PRINCE GEORGE SOUTH TONIGHT

Change in Schedule of Trains. All
Leaving Here at 11:15
Instead of 11:30.

The proposed southbound trip of the Prince John was cancelled yesterday, just too late for a notice to get in the paper. Instead of her, the Prince George will go south, leaving tonight at 9 and the John, which is making a short run to Masset, will take her place on the Sunday night run. The George will get to Vancouver on Monday morning in time to take the Prince Rupert's run from that place, arriving here on Wednesday.

There is a slight change in the railway time table, all trains in future leaving here at 11:15 instead of 11:30 mornings.

Mackenzie King Is Pleased with West

to meet a good many Prince Rupert people before he leaves; speaks tonight in Westholme Theatre

Bright and fit and energetic, Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King and party arrived this morning on the delayed steamer and met by a goodly delegation of Prince Rupert citizens. He was once taken in hand by the local Liberal Association and are being escorted to the shipyards, the cold and the Seal Cove.

Mr. Mackenzie King were accompanied by Dr. H. S. Beland, M.P., Ernest Lapointe, M.P., W. C. Kennedy, M.P., Wm. Duff, M.P., and the organizer, Andrew Hayden, M.P., Liberal leader and several of the others are to address the citizens of Prince Rupert tonight at the Westholme Theatre.

Mr. King is exceedingly pleased with the reception that was given him both at Vancouver and Victoria. He said it far exceeded his expectations and just served to show how dissatisfied the people were with the present government, especially in view of the fact that they had no mandate from the people to carry on.

Mr. King likes the West. He says that he has met some of the finest people he knows on this coast and he is no stranger to a number of Prince Rupert people. Before he leaves he hopes to meet a good many more of them.

ALBERTA GOVERNMENT MEMBERS TO EXTEND WELCOME TO LEADER

EDMONTON, Oct. 1.—Members of the provincial government will assist in the utmost toward the welcome and entertainment of Hon. Mackenzie King and other members of the Liberal party touring the west, who are due to arrive in Edmonton on Wednesday of next week. Premier Stewart says the story to the effect that the Alberta government would take no official part in the reception of Hon. Mr. King, might give rise to an erroneous impression.

While it is true that as a government no official demonstration will be made in honor of Hon. Mr. King, the cabinet ministers will do their utmost as Liberals and as citizens of the province to make the Liberal leader's stay in the city as pleasant as possible.

Hon. J. R. Boyle is chairman of the general committee on reception, arrangements for which are being carried out by sub-committees will report at a general meeting in the Liberal club rooms, Sandison block, Monday evening. Hon. Mr. Boyle says all Liberals in the city are invited to attend this meeting when final arrangements will be made for the welcome and entertainment of Hon. Mr. King and party.

GUN CLUB AT SMELTER TOWN

New Organization to Hold First Regular Shoot at Traps Tomorrow

ANYOX, Oct. 2.—The first regular competition in connection with the newly formed gun club at Anyox is to take place tomorrow at the traps on the slag pile.

The Gun Club was recently organized with H. S. Munro, president, E. E. Campbell, vice-president, Messrs. Baker and Ernie Marsden, secretaries; and W. L. Wetmore and Jack Beckett on the committee.

Shoots are to be held twice a week, Wednesdays and Sundays, and much interest is being taken in the sport. Already the boys have been out practising several times.

ADMITS HAVING MADE A FALSE STATEMENT

But Pleads Joking; is Acquitted by Jury, but Rebuked by the Judge

BRANTFORD, Oct. 1.—An acquittal was brought in by the jury in the case against Joseph Dutton before Mr. Justice Kelly. He was charged with publicly making a false statement with wilful intent to harm the administration of justice. This was the first such case in Ontario and only the second in the Dominion.

The statement said to have been made by Dutton was that a few hundred dollars was a mere nothing in police protection on the liquor traffic. Dutton admitted making the statement to P. A. Shuttis, but pleaded that it was said in a joking way, as Mr. Shuttis knew at the time. Dutton admitted that the statement was false, and Chief of Police Slemm declared that there was nothing in it.

After the verdict had been rendered Mr. Justice Kelly dismissed the accused, but gave a reprimand for the use of the words and counselled him against using such language jokingly in future.

ENDED HIS LIFE IN A GAS FILLED ROOM

SEATTLE, October 2.—Because his wife was asking a divorce, S. Weaver Scott, 38 years of age, formerly an expressman of Vancouver, ended his life in a gas-filled room here.

