

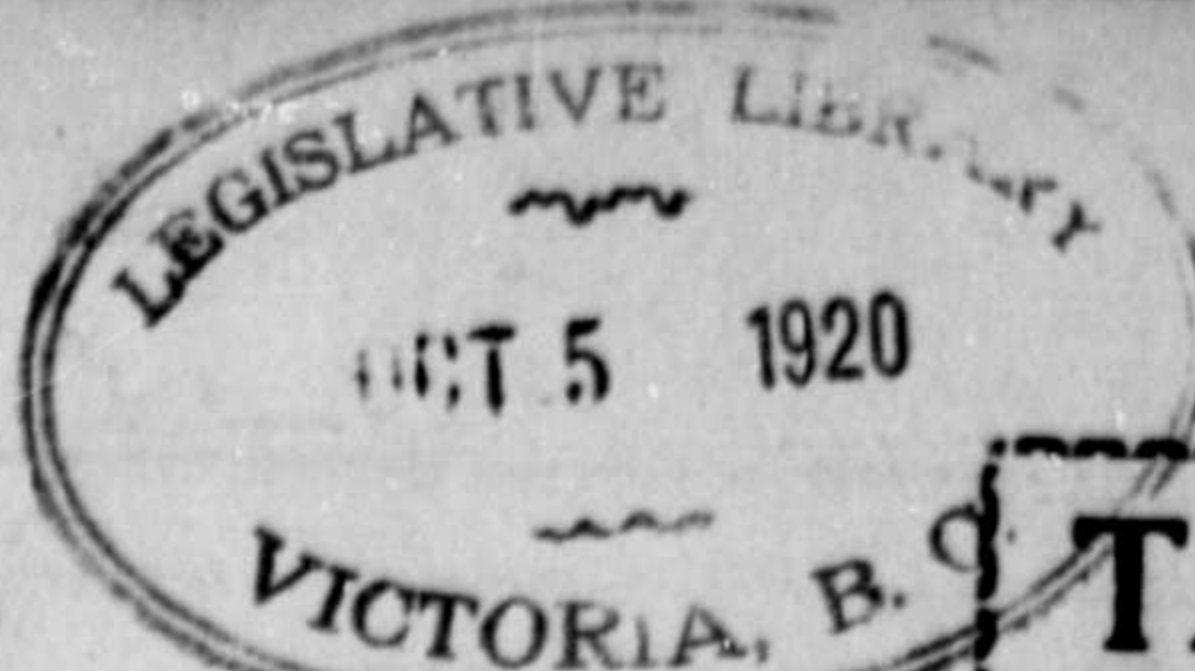

Big Steamer Beached Early Today

AMERICAN LEAGUE BASEBALL PLAYERS ARE INDICTED BY GRAND JURY

S. Prince Rupert Beached at Swanson Bay after Striking

Passengers are all safe and Prince John has gone to fetch them expecting to arrive here tomorrow morning

The G.T.P. steamer Prince Rupert is ashore at Swanson Bay. The steamer Prince John has gone to fetch the passengers and the vessel struck at 1:15 this morning doing considerable damage to the hull of the vessel. She continued northward, however, reaching Swanson Bay it was decided that she was taking on too fast and she was beached by Capt. Mackenzie. The passengers were taken ashore and are being well cared for by the manager and officials of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co. at Swanson Bay.

Word was sent out by wireless both to Prince Rupert and Vancouver and arrangements were at once made here for the despatching of the passengers and mail.

The steamer was up the Skeena at the time making a trip to the Balmoral Cannery for salmon. Superintendent Beauvais was aboard her. Word was sent at once and she went direct from the river.

Nicholson was not in Vancouver when word was received, but away on official duties. It is understood, however, that a salvage steamer is en route north and the Prince will be pumped out and where as soon as possible.

Prince John is not expected here with the passengers tomorrow morning.

At Swanson Bay, Sept. 29.—The steamer Prince John, which was beached at Swanson Bay, was so swiftly that Captain Mackenzie beached the vessel in such a way that the passengers might be in danger.

Prince John is gone to her assistance. It is expected the vessel will be off the run for at least a week and her place will be taken by the Prince John which will leave for the north at 10 a. m. tomorrow, leaving Prince Rupert for this port at 8 p. m. on Thursday.

