SENTENCES GIVEN IN LIQUOR TRAFFICKING CASES NEW YORK SHAKEN BY TERRIFIC EXPLOSION; KILLS AND INJURES MANY

Five Liquor Sellers Given Hard Labor at Okalla Farm

morning saw the closing scene in the police court as far as selling charges against Charles Olsen, George A. Sweet, D. The room was crowded with spectators to see the accused face punishment. Tonight these five will leave in custody of police to the Prince Rupert to serve their time. Appeals are being made in each instance and defending counsel are losing no time in action. With the exception of S. A. Corley, who was fined, it is understood, will go before the supreme court of appeal.

In Black and Olsen case, the magistrate agreed with the defense that Thomas Black was not involved and, therefore, convicted Charles Olsen and dismissed the charge against Thomas Black. "It is my duty as a magistrate and that is Magistrate South. You may think that I should be guided by the South decision, but I don't."

British Law

"No, you are not bound by it, but it is generally the custom of magistrates to follow the precedents of their fellow magistrates and have the changing to the higher courts. It would not be British law to convict the accused of a second offence."

Terrific Explosion Heart of New York

Bodies of Victims found in Streets of Manhattan; Stock Exchange Ordered Closed

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—A terrific explosion which shook all of Lower Manhattan occurred today outside of the office of the J. P. Morgan Co., of Wall Street. Several were killed and several were injured.

NEW YORK—(11 o'clock). The police estimate of the number of injured is placed at 200.

NEW YORK—(12 o'clock). The unofficial estimate places the dead in this morning's street explosion at thirty.

International Court

At The Hague.

The despatches announce that it is proposed to establish an international court at The Hague. The idea is a good one although not new. The difficulty will be in enforcing the decisions of the court. Nations like individuals have not yet learned to work in concert.

The United States Republican idea is that it is not correct to try to enforce the findings of the court, but to use moral suasion. That is as useless as trying to induce temperance by supplying all the liquor and beer possible and advising people not to touch it. We are too young in development to expect to get along for many generations to come without using force. Mind is greater than matter, but matter counts a good deal yet.

It would be a distinct advantage for the United States to join the League of Nations, but it is for them to decide. In the meantime it is satisfactory to think that the league is getting into working order without the aid of the States.

Labor Paper

Plays with Fire.

After taking some Soviet money and holding it for a time the labor newspaper, The Herald, has found that public opinion is so much opposed to the idea of the paper accepting the bribe that it has decided to refuse. It took a long time for the owners of the paper to choose the strait and narrow path, but it has come out right in the end.

The sending of cash to the Herald is making people wonder to what extent other papers are in the pay of the Bolsheviks. The model Russian Government seems to consider bribery to be a virtue rather than a failing. It is possible too that the Herald would have accepted that money if it had not become known to the public that it had been received.

The News is not blaming the Herald. Financing a labor paper is very difficult. It simply goes to show that labor leaders are no more infallible than other people, and that when they pose as the only exponents of honest government or honest living we know that they have not yet met the tempter or that they are of the minority.

Interest Here
In 16th Battalion.

Much interest will be taken here in the reorganization of the 16th Battalion as a peacetime military unit. A number of Prince Rupert boys were members of the 16th overseas and Col. Peck is still to be its head. Just what arrangements the Colonel will make are not apparent, but the fact that it is his regiment will make Prince Rupert people take a keen interest in its success for years to come.

The water sports commence at 1 o'clock with a grand water carnival parade from the City Hall. A band will lead the way to the water front, where there will be the opening with naval salute and parade of harbor craft from steamers down. There will be a trawl setting contest, which will be quickly followed by water races of all kinds. At 2:15 the Campbell Cup speed boat race, in which much interest is centered, will commence. Log rolling contests and aquaplaning will be further features. The entries for the pleasure boat race for the Rowing Club challenge cup will close on September 20.

