Labor Shortage Throughout This District is Reported

Labor Bureau unable to supply anything like all demands; Lumbering and Mining Occupations are short.

There is a decided shortage of labor at this point. That is the opinion of J. M. Campbell, employment officer, who finds it difficult to supply all the demands for men to work in the district. During the month of August there were 528 vacancies for labor and only 374 applicants from men. Of the applicants, 323 were placed in British Columbia and 20 were transferred to Alberta, while four were sent to the Yukon.

Men for men have come from Anyox, Stewart, the Hutton River and other points including railway construction on the coast. The applications have come from the lumbering and mining camps, the mines and general labor both in the district.

Statistics indicate that in the district the rates for labor run all the way from 75c according to the district in the mining industry being paid from day for an eight-hour day for the lumber trade from 75c up, according to the district. Sawmills pay 65c an hour and in the lumber camps the men get a day all the way up to \$1.00 for the work and skill required.

Men were sent from the month to work in the district and Mountain Park men went east to help in the big crop on the coast. The men going to the coast got a special rate on the railway.

SANK AS OR FOULED PROPELLER

Position.

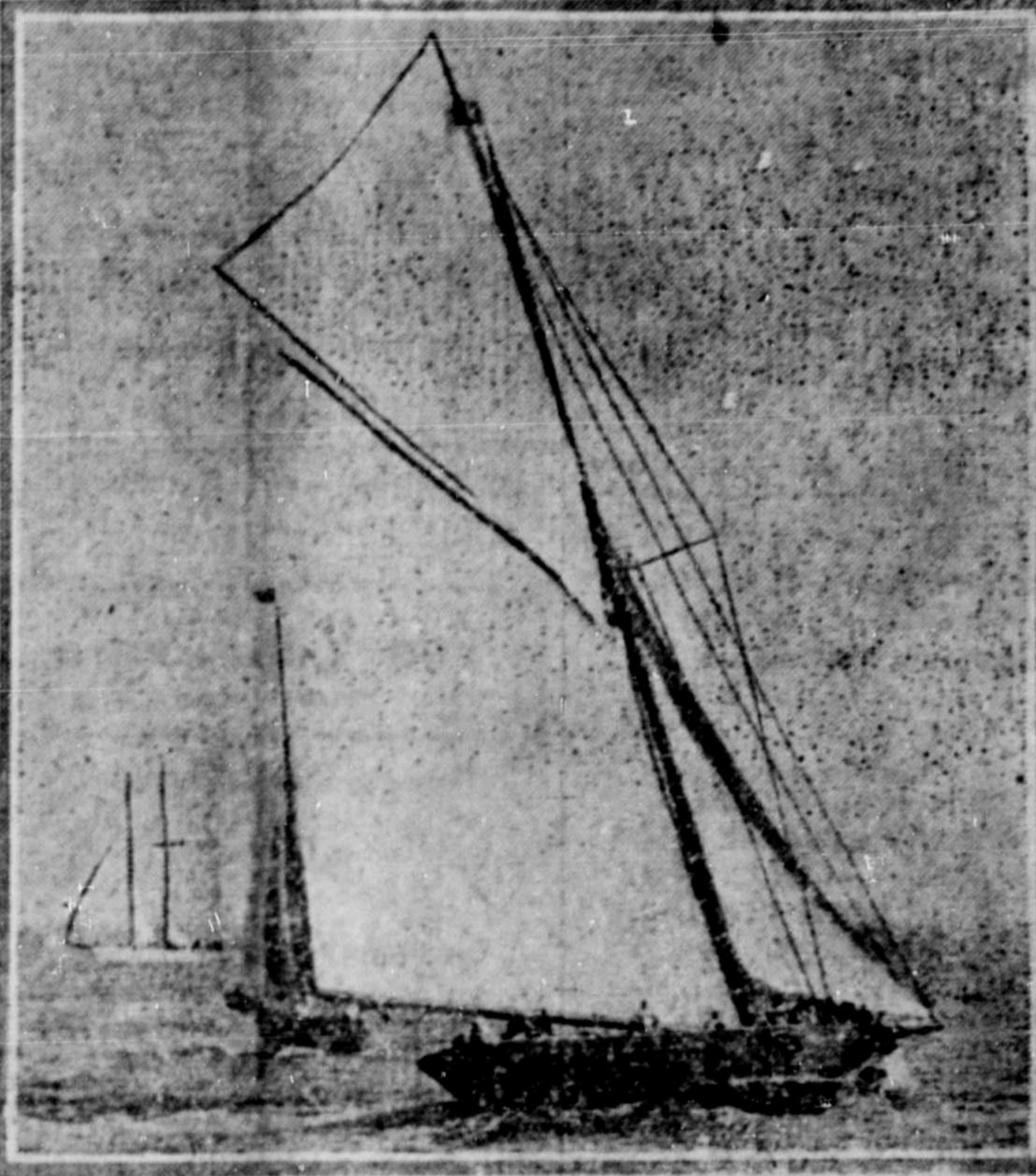

The planing mill at the Prince Rupert Lumber Company's plant is now in operation and will be used steadily from this time on. This pretty well completes the improvements made by the company. The dry kilns have been in use some time and the recent saws are also in operation.

The operation of the planing mill and dry kilns is a great advantage to the mill as it enables it to do a great deal of work here which would otherwise have to be done at some other plant. The drying and planing of the lumber reduces the weight considerably and naturally reduces the freight charges. It is an advantage to the city as more men are employed in doing the work.

\$10 Ten Dollar Prize \$10 for Letter on Prohibition

A good friend of the prohibition cause has made an offer of a prize of ten dollars for the best short letter arguing in favor of the continuation of prohibition and against government sale. Sweet Sentence Adjourned; Besner Trial Proceeds

Magistrate awaits extending of Evidence before delivering Judgment on Liquor Sellers. Appeal to be entered at once.

The Sweet, Miller and Besner liquor selling cases were dealt with in the police court this morning and adjournments made in each of them. In the Sweet case L. W. Patmore, acting for the defence, asked that sentence be not pronounced as it would necessitate appeal proceedings being taken at once, which would be inconvenient as the notes were not yet extended. Mr. Hooper stated that ten days was allowed for an appeal but that it would be inconvenient for the defence if sentence was pronounced before the evidence was extended. Sweet was, therefore, remanded until September 7 on the same \$1,000 bail.

