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SENTENCES GIVEN IN LIQUOR TRAFFICKING CASES

NEW YORK SHAKEN BY TERRIFIC EXPLOSION; KILLS AND INJURES MANY

Five Liquor Sellers Given Hard Labor at Okalla Farm

One gets a year, Sweet, Zarelli and Olsen nine months each and McKay six months; Going South Tonight

This morning saw the closing scene in the police court as far as the liquor trafficking charges against Charles Olsen, George A. Sweet, D. Zarelli and Kenny McKay are concerned, when each was sentenced by Magistrate McMordie to various terms of confinement at Okalla prison farm with hard labor. The court was crowded with spectators to see the accused face their sentences. Tonight these five will leave in custody of police officers to serve their time. Appeals are being taken in each instance and defending counsel are losing no time in connection. With the exception of S. A. Corley, who was fined, all appeals, it is understood, will go before the supreme court tomorrow.

In the Black and Olsen case, the magistrate agreed with the counsel for the defence that Thomas Black was not involved and, therefore, convicted Charles Olsen and discharging the charge against Thomas Black. "It is my duty as a magistrate," said Col. McMordie, "to see that justice is done and I cannot do otherwise than to give the sentence which the law demands." "I do not take Magistrate South's decision as an authority," said the magistrate. "It is a travesty on common sense and justice. The defence has every right of appeal. I find the accused guilty of a second offence of selling."

Here again before sentence was imposed Mr. Williams interjected, but was forestalled by the bench. "If I kept on listening to the defence you might convince me that these men were not selling liquor, but were running a Sunday School."

Mr. Williams then remarked that the King ought to be able to make the laws and the magistrate informed him that it was not the King who made the laws any more. That was what was now told to children.

W. Patmore also had a word to say as to the taking of the court proceedings, asking that it be noted in the notes that the magistrate had said that he would have preferred to give fines, but had been constrained by the law to impose jail.

"Why," replied Magistrate McMordie, "I might as well have the stenographer put in that I regret being a police magistrate."

From this on proceedings went on with more despatch and less interruption from counsel. Olsen was led by an officer from the prisoner's dock to the jail below and G. A. Sweet was called from the audience. Sentence of nine months for a second offence was passed upon him and he also left in custody of a policeman.

Olier Besner was called and before the magistrate pronounced sentence Mr. Patmore drew attention to the fact that the accused's position was somewhat similar to that of Olsen. He had not actually made the sale. The magistrate suggested that it would save time to let him proceed. The accused was pronounced guilty of a third offence and sentenced to twelve months, the minimum penalty. Besner left the dock with a broad smile which was answered by titles from the crowd of spectators.

D. Zarelli was sentenced to nine months and did not take the decision with such pleasant demeanor. A hard look came over his face as he left the prisoner's stand in company with the officer. When Kenny McKay had been given six months, the minimum for a servant making a sale, the court adjourned, with the spectators anxious to get away and further spread the news that has been awaited with such interest for many days.

LIVING COSTS HAVE DROPPED

Government Report at Ottawa says Decline Greater than any Previous Month

OTTAWA, Sept. 15.—The cost of living dropped more in the month of August than in any previous month, according to an official report made by the labor department of the Dominion Government. The abundant crop is believed to have been largely responsible for the fall in prices, which are evident everywhere.

WILLIAM SAGAR IS APPOINTED

Well Known Medical Missionary From Surf Inlet, Formerly of Hazelton, Succeeds Dr. R. W. Large.

At the meeting of the Port Simpson General Hospital Board held in Port Simpson yesterday afternoon, the appointment of Rev. Dr. William Sagar, M.A., M.D., C.M., J.P., of Surf Inlet, as medical superintendent in succession to the late Dr. R. W. Large was confirmed. The appointment will take effect on October 1, although Dr. Sagar will not take hold until the New Year for in the meantime he is going to New York to take up post-graduate work. While Dr. Sagar is in the east Dr. Benwell, the present assistant, will be in charge at Simpson and Dr. W. T. Kergin, of this city, will be treasurer.

Dr. Sagar is a physician and missionary of considerable experience although he is a comparatively young man. He is a medical and arts graduate of McGill University and his preliminary education was received in the Old Country. He has been five years in British Columbia and before going to Surf Inlet spent a year and a half at Hazelton. The appointment comes with general favor in the north.

