VANCOUVER, August 19.—Before the eyes of thousands of people among whom was his own sister, Captain B. Brenton, purchasing agent of the Union Steamship Company of British Columbia, was last night drowned in English Bay when a Boeing aeroplane in which he was making a test flight for the obtaining of a commercial aviator's license, turned over at a height of 1,000 feet and threw him from the cockpit.

#### POLES NOW IN ASCENDENCY OVER THEIR FLYING ENEMY

Panic Stricken Reds Evacuate Brest Litovsk leaving wake of heavy losses---Warsaw is Now Safe

WARSAW, August 19.—The Reds in a panicky flight have evacuated Brest-Litovsk and Warsaw is now considered safe. The Poles are advancing and have completely annihilated two Bolshevik divisions, making prisoners of 1,000 of the soviet soldiers.

#### LIQUOR VOTE DATE NAMED

OTTAWA, August 19.—That as operating expenses are lower and revenue is higher when the west is compared with the east, the same necessity does not exist to raise the rates in the west is a new angle that is being taken in the arguments before the Railway Commission on the proposed increase in rates.

#### VANCOUVER HAD BIG FIRE AT NOON TODAY

Calvert Fisheries and the Charles Anderson Plant Destroyed as Well as Junk Shops.

VANCOUVER, August 19.—The Calvert Fisheries plant and the Charles Anderson fish drying establishment besides two junk stores at the foot of Main Street were destroyed by fire at noon today. These places are located close to the Grand Trunk docks.

#### BIG JAPANESE LINE IS TO RESUME CALLS AT PORT VANCOUVER

TOKYO, August 19.—The Osaka Shosen Kaisha trans-Pacific liners are to resume their calls at Vancouver at once. The O. S. K. is one of the biggest Japanese steamship companies engaged in the trans-Pacific business.

KINGSTON, Aug. 19.—Because of the prevalence of smallpox on the island the proposed visit of the Prince of Wales to Jamaica may have to be postponed.

#### FIREMAN OF VANCOUVER STEAMER IS DROWNED

VANCOUVER, August 19.—J. De Witte, a fireman on the steamer Bellena of the Terminal Steamship line, was drowned when he fell from the deck of the steamer at Squamish. The deceased was a native of Belgium.

#### Flyers are Welcome at Hub of Klondyke

Presented with Gold Souvenirs inscribed by the Governor---Scheduled to Leave Dawson Today

DAWSON, August 19.—The New York to Nome planes were scheduled to leave here for Fairbanks at 9:30 this morning, weather permitting.

The flight from Whitehorse to Dawson was made at a height of 6,000 feet or slightly over a mile from the ground. Atmospheric conditions were excellent and a clip of ninety miles per hour was easily maintained.

Before passing over Skagway the flight along Lynn Canal from Wrangell was made at a low altitude.

Two of the aircraft arrived here the day before yesterday on the twenty-fourth anniversary of the big Klondyke gold discovery and a celebration was being held in the Arctic Brotherhood hall.

As a welcome to Dawson, each of the flyers was presented with a miniature gold pan filled with Klondyke nuggets and bearing the inscription of Governor MacKenzie.

Hawaii Game Commissioner will Enjoy Sport in a Different Clime while Gathering Data

George C. Beckley, fish and game commissioner for Hawaii, accompanied by Dr. W. C. Hobdy and Mr. August Breier of Honolulu were in the city Monday on the S.S. Princess Alice en route for Alaska, where they will engage in an extensive game hunt. Their outfit consists of three Indian guides, 27 horses, a cook, horse-wrangler and a packer. They will hunt for six weeks in the wilds of Alaska for moose, caribou, bear and mountain sheep. The purpose of the expedition, as revealed to the World at Vancouver by Mr. Beckley, is to furnish data for the department, and also to acquire a group of species for the Bishop Museum in Honolulu. Their first stop is Wrangell, Alaska, from which they take a launch up the Stikine River, two and one-half days to Telegraph Creek, and on to Dease Lake, where they will make their permanent camp, penetrating inland from there 100 miles north to the game fields. Mr. Beckley has just finished a tour of hatcheries up the Pacific Coast. The hunters expect to come down from the north with abundant fruits for their labors.

Mr. P. E. Doncaster, acting District Engineer in the Department of Public Works, left on the train yesterday for Parle Pas Rapids on the Peace River, to make an inspection of the rapids.

