#### Bolshies Started Counter Movement

Desperate Attempt to Save Themselves from being Hemmed In; Was Unsuccessful

LONDON, August 26.—It is reported here that the Bolshevik army to the north of Poland that has been suffering such heavy reverses lately has begun a desperate counter offensive against the Poles to prevent their being entirely cut off. Partial success is reported in connection with the counter movement.

Poland has flatly rejected the peace terms set forth by the Reds demanding a complete demobilization of the Russians.

WARSAW, August 26.—Kolno has been captured and the Reds are fleeing in disorder. Their casualties are estimated at 50,000.

LONDON, August 26.—The Poles have surrounded the remnants of the two defeated Red armies and the latter have with- drawn their demands for the establishment of a workmen's militia.

#### Granby Company will Appeal Finding Made In Victoria Courts

VICTORIA, August 26.—The Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting and Power Company makes the announcement here that Judge Gregory's important judgment in favor of the Esqui- malt and Nanaimo Railway against Wilson and MacKenzie in the fight over settlers' rights will be appealed to London courts. By Judge Gregory's finding the Granby Company loses its title to the property where the town of Cassidy's Siding is located. This town was built by the Granby Company at a cost of one million and a half dollars.

The mining work proceeds pending the litigation. The case is first going to the highest court of British Columbia in October and then it will go to London in 1921. The government gave the Granby Company the crown right to the property three years ago. Since that time this action was contested. The complaint was made that lack of notice was given and that the hearing was in the Esquimalt and Nanaimo interests.

#### SMALL GROCER'S SUDDEN FORTUNE WHEAT DAMAGED BY THE FROSTS

Claims \$43,000,000 Estate of An- cestor Now Held by U. S. Government.

MONTREAL, August 26.—H. Horowitz, a small grocer here, is claiming \$43,000,000, being the value of a Californian estate now in the hands of the United States Government. He is in the pos- session of documents which are alleged to establish his relation- ship to an ancestor and whose estate upon his demise passed into the hands of the government receiver.

In Many Districts Late Crops are Injured—Very Cold at Yorkton.

WINNIPEG, August 26.—No- body seems to know just how much damage has been done to the wheat crop by the recent frosts, but it is certain that some districts have suffered a good deal. At Yorkton from 12 to 14 degrees was reported and it was said all the late wheat was prac- tically ruined. In many districts the damage was negligible, but anywhere in low lying farms where crops were late the wheat will be somewhat damaged.

#### FINED FOR ALLOWING COWS TO TRESPASS

In the police court this morn- ing Robert McKay was fined \$10 for allowing his cows to trespass on the property of Mrs. J. J. Anderson. In spite of the pro- tests from the dairymen the mag- istrate maintained that there was a bylaw by the city against hav- ing cows run at large even though the lots traversed were vacant and he had to uphold it when the decision came before him. "Then this means that we will have to keep our cows in the barn all the time and feed them there," said Mr. McKay. His parting retort to the court was that "milk will soon be a dollar a bottle then."

#### SIR ALFRED SMITHERS SICK ON ARRIVAL

NEW YORK, August 26.—Sir Alfred Smithers, chairman of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, arrived here today. He was taken ill on the voyage and had to be taken to the hospital on the dock- ing of the Olympic. His condition, though serious, is not considered grave.

ADRIFT IN DORY FOR MANY DAYS

Adrift in the Bering Sea in a dory for five days, without food or water, with a choppy sea and a heavy wind howling, many miles from shore and with little hope of being picked up, was the trying experience endured by Dan Denison, a cod fisherman who arrived in Ketchikan last night on his way south, says the Ketchikan Chronicle.

As a member of the crew of the Maid of Orleans, Denison went north some weeks ago. He left the boat in his dory, intending to be back within a short time. A heavy fog fell which shut him off from the Maid of Orleans and then a wind sent him far adrift.

After five days he was picked up by a gas-pat and taken to Port Moller where he remained until he was again picked up by the steamship Catherine D. He is returning to Seattle, the home port of the Maid of Orleans.

On this property there is a tunnel 100 feet in depth and there is some good shipping ore on the dump ready to send to the smelter. It averages high in native silver.

Mat Allard has good shipping ore on the dump carrying free gold and silver at the Bear group. This will be one of the properties that will ship regularly if the transportation scheme is established.

These are just a few of the properties which are partially developed and from which good paying ore may be shipped yielding returns large enough to warrant the paying of high transportation rates.

The scenery on the route is among the finest in the world and Kitsumkalum Lake is likely to become one of the playgrounds for the people at the coast and interior towns.