Perry and Rev. T. H. Nuttall. Three nurses from the local hospital, Misses Shanahan, Watt and Johnson, made the trip with the party from Prince Rupert on Dr. Kergin's boat "Sunbeam II."

Terrific Explosion Heart of New York

Bodies of Victims found in Streets of Manhattan; Stock Exchange Ordered Closed

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—A terrific explosion which shook all of Lower Manhattan occurred today outside of the office of the J. P. Morgan Co., of Wall Street. Several were killed and several were injured.

NEW YORK—(11 o'clock). The police estimate of the number of injured is placed at 200.

NEW YORK—(12 o'clock). The unofficial estimate places the dead in this morning's street explosion at thirty.

Bodies of explosion victims are being found on the streets and in the great buildings of Manhattan. All windows have been

broken and buildings jarred for a wide area. The Stock Exchange and all financial institutions have been ordered closed. Guards have been sent to watch over the U. S. Treasury.

First theories seem to indicate that the explosion was caused by a bomb explosion. Another theory is that a truck carrying TNT collided with an automobile. A demolished truck was found near the Morgan Building which was badly damaged. Spectators say that they saw a man draw up and purposely drop a bomb. T. W. Lamont and H. P. Davidson, prominent financiers, had miraculous escapes.

PREPARATIONS FOR THE FAIR

Many Entries Coming In—Something Doing Every Day in Exhibition Building.

CARNIVAL OPENS ON MONDAY NEXT

The carnival opens here on Monday next, the fair on Wednesday. Already booths are being erected on Seventh Street and they are constructed in such a way that rain or shine they will be open to the public and everyone will be under cover. A large sum of money is being spent in providing amusements and housing them, and there is no doubt this will be a great attraction to many people.

The opening of the fair proper will take place on Wednesday afternoon and each day there will be band concerts there. The entries are expected to be all in place before the opening and the judging will commence on Wednesday morning in some classes. On Wednesday night there will be a promenade concert.

On Thursday the judging will be completed, there will be various attractions in the afternoon and in the evening there will be an Indian entertainment.

On Friday the afternoon attraction will be similar to the previous day and in the evening there will be a big jitney dance which will be one of the big attractions of the week.

Already there are over 600 entries for the fair, and they are coming in fast from every quarter. O. S. Schulstad has entered a fine collection of products from Hagensburg, mostly horticultural and agricultural products.

On the whole the prospects for the forthcoming exhibition are most rosy and, given good weather, there should be a very successful week.

MR. BALLANTYNE IS INSULTED

Victoria Board of Trade Apologizes for Attack Made on Minister by Outsiders.

When Hon. C. C. Ballantyne was in Victoria, C. J. V. Spratt and Mr. Neild of the Harbor Marine Company, which is building ships for the Dominion Government, attended a meeting of the council of the Board of Trade with the minister. At that meeting it is stated that these men insulted Mr. Ballantyne to such an extent that he afterwards stated that "he had never been so much insulted in his life."

There was no mention of the occurrence in the Victoria Daily papers but "The Rivet," the official paper of the Harbor Marine Co., reported the meeting and said Colonel Ballantyne was on his defence "like a she adder defending its young," and added—"some men are so puffed up with pride of office that they would float were it not that they are in turn weighed down with an overwhelming sense of their own dignity and importance."

The matter was taken up at a more recent meeting of the Victoria Board of Trade and an apology sent to Mr. Ballantyne, with a statement that all members of the council regretted the incident. It was further stated that Mr. Ballantyne "put it all over" his opponents at the time of the incident.

The liquor seized at George Sweet's house at the time of the recent raids, was this morning ordered confiscated by Magistrate McMordie.

TAXES IN VICTORIA CITY

Signs and Gasoline on Streets are to Pay Civic Funds.

Sept. 16.—Overhead gasoline pumps are to be installed under a by-law passed. There are 627 overhead signs out over the sidewalk on these, it is estimated to produce \$1,491.22. Gasoline pumps on the streets and these pay \$10 a year.

International Court At The Hague.