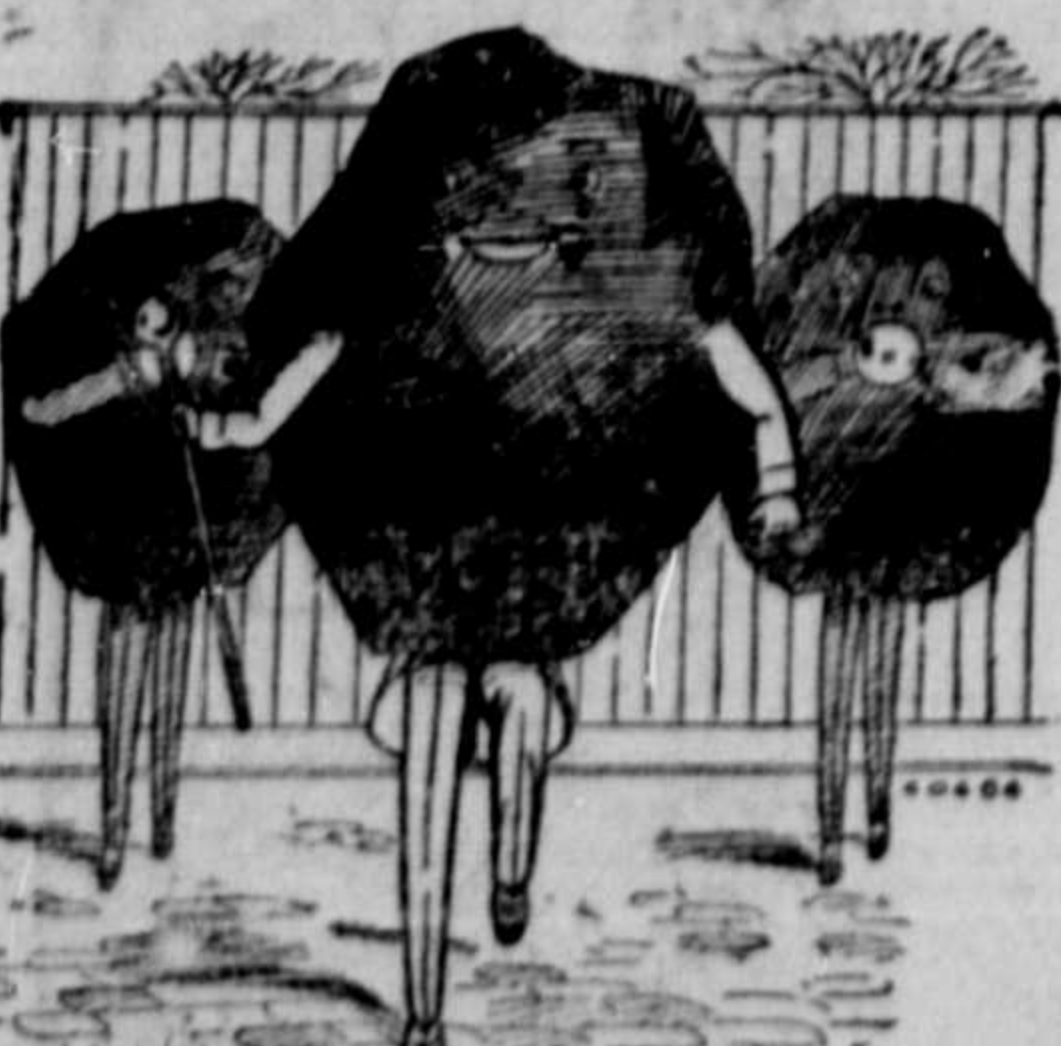

### YACHTS TOO FRAIL FOR CUP RACING

Lawrence Parry Says the Next America's Cup Challenger Must Be Strongly Built.

NEW YORK, August 19.—Mr. Lawrence Parry says that whoever next challenges for the America's cup will have to name a wholesome boat if he expects to receive the applause and interest of that section of the yachting fraternity which has little patience with racing machines. The America's cup, emblem of the blue ribbon of the seven seas, should not be permitted to stand as sponsor for speed freaks, for boats that are built to hold together under average conditions—and little more.

The sloops which sailed in the recent cup series were fragile craft. Upon a hull of only 75 feet water line towered between eleven and twelve thousand square feet of canvas with masts that would miss passing under the Brooklyn bridge by many feet. In fact, to be specific, when the Shamrock's club topsail was set the tip was one hundred and thirty-five feet above the deck—the Brooklyn bridge is one hundred and thirty-five feet high. Again, all rigging and gear was as light as dare be made in order to save weight, and the hulls were also pinched in and fragile, not alone to save weight but to beat the rules governing the cup yachts.

#### Unsafe to Race.

What was the result? The Resolute throughout her racing career had repeated breakdowns and finally lost one of the cup series because of the parting of her throat haliards. Shamrock even in the light winds which characterized all the races sprung her deck forward, so that it was unsafe to race her in tumbling seas, while on the day Resolute broke down, the challenger sprung her bowsprit and with any wind would have been compelled to drop out herself. And on the one day when there was a real breeze—it was not more than twenty knots—the sloops dared not race. In this there is no reproach against the men on board the two sloops. Their boats were simply not qualified to stand the gaff. And so there was no race.

#### Need Sound Boats.

What we want hereafter—if the sporting aspects are to be taken seriously—are sound boats, schooners, say, that are able to go out to sea and take the best that comes. We have a flair for building schooners in this country and Nicholson, the British designer, has shown in his Margherita that he too can build swift fore-and-afters. So now that the decks are cleared and the two sloops which raced last month are on their way to the junk heap—that is to say, they'll get there sooner or later, being speed machines and nothing else—let us begin with a new deal so far as the America's cup is concerned.
