Flyers are Welcome at Hub of Klondyke

Presented with Gold Souvenirs inscribed
by the Governor—Scheduled to
Leave Dawson Today

DAWSON, August 19.—The New York to Nome planes were scheduled to leave here for Fairbanks at 9:30 this morning, weather permitting.

The flight from Whitehorse to Dawson was made at a height of 6,000 feet or slightly over a mile from the ground. Atmospheric conditions were excellent and a clip of ninety miles per hour was easily maintained.

Before passing over Skagway the flight along Lynn Canal from Wrangell was made at a low altitude.

Two of the aircraft arrived here the day before yesterday on the twenty-fourth anniversary of the big Klondyke gold discovery and a celebration was being held in the Arctic Brotherhood hall.

As a welcome to Dawson, each of the flyers was presented with a miniature gold pan filled with Klondyke nuggets and bearing the inscription of Governor MacKenzie.

VETERAN WAS KILLED AT BELMONT MINE BIG ROBBERY BUCKLEY BAY

Funeral of John P. Redding Took Place Under Great War Veterans' Auspices This Afternoon.

At two o'clock this afternoon the funeral of John P. Redding took place from the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers to Fairview Cemetery. Deceased was a returned soldier employed at Surf Inlet and interment was made under the auspices of the local G. W. A. Canon Rix officiated at the cemetery.

Mr. Redding was employed in the Belmont mine at the time of the accident and was crushed in a mine and no trace has yet been discovered by Provincial Police Chief A. C. Minty from Constable Ponder. The robbery is shrouded in mystery and no trace has yet been discovered by the thieves. The money taken is described as consisting of five hundred dollars in notes and \$450 in Dominion Express orders issued in Prince Rupert about three weeks ago in the name of Muriel Pye, one of the ladies who was robbed. Constable Ponder is working on the case from Buckley Bay.

The local office of the police has ascertained the numbers of the express orders as being from 875544 to 875547 as well as order number 29529. All the local banks, express offices and the city police have been apprised of the robbery but as yet no clue is forthcoming.

London Times
On Winnipeg Strike.

It is a matter of some interest that the Miners' Federation of Great Britain, at the instance of their president, Mr. Smillie, should have passed a resolution demanding the retrial of the Winnipeg strike leaders, says the London Times. At the original trial various punishments were imposed on twelve men (three of whom have, while in gaol, been elected to the Parliament of Manitoba) on charges of which ordinary British law takes no cognizance. The seven counts of the indictment, on all of which the men were found guilty, have the effect of bringing under the head of sedition (1) a general strike, (2) direct action, (3) sympathetic strikes, (4) attempts to form one big union, (5) attempts to obtain control of industry, (6) advocacy of change in the form of government, and (7) acts which "endanger the comfort of the public." The seventh count, which took the legal shape of declaring the strike a "common nuisance," should surely have made the rest superfluous. Most strikes are a nuisance to a considerable number of people, and if a precedent be set for dealing with them simply as such, it would become legally possible to arrest at once every striker, however peaceable his methods and however just his cause.

Remedies Are
Suggested for It.

It is widely felt in Canada that the Winnipeg verdict was a somewhat extravagant one, only made possible by a mixing up of war-time regulations with normal law, and that if it should remain as a precedent for action in other labor disputes it might be productive of great mischief. The remedy sought by many thoughtful Canadians is an appeal to the British Privy Council, which, they believe, would be likely to discover the verdict bad in law. To this end they have sought the support of British Labor, and the resolution of the Miners' Federation is a consequence. But we should doubt whether intervention in any form from Britain is the best method of settling the matter right. The appeal to the Privy Council is a cumbersome though sometimes a valuable feature of Dominion legislative systems, and the tendency is towards abandoning it. Canada has a more natural means of undoing the effects of the Winnipeg trial in turning out the Government that inspired it, and in reasserting the supremacy of the normal law which it overrode.

No Real
Deserters.

