Navy League. Being Supported.

Lieut. Helmsing, the organizer for the Navy League of Canada, is receiving a splendid reception at all points he is visiting in the north and aid in establishing the branches of the League at various places is being unselfishly given. The objects of this League are most worthy in the effort to educate the people and especially the young people to the importance and necessity of maintaining a navy and merchant marine equipped with both ships and men. The endeavor to further the movement now on foot in Canada should, indeed, command all the public support and sympathy it can be given.

Canadians Owe Debt to Navy.

Canadians owe more to the navy than they can ever pay, says Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, and this apart from the service rendered by it to civilization generally. A great commentator on English law wrote in 1758 (half a century before Trafalgar): "The Royal Navy of England has ever been its greatest ornament; it is its ancient and natural strength, the floating bulwark of our island."

But for that Navy the expansion and preservation of the British Empire had been impossible. But for the Navy Canadians would not be in possession of the better part of the North American continent and enjoying, as they do, the happiest possible system of government. And yet the gigantic burden, ever-increasing, for the maintenance of this indispensable force and influence for good has substantially fallen on the British Islands alone.

Most Are Convinced of Value.

Time was, and not so long ago, when some of our countrymen in the Dominion looked askance at any proposal to strengthen this great arm of our defence, but the four years of war left few men unconvinced as to the value of the navy to Canada.

To our people, indeed, the freedom of the seas is absolutely essential and the navy has so preserved our freedom of trade and export, as well as industrial and agricultural development, that Canada has been able to bear her share of the great war's burden and yet enjoy at the same time a fair amount of prosperity.

European Situation is Hard to Understand.

Warsaw, the Polish capital, has now been entered by troops of the Russian soviets and the persecution of the gallant little nation seems to be more and more intense. About a month ago it appeared that she might have been saved all the bloodshed and pillage that is now going on. If the Allied active intervention had been brought to bear on the situation it is likely that the present deplorable situation might have been avoided, but European diplomatic and political affairs at the present time are both intricate and dangerous to handle. For France or Britain to actively participate in the quelling of the Reds would have seemed like throwing down the gauntlet to certain factions in their own borders whose strength is not known but is, nevertheless, feared. The soviets are no doubt afraid of Allied intervention and these countries themselves are not desirous of kindling civil dissension. The situation in Europe today is indeed a precarious one and it is not for the common person dependent on the ordinary sources of information to condemn the actions of any of the great Allied powers in connection with the Polish situation. If the Allies ever do actively intervene many preparations will have to be made and many of these preparations will be right at home.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

