OUR TRANSCONTINENTAL FLYERS ARRIVE SAFELY AT SERGIEFF ISLAND

Planes Reached the First Alaskan Stop

landed on Sergieff Island near Wrangell late Saturday Afternoon--next stop is Whitehorse in Yukon

FRANGELL, Alaska, August 16.—The planes in the New to Nome transcontinental flight landed at Sergieff Island here at 4:30 on Saturday afternoon, having taken only two and twenty-seven minutes to make the flight from Hazelton after Wrangell, the next stop of the planes is Whitehorse, Territory, a distance of three hundred miles. The planes were scheduled to leave here yesterday afternoon.

THE STRIKE IS MADE TO SOUTH

Bight at North End of Princess Royal Island is Attracting Prospectors.

BUTDALE, August 15.—As a result of a strike of ore near that of the Surf Inlet made at Rivers Inlet on Royal Island last Monday a number of prospectors are making their way to this point. There are thirteen claims staked in the vicinity last week and more prospectors are on their way to the mine.

Some of the strike are as yet vague but the report here is that the lead is very rich and a large body of ore is in sight. Rivers Inlet is situated near the north end of Princess Royal Island and the find has been made quite close to the shore.

W. DOHERTY IS DEAD IN VANCOUVER

Such for Care of Disabled Veterans—Ailed from Bright's Disease.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 16.—Lieut. C. E. Doherty, superintendent of the British Columbia Hospitals, died of Bright's disease yesterday at the age of 47. He had been ailing for some time and during the latter part of his illness his condition became very serious.

Lieut. Doherty organized the Canadian Mental Hospitals for returning men from the Canadian Expeditionary Forces during the war. He was formerly a member of the Dominion Executive of the War Veterans' Association.

NEGRO IN JAIL RESULT OF FIGHT

Thomas Dunn Received Severe Wounds in Affray on Fulton Street Last Night.

Just before the train left this morning the city police were able to locate Ray Anderson, colored, on a dinner car and he was taken to the police station where he will be held in connection with a fighting affray of last night on Fulton Street. The other party to the affair is Thomas Dunn, who is able to be around alright today but is suffering from the effects of twelve wounds which are supposed to have been inflicted by a sharp weapon.

According to the story of Dunn this morning he came in from the Prince Rupert Cannery at 8 last night and after a short time went for a stroll in the city. It was while going up Fulton Street that he was hailed with "Hello Buster" so he stopped to see who was talking as did not like the appellation. The man who accosted him, who was later taken to the Anderson, said that he had been in the American army and Dunn came back with the news that he had served with the Canadian forces. Apparently words got stronger between the two parties and a fight was started. Dunn remembers little after the fight started except that he tried hard to grapple his assailant. He now carries some very bad head wounds and a gash in the back near the region of the kidneys.

Police on Trail.
Constables Wisely and McDonald came on the scene about 1:45 when a phone message came in about the fight. Early this morning they were hot on the track of the man whom they wanted. They were just a little behind him all the time. Four of the members of the police force were down in the yards and it was while going through the diner that Constable noticed something near the floor like a bundle of rags. At first he passed it by but later returned and found Anderson in a bent-up position on the floor of the coach.

LONDON, August 16.—An attempt on the life of Premier Lloyd George has been reported to have been discovered. The detective guard has been increased at his official residence.

PAT BURNS OPTIMISTIC

Says Conditions in British Columbia Most Promising—Claims Meat Situation Relieved.

Pat Burns, Western Canada's "Cattle King," and head of the P. Burns Packing Company, was a visitor to the city yesterday, on one of his customary trips of inspection of his branch departments, says the Victoria Colonist.

"There is no shortage of beef," stated Mr. Burns, who contradicted the recent alarmist reports which spoke of a threatened shortage in the meat supply of the Dominion. Especially in the West conditions are much improved consequent upon more satisfactory feed situation this year. It was quite true, he says, that the drought conditions in the Prairies last summer and the following severe winter occasioned losses of cattle, but the heavy losses were isolated cases, severe in themselves, but by no means general. Many ranchers sold cattle they would otherwise have kept, but they got good prices. In his opinion the total output of meat has not been affected by the past year's condition.

Mr. Burns is an optimist so far as the Western crop situation is concerned. Crops in Alberta are the best he has ever seen, and nothing can prevent the West garnering a record crop this season, as the harvest is now so near that no unfavorable conditions can arise to seriously affect results. He visited the Delta section and the Red River district last Sunday; and there, too, he states, harvest conditions are excellent, with the exception, perhaps, of the area recently flooded through the rising waters of that river.