Chief Vickers was called to the stand in the Miller case and testified as to a previous conviction of the accused under the B. C. Prohibition Act. Miller had been convicted of having liquor in his store at the corner of Sixth St. and Second Ave. on June 27, 1918, and fined \$50.50 by Magistrate Carss on that date. He had paid the fine on that date according to the police records. Miller is also remanded until September 7 on \$1,000 bail.

Chow Yee, a Chinaman, was charged with selling liquor this morning and was remanded until Saturday morning. L. W. Patmore appearing for the accused, pleaded not guilty.

Besner Case.
The Olier Besner selling case was remanded until tomorrow morning and the case of having liquor for sale was proceeded with. The charge of moving liquor illegally was dropped on the recommendation of the city solicitor. In the first case, L. W. Patmore drew to the attention of the court that the prosecution had not proved that Besner was the occupant of the premises on the date in question and that the very root of the case was thus affected. The defence now maintains that a transfer was effected on May 22.

Witnesses.
In the Besner having for sale case, Harry W. Birch, acting city treasurer, gave evidence as to the accused being the holder of the city licenses for the export warehouse and the bar at the Knox Hotel. Sergeant Wm. Adams and Building Inspector W. A. Matheison gave evidence as to measurements taken about the Knox bar and warehouse premises whereby the movements at the warehouse and between it and the hotel could be viewed from the interior of the bar. The warehouse could not be seen through the windows of the bar, but through the open doors or through the crack between the bar doors the warehouse and the door could be fully seen if the attention was focused there. Mr. Matheison stated that a person would have to look very carefully to view the door through the cracks although it would be easy through the open doors.

The Detective.
Detective Hugh Money was called to the stand and his evidence in the main and under cross examination was substantially the same as was given in the selling charge. With the aid of blue prints and sketches the determining of distances was facilitated. The defence made a strong attempt to undermine the evidence of the witness and get him confused as to distances but the witness maintained his story very reasonably. After Money's evidence had been taken adjournment was made until tomorrow, when Detective Smith will be called.

ASK GAS BOATS ON ALL RIVERS

Fishermen's Protective Association Would Eliminate Drag and Seine Nets.

