PRINCE RUPERT, Sept. 10.—Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister

"There is every justification for carrying out the Govern-
ment improvements at Vancouver, Victoria and Prince
Rupert. He further added that Prince Rupert promised to de-
velop a shipping port. Considerable improvements would
be made there, as the business of that part of the province
to develop and it is 500 miles nearer the Orient than
the Pacific port."

Irish Question is Not Religious, says Mrs. Peat

Urges Suppress Lawlessness and then give Dominion
Rule; Too Much Leniency in Past, says Lecturer

Declaring that the Irish question was not a religious one but
that the present troubles arose from the supineness of the author-
ities in not enforcing the laws and thus allowing the situation
to get out of hand, Louis Watson Peat, wife of Private Peat,
gave a very interesting lecture at the Chautauqua gathering in
the skating rink last evening. She urged Dominion rule as the
solution of the present problem.

Mrs. Peat said that the words Sein Fein (pronounced Shin
Fane) mean "ourselves alone." The organization was allowed
to grow unheeded for many years until now it had got beyond
control of either church or state. It had grown up as a result of

too much leniency. Laws were
not enforced and this was the
result. It was "nationalism gone
to seed, sentimentalism gone to
the madhouse." Ireland had a
bad case of swelled head and as
a result she aimed to get the
whole empire by the ears. Be-
tween the Sinn Fein on one side
and the soldiers on the other
were the loyalists.

Grievances.
"Why were all the murders?"
the lecturer inquired. Because
of the supineness of authority.
There were grievances of course.
Did not everyone have grievances?
There was also the ideal of self-
determination of small nations.
There were grievances in every
country, but the difficulty with
the Irish was that they looked
back to 100 years ago, and lived
on the memory of that time. The
condition of 100 years ago or of
50 years ago were not the con-
ditions of today.

The word "England" had been
used as a slogan by every Anglo-
phobic for years past, but all
the Empire was to blame for con-
ditions today as much as England.
Ireland was the key to Imperial
unity for in union lay the
strength of the Empire. The
speaker said she had no brief for
England nor for the Welsh or
Scotch. She herself, though born
in Ireland, was a Canadian. She
argued that authority must be
exercised and if those in authority
in Ireland today did not "do the
job" they should get out and let
someone else do it. Dominion
rule was the solution of the prob-
lem. There were, however, prob-
lems to solve. There was the
north and south problem, the
safeguarding of minorities. De
Valera who led the Sinn Fein fac-

Class Distinctions In Britain Going.

M. A. Grainger, chief forester of British Columbia, who has
been visiting England recently after an absence of many years,
writes most interestingly of his visit in an article published in
Victoria recently. He says:

"Class distinctions are being crushed a good deal by Eng-
land's tremendous burden of war taxation. A family man with
a \$10,000 income loses one-third of it—just one-third—money
which in happier days gave him the appearance and privilege of
the well to do. He used to keep a car. He cannot do it now in
London because he can't afford a chauffeur, and autos must not
be left empty in the narrow streets. The personage with \$150,-
000 a year has about half the amount taken in taxes. The average
cost of everything has doubled so he really has only about one-
quarter of the spending power that he had before the war.

"A yacht of grouse moor are still possible for the wealthy
man with usually this difference nowadays, that he must choose
which one. He cannot have both. So nine-tenths of the estates
are being broken up.

"A stranger hears it said that local agricultural committees
have some power to compel a land owner to put good land to
use in such manner as may satisfy them. And yet in the same
country, this country of queer contrasts, personal liberty is the
sacred subject of anti-prohibition posters ten feet high on adver-
tisement hoardings."

Prices in England Seem Appalling.

Mr. Grainger goes on to tell of the prices paid for com-
modities in England. "The price of fruit is startling to English
people, even costermongers' barrows in mean streets showing
poor strawberries at 55c. a pound and gooseberries at from 33c.
to 45c. a pound, many times pre-war prices. So people go with-
out. Butter at a dollar a pound, a sugar famine, and \$1.20 for
a dozen eggs, keeps housewives worried, especially among the
large classes that live on pensions or small fixed incomes and
have been reduced to various degrees of poverty by the increased
cost of living."