The despatches announce that it is proposed to establish an international court at The Hague. The idea is a good one although not new. The difficulty will be in enforcing the decisions of the court.

The United States Republican idea is that it is not correct to try to enforce the findings of the court, but to use moral suasion. That is as useless as trying to induce temperance by supplying all the liquor and beer possible and advising people not to touch it.

It would be a distinct advantage for the United States to join the League of Nations, but it is for them to decide. In the meantime it is satisfactory to think that the league is getting into working order without the aid of the States.

Labor Paper Plays with Fire.

After taking some Soviet money and holding it for a time the labor newspaper, The Herald, has found that public opinion is so much opposed to the idea of the paper accepting the bribe that it has decided to refuse.

The sending of cash to the Herald is making people wonder to what extent other papers are in the pay of the Bolsheviks. The model Russian Government seems to consider bribery to be a virtue rather than a failing.

The News is not blaming the Herald. Financing a labor paper is very difficult. It simply goes to show that labor leaders are no more infallible than other people, and that when they pose as the only exponents of honest government or honest living we know that they have not yet met the tempter or that they are of the minority.

Interest Here In 16th Battalion.

Much interest will be taken here in the reorganization of the 16th Battalion as a peacetime military unit. A number of Prince Rupert boys were members of the 16th overseas and Col. Peck is still to be its head.

One Long Gala For Whole Week.

With the carnival and fair only a few days away it looks as if it would be the greatest in the history of the city. The fair is, as always, a big event to many.

This year there is to be a new feature in the form of a street carnival. Already this is being prepared and it seems as if there would be every opportunity for people to enjoy themselves in any way they may see fit.

The visit of the seaplane will add much to the general interest, and will bring people here who otherwise would not have made the trip this year.

In spite of all the counter attractions on this occasion, the exhibition itself is not being neglected by any means. There will be a good exhibit and all sorts of other things going on at the fair building during three days of the week.

Will Visit Coast during Inspection Tour of Canadian Military

Major General Seeley, former minister of war in Great Britain, will visit the coast in the course of a military inspection tour through Canada, in the near future.

Sport Briefs

The program for the Aquatic Day at next week's fair has just been arranged and shows the afternoon of Saturday, September 25, is to be a most interesting and entertaining one. The water sports commence at 1 o'clock with a grand water carnival parade from the City Hall. A band will lead the way to the water front, where there will be the opening with naval salute and parade of harbor craft from steamers down. There will be a trawl setting contest, which will be quickly followed by water races of all kinds. At 2.15 the Campbell Cup speed boat race, in which much interest is centered, will commence. Log rolling contests and aquaplaning will be further features. The entries for the pleasure boat race for the Rowing Club challenge cup will close on September 20.

The committee in charge of the rowing and canoeing contests is especially desirous that there should be a large number of entries. The races at the Labor Day celebration in these classes were not well entered, with the result that there were prize-winners the quality of whose racing was not of very much worth. There will be canoe race doubles for men, doubles for lady and gentleman and row boat races the same, with also an event for boys. The ladies, it is hoped, will turn out in force and do their share. The races are healthful and graceful and the prizes are very substantial.

President Irigoyen, of Argentine Republic, and his cabinet are considering projects of law for the suppression of litigation of horse racing. It is announced, Buenos Aires has one of the finest race courses in the world operated by its famous Jockey Club, where millions of pesos change hands in a year under the pari-mutuel betting system. Races are held twice a week, Thursdays and Sundays, and on the frequent holidays. The attendance is from 15,000 to 20,000 persons. The newspapers have commented on the fact that, as a corollary to the mounting cost of living, the betting public has increased its wagers on the races. Where total bets on a Sunday were formerly 800,000 pesos, they now sometimes aggregate 3,000,000 pesos. The administration believes that the Thursday races, at least, ought to be suppressed.

Louis A. Firpo, South American heavyweight boxing champion, is soon to visit the United States, where he will seek the advantages to be derived from good trainers and expert management. Firpo weighs 213 pounds. His title was gained by defeating boxers in Chile and other South American countries. In a match in Buenos Aires in June he knocked out Antonio Jirsa, who styles himself "Czecho-Slovak champion," in the first three minute round of a scheduled 10 round bout. Firpo has a considerable ring history and before taking up boxing was a professional Greco-Roman wrestler.