FREE CASES FOR ASSIZES

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 28.—Prohibition is credited with saving \$2,000,000,000 for the United States in the last year according to a statement made by Governor Milliken of the state of Maine in addressing the International Congress against alcoholism.

TELKWA COLLIERIES MINE BEEN LEASED FOR THREE YEARS

TELKWA, B.C., Sept. 29.—The Telkwa Collieries property has been leased for a period of three years to John Gillespie who will work the mine. A shipment has already been made by him to McBride. This is the mine in which several Prince Rupert people, including Mayor McGlymont, are interested.

TRAIN DELAYED

Freight Wreck Took Place Near Jasper, Holding up Passenger.

The train from the east did not arrive until this morning owing to a freight wreck blocking the road near Entrance between Jasper Park and Edson. Unluckily the freight trouble took place just ahead of the passenger and it took considerable time to clear the line.

REPRISALS IN IRELAND ARE CARRIED OUT

Town Sacked Following Raiding of Military Barracks.

CORK, Sept. 29.—The sacking of the town of Mallow, County Cork, followed the Sinn Fein coup when the military barracks were raided and a sergeant killed. Seventeen lanceurs are said to be enacting reprisals. They burned down the town hall and forty buildings including the creamery and principal shops.

PROHIBITION IS ENDORSED

Trades and Labor go on Record by Narrow Margin after Long Debate

After a lengthy discussion last night over the merits and demerits of Prohibition, the Trades and Labor Council went on record by a narrow margin endorsing prohibition as against government control and sale of liquor. The debate was long and interesting and some forceful argument was offered in favor of and against the enactment. Prominent in the argument were Arthur Ellis, R. O. Miller and J. R. Beatty for prohibition and W. E. Thompson and J. J. Gillis for government control.

An address was also given at last night's meeting by Wm. McAdam on "Leadership." Mr. McAdam is a forceful speaker and his address was well received. Final reports were also received on the Labor Day celebration, showing a substantial balance on the right side of the books as a result.

Piledriving in a Month; Completion in February

Satisfactory Progress being made on Ocean Dock Extension; bottom material being brought from McNicholl Creek

Although operations on the construction of the new Grand Trunk wharf extension have not been as speedy as might have been expected, the progress being made now is reported to be very satisfactory. At the present time Grant and McDonald, the Vancouver contractors, are dredging with one of their dredges at McNicholl Creek and are bringing the material to the wharf site on barges in tow of the tug Fearful. This material being taken now is of a very suitable nature. Only one dredge is working at present, the other two are in the dry dock undergoing repairs for they were in none too good shape when they reached here from the south.

The wharf construction work proper by Grant, Smith & Magoffin, of course, cannot commence until all the dredging has been finished at the wharf site and the dumping of new material is finished. The first work will be the driving of piles and this will commence in about a month's time. At the present rate the wharf will be well on towards completion by the middle of February.

Meeting Held at Telkwa With Officials of the Line.

TELKWA, Sept. 29.—A representative deputation including Messrs. Wallace and Clements of the firm of Wallace, Parson and Farmer, wholesalers of Vancouver, met here Friday evening and discussed the coming changes on the railroad with some of the company officials from Smithers. Lem Broughton presided.

After discussing the matter well into the night, it was decided to leave the matter in the hands of the railwaymen.

Messrs. Wallace and Clements seemed to take a serious view of the inconvenience to the travelling public.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—The London press are hinting that Premier Hughes of Australia may retire in the near future. A testimonial for him is planned, for it is said, he will leave public life poor.

CARS COLLIDE ON THIRD AVENUE

As the result of an automobile collision at the corner of Third Avenue and Fifth Street at noon today, Fred Scadden's car and a taxi are both in a repair shop this afternoon. Scadden was going along Third westbound and the other car was coming in the opposite direction and through some miscalculation they collided. The damage was not very serious, a new radius rod being the only repair that is necessary to Scadden's car.

True Bills Against Baseball Players

Cicotte wept during confession that he got \$10,000 but is taken into custody and others expelled

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—The Grand County Jury voted true bills against the following in connection with the alleged "throwing" of the 1919 world baseball series between Cincinnati and Chicago in which Cincinnati won the championship of the world: Eddie Cicotte, Williams, Gandill, Felsch, Risberg, Joe Jackson, McMullin and "Buck" Weaver. All these men are members of the Chicago Americans.

