Over Two Million Pounds of Halibut

Harvest of the deep landed here during
September was large; Schooners
now going Northward

There was 2,320,000 pounds of halibut and 81,500 pounds of
salmon handled by local fish concerns during the month of August,
according to official figures obtained at the waterfront this morning.
This total is considered very satisfactory and exceeds the figures
for September, 1919, when the total halibut catch was 1,809,000
pounds and salmon, 27,000 pounds. The total handled here this
month could have been much higher had there been sufficient cars
all the time, for there were 163,000 pounds taken away to other
ports on account of car shortage here, while other boats bearing
of the shortage would not come here at all. The bait shortage has
also made difficulties in halibut fishing but all the ports on the
coast are short of bait and Prince
Rupert does not suffer especially
in that regard although the fish-
ing business is affected generally.

October is the month that many
of the small boats commence to
tie up and already there are some
fishermen in port who will not
go out again until January. The
big schooners are leaving the
southward banks to make their
way north to Yakutat, the Behring
Sea and theaskan Peninsula, and
will market here if conditions re-
main satisfactory.

The highest price paid here
during the month of September
was 18.6c on September 24. Oddly
the lowest price was paid on the

same date, 11.6. This is explained
by the fact that on that day there
were a limited number of cars and
the high price was paid to the
boats selling for shipment east
while the small price was paid
for fish going into cold storage.

Thousands Hear the Liberal Leader

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King says Dom-
inion Ministers are real Bolsheviks;
will speak at Prince George

VANCOUVER, Sept. 30.—Addressing 4,000 people at the Arena
last night, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King reiterated his demand for an
election. He said the Government raised the cry of Bolshevism in
Canada but the ministers were the real Bolsheviks by usurping the
functions of government without any mandate from the people.

Mr. King said he was making these demands because the Union
Government was not a force but a name, administering without the
people's authority. The coalition was born by silent manoeuvring,
when Borden's party was tumbling like a house of cards. They had
had neither submitted nor en-
dorsed any policy. The new plat-
form was a pretense.

Referring to the Grand Trunk
acquisition, the Liberal leader
charged financial extravagance
and autocracy. Another example
of this was the letting of ship-
building contracts without ten-
der or parliamentary authority.

The speaker reiterated the need
for a reduction of tariffs on such
things as the necessities of life.
Hon. W. J. deB. Farris, who
presided, said that the Union
Government was like a mule with
no pride of ancestry or hope for
posterity.

It was announced that in defer-
ence to demands Mr. King would
give an address at Prince George,
making the trip on a fish train
and picking up the regular pas-
senger the next day.

TAX SALE IS NEARLY OVER

Out of 147 Lots Offered 83 are
Already Sold and Sale will
Finish this Afternoon.

The highest price at this morn-
ing's city tax sale was paid by
Frank O. Cole for lot 37, block 16,
Section 1, the figure being \$589.10
while the lowest was for lot 6,
block 26, Section 7, which went to
the city at the knock-down price,
\$21.27. There was a good at-
tendance at the sale this morning
but the buyers were slow and
prices, generally speaking, were
low, many going to the city with-
out bidding. Of the 147 lots up
for sale 83 were disposed of this
morning and the balance will be
sold this afternoon. There are 8
lots more this year than there
were last. The officials of the
sale, which is in charge of W. D.
Vance, city treasurer, are E. A.
Woods, auctioneer, and Harry
Birch, cashier.

In Section 1 there were 37 lots
handled, the top price being
\$589.10 by F. O. Cole for lot 37,
block 16. The lowest price was
\$122.58 for lot 4, block 7, knocked
down to the city.

On the Section 2 list four lots
were disposed of, T. A. Roy pay-
ing the highest price for lot 50,
block 3, \$205.38. M. M. Stephens
got the cheapest lot, lot 23, block
12, \$39.14.

In Section 5, of the nine lots
sold, Th. Collart paid \$189.50 for
lot 37, block 9, while lot 13, block
28, went to E. C. Gibbons for
\$35.01.