NEW WESTMINSTER, Sept. 2.
The executive of the B. C. Fishermen's Protective Association on Saturday went on record as being unanimously in favor of the elimination of drag seines and traps as promised by the Hon. G. C. Ballantyne to President Wiedeman of the association and Wm. Maiden, chairman of the Great War Veterans' fisheries' committee. President Wiedeman reported that the definite statement, without qualifications, was made in the presence of Mr. W. G. McQuarrie, M. P., Col. Cooper, M. P., Mr. David Whiteside, M. L. A., and Commissioner Gillespie of South Vancouver, all of whom formed the party sitting at the table with the Hon. G. C. Ballantyne at the time. Mr. Whiteside, M. L. A., at the time commented upon the fact to the representatives of the fishermen that they had at least been granted one important concession.

The fishermen will exert every effort to have the seines and traps eliminated; also they will press for gasoline boats in all three districts, request that one license be granted for all British Columbia, and that the season for sockeye nets be extended to November 10.

All data possible from the active fishermen's standpoint will be prepared and forwarded to Mr. Ballantyne, and also a meeting will be arranged with Mr. W. G. McQuarrie, M. P., Senator Taylor and Mr. David Whiteside, M. L. A., when the fishermen's side of these important questions will be thoroughly discussed. Mr. Ballantyne has stated that he will consider the fishermen as well as the canners before any radical changes are made.

Empire Press
Party's Jaunt.

The representatives of the big newspapers of the Empire have been on a jaunt through Canada, but unhappily Prince Rupert has not been in their itinerary. They visited the Okanagan country, Duncan, Jasper Park and every place of importance with the single exception of Prince Rupert. The result is that we miss the pleasure of entertaining them, and they miss the pleasure of seeing this city and its surroundings. Incidentally too we miss, or think we miss, a lot of publicity that should accrue to us.

Any person who wishes to see Canada cannot afford to miss Prince Rupert. In fact no one can say he has seen Canada until he has visited this city. Here is something unique and different from the rest of the country. Canada's greatest fish market is a place not to be ignored when studying the resources of the country.

Not as Large as
Might Have Been.

Yesterday we told of the local halibut catch for the month. It was not as large as it might have been, for, owing to shortage of cars this summer, many of the fishing boat owners have got the habit of going elsewhere with their halibut. The boat that has been out two weeks cannot know whether to expect cars here or not under conditions such as have prevailed. Now happily this is changed, but the market for the year is ruined, so far as this port is concerned. It will take some time to get back the business which has been lost.

Bait and Ice
For Next Season.

Under the changed conditions, the fish marketed here next year should be almost twice as large as this. With that in view it will be well for those interested to make provision for a plentiful supply of bait and ice, not based on the requirements of this year but on the requirements under the changed condition. If this is not done, we shall find the port handicapped as it has been before. Given plenty of cars, ice and bait and we should do a record business here.

Satisfactory Work
On New Dock.

The new wharf work is progressing well. The dredging has been completed and the filling commenced. This filling will take some time as a large quantity of material has to be placed on the rocky bottom of the ledge from which the mud was taken, in order that the piles may have something in which to hold. The work is being rushed and will be completed quicker than a good many people imagine. Everything should be ready for the dock to be in use for the rush season next year. With the modern facilities provided, the port should benefit very materially from the new structure as soon as it is ready for use. Unlike some ports, the dock has the business waiting for it instead of having to create the business after the dock is built.

What Benefits Port
Benefits Railway.

What is of benefit to the port of Prince Rupert is also of benefit to the railway, and only increased business on the railway can make it pay its way and lift the burden from the people of the country. It will be of advantage to the Dominion Government to see that this end of the road is developed, for by doing that they are likely to make a better showing with the railway as a whole.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

The steamer Port Simpson is under charter to the Foley, Welch & Stewart Co. this fall.

The Grand Trunk steamers are bringing in a hundred men every trip for work on the railway.

There was a meeting of Prince Rupert citizens in P. I. Palmer's office today urging the city council to give early attention to the railway assessment matter in the best business interests of the city.

Sam Pearce was fined \$200 with the option of six months' imprisonment by Magistrate Carss in the police court this morning. He was found guilty of supplying liquor to Emily Vann, a Metlakatla Indian woman.

The Grand Trunk track layers have now reached Mile 65.

Mining News

The Valhalla group of mining claims at Usk is showing a good outcrop with considerable gold and silver values.

A seven mile trail is being built up Chumness Creek near Usk to some good claims. There is a good showing of native silver.