At last the two contenders for the Northern B. C. championship have arranged together and on September 26th the Butchers, commercial league champions, and the Colts, who hold similar honors in the intermediate league, will meet in a game that promises to be the most interesting of this baseball season. The Colts, with a long run of good luck and not a little good playing, have fought their way to victory in a close race for the top of the intermediate league, while the Butchers, starting out as a handful of amateurs in June, have become a very creditable bunch of baseballers. A good live game is, therefore, promised for Sunday week. Two-color window cards take the eye quickly. See them at the News Job Department.

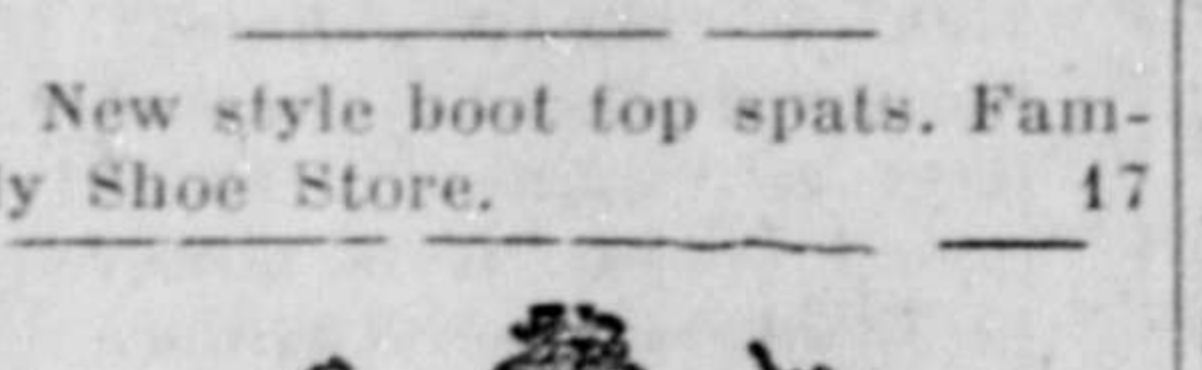

SPEED BOATS SOON READY FOR RACES

Three Under Construction Here Are Making Good Progress in Builders' Hands.

SUGU'S CRAFT MAY PROVE TO BE SPEEDY

George Frizzell's "Violet F. III" Has the Advantage of Great Power.

Great progress is being made on speed boat construction at Cow Bay and the three new local contenders for the Campbell trophy in the exhibition races are rapidly nearing completion. U. Sugu and George J. Frizzell have their boats at the Sugu boatbuilding shop, while Tommy Hooper is building his in the attic over the Imperial Machine Shop. The boats were each looked over yesterday morning by a representative of the Daily News and each owner seems to be confident that Ed. Campbell's "Wayward Girl" is not going to carry the Northern B. C. hydroplane championship back to the smelter town this year.

U. Sugu's boat is of a unique design, the original planning for which was done by its owner. It is of shallow draft and is semi-tunnelled, giving the hull a convex or concave shape. If this craft will displace the water properly as planned it should be of great speed. It is powered with a 35 horsepower Delmore marine engine, the machine having formerly been in the Anyox boat "Scout." The hull of the new boat is practically finished but the deckwork is still to do. The engine is not installed and will not be until after the launching.

The hull of Tommy Hooper's sea sled "Folly II" is also finished and the deck work is nearing completion. This craft, which has been described before, has a 35 horsepower Pierce-Arrow motor. The Folly resembled a barge somewhat in shape and is square at bow and stern.

George Frizzell's "Laura No. 3" is the furthest advanced as far as construction is concerned. It is painted and is ready for the water, so launching will take place in a day or so. This new boat is 22 feet long and is to have the 60 horsepower Winton engine formerly in the "Laura No. 2."

Alterations, including the installation of a new propeller, are being made to Kenny Rod's "Buddy." It is expected that she will have her speed greatly enhanced by the changes.

Speculation as to the outside competition is still rife. Besides the "Wayward Girl" it is altogether likely that Anyox will be further represented in the event on Saturday week. "Dark horses" from all over are rumored, Port Simpson, Ocean Falls and Ketchikan being prominently mentioned now.