Welcome to Leader
Of Liberal Party.

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King is here today and all the city, irrespective of party, will join in welcoming him and the other prominent Liberals who are with him. Prince Rupert people as a unit have welcomed members of the present government, and they expect the opportunity of welcoming the Premier. Today, however, there is with us the man who ranks second only to the premier in importance, and second to none in ability and prestige. With him are Hon. Dr. Borden, who fought with the Allied forces overseas, and who was a former member of the Laurier cabinet. Another bright young man, a future leader, is Ernest Lapointe, a French-Canadian, who has been attracting much attention of late as a coming leader in Quebec. Mr. Duff and Mr. Kennedy are prominent members of parliament and Mr. Haydon is organizer for the Liberal party throughout Canada. All these men will be on the platform at the Westholme Theatre tonight and several of them will give short addresses while Mr. Mackenzie King will give the speech of the evening.

Value of Port
To the Dominion.

There is every possibility that in the near future Mr. King will be premier of Canada. He has the ability, the force of character and he is acquiring the confidence of the Canadian people. Because of the future probabilities we are anxious that he shall see the town and its possibilities and get to realize what value Prince Rupert may some day be to Canada. We are apt to be rather selfish and consider what developments we can get for the sake of ourselves. He will look at it in the broader light of what will be the value to Canada to have a large seaport, nearer by several hundred miles to the Orient than any other can be, an entrepot for the Orient and a means of quick communication with Siberia.

Making Province
Known in East.

It is to be hoped that some time this winter Premier Oliver will be able to go to Montreal to accept the invitation to address the Canadian Club there on British Columbia. The Premier can talk British Columbia by the hour. He knows it like a book. He speaks in a convincing and interesting manner and if he goes he will give the province more publicity than could be secured in any other way, so far as Eastern Canada is concerned. It would be a good thing for the eastern people to know a real farmer premier, much more a farmer than the leader of the farmer party in Ontario.

Canon Barnes on
Science and Faith.

Inquiries have been made in regard to an article on evolution by Canon Barnes published in the News, in which reference was made to a recent sermon at Cardiff. In that sermon the Canon as reported in the London Times, said:

"After a period of natural hesitation and deplorable hostility Christian thinkers now quietly accept theories of the origin of the earth and of man due to modern scientific investigation and speculation. They therefore found it necessary to abandon the doctrine of the Fall and arguments deduced from it by theologians from St. Paul onward. There was a strong temptation to allegorize beliefs which it was no longer possible to hold; but, though allegory had its value, it was misused when it obscured the revolutionary consequences of new knowledge. A faith that feared the progress of knowledge anticipated its own dissolution. Yet, while some elements in the Christian tradition were perforce discarded, the essential nature and strength of the Christian Faith had been more clearly disclosed. For Christianity the perfection of Christ's religious teaching and the revelation of His own supreme excellence were alone of decisive importance. The unique value of Christ's self-revelation was a fact of history and of religious experience undisturbed by scientific progress. On the other hand, Christ's religious teaching dovetailed with singular exactness into the wider scheme of evolution now coming into view. It now seemed highly probable that from some fundamental stuff in the universe the electrons arose. From them came matter. From matter life emerged. From life came mind. From mind spiritual consciousness was developed.

There was a time when matter, life, mind, the soul of man, were not; but now they were. Each had arisen as part of a vast scheme planned by God. The Christ Spirit within a man, "the quality of deity," as it had been called, separated him from the animals whence he had sprung, just as life separated them from the matter of which they were made. And through the same Spirit of Christ men put on immortality, inasmuch as the things that were of God were eternal with God. Thus science described the process by which man had come into being and religion offered him guidance towards his spiritual destiny. Evolution described facts; the ultimate meaning of those facts the Christian revelation disclosed."

BOARD OF TRADE
BACKS UP COW
BAY COMMITTEEEndorse Recommendation of Filling in to Provide Sites for
Warehouses—Capt. Freeman Dissents.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trade held last evening, the report of the Cow Bay committee was received and finally adopted, the only opposing member to the adoption being Capt. H. K. Freeman who, speaking at some length, gave the reasons for his opposition. The text of the recommendations of the committee were fully reported some weeks ago and since that time the city council has acquiesced in the proposal to fill Cow Bay if the city is recompensed by adequate waterfrontage outside. The railway company and provincial government has also approved the recommendation and the latter has again made application to the railway commission for permission to put in the level crossing, the request for which was withdrawn some time ago.

