Poles Charged with Delaying Peace

MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES WAS WELL RECEIVED IN THIS CITY

Six Divisions of Reds Surrounded

British Advance Still Continues and 15,000 Prisoners have been Taken; Wrangel Drives Reds across Dnieper River

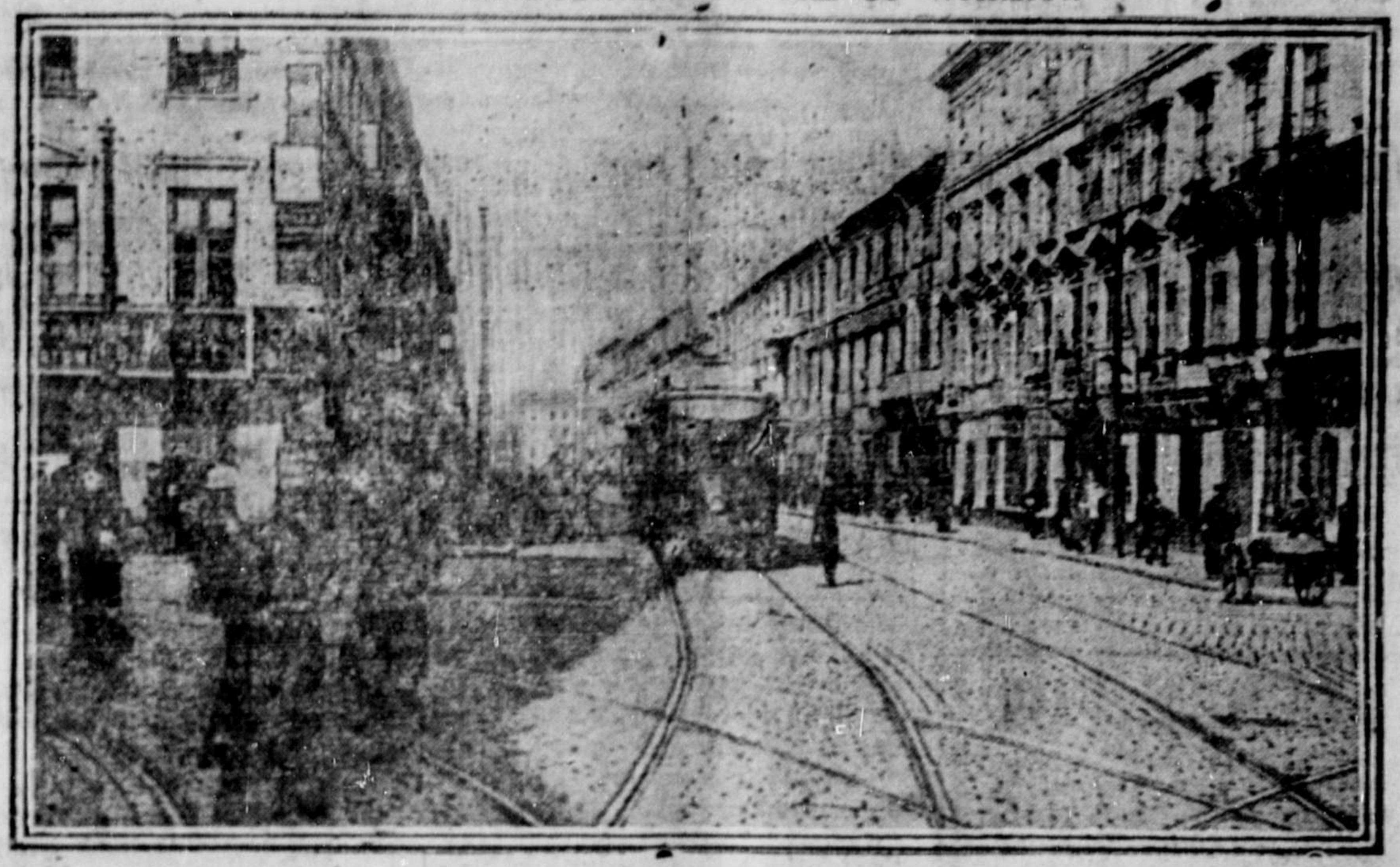
WASHINGTON, August 21.—The report that Gen. Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik general of South Russia, had driven the Bolshevik armies across the Dnieper River has been confirmed and is official.