Mackenzie King Says That Canada Needs Election Now

At Toronto Meeting Saturday Opposition Led stated that No Economy in Meighen's Policy

TORONTO, August 16.—At a monster meeting held here on Saturday night, L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberals in the House of Commons, stated that an election was needed immediately in Canada to stop the usurpation of authority by an autocratic executive.

In Premier Meighen's policies, Hon. Mr. King said, he could see little hope for economy in Canadian affairs of state.

BIG SOCKEYE PACK MADE AT BUTEDALE

Devious Actions of Bolshevist Soviets

Appeal for Protection from France is one Report; Banding with Germany in another

PARIS, August 16.—The Soviets have made a direct appeal to French labor not to allow France to declare war on Russia. KOLNO, Poland, August 16.—According to reports made here it is the intention of the soviets of Russia to seek an alliance with Germany to war on France, conquer England and then the United States, and thus thrust Bolsheviki rule over the world. A statement to this effect was made here to an Associated Press representative.

Why in Favor Of Prohibition.

So many people have asked why the News favors prohibition as against government sale of liquor, that it might be in order to give a few of the reasons for that stand.

Abolish the Bar No Longer an Issue.

The bar has been abolished and will remain abolished in so far as the sale of liquor is concerned. That seems so probable as to be almost certain.

If prohibition is allowed to continue, through the people voting in favor of it, the Provincial Government has promised to recommend to the legislature the passing of a resolution calling on the Dominion Government to prohibit importation of liquor into this province except for medicinal and similar purposes.

If the people vote in favor of government sale of liquor, it means that an immense quantity more liquor will be used than is used today. It will be a return to open legalized drinking.

Present Law is Not Enforced.

The present prohibition law is not enforced. No one will pretend that it is. People coming from Victoria say they can buy liquor at almost any bar in the capital city, and there is undoubtedly a large amount of liquor sold in Prince Rupert.

Prince Rupert Not Typical of Province.

Prince Rupert is not typical of the whole province in regard to the liquor trade or in sentiment toward the Prohibition Act. Judging from associations with people in their homes, especially at Victoria, we should say there would be a large majority for prohibition when the next vote is taken.

We are of opinion that prohibition will be supported again this year because it is in the interests of the business men to vote for it, the labor people are officially supporting it, the women are for it, and most people who are interested in the general betterment of the race and are not burdened with an overwhelming thirst would like to see liquor kept out as much as possible.

Political Machine. May be Created.

In this article we have said nothing about the danger of creating a political machine in connection with the liquor selling business. There is a very real danger but we have no experiences to guide us here along those lines.

On the night the uprising is to take place, with a massacre of the whites as its object, Sigrid goes to the temple steps to dance in the moonlight, as her lover had often dreamed of her doing. Her lithe figure, in flowing white, fills the natives with awe, and believing her to be the reincarnation of the defiled "bride of Vishnu," they fall down to worship her. She dances until she is exhausted, in order to hold the blacks from their contemplated revolt, and by so doing enables British reinforcements to get up and save the situation.

Classic Dances.

Nazimova's dancing is of the classic sort. She wears the white, flowing garments of the Greek dancers. This style of terpsichore is much affected among the girls and young women of the present day. Parents send their children to schools to learn the poetry of motion.

AUNT DOLLY WAS A SOUTHERN SLAVE

Was Well Known at Dawson and in Alaska.

Everyone who knows Tenakee, the hot springs town, knows "Aunt Dolly," says an Alaska exchange. They know her humor and her philosophy and have listened to her tales of frontier days by the hour. "Aunt Dolly" is dead. One of the characters of Alaska has passed on.

Mrs. Dolly Nelson "Aunt Dolly," born a slave in Maryland something over 85 years ago, died at Tenakee after a very brief illness. She was buried the next day, Commissioner Case conducting the services and the whole population of Tenakee followed her body to its last resting place under the big spruce trees at the end of Tenakee's one and only street.

"Aunt Dolly" after securing her freedom through Abraham Lincoln, her idol, came west and took part in all the stirring times incidental to the winning of the west. She was a skilled cook of those luscious Southern dishes that have made the South famous to the world over. A true daughter of the frontier, she came North with the Klondike rush and went to Dawson and other camps of the interior. She operated road-houses where her cooking and her humor cheered many a weary trapper.

HOLDUP MAN BEING CHASED

Barry, Who Assaulted Stoddart At Victoria, is Still At Large.

Barry, or Reis, the man who recently assaulted S. A. Stoddart in his jewelry store here, thought to be ragged and hungry, is still lurking about Parksville, Vancouver Island, near his ranch, according to information which reached Mayor Porter, chairman of the City Police Commission, today, says a Victoria paper. The Mayor's information concerning the fugitive appears to prove incorrect the rumors that Barry had been seen near Union Bay or had escaped from the Island altogether. When last seen by a man who was too terrified to stop him, Barry appeared desperate, exhausted and ragged. He was still wearing the white tennis shoes which he had on when he committed his attack here, but they were torn to ribbons, as were his other clothes, as a result of the mad chase through the bush.