In Section 6 there were only five
lots offered and the high price
was paid by Thos. McGlymont for
lot 18, block 17, \$262.12. W. H.
Vickers got the lowest lot, paying
\$60.95 for lot 16, block 31.

WOULD REMOVE MARINE HAZARD

Col. Peck Will Ask Support of the
Boards of Trade in Asking
Improvement at Sey-
mour Narrows.

Col. C. W. Peck, V.C., is going
to ask the assistance of the
Prince Rupert Board of Trade in
efforts towards having the Dom-
inion Government remove the
rock in the middle of Seymour
Narrows that is such a hazard to
northern navigation and concern-
ing which Prince Rupert would be
vitaly interested. Col. Peck will
ask the local board to support his
representations to the govern-
ment in this regard and will also
ask it to communicate with the
Boards of Vancouver and Victoria
as well as the Shipmasters'
League asking their support of a
petition being sent to Ottawa.

The rock in question has long
been a dread to mariners of
northern waters and has figured
in many marine disasters. It was
only a couple of months ago that
the Prince George got into diffi-
culties at this point and all
steamers coming to Prince Rupert
have to pass it. Although
Seymour Narrows is in the Comox
riding represented by H. S.
Clements, it is felt that Skeena
district is more directly interested
in the improvement on account of
the amount of shipping that
passes there in and out of Prince
Rupert and other Skeena ports
and the petition for its improve-
ment might well arise here. Be-
sides the shipping to this port all
boats going to southeastern
Alaska have to pass through
Seymour Narrows.

The taking out of the rock
would remove the danger of ves-
sels hitting it and would at the
same time lessen the current
caused by the tide at that point.
The undertaking would be quite
a large one, but not as large as
generally thought and the benefit
to navigation made thereby would
be invaluable.

Cruel Way of Raising Revenue.

In his evidence before the Tariff Commission at Victoria, E. S. Woodward, secretary of the Trades and Labor Council, said that the "tariff was the cruellest way of raising a revenue" as under it the poor man is taxed the same as the rich man and the man with 12 children pays twelve times the tax that the man with one child does.

The argument that Mr. Woodward omitted was that it was the most expensive way of raising revenue. From the matter of economy it is a total failure. This is the reason:

It is well known that business men calculate their profits on a percentage basis. In pricing goods, except on a few staples, they aim to get a certain percentage of profit. Suppose this profit is thirty per cent. The price of an article is a dollar, wholesale, on the other side of the line. Add duty 30 per cent and the price is \$1.30. The jobber who imports gets, say, ten per cent, which added to handling charges brings it at least to \$1.50. On this is added the retail profit of thirty per cent, and the price to the retailer is then \$1.95. Yet out of the 30 cents paid to the government there is to be deducted the expensive cost of collecting by means of customs houses and the delay and annoyance caused to customers when importing.

On many articles not looked on as staples, the profit is much larger than thirty per cent. In some lines where the demand is comparatively small and sales infrequent it is necessary to charge at least 100 per cent profit in order to be able to carry on. In cases like this it is easy to see how expensive is the method of collecting revenue by means of customs duties.

People Always Like to be Fooled.

There are two reasons why people stick to the customs duties. One is that it enables a few people to make a large profit and they are able to fool the people into believing it is the best thing for them to tax themselves in that way. The other reason is that everyone objects to paying direct taxes and does his best to evade them. When paying a tax on a pound of tea through customs duties, the purchaser does not realize that she is paying taxes every time she makes a purchase. She often blames the merchant, or the intermediate profiteer, for the high price, when all the time it is the Government that has pushed the price up by means of a customs duty collectable at the point of entry.

We are not a very wise people. We are easily fooled, and, often as not, we fool ourselves. A certain class of people speak of themselves as "wage slaves." Usually they are slaves to their own ignorance. As the result of modern educational methods they have acquired a little knowledge, enough to see that they are victims of injustice. What we all need is more knowledge to enable us to obtain balance and to investigate all the deep problems of society. Added to all the other studies must be a study of human nature and the wonderful way it acts and reacts under certain conditions.

