be disturbed, and it was not to be expected that in a few brief months, or a year or two, the ravages of war could be repaired. We had come through very difficult times, which had often threatened calamity, and we had made successful progress in the first six months of this year, we had passed the peak of our national difficulties, and had begun the downward path from the high level to which we had been forced to climb.

Since the beginning of the year, when account was taken of the gold transferred from the banks to the Bank of England, the legal tender currency, instead of continuing to increase, had begun to decrease. The national debt, instead of growing larger and larger, had been reduced by £200,000,000. (Cheese.) The floating debt had been reduced by £60,000,000. What was more important, if possible, all new demands for capital, whether for private or public purposes, had been met out of the savings of the people and not by a fresh creation of artificial credit.

Our exports had steadily extended, and, though any calculation of that character was always subject to some doubt and some variety of opinion, he thought it was true to say that our exports, visible and invisible, had exceeded our imports and had been sufficient to find the amount necessary to repay the £50,000,000 of foreign obligations we had to meet, or at any rate to produce the funds to meet them. At the same time the obligations of foreign countries to the private citizens of this country had increased, and we were getting back some of those external obligations with which we were forced to part during the war. As a result of some of those things the Economist index number of prices, which had steadily risen from March last year to April of this year, had at last begun to show a tendency to fall.

We had no reason to be dissatisfied for we had done all that without any violent disturbance or serious financial crisis, such as had afflicted some of the competitors who had been pointed out as most dangerous to this country, and whose competition had been most feared by men entitled to speak with authority.

SMITHERS MILL IS TO CUT LOGS SOON

Eastern Interests Preparing to Take Over Industry.

The lumber mill of the Northern B. C. Lumber Co. which has been closed for some time is about to reopen in the near future, according to H. H. Gilchrist of Calgary who is connected with the concern. There is a deal on under which some eastern capital will be introduced and the work resumed.

An important ruling was also passed, namely, that any players cannot now be released from any team to enter another before the end of the league. This will obviate the padding of any one team from the members of the others. The players may be released but they cannot again sign on to take part in the present league fixtures. New members can be added, however, until the very end.

Twenty-five dollars was ordered to be paid towards the dressing room fund.

RACE WAR ON FISHING BANKS

Austrians and Japanese in California Keep Up Incessant Warfare

SAN DIEGO, Aug. 12.—Investigation by the local police convinced them that warfare which has been carried on intermittently for several years among Austrian, Italian and Japanese fishermen on the fishing banks off the Lower California and Southern California coasts has broken out afresh and with at least two casualties.

Two bodies found floating in the bay several days ago have been identified as members of the crew of the Japanese fishing smack Yamoto, operating under charter to the Long Beach Fisheries Company.

The Yamoto, according to evidence gathered by the police, crashed into the jetty at the entrance of the harbor ten days ago and sank. According to the police, several other fishing boats have entered the harbor with their cabins and upper works almost riddled with bullets, and it is reported that practically every fishing boat leaving this port or San Pedro goes heavily armed.

The police said the situation had been aggravated by the coming to the banks of Austrian manned purse seine boats from Puget Sound and that the Austrians were charged with having destroyed thousands of dollars' worth of nets and gear belonging to Japanese and Italian fishermen from Southern California.
