VICTORIA, Sept. 28.—Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King in his initial western tour here last night said a general election was necessary to restore to the people control over the Government. The leader of the opposition said he favored a downward revision of the tariff with substantial reductions on the necessities of life and instruments of production. A reduction of taxation on these items would be possible by curbing extravagance. Mackenzie King said he believed in a wider recognition of labor in the shaping of policies and in consumption afterwards. This would have the effect of putting an end to industrial strife.

### COLONEL PECK BACK TO TOWN

Three Weeks in Wilderness of North Out of Communication With World.

Colonel C. W. Peck, M. P., V. C., returned to town last night on the Walrus from Telegraph Creek after a three-weeks' tour of his constituency during which time he visited Atlin, Carcross, Y. T., and other points. Although he was delayed a week longer than he had intended to stay, he stated this morning that he had been pleased with his trip and was especially optimistic as to the prospects of the Dease Lake country. He was unable to get in there, although he would have liked to, but the time did not allow. While north he gained much first hand knowledge in regard to it, for the Stikine river is the route of entering. Col. Peck is confident that with development a great and prosperous district will be opened up there.

Speaking of the proposed visit to the city by Dr. S. F. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, and Premier Meighen, Col. Peck said that one of his first actions after returning from the three weeks in the wilderness, during which time he was only twice in telegraphic communication with the outside world, was to get in touch with these ministers. He was confident that they would both be here but he wished the premier to come west over the Grand Trunk Pacific and visit Prince Rupert before going south to Vancouver and Victoria.

Col. Peck and Dr. Tolmie intend to spend a few days inspecting the Bulkley Valley.

### CAR SHORTAGE SENDS HALIBUT AWAY AGAIN

Two Big Schooners Cleared for Seattle This Morning Because of Low Prices.

One hundred thousand pounds of halibut, the catch of two boats, the Restitution with 25,000 lbs., and the Scandia, with 75,000 lbs., cleared for Seattle this morning because there were no refrigerator cars to ship the fish east and the local buyers could not pay a fair price on that account. There were only two cars in for the sale today and no others reported. Following are the sales: Cape Spence, 11,000 pounds, and Annie, 11,000 pounds, sold to the Booth Fisheries at 48.2c and 9c. Fisher, 10,000 pounds, and Venus, 13,000 pounds, sold to Pacific Fisheries at 17.9c and 9c. Bringold, 18,000 pounds, and Laneing, 17,444, sold to the cold storage at 42c and 7c. The catches of two small salmon boats were sold.