Cicotte, the ace pitcher, wept during the confession that he got \$10,000 and Joe Jackson \$5,000, and slept with the money under their pillows.

Later Cicotte was taken into custody and every member indicted has been suspended by the club. This practically kills all chances of the White Sox winning the pennant this year.

More White Sox players may be involved in the gambling investigation and there is a possibility that this year's series may be probed. Cicotte, at the inquiry, told how eight players met in a room and Cicotte got \$10,000 cash before the decision to throw the 1919 series was arrived at.

The wording of the true bill brought in against the offenders is that they formed "a conspiracy to commit an illegal act." If found guilty the accused are liable to a period of imprisonment up to five years or a fine of ten thousand dollars.

2,000 BEEVES IN INTERIOR

Number of Cattle Likely to be Marketed in Prince Rupert This Fall.

TELKWA, Sept. 29.—There will be a large number of beef cattle for sale this autumn in the country between Ootsa Lake and Morricetown. A survey of the district indicates that there will be 2,000 head offered for sale, and in all probability many of them will be marketed in Prince Rupert.

GENSA, Korea, Sept. 28.—Twenty-five persons were killed in rioting here. Korean students destroyed a branch of the bank and killed seven Japanese.

POLES TAKE GRODNO

WARSAW, Sept. 28.—Grodno, an important city in Northwestern Russia near the border of Lithuania, has been captured by the Poles.

PRESENTATION TO LEADER OF LIBERAL PARTY

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King Guest Last Night at Public Reception at Hotel Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, Sept. 29.—Mackenzie King was the guest last night at an enthusiastic public reception at the Hotel Vancouver. In the course of the evening he was the recipient of a walking stick of wood from the steamer Beaver mounted with gold from the B. C. mines, the gift of the Women's Liberal Association of Vancouver.

In a short address, the Liberal leader said he was here to get Western ideas, believing he would soon be called on to administer Canada's affairs. He appealed for courtesy in public life.

The big public meeting is to be held tonight at which Hon. W. J. deB. Farris will preside.

WOMAN IS TO BE HANGED

Sentence is Pronounced Against Mrs. Sarah Jackson of Edmonton.

EDMONTON, Sept. 29.—Mrs. Sarah Jackson was yesterday sentenced to be hanged in December next for the murder of her husband. She is the first woman in Alberta to receive the death sentence.