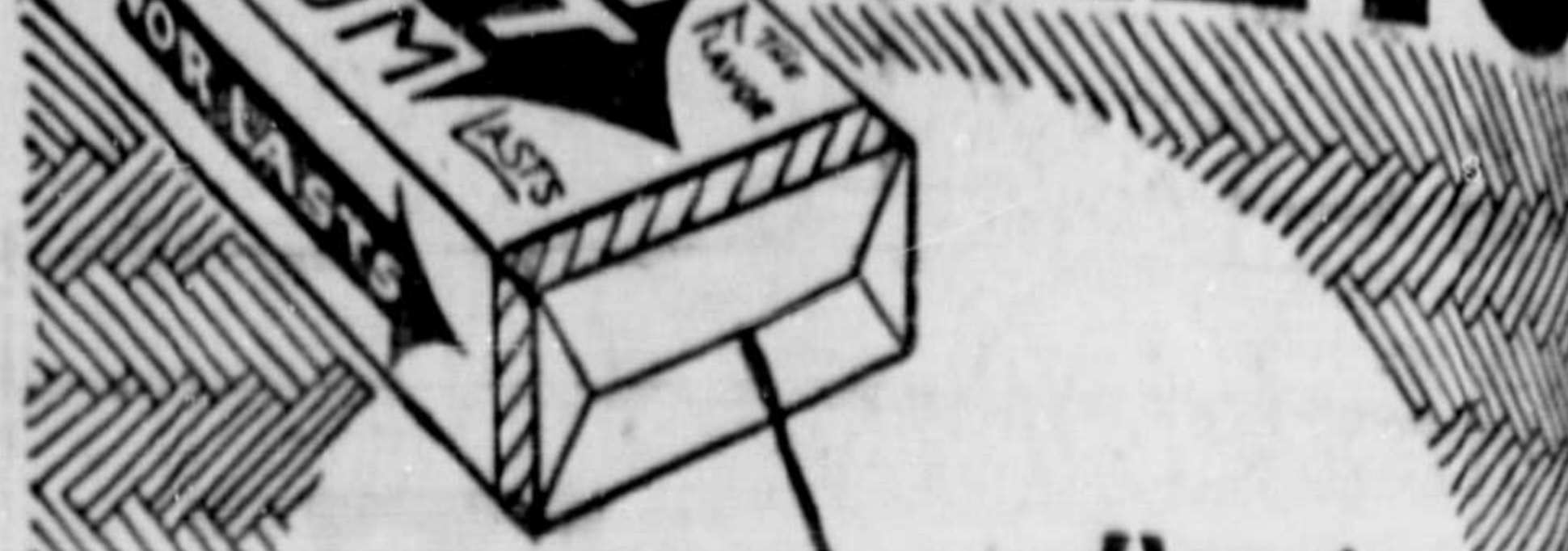

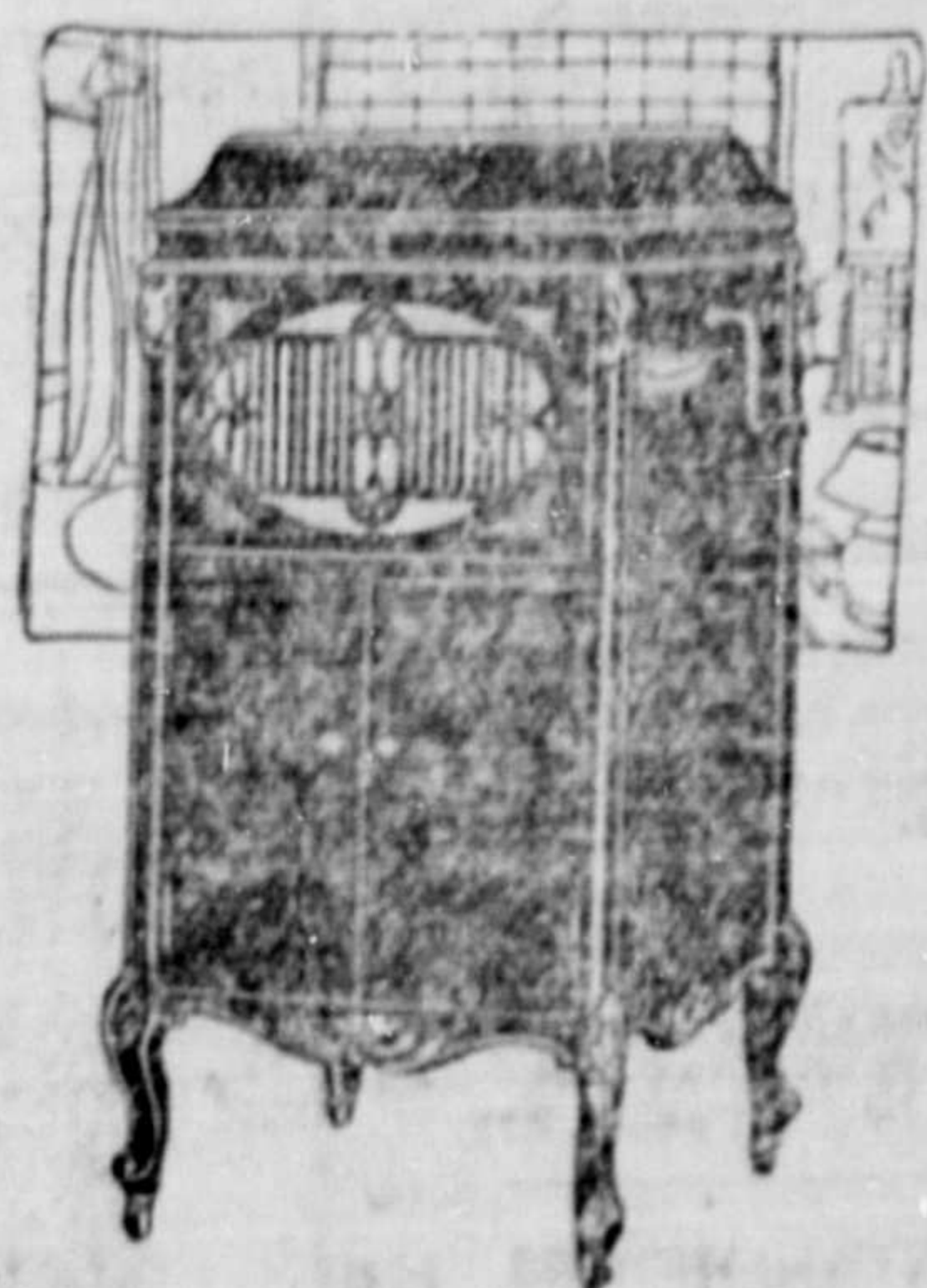

will attend the sick girl. Mrs.
Morgan arrived in the city on
Sunday.

Sport Briefs

Tomorrow night the Beavers
and the Red Sox meet in an in-
termediate league fixture on the
Acropolis Hill grounds. As the
evenings are beginning to get
rather short it will be up to the
two teams to get started early.
It will perhaps be necessary to
play only seven innings, but this
should be decided before the game
commences. As the league is now
drawing to a close these matches
are being watched very closely by
all who are interested. The
Beavers hope to be able to re-
cover themselves from the trim-
ming which they received from
the Colts last week.

Just for a minute it looked last
evening that the fans were going
to enjoy a real stand up fight dur-
ing the football game. Fanthorpe,
back for the Grand Trunks, had
been checking off Pat Conlin from
rushing the other back. Pat
walked right through him so Fan-
thorpe apparently waited his next
chance and went after him again.
This time the break occurred and
the two players clinched. They
broke away and were just stand-
ing up to one another when some-
one from the side lines rushed in
and stopped the fracas.

With three "Eds" on the field
last evening and two "Pats" it
was difficult at times to know just
who was wanted as someone might
cry "Come on Ed" and the Ed that
some of the players thought was
needed might have been miles
away from the ball.

Eddie Craggs was out of form
for sure last evening especially
in the first half when what balls
he did not put over the bar, or
over the side lines, or foul, were
taken away from him. Very sel-
dom did he get a good centre. In
the second half there was much
cheering for the Trail outside left