### MONTHLY DEBATES BY CATHOLIC SOCIETY

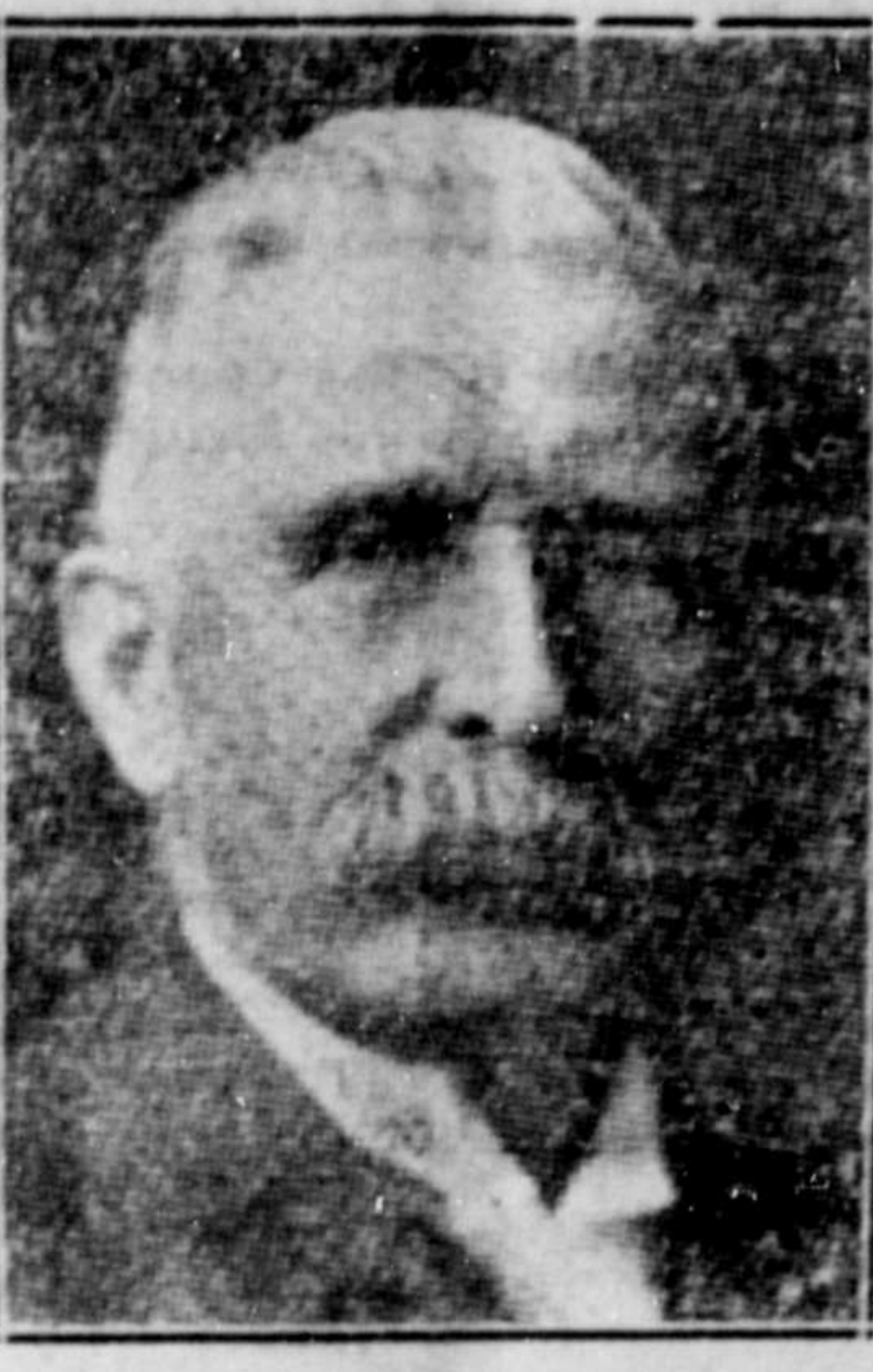
Opening Smoker Last Night by Knights of Columbus.

### PERRY FIRES BACK AT HOSPITAL BOARD FINANCE COMMITTEE

At the meeting of the City Council last night there was another shot fired by Alderman Perry in his difference of opinion with D. C. McRae and J. B. Roerig over hospital affairs. It followed the reading of a letter in which Messrs. McRae and Roerig apologized for slighting the Council in not having Alderman Perry attend meetings, but qualifying the apology with the statement that the alderman had not attended the meetings he might have. Reference was also made to his failure to attend meetings of the Public Utilities committee of the City Council in 1919.

Ald. Perry said he was glad an apology had been made, but he hoped the matter would have been allowed to drop there. They had made further statements, however, and the alderman said he would indeed be "a miserable little rube" if he did not reply. He denied that he had failed to attend any important meeting of the Utilities committee in 1919.

Alderman Perry then went to impute interested motives to Messrs. McRae and Roerig and threatened to give facts and figures to prove that he was right.

Game Warden J. W. McIntosh has received a notification that trapping will open for all animals except beaver on November 1 instead of December 1. An order-in-council has made this possible under the amendment to the Game Protection Act. The open season for beaver does not commence until 1924.

### Soviet Russia is Asking for Peace with Roumania

Offers to return Stolen Money and Art Treasures to that country as Condition of Signing Treaty

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—Soviet Russia has announced her readiness to return to Roumania the Roumanian gold amounting to \$500,000,000 and the art treasures taken to Moscow if Roumania will sign a treaty of peace. This is the statement made here by Captain Stoica, former Roumanian Liaison officer, yesterday.

The anxiety of the soviet government to sign up treaties with her neighbors now that she is getting the worst of the fighting, is rather significant. When she was advancing and winning battles, her leaders were arrogant as those of any military nation. It is the general opinion here that the Bolshevik danger, from the military point of view, is past.

