Aeroplane Station for Prince Rupert OVER QUARTER OF A MILLION POUNDS OF FISH MARKETED YESTERDAY

Twenty-Foot Shortt Plane Has Arrived at Vancouver

Capable of Making Flight to this City; Carries Five People, Pilot, Observer, Wirelesser, Photographer and Mechanic

Prince Rupert to Have Landing Field and Hangar

Location Needed in North for Planes used in Fisheries and Forest Patrol Service

VANCOUVER, September 13.—A big English Shortt seaplane arrived here for the Air Board station. It is a magnificent craft capable of making a non-stop flight from here to Prince Rupert.

The airplane will carry five persons—a pilot, observer, wirelesser, photographer and mechanic, and will be located at quarters at the new station being prepared at Kitsilano. The start will be made in the spring at Prince Rupert. Preparation of a landing field for aeroplanes and it is to be ready for the accommodation of the planes which are used in the fisheries and forest patrol next year. Hangars and a hangar will be erected there.

The first official airboard flight with the new machine will be from Vancouver to Kamloops.

RAILWAY RATES GO INTO EFFECT TODAY

OTTAWA, Sept. 13.—The Dominion Government refuses to interfere in the matter of the railway rates increase. The new rates go into effect today. The government recognizes the right to appeal.

BETTER RATES ARE ASKED ON THE STEAMERS

Board of Trade Takes up Matter of High Charges With Heads of Traffic Department.

Among the subjects discussed with the railway men on Saturday was that of discriminatory rates for northern ports and to the Islands. F. G. Dawson outlined the complaint showing that while the passenger rate from Vancouver to Victoria was \$2.50, the rate for the same distance from Prince Rupert to Anyox was \$8.10, and to Stewart, a distance of 120 miles, \$12.65, and there were no special rates for commercial men. He thought these rates much too high. Better rates might not pay the company any better directly at first but they would help build up these smaller communities and the company depended on the building up of the country for its future business.

The rates to the Islands were rather better, but still too high. Dealing with freight rates, Mr. Dawson showed that the rates Prince Rupert to Anyox, Alice Arm and Stewart were little different from the rates from Vancouver to the same places. An adjustment of these would help business here. Space rates were charged here against weight rates between Vancouver, Seattle and Victoria. If the rates were adjusted there would be no difficulty in establishing a wholesale hardware concern here. At present, however, there was no advantage in opening at this point.

The need of running a small boat out of this port to cater to local trade was gone into at some length, a craft about the size of the Titamook being suggested as suitable for the business. These would call at Skeena River, Naas River, Surf Inlet and other points. Mr. Hayes promised to look into all these matters and give them careful consideration.

TWO YEARS FOR DESERTING IN OLD COUNTRY

Court Martial at Victoria Held in Presence of Work Point Troops.

VICTORIA, Sept. 13.—In the presence of the troops at Work Point barracks, Cecil Grahame of Saanich was court martialled and given two years for desertion during the war. Grahame was drafted in 1918 and got to the old country, where he was given leave to visit Ireland. He then hid and got away to the United States. He was arrested on his return to Saanich.

Sentences to be Passed Next Thursday Morning

Magistrate McMordie says No Reason for Further Adjourning; Kenneth McKay Convicted

There was a large assembly of interested spectators in the police court this morning to hear the expected sentences of persons convicted over the recent whiskey investigations, but these sentences were not pronounced and remands were further made until September 16. These adjournments were made on the request of the city solicitor this time and Magistrate McMordie in granting them stated that there would be no further remands after that date, if the evidence was extended. The main public interest now centers around the convictions and the evidence seems to be becoming tiresome. There is still evidence to be taken in the selling charge against S. A. Corley.

Olsen and Black.
In the Olsen and Black case this morning W. E. Williams, appearing for the accused, argued that there was no evidence to connect Black with the alleged sale. It had been made to the detectives by Olsen and under the B. C. Prohibition Act, although a stranger or servant making the sale would leave the occupant responsible, still there was nothing to say that a co-occupant was guilty because his partner had made the sale. City Solicitor Hooper pointed out that B. C. statutes made occupant either a plural or a singular number and it was a well known principle that two partners could be guilty of an illegal act. It would be absurd to have an occupant responsible for the acts of a stranger or a servant and not of a partner. Adjourning was made until September 16.