PARIS, August 21.—The French General Weygand is continuing the successful drive against the Bolsheviks who have been attacking Poland. Steady advances have been made since week-end when the wedge of the Red armies was driven from the northern suburbs of Warsaw.

Now the Bolsheviks are many miles away and they are making complaint that the Poles are dragging the armistice parley. The warships are en route to Danzig.

PRINCE RUPERT, August 21.—The Poles have surrounded six divisions of Reds numbering 30,000 men. In the last week's recovery the number of prisoners estimated to have been taken reached 15,000. The French have sent congratulatory messages to the Poles on their victory.

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne Told of Port's Needs

Met Citizens at Open Meeting in Council Chamber Yesterday Afternoon; Gas Boats on Skeena Asked For, as well as Terminal Facilities

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, was well received at the open meeting in the city hall yesterday afternoon and the same spirit of satisfaction prevailed there as at the luncheon earlier in the afternoon. W. E. Williams aptly put it "as far as Prince Rupert is concerned, Mr. Ballantyne is the one bright star in a very drab sky, and Prince Rupert is appreciative." S. E. Parker, president of the Board of Trade, was chairman, and Mayor McClymont took his seat with Mr. Ballantyne. The gathering was called upon to place such matters before Mr. Ballantyne as seemed necessary for his consideration.

Alderman Dybbahu stated that the allowing of gas boats to fish for salmon in the Skeena district would be an advantage. He also enquired as to the proposed close season for Halibut.

The car shortage was mentioned at Ald. Dybbahu's stated he understood Mr. Ballantyne had no jurisdiction over this.

W. E. Williams stated that the greatest requirement at the present time here was for terminal facilities, bunkers and wharfrage. The time had come for assistance from Ottawa and this would be well warranted as business would naturally come here as a result. Mr. Williams also spoke in favor of gas boats on the Skeena.

ALASKA PLANES ON LAST STEP

Fairbanks Yesterday Afternoon to "Carry on" to Nome.

FAIRBANKS, August 21.—The three days stopover at Fairbanks of the transcontinental planes has been cancelled and, in the planes left yesterday at Fairbanks. On their arrival they were expected to leave some afternoon for Nome and complete the long flight from Fairbanks which has taken over three days.

PAYING FARES OF VICTORIA CROSS MEN TO TORONTO

OTTAWA, August 21.—The Dominion Government is to pay the fares of all Victoria Cross men in Canada who are to gather at Toronto when the Canadian National Exhibition opens on August 28.

Captain John McGregor, V.C., of this city, left on this morning's train to attend the gathering. Col. Peck, V.C., was unable to go east on account of the visit of the minister of marine and fisheries. He went south last night with Mr. Ballantyne on the Stadacona and is expected back in the course of a few days.

NEW DESIGN CANADA YACHT

SEATTLE, August 21.—James M. Thompson, a grocer of this city, was shot dead last night by a highwayman who escaped in an automobile.

WORK STARTS ON NEW DOCK

First Thing to Remove Mud—Thirty Men Now Working.

Actual operations have now commenced in connection with the new Grand Trunk dock. This morning the dredge Victoria was towed to position at the end of the present wharf and alignment has now been made with the surveyors' stakes. Cables have been run ashore and the anchor lines have also been made fast so that the only thing left now is for the mechanics to work the clam-shell and the mud will quickly vanish.

Removing Mud.

There are three mud areas in all which must be dredged. For the present the material will be lifted out of its present position and dumped further out in the harbor where there is plenty of depth and where the piles will not be driven. Arrangements have not yet been made with the harbor authorities as to where the balance of the material will be taken after it becomes necessary to load it on scows. The mud is being removed and sand will be substituted to give a firmer footing to the piles.

Two other dredges which will be engaged in taking out sand at Silver Creek, were due to leave Vancouver today for their northern destination. As soon as these arrive the work of filling in will commence and the number of employees will be quickly increased. At the present time there are about thirty men working on the dock. A number of these are mechanics on the dredge which will be operated with three shifts.

No Word of Sale.

Local officials have not had any word of the sale of the tug Fearful which was reported yesterday. The tug was taken up to Prince Rupert specially for this job and it hardly seems reasonable that the company would turn round and sell the boat when its use was just beginning to become apparent.

Already a large amount of the roofing material has arrived and has been unloaded and checked over and will be stored away until required.

PULP MILL FOR KETCHIKAN IS PROPOSED NOW

Harry Chimes Said to Represent London Capital Investigating, According to Ketchikan Newspaper.

