Bolsheviks are Repulsed at the Gates of Polish Capital

While fighting rages fiercely in outskirts of Warsaw Peace is being Discussed---Polish Independence Respected

WARSAW, August 18.—The Bolshevik forces have been repulsed after entering the city and are now fighting fiercely on the outskirts. The Polish defence is now being stoutly maintained. MOSCOW, August 17.—The soviet peace terms with Poland and that guarantees be made that Polish landlords will not be attacked. More territory is offered than in the Entente conditions. The government professes to respect Polish independence.

Transcontinental Planes Are Now at Dawson City

Landed there Yesterday Afternoon while other Two Make Flight Today---One Plane Slightly Damaged

WHITEHORSE, Y. T., August 18.—The fourth Alaska plane landed by Captain Street reached Whitehorse yesterday. Two planes, 2 and 4, left Whitehorse yesterday afternoon and arrived safely at Dawson. Planes 1 and 3 are delayed at Whitehorse, one machine having sustained a damaged plane in landing to "hop off" at Whitehorse. Captain Street is, therefore, remaining there with it. DAWSON, Y. T.,—Number 1 hopped off from Whitehorse at 10:35 this morning and reached here at 9:25. Plane number 3 reached Whitehorse at 10:35.

RIAL VETERANS WILL GET EXPENSES

Who Resided in Canada Returned Before Armistice Will get Transportation Refunded

OTTAWA, August 18.—The government is made here that transportation of authorized soldiers who were domiciled in Canada prior to the Great War will be refunded. This applies to soldiers who returned on their own account before the armistice was declared.

LYOYD GEORGE WILL VISIT THIS COAST

During his visit to America, Lloyd George will be invited to a conference at Washington to discuss diplomatic questions.

One particularly fine scene which will be photographed will be at the point where the train makes a long sweep into Port Edward. In the background can be seen the present houses of the townsite with the train making the long curve round the bend in the track. The scenes at the canneries along the Skeena ought to prove very interesting when reproduced in various parts of the country.

SPRING WHEAT CROP IS PRACTICALLY MADE

Grain Ripening Very Rapidly and Quality is Remarkable

WINNIPEG, August 18.—Harvest is now in full swing in Manitoba and the Canadian spring wheat crop may be considered made. There appears to be a sufficiency of farm help in this province, but there is a great demand for labor in Saskatchewan. As regards the Saskatchewan crop, a bulletin issued by the Provincial Department of Agriculture Saturday stated that the grain was ripening much faster than had been anticipated and that the demand for farm help is urgent. Two cars of new wheat were on the market during the week. They were both remarkable samples of Manitoba hard wheat, Marquis variety, weighing 85 pounds to the measured bushel. Both came from the Gretna district, Southern Manitoba.

There is no doubt but what the quality of the crop will be of remarkable excellence this season, given good harvest weather. There may be some shrunken wheat where rust prevailed but generally the grain is too far advanced for much damage from this pest. Rust has been far more widely spread than many believe and some late fields have been rendered useless. Hail has done considerable damage in Southern Saskatchewan.

GLASGOW, August 18.—The Canadian Pacific steamship Empress of Canada which will be the largest steamer to operate in the Pacific Ocean and will run to the Orient from Vancouver has been launched here.

Flying Boats for Fisheries Patrol

This district will soon see "Hawks" protecting against Poachers---each Plane has Four Men

VANCOUVER, August 18.—Arrangements have been completed for the use of two Canadian Air Board flying boats in the fisheries patrol service of the Pacific Coast. These boats will have a flying range of from eight to thirty miles and will be employed as far north as Prince Rupert. Each plane will carry four men. The cruiser Givenchy now carries twenty two. "Every hawk will be a potential air policeman to the fish poachers," says Major Motherwell, the assistant inspector of fisheries.

Labor Day Celebration Plans Are Being Made

The perfecting of plans for the Labor Day celebration was the principal business at the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council last evening. A splendid day's program has been drawn up and the arrangements for the various attractions have been left in very capable hands. Special efforts have been made to have things attractive for the women and children.