Power of Suggestion Neatly Illustrated.

Suggestion is one of the greatest powers in the world. We
all are open to control. Even those who resent interference by
others can be managed if tact is used. The London Times tells
of an interesting incident in this connection. It says:

"A few mornings ago the Daily Mail contained a photograph
which had won a prize in the competition for amateurs, of two
dogs yawning. Now, nothing is so provocative of imitation as
the yawn, whether in animal or man. A passenger on the Under-
ground, one nicely sensitive to the humors of life, saw the picture,
laughed—then yawned, and laughed again. Looking at the
newspaper-readers opposite him, he watched for each to turn
to the picture-page. One after another, on reaching it, smiled—
and yawned. At last some mysterious link of sympathy brought
the eyes of the little company on one another. They all smiled
in unison. The first passenger yawned. The rest laughed—and
afterwards yawned in chorus."

WATER PROBLEM OF REGINA, SASK.

Seven Millions Least Amount at
which Supply can be Secured

REGINA, Sask., Sept. 9.—Seven
million dollars is the minimum
cost at which the southern part
of the province can be supplied
with water from the South Sas-
katchewan River. This is the
estimate of the South Saskat-
chewan Water Supply Company,
and is based on a wood stave pipe
being used. If a concrete pipe
line is adopted the cost will be
eleven million dollars. Should it
be found necessary to adopt this
type of construction to make the
scheme a success, it would be
financially impracticable at the
present time, according to Major
A. J. McPherson, chairman of the
commission. A steel pipe line
would cost thirteen million
dollars.

RADIO STATIONS ALASKA WATERS

Aids to Navigation to be Placed
at Different Points in
the North.

Radio compasses, which enable
ships at sea to gain accurate
bearings in spite of bad weather,
are to be installed along the
Alaskan coast from Dixon's En-
trance to Unimak Pass in the
Aleutian Islands, says the Ketchikan
Chronicle. A party of naval
men went north on the steamship
Jefferson in connection with the
work today.

Few, if any, of the present com-
mercial radio plants on the coast
can be used in connection with
the radio compass work, as they
are not properly located. It is
said that the Ketchikan station is
so surrounded by mountains and
hills that it would probably be
impossible to give accurate direc-
tions. Present plans call for the
installation of ten new radio
stations along the coast. These
will probably not be used for
commercial business, it is said.

Finding Position.

The operation of the radio
compass is simple. Several years
ago a system was devised whereby
the direction from which a radio
message is sent can be determi-
ned at a receiving station, and this
device is the basis of the com-
pass. If a ship at sea desires to
know its position, it flashes a
message to two different land
stations, both of which are equip-
ped with a direction finder. The
stations determine the direction
the ship is from them and report
their findings to the ship. It is
then a comparatively simple mat-
ter to determine the ship's exact
location.

The new stations will be in-
stalled at the principal entrances
to Alaskan waters.

Capes Muzon and Chacon will
have stations to guide vessels
into Dixon's Entrance.

Cape Omay will be the next
station up the coast, guiding the
entrance to Clarence Straits.

Cape Spencer station with the
assistance of Omay or the sta-
tion to be erected at Cape St.
Elias will guide boats bound to
Icy Straits from the westward.

The entrance to Prince Wil-
liam Sound will be guarded by
stations at Capes Hinchinbrook
and St. Elias.

The entrance to Cook Inlet will
be marked by a station on the
northeast shore of Afognak Is-
land and some point on the shore
of Cook Inlet.

Unimak Pass through the Aleu-
tian chain will be marked by sta-
tions at Cape Sarichef, on the
Bering Sea side and Scotch Cape
at the Pacific entrance.