Other Cases.
Kenneth McKay was found guilty of a second offence under the Prohibition Act and was remanded until tomorrow for sentencing. The Miller, Sweet and Olier Besner selling cases were all remanded until September 16. "I see no reason why sentence should not be pronounced then," said the magistrate, "and if the notes are extended I shall not remand them any further." The S. A. Corley case has been remanded until tomorrow for the city solicitor to give consideration to the advisability of using the Kenneth McKay evidence in this case.

ITALY TROOPS QUELL REVOLT

Outbreak of Socialists in Milan and Trieste Looked Threatening for a Time

MILAN, Sept. 13.—A Socialist revolt was suppressed by the Italian troops at Trieste at the week-end. For a time the streets were barricaded and a battle took place between the military and the revolutionaries. Some Milan chemical works were occupied by workmen, who hoisted their red flags on the signal being given.

The question of providing cargoes for ships sailing out of this port was discussed at some length at the meeting of the Board of Trade on Saturday afternoon at which C. A. 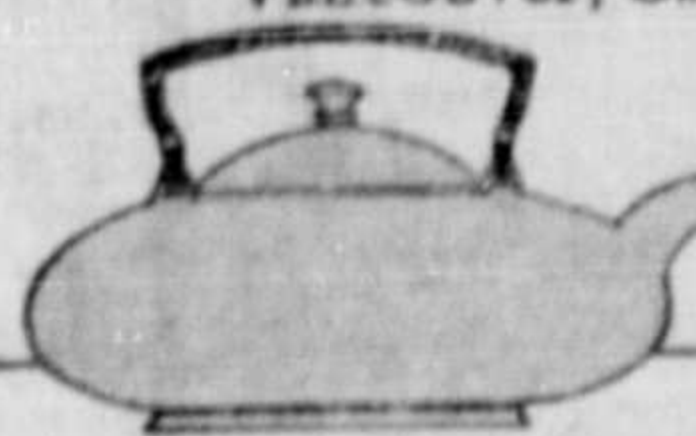