There are 150 men employed on the Nickel Plate and other mines of the Hedley Gold Mining Co. at Hedley. Two-thirds of them are employed underground and the remainder in the mill and power plant. The gold ore gives values of 89 a ton and the cost of production is said to be \$8.50. That seems like trading on a narrow margin.

The Lanark Mining Co. near Glacier, B.C., has shipped its first car load of ore to the Trail smelter.

Since the Dolly Varden mine has been making regular shipments to Anyox, the quartz mines at Swamp Point have ceased working as the Dolly ore is good flux for the Hidden Creek ore.

A great deal of interest is being taken in the silver mines at Cedar River and Kitsumkalum Lake. The proposal to put in a ferry transportation system there is making the miners hopeful of getting their properties developed.

Andy Oleson has some good looking properties on Copper Mountain near Terrace. A number of prospectors are doing their assessment work there now, among them being the Michaud brothers.

The washing out of the bridges and trails at Stewart has had the effect of checking a good deal of the development at mines in that neighborhood, particularly up the Bear River.

ASK DOMINION TO INVESTIGATE WINNIPEG RENTS

Increases in That City Said to be
Extortionate—Many
Complaints.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 2.—A commission will be appointed by the Dominion government to make a complete investigation into rentals in Winnipeg is probable if the recommendation to be made by Capt. William White, K.C., chairman of the board of commerce, is favorably dealt with at Ottawa. Captain White held a conference with W. A. Shepard, secretary of the Army and Navy Veterans' association, Thursday prior to leaving for Ottawa, at which data received by the association in connection with rent increases in the city was shown him. He took copies of the material and stated he would recommend to the federal government that a commission be appointed to make a full investigation into rentals in Winnipeg.

It was announced that the Joint Council of Industry has made no definite decision concerning a probe into rentals. That body held a discussion at a meeting on Thursday night.

More Complaints Made.

Further complaints were received by W. A. Shepard today of cases in which it is alleged that profiteering is taking place. In all cases the names of individuals sending particulars have been withheld.

It is stated that in the Bickle block, corner of Broadway and Spence streets, consisting of three duplex houses with two suites in each, the rent was raised on October, 1919, to \$85 for five of the suites and \$80 for the other. The increase at that time was \$10 per suite and the reason given was that the increasing cost of coal necessitated a greater return from rentals. It has been announced by the trustees of the Roman Catholic parish of St. Mary's, the owners of the property, that an increase of \$10 per month will be put in force on October 1, 1920, making a total increase on the x-suites of \$2,410 per year, or about 20 per cent. It is stated that in this block there is one janitor, who attends the furnace, but that the tenants have to clean the halls and stairways, and look after the screen doors and double windows.

\$117.50 a Month.

IN the Martello Court, Broadway, in the four-room suites, with the exception of the basement, notices have been served on the tenants advising that an increase in the rents will be made from \$60 to \$80 per month, according to reports received by the Army and Navy veterans.

In the Brussels apartment, 150 Lilac street, it is reported to the veterans that the rent has been ordered increased from \$77.50 to \$117.50 per month. This is an increase of approximately 53 per cent.

Mr. Shepard, in commenting on the rentals situation, stated that tenants coming to the association had clearly indicated that they were willing to see increases making a fair return on investments go into force, but would oppose profiteering.