### ATHLETES MEET ON THURSDAY

With Thursday night's meeting of the Prince Rupert Athletic Association the winter season of indoor athletics can properly be said to commence. At this meeting officers will be elected and preliminary arrangements for the winter's work at the Agricultural Hall quarters will be gone into. The Association has been inactive during the summer on account of the outside sports, but next week, the quarters will be turned back to the association by the fair board. There is a balance in the bank to the credit of the association and all bills have been paid in connection with the improvement of the rooms and the purchase of paraphernalia. The financial status of the body is therefore in the best of shape.

"We want the young fellows to get in now," said Col. McMordie this morning. "It is the beginning of the season and they will be given a chance to run things just as they like if they turn out on Thursday night and manifest an interest in the thing. After flying an hour and a half the engine missed and the airman landed near Nalau Island and dusk came on before the repairs were made. During the night a gale came up and washed the craft toward shore. The plane pounded to bits with the pilot still aboard. Brown reached shore safely and after spending the day alone on the island decided to try to paddle out on a log to waylay a steamer before being overcome by hunger. There are many new members this year and one of the particular features of the opening night was the strength of the tenor and bass. In order to balance them the society will have to greatly strengthen their numbers in soprano and contralto, particularly with the young voices.

The colonel was formerly a member of the Northwest Mounted Police and later a member of the expeditionary forces, in the veterinary department. He was born at Moncton. The platform adopted includes exclusion of Orientals from land ownership and retention of the tariff.

#### Prohibition Plebiscite Vote Very Soon.

About three weeks from now the people of the province will be asked to vote on the question of whether the people through their Government shall go into the liquor vending business or continue the present system of prohibition. This on the understanding that if the present law be allowed to stand, the Dominion will prevent the importation of liquor into the province.

The editor of the Daily News is strongly in favor of prohibition, believing that liquor is a drug and that like other harmful drugs it should be prohibited along with opium, morphine and cocaine. The fact that like other opiates it has the power of creating a strong appetite for itself and that many men and women are unable to hold out against the craving for it, is sufficient reason for preventing its sale as a beverage. Everyone knows enough about the effects of alcohol indirectly in bringing misery and degradation into homes and in degrading whole communities, without attention being drawn to it.

#### Honest Opinions Against Compulsion.

There are many honest and well meaning people who believe that prohibition is wrong. They say it interferes with personal liberty. While some of the people who so argue are those who are already to some extent in the grip of the drug, there are others who do so from honest conviction. Some even will argue that there is a food value in liquor. At any rate it must be admitted that nearly half of the readers of the Daily News are opposed to prohibition and that they have a right to their opinions. We respect them. We believe them to be honest, unless we are shown otherwise. At the same time we believe they are mistaken, sadly mistaken.

From time to time during the coming campaign we shall discuss this subject and doubtless it will be discussed again by public speakers. On such occasions we shall give a fair report for either side and if any correspondent has any views for or against and is willing to sign his name to a letter, we shall be glad to give his views to the readers of this paper, whether we agree with what he says or not. Letters must, however, conform to the ordinary rules of debate. We believe that people should be thoroughly informed on all phases of this important question before being asked to vote on October 20.

#### Is Present Act a Failure?

One of the statements so often made by those who are opposed to prohibition is that the present act is a failure, because a few people, comparatively, have taken up bootlegging as a profession and have made money from it, and perhaps are serving time for it. The same might be said of stealing. There have been periods when day after day men have been haled into court for stealing. That is no reason for slackening the law and allowing people to steal at will. And yet there is more injury done to the race by serving them with liquor, than by those who steal.

As a matter of fact the consumption of liquor decreased to a very large extent under the war measure which prevented importation into the province. With the reversion to the present system by which all the whiskey anyone wanted could be imported, bootlegging increased and many drunken people were seen on the streets.

It was not reasonable to expect that that the custom of drinking intoxicants could be eradicated in a few months or a few years. There will be liquor sold for many years to come and there will be illicit vending and manufacturing. Everyone knows that, and no one better than the people who support prohibition.