In the morning the chief interest will be centred at the waterfront where a series of races will be carried out and it is expected that the entries will be many. There will be two especially attractive events for the fishermen, namely, a halibut fishermen's gear setting contest and a dory race. In other years the former has been particularly interesting to the land-lubbers who have so little an idea of how the fish are caught. There will also be a canoe race open to all comers.

Local Cabaret Girl Is Victim of Crime

Mrs. Alma Sampson found murdered in room of Castle Hotel--Fred Saunders held material witness, William Coleman, suspicion

VANCOUVER, August 18.—Mrs. Alma Sampson, aged 35, the wife of a Great Northern Railway trainman, and formerly employed in a cabaret operated by Fred Saunders at Prince Rupert, was found dead across a bed in a room at the Castle Hotel here at noon yesterday. The body, which was nude, was wrapped in the clothes of the bed and the head was badly battered.

The crime was discovered when a phone call was made by Saunders to the room but was unanswered. A man's undergarment was found stuffed under the bath and the bath-room also showed evidence of the murder. The man, having washed his hands, was a material witness and Coleman is also being detained on suspicion. The husband arrived on a train after the body had been discovered.

FIRE HAZARD IN PROVINCE

Mon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, Says Conditions are Dangerous in B. C. VICTORIA, August 18.—Hon. Thomas D. Pattullo, provincial Minister of Lands, makes the announcement that fire fighting in the province has cost the government \$55,000 so far this year. "Conditions are dangerous," Mr. Pattullo, "except around Prince Rupert, where recent rains have reduced the risk."

HAVE FINISHED LONG JOURNEY

H. Kindersley and T. P. O'Kelly Travel Length of Mackenzie and Porcupine Rivers by Canoe

DAWSON, August 18.—H. Kindersley, son of Sir Robert Kindersley, and T. P. O'Kelly have arrived here. They left Edmonton early in the summer and travelled by canoe the length of the Mackenzie and Porcupine Rivers to Fort Yukon, thence by steamer to Dawson. They are coming southward via steamer up the Yukon River to Whitehorse and over the White Pass Railroad to Skagway, thence south.

SPECULATION ABOUT NEW OIL FIELDS IN MACKENZIE VALLEY

VANCOUVER, August 18.—The report that the Canadian Imperial Oil crews have struck oil at Fort German at a depth of one hundred feet has caused great interest here. It is possible that a new field is about to be opened.

Public Can Control Prices.

Recently the British government removed the control of most prices. The first effect was a rise of from 30 to 50 per cent. The markets were glutted with cattle which had been held up until decontrol came. Butchers retaliated by boycotting dealers; the public, who had become accustomed to cheap frozen meat, were equally disinclined to bid up. The result was that in a short time prices began to fall and now are reaching reasonable levels. The remedy lies with the public who can regulate the prices by controlling the demand. The process in England goes to show that government control does not necessarily mean a great increase in prices.

Government Control Did Not Effect.

The announcement of the drop in price of sugar which was made yesterday in Vancouver is another instance where control has had no practical effect on price. A maximum figure for sugar sale was declared by the Dominion Government about a month ago but this has not meant that the price would be kept up to the very height. On the other hand sugar has commenced to drop in price, yesterday's drop of one cent being the first downward fluctuation in the price of sugar in five years. This drop is taken as an encouraging sign by householders and others and may be an indication that the living costs which have been mounting so steadily ever since 1915 now have reached the peak and may have commenced to go down.

Big Decrease Not Advantageous.

It is not reasonable to expect that prices will ever get down to the old level for such a reaction would probably mean as much disorganization and trouble as the gradual increase of the past years have done. Although wages and earning power has not increased in proportion to living costs, they have, nevertheless, gone up a good deal and much of a drop in prices of living necessities would cause a drop in wages and production would probably decrease. There is a possibility that living costs might decrease to a certain extent without seriously affecting wages, but a big decrease in the costs of living necessities may be feared nearly as much as a large increase for it would probably be almost as damaging in its reaction on other conditions with which it would be interlinked.