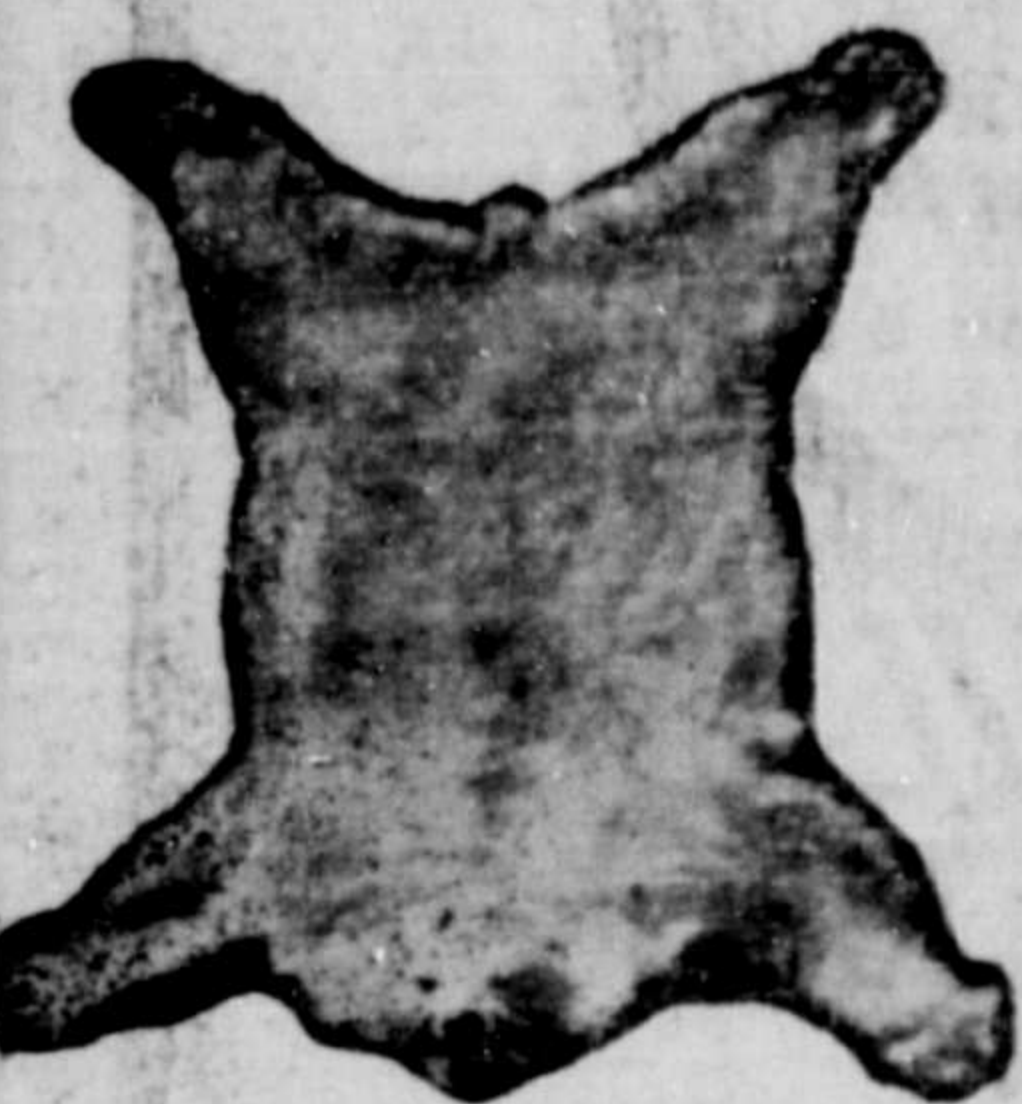

Is Thriving Coast Town Says Russell R. Walker Writing of This City

Russell R. Walker, who visited this city along with Premier Oliver and Hon. T. D. Pattullo recently, representing the Vancouver Province, writes most interestingly of this city in a recent number of his paper. He says:

"To the casual visitor Prince Rupert is a thriving coast town, romantic in the extreme, and inviting to a very marked degree. To the careful investigator the northern terminal city is as substantial as the rock foundation upon which she stands, and her future is like that of all Western Canada, rosy as an optimist's dream."

"Fifteen years ago the population of Prince Rupert consisted of seasonal employees at coastal canneries, Indians, and a sprinkling of white traders, trappers and linemen, whose simple needs were looked after by the frontier stores of the Hudson's Bay Company. Twelve years ago western construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway was commenced and Prince Rupert came into existence as a distribution point for men and material. In 1914 the work of construction was completed, and its train of contractors, laborers, pioneers and speculators left for other fields, leaving behind them the nucleus of today's population, which the natural development of the country's resources has considerably increased during the past five years."

"Fishing Leadership. Northern British Columbia holds the undisputed leadership of the deep-sea fishing trade of the Pacific Coast, a position it has won in four years. It also contributes 80 per cent. of the raw salmon and canned products of the same exported or consumed in British Columbia and Canada. At the present time Prince Rupert has a fishing fleet of 76 halibut schooners, 459 gasoline boats of three tons each, engaged in salmon trolling, and in addition 179 American halibut schooners make Prince Rupert their headquarters from January to November each year. There is also the salmon fishing fleet operating from the canneries in the district, which consists approximately of 2,300 sailing boats and thirty-five fish pacs and tugs."

"This deep-sea industry should alone bring prosperity to any city. Some 2,000 men are engaged in the trade, and new plants are being erected and old ones enlarged. One plant alone employs 400 men and ships in refrigerator cars, and in the frozen state, salmon, halibut and cod to all parts of Canada and the eastern states. This company can store ten million pounds of fish above its main floor."

"Mills Kept Busy. Everyone conversant with Canadian war production is familiar with the airplane spruce industry. Prince Rupert mills are today cutting into No. 1 lumber Sitka spruce logs cut by the Imperial Munitions Board for airplane construction. The flying machine made the Sitka spruce of northern British Columbia famous. It could not be cut fast enough to supply the demand, but at that 217,000,000 feet were cut in 1918 and 218,000,000 feet in 1919. Last year 29 sawmills were operating, with a combined cutting capacity of a million feet per day. Two pulp mills produced 87,233 tons of pulp and 69,000 tons of paper. No less than 56,000 million shingles were turned out, the total value of all timber products during last year being \$9,140,433."

"Prince Rupert looks off to the south at her big sister Vancouver not with envy, but with genuine admiration and a determination to get into the limelight more and more. There is more than enough for all, she maintains, and to substantiate her claim to a place in the sun points to her All-Red Route to the Orient, which is the shortest between Europe and the Far East and saves 24 hours' steaming on the Pacific. Looking eyes are also cast upon the Alaskan fish trade, which now totals 100,000 tons a year. The Canadian National lines will eventually carry this freight to market, is the claim."