#### Can You Change People By Act of Parliament?

One stock argument used by those who favor unrestricted liquor selling by the Government, is that you can't make people sober by act of parliament. Nobody thinks you can. At the same time there must be some efficacy in acts of parliament, else why continue such an expensive institution in each province and also in the Dominion? Combine good legislation with education and progress is made.

Prince Rupert is a frontier town and the tendencies are to object to restrictions of all kinds. This is the first year that any attempt has been made to enforce the same laws here. Among the unattached portion of the population, the tendency is against prohibition, but among those who have homes, there is a strong feeling in its favor. Even in Prince Rupert we look for a majority in its favor. In some communities in the province there will be hardly any opposition to it.

## CLEMENTS TO BRING DOWN ASSESSMENT

### Will be Assisted by Two Commissioners—Council Could not Find Suitable New Man.

The city council has decided on the motion of Ald. Rochester, seconded by Ald. Kerr, to instruct City Engineer F. S. Clements to bring down the 1921 assessment with the assistance of two commissioners who are to be appointed at a later date.

The question of an assessor was laid over last week to allow of local applications to be received and last night two were presented to the council, one from W. H. Montgomery, \$200 a month, and from O. J. Smith, \$175. These were not considered and the application of E. H. Henderson, of Vancouver, was again turned to. However he, too, was allowed to drop with the arriving at the conclusion already stated.

## Mining News

### LEGITIMATE MINING

William Forrest, well known Stewart mining man, says that there has been more legitimate mining at Stewart during the past summer than ever before. He predicts that there will be a number of shippers, when development work has been carried on a little further. A sampling works is badly needed at the northern town so that smaller operators may be given an opportunity to carry on. Mr. Forrest blames the high rents to a large extent for the slowness of progress in the Canadian town.

### PEERLESS AT USK

The Peerless Mine, Kleanza Creek, near Usk, has been attracting considerable attention this year. Last season 450 tons of ore were taken out and this season 100 tons have already been shipped. The work at present consists for the most part of development and the ore blocked, it is stated, runs about \$100 per ton in value. That the property has merit is indicated by the fact that the Provincial Government is spending money in improving the trails to it. The Peerless Group is being developed by Wells, Lindland & Hamblett, who sent prize ore from it to the recent exhibition here.

### OIL IN KOOTENAY

That there is a rich oil field in the Flathead country, Kootenay district, near the international boundary line, is the statement of John Watt who came from that part recently to confer with Premier Oliver at Victoria. Mr. Watt brought samples to the coast with him and he predicts that development would make a good producer there. The specimens are in the form of heavy petroleum wax which is hard and burns with intense heat. All the available information has been put in the hands of the government.

## WILL ASSIST IN FIGHT AGAINST CHURCH EXEMPTION

The city council last night decided to support the resolution of the Victoria council asking other B. C. municipalities to assist in the fight, between the Victoria council and a church of that city that has won an appeal case on the exemption of churches from taxes and tax sales.

C. should bear a share of the cost, especially as all would be concerned in the ultimate decision of the case.

Judgment was yesterday given in the County Court by Judge Joung in favor of the plaintiff for \$200 in the E. J. Large vs. H. A. Swain land lease case of Terrace. The defence did not put in an appearance.

The fact that the Hub on Second Avenue was running during the Carnival week and that dances were carried on and the bar running, is to be investigated by the city. It appears that no license was granted the premises.