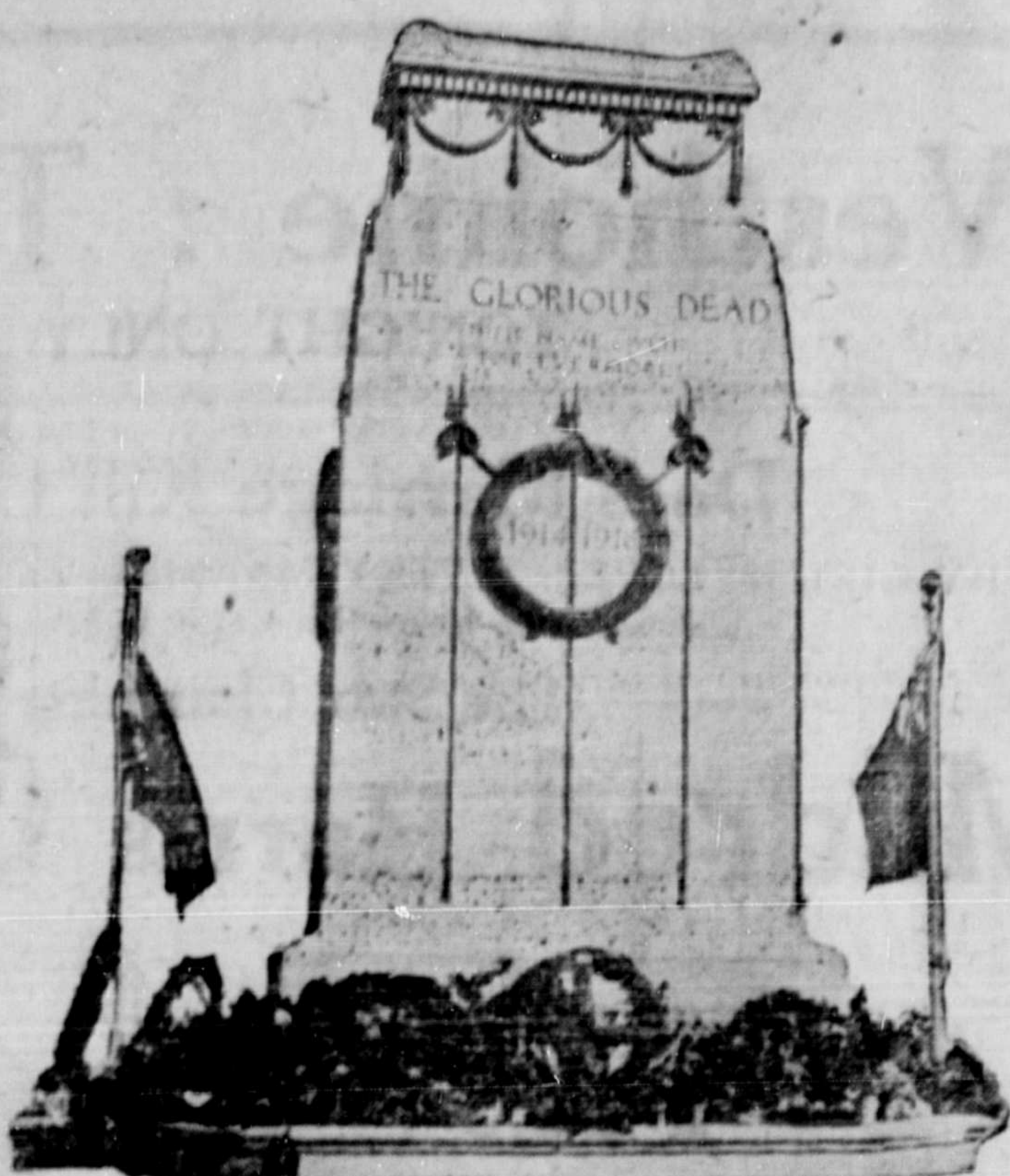

NEW STEAMER DISTRIBUTOR

Vessel Launched for Use on the Mackenzie River

EDMONTON, Sept. 2.—With the entry into service of their newest boat, the Distributor, the Lamson and Hubbard Canadian Company, Limited, have now continuous river communication, with the exception of portages, from Peace River to the Arctic circle. The S.S. Thomas, now owned by the company, runs from Peace River to Vermilion Chutes, the S.S. Slave River from the Chutes to Fitzgerald, and the Distributor from the portage to Point Separation in the Arctic Circle.

The Lamson & Hubbard Canadian Company, Limited, successfully launched their Mackenzie River boat, the S.S. Distributor, at Fort Smith, N.W.T., on Tuesday afternoon, August 31.

With flags flying and amid the cheers and good wishes of scores of spectators, some of whom had come thousands of miles for the event, the "Distributor" sped swiftly down the ways and made her first plunge into the swift waters of the Slave River. The honors of the occasion fell to Miss A. K. Guest, of the Lamson & Hubbard Canadian Company, Limited, of Edmonton, who christened the boat with all due ceremony.

PREMIER MEETS DELEGATION

Expresses Himself in Favor of Community Plan to Develop Kitsumkalum Lake District.

PAYS VISIT TO THE CONCENTRATOR AT USK

HAZELTON, Sept. 2.—Premier Oliver and Hon. T. D. Pattullo addressed a meeting here on Monday and later visited Usk where he inspected the mill and concentrator at Kitselas Mountain mine and expressed himself as very pleased at the work being done there.

