PARIS, Sept. 24.—George Leygues, former marine minister, has been called by President Millerand to be the new premier of France and has accepted the position, provided he can form a cabinet successfully.

The new president declared in his inaugural speech that the ruins of the war must be rebuilt.

DUBLIN, September 25.—It is officially announced that an attempt was made yesterday to assassinate Major General Strickland, military commander in southern Ireland. While motoring near Cork the general was fired on by ten men with revolvers. The party in the automobile returned the fire but the assailants fled, apparently uninjured.

A raid was made by some of the lawless element here on the general post office which was robbed.


### Cruiser Rainbow Sold to American Firm at Seattle

Originally cost a Million Dollars and was Built on the Tyne; Bought by Canadian Government for Training Ship

VICTORIA, Sept. 25.—The cruiser Rainbow has been sold to the firm of Neider & Marcus of Seattle, who refuse to discuss the details. She was built on the River Tyne at a cost of a million dollars and purchased by the Laurier Government to be used as a training ship for the nucleus of a Canadian navy. On the defeat of the Laurier Government she was tied up at Esquimalt until the war broke out when she was again commissioned and was almost the only defence of the port against raiders.

She has been dismantled and was idle at Esquimalt when sold to the American firm.

#### How Freight Rates Affect Prince Rupert.

When Vice-President Hayes was here recently discussing freights with the Board of Trade, he mentioned that our basic industry in this north country was lumber. Yet the railways, backed by the Board of Railway Commissioners, have put many of the lumber mills out of business.

So that people will have an idea what the increased freight rates mean to this place it may be explained that New York is the best market for lumber from this port. A car load of rough lumber is approximately 20,000 feet, weighing about 60,000 lbs. The old rate on this was 80c. a hundred pounds, but under the new rates this has been raised to \$1.06 1/2, or an increase of 26 1/2c. a hundred pounds. This is an increase of about \$8 a thousand feet, or \$160 a car load over the rate paid formerly. The buyers will not absorb the increase and the sellers cannot. The result is stagnation for the industry.

#### Enter Period of Lower Commodities.

This is a period of reconstruction following the war. It is a time when efforts are being made to smooth down the ill effects of the great struggle. The smoothing process had commenced. Commodities were coming down in price, steadily but surely. Everything pointed to an early return to more normal conditions. Then the Government put a spoke in the wheel of progress by authorizing an immense increase in the freight rates on the railroads. How is it possible to return to normal if the Government is the first one to jump the prices?

Admit that the railways are losing money. Are they going to increase their revenue by killing off the industries on which they feed? Already we hear complaints of falling off in business. The reason is clear. People cannot continue to ship products at a loss.

#### Time to Prepare For Next Exhibition.

There is no such thing as standing still for any length of time. Either we are making progress or we are dropping behind. This is true of the annual fall fair. This year an experiment has been tried and this is the time to consider whether it will be repeated. What is the effect of the carnival, if any, on the fair proper?

In looking over the exhibits the thing that strikes everybody is the poor showing of industrial stalls. There were fewer this year than last. Putting in an exhibit entails a lot of work but in many cases it means increased business. It is sometimes difficult to trace results, but some of the business men have direct business they have obtained as a result of fall advertising.

We must not always look at everything from the cold-blooded business point of view. The broader outlook of communal benefit must sometimes enter into our calculations. Those who made entries are to be congratulated on their progressiveness. We hope they will be richly rewarded.

#### Regret Seaplane Did Not Arrive.

There is general regret at the non-arrival of the seaplane, but a feeling of relief at the news that the airman is safe. Some people came to the fair for the sole purpose of seeing the airman and possibly of taking a ride. They have been disappointed, but it was no fault of the directors of the fair that the plane did not arrive. Every effort was made to secure the big feature. Doubtless another effort will be made next year and it is to be hoped with greater success. Perhaps by that time the airplane will no longer be a novelty in this part of the world.

## LIQUOR CASES APPEAL COMES UP WEDNESDAY

Argument Will be Heard in Victoria by Chief Justice Hunter in Chambers.

VICTORIA, Sept. 24.—In connection with the release on bail yesterday of Sweet, Olsen, Zaroli, Miller and McKay imprisoned at Okalla with hard labor for selling liquor at Prince Rupert, the application was made by Stuart Henderson, K.C., before Chief Justice Hunter, who signed the necessary papers following the issuing of a writ of certiorari.

Henderson appeared in court yesterday and filed the necessary papers, so that applications for habeas corpus on behalf of the six men will be held here in court next Wednesday morning.

Stuart Henderson came from Prince Rupert with some of the prisoners a week ago, but was unable to get a judge owing to it being vacation.

## VICTORIA SHIPYARD TENDERS ON VESSELS

Four Tankers Wanted by Un-named Firm

VICTORIA, Sept. 24.—The Harbor Marine Shipyards has no intention of closing its gates permanently without first making an effort to secure contracts that will allow it to continue in the provision of work for ex-service men of the city. The technical staff of the company is at present at work on tenders for a number of different craft. Quite a number of enquiries are being received concerning prices.

Tenders are being put in by the Harbor Marine Company for four 8,000 ton tankers which are wanted by a firm, the name of which has not been divulged. A price is also being submitted on a small coasting steamer of about 500 tons dead-weight, while a bid for the construction of a big ice-breaker for the Dominion Government is also being submitted.

With requests for estimates coming in as they are at present, there is a strong hope prevailing that work may be obtained to keep the yard open. The construction of a new C.P.R. car barge is to be undertaken soon.