Children Should Be Taught Swimming.

The reports of drowning fatalities that are filling the papers just now are most noticeable and should sink into the minds of parents very strongly. There is no doubt that many of these fatalities could have been avoided if only the victims had known the rudiments of swimming. The fear that most parents have of allowing their children to go near the water should be conquered and instead parents should see that their children do take to the water and learn to swim. The chief difficulty in teaching a grown-up person to swim is to overcome the lack of confidence which non-swimmers show in the water. This lack of confidence is a natural result of fear which, in many cases, deliberately taught. If children were not taught to fear the water they would be able to learn to swim as easily and naturally as they learned to walk.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

YUKON RIVER IS SWARMING WITH SALMON THIS YEAR

The upper Yukon has been swarming with king salmon during the past few weeks, according to advices from Dawson, which may call a halt to the effort to close the lower Yukon to fishing.

At Dawson the king salmon are being stored in ice tunnels or shafts, salted and smoked for winter use.

Last season for some freakish reason there was a very light run of king salmon on the Yukon river. As a result the supply of dog feed was short, and it was the mouth of the Yukon river was charged that the Carlisle plant at responsible, and led by Archdeacon Sluek, an effort was made to close the cannery.

Senator J. R. Heckman, who made a trip down the Yukon river last summer, declared on his return that the small amount of king salmon taken within the Yukon river limits should not affect the run up the river. He said the netters working within the river limits were not many and owing to the great width of the river he could see no reason why operations could be held responsible, predicting that the run this season would be normal and the matter pass from mind. This prediction is now proving true.

The pack of the Carlisle people at the mouth of the Yukon was small last year, and advices indicate the company plant was closed early with a light pack. However, the closing of the plant came after the swarm of fish reached Dawson, indicating cannery operations was not seriously interfering with spawning fish getting up the river.

IS A SUMMER COTTAGE A PRIVATE DWELLING?

Upon Decision Hangs a Magistrate's Judgment in Liquor Case.

ST. THOMAS, August 17.—The point of law whether a cottage at a summer resort may be regarded as a private dwelling within the meaning of the Ontario Temperance Act has been raised in one of the most curious liquor cases that has come up in the County Court for some time. Last week License Commissioner Ross confiscated five cases of whiskey consigned to William O'Connor, a Hamilton man spending the summer at Port Stanley. During the night the whiskey was stolen from the express office.

O'Connor appeared before County Police Magistrate Hunt charged with getting liquor for the purpose of sale. After hearing the evidence the Squire stated that in his opinion the defendant was within his rights in getting the liquor, providing it was to be taken to a private dwelling, but his worship had grave doubts about the summer cottage being a private dwelling. He therefore reserved judgment for one week in order to inquire further into the matter.

INDIANS SAVED FROM HUNGER

Dr. F. L. Forbes Reports a Big Catch Along Upper Yukon and Tributaries.

JENEAU.—"Fish, along the Yukon and its tributaries, will be both abundant and cheap this year, and the Indians will have a prosperous season," according to Dr. F. L. Forbes, superintendent of the Bureau of Education in the Upper Yukon district, who is in Jeneau visiting his daughter, Miss Ethel Forbes.

"The catch, by the middle of July was as large as that of the whole season last year and the big run is expected in August and September," Dr. Forbes explained.

"The shortage of fish last year was serious, not only because it left the Indians poor, but because it extended to the spawning grounds and the catch four years from now will thus be correspondingly small.

"The financial depression among the natives resulting from the poor fishing season last year was saved by the muskrat catch this spring. The merchants, who had carried the natives on credit for as much as \$30,000 during the winter, bought quantities of the skins. In Fort Yukon, the natives sold 75,000 for \$1.50 and \$2.00.

"After Christmas, with the shortage of fish and an abundance of Indians would be destitute for food. However, because of the deep snow the moose and caribou were unable to range in the hills or run in the lower lands and killing moose was like going into a slaughter house to kill beef. If it had not been for the illicit slaughter of moose, the people, whites as well as natives, would have been short of proper food.

