FORMER RUPERT RESIDENTS ARE INVOLVED IN VANCOUVER HOTEL MURDER

Bolsheviks are Repulsed at the Gates of Polish Capital

While fighting rages fiercely in outskirts of Warsaw peace is being discussed---Polish independence respected

VARSAW, August 18.—The Bolshevik forces have been repulsed after entering the city and are now fighting fiercely on outskirts. The Polish defence is now being stoutly maintained.

MOSCOW, August 17.—The soviet peace terms with Poland demand that guarantees be made that Polish landlords will not attack.

No territory is offered than in the Entente conditions. The government professes to respect Polish independence.

Transcontinental Planes Are Now at Dawson City

WHITEHORSE, Y. T., August 18.—The fourth Alaska plane landed by Captain Street reached Whitehorse yesterday. Two planes, 2 and 4, left Whitehorse yesterday afternoon arrived safely at Dawson. Planes 1 and 3 are delayed at Whitehorse, one machine having sustained a damaged plane in flying to "hop off" at Whitehorse. Captain Street is there remaining there with it.

WHITEHORSE, Y. T.—Number 1 hopped off from Whitehorse at 9:30 this morning and reached here at 9:25. Plane number 3 reached Whitehorse at 10:35.

SPRING WHEAT CROP IS PRACTICALLY MADE

Grain Ripening Very Rapidly and Quality is Remarkable

WINNIPEG, August 18.—Harvest is now in full swing in Manitoba and the Canadian spring wheat crop may be considered made. There appears to be a sufficiency of farm help in this province, but there is a great demand for labor in Saskatchewan.

As regards the Saskatchewan crop, a bulletin issued by the Provincial Department of Agriculture Saturday stated that the grain was ripening much faster than had been anticipated and that the demand for farm help is urgent.

Two cars of new wheat were on the market during the week. They were both remarkable samples of Manitoba hard wheat, Marquis variety, weighing 65 pounds to the measured bushel. Both came from the Gresford district, Southern Manitoba.

There is no doubt but what the quality of the crop will be of remarkable excellence this season, given good harvest weather. There may be some shrunken wheat where rust prevailed but generally the grain is too far advanced for much damage from this pest. Rust has been far more widely spread than many believe and some late fields have been rendered useless. Hail has done considerable damage in Southern Saskatchewan.

SALT IS FOUND IN NORTH OF ALBERTA



Flying Boats for Fisheries Patrol

This district will soon see "Hawks" protecting against Poachers--each plane has four men

VANCOUVER, August 18.—Arrangements have been completed for the use of two Canadian Air Board flying boats in the fisheries patrol service of the Pacific Coast. These boats will have a flying range of from eight to thirty miles and will be employed as far north as Prince Rupert. Each plane will carry four men. The cruiser Givenchy now carries twenty two.

"Every hawk will be a potential air policeman to the fish poachers," says Major Motherwell, the assistant inspector of fisheries.

Labor Day Celebration Plans Are Being Made

The perfecting of plans for the Labor Day celebration was the principal business at the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last evening. A splendid day's program has been drawn up and the arrangements for the various attractions have been left in very capable hands. Special efforts have been made to have things attractive for the women and children.

In the morning the chief interest will be centred at the waterfront where a series of races will be carried out and it is expected that the entries will be many. There will be two especially attractive events for the fishermen, namely, a halibut fishermen's gear setting contest and a dory race.

Local Cabaret Girl Is Victim of Crime

Mrs. Alma Sampson found murdered in room of Castle Hotel--Fred Saunders held material witness, William Coleman, suspicion

VANCOUVER, August 18.—Mrs. Alma Sampson, aged 35, the wife of a Great Northern Railway trainman, and formerly employed in a cabaret operated by Fred Saunders at Prince Rupert, was found dead across a bed in a room at the Castle Hotel here at noon yesterday. The body, which was nude, was wrapped in the clothes of the bed and the head was badly battered.

The crime was discovered when a phone call was made by Saunders to the room but was unanswered. A man's undergarment was found stuffed under the bath and the bath-room also showed evidence of the murderer having washed his hands.

Suspicious Circumstances.

Investigation shows that Mrs. Sampson had been engaged in a Vancouver hotel for a time and then went to Prince Rupert, where she was employed at a cabaret operated by Saunders, whose unanswered telephone call was the means of discovering the murder. Coleman, who became intimate with Mrs. Sampson at the hotel here, is said to have followed her to Prince Rupert despite her opposition to his advances hence the alleged jealousy.