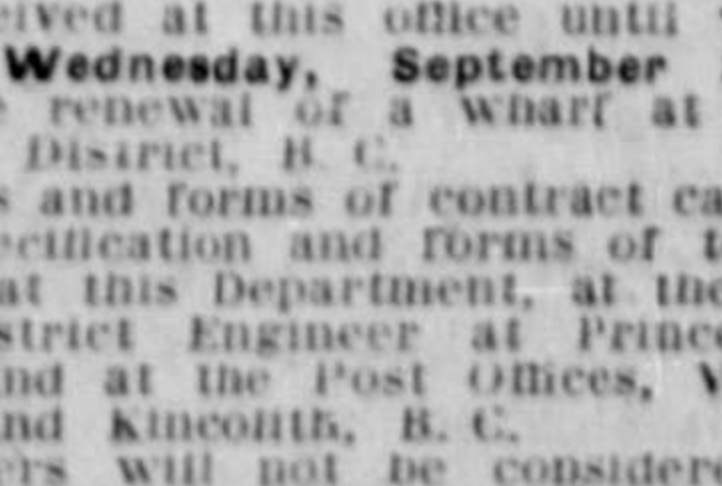

BUSY MONTH IN EMPLOYMENT

Offices throughout Province Show
Considerable Activity; New
Branch at Prince George

The month of August was an extremely busy period in most of the employment bureaux operated by the Provincial Government, and the results obtained were greater than in any previous month since the Employment Service was instituted. A report just issued by the Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, Minister of Labor, under whose department the bureaux are operated, states that the weekly average of placements for August was 2,014, which figure takes a big jump past the previous record of 1,644 per week in April last. The main factor in bringing about the increase for August was the sending of men to the Prairie Provinces for harvest work; but even if all placements outside British Columbia were omitted from the reckoning, August would still show a higher weekly total for the province than any previous month.

The total number of applicants for position was 8,388, the vacancies 7,542 and the number of placements was 8,056. For the five weeks ended July 31st the corresponding totals were Applicants 8,559; vacancies 8,187; placements 7,610 (weekly average 1,522). The list of vacancies does not include orders for workers received from outside the province; but men and women sent to work in other provinces are included in the totals of placements.

Applicants Unplaced

On August 26 the unplaced applicants who were registered at the bureaux in the province numbered 1,052, a decrease of 42 compared with July 31. The excess of vacancies over applicants is now greater than at any time in the history of the Employment Service. Unfortunately the situation differs greatly in various parts of the province as will be seen from the following table, giving the total from the August 28 return.

It will be seen that the unemployed are nearly all in the cities of the coast, Victoria having the usual high proportion. During the month every effort has been made to bring to the notice of the men out of work in these cities the better employment situation which exists in other parts of the province, but difficulty is experienced in inducing many of the seekers after employment to interest themselves in jobs outside their own locality.

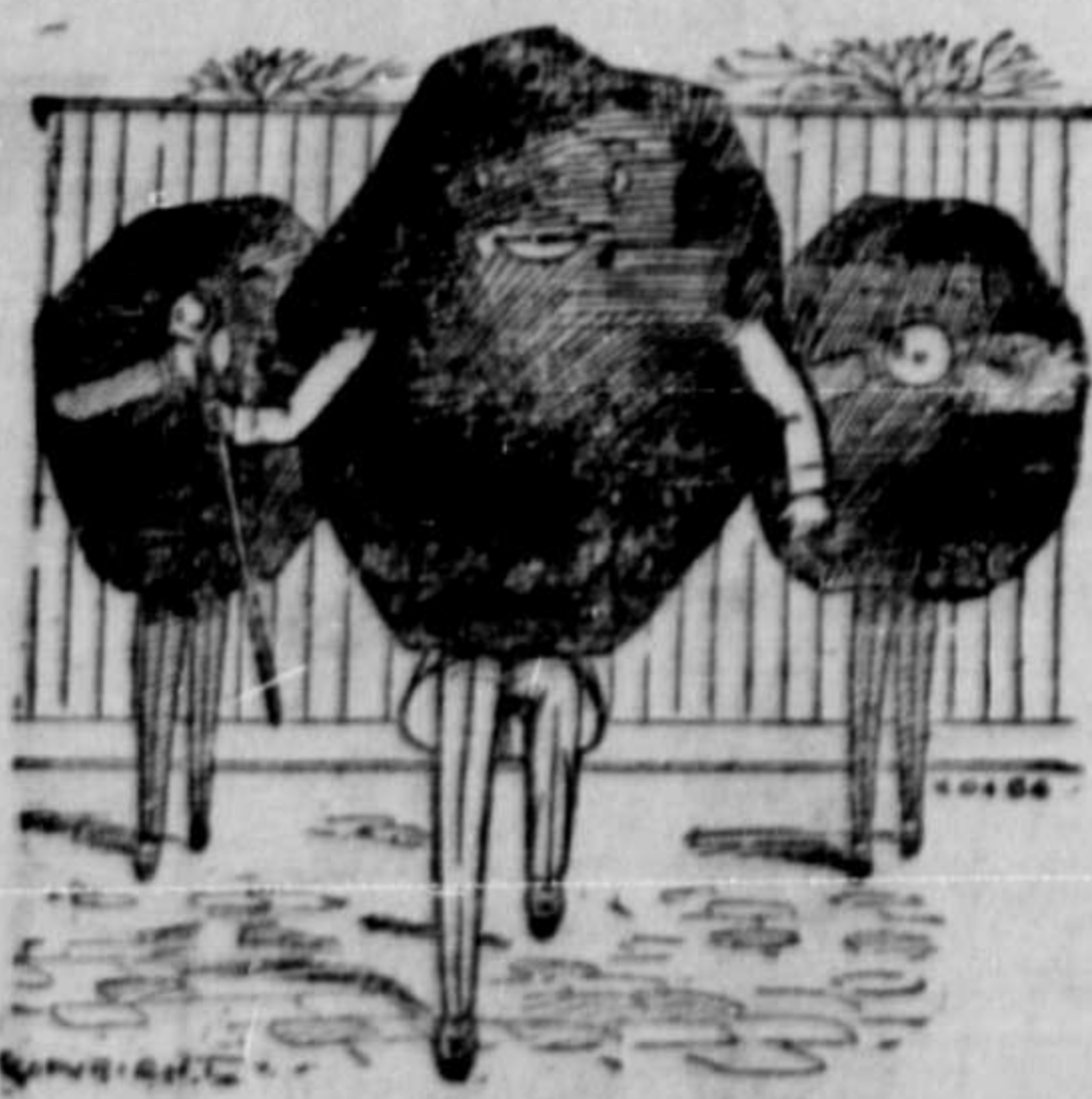

GERMAN AS SPY IN U. S. ARMY

Photograph of Self in Uniform Gave his Game Away

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.—Inordinate pride caused the downfall of Theo. Chude, German spy, confessed murderer of three persons in Berlin, and who has been posing as Lieut. Arthur Kincaid. When he took over the personality of the United States officer and began drawing Kincaid's back pay, Schude destroyed everything that would point to his real identity, with the exception of a photograph of himself in a German uniform. He was so proud of the picture he would not destroy it, but hid it in the bottom of a trunk. One day his playful buddies upset the trunk, found the portrait and Schude's arrest and exposure followed.

The spy arrived here from San Francisco in the custody of two Deputy United States Marshals. He said he was ready to plead guilty to posing as Lieut. Kincaid and of defrauding the Government of \$1,600, but denied he had operated at any time as a German Government spy in American army ranks.

Captured by French

"I came to the United States in 1913," he said, "and was here for five months. Then I went back to Germany, and the war started. I entered the German army and served until 1917, when I was captured by the French. I escaped, returned to Germany and entered the secret service."

"I got hold of the papers captured from Lieut. Kincaid, an American. I did not need them then, but kept them for an emergency. After the war I shot one of the leaders of the Communist party in Berlin, April 1919, and was sentenced to die on May 19. I managed to escape from prison by killing two men, and reached Brussels, where I fell ill."

Signed Pay Cheques.

"I told the Belgians I was a United States officer, and showed them Kincaid's papers. They notified the United States Legation, which sent me to Antwerp and later to Paris. Then I was brought to Fort Sheridan, Illinois. At the fort they told me to get a uniform, but I replied that I had no money. Then I signed a pay cheque voucher as Lieut. Kincaid, bought a uniform and went to San Francisco. By signing Kincaid's vouchers I received \$1,600 back pay. Everything I owned have worked out nicely had I only destroyed that photograph of myself in German uniform."