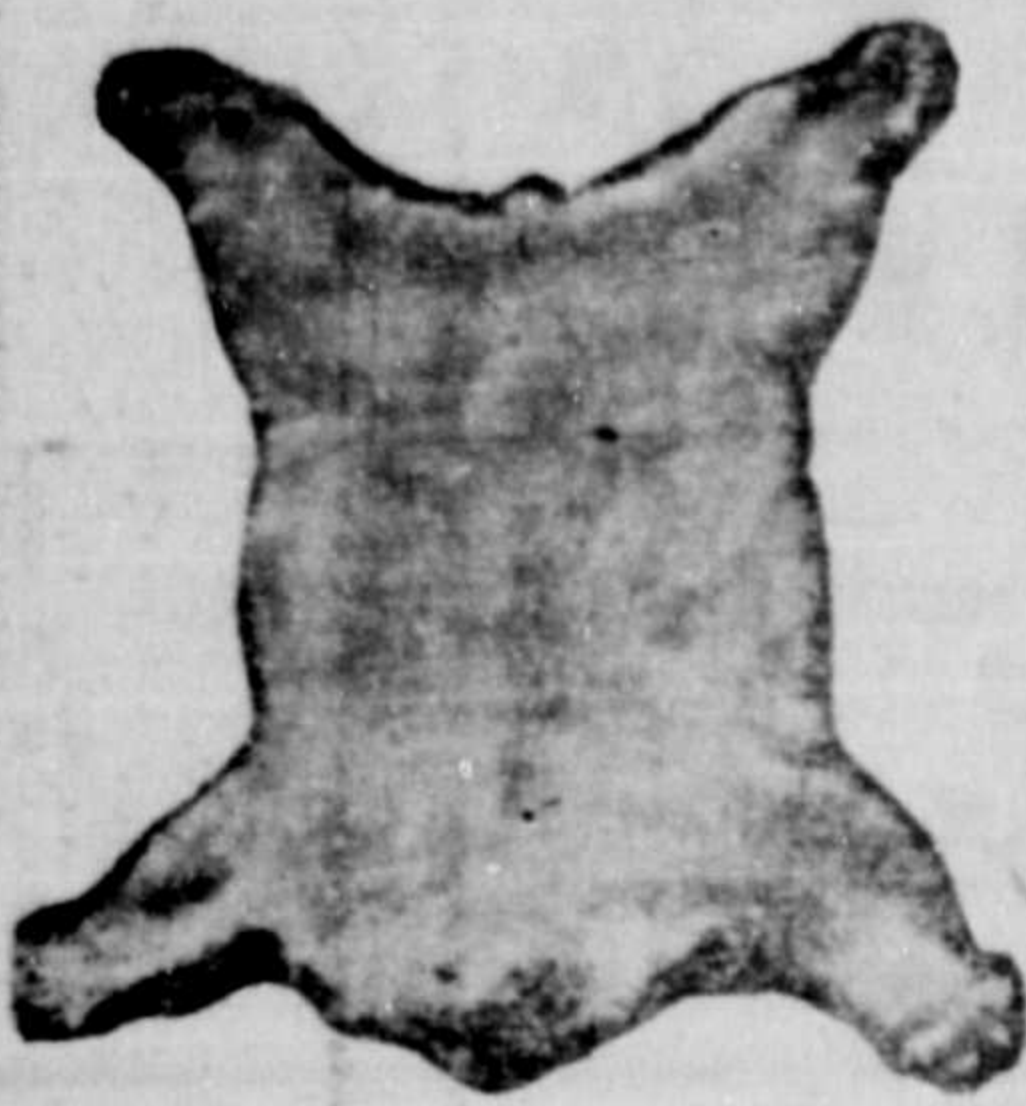

## HOW MINISTER WAS INSULTED

L. Bullock-Webster Writes Regarding Interview with Hon. C. C. Ballantyne at Victoria

### "THE RIVET" ROASTS MINISTER OF MARINE

Gives Story from Point of View of Shipbuilding Company; Claims Promises Broken

About two weeks ago there was a story published in the Daily News, an article which told of a meeting in Victoria in which Hon. C. C. Ballantyne is reported to have said that he had been insulted. In reference to this the following letter has been received from L. Bullock-Webster, formerly an alderman here:

Editor, Daily News—I notice on the front page of your issue of September 16th some comments on the meeting of the Victoria Board of Trade at which the Hon. C. C. Ballantyne was present. The article leaves the impression that Mr. C. J. V. Spratt and Mr. J. Neild insulted the Minister of Marine. That was certainly not the case. Mr. R. Neild was there, I take it, as a strong supporter of Mr. Ballantyne, and his speech was both friendly and favorable to the Minister. Mr. Spratt spoke briefly (toward the end of the meeting), but no one could suggest that he said anything that could be construed as an insult.

#### Alleged Insults

The alleged insults came from the four members of the soldiers' delegation, which was sent there by the Harbor Marine Veterans. As chairman of that delegation I must assume the responsibility for what occurred and therefore venture to encroach on your valuable space, but will be as brief as possible. The boys in the yard were extremely indignant over Mr. Ballantyne's treatment of their claims for consideration when distributing Government work. A general meeting of the men deputed four of us to go and meet the Minister, and tell him plainly that they considered he had broken his promises. This we did in very plain unvarnished language. There was no rowdiness, no vulgar or objectionable epithets, no disorder. Not one of the delegates used anything but parliamentary language.