Certain events occurring since the return of the woman from Prince Rupert as well as statements and movements of certain parties about the time of the murder are being investigated. It has been established by the police that a man left the scene of the murder shortly after midnight on Monday night but it is doubtful if Coleman was that man. Saunders is known to have been out of the city on Monday night, having returned shortly before the murder was discovered.

Public Can Control Prices.

Recently the British government removed the control of most prices. The first effect was a rise of from 30 to 50 per cent. The markets were glutted with cattle which had been held up until decontrol came. Butchers retaliated by boycotting dealers; the public, who had become accustomed to cheap frozen meat, were equally disinclined to bid up. The result was that in a short time prices began to fall and now are reaching reasonable levels. The remedy lies with the public who can regulate the prices by controlling the demand. The process in England goes to show that government control does not necessarily mean a great increase in prices.

Government Control Did Not Effect.

The announcement of the drop in price of sugar which was made yesterday in Vancouver is another instance where control has had no practical effect on price. A maximum figure for sugar sale was declared by the Dominion Government about a month ago but this has not meant that the price would be kept up to the very height. On the other hand sugar has commenced to drop in price, yesterday's drop of one cent being the first downward fluctuation in the price of sugar in five years. This drop is taken as an encouraging sign by householders and others and may be an indication that the living costs which have been mounting so steadily ever since 1915 now have reached the peak and may have commenced to go down.

Big Decrease Not Advantageous.

It is not reasonable to expect that prices will ever get down to the old level for such a reaction would probably mean as much disorganization and trouble as the gradual increase of the past years have done. Although wages and earning power has not increased in proportion to living costs, they have, nevertheless, gone up a good deal and much of a drop in prices of living necessities would cause a drop in wages and production would probably decrease. There is a possibility that living costs might decrease to a certain extent without seriously affecting wages, but a big decrease in the costs of living necessities may be feared nearly as much as a large increase for it would probably be almost as damaging in its reaction on other conditions with which it would be interlinked.

Children Should Be Taught Swimming.

The reports of drowning fatalities that are filling the papers just now are most noticeable and should sink into the minds of parents very strongly. There is no doubt that many of these fatalities could have been avoided if only the victims had known the rudiments of swimming. The fear that most parents have of allowing their children go near the water should be conquered and instead parents should see that their children do take to the water and learn to swim. The chief difficulty in teaching a grown-up person to swim is to overcome the lack of confidence which non-swimmers show in the water. This lack of confidence is a natural result of fear which was, in many cases, deliberately taught. If children were not taught to fear the water they would be able to learn to swim as easily and naturally as they learned to walk.




Recently Became Sole Owner; Will Soon be Shipping 300 Tons per Day.

Nick Gurvich is in town on business in connection with his coal mine at Coalspur, Alberta, on the Mountain Park branch of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and leaves tonight for Alice Arm. Recently Mr. Gurvich made a deal for the sole ownership of the mine which is showing great promise. The property is now under option to Dale and Ollis, of Winnipeg, for lease at a large figure.

At present 35 men are engaged at the mine and 75 tons are being sent out per day. In two months, Mr. Gurvich says, he will be shipping 300 tons. Tom Davis, formerly of the Michel Colliery, is in charge at the mine and Alex Susner is secretary.

ADMIRALTY GIFTS ARE COMING SOON

Oil-burning Cruiser Aurora for Canada—Send "Subs" to Lakes.

Ottawa, August 18.—Toward the end of September the flotilla of naval vessels comprising an oil-burning cruiser, the Aurora, two destroyers and two submarines, which are the gift of the British Admiralty to Canada, will arrive at Halifax. After a demonstration there they will be brought to Quebec, and later to Montreal. If it is found practicable the submarines will be brought up some of the Canadian canals to the Great Lakes. If their draught is sixteen feet, as is supposed, this may be a matter of difficulty.

It is the intention to keep all these vessels at sea as a training to officers and crew to form a nucleus for working out any future naval policy adopted by Canada as a result of the 1924 Imperial Conference and subsequent deliberations in Parliament.

The obtaining of the Aurora, an oil-burning vessel, is a subject of some self-congratulation to the Government, as it is understood that Admiral Jellicoe, when in Canada, informed the Dominion Government that there was no hope of any vessels other than coal-burning vessels being taken over.

The story goes, however, that the minister of marine has persistently and consistently refused every coal-burning cruiser offered, and that representations made concurrently in London that only a modern vessel would make Canada consider it worth while, eventually brought about the offer of the Aurora.