Though Mayor Porter has withdrawn City Detectives Carlow, Macdonald and Heather from the pursuit, Provincial Police are still searching for Barry, confident that he is in the woods near Parksville, where he lived before the crime. To catch him in the woods he knows so well, however, is a task of the utmost difficulty and so far has baffled his pursuers.

Many Reports.

Numerous reports regarding the whereabouts of Barry continue to pour into the police and a great deal of time has been consumed in tracing up all the clues. The other night a Chinese cook working at a Cumberland house was stopped by a man who said he was starving. He told the Chinaman to leave a pail of food outside the house for him. The Chinaman's story was investigated, but led to no results. Last week a resident of Cumberland who was travelling along the Island highway in an automobile was hailed by a man answering Barry's description. The man attempted to stop the car but the driver put his foot on the accelerator, shooting the car ahead and frustrating the man's attempt to board it.

Milks Cow.

There have been other trails, all of which have been faithfully followed by the police. One was at Mud Bay, where a barberry bark collector said that a man had run away from him into the bush when he accosted him. The other report came from a farmer named Cairns, who averred that he caught a stranger milking his cow. When the man, who was backing away, saw some others approaching he took to his heels and disappeared over a long-railroad trestle.

The missing boat, referred to in the chase last week, belonged to Mrs. Phillips, of Parksville, and was stolen from the beach and the presumption was that it was Barry who stole it. It was this incident that led to the tracking of a harmless fisherman all the way to Oyster Bay, where he accounted for himself satisfactorily.

Barry is a Boer.

FLOOD DAMAGE NEAR STEWART

All Bridges Washed Away on the Bear, Salmon and Marmot Rivers.

More particulars of the floods which have damaged the trails and washed away the bridges in the Stewart district were brought south last night by the steamer Prince George. It seems that the bridges over the Bear river, Salmon river and Marmot river have been washed out and an immense lot of damage done to the trails and roads. It is now quite impossible to get to some of the localities.

Up the Bear river there was a food shortage, so a number of horses were swum across the river, taking a cable from the Stewart side. With it they were able to get provisions across and send a pack train to the mines.

On the Salmon river road a good deal of damage was done. E. Campbell, superintendent of the Anox mines, and Postmaster Cameron were up at the 49 mine when the storm came and they were held there five days. Coming down Dale Pitt, manager of the Premier, came near losing his life when the horse he was riding slid off the road.

At Hyder several buildings were washed away and the damage everywhere is very considerable.

WISHING FOR IRISH PEACE

Sir Campbell Stuart and Sir Hamar Greenwood on Condition of Emerald Isle

LONDON, Aug. 15.—At a Canadian Club banquet here Sir Campbell Stuart, introducing Sir Hamar Greenwood, said:

"The duties of the Chief Secretaryship are, at the present time, onerous and responsible in the extreme.

"The future that lies before him is clouded; but perhaps it is peculiarly possible for Canadians to regard it without hopelessness. In Canada we have seen difficulties, to our minds as formidable as those which confront Sir Hamar Greenwood, resolve under the miraculous action of wise institutions of self-government. I do not think that I am encroaching on disputed ground if I say that, as Canadians, we realize the immensity of the boon which an Irish settlement must confer upon this Empire. It could scarcely be measured. Yet, earnestly though we all hope for such a consummation, it is not only the Empire that we have in our minds. I believe that all of us covet the blessings of peace and contentment for Ireland herself. To one who, like myself, was privileged during the war to undertake a mission in Ireland and received from Irishmen of all creeds classes and politics, not merely the courteous welcome of a kindly people, but true sympathy and active assistance, it is difficult indeed not to believe that, beyond the misunderstandings and bitternesses of the present, there lies a future in which all Irishmen will join in contributing the indispensable aid of their country to the strength and unity of the Imperial Commonwealth." (Cheers.)

Leaders Seldom Meet

In his reply Sir Hamar said: "I like Ireland. I like the Irish people. They are strong in their religious and strong in their political views, but when Protestant and Roman Catholic do meet together, as they do in many organizations in their country, they work well together. One of the tragedies of that country is not the fact that there are two religions, but the fact that the leaders of these religions seldom meet together. I believe the vast majority of the Irish people hate and loathe the campaign of terror and murder now carried on in certain parts of their country. (Cheers.) This campaign casts an undeserved stigma upon a great race, and until it is ended the industrial, commercial and political future of Ireland will grow darker and darker."