but it is hardly known whether it
was meant for sympathy or praise.

With two such players as Pat

SCIENTIST DIES IN LONDON CITY

Sir Norman Lockyer was Astrono-
mer and Exploration Expert.
84 Years Old

LONDON, August 17.—Sir Nor-
man Lockyer, an eminent scient-
ist and authority on exploration,
is dead here.

Sir Norman was born in 1836
and was also a famous astronom-
er and was Director of the Solar
Physics Observatory at South
Kensington and Professor of As-
tronomical Physics at the Royal
College of Science. He was pre-
sident of the British Scientific
Association in 1903 and 1904.
He was the chief of several
eclipse expeditions.

WRONG KIND LIQUOR FOR FIRE CHIEF

WINDSOR, Ont., August 17.—
Clarence D. Fields, chief of the
Windsor fire department, in a
statement here to day, declared
that while in Toronto recently at-
tending the fire chiefs' conven-
tion, he was "shocked" at the
open manner in which liquor was
being offered for sale. "I had not
been there twenty-four hours be-
fore I had all kinds of liquor of-
fered me for a consideration. I
could have had it in pints or in
barrels, and one did not have to
go into a back lane to get it
either," he said.

LABOR SITUATION IS SATISFACTORY

Provincial Labor Bureaus Have Employment for Many Men in the Province.

The report of the provincial labor bureaus for the month of July show that the work of these offices is steadily increasing in scope and effectiveness. In fact, the weekly placements throughout the province were higher during the past month than they have been in any month since the service commenced except in April when the spring season makes the demand especially large. The number of vacancies in proportion to the number of applicants was also much more satisfactory during the past month.