Winston Churchill has announced in the British Parliament that there was to be no amnesty for those deserters from our various fronts who are still in prison. If everybody knew everything, we fancy there would be a general agreement now to let these poor wretches out. When people hear the word deserter their first thought is of a man who goes over to the enemy. Such men, in our army in France, at any rate, were almost unheard of. If there are any in our prisons now they might well be excepted from a general amnesty. Almost all the men shot or sent to penal servitude for desertion in France were simply men whose nerves broke, so that they slipped away when their units were going into the trenches. While a war is going on you must deal severely with such failures, because of the gravity of their actual or possible consequences. But when a war is over one may rightly consider several other points. One is that whether an officer or man actually deserted or not was often decided by the character of somebody else. Hundreds of subalterns and thousands of privates escaped this disaster, not because they were better men than those who gave way, but because a good company or platoon commander or sergeant was watching them when the strain came, and either pulled them through by moral ascendancy or got them sent out of the way.

Gay bachelors, midnight parties, "other women," shadowy pasts, well seasoned with a dash of spice and mixed with a spoonful of happy complications, comprise one of the best entertainment concoctions seen here for many a day, and this is the show being shown at the Westholme Theatre tonight. There is something crisp and new about this smart Tom Moore photoplay and in many of its situations are "Frenchy" in flavor.

Even the best of us—that is, the most proper of us—find keen enjoyment in entertainment that carries with it just a little touch of spice. Witness, for instance, the widespread popularity enjoyed by the bedroom farce and in it we see reflected the present trend of public taste—the tendency towards the audacious and the mildly daring. In "The Gay Lord Quex" you have many of the elements that have contributed so largely towards the success of the bedroom farce, yet devoid of anything that would agitate the mind of the most sanctimonious censor.

YACHTS TOO FRAIL FOR CUP RACING

Lawrence Parry Says the Next America's Cup Challenger Must Be Strongly Built.

NEW YORK, August 19.—Mr. Lawrence Parry says that whoever next challenges for the America's cup will have to name a wholesome boat if he expects to receive the applause and interest of that section of the yachting fraternity which has little patience with racing machines. The America's cup, emblem of the blue ribbon of the seven seas, should not be permitted to stand as sponsor for speed freaks, for boats that are built to hold together under average conditions—and little more.

The sloops which sailed in the recent cup series were fragile craft. Upon a hull of only 75 feet water line towered between eleven and twelve thousand square feet of canvas with masts that would miss passing under the Brooklyn bridge by many feet. In fact, to be specific, when the Shamrock's club-topsail was set the tip was one hundred and thirty-five feet above the deck—the Brooklyn bridge is one hundred and thirty-five feet high. Again, all rigging and gear was as light as dare be made in order to save weight, and the hulls were also pinched in and fragile, not alone to save weight but to beat the rules governing the cup yachts.

Unsafe to Race.

What was the result? The Resolute throughout her racing career had repeated breakdowns and finally lost one of the cup series because of the parting of her throat halyards. Shamrock even in the light winds which characterized all the races sprung her deck forward, so that it was unsafe to race her in tumbling seas, while on the day Resolute broke down, the challenger sprung her bowsprit and with any wind would have been compelled to drop out herself. And on the one day when there was a real breeze—it was not more than twenty knots—the sloops dared not race. In this there is no reproach against the men on board the two sloops. Their boats were simply not qualified to stand the gaff. And so there was no race.

Need Sound Boats.

What we want hereafter—if the sporting aspects are to be taken seriously—are sound boats, schooners, say, that are able to go out to sea and take the best that comes. We have a flair for building schooners in this country and Nicholson, the British designer, has shown in his Margherita that he too can build swift fore-and-afters. So now that the decks are cleared and the two sloops which raced last month are on their way to the junk heap—that is to say, they'll get there sooner or later, being speed machines and nothing else—let us begin with a new deal so far as the America's cup is concerned.