"Wonderful Harbor. The little northern city, now claiming a population of 8,000, has a wonderful harbor. Modern dry dock and ship repair service may be had and fuel oil distribution is provided for. Wharfage accommodation is limited as yet, but Rupertites are highly exuberant over the prospects of increased dockage facilities. The recent visit of the minister of marine appears to have been considered a red-letter occasion and the construction of new ships and wharves is on the industrial program."

"Prince Rupert has no surrounding farming districts, but she is the doorway to the rich agricultural lands of the Skeena and Bulkley valleys, drawing food products already from these districts in large quantities. Only last week the first shipment of live cattle was received from the Bulkley Valley, and slaughtered for local consumption. The small valleys tributary to the Skeena contain splendid farm lands and are being opened up rapidly."

"All is not business in the new city of the north. Here is found a hunter's paradise. Within a few hours' ride may be found the best of deer, goat, bear and bird hunting. The shores, lakes and (Continued on Page Six.)"

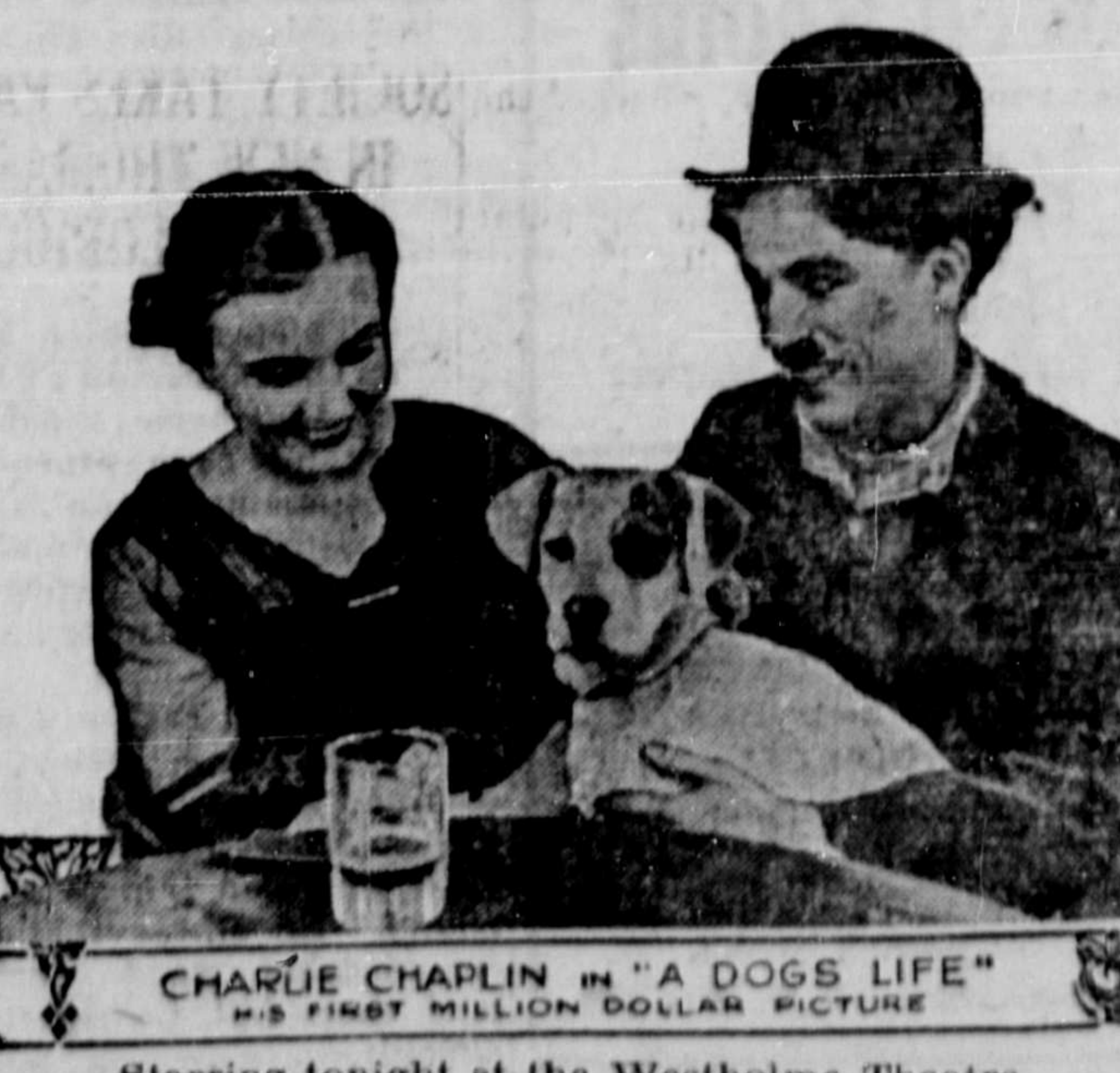

HAIDA CHIEF PASSES AWAY

Charles Edenshaw Leaves Many Descendants at Masset and Other Points.