Professional Sport Gets a Jar.

The revelations being made in regard to the "throwing" of the world series ball game last year are giving a serious set back to professional sport of all kinds. The man who plays for money or who fights for money is not on a very high plane, yet we take a great interest in this "professional sport" often because it is so much more skillfully played than in amateur sport. It seems impossible to develop the highest skill without the money urge.

TEXT OF LETTER ON ALDERMAN PERRY BY THE HOSPITAL BOARD

The following is the text of the letter sent to the mayor and city council by D. C. McRae and J. B. Roerig in regard to the attendance of Alderman Perry at Hospital Finance Committee meetings:

"Since it has been suggested to the council that an apology should be forthcoming for the non-attendance of the council's representative at the finance committee meetings of the Hospital Board, we take great pleasure in tendering our most humble apology if for any reason Alderman Perry thinks that he has been slighted, ignored or humiliated at the hands of the finance committee.

"Mr. Perry is reported as having stated that he has attended two meetings of the finance committee. This is not quite correct for as far as we know he has attended only one meeting and then upon being notified by D. C. McRae, after the other members were present. Efforts to get him to subsequent meetings were unavailing.

One Out of Eleven.

"In 1919 Mr. Perry was a member of the utilities committee of the council. The records to April 10th are not available but from that date to the end of the year he attended 15 meetings out of 35 meetings held. Out of eleven meetings regularly held (notices of which were duly mailed to Mr. Perry) of the Hospital Board he has attended only one. He has been remiss in his duties to the regular monthly board meetings as well as the meetings of the finance committee.

"About August 1st Alderman Perry explained to Mr. McRae that his apparent lack of interest in hospital affairs was due to his multiplicity of other duties, and further that he was not being notified of the meetings. The secretary's attention was called to this and Mr. McRae specifically inquired at the next meeting for Mr. Perry and was informed that he was out of town.

Erroneous Impression.

"It appears to us that Alderman Perry has not properly represented your council in hospital affairs and that deep down in his heart he well knows that he has not done his duty, but takes opportunity at the council meeting to leave an erroneous impression in his own favor.

"However, it pleases us greatly to have the members of the Hospital Board manifest interest in the affairs of the institution, indeed we wish that more interest would be taken in the work, and particularly we should think that the council ought to be well represented on the board, and perhaps now that his resignation was not accepted Alderman Perry will get down to work and show that he can assume public duties and faithfully carry out the responsibilities."

The Bank of Montreal has notified the city that it cannot make further advances to the city until the differences with the G.T.P. over assessment have been settled. Possible impairment in the city's assessment is given as a reason.

Dr. W. T. Kergin is leaving on Saturday for Montreal to attend the Congress of the Surgeons of America. While in the east he will visit Toronto and will go to Rochester to take a post graduate course at the Mayo Clinic. He expects to be away a month.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Mrs. Arthur Hamilton, who left St. Margaret's Bay, near Dover, about 6 o'clock in an endeavor to swim the Channel, gave up the attempt after being in the water all night. Mr. Porter, of Margate, acted as pilot and there were four assistants in a motor launch and rowing boat.

Mrs. Hamilton, who returned to Deal next day, stated that she left the water about nine miles off the French coast after having swum for over 12 hours. The weather was very favorable when she left St. Margaret's, but about six miles off the coast she encountered a strong under-current which made progress difficult.

Mrs. Hamilton added that the arrangements for her swim were adequate, and that she was perfectly fit when she entered the water. She was feeling very dazed after her effort. She did not feel inclined to make another start this year, but hoped to try another year in more favorable weather.

Another Competitor

Although she failed in her attempt to swim from Dover to Calais on Friday, Mrs. Hilda Willing, of Rochester, created a new world's "record" by swimming for 10 hours 35 minutes, 15 minutes longer than the time of Isaacus, who in 1900, in an attempt to swim from Calais to Dover, was in the water for 10 hours and 20 minutes, while she swam 20 miles. Mrs. Willing, who is 28 years of age, covered nearly 30 miles, swim and drift.

