## Labor Shortage

## Handicaps Operations.

The News has no wish to see a condition in which the man who sells his labor must peddle it around from one employer to another and run the risk of not getting a job in the end. We recognize the dignity of labor and the hopelessness of unemployment, especially when the unemployed person has dependents who must be provided for. Just now, however, the tables are reversed. There are many employers looking for men and there are not enough men to do much more than half the work offering.

If all accounts be true there are plenty of men in Vancouver, but that is a long way off and it costs a good deal to bring men from there. It seems a pity that some of the men cannot make their headquarters here instead of in Vancouver, for there are all sorts of industries within a short radius of the city. Industries are handicapped through not being able to get men, and there are plenty of men requiring employment if they could only connect.

Death of Pioneer  
Of British Columbia.

Last comers to British Columbia will know little of the man whose death was reported in this paper yesterday, Hon. J. S. Helmcken. He was a unique character. He objected to anything which interfered with the liberty of the subject or encroached on the rights of the people. He took strong exception to laws dealing with behavior on Sunday and again and again in Victoria he took issue with the park commissioners over concessions given to individuals or clubs within the park limits.

In his day, Dr. Helmcken was one of the best known and most highly respected residents of the province and in Victoria was a familiar figure, until he became too infirm to go out. He was the man who negotiated the terms by which the province joined the Canadian federation and he naturally took great interest seeing how those terms worked out, and was an active participant in their benefits.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

### CARDINAL ON NEW PALESTINE

Bourne Objects to Plan to Set Up Jewish State in Holy Land

In his presidential address at the Catholic Congress in Liverpool recently Cardinal Bourne said:

"I cannot believe that the statesmen who had conceived it have realized or foreseen its immediate, still less its ultimate, consequences. There are many questions rising out of it which remained unanswered, but the salient fact that a new non-Christian influence is being deliberately set up in the land whence countless generations of Christendom have longed and striven to oust a non-Christian power is so tremendous in its import that without the smallest anti-Jewish prejudice men of every Christian nation are justified in asking, as they are actually asking, what is the purpose, what is to be the outcome of so grave a political departure. (Cheers.)

"Letters continue to reach me which prove that the resistance of both Christians and Moslems to this invasion of Zionism has in no way lessened, but tends to become still more acute. The Zionists dispose of large funds. They are buying from the Palestinians, impoverished by the war, lands and houses which the former are almost compelled to sell, for while the Jews can easily obtain loans at a very low rate of interest Christians and Moslems can obtain advances for the development of their enterprise only upon terms that are too onerous for acceptance. Thus, even if a direct political control is definitely excluded by the British administrators, there is every danger of the establishment of a Zionist economic and financial domination which would be no less unacceptable in its results. (Cheers.)

"Would it not be wise for our Government, without in any way retracting from the mandate entrusted to it by the League of Nations, to give to the other nations of Europe—to France, Belgium, Italy, Spain, and in due time to the central nations, and, of course, to America, North and South—some kind of representation, apart from the usual consular agents, in the guardianship of these sacred shrines of Christendom. They do not belong to the Government of Palestine alone, nor to England, but they are the heritage of the whole Christian world. Action of this kind would have far-reaching consequences in gaining for the British administration of Palestine the universal confidence which is necessary for its complete success."





## SEVEN BISHOPS GIVE OPINION ON SPIRITUALISM

**Opposition by Anglicans Shown in  
Statements Issued in England**

LONDON, Sept. 3.—Seven Church of England Bishops have made public statements in denunciation of popular spiritualism. This is undoubtedly the beginning of what will grow to be a formidable opposition to the wave of popular interest in that subject which has swept over England.

The campaign of pro-spiritualism reached a climax with the publication in Lord Northcliffe's Sunday Weekly Dispatch of a series of full-page articles purporting to give in great detail an inspired account of life after death by the Rev. G. Vale Owen, an English vicar.

Undoubtedly it is this last outburst from an English churchman which has rallied the Bishops to concerted action against spiritualism. Here is what five of them say:

### Bishop of Hereford —

"Nothing is more certain than that spiritualistic investigations are, for ordinary people, mentally and morally debilitating. No progress is made in them and it is difficult to believe that any genuinely scientific character attaches to researches so barren, so heavily shadowed by fraud and so plainly unwholesome to the investigators."

