## Egypt Becomes Independent Country

### PEACE TERMS OF BOLSHEVIKI ARE REFUSED BY POLES; 75,000 PRISONERS

#### Egypt Becomes Independent Country, says London Times

London Still to Retain Certain Rights, Especially in Connection with Guarding of Suez Canal

LONDON, August 23.—The independence of Egypt has been declared by Great Britain, says the London Times. Britain retains certain privileges but for all practical purposes the country will be independent and self governing. The country is assured facilities in case of war and has the right to maintain a garrison in the canal zone. The new government of Egypt must respect British policy, and the arrangement now made and agreed to by both countries. At the late war Egypt was nominally subject to Turkey, to which she paid tribute. In 1879 a dual control by Great Britain and Great Britain was established without severing the connection with Turkey. The Egyptian army was reorganized by the British in 1882. The British general officer known as the Sirdar and most of the posts were held by British officers. The strength of the army was about 17,000. The cultivable part of Egypt is estimated at about 8,000,000 acres. The actual cultivation at a little over 5,000,000 acres. Under British administration the finances of the country were put on a sound basis, and much land brought under cultivation.

#### PULP PLANT FOR ISLANDS

Buckley Says Preparations Being Made to That End.

VANCOUVER, August 23.—F. L. Buckley of the Masset Timber Co. (1919) who returned from Masset last week, states that water measurements are being taken and all plans laid at Masset by his company in preparation for the establishment of a modern pulp plant. English capitalists are behind the venture. Mr. Buckley stated, and without doubt actual building operations on the plant would start next year. He describes the limits at Masset as containing the best pulp wood in the province. At present 450 men are employed by the company getting out logs, which are marketed with the Prince Rupert Lumber Mills and with the pulp mills in the province. The output is 9,000,000 to 10,000,000 feet per month. The mill at Masset has been closed and according to Mr. Buckley, is not likely to be reopened this year.

#### HEADS POLISH NORTHERN ARMY



General Joseph Haller, who commanded the Polish armies in France, has been appointed commander of the Army of the North. He recently raised a volunteer army to meet the Russian hordes, which is retreating from Warsaw.

#### Transportation Scheme For Kitsumkalum Lake

Proposal to place Motor Lorries in Service to carry out Rich Ores of District.

TERRACE, August 23.—The town is all agog over a proposal which is being made to put a motor lorry service on the run between this place and Cedar River Crossing ten miles north of Kitsumkalum Lake. The scheme is a unique one and should it succeed has wonderful possibilities for developments in other parts of the province.

At present there is a very poor road to Mud Lake, the southern extremity of Kitsumkalum, so poor that part of it is not fit to travel over, even with a lumber wagon. There is no hope of a railroad going in that way in the near future unless it should be to tap the Groundhog coal fields. There are, however rich mines at the north of Kitsumkalum Lake and ore going several hundred dollars to the ton is ready to be taken out to the market. The provincial government is already spending a good deal of money on roads in the Terrace district so the proposal is that the people interested shall put the road in shape and form a transportation company to carry out the ore on motor lorries.

**Soldiers' Scheme.**  
Col. Muerling, D. S. O., M. C., Croix de Guerre, who had charge of the Canadian machine gun transportation in the war, is the man who is moving in this matter. He has had several years' experience with motor lorries and knows exactly what they will do. He is meeting a number of the prominent citizens of Terrace tonight and is discussing the whole matter with them.

Interviewed here by a Daily News representative, he said the only thing for the people to do in a case like this was to help themselves. He thought they could and would do it. He said there was something like thirteen miles of road that would need little improvement and of the 19 miles to the lake the rest was patchy. From there they could utilize the lakes for 12 miles and of the ten miles beyond, nine was flat jack pine plain, so there was really only a mile of difficult work.

While in the district Col. Muerling discussed the matter with the prospectors and settlers, some thirty in number, and all he had seen agreed to give some weeks of work, payable in shares in the new transportation concern. This would be sufficient to put the road in shape. The company would have to put up enough money, say

\$20,000, to purchase three motor lorries and a motor boat and scow to use on the lake. If this were done, the work of carrying out the rich ores could be commenced next spring and the country would develop at a great rate. Two lorries would be used south of the lake and one north of it.

Col. Muerling is confident that if he gets the proper support for his scheme, he can carry it through successfully and the whole town seems interested in it.

