Mackenzie King Opens His Western Tour at Victoria

A downward revision of Tariff particularly on Necessaries of Life and Instruments of Production

Taxation Reduction by Curbing Extravagance

believes in wider recognition of Labor with representation in shaping industrial policies

RIA, Sept. 28.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in his initial speech in his western tour here last night said a general election is necessary to restore the people control over the Government. Leader of the opposition said he favored a downward revision of the tariff with substantial reductions on the necessities of life and instruments of production. A reduction of taxation made and this would be possible by curbing extravagance. Mackenzie King said he believed in a wider recognition of representation in the shaping of policies and in coming afterwards. This would have the effect of putting industrial strife.

Mr. King continued, "that if labor is as necessary to the successful running of our railways as capital or management, it is entitled to its place on the board of directors." During the most open diplomacy in inter-imperial and international relations, the speaker said the floor of Parliament and not the cabinet councils is the place for treaties to be made and agreed to.

Colonel C. W. Peck, M. P., V. C., returned to town last night on the Walrondo from Telegraph Creek after a three-weeks' tour of his constituency during which time he visited Atlin, Carcross, Y. T., and other points. Although he was delayed a week longer than he had intended to stay, he stated this morning that he had been pleased with his trip and was especially optimistic as to the prospects of the Dease Lake country. He was unable to get in there, although he would have liked to, but the time did not allow. While north he gained much first hand knowledge in regard to it, for the Stikine River is the route of entry. Col. Peck is confident that with development a great and prosperous district will be opened up there.

The balance of the evening was taken up in card playing, when light refreshments were served. The Westholme Orchestra furnished music for the evening.



PERRY FIRES BACK AT HOSPITAL BOARD FINANCE COMMITTEE

At the meeting of the City Council last night there was another shot fired by Alderman Perry in his difference of opinion with D. C. McRae and J. B. Roerig over hospital affairs. It followed the reading of a letter in which Messrs. McRae and Roerig apologized for slighting the Council in not having Alderman Perry attend meetings, but qualifying the apology with the statement that the alderman had not attended the meetings he might have. Reference was also made to his failure to attend meetings of the Public Utilities committee of the City Council in 1919.

Ald. Perry said he was glad an apology had been made, but he hoped the matter would have been allowed to drop there. They had made further statements, however, and the alderman said he would indeed be "a miserable little rube" if he did not reply. He denied that he had failed to attend any important meeting of the Utilities committee in 1919.

Alderman Perry then went to impute interested motives to Messrs. McRae and Roerig and threatened to give facts and figures to prove that he was right.

Soviet Russia is Asking for Peace with Roumania

Offers to return Stolen Money and Art Treasures to that country as Condition of Signing Treaty

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Soviet Russia has announced her readiness to return to Roumania the Roumanian gold amounting to \$500,000,000 and the art treasures taken to Moscow if Roumania will sign a treaty of peace. This is the statement made here by Captain Stoica, former Roumanian liaison officer, yesterday.

The anxiety of the soviet government to sign up treaties with her neighbors now that she is getting the worst of the fighting, is rather significant. When she was advancing and winning battles, her leaders were arrogant as those of any military nation. It is the general opinion here that the Bolsheviks, from the military point of view, is past.

With Thursday night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Athletic Association the winter season of indoor athletics can properly be said to commence. At this meeting officers will be elected and preliminary arrangements for the winter's work at the Agricultural Hall quarters will be gone into.

The Association has been inactive during the summer on account of the outside sports, but next week, the quarters will be turned back to the association by the fair board. There is a balance in the bank to the credit of the association and all bills have been paid in connection with the improvement of the rooms and the purchase of paraphernalia. The financial status of the body is therefore in the best of shape.

Prohibition Plebiscite Vote Very Soon.

About three weeks from now the people of the province will be asked to vote on the question of whether the people through their Government shall go into the liquor vending business or continue the present system of prohibition. This on the understanding that if the present law be allowed to stand, the Dominion will prevent the importation of liquor into the province.

The editor of the Daily News is strongly in favor of prohibition, believing that liquor is a drug and that like other harmful drugs it should be prohibited along with opium, morphine and cocaine. The fact that like other opiates it has the power of creating a strong appetite for itself and that many men and women are unable to hold out against the craving for it, is sufficient reason for preventing its sale as a beverage. Everyone knows enough about the effects of alcohol indirectly in bringing misery and degradation into homes and in degrading whole communities, without attention being drawn to it.

Honest Opinions Against Compulsion.

There are many honest and well meaning people who believe that prohibition is wrong. They say it interferes with personal liberty. While some of the people who so argue are those who are already to some extent in the grip of the drug, there are others who do so from honest conviction. Some even will argue that there is a food value in liquor. At any rate it must be admitted that nearly half of the readers of the Daily News are opposed to prohibition and that they have a right to their opinions. We respect them. We believe them to be honest, unless we are shown otherwise. At the same time we believe they are mistaken, sadly mistaken.