INTERMEDIATE LEAGUE EXHIBITION PLAY-OFF

There Will be an Interesting Doubleheader at Acropolis on Sunday as Preliminary.

Arrangements were made at a meeting of the Intermediate baseball league last night for the play offs for the Exhibition \$50 prize. The proposed game between the Butchers and the Colts for next Sunday is, necessarily, postponed.

CARBOLIC HAS CREAMY FLAVOR IN COMPARISON

J. A. Shanks Gives Prince Rupert Some Notoriety on Return from Visit

J. A. Shanks, who was recently here for a short stay, and who was employed for a few days as barber at the Empress shop, has been spreading himself on Prince Rupert as he saw it, or perhaps it would be more appropriate to say as he tasted it. This is the yarn as published in one of the Victoria papers:

"Men once regarded as the north country's most substantial citizens have become dispensers of tobacco juice, whisky, rot-gut booze and other forms of bootleg liquor and they are dying hard, according to J. A. 'Five Points' Shanks, who returned to Victoria yesterday after an extended tour through the Bulkley Valley and a fairly lengthy visit to Prince Rupert.

Mr. Shanks, who some time ago announced himself as candidate for police commissioner here, says the wood alcohol fiends will be ruthlessly treated if he is ever elected.

Writing from Prince Rupert, Mr. Shanks said:

"I present this metropolis of the north is all agog on the subject of bootlegging. Large seizures of liquor have been made and a dozen or so erstwhile respected citizens are out on bail. That is as it should be. The law should be no respecter of persons when it comes to crime, and especially such a heinous offence as supplying rot-gut to a bunch of hard-working fools who are ready to drink it.

"I presume in Victoria one can secure a very fair grade of intoxicants through illegal channels, but up in this north country the stuff that these birds call whisky and sell for \$20 a bottle is an outrage of the vilest kind.

Wood Alcohol for 'Pep'

"I have heard that it is a composition of chewing tobacco soaked in methylated spirits, to which is added a dash of wood alcohol to give it 'pep.' That as it may, my own impression, after taking a 'shot,' was that I want no more. It is the fiercest concoction I ever saw under a cork; carbolic acid has a creamy flavor compared to it.

"But one of the side lights on this condition here strikes me as peculiar, and that is the sympathy that many people express for some of the culprits. I have heard numerous solid business men lament the fact that so-and-so, naming some particular dispenser of rot-gut, has been pinched. Moreover, they would express the hope that a fine would cover his wrongdoing, though he was up for his second or third offence, which calls for a time sentence. For my part, I have more respect for a legitimate hold-up artist; he at least lets you go clear-brained and sensible if you'll hand over your roll."

Blind Pigs Everywhere.

"Prince Rupert, though, is by no means alone in the blind pig industry. All through this north country evidence of booze consumption is apparent. Drunks are noticeable in any town you visit, and the general salutation seems

to be, 'Have you got anything on your hip?'

"I must say that the fellow who gives you a drink of good stuff for a rational price, even if he is breaking the law, should have more lenient consideration than the bird with the wood alcohol mixture, whose only object is to get the dough. One is really supplying a necessary evil, which has the legitimate claim of long-standing habit. The other, however, is creating an appetite for a new and worse evil, for I am told that those who acquire a liking for this awful concoction of chewing tobacco and its accessories go clean bug-house after a spell. They lose all interest in ordinary business pursuits, but search and crave only for more and more of this vile intoxicant."

Mining News

PREMIER SUMMER WORK

Operations at the Premier Mine, Stewart, during the summer are reported to have been highly satisfactory. The work has been of a development and construction nature, as it has been found to be more economical to ship ore in the winter when the snows may be used to advantage in getting the ore from the hills to tide-water. A great deal of diamond drilling has been done during the summer and the proving of the main ore body at 675 feet is very satisfactory, for many engineers had expressed doubts as to the depth. The bottom tunnel should hit the ore body in about another 30 feet and if the size and richness persists at this point all doubts as to the bigness of the mine will be removed. Some optimists say the concentrator will be operating at the Premier this winter, but many experts say this will be impossible so soon. If concentrator is not shipped out this winter there will, undoubtedly, be large quantities of high grade ore going to Tacoma for smelting.