The committee in charge of the rowing and canoeing contests is especially desirous that there should be a large number of entries. The races at the Labor Day celebration in these classes were not well entered, with the result that there were prize-winners the quality of whose racing was not of very much worth. There will be canoe race doubles for men, doubles for lady and gentleman and row boat races the same, with also an event for boys. The ladies, it is hoped, will turn out in force and do their share. The races are healthful and graceful and the prizes are very substantial.

President Irigoyen, of Argentine Republic, and his cabinet are considering projects of law for the suppression of infiltration of horse racing, it is announced.

Buenos Aires has one of the finest race courses in the world operated by its famous Jockey Club, where millions of pesos change hands in a year under the pari-mutuel betting system.

Races are held twice a week, Thursdays and Sundays, and on the frequent holidays.

The attendance is from 15,000 to 20,000 persons.

The newspapers have commented on the fact that, as a corollary to the mounting cost of living, the betting public has increased its wagers on the races. Where total bets on a Sunday were formerly 800,000 pesos, they now sometimes aggregate 3,000,000 pesos.

The administration believes that the Thursday races, at least, ought to be suppressed.

Louis A. Firpo, South American heavyweight boxing champion, is soon to visit the United States, where he will seek the advantages to be derived from good trainers and expert management.

Firpo weighs 213 pounds. His title was gained by defeating boxers in Chile and other South American countries.

In a match in Buenos Aires in June he knocked out Antonio Jirsa, who styles himself the "Czecho-Slovak champion," in the first three minute round of a scheduled 10 round bout.

Firpo has a considerable ring history and before taking up boxing was a professional Greco-Roman wrestler.





SPEED BOATS SOON READY FOR RACES

Three Under Construction Here
Are Making Good Progress
in Builders' Hands.

SUGU'S CRAFT MAY PROVE TO BE SPEEDY

George Frizzell's "Violet F. III"
Has the Advantage of
Great Power.

Great progress is being made on speed boat construction at Cow Bay and the three new local contenders for the Campbell trophy in the exhibition races are rapidly nearing completion. U. Sugu and George J. Frizzell have their boats at the Sugu boatbuilding shop, while Tommy Hooper is building his in the attic over the Imperial Machine Shop. The boats were each looked over yesterday morning by a representative of the Daily News and each owner seems to be confident that Ed. Campbell's "Wayward Girl" is not going to carry the Northern B. C. hydroplane championship back to the smelter town this year.

U. Sugu's boat is of a unique design, the original planning for which was done by its owner. It is of shallow draft and is semi-tunnelled, giving the hull a convex or concave shape. If this craft will displace the water properly as planned it should be of great speed. It is powered with a 35 horsepower Delmore marine engine, the machine having formerly been in the Anyox boat "Scout." The hull of the new boat is practically finished but the deckwork is still to do. The engine is not installed and will not be until after the launching.

The hull of Tommy Hooper's sea sled "Folly II" is also finished and the deck work is nearing completion. This craft, which has been described before, has a 35 horsepower Pierce-Arrow motor. The Folly resembled a barge somewhat in shape and is square at bow and stern.

George Frizzell's "Laura No. 3" is the furthest advanced as far as construction is concerned. It is painted and is ready for the water, so launching will take place in a day or so. This new boat is 22 feet long and is to have the 60 horsepower Winfon engine formerly in the "Laura No. 2."

Alterations, including the installation of a new propeller, are being made to Kenny Roos' "Buddy." It is expected that she will have her speed greatly enhanced by the changes.

Speculation as to the outside competition is still rife. Besides the "Wayward Girl," it is altogether likely that Anyox will be further represented in the event on Saturday week. "Dark horses" from all over are rumored, Port Simpson, Ocean Falls and Ketchikan being prominently mentioned now.