MANITOBA ABOLISHES ITS PRISON STRIPES Now Provides Winter and Summer Uniforms for Convicts—Danim and Blue Cloth. WINNIPEG, Aug. 18.—Believing that the old striped uniform in which all convicts have been previously garbed has a tendency toward degrading and hardening prisoners, the department of justice, after much deliberation, has decided to abandon it within the next year. In the future two uniforms, one for summer wear and one for winter will be supplied to take its place. Abandon Painted Numbers. Made from durable, unicolorized brown denim, the new summer uniform will consist of jacket and trousers cut in conventional pattern, with none of the hitherto distinguishing prison features. The huge painted numbers which in the old uniform adorn the back and chest of the wearer, and which were unnecessarily conspicuous, will be abandoned. They will be replaced with small, neat metal number plates, secured to the back and breast of the jacket, quite inconspicuous. Straw hats will be worn as headgear with the summer attire. The winter clothing will be made from French blue cloth, while numbers similar to those on the summer uniforms will be affixed. Round cloth caps, similar in design to the forage cap issued by the German government to field regiments, of blue cloth and with earflaps, will complete the convict's winter equipment. The most radical change, however, will be made in the provision of discharge clothing for prisoners. In former years the government has been wont to provide grey tweed suits, badly cut and unmistakable to residents of prison cities. ## PREMIER OLIVER SCORES BIG HIT WITH RUPERT AUDIENCE

(Continued From Page One.)

the people of the north that two experts were to be sent here to examine the coal and iron deposits of the district and especially those at Copper River.

### Sample All Right.

Mr. Bowser had said that the government wharf was a sample of the work of the old administration and, indeed, it was. At the present time it would not carry a heavy load although it had cost \$250,000. There was now on the estimates, however, from \$60,000 to \$80,000 to make it so that it would.

"It has been reported in the south that I am going to seek reelection in the Okanagan or in Prince George," concluded the minister of lands, "but let me tell you that I mean to stand or fall in Prince Rupert and nowhere else. I have fought for northern B. C. and I think I have made good. In fourteen or fifteen months we will have to go to the people and when that time comes I feel that you will say 'Well done, good and faithful servant, continue in the good work.'"

In regard to a query from the audience as to the eight-hour bill Mr. Pattullo stated that this had been taken up at the last session but had been left over as a question for the Dominion to deal with. If this was not done by the next session provincial legislation would, however, be brought down.

### Premier Oliver.

Premier Oliver was the next speaker and after the applause had died down, he prefaced his speech with some of his bright witticisms and congratulated the city on its progress since his last visit some three years ago. At that time pessimism prevailed but now optimism was very noticeable. He had visited the scenes of the fishing, lumbering and shipbuilding industries and saw the reason for the optimism. The people must remember that industry and not legislation was the key to prosperity.

The premier referred to the able manner in which Prince Rupert and Omineca were represented and also the worth of the late lamented Frank Mobley, member for Athol.

It appeared that the opposition leader was going around the country giving one set speech to which sufficient local color was added to touch it up. His word had always to be verified and he never did give the public credit for a great deal of common sense.

### Civil Service Salaries.

"He alleges that the civil service salaries have been increased by \$1,500,000, but I have already challenged him on this, stating that his statements are untrue and cannot be verified. It is true that they have been increased 30 per cent, but the million and a half is simply untrue.

"He also says there are too many motor cars but where he had \$4,000 and \$5,000 cars for the ministers we provide \$570 Ford's for our employees and find that the efficiency of the civil service is greatly increased. We find that the supplying of these cars enables the officials to cover more ground and are good economy. We are trying to be an up-to-date government and not

so slow as the leader himself is. "Mr. Bowser says that when I was a farmer I used to squeeze a ten cent piece but now that I am premier I am squandering millions like a drunken sailor. There were no millions to spend when he got done though and during his regime expenditure far exceeded revenue. It took them two and a half months after they had been defeated in 1916 to leave office so that they might search the files and erase incriminating traces. When the leader of the opposition left the premier's office he took with him official cablegrams to and from the agent-general at London and despite the demands of the legislature has not returned them. It is my duty to compare the past regime with the present and point out such affairs as the Dominion Trust scandal, the McKenzie & Mann deals and the Pacific Great Eastern campaign fund. He says that the dead past should bury its dead and I say that that is quite true but that the dead should remain in their graves and not continue an offence to the people of British Columbia."

### Financial Situation.

The financial situation was fully gone into by the premier. When he first took office he went to Toronto to float bonds and had been offered a much lower rate than Ontario and told that B.C. bonds were deficiency bonds for expenditure was so much greater than revenue. In eight months, however, he had been able to sell the same bonds at 116 per cent higher rate of interest. Great increases in taxation had been necessary and they had been put on but revenue and expenditure now bore a more satisfactory relation to each other. On account of these increases in taxation three government candidates had been defeated in recent by-elections, however. It was indeed hard to find an equitable basis of taxation.

The colonization question was also dealt with. Where the late administration had allowed millions of acres to get into the hands of speculators, the present government had made conditions so hard for these speculators that they had been forced to colonize or pay 10 per cent taxes. The result was that much valuable land had been opened up and many settlers had been placed under good conditions.

### Grand Trunk Railway.

"Your city owes its life to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, which was conceived by a Liberal Government," stated the premier, "and it was the intention of that government to open a fish industry and a merchant marine with its base at Prince Rupert." But in 1914 that government was sup-

planted and since that time the one aim has been to kill the Grand Trunk Pacific with the result that Prince Rupert had had eight years of stagnation.