#### LACROSSE TIE AS RESULT OF RECENT GAME

NEW WESTMINSTER, August 23.—The two big lacrosse teams are now tied and the excitement is very keen in regard to the final outcome. Up to Saturday New Westminister was ahead but they lost the game to Vancouver on that day on their own grounds by a score of 6 to 1. The result was very disappointing to the Salmon Bellies as they had an idea they were going to keep the lead.

#### Bolsheviki Pressed by the Polish Army

Peace Terms of Reds have been Refused and Great Disaster for their Armies Seems Certain

WARSAW, August 23.—The peace terms of the Reds have been refused. They lost their opportunity and now the Poles are pressing them hard. Every gateway of escape has apparently been closed and the Bolsheviki are being bottled in on the northern front. They are on the eve of disaster.

General Waygand of the French army says that Poland will be the grave of three-fourths of the Bolsheviki army. It is estimated that already 75,000 prisoners have been taken.

#### ALASKA PULP FOR PAPERS

Chief Forester Says That Territory Can Furnish Two Million Tons Annually.

SEATTLE, August 23.—Alaska can furnish 2,000,000 tons of paper pulp annually, says Colonel Greely, chief forester. The Alaskan forests hold the solution of the American newsprint problem, he declares.

At present the bulk of the newsprint being used in the United States comes from Canada.

#### TALKED TO AVIATOR WIRELESS TELEPHONE

London Merchant Has Novel Conversation With Machine Over Folkstone.

Proposed Transportation  
Scheme from Terrace.

The transportation scheme outlined by Col. Muerling to tap the rich mining district north of Kitsumkalm Lake, holds out great possibilities for the development of that district. It is one of the first proposals made for the people to help themselves instead of depending on the government. There are always people benefited by schemes of this kind and they are now being asked to aid in forwarding it.

The News has taken the trouble to investigate the proposal to some extent and has found that the richness of the district is such as to warrant the expenditure. E. F. Michaud of Terrace, an experienced prospector, who knows the country well, says that there are plenty of ores there running from two to three hundred ounces to the ton which would pay well to ship, even if the freight charges were high. J. D. Wells, who is particularly interested in the Usk neighborhood, is enthusiastic over the scheme. He says he thinks there are many communities besides Terrace that would do well to make it possible to ship ores from some of their mines in order to show the mining world what can be done. He says he knows of the Kitsumkalm Lake and Cedar River district and the richness and quantity of the ores fully justify the people going ahead with the proposal. He suggests there would be no difficulty whatever in keeping up the shipments. Col. Muerling says he has investigated the ore bodies and there are good showings of free gold, free silver, grey copper bearing silver, copper, lead, and carbonate of soda.

Lorries Would  
Aid in Settlement.

There is a fine agricultural district in the Kitsumkalm valley but the lack of transportation facilities is holding the country back. The same lorries that would carry ore and timber to Terrace would haul supplies to the mines and farms and would also carry passengers to and from the interior points. There would be no end to the possibilities.

Prominent Visitors  
To the City.

Prince Rupert is being much favored this year in the presence of prominent visitors. Already there have been very important passages here from Ottawa. Today Mr. Bowser is in the city and on Wednesday Premier Oliver is expected to arrive accompanied by the local member. We welcome them all. We hope to see them return and when others come who have promised, such as Premier Meighen and Mackenzie King, we shall show them that we are not an inhospitable people in the far west.

Wonderful Possibilities  
Of Interior Country.

The interior country, tapped by the line of the G. T. P., is a wonderful country. It holds immense possibilities and the interesting thing is that development has already commenced and is well under way. There are districts untouched and other districts scarcely scratched. The lumbering industry is well under way, however, and that is the first step toward agricultural development. There is no difficulty in disposing of the land, once the timber is off.

A few people are holding up the country by refusing to cut up their land or sell it. They are trying to get rich at the expense of their neighbors. On the whole, however, there is a steady development going on that is permanent in its nature and likely to lead to much greater things in the future.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

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





Hidden Inlet Plant was Destroyed by Fire on Friday Night; Looking for Canadian Salmon.

The cannery tender Frederick C. arrived last evening from Hidden Inlet, Alaska, with a number of women and children aboard from the cannery at that place.

## Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partially pre-empted lands, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptory man occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 3 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 3 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stamp duty.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon actual occupation of road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

### PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The Act includes the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor, provided for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 28, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

### SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

### GRAZING

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