O'Connor admitted in court that he shared the cottage with his brother-in-law, and the Squire expressed an opinion that this would make the cottage other than a private dwelling.

At the same time that O'Connor's whiskey was seized, Inspector Ross also confiscated ten cases consigned to the brother-in-law, and they also have disappeared from the express office.

O'Connor, through his counsel, contends that the liquor was not in his possession and had not been taken from the express office, therefore he is not guilty of violation of the O.T.A. If the case is decided in his favor it is reported that O'Connor has threatened suit against the express company and also against Inspector Ross.

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ANOTHER CROWD HEARS LECTURE

Lieut. Helmsing of Navy League Gets Another Good Reception.

Another excellent turnout greeted Lieut. Helmsing in his lecture on the "Blockade of Zeebrugge Canal" which he delivered at the Westholme Theatre last night after the first show. Although this was the second time the lecture had been given here it was just as enthusiastically received as at first.

Lieut. Helmsing is a fluent speaker and his lantern slides made the whole address most interesting and enlightening, bringing forth the conduct and effect of this naval coup plainly before all. The officer mentioned Lieut. Alex Young, son of Judge and Mrs. F. McB. Young, of this city, who also went through the engagement. The speaker was introduced by J. F. McGuire, chairman of the local branch of the Navy League.

Lieut. Helmsing expects to return south by the Prince Rupert Thursday night.

DEALS WITH THE STEAMER SITUATION

Any juggling with the steamship service of Alaska, declares the Valdez Miner, would be a disastrous blow to the Territory, and would probably give our people the worst times they have ever experienced. It may be true, admits the coast paper, that the steamship companies charge huge freight rates, but they are in line with other charges. Up to two years ago our people had little to complain of in their treatment by the steamship lines. Fares were cheap, freight rates were reasonable, and we had good service. When one considers that twelve ships of over two thousand tons each are plying to Alaskan waters with a population of but about 30,000 persons to serve, it must be seen that charges must be high if we are to have the boats. It is unfair to charge the steamship companies with extortion in the face of present high prices.

NICK GURVICH HAS BIG MINE

Recently Became Sole Owner; Will Soon be Shipping 300 Tons per Day.

Nick Gurvich is in town on business in connection with his coal mine at Coalpur, Alberta, on the Mountain Park branch of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and leaves tonight for Alice Arm. Recently Mr. Gurvich made a deal for the sole ownership of the mine which is showing great promise. The property is now under option to Dale and Oils, of Winnipeg, for lease at a large figure.

At present 35 men are engaged at the mine and 75 tons are being sent out per day. In two months, Mr. Gurvich says, he will be shipping 300 tons. Tom Davis, formerly of the Michel Colliery, is in charge at the mine and Alex Susner is secretary.

ADMIRALTY GIFTS ARE COMING SOON

Oil-burning Cruiser Aurora for Canada—Send "Subs" to Lakes.

Ottawa, August 18.—Toward the end of September the flotilla of naval vessels comprising an oil-burning cruiser, the Aurora, two destroyers and two submarines, which are the gift of the British Admiralty to Canada, will arrive at Halifax. After a demonstration there they will be brought to Quebec, and later to Montreal. If it is found practicable the submarines will be brought up some of the Canadian canals to the Great Lakes. If their draught is sixteen feet, as is supposed, this may be a matter of difficulty.

It is the intention to keep all these vessels at sea as a training to officers and crew to form a nucleus for working out any future naval policy adopted by Canada as a result of the 1921 Imperial Conference and subsequent deliberations in Parliament. The obtaining of the Aurora, an oil-burning vessel, is a subject of some self-congratulation to the Government, as it is understood that Admiral Jellicoe, when in Canada, informed the Dominion Government that there was no hope of any vessels other than coal-burning vessels being taken over.

The story goes, however, that the minister of marine has persistently and consistently refused every coal-burning cruiser offered, and that representations made concurrently in London that only a modern vessel would make Canada consider it worth while, eventually brought about the offer of the Aurora.