HIS TRIBE FORMERLY RULED WHOLE COAST

The Indians of Queen Charlotte Islands are mourning the loss of the oldest and most respected Chief of the Haidas, Charles Edenshaw passed away on September 10 at his home on the Massett Reserve. He was the first Chief Edenshaw and aged seventy years.

For many years before the arrival of the whites the Edenshaws ruled, from the shores of Alaska to Vancouver Island. At the head of the most powerful band of warriors, they warred with almost every tribe between the Columbia river in Oregon and the Fraser river. The tribes under the chiefship of the Edenshaws numbered many thousands of Haidas; but the nation is passing, with but six hundred comprising the bands whose deserted settlements may be seen from one end of the Queen Charlotte Islands to the other.

Fine Carvings.

Chief Charles Edenshaw during late years engaged in reproducing the gold, silver, slate and wooden carvings, so much prized by visitors. His handiwork is on view in many museums and other places in Europe and the United States. He was a quiet, unassuming Christian, having accepted the teachings of the missionaries on their first visit to Massett. He leaves a large number of relatives in Alaska, Skidegate and Massett. A widow and three daughters reside on Queen Charlotte Islands. Henry Edenshaw is a nephew of deceased.

The Funeral.

The funeral was held at Massett. Contingents of relatives and friends, from all portions of the district formerly under the chiefship of the deceased, attended the funeral, which took place from the Anglican Church on Massett reserve which the dead chief assisted in constructing over half a century ago, and of which he was one of the most consistent of members during many years.

The Red Sox defeated the Saw Mill in a rather loose game of baseball at the Acropolis grounds yesterday afternoon. The final score was 13-8 and the Sox were decidedly the superior team. E. A. Donahue was strikes and balls umpire and Smith officiated at the bases.

In the departure of James Mitchell and his sister, Caroline, for the University of B.C. last night, athletic circles in the city will feel a loss. Jimmie was a consistently good football and baseball player with the Callies and Red Sox and Miss Caroline was an enthusiastic supporter of intermediate baseball, her lot, however, being cast with the team of her younger brother, George, the Colts.

SOCIETY TAKES PART IN NEW THOMAS PLAY "THE GLORIOUS LADY"

Members of Exclusive Social Club
Appear in Spectacular
Race Scene.

It is not frequent that theatre audiences are furnished the titbit of seeing society people play roles in a picture play, but this is the case in Olive Thomas' picture, "The Glorious Lady," which will be shown at the Westholme to-night.

KETCHIKAN LIGHT AND POWER COMPANY ASKS FOR EXTENSION

KETCHIKAN, Sept. 11.—Application has been made to the city council by the Citizen's-Light, Power and Water Company for a twenty year extension of its franchise.

The preamble to the application states that the growth of the city necessitates an expansion of the company's plant, but that the expenditure would not be justified unless the company had a definite renewal of its franchise.

The present franchise will expire in the spring of 1922, but the company desires to start work on extensions previous to that time.

After receiving the application last night, the council tabled it for consideration at a special meeting to be held in the near future.

At the general election last spring, a referendum petition was adopted in favor of an extension of the franchise and another petition was adopted in opposition to municipal ownership. The law provides that the council shall first pass an ordinance for the extension, which ordinance must be submitted to the voters for their approval.

TON OF BEEF IN SANDWICHES

Half Million People have Attended Industrial Picnics in Pittsburg This Year

PITTSBURG, Sept. 13.—More than 500,000 persons have this year attended the picnics given by industrial concerns in Pittsburg to their employees, according to the estimates of amusement park managers and a number of the most important are yet to be held. Arrangements for these great gatherings of workmen and their families are on a colossal scale and carried out by an efficient organization of trained engineers and office men. It occasionally happens, as in the case of the Clairton plant of the Carnegie Steel Company, that no picnic ground was available. So the engineers selected a nice bit of virgin forest not far from the town, built good roads in and through it, erected merry-go-rounds and other traditional amusement devices, built refreshment booths and a dancing platform, and when the thousands of steel workers and their families reached the place for a day's enjoyment they found it as complete as if it had been standing for years.