#### Dared to Criticize.

If Mr. Ballantyne felt insulted, as I am told he did, the nature of the insult was that four working men should dare to openly criticize a cabinet minister and the Government, in the presence of a representative body of business men, as though they were addressing an equal, and should have the temerity to point out that they considered he had broken his promise. If we really believe in Canadian Democracy, then there can be no reason why a working man should not speak as frankly to a cabinet minister as he would to one of his co-workers.

The following is part of a report of the Victoria meeting as given by "The Rivet," the organ of the Harbor Marine Co.:

"The Hon. C. C. Ballantyne has swept through British Columbia, with trumpets sounding and banners flying. His majestic figure has moved in triumphal procession from North to South and South to East. At his approach the fanfares have been sounded. Panegyrics have been written, and his praises sung, by sycophantic obsequious favor-seekers. From Prince Rupert, he travelled by special boat to Victoria. The Stadacona went one thousand miles in his honor. In Rupert they gave him a good luncheon, and said how pleased they were with his policy. But here, alas, occurred the only incident which marred the stately triumph, and, for a moment, shook that solid self-satisfied egotism, which is the shield and outer casing of the cunning little nature, which can plan misleading letters. Some men are so puffed up with the pride of office that they would float, were it not that they are in turn weighed down with an overwhelming sense of their own dignity and importance. And to such the method of approach is on bended knee; their vernacular is the language of flattery. The Hon. C. C. Ballantyne had no time to speak to the boys in the Yard. He did design, however, to set his stately foot on