From time to time during the coming campaign we shall discuss this subject and doubtless it will be discussed again by public speakers. On such occasions we shall give a fair report for either side and if any correspondent has any views for or against and is willing to sign his name to a letter, we shall be glad to give his views to the readers of this paper, whether we agree with what he says or not. Letters must, however, conform to the ordinary rules of debate. We believe that people should be thoroughly informed on all phases of this important question before being asked to vote on October 20.

Is Present Act a Failure?

One of the statements so often made by those who are opposed to prohibition is that the present act is a failure, because a few people, comparatively, have taken up bootlegging as a profession and have made money from it, and perhaps are serving time for it. The same might be said of stealing. There have been periods when day after day men have been haled into court for stealing. That is no reason for slackening the law and allowing people to steal at will. And yet there is more injury done to the race by serving them with liquor, than by those who steal.

As a matter of fact the consumption of liquor decreased to a very large extent under the war measure which prevented importation into the province. With the reversion to the present system by which all the whiskey anyone wanted could be imported, bootlegging increased and many drunken people were seen on the streets.

It was not reasonable to expect that that the custom of drinking intoxicants could be eradicated in a few months or a few years. There will be liquor sold for many years to come and there will be illicit vending and manufacturing. Everyone knows that, and no one better than the people who support prohibition.

Can You Change People By Act of Parliament?

One stock argument used by those who favor unrestricted liquor selling by the Government, is that you can't make people sober by act of parliament. Nobody thinks you can. At the same time there must be some efficacy in acts of parliament, else why continue such an expensive institution in each province and also in the Dominion? Combine good legislation with education and progress is made.

Prince Rupert is a frontier town and the tendencies are to object to restrictions of all kinds. This is the first year that any attempt has been made to enforce the game laws here. Among the unattached portion of the population, the tendency is against prohibition, but among those who have homes, there is a strong feeling in its favor. Even in Prince Rupert we look for a majority in its favor. In some communities in the province there will be hardly any opposition to it.



HOW MINISTER WAS INSULTED

L. Bullock-Webster Writes Regarding Interview with Hon. C. C. Ballantyne at Victoria

"THE RIVET" ROASTS MINISTER OF MARINE

Gives Story from Point of View of Shipbuilding Company; Claims Promises Broken

About two weeks ago there was a story published in the Daily News, an article which told of a meeting in Victoria in which Hon. G. C. Ballantyne is reported to have said that he had been insulted. In reference to this the following letter has been received from L. Bullock-Webster, formerly an alderman here:

Editor, Daily News—I notice on the front page of your issue of September 16th some comments on the meeting of the Victoria Board of Trade at which the Hon. G. C. Ballantyne was present.

The article leaves the impression that Mr. C. J. V. Spratt and Mr. R. Neild insulted the Minister of Marine. That was certainly not the case. Mr. R. Neild was there, I take it, as a strong supporter of Mr. Ballantyne, and his speech was both friendly and favorable to the Minister. Mr. Spratt spoke briefly (toward the end of the meeting), but no one could suggest that he said anything that could be construed as an insult.

Alleged Insults

The alleged insults came from the four members of the soldiers' delegation, which was sent there by the Harbor Marine Veterans. As chairman of that delegation I must assume the responsibility for what occurred and therefore venture to enroach on your valuable space, but will be as brief as possible. The boys in the yard were extremely indignant over Mr. Ballantyne's treatment of their claims for consideration when distributing Government work. A general meeting of the men deputed four of us to go and meet the Minister, and tell him plainly that they considered he had broken his promises. This we did in very plain unvarnished language. There was no rowdiness, no vulgar or objectionable epithets, no disorder. Not one of the delegates used anything but parliamentary language.

Dared to Criticize.

If Mr. Ballantyne felt insulted, as I am told he did, the nature of the insult was that four working men should dare to openly criticize a cabinet minister and the Government, in the presence of a representative body of business men, as though they were addressing an equal, and should have the temerity to point out that they considered he had broken his promise. If we really believe in Canadian Democracy, then there can be no reason why a working man should not speak as frankly to a cabinet minister as he would to one of his co-workers.

The following is part of a report of the Victoria meeting as given by "The Rivet," the organ of the Harbor Marine Co.:

"The Hon. G. C. Ballantyne has swept through British Columbia, with trumpets sounding and banners flying.

"His majestic figure has moved in triumphal procession from North to South and South to East. At his approach the fanfares have been sounded. Panegyrics have been written, and his praises sung, by sycophantic obsequious favor-seekers. From Prince Rupert, he travelled by special boat to Victoria. The Stadacona went one thousand miles in his honor. In Rupert they gave him a good luncheon, and said how pleased they were with his policy. But here, alas, occurred the only incident which marred the stately triumph, and, for a moment, shook that solid self-satisfied egotism, which is the shield and outer casing of the cunning little nature, which can plan misleading letters. Some men are so puffed up with the pride of office that they would float, were it not that they are in turn weighed down with an overwhelming sense of their own dignity and importance. And to such the method of approach is on bended knee; their vernacular is the language of flattery. The Hon. G. C. Ballantyne had no time to speak to the boys in the yard. He did design, however, to set his stately foot on