### Bishop of Norwich —

"So far as spiritualism relates to communication with those behind the veil I do not believe that we can obtain anything so strong and comforting as the consciousness of the living and the dead."

### Bishop of Truro —

"In this life the future is veiled from our eyes. If it were not so, life would be hardly tolerable and our very freedom of will would be in jeopardy. Therefore, fortune-telling, crystal gazing and all such things are clearly, so far as they are in earnest, efforts to cut across the wisdom of the Divinely ordered plan."

"Of the life to come we are told some little and then the veil is drawn. If spiritualism attempts to lift this veil so that we may gain from its lifting some knowledge of the future, then clearly we are going outside the divine plan of life. Success in this endeavor would make us all, not creatures of circumstance, but mere automata at the will of the future."

### Bishop of Lincoln —

"Those attempting to probe the future are trying to open a door closed by God."

### Bishop of Lichfield —

"On the main point the welcome I should give to any scientific demonstration of the conscious existence after death of personalities whom I have loved and revered on earth and of real intercourse with them, then I am sure I am not prejudiced against spiritualism."

"But it is impossible for me to read without some prejudice the exposition of the nature of that conscious existence, which spiritualists hold to be revealed to them by the departed through 'controls' and 'mediums.'

"Their conception of survival—that is, the continuance of a life closely resembling our present life—is not identical, indeed, with my conception, which I believe to be the Christian conception of a 'revival,' a renewal of spiritual, a being with Christ. Everlasting life is not to us, as it seems to them, very like earthly life prolonged eternally."

AND COSSACKSMakes Agreement with People of  
Don and Other Districts

PARIS, Sept. 3.—General Wrangel is at present very much in the public eye. He has made a treaty with the Cossacks under which he is to lead them. The terms of the agreement are as follows:

(1) Complete autonomy of the Cossack territories of Don, Kuban, Terek and Astrakhan as regards their interior organization and administration.

(2) General Wrangell, Commander-in-Chief of the troops of South Russia, has supreme power over all the troops of the Cossack territories of Don, Kuban, Terek and Astrakhan for all military operations, as well as the organization of the army.

(3) All resources of food and other supplies of the territories of Don, Kuban, Terek and Astrakhan necessary for the troops fighting against the Bolsheviks are put at the disposal of the Commander-in-Chief.

(4) The railroad and telegraphic administration is entrusted to authorities under control of the Commander-in-Chief.

(5) Negotiations and agreements with foreign powers, both purely political and economic, are to be negotiated and concluded by the Commander-in-Chief.

(6) All tariff barriers in the territories concerned in the agreement are to be suppressed. The same indirect taxes are to be levied throughout these territories.

(7) The same monetary system is to be established throughout these territories. The right to issue currency is vested in the Commander-in-Chief.

(8) The present agreements enter in force from the date of signature, subject to approbation by the Parliaments of the respective Cossack territories after their liberation.

(9) The present agreement will have executive force throughout and until the complete cessation of the civil war."

FOUND TWO STILLS  
IN OPERATIONWhiskey Made by Old Offender at  
Barrie

BARRIE, Sept. 3.—Officers located here what they think is one source of a good deal of whiskey which has been going into Collingwood lately when they discovered a plant on the farm of Allan McDonald. In a dark room off the main cellar they found two stills in active operation, the heat being supplied by a coal oil stove. Five gallons of whiskey and 125 gallons of rich molasses and corn meal mash were found.

In the kitchen was another still about the size of a garbage can that was black with use. McDonald was pursued by Officer Fisher, but escaped into a swamp. The seizure was made by Inland Revenue Officer Bloody and Inspector Fisher of Orillia.

Last year McDonald was fined \$200 for having whiskey in his buggy, and a few years ago when keeping hotel at Craighurst he was fined for illegal selling of liquor. A warrant has been issued for his arrest.