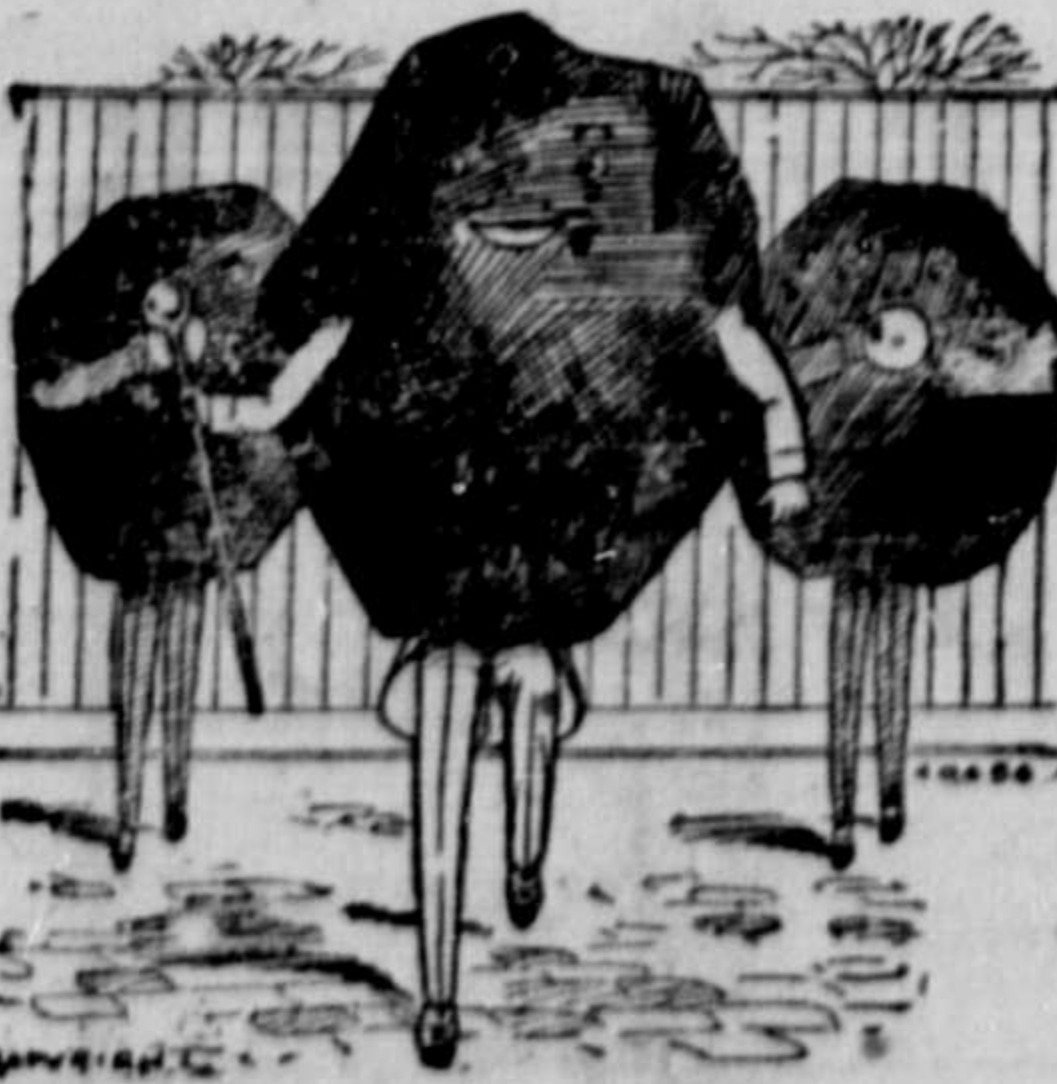

our humble deck plates, and could not fail to see the good work which we have done here; but it is extremely probable that the good lunch in Prince Rupert made a deeper impression than the good work in Victoria.

#### Denied Statement.

"Before our delegates went to Ottawa, Mr. James Dakers told the meeting at the City Hall that the Minister of Marine had said Mr. Spratt would get no more work from him. Our delegation taxed Mr. Ballantyne with this at the Board of Trade the other day, but he absolutely denied having made such a statement.

"A polite telegram was sent to Mr. Ballantyne inviting him to address the men in this yard on his visit to Victoria. When it was learnt that he had refused to do so, on the plea of insufficient time, and had, after that, accepted an invitation to lunch at the Boys' Naval Brigade Camp, feeling ran very high, and a considerable number of the men were in favor of making a hostile demonstration, and some were with difficulty persuaded that to pelt the minister with rotten eggs could do no good, and would merely bring discredit on our organization. In the end more sober counsels prevailed and it was decided to send four representatives from the Harbor Marine Veterans' Association to meet the Minister of Marine and tell him in no uncertain terms what we think of him and his policy, as well as the Government which he represents.

#### Not Love Feast.

"This was how it came about that at the Board of Trade meeting—when all was going as sweetly as marriage bells, when Mr. Ballantyne had spread the honey of his promises, thick on the bread of their credulous expectation, when in mellifluous tones, vibrating with self-righteousness he had assured the audience that his government could be relied on to fulfill its promises—this was how it came about that our four representatives, Comrades Bullock-Webster, Orford, Crockett and Baxter, suddenly changed the tone of the gathering from that of a love-feast to something more nearly resembling an indignation meeting. The former having been appointed chairman of the committee, opened the attack, and was closely followed by Comrade Orford, who left very few stones unturned; but what few there were, were very quickly and skillfully turned by Comrade Kirkpatrick-Crockett, who flung his denunciations with the unerring judgment which David must have shown in his somewhat primitive attack on Goliath. The final coupe-de-grace was delivered by Comrade Baxter, who calmly and politely showed why this yard should have had special consideration from a re-establishment point of view, and why it is dangerous to leave a vast number of returned men unprovided for as winter approaches.

#### Was Astonished.

"Mr. Ballantyne was astonished that he or the Government should meet with criticism. He repeated all the dear old stuff about 'the Government doing so much for the soldiers, and feeling that they couldn't do enough for the returned boys.' He was virtuously on the defensive, like a she-adder defending its young. He admitted having written the letter (which had raised all our hopes), but stated that it was written for a purpose. He would not say what purpose."

G. P. Logan, formerly of the provincial police here and more recently of Princeton, has severed his connection with the force and is here on private business.

The G. T. P. arbitration party which leaves Winnipeg on Thursday is due to arrive here on Sunday. President Taft is the most prominent member of the board.