At Prince Rupert employment has been unusually active during the month, the placements being more than double those in June. The logging camps of the Islands and to the south and the mining camps of Stewart, Anxox and Alice Arm continue to absorb the most of the men available and during the past month there were many positions unfilled owing to the scarcity of men. Machine miners, loggers, shipyard workers, general laborers and sawmill men are in demand about the city and district.

Throughout other parts of the province farm help and railway work is giving employment to all.

MAY BUILD TOURIST HOTEL JASPER PARK

Vancouver Official of Canadian National Makes Statement at Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Aug. 17.—A move towards the building of a big Canadian National Railway Hotel at Jasper to replace the present tent city will be made next spring according to a statement made by Assistant General Freight Agent Brodstedt here.

WELL KNOWN MERCHANT IS DEAD AT STEWART

T. P. Lindsay, aged 68, a well known merchant of Alaska and northwest cities, died at Elovon Mile, Salmon River, last Wednesday morning from heart trouble. Owing to the storm it was impossible to bring the body to Elovon. He was the first merchant to reopen in Spokane after the big fire. Of late years he had been in business at Candie, above Nome.

RESTOCKING JASPER LAKES WITH FISH

A systematic plan for restocking lakes in Jasper Park with trout has been inaugurated by Col. S. Maynard Rogers, superintendent of the park. During July 18,000 trout fry have been received from the Government hatcheries and placed in lakes Pyramid, Patricia, Annette and Edith. All of these lakes are well suited to fish propagation and are within easy distance from park headquarters.

and Went Down**

JUNEAU, August 17.—An official report of the drowning of Olaf Waisted, a member of the crew of the gas boat J. P. Todd II, while that vessel was off Cape Addington on July 26, has been received at the Customs House from Capt. Adam Wilson of that vessel. The reports says that Waisted jumped overboard at 9 a.m., with the purpose of committing suicide. The gas boat was quickly stopped and brought to where the drowning man was in the water. Three times members of the crew got him by the clothes and each time he fought loose, finally sinking to the bottom. The body was not recovered.

The J. P. Todd II is owned by Wilson and Sullivan of Ketchikan from which port she sailed for the Deep Sea Fisheries. She is of 17 tons register and carries a crew of five.