"The quantity of provisions required for the entertainment for a big plant and its workers astonishes those who know little of such enterprises. At one industrial picnic held here recently three tons of beef and four tons of boiled ham were required for the sandwiches. Five thousand loaves of bread were used, three men working fifty hours to cut it to size.

For the 45,000 persons who attended this picnic there were issued 65,000 free tickets for park amusements; 45,000 American flags and 40,000 toy balloons for children were distributed and 45,000 souvenir buttons were given to the workers and their families, while 50,000 knives, forks, spoons and plates were sent to the grounds for the picnic supper.

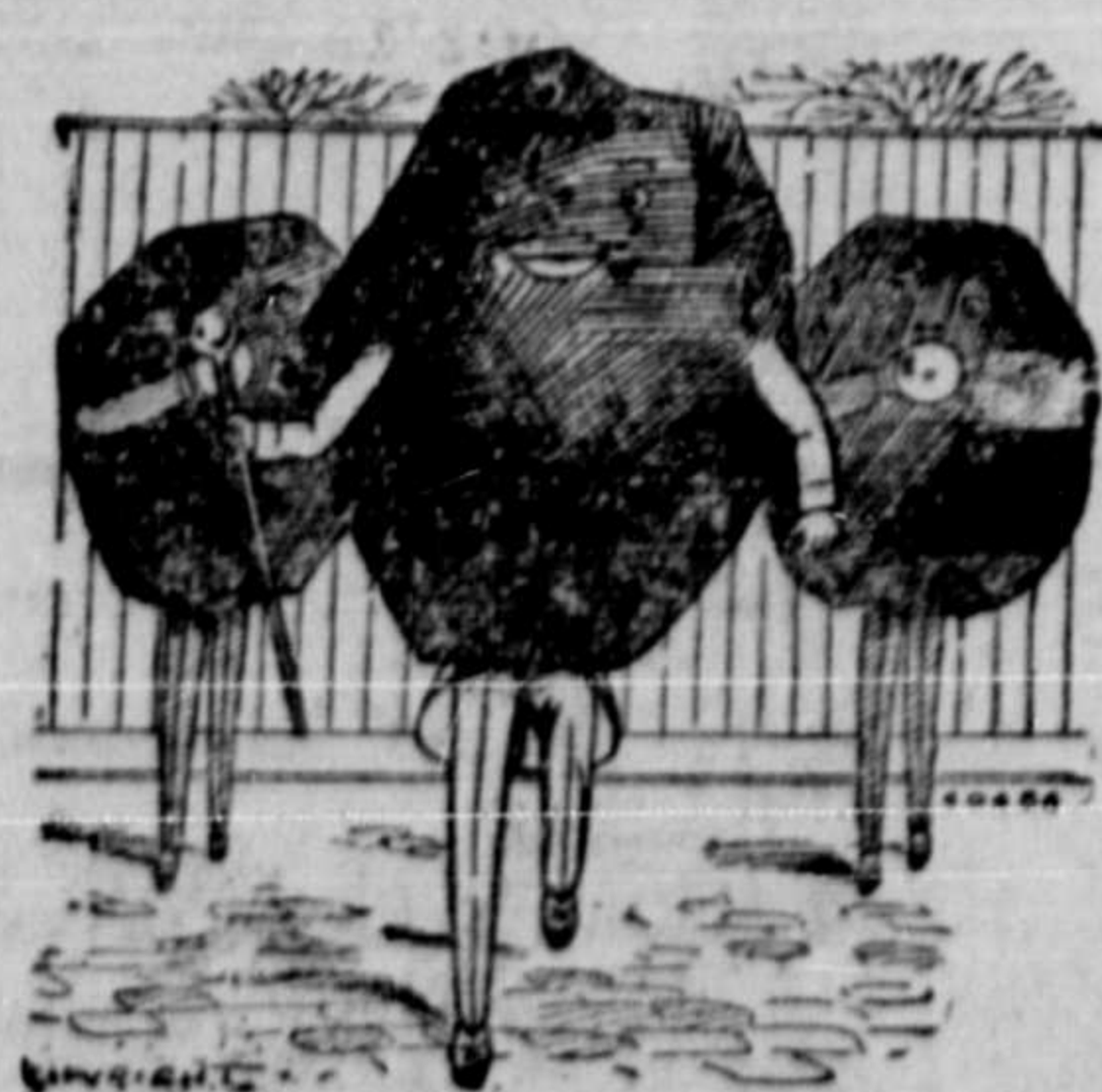