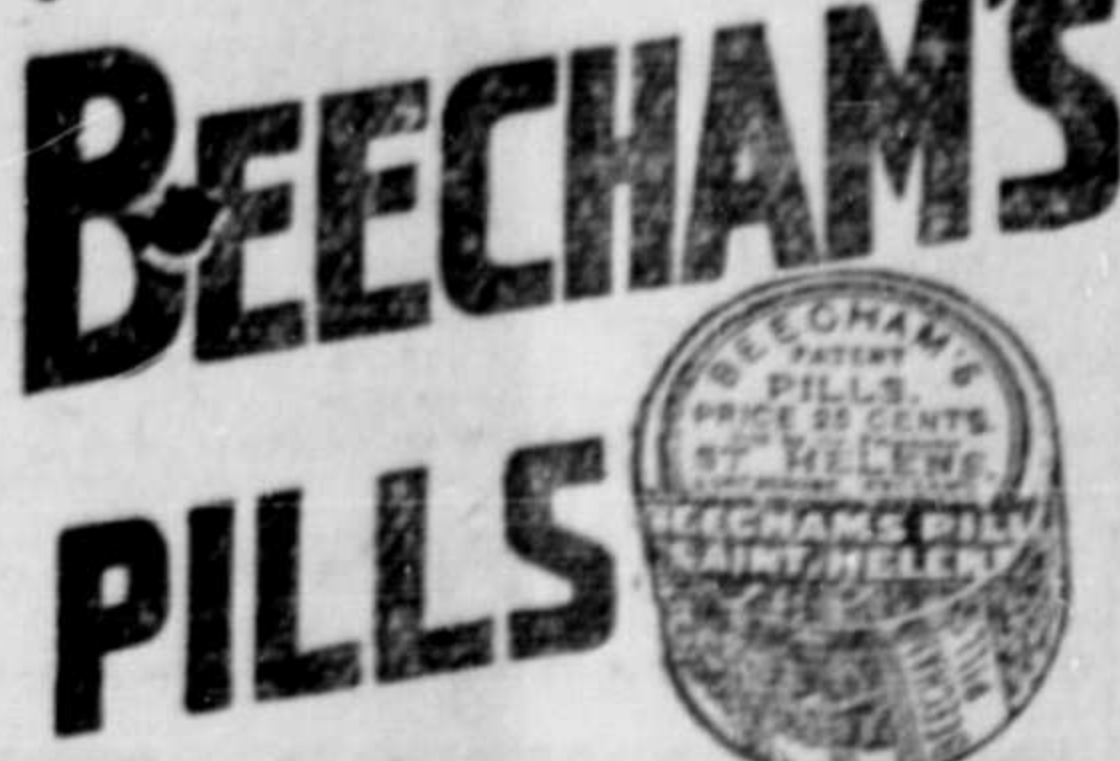

HAZELTON FOR TUBERCULOSIS

Hospital Board in Sending First
Patient there Recommends
Establishment of Govern-
ment Sanitarium

Hazelton as the site of a sanitarium for tubercular patients is strongly recommended by the Prince Rupert General Hospital Board and the body is now making representations in this regard to the Provincial and Federal Governments. This week the board is sending to the Hazelton Hospital the first tubercular patient from this institution to that point and the fact that it will cost the local institution \$60 cash every month to keep the patient there is a concrete demonstration of the faith that it has in the merits of the interior point as a tubercular resort. It is felt generally that a second Tranquille Sanitarium might be established at Hazelton both for natives and whites and be thus under the support of both provincial and federal governments.

"It is going to cost us \$60 a month to keep this patient at Hazelton," said President D. G. Stewart to the News yesterday afternoon, "but we are sending him in the belief that there he will have a good chance for recovery, which he could not possibly have here."

For the North

"We are trying to bring to the attention of the authorities, both Provincial and Federal, the advantages of this place for the location of a government sustained sanitarium with a wing both for Indians and for whites."

"Several times we have tried to send this very patient to Kamloops, but that place has such a long waiting list that we found it impossible to do so. Hazelton, it seems, would be an ideal location for a similar establishment for the North, especially as we have no place to send such cases now."

Indian Standpoint

From the Indian standpoint alone the need of such an institution in the North is keenly felt. W. E. Collison, Indian Agent, in a letter recently written to President Stewart says that tuberculosis is the most serious menace to the existence of the Indians on this coast and fully 50 per cent of them are today affected with it in some way or other. "The establishment of a sanitarium for Indian patients," says Mr. Collison, "would answer the urgent question of 'What are we to do with those who have already contracted the disease?' The very education that such an institution would give along the lines of self-preservation would be invaluable and would also take the advanced cases away from the villages where they are now becoming centres of infection. The need of a sanitarium for the care of Indian patients is just as important as the need for whites, because tuberculosis must be fought as a whole."

Burned by Author But Eventually
Re-written and Sold as a
Shilling Shocker.

An interested spectator during the filming of "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," the picture in which John Barrymore is giving one of the most remarkable performances of his career at the Westholme tonight, was Lloyd Osbourne, stepson of Robert Louis Stevenson, author of the story. "But, upon our persuasion, he rewrote the story and it was brought out in a cheap edition as a 'shilling shocker.' At first it attracted little attention, but it was soon taken up from the pulpit by the clergy and editorially in the newspapers. Soon it was a literary sensation."

"The film version of 'Jekyll and Hyde' is truly a work of genius. John Barrymore's performance surpasses even that of Richard Mansfield in the stage play made from the story. It is doubtful whether there will be another such portrayal as Mr. Barrymore's in this generation or the next. Mr. Mansfield depended solely upon theatrical devices for his effects; Mr. Barrymore's conception of the roles is more subtle and not only thrilling, but convincing as well."

GERMAN GOODS OUST BRITISH

Government of Great Britain is
Asked to Enforce Making
of Hosiery.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Considerable unemployment and consequent distress exists in the Midland hosiery centres—such as Leicester, Nottingham, Hinckley, Loughborough and Derby—as a result of the importation into the country of large quantities of German-made goods. In addition to widespread unemployment, many workers have had to be placed on short time.

The president of the Leicester Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Frank Moore, has drawn the attention of the President of the Board of Trade to the serious situation and has asked him either to insist that German productions shall be clearly marked as such, or to restrict imported goods to such quantities as are absolutely necessary, and thus enable British manufacturers to keep their workpeople more fully employed.