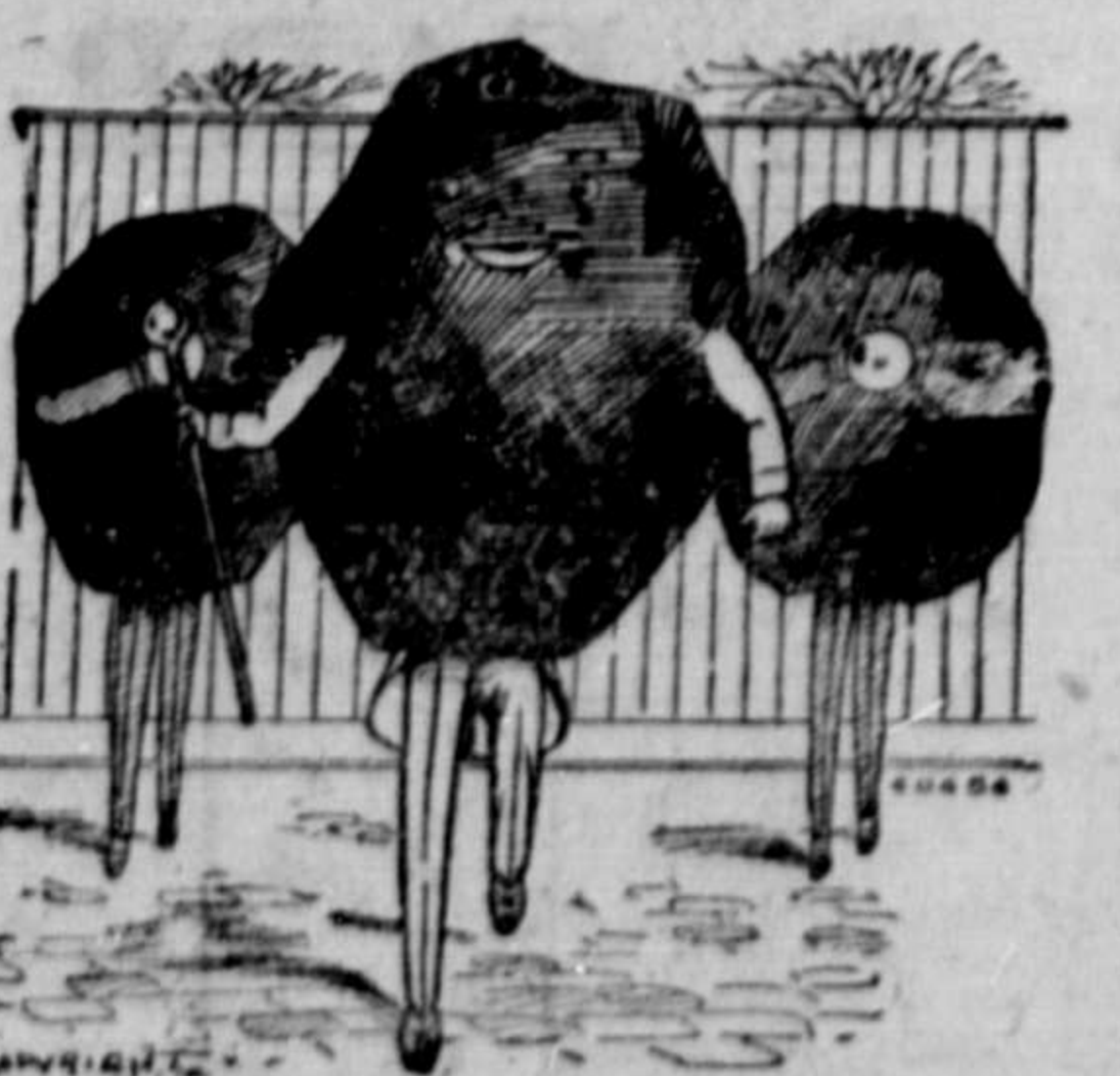