At Terrace, which they reached on a speeder, the premier and minister of lands met a delegation headed by Colonel Muerling, M. M., D. S. O., Croix de Guerre, in regard to aiding in the improvement of the road to Kitsumkalum Lake and the mines to the northward. The plan as outlined by Col. Muerling was that each of the prospectors and settlers in the Kitsumkalum Lake district would give one month of his time to work on the road provided the Provincial Government would supply them with food during that time. This would be sufficient to make the road fit for motor traffic to the district, and a company would then be formed to put the motor-carries on the route to take in supplies and carry out the rich ores.

The premier expressed himself in favor of such a community proposal.

SUGAR RATION IN BRITAIN INCREASED

Colored Varieties may be Purchased in Addition to Regular Allowance

LONDON, September 2.—The weekly sugar ration has been increased from 8 oz. to 12 oz. from Monday. The Food Controller, in making the announcement states that the increase has been made possible by the supplies of sugar now in the hands of the Royal Commission on the Sugar Supply, and purchased for future arrival. If a retailer is unable, owing to transport delays or other circumstances, to meet the increased ration immediately, the arrears should be made up as soon after today as may be practicable.

The Food Controller further announces that there are now available supplies of West Indian grocery sugars (crystallized and "Muscovado") of which the special qualities are highly appreciated by many consumers. In order to assist the restoration of this important industry within the Empire, he has given instructions that on and after September 6 these colored sugars imported from the British West Indies or Demerara may be sold retail, without reference to and in excess of the authorized ration, to registered or unregistered customers at prices not exceeding those authorized by the Royal Commission for the time being for free sugars. Colored sugars of grocery quality produced in refineries in Great Britain will be treated on the same footing.