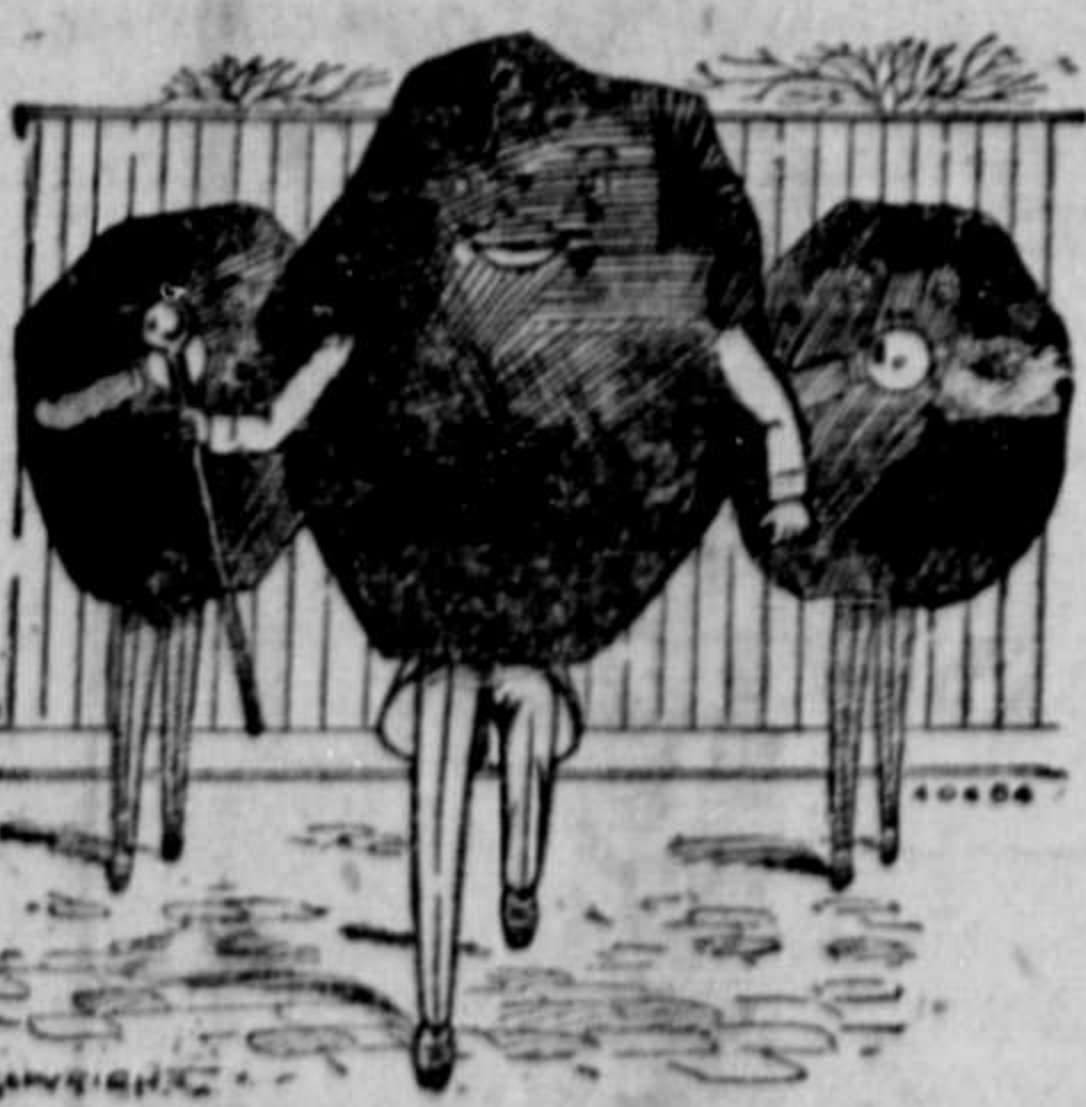

CHINESE CIVIL WAR ENDS SATISFACTORILY

The civil war in China has not only come to a speedy end; it has apparently also come to a good end, says the Manchester Guardian. The northern forces so skillfully outmanoeuvred the southern as to cause their complete collapse. In consequence the leader of the Anfu faction, in suing for peace, offered the disbandment of all the troops under his command, the dissolution of Parliament, the dismissal of three Anfu ministers and the suppression of the Anfu Club. It would be fatal to consider these as mere incidents of a local political intrigue. The terms offered mean nothing less than the utter rout of the militarist and pro-Japanese system which dominated at Peking. They mean the success of the remarkable and progressive national movement that has swept over China of late, and that is a fact which marks the end of what one may call the "protectorate" era in the Far East. It should not be necessary to wait long in order to see the reflection of this in Japan's foreign policy. A beginning is suggested in her decision to recognize the new State and Government formed in Eastern Siberia.