ALASKA OR VANCOUVER ISLAND?

In view of the statement that Josephus Daniels, Secretary of

the U.S. Navy, recently made that all the American fleet on the Pacific Coast would secure its coal supplies in future from the Alaska fields, the heavy shipments of Vancouver Island coal, which have been increasing recently, is considered significant. The island mines are heavy shippers to southeastern Alaska and even to Cordova and Seward, points adjacent to the supposed Alaska fields. No less than a thousand tons of coal left Vancouver Island last week for Ketchikan. The recent calls of United States government ships to this port for coal is also looked at with jealousy.

ACTIVITY IN SLOCAN

While no great development has been engaged in by the mining companies of the Slocan division in recent months, lessees are doing more than ever there. The Rambler Cariboo and the Washington are shipping galena and lead in such quantities and of such value to make the mining very profitable. The biggest strike of all has been made by Fahey Bros. in the Whitewater, where they had shipped two carloads at the time of the latest reports and had as much as five feet of solid galena ore in sight. The Fahey workings are close to the Wellington mine, where the Standard Lead Co. are reopening No. 2 tunnel. The strike situation in the Slocan seems to be improving and applications for employment are being received in increasing numbers.

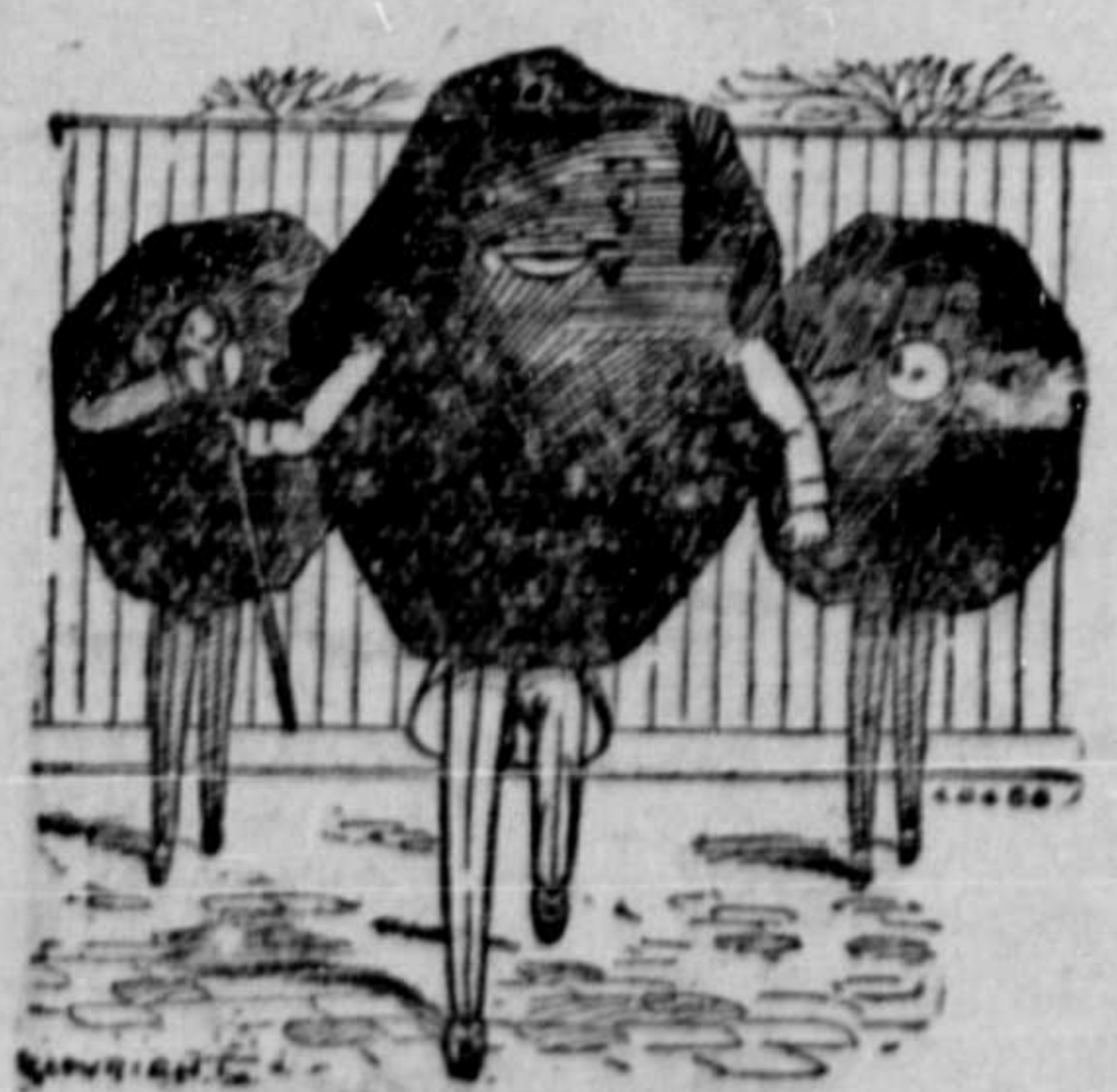

It is understood the vacancy caused by the resignation of Ald. Casey, who recently joined the fire department, will not be filled until the general election in January, unless further vacancies should occur. Two chairs are vacant most of the time at the council board, the one just mentioned and that of Ald. Currie. The alderman is out of town at Princess Royal Island.