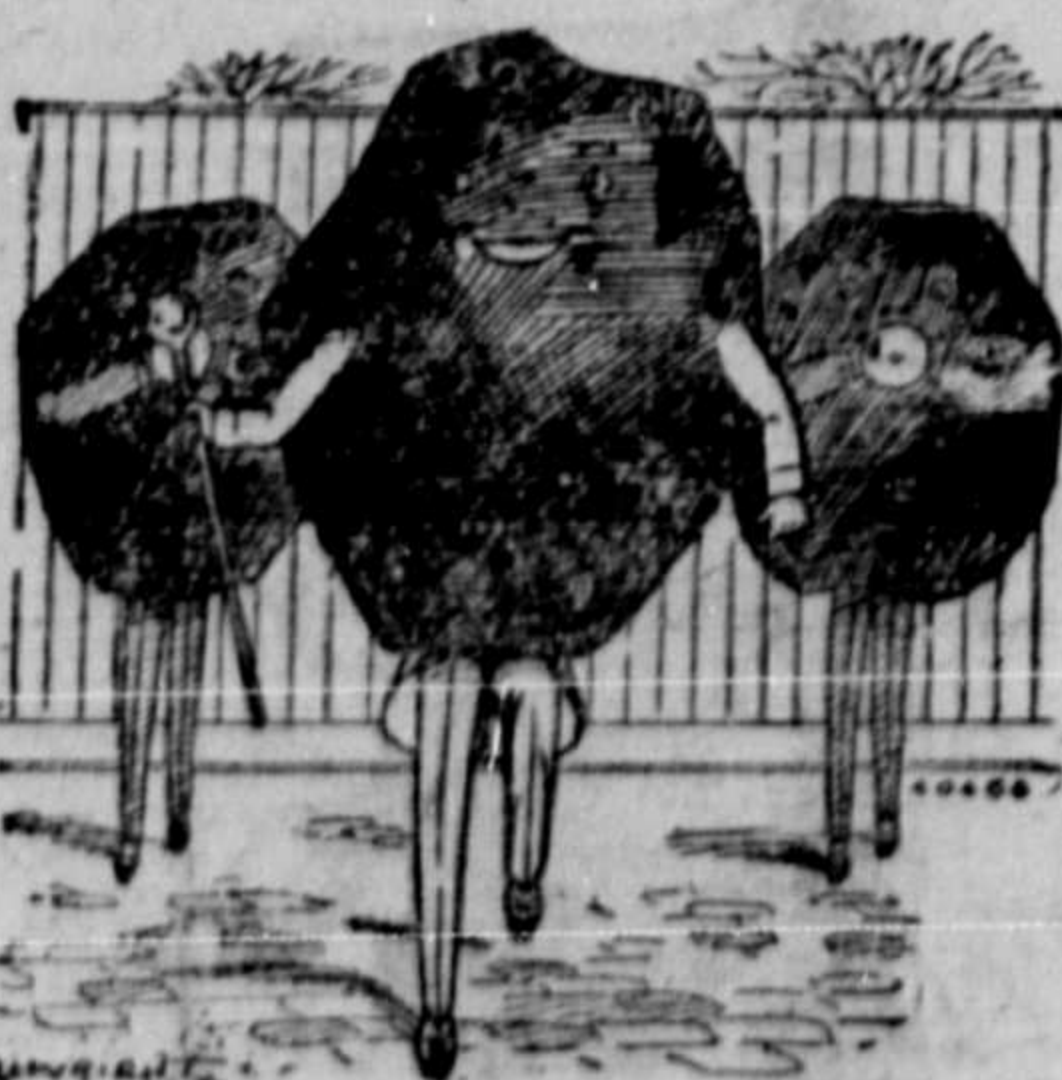

1,455 VESSELS

In a written answer to Commander Lord Curzon, who asked for a list of all H. M. ships sold since the Armistice, and inquired what had been done with the German ships awarded to Great Britain under the Peace Treaty, Mr. Long has circulated a list of 422 warships (including 63 ex-German submarines) and over a thousand trawlers, motor launches, and others—1,455 in all—sold by the Admiralty since the Armistice.

As regards the surrendered German ships, the agreement between the Allies was that they should be rendered incapable of further service within 18 months and completely broken up within three years.

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FIRST SPEAKER OF LEGISLATURE DIED YESTERDAY

Hon. J. S. Helmcken, M.D., of Victoria Was Son-in-Law of Sir James Douglas.

A telegram was received this morning by Morte Craig telling of the death of Hon. J. S. Helmcken at the ripe age of 95 years. He was one of the old Hudson's Bay officials and was a son-in-law of the late Sir James Douglas, first governor of British Columbia.

Dr. Helmcken was born in London, England, in 1825 and was educated at St. George's School. He received his medical training at Guy's Hospital and came to British Columbia in 1850, very soon after the first trading post was established by the Hudson's Bay Co. He was physician to the colony for many years.

In 1855 the late doctor was elected to the legislature of Vancouver Island and was speaker of the House until the admission of the colony into the Dominion of Canada in 1871, and a member of the Legislative Council.

Dr. J. S. Helmcken was one of the delegates sent to Ottawa to convey and support the terms of union with Canada as proposed by the Legislature of British Columbia, and he brought back the terms as finally agreed on, which resulted in the Union. He was offered a senatorship in 1871 but declined.

Dr. Helmcken married Cecilia Douglas, daughter of Sir James Douglas, K.C.B., and has lived in Victoria ever since in the old residence which was part of the Douglas estate.

The doctor has for many years been the one remaining link with the early settlement days and his passing will be regretted by many. He always took a deep interest in public affairs and stood out most strenuously for the rights of the people, especially against any encroachments on the public domain. Until quite recently, his letters to the newspapers on public matters were read with interest and his views treated with respect.

His Progeny.
Dr. Helmcken had a number of children, among them being the late H. Dallas Helmcken, K.C., at one time member of the B. C. Legislature, and Dr. Helmcken of Victoria.

Miss Emily Craig, daughter of Morte Craig of this city, married a grandson of the late doctor, D. D. McTavish, of Victoria.

TORYISM NOT THIS CENTURY

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King Explains Essential Difference Between Parties

RENFREW, Ont., Sept. 2.—Two thousand citizens of Renfrew and the surrounding district gave welcome to Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King here. Many could not gain admission to the armchairs.

Hon. Mr. King said: "We are in Canada down to real democratic principles, and Toryism, which is the reverse of toleration, now belongs to a past century."

He spoke at length of the essential differences between the Liberal and what he described as the autocratic or Tory line of thought. The Labor and Farmer movements were but an expression of Liberalism in its truest form. The work of Liberalism is to gather those who are out for a democratic government; those who are out for a better life, such as the returned soldiers. These were things that Liberalism was trying to gather together to sweep like an ocean over the land and give much needed improvements. The labor movement was formed to represent every branch of labor and give expression of labor all over the country. This was truly democratic. The Farmer movement came into being in a similar way. They started with the people themselves.

Whence Came New Party?
Liberalism, he said, placed its trust in the people. They talked about government by the people, but the people had not had a say in the returning of the present government and the Liberals were out to remedy this. Where did