PEACE RIVER TO COAST BY WAY OF HAZELTON

Darwin A. Piche, of Peace River,
says People Want Connection
with This Port

Darwin A. Piche, a resident of the Peace River country, who is at present in this city, has been making representations to the Board of Trade regarding the advisability of a railway from Hazelton tapping the Peace River country. He has been in conference with the commissioner of the Board of Trade and has asked that the local body get in touch with the Peace River boards with a view to petitioning the government to put in such a railroad. Mr. Piche states that the people of the Peace River valley would prefer the Hazelton route in that the Pacific coast outlet would be Prince Rupert instead of Vancouver. The proximity of Prince Rupert and the shorter railway haul to the sea is the sound basis upon which Mr. Piche and the people of the Peace River are asking for the Hazelton and Prince Rupert outlet to the Peace River valley. Premier Oliver when he recently spoke favorably of such a route and the question is especially timely as there are at this time government surveys being made from points north of the Grand Trunk Pacific for the selection of a new Peace River route tributary to the Pacific coast.

The question will be taken up at the monthly meeting of the Board of Trade and Mr. Piche has been invited to attend to set forth his views and the claims of the Peace River residents.

DEVELOPMENT OF TANK CORPS

Experimental Grounds in Dorsetshire where Progress is being Made

LONDON, Sept. 30.—Whatever hopes may be centred in the League of Nations as an insurance against future wars, almost every nation has been busily engaged since the Armistice in experimenting with a view to developing and improving weapons of war generally.

The most important experiments have been directed towards the development of the Tank. The French and the Americans, it is believed, have achieved very important results in this direction. British tank experts have not been idle, and although the greatest secrecy has necessarily been maintained, there is every reason to believe that they are highly satisfied with the progress made.

At Wool, in Dorset, the tank corps has an excellent experimental ground, but it has the disadvantage of having no other troops stationed in its vicinity. Combined operations, therefore, cannot be carried out. The military authorities are believed to be fully alive to this disadvantage, and it is thought that, very shortly, as the end of the training season is approaching, a number of tanks will be moved to one of the chief training centres, either Salisbury Plain or Aldershot, with a view to a small scheme of combined operations, in which the Royal Air Force, tanks, artillery and infantry will all take part. It is to be hoped, however, that if these operations take place, some cavalry also will be able to participate, since it is of the utmost importance to have some light thrown on the question to what extent tanks can take the place of cavalry.