KETCHIKAN, August 21.—A pulp and paper mill with a capacity of 250 tons per day is now being proposed for Ketchikan. Harry Chimes, who is said to represent London capital, has been visiting the Alaska city and the possibility points to the erection of the plant right in the city on a site now used as a baseball diamond.

According to the Ketchikan Chronicle which makes the report, Mr. Chimes says conditions at Ketchikan are highly favorable to the establishment of the project. It would cost several million dollars and he urges the people of Ketchikan to give it moral support.

WILL SUE FOR INCOME TAXES

Rupert's Appreciation is Shown Minister Fisheries

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Guest of Honor at Luncheon, is sanguine as to Possibilities of this Port.

Appreciation of the services he had done Prince Rupert in obtaining ship contracts for the shipyards and changing the legislation in regard to the fisheries was the keynote of the welcome extended to Hon. C. C. Ballantyne at the luncheon in the Hotel Prince Rupert yesterday afternoon. There was a capacity crowd of business and professional men present and the gathering was very representative. Fitting demonstration was made of the endorsement the minister is given here on his stand in regard to the fisheries question and the gathering was different from the most of receptions to public men, for a feeling of appreciation overshadowed the usual complaints that meet most men in similar capacities.

The mayor presided at the head of the luncheon table with Hon. Mr. Ballantyne and Col. Peck, M. P., on either side. As soon as the sumptuous repast had been dispensed with the toast to the king was duly responded to and with a few brief remarks the distinguished visitor was introduced amid a demonstration of applause.

Business Tour.
Mr. Ballantyne thanked the citizens for the welcome extended him and the splendid luncheon prepared. He complimented the city on having such a faithful representative at Ottawa as Col. Peck who was always keeping the interests of Prince Rupert to the fore, at the same time not forgetting Canada as a whole. He intimated that he was not on a political tour, but that he was on a visit to the Pacific Coast on the business of his department. He had learned much on his trip west over the Grand Trunk Pacific and in visiting points of interest about the city in the morning and he believed that it would prove of assistance in his department as well as to the government as a whole.

Will Get Station
He had been impressed with the railroad, but realized that money would have to be spent in improving the roadbed. Hon. Dr. Reid and Mr. Hanna might be trusted to look into this, though he was as surprised as Dr. Reid had been that there was no station here, but he gave assurance that the Minister of Railways would see to it that Prince Rupert had a station commensurate with her size and needs in the very near future.

He mentioned the superiority of the harbor and predicted a good future for the port. "Two new ships are being built here now," said Mr. Ballantyne, "and I can see no reason why they should not receive their first cargoes here. This port should have sufficient exports and imports to warrant the running of ocean vessels to it."

Optimism Well Based
"Many things have impressed me on my trip to Prince Rupert and one of the most impressive

Investigate Local Work
"I am not satisfied with the gentleman behind the local dock. The government is willing and ready to support those who are going to conduct permanent industry, but is not going to support promoters. The man behind this dock will have to show me that he is ready with a permanent program and I am going to call him to Ottawa on my return to ascertain the condition of his present operations and what his plans for the future are."

"Last session I put through a bill for the support of permanent shipbuilding companies. This bill provides for a 50% advance for the building of ships for foreign or domestic trade. France wants more ships and oil tankers are also wanted and the government will assist in their construction in Canada. The buyer and builders will cover 50% and the government will advance 50%, taking as security the notes of the buyer and builder, as well as mortgages on the ships. I fully hope that shipbuilding will go on permanently here, but if it does not, it will be through no fault of mine or of the government. I was surprised recently when the government called for tenders for the building of an ice breaker that the Prince Rupert yard made no bid."

Fish Regulations
"I am glad that my actions and those of the officers in my department in throwing open the fisheries has met with the approval of Prince Rupert people. The credit does not belong to me, but more rightly to Colonel Peck and your mayor in bringing the conditions so ably to our notice. The fairness of open fisheries appealed to me and I could not understand the monopolistic regulations formerly governing them. I realize that I have been severely criticized in a city not far from here, and which I shall soon visit, but you have no fear that my policies will be changed. (Applause.)"

Business Will Grow
"The changes seriously alarmed certain people in the south and they lost many nights' sleep worrying over the depletion of fisheries that they said would be brought about. However, the fisheries will not be depleted, but are now on a better basis and are (Continued on Page 5.)"