Before the war, it was customary for these goods to be marked "Made Abroad," "Made in Germany," or "Made in Saxony," but today there appears to be no means of enforcing such markings, and the German goods are coming in without any indication of their origin whatever. The production of fine cotton hosiery and fabric gloves is practically a new industry in this country, and was developed during the war at the instigation of the government. Now that the war is over the manufacturers complain that all moral and practical support has been withdrawn, and every encouragement is given to Germany to nullify the efforts which British manufacturers have made.

It is pointed out that many of the German employees are working 12 hours a day, as against eight hours worked here, and that, moreover, they are working for considerably lower wages than those of the British workpeople. The German goods are coming in at a price with which British manufacturers cannot compete.

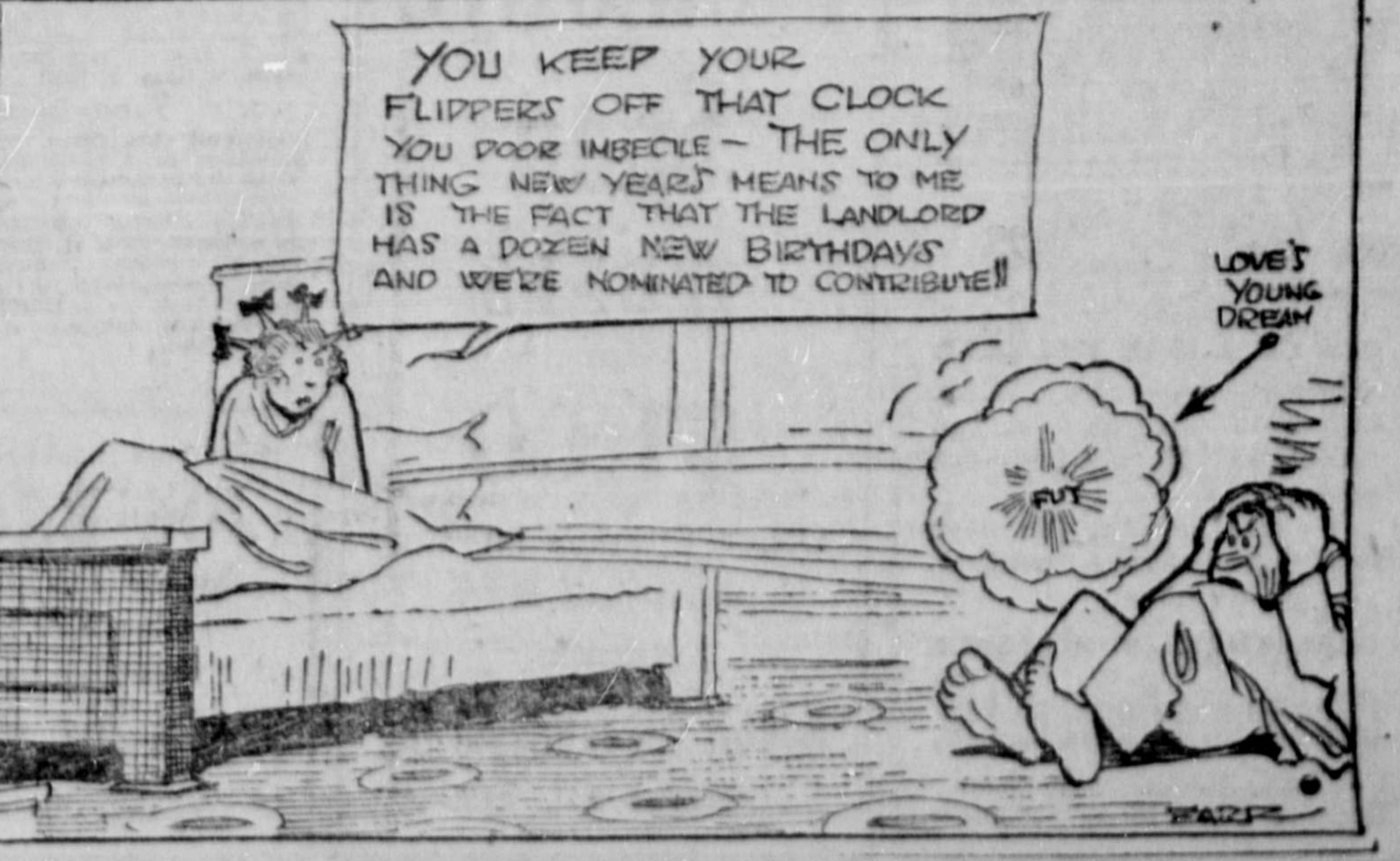

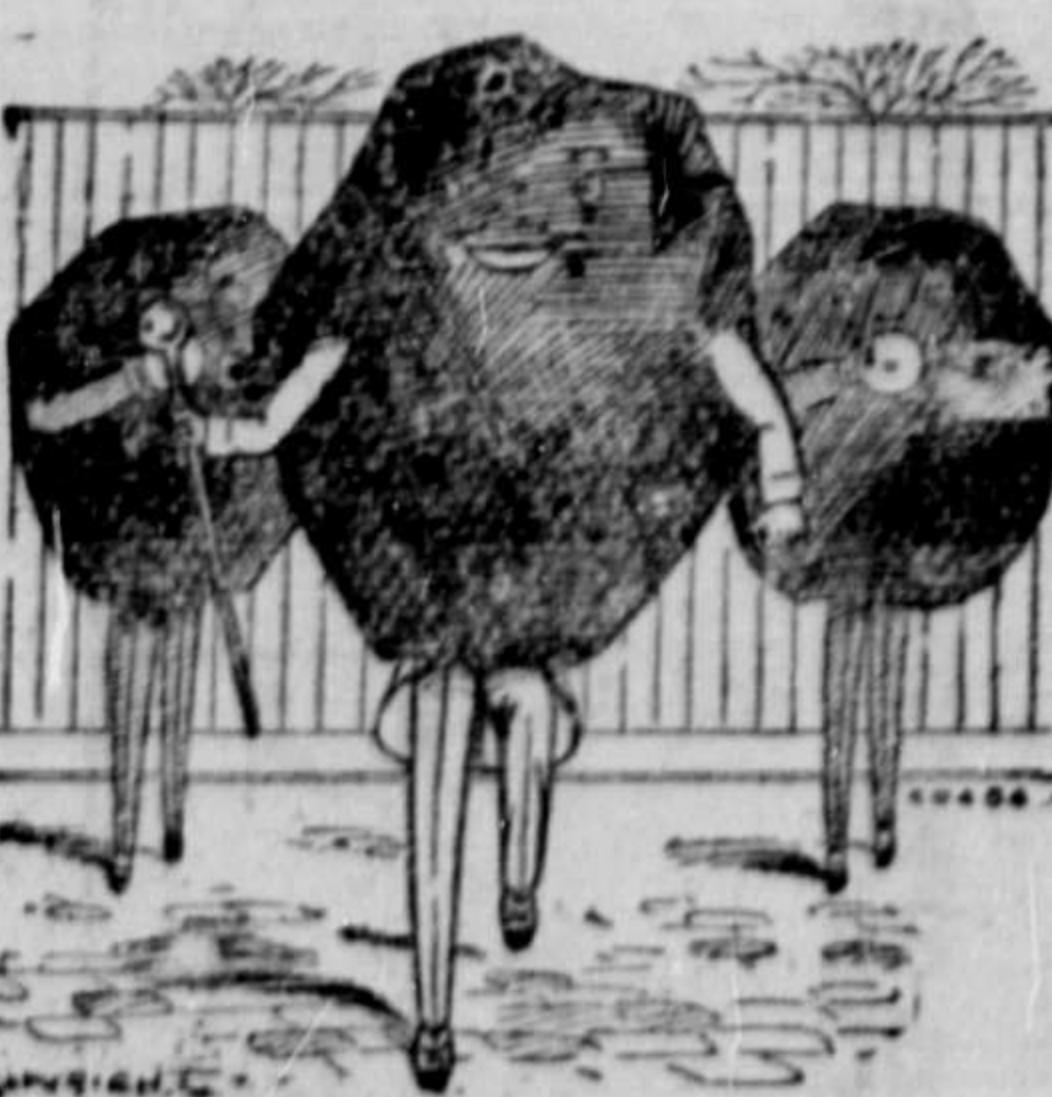

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Parting-up provisions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Failure to make improvements not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements may be made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial site on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebay of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and severing with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fee relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Ordering 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provided for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner.

Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners establish Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
