While no official communication received, the Digby wireless station received a message saying a disabled hydroplane had been picked up by tender in Hidden Inlet. The plane was bound for Prince Rupert. Pilot Brown is on the way with the plane but the mechanics behind on account of being sick. The code name of the plane having on board the plane and owner is N.K.Z., but the name of the vessel is not known.

First message was received yesterday afternoon soon after it was sent to press. It was received by the wireless station at Triangle Island and said that a wrecked aeroplane had been picked up at Hidden Inlet by some vessel.

Hidden Inlet is back of Wales Island, about forty miles from Prince Rupert. From this it would seem that the plane must have either been on its course or the pilot must have lost his bearings and landed at Alaska by mistake. It seems clear, however, that there is no seaplane here for the fair this year.

Bowser says Election be Held Early in December

Praises Premier Oliver and says he is only man of real ability in British Columbia Government

POINT GREY, Sept. 24.—Hon. W. J. Bowser, addressing a meeting here last night, said the general elections would likely be held the first week in December after the Government knew the result of the prohibition plebiscite which was to be held on October 20 and could draw up a policy accordingly.

Mr. Bowser scored the Government administration, but said the Bowser campaign would not be one of abuse or of the digging up of old charges.

Mr. Bowser generously praised Premier Oliver, saying he was the only man of real ability in the Government.

PRINCE GEORGE MASTER FINED TWO RACING BOATS ARRIVE

Failed to Have Contraband Entered in Manifest and Has to Pay. Both Wayward Girl and Priscilla Came in This Morning on Azurite—Frizzell Confident.

SEATTLE, Sept. 24.—Alleged failure to have 79 quarts of whiskey and 54 tael of opium mentioned in the manifests of the steamer cost Capt. D. Donald, master of the steamship Prince George, \$783 in fines upon representation of the customs department. The goods were seized. The whiskey was assessed at \$2 a bottle and the opium at \$12 a tael.

MUCH FISH BUT VERY FEW CARS

Ten Cars Needed to Handle Fish Exchange Board, But Only Six Available.

Only four cars were available for the Fish Exchange this morning for 238,500 pounds of halibut that was up for sale. For the car load lots a price of 18.3c and 8.7c was paid, while the rest of the fish sold at prices ranging from 14.7c to 12.8c. The bulk of the arrivals were taken up by the Cold Storage.