The canoes and dory races will show up the contestants, as will also the gear setting contest, all of which events will be pulled off in the course of the big fair program, too. The prizes in the latter event on Labor Day will be quite substantial, ranging from \$50 to \$500 donated by various water front companies.

The National League baseball teams still remain clustered together, standing with little over 150 points between the leader and the tail-end. In fact the National flag is still within reach of any of the eight teams, if any should run into a long winning streak. Brooklyn, Cincinnati and New York are in the lead and all three are within twenty-five points of each other, while a drop of fifty points and below the 500 mark are Pittsburgh, St. Louis and Chicago. Boston and Philadelphia are dragging along about 400.

In the National League Chicago, Cleveland and New York are together slightly above the 600 mark while St. Louis is at 550. Boston, Washington and Detroit are below 500 but above 400. The Phillies are retaining the usual place in the cellar that they have held down for the last few years since Connie Mack had his famous reorganization.

From the present appearances it is hard to forecast who will take part in the fall party in October or where it is going to be held. It is so well within the reach of all the National League clubs that there will have to be a change in the way things have been going all season or it will not be determined till near the time for the world's series. It is likely that Chicago, Cleveland or New York will be the American winners. Sport writers predict that the American League finish will be limp and colorless, no matter who leads home. Voices of the thousands of baseball fans a few days ago shouting wild and joyfully are now couched in whispers. The psychological effect of the fatal accident to Ray Chapman, Cleveland's star short stop, has taken the heart out of one of the hottest pennant fights in history. Cleveland's rivals do not feel like taking the flag under such a great handicap and Indians themselves are not in the best of mood for honors.



## LABOR FEDERATION GOES INTO POLITICS

### Decides to Support Ontario Labor Party

HAMILTON, Sept. 3.—The Canadian Federation of Labor decided to identify itself with the political Labor movement and will affiliate with the Ontario Labor party, to which it will give financial and moral support.

The convention condemned the Federal Government for not putting into force the eight-hour day as provided in the League of Nations pact. It was felt that this federal government should impress upon the Federal Government the recognition of national Labor to be consistent with the Government poster which read, "Canadian money, Canadian made, should stay in Canada for Canadian trades". Public ownership of telephones was also discussed and a resolution asking the Hydro Commission to consider the question of establishing a Provincial telephone system was passed.

The last item discussed was immigration. The federation felt that the Government, instead of importing alien labor and encouraging such immigration should repatriate Canadian soldiers who have taken out their discharge in England.

## PLAN TO FIGHT BOLSHEVISM

Organized Labor at London, Ontario, take Steps in that Direction

LONDON, Ont., Sept. 3.—A campaign to fight the spread of the One Big Union idea, and also the propaganda of the I.W.W. and the Bolsheviks, was launched in London by P. J. Flannery, Canadian general representative of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, and A. A. Woodward, general representative in Canada of the International Brotherhood of Railway Firemen.

President Frank McKay of the London Trades and Labor Council says that he is not aware that the organizations named have been working in London and he does not think that they have made any headway here if they have, but Messrs. Flannery and Woodward state that the danger to organized Labor is very great and must be combated energetically. The following statement was issued by them today:

#### Bolshevism Denounced

"The seventeen railway brotherhoods that obtained the award handed down by the United States Railway Labor Board will establish in Canada a council composed of the Grand Vice-Presidents for the purpose of offensive and defensive action on all matters pertaining to the welfare of the bona fide international unions from any encroachment of dual or outlawed radical organizations. The latter are endeavoring to undermine the trade union movement with their Soviet doctrine in order to create class hatred and discontent along the lines of darkest Russia. This means the ultimate destruction of all forms of civil government thereby degrading civilization to the level of the dark ages. Cooperation and production will solve the industrial problem along conservative lines."

## POULTRY RAISING REQUIRES CAPITAL

From Five to Eight Thousand Dollars Necessary to Make Good Start

L. F. Solly of Lakeview poultry farm, Vancouver Island, gives in the Cowichan Leader an interesting article on poultry farming in which he says that, at present prices, the cost of going into the poultry business in such a way as to make it pay would require a capital of from \$3,000 to \$8,000. This is made up as follows:


