Aeroplane Carries Gold to New York

GENERAL LEADER COMING HERE EARLY IN OCTOBER FROM VANCOUVER

Aeroplane Carries Gold and Two Dogs to New York

Kirkpatrick will fly up Umak River to look for Survey Party two weeks overdue.

PRINCE RUPERT, Sept. 11.—Plane number four arrived Thursday night but unfavorable weather conditions prevented taking flight yesterday for Hazelton. She hopes to start tomorrow. This plane will take the first shipment of the newly opened gold mine near Wrangell for delivery of the mine at New York. The plane will also carry a malamute and a husky.

Wrangell to Hazelton Lieut. Kirkpatrick will fly up the river to search for the twelve lost members of the inter-tribal survey crew, now two weeks overdue. Government Fights Republican Courts

New Law Gives Extensive Powers in Ireland which are being Used with Effect

DUBLIN, Sept. 11.—One important provision of the Irish Crimes Bill which was put into effect last month is that which gives power to try civil actions without a jury. It is intended to make short work of the activities of the Sinn Fein Courts which have revolutionized legal business, and largely reduced the Irish Bar to idleness.

The proceedings in criminal matters of Sinn Fein courts are already being dealt with by the police. When the Sinn Feiners arrest a man on a charge of theft or burglary or anything else the police treat the Sinn Feiners' action as a breach of the liberty of the subject who should be only triable by a lawful court. The Sinn Feiners are prosecuted for assault, tried by courtmartial and sentenced to long terms of imprisonment.

The civil trials by the Sinn Feiners are more difficult to deal with, for they can be argued to be merely arbitrations by consent of the parties. But the test to be applied is whether they purport to be trials by authority of the Irish republic and where that is apparent they may be held to be seditious and those taking part in them prosecuted.

Police have recently been attending all such Sinn Fein courts. They have not interfered with the proceedings but have taken the names of those engaged so that they may subsequently be tried by courtmartial. It is generally agreed that the government has, now, the most complete powers against the whole machinery of Sinn Fein but there is some doubt whether it will strenuously employ them. It will have to deal with hunger strikes on a large scale in the prisons.

ANOTHER SPEED BOAT FOR EXHIBITION RUN

U. Sugu is Building Hydroplane to Contest for Campbell Cup

Another speed boat is now being built at Cow Bay for the exhibition races. This one is for U. Sugu and promises to be a speedy craft. It is of hydroplane model, 20 feet long and 5 feet beam, and will be equipped with a 35 horse power high speed motor, the engine being that which was formerly in the Granby speed boat, Scout. Two carpenters, under the supervision of Mr. Sugu, are busily at work rushing the new boat for the forthcoming contest.

Preparations are being made for industrial exhibits in the fair building and it is expected there will be an unusually large number of entries this year.

The tourist trade to Skagway is just about over and the steamers are now being crowded with persons who are leaving the Yukon to spend the winter in the outside.

Ballantyne

Still Remembers.

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne still remembers Prince Rupert. More than that he is telling the people in the east about us. What better news could we have? The next important thing is to see ships sailing out of this port from the docks built by the Dominion Government.

There is no better place to be well known than in the seats of the mighty at Ottawa. If the ministers take an interest in this port we are like to get some attention from the Government. That is a good reason for welcoming the next important visitor, W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the opposition. He is in close touch with all legislation and it is quite possible that within a couple of years he may be occupying the same chair that is now used by Premier Meighen.

Co-ordination Scheme Satisfactory.

It is very satisfactory to the people of Prince Rupert that under the co-ordination scheme of the railways, there have been no radical changes in the local staff. The vacancy caused by the resignation of H. McCall has been filled by the appointment of N. B. Walton of Edmonton, who is promoted to the position he now holds. Capt. Nicholson and G. A. McNicholl have been re-appointed to their old positions and it is generally understood there are not likely to be any other radical changes in the staff. Places are being found for everyone.

The next thing we shall all be looking for is a daily train service between this city and Edmonton. The developments along the line are going ahead so fast that it cannot be long before at least three additional trains must be put on. It will pay the railway to give the service. Already the trains are very long and on at least one occasion this summer a second section had to be added to carry all the people. With a more frequent service there would be more travel this way. It would especially convenience commercial men who find it difficult to get around quickly enough if they call at the small places.

Chautauqua Leaves Pleasant Memories.

There were several first rate artists in the Canadian Chautauqua which has just concluded its visit to this city. The concerts were not well attended, with the exception of the last, but those who did attend all spoke well of the artists. It is to be hoped that they will return next year and that the arrangements may be such that everyone will take advantage of the opportunity to hear them. Artists deserving of special mention were Elsie May Gordon, the impersonator; Alice Genevieve Smith, the harpist; and Count Szeda, violinist. It is seldom that Prince Rupert people get an opportunity of hearing such as these.

Organize for Any Old Thing.

The word "organize" is on our lips so often that we hardly realize what it means. Usually it signifies the gathering of a few people who are interested in some cause, the election of officers and an executive committee and then the carrying on of a propaganda by one or two of the officers and committeemen. That is organization in the ordinary sense.

In its proper sense it is the banding together of a group of people in a common cause, the officers representing and gathering their enthusiasm from the members and being in close touch with them, never acting without their authority but representing them all the time.

There is also an organization, which is not uncommon, which consists of a set of officers and committeemen, elected by themselves, but never doing anything except getting some notehad printed with their names on it. This kind of organization dies a natural death within a reasonable period.

The mortality among organizations is almost as great as the number of births. Were it not so there would soon be enough organizations in existence for every man, woman and child to be a president.

C. now held by the Kitimaat team.

Gilbert Campbell, manager of the Sawmill baseball team, and his sawdust kids have taken a notion into their heads that they can stage a comeback at baseball and have invited the Red Sox up to the Acropolis Hill tomorrow to try conclusions again. Both teams have been strengthened somewhat and a hard tussle seems assured this time. The Red Sox themselves are not feeling at all faint and they are going up to maintain their reputation. The batteries will be McCullough and Matheison for the mill team and H. Astoria and Bob Frizzell for the Sox.

Hazelton proved altogether too fast for the Smithers G. T. P. team in the first of the Gray Cup football matches at Smithers last Sunday and won by a 6-1 score. At no time were the Smithers dangerous and good sportsmanship was certainly displayed by the boys from the Skeena. The Misses Waitie proved great boosters rooting in the grand stand.

The sports at the Telkwa Barbecue this year were largely instrumental in its success. In the morning a football game between Smithers and the G. T. P. proved a tie. After the barbecue beef had been served to hundreds at noon, Telkwa tied into Hazelton and beat that town by a score of 10 to 6 in one of the best played baseball games ever played in the interior. Several interesting horse races including the Bulkley Valley Derby were run off in the late afternoon. The dance at night was the usual big success, the Telkwa hall being filled to capacity. Four in the morning saw the last of the dancers away.

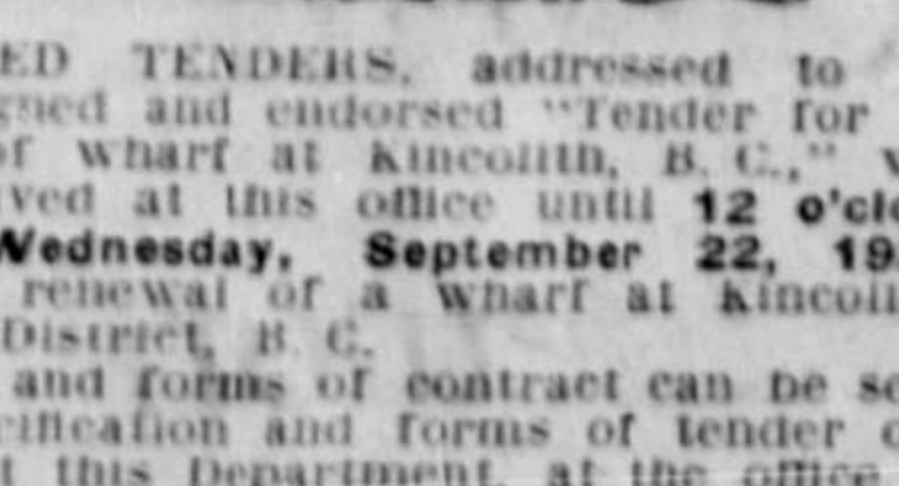

FINAL NIGHT OF CHAUTAUQUA

Splendid Musical Program and Interesting Lecture by Private Peat.

SAYS PEOPLE SHOULD BOOST FOR COUNTRY

Lecturer Urges More Flag Waving and National Selfishness in Canada.

With a good attendance filling the seats at the Auditorium last night, the Chautauqua performers seemed to warm up to their recitals and one of the most artistic and varied programs ever offered to Prince Rupert audiences was presented. It was indeed a treat and great appreciation was shown for every artist was applauded again and again.

The Royal Willow Four opened the program with their versatile numbers; Miss Julia Morse, soprano soloist, and Miss Charlotte Silverson Foreman, pianist, following. These artists were as excellent as before. Elsie May Gordon again pleased everyone with her wonderful gift of impersonation which enabled her to mimic in quick succession the New York Italian fruit vendor, plantation negroes and the disconsolate child. Miss Alice Genevieve Smith was again delightful with her harp numbers, the final number being a bright melody by the Royal Willow Four to her harp accompaniment.

Count Oton Szeda.

Count Oton Szeda was heard for the first time and from the time his bow first crossed the strings of his violin the audience knew that there was an artist before them. Count Szeda is a wizard at chording, pizzicato and harmonics. It seems that at no time does he play on a single string but a beautiful chording produces more music than an ordinary person would believe could come from a violin. A violinist of Count Szeda's skill and technique is not often heard in this country and he was much appreciated last night.

Countess Szeda is hardly less gifted. Besides playing several accompaniments for her husband she gave classical solos as well. She is a delightful player.

Private Peat Lectures.

The last number on the program was the lecture on Canadianism by Private Harold R. Peat, the president of the Canadian Chautauquas. Private Peat is an easy speaker and is very forceful but he is not dry, for his lecture was interspersed with much humor.

United States, a country with the same environment and the same ideals.

"I have just completed a tour of the United States and the one thing that I noticed wherever I went was the national selfishness. The Americans think their country is the greatest on earth and are not ashamed to tell about it. Why every little city in that country capitalizes something and something they possess they maintain is the greatest in the world. In one town I remember they boasted because they had the greatest roof in the world—an asylum roof. What's the matter with Canada?"

National Selfishness.

"The trouble with Canada is that she lacks this national selfishness which has been so instrumental in making the United States the great country it is. We know too much about other people and not enough about ourselves. Our children know as much about American geography and history as they know about their own country. Why they are taught in school to think California is the most beautiful country in America. Rot! For beauty this province of British Columbia would put California a hundred times in the shade. Why are the boys and girls not taught to realize it? What we must do is pump the national importance of his country into the Canadian boy."

"Do you know, a Canadian boy seems ashamed of his king and country. You may say derogatory remarks about the King to him, but try saying things to an American boy about the Statue of Liberty and see what happens. The children are being taught 5 per cent Britishism and 95 per cent foreignism when it should be the other way around. Canadians do not impress foreigners because the people do not tell of their importance. If Canadians would capitalize what they possess and realize their greatness this condition would soon be changed. We lack national spirit for we did not learn it as children. Now is the time, let's start waving the flag and it will impress others. And above all instill into our children the sense of their national greatness."

TWO GOOD REASONS

Two good economical reasons why you should eat more fish: It is cheap and nutritious, and provides a thrifty meal.

One of Canada's greatest sources of wealth is her fisheries, and you help develop the industry by eating fish, and also help to put Canada in a better financial position.

Probably you are not aware how little fish Canadian people use.

Great Britain is one of the greatest fish consuming countries in the world. During 1918 she had a per capita consumption of 58 pounds, and in 1919, it is believed, this was increased to 60 pounds. This means that each individual consumed at the rate of more than one pound per week.

In the United States last year it is estimated by officials at Washington the per capita consumption was 49 pounds. Although little reliance can be placed on this estimate, there is no doubt but that the local consumption in the United States has increased greatly in recent years.

A few years ago the per capita consumption in Canada per annum was a matter of ounces. Through the combined efforts of the Canada Food Board and the Fisheries Branch it is estimated that the local consumption at one time reached a point equal to 45 pounds per capita. During 1919 it is estimated the per capita consumption was somewhere between 23 and 25 pounds per annum.

Canada is one of the greatest, if not the greatest, fish producing countries of the world. Why have our people so little faith in fish?

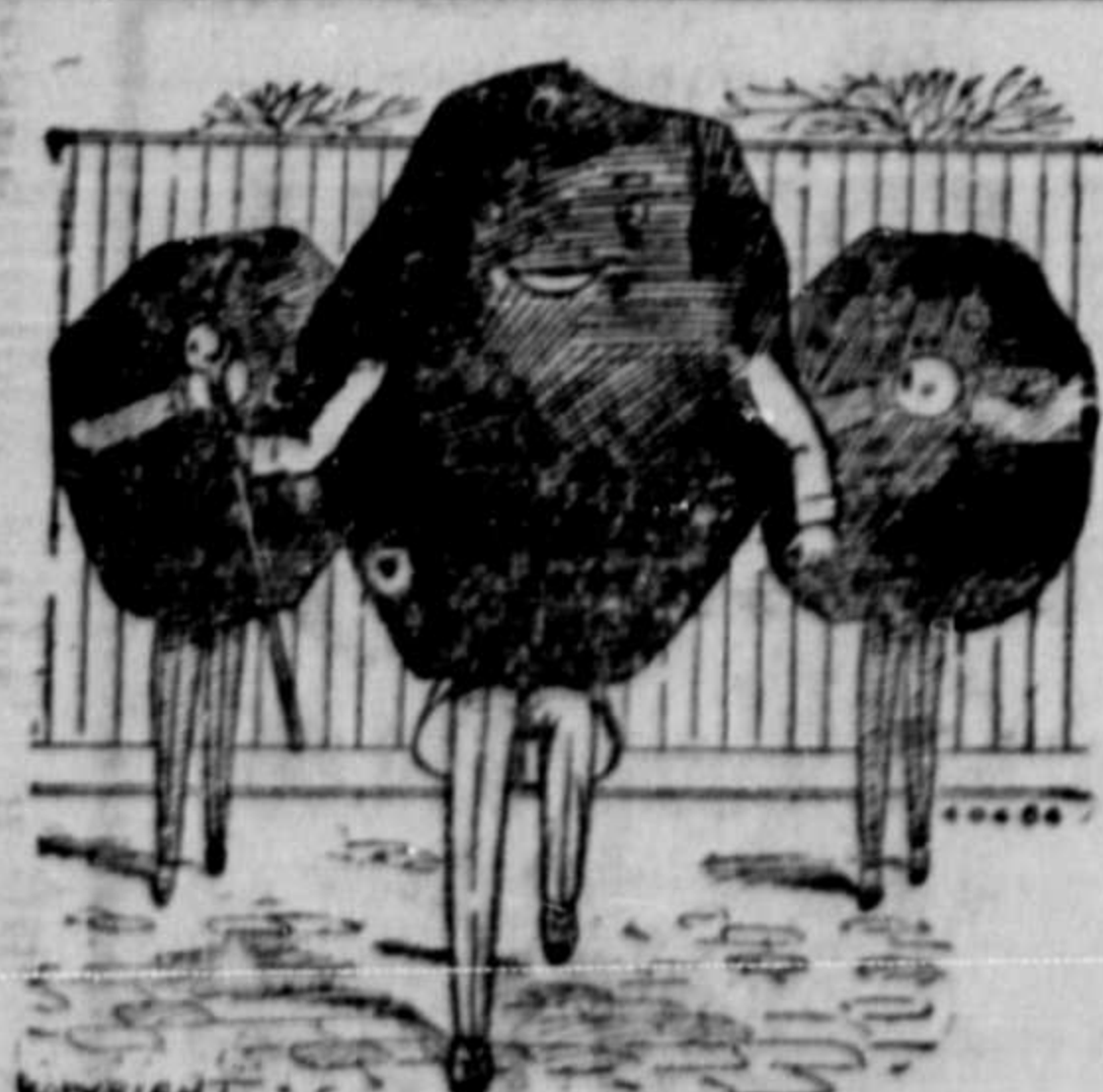

SPEAKER'S CHAIR TO BE READY SOON

LONDON, Sept. 11.—The Speaker's Chair, which is to be presented to the Canadian House of Commons by the members of the Empire Parliamentary Association in the House of Lords and Commons, is expected to be ready in time for the opening of the new House of Commons in Ottawa early next year. Hitherto, the Canadian speaker, like the English speaker in former times, removed his chair on the termination of his office. This chair will remain permanently, an abiding token of good will between both Parliaments. It will be constructed of oak in its natural state, to correspond with the woodwork of the new Canadian House of Commons which is of oak that has not been oiled, stained, varnished, or polished, but left in its natural condition. For the Royal Arms surmounting the chair timber taken from the roof of Westminster Hall will be used. The Royal Arms and Tudor Roses are worked on the canopy.

It was thought that it might be desirable to introduce the maple leaf also, but Lieut. Col. Amery, M.P., Under-Secretary for the Colonies, while in Ottawa recently attending the West Indies Conference, took the opportunity of consulting the speaker of the Canadian House of Commons on the matter, and he was assured that no alteration in the design of the chair was desired.
