Beatty for prohibition and W. E. Thompson and J. J. Gillis for government control.

Piledriving in a Month; Completion in February

Satisfactory Progress being made on Ocean Dock Extension; bottom material being brought from McNicholl Creek

Although operations on the construction of the new Grand Trunk wharf extension have not been as speedy as might have been expected, the progress being made now is reported to be very satisfactory. At the present time Grant and McDonald, the Vancouver contractors, are dredging with one of their dredges at McNicholl Creek and are bringing the material to the wharf site on barges in tow of the tug Fearful. This material being taken now is of a very suitable nature. Only one dredge is working at present, the other two are in the dry dock undergoing repairs for they were in none too good shape when they reached here from the south. The wharf construction work proper by Grant, Smith & Magoffin, of course, cannot commence until all the dredging has been finished at the wharf site and the dumping of new material is finished. The first work will be the driving of piles and this will commence in about a month's time. At the present rate the wharf will be well on towards completion by the middle of February.

True Bills Against Baseball Players

Cicotte wept during confession that he got \$10,000 but is taken into custody and others expelled

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—The Grand County Jury voted true bills against the following in connection with the alleged "throwing" of the 1919 world baseball series between Cincinnati and Chicago in which Cincinnati won the championship of the world: Eddie Cicotte, Williams, Gandill, Felsch, Risberg, Joe Jackson, McMullin and "Buck" Weaver. All these men are members of the Chicago Americans.

Cicotte, the ace pitcher, wept during the confession that he got \$10,000 and Joe Jackson \$5,000, and slept with the money under their pillows.

Later Cicotte was taken into custody and every member indicted has been suspended by the club. This practically kills all chances of the White Sox winning the pennant this year.

More White Sox players may be involved in the gambling investigation and there is a possibility that this year's series may be probed. Cicotte, at the inquiry, told how eight players met in a room and Cicotte got \$10,000 cash before the decision to throw the 1919 series was arrived at.

The wording of the true bill brought in against the offenders is that they formed "a conspiracy to commit an illegal act." If found guilty the accused are liable to a period of imprisonment up to five years or a fine of ten thousand dollars.

2,000 BEEVES IN INTERIOR

Number of Cattle Likely to be Marketed in Prince Rupert This Fall.

TELKWA, Sept. 29.—There will be a large number of beef cattle for sale this autumn in the country between Ootsa Lake and Morricetown. A survey of the district indicates that there will be 2,000 beefs offered for sale, and in all probability many of them will be marketed in Prince Rupert.

To Reorganize
Athletic Association.

On Thursday night the annual general meeting of the Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association is to be held in the Board of Trade rooms and all Prince Rupert people who are members or who wish to become members are invited to attend on that occasion. Officers for the year will be elected and the policy for the season planned.

President McMordie, whose energy was largely responsible for the successful carrying out of the work of improving the rooms at Acropolis Hill, is anxious to resign and let some younger men carry on. He suggests that now they have suitable rooms and some apparatus all paid for and a little money in the bank with which to open the season, it is up to them to manage the institution and to make as much of it as they wish.

A further suggestion will be made at the meeting that the entrance fee be lowered in order to popularize the institution. This will come up and be discussed and voted on by the members. It is for the young men to decide what they will do.

It would be difficult to get a better start for an athletic association than that now offered. The big exhibition building is given rent free. A good dressing room with shower baths has been installed and is paid for. All that is now necessary is to get a good instructor, pay him well, and have classes organized and schedules of games drawn up. Doubtless there will be a good demand by basketball and other teams and there is no reason why a splendid season of indoor sport should not result. One absolutely necessary thing is to have a first rate paid instructor, who will give practically all his time to the work. To get such a man and pay him well in a town like this should not be difficult. Everything depends on proper organization.

English Papers
On Hunger Strike.

It is interesting to notice the articles in the English newspapers in connection with the hunger strike of the Mayor of Cork, especially those newspapers that are against the Lloyd George Government. The Manchester Guardian of September 3, only one day short of four weeks ago, said: "Wild riot prevails in the greatest city of Ireland and the Lord Mayor of Cork is dying or dead."

A week later on September 10 under a headline "Anarchy in Ireland" the same paper says:

"Before these lines are read the Lord Mayor of Cork will probably be dead. We say nothing of the human aspect of this event, the slow extinction of a brave spirit sacrificing life for an ideal, with all the world as spectator. There is something ennobling in the spectacle, and it will have its deep and far-reaching effects. A worse tragedy, because unredeemed by a spark of generosity and destined only to futility and shame, is the refusal of the Government to respond to an almost world-wide appeal for clemency. The appeal has failed; the ruthlessness and the folly have gone on. It is a great test of government and of our governing men. They are now embarked on a course from which it is hard to see how they can turn back. It is a disastrous course; it may lose them and us a kingdom. Of course, it does not stand alone. It cannot stand alone. It is part of a policy—the policy of moral cowardice and self-defeating force. It is hard for us here to realize what is going on in Ireland, and yet there never was a time when it was more important that our eyes should be open. Parliament is prorogued. The Government gives us no assistance. Mr. George is much concerned for the freedom of Poland, but for Irish freedom to all seeming he cares not a rap. The Labor party is prepared to go all lengths to prevent a war against Russia which the Government had not the smallest intention of declaring, but is a good deal less concerned about the war against Ireland which they have actually declared and are busily prosecuting."

Aviator's Failure
To Reach This City.

There seems to have been a prevalent notion here that the proposed seaplane demonstration was all camouflage, and that the plane was really not expected to arrive. This is absolutely incorrect. No one was more disappointed than the fair directors at the failure of the birdman to put in an appearance.