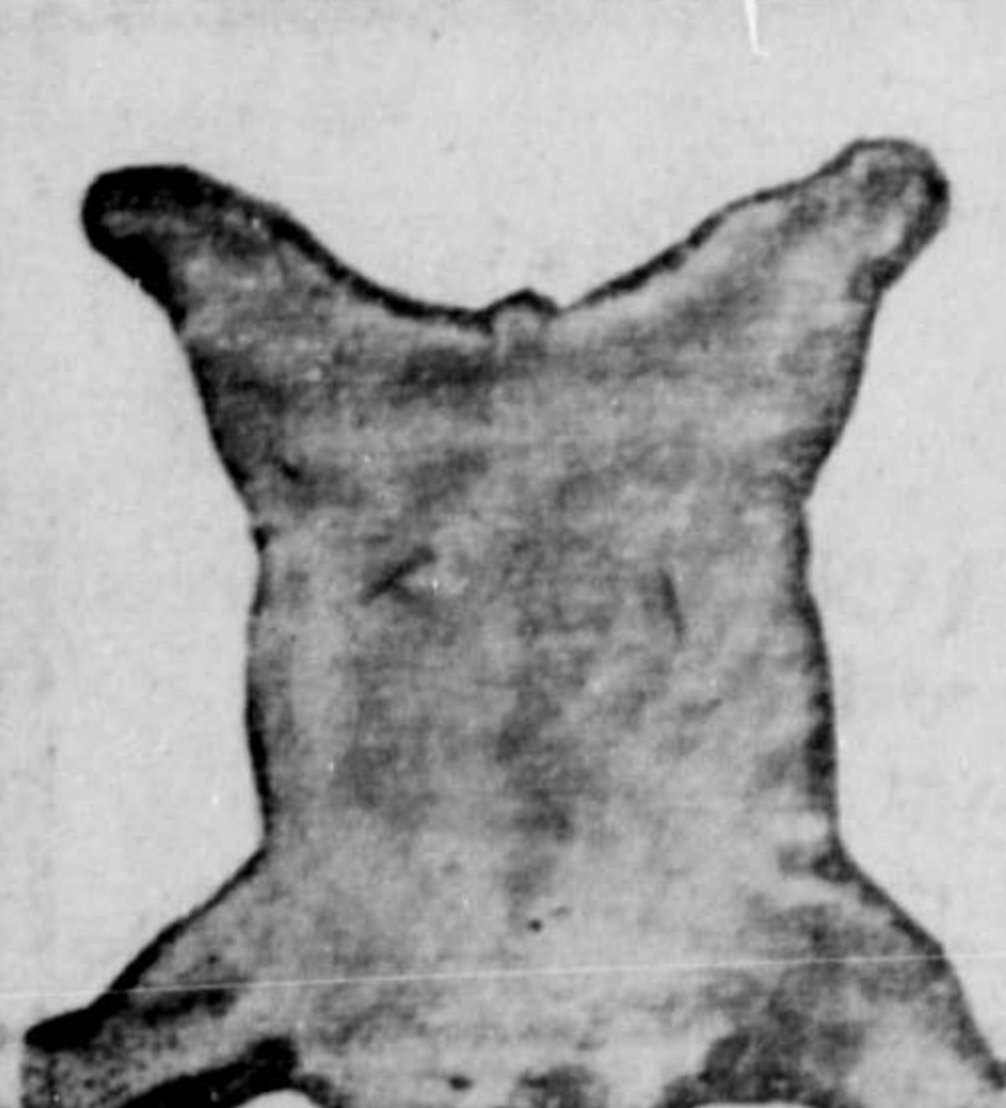

AGAINST ALL PROHIBITION.

Editor the News:

Regarding prohibition, I would like to call your attention to the fact that the original prohibitionists used to prohibit all churches except the one they were used to. We have again advanced in the vicious circle of prohibition to where the churches are voluntarily endeavoring to unionize the church. Once succeeding in this, we shall arrive at the beginning of another dark age era with its inquisition.

We are becoming a nation of prohibitionists. Every individual has some one weakness which preys upon his mind until he wants to prohibit other people from sane and happy living. The manufacture, sale or use of liquor is no crime any more than the manufacture, sale or use of sugar is.

An Assumption.

Our prohibition laws, like many of our laws for the regulation of other people's lives, assume that every individual in our country is a scoundrel and therefore the whole community should be punished before they do any harm. In all our business life we assume the opposite idea that all men are honorable and treat them so, until we learn differently. The result of the governmental assumption is, as one of our judges said, "Our prohibition laws are making criminals of us all."

The original crime in the liquor business was when, at the instance of monopolists, a license was put on the manufacture and sale of liquor. Liquor was and is either a good thing or a bad thing. If it was good, there was no necessity of granting an unearned monopoly on its manufacture or sale. If it was bad there was far less reason for doing so.

Many Prohibitory Laws.

Our liquor prohibition is but one of the many prohibitory laws wherein our respectable people have been persuaded to grant by law an unearned monopoly of their business to men of criminal instincts, and all other men who enter that business have therefore become criminal. Our blind piggers are the direct result of such law. "The best governed country is the least governed." The very men who want all these vicious regulations are the ones to break them. They are also the ones who want other people's lives governed, but they don't pay their taxes as witness the Dominion prosecutions.

PRINCE GEORGE DOES NOT FAVOR

Asking Prince Rupert to Support Protest to Railway Commission on New Service.