"Prince Rupert occupies a strategic position with the immense valley lands tributary to her and the filling up of these lands is a prime factor of this city's welfare. Do not the Conservatives owe you restitution?"

### Pacific Great Eastern.

The premier touched on the expenditures made by the present government, referring to the completion of the Pacific Great Eastern, a road conceived by the old administration in the iniquity of a \$500,000 campaign fund, the farmers' loans, the better housing scheme, the Industries Act, and irrigation work.

The P. G. E. extension was referred to, the premier predicting that there would be two roads to the Peace River Valley on either side of that river, one from Hazelton and the other probably from Prince George. The question was dealt with at length and Mr. Oliver told of the plan to get relief from the Alberta government by the laying of rails over a now existing grade until the B.C. road might be completed. In this Mr. Bowser had been forced to con-

### Government's Reforms.

It was the intention of the government to assist in the exploitation of the mines of the province and assist in their proving. Claims were not to remain idle and the policy of the government was one of development.

Referring to the reforms of the present administration, the premier spoke of the passing of the women's franchise, equal wages for women, maintenance of deserted wives, the adoption act, mothers' pensions, and the extensions to the compensation act with benefits to widows and children along common sense lines.

His address was closed very quietly and without the usual flourish generally made by public speakers. Gries from the audience to keep going were heard, but the premier wittily replied that "if they were not tired he was getting that way" and sat down amid an uproar of applause.

### RICH ORE STRIKE

Funter Bay Property Near Juneau is Scene of Find

JUNEAU, August 26.—That Charles Otteson, operating mining property at Funter Bay, has made a fabulously rich strike of gold quartz is the news brought to this city by recent arrivals from that place. The ore is said to run well into the thousands of dollars per ton in gold values and is now being sacked and carried to tide water for shipment for treatment for the extraction of gold.

It is said that Mr. Otteson, who has held the property for a number of years, has run an extension of a tunnel that was run several years ago to crosscut some ore veins. After going only a short distance a new vein of rich quartz was uncovered far surpassing anything yet found in that vicinity. Mining men who have visited the property lately are enthusiastic over the rock, but do not know what size the vein is or how far it has been traced.

Mr. Otteson, with his son-in-law, C. L. Tubbs, has been working on the Funter Bay claim steadily all summer. Both are still there. The claims are near those of the Admiralty Alaska Gold Mining property in Funter Bay, on which extensive development work is now being done.

### LAW TO DISARM ALL PEOPLE OF GERMANY

Right to search Houses and Search Letters and Telegrams Given Police.

BERLIN, August 26.—The new law providing for the disarming of the civilian population empowers the president of the republic to appoint a commissary, who will issue an order for the surrender of arms. If the order is disobeyed the commissary can enforce it with the help of the police, the Sicherheitswehr (Security Police), the Reichswehr, and even of "special organizations." He can also allow any armed forces, whether regular or irregular, to retain their arms until the disarming of private individuals is complete. He can order house-searchings, and his officials have the right to open private letters, telegrams, and to overhear private telephone conversations. Those who fail to surrender arms are liable to fines up to 300,000 marks or imprisonment up to ten years.

"Freiheit," the organ of the Independent Socialists, has begun a violent campaign against the new law, speaks of it as a reactionary militarist measure directed against the working class, prophesies that it will disarm and ruthlessly punish every workman who is found with a rusty rifle in his possession, while Pomeranian Junkers, who are alleged to have collected stores of arms, will not be touched.

#### No Liquor Allowed.

In regard to the instructions received from Olier Besner witness said the proprietor told him that he didn't want to have any employees having liquor around there. It was during the cross-examination by Mr. Hooper that an amusing incident between the lawyers occurred. There was an objection to the wasting of time and Mr. Hooper stated that he was paid by the month to which Patmore remarked "That's where I get ahead of you, I get paid by the case."

Carl Johnson, also a bartender in the New Knox Hotel, was then called to take the stand. When asked by Mr. Patmore in regard to the swing doors and if they were closed on the day of August 2, witness replied, "Sure." Witness described having taken the two detectives in to the wine room and having procured the bottle from the barrel of rubbish. It was during the locating of the position of the barrel on the plan that Mr. Hooper objected to Mr. Patmore marking the plan, to which counsel for the defence replied: "That was marked up before it came here, and don't get so fresh." Upon cross-examination witness maintained that he could not remember whether it was Smith or Money who had paid for the bottle.

#### Denies Statements.

Johnson denied that he had made the following statements in the presence of the two witnesses: "The old man forgot to leave enough whiskey today before he went out. I had to supply the fishermen and also the boats and have only half a bottle left."

"The old man leaves a sackful in the morning for the fishermen but it is not so good as you fellows get. The whiskey is mixed with water."

Witness denied having put the money in the fill for the bottle which he sold.

#### Adjournment.

Olier Besner testified for himself and with the hearing of the argument for the defence and the prosecution, the case was adjourned until tomorrow morning.

The Sweet case is further adjourned for a week when accused will come up for sentence.