The wireless messages, which gave the idea that the plane was wrecked at Bidden Inlet, were confusing, but the complication arose owing to the name of the rescuing boat being named "Hidden Inlet." Lieut. Brown, who had such stirring adventures in his endeavor to reach here, was probably the most disappointed man of all.



HAZELTON FOR TUBERCULOSIS

Hospital Board in Sending First Patient There Recommends Establishment of Government Sanitarium

Hazelton as the site of a sanatorium for tubercular patients is strongly recommended by the Prince Rupert General Hospital Board and the body is now making representations in this regard to the Provincial and Federal Governments. This week the board is sending to the Hazelton Hospital the first tubercular patient from this institution to that point and the fact that it will cost the local institution \$60 cash every month to keep the patient there is a concrete demonstration of the faith that it has in the merits of the interior point as a tubercular resort. It is felt generally that a second Tranquille Sanitarium might be established at Hazelton both for natives and whites and thus under the support of both provincial and federal governments.

"It is going to cost us \$60 a month to keep this patient at Hazelton," said President D. G. Stewart, to the News yesterday afternoon, "but we are sending him in the belief that there he will have a good chance for recovery, which he could not possibly have here."

For the North

"We are trying to bring to the attention of the authorities, both Provincial and Federal, the advantages of this place for the location of a government sustained sanitarium with a wing both for Indians and for whites.

"Several times we have tried to send this very patient to Kamloops, but that place has such a long waiting list that we found it impossible to do so. Hazelton, it seems, would be an ideal location for a similar establishment for the North, especially as we have no place to send such cases now."

Indian Standpoint

From the Indian standpoint alone the need of such an institution in the North is keenly felt. W. E. Collison, Indian Agent, in a letter recently written to President Stewart says that tuberculosis is the most serious menace to the existence of the Indians on this coast and fully 50 per cent of them are today affected with it in some way or other.

"The establishment of a sanitarium for Indian patients," says Mr. Collison, "would answer the urgent question of 'What are we do with those who have already contracted the disease?'. The very education that such an institution

would give along the lines of self-preservation would be invaluable and would also take the advanced cases away from the villages where they are now becoming centres of infection. The need of a sanitarium for the care of Indian patients is just as important as the need for whites, because tuberculosis must be fought as a whole."

'DR. JEKYLL AND MR. HYDE' WAS SENSATION

Burned by Author But Eventually Re-written and Sold as a Shilling Shock.

An interested spectator during the filming of "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde," the picture in which John Barrymore is giving one of the most remarkable performances of his career at the Westholme tonight, was Lloyd Osbourne, stepson of Robert Louis Stevenson, author of the story. Mr. Osbourne collaborated with Stevenson in several of his stories.

"Jekyll and Hyde" was written only a short time before my step-father died," said Mr. Osbourne. "One night he had a dream and the next day he was writing feverishly. In three days the story evolved from his pen. He read it to my mother and myself. Then suddenly he decided it was no good and threw his manuscript into the fire.

"But, upon our persuasion, he rewrote the story and it was brought out in a cheap edition as a 'shilling shocker.' At first it attracted little attention, but it was soon taken up from the pulpit by the clergy and editorially in the newspapers. Soon it was a literary sensation.

The film version of "Jekyll and Hyde" is truly a work of genius. John Barrymore's performance surpasses even that of Richard Mansfield in the stage play made from the story. It is doubtful whether there will be another such portrayal as Mr. Barrymore's in this generation or the next. Mr. Mansfield depended solely upon theatrical devices for his effects; Mr. Barrymore's conception of the roles is more subtle and not only thrills, but convinces as well."

GERMAN GOODS OUST BRITISH

Government of Great Britain is Asked to Enforce Making of Hosiery.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Considerable unemployment and consequent distress exists in the Midland hosiery centres—such as Leicester, Nottingham, Hinckley, Loughborough and Derby—as a result of the importation into the country of large quantities of German-made goods. In addition to widespread unemployment, many workers have had to be placed on short time.

The president of the Leicester Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Frank Moore, has drawn the attention of the President of the Board of Trade to the serious situation and has asked him either to insist that German productions shall be clearly marked as such, or to restrict imported goods to such quantities as are absolutely necessary, and thus enable British manufacturers to keep their workpeople more fully employed.

Before the war, it was customary for these goods to be marked "Made Abroad," "Made in Germany," or "Made in Saxony," but today there appears to be no means of enforcing such markings, and the German goods are coming in without any indication of their origin whatever. The production of fine cotton hosiery and fabric gloves is practically a new industry in this country, and was developed during the war at the instigation of the government. Now that the war is over the manufacturers complain that all moral and practical support has been withdrawn, and every encouragement is given to Germany to nullify the efforts which British manufacturers have made.

It is pointed out that many of the German employees are working 42 hours a day, as against eight hours worked here, and that, moreover, they are working for considerably lower wages than those of the British workpeople. The German goods are coming in at a price with which British manufacturers cannot compete.




Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$10 an acre; second-class to \$5½ an acre.

Provision now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of four or more that may farm together, adjust pre-emption with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than one year and has made proportionate improvements, he may be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Record without permanent residence may be granted provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture.

Title cannot be obtained in less than one year unless improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Where pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may reside another or elsewhere, he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown Grant.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of taxes.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

TIMBER SALE X 2326.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year to three years of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No claim relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers whose pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.

Provision for return of moneys advanced and interest paid since August 4, 1918, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Armed Forces or dependents acquired direct or indirectly remitted from April to March 21, 1929.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchases involving forfeiture, or failure of payment of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1930.