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$10 an acre, second-class to \$5.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-urban land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may acquire adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 1 acre, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made proportionate improvements, or because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant has not less than 2 years' residence on the land, and records of \$200 per annum and records of \$200 per acre may be made.

Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. This cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10 per acre, including 5 acres of cultivated and improved land of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 400 acres may be leased by one person or company on terms not exceeding 40 years.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on areas not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased on conditions of payment of stampage.

Natural hay meadow inaccessible by existing roads, and all persons interested in the land so situated, may apply for a deed conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANT ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving in the British Forces. The time within which the heirs or assigns of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year to one year after the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments of taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on moneys advanced to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from settlement to March 31, 1924.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1929.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for cottagers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

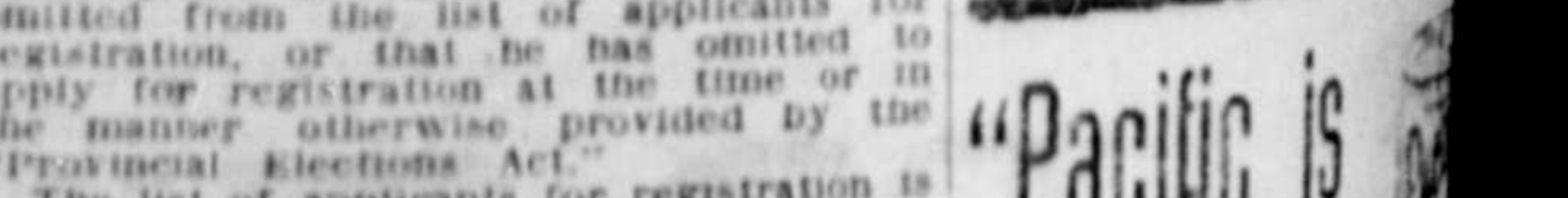

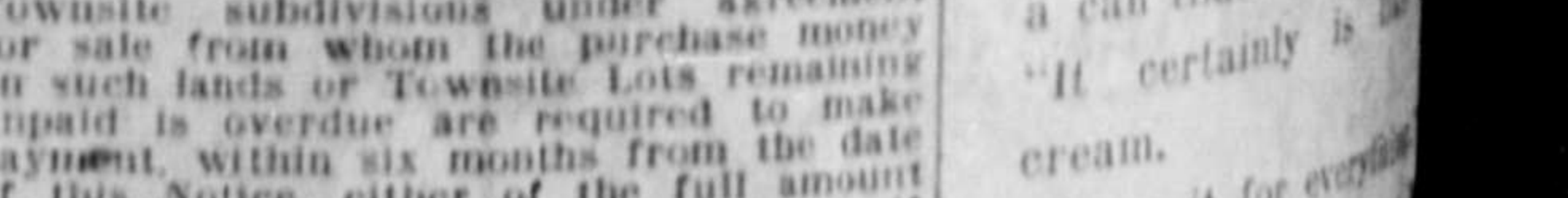