A telegram was yesterday received by the local Board of Trade from the Prince George body asking support in a protest that is to be lodged with the Railway Commission when it visits Prince George next week over the impending changes in the service of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway that are to become effective on October 3. The Prince George board maintains that the making of the G. T. P. route west of Jasper into practically a branch line is going to have a detrimental effect. The matter will be discussed at the meeting of the board tomorrow.

Since the announcement recently made whereby the through trains here will be discontinued at Jasper and, instead, diverted to Vancouver from that point protests have been heard from both Smithers and Prince George. Of course the real reason for their protests is probably not on that score. Where they suffer is in the moving of the train crews from these places to Endako and McBride respectively. In future under the new service crews taking the trains out of Rupert will go on to Endako and the crew from there will take the trains on to McBride, thus practically cutting Smithers and Prince George out as residence towns for the divisional crews. In this regard what is loss to Smithers and Prince George will be gain to Endako and McBride.

Through Sleepers.

Speaking of the change, G. A. McNeill, assistant general passenger and freight agent, has informed the Board of Trade that he thinks the through sleepers will still be maintained out of here but day passengers will be required to change at Jasper. The service from Prince Rupert will be improved for the run to Winnipeg will be made in four hours less time. Eastbound, the Grand Trunk trains will reach Jasper at 6:30 in the evening and the Canadian National will continue at 7:30.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$3.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emption abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

For grazing and industrial purposes, pre-emptor holding 40 acres may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes, areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company. Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road, not exceeding half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces, time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 28, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years. Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

CANON BARNES ON EVOLUTION

Preaching in Westminster Abbey
He says No one Denies Ascent
from Lower Animals

LONDON, Sept. 20.—Preaching in Westminster Abbey Canon Barnes alluded to the controversy which had arisen over his recent sermon at Cardiff during the meeting there of the British Association.

He gave various instances to show the gradual acceptance of the idea of evolution by Christian thinkers during the last generation; and emphasized the significance of the fact that, so far as he was aware, no Bishop, no Non-conformist divine, no scholar or man of science or eminence, had come forward to deny explicitly that man is descended from the lower animals, or to assert that the Fall was an historical fact. Bishops and divines might yet come forward, but he reiterated his conviction that the verdict alike of modern science and of Christian thought would be unfavorable to the doctrine of a special creation asserted in the Genesis narratives. We were living at the end of the most fruitful century of discovery in the history of mankind. The framework of ideas which placed creation 6,000 years ago had simply fallen to pieces. Christianity had everything to gain by its new freedom.

Now Accessible

Alluding to the contention that a revolution in religious thought was best made in silence he urged that modern conceptions of the origin of the earth and of man were now accessible in popular form and that the silence of Christian with regard to them was responsible for the alienation of the younger educated men and women from the Christian churches. He quoted from his own experience and from a report on "Younger Women and the Church of England," issued four years ago, to show the widespread dissatisfaction that at present prevailed. Christian clergy could no longer close their minds or their sermons to the new ideas. The closed mind would lead, sooner or later, to the closed church.

Origin of Sin

Canon Barnes next dwelt with the objection that it was possible to make transition smoother by using the early Genesis narratives as allegories without explicitly denying their truth. He pointed out the dangerous resemblance between such a process of accommodation and the modernism which Pius X. rightly condemned. The principle of modernism was that a man might accept facts which he knew to be untrue because they had a value for faith. Such a contention was, to the plain man, intolerable. Yet it was somewhat similar to the plea that the Fall had a spiritual value to those who denied it to be a historical event. He urged that there was no necessity to make such a plea. The story of the Fall was an attempt to explain the origin of sin. Though the story were, performance, abandoned, the fact of sin remained. To escape from sin man needed the atonement; and Redemption through Christ was a fact of Christian experience—not some bit of ancient folklore.

TOOK PATRIOTIC FUNDS AT CALGARY

CALGARY, Sept. 20.—Malcolm Davis, formerly secretary of the Canadian Patriotic fund, was found guilty here yesterday of misappropriating monies belonging to the fund. The lady secretary is facing a similar charge.

F. Biddlecome was in the police court this morning charged with vagrancy and was remanded until tomorrow morning.