CARBOLIC HAS CREAMY FLAVOR IN COMPARISON

J. A. Shanks Gives Prince Rupert Some Notoriety on Return from Visit

J. A. Shanks, who was recently here for a short stay, and who was employed for a few days as barber at the Empress shop, has been spreading himself on Prince Rupert as he saw it, or perhaps it would be more appropriate to say as he tasted it. This is the yarn as published in one of the Victoria papers:

"Men once regarded as the north country's most substantial citizens have become dispensers of tobacco juice whisky, rot-gut booze and other forms of bootleg liquor and they are dying hard, according to J. A. 'Five Points' Shanks, who returned to Victoria yesterday after an extended tour through the Bulkley Valley and a fairly lengthy visit to Prince Rupert.

Mr. Shanks, who some time ago announced himself as candidate for police commissioner here, says the wood alcohol flunks will be ruthlessly treated if he is ever elected.

Writing from Prince Rupert, Mr. Shanks said:

"At present this metropolis of the north is all agog on the subject of bootlegging. Large seizures of liquor have been made and a dozen or so erstwhile respected citizens are out on bail. That is as it should be. The law should be no respecter of persons when it comes to crime, and especially such a heinous offence as supplying rot-gut to a bunch of hard-working fools who are ready to drink it."

"I presume in Victoria one can secure a very fair grade of intoxicants through illegal channels, but up in this north country the stuff that these birds call whisky and sell for \$20 a bottle is an outrage of the vilest kind."

Wood Alcohol for 'Pep'

"I have heard that it is a composition of chewing tobacco soaked in methylated spirits, to which is added a dash of wood alcohol to give it 'pep.' That as it may, my own impression, after taking a 'shot,' was that I want no more. It is the fiercest concoction I ever saw under a cork; carbolic acid has a creamy flavor compared to it."

"But one of the side lights on this condition here strikes me as peculiar, and that is the sympathy that many people express for some of the culprits. I have heard numerous solid business men lament the fact that so-and-so, naming some particular dispenser of rot-gut, has been pinched. Moreover, they would express the hope that a fine would cover his wrongdoing, though he was up for his second or third offence, which calls for a time sentence. For my part, I have more respect for a legitimate hold-up artist; he at least lets you go clear-brained and sensible if you'll hand over your roll."

Blind Pigs Everywhere.

"Prince Rupert, though, is by no means alone in the blind pig industry. All through this north country evidence of booze consumption is apparent. Drunks are noticeable in any town you visit, and the general salutation seems

to be, 'Have you got anything on your hip?'

"I must say that the fellow who gives you a drink of good stuff for a rational price, even if he is breaking the law, should have more lenient consideration than the bird with the wood alcohol mixture, whose only object is to get the dough. One is really supplying a necessary evil, which has the legitimate claim of longstanding habit. The other, however, is creating an appetite for a new and worse evil, for I am told that those who acquire a liking for this awful concoction of chewing tobacco and its accessories go clean bug-house after a spell. They lose all interest in ordinary business pursuits, but search and crave only for more and more of this vile intoxicant."

Mining News

PREMIER SUMMER WORK

Operations at the Premier Mine, Stewart, during the summer are reported to have been highly satisfactory. The work has been of a development and construction nature, as it has been found to be more economical to ship ore in the winter when the snows may be used to advantage in getting the ore from the hills to tide-water. A great deal of diamond drilling has been done during the summer and the proving of the main ore body at 675 feet is very satisfactory, for many engineers had expressed doubts as to the depth. The bottom tunnel should hit the ore body in about another 30 feet and if the size and richness persists at this point all doubts as to the bigness of the mine will be removed. Some optimists say the concentrator will be operating at the Premier this winter, but many experts say this will be impossible so soon. 

five years and make improvements to
value of \$10 per acre, including clearing
and cultivation of at least 5 acres
before registration.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not
less than 5 years and has made proportionate
improvements, he may, but
not otherwise, apply for a certificate of
improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent resi-
dence may be issued, provided applic-
ant makes improvements to extent of
\$10 per annum and records same each
year. Right to make improvements
or record same will operate as for
feiture. Title cannot be obtained in
less than 5 years, and improvements of
\$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres
cleared and cultivated, and residence
of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant
may record another pre-emption, if he
requires land in conjunction with his
present and actual occupation, pro-
vided statutory limit is not exceeded.