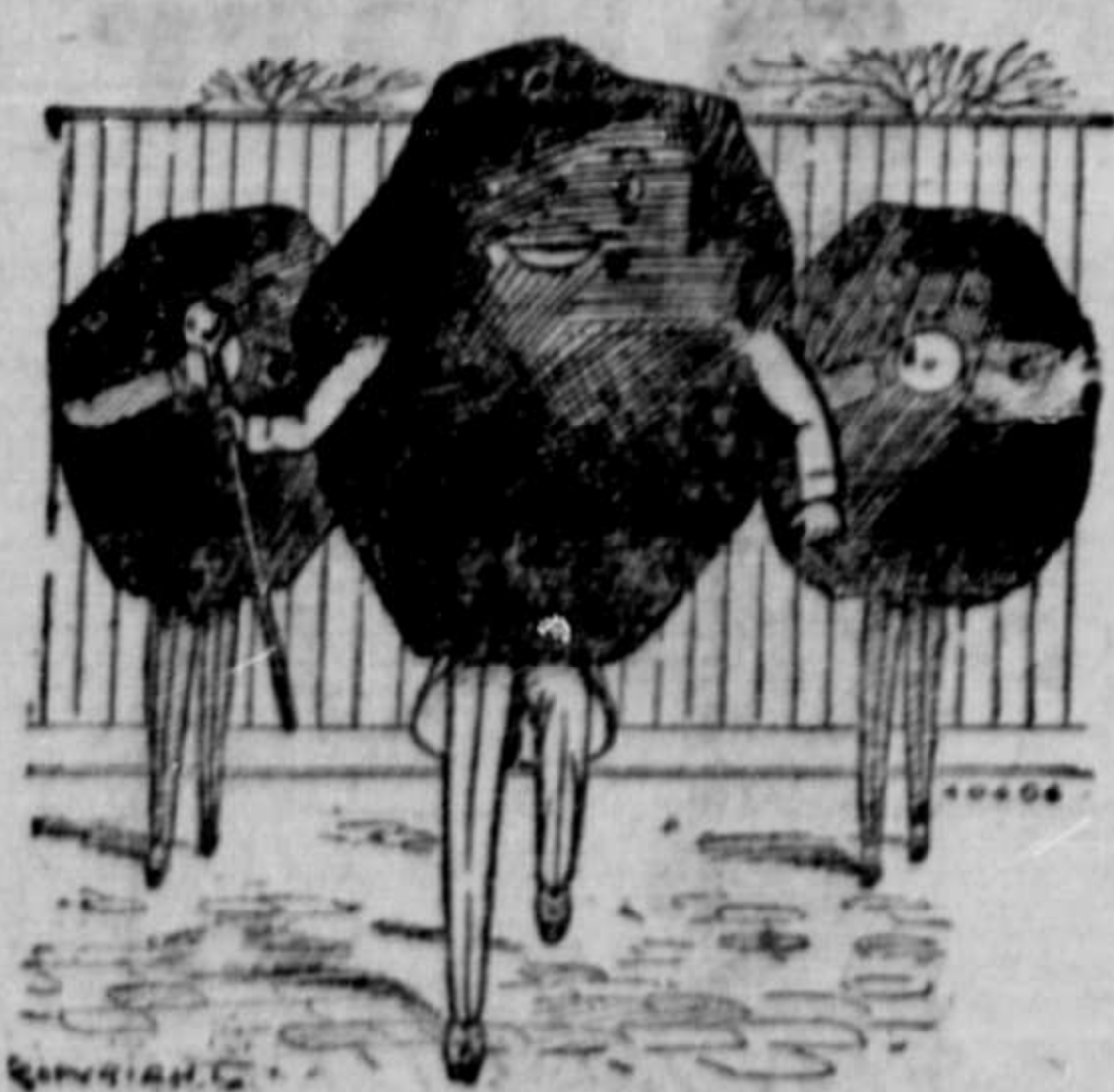

DEEP SEA DIVER GETS PARALYSIS

Was Working on Princess Sophia when Taken Ill

Deep Sea Diver John Donovan is at the Dawes Hospital in this city suffering from paralysis of his lower limbs and impaired heart action caused by staying under water too long and being brought to the surface too quickly while working on the wreck of the Princess Sophia, says the Alaska Daily Empire of Juneau.

Donovan was engaged in fastening cables to the sunken vessel and was working at a depth of 150 feet. He was down for a considerable length of time and when he was hoisted up, it is said, was not brought up gradually enough. The sudden change of pressure affected him.

He was rushed to the city on the salvage tug Daniel Kern and taken to the Dawes Hospital where he is now under the care of Dr. L. P. Dawes. Dr. Dawes said today that although the man was in a serious condition he had great hopes that he would recover.

Two divers, of whom Donovan is one and Jack Clouse the other, have been working on the wreck of the Princess Sophia for several weeks placing the cables that will be used in raising the sunken vessel. Donovan has done considerable work in Alaskan waters and is known as a daring diver. Jack Clouse is a Port Townsend man who made quite a reputation in war days in France. He is continuing at work at the wreck.

FAIRBANKS HAS LARGE AERO FIELD FOR ALL AIR SCOUTS

FAIRBANKS, August 17.—At the meeting of the park board, which was held recently, the bids for clearing land at the park in preparation for the landing of the Alaska airplanes were opened and the contract awarded to Paul Rickett, the lowest bidder.

Three hundred feet of ground in the direction of the N. C. woodpile will be cleared and put in shape, and this will make the entire field 1,200 by 600 feet, which will fill the requirements for a landing place.

Captain Douglas, the army aviator who has charge of the preparation of landing places, will give his personal supervision to the finer details of the work. The space between the race track and the grand stand is now in good shape, and with the additional cleared space, the park should be as good an airplane field as there is in the territory.