Capt. Freeman.

In voicing his disapproval at the filling in of Cow Bay, Captain Freeman last night stated that as a haven for smaller boats the bay would be much more valuable left open than it would be filled in for warehouse sites. If it were dredged out an 1,800 foot waterfrontage for small boats could be secured and with floats this could be increased to 3,600 feet. The cost would be small and 300 lineal feet would be all the actual waterfrontage taken. This city had something now that other cities have had to put in under great expense. Petitions were passing along the waterfront opposing the measure of filling in and these were being largely signed by fishermen.

Discussion.

Considerable discussion ensued and the point was taken that the provincial government could not dredge Cow Bay as it was not under its jurisdiction and the federal government would not be likely to do so because it is within a railway track. Its use as outlined by Captain Freeman was a prospect in the far future and the place would perhaps be tied up for a generation, where now there was a possibility of having it put into immediate use if the recommendations prepared by the committee were carried out. Finally on motion of M. P. McCaffery, seconded by G. W. Nickerson, the report of the committee was adopted with Captain Freeman dissenting.

TO REGULATE
DRUG SALES

Doctors Asked by Dominion Government to Aid in Rounding up Addicts.

OTTAWA, Oct. 1.—By an order printed in a special issue of The Canada Gazette some very far-reaching regulations affecting the drug traffic in Canada go into force immediately. Every doctor and druggist within the Dominion is to be circualarized, with a view to rounding up drug addicts, and measures are to be adopted which will make the carrying on of illicit drug traffic practically impossible.

That the government health officials are sincere in their effort to clean up the drug evil, and that they are having wonderful success, is shown by some figures given out today. Compared with the three months ending June 30 last year, the amount of cocaine imported into Canada for the same period this year has dropped from 2,373 ounces to 605 ounces. Cocaine has dwindled from \$12,384 worth to \$5,816 worth. Morphine and opium have both dropped away down in importation.

Evidence that certain porters and news agents on Canadian railways are implicated in the carrying of drugs across Canada has reached the federal health authorities here, and immediate action, it is stated, will be taken.

Follow the crowd to the Westholme Theatre tonight to hear Mackenzie King, leader of a majority of the Canadian people.

W. L. Mackenzie King and Five of His Colleagues

Some of the men who are making history in Canada are visiting ci y today; sketches of their lives

The visit of six of Canada's prominent men to Prince Rupert is an event in the history of the city. Next to the Premier there is not one that is so much in the public eye as the leader of the opposition, the prospective next premier. W. L. Mackenzie King and his colleagues are touring the west, getting the western spirit. Western people will be interested in knowing who they are and what they have done.

The Honorable William Lyon Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal Party, is now in his 46th year, having been born in December, 1874. His father was John King, K.C., a Canadian of Scotch descent, a well known lecturer at the Ontario Law School, and writer on legal topics; his mother was the youngest daughter of William Lyon Mackenzie, a leader in the struggle for responsible government in Canada. Mr. King's university course was carried on at Toronto University, University of Chicago, Harvard and abroad. He specialized upon industrial and social problems. From 1900 to 1908, he was deputy minister of labor, served as chairman of several Royal Commissions on labor, and immigration problems, and settled numerous and difficult labor disputes. He acted for the government also in negotiations relating to immigration from Great Britain from the Orient and from India in particular. In 1908 he was appointed minister of labor, and was in Parliament until the defeat of the Laurier Government in 1911. During the war, he rendered important services in settling industrial disputes and furthering continuous and maximum production by concerns engaged in producing war supplies.

In 1919 he was elected Leader of the Liberal Party by a large and representative convention, in a free, open and fair election, the most democratic choice ever made in Canada. Mr. King is a student and profound admirer of British institutions, and during the session of 1920 a large part of his criticism of the Government was devoted to its departure from the spirit of those institutions. At the opening of the session he moved a resolution calling for a general election as the best means of removing unrest and restoring stability and confidence in responsible and representative government. He retains in public life the thoroughness and exactness of thought and statement which characterized his student days. But he is a student of human nature as well as of books and the human side of public questions attracts him. He is the author of a work entitled "Industry and Humanity," a study of the principles underlying industrial reconstruction.

William Duff
William Duff, M.P. for Lunenburg, was born in Newfoundland in 1872, and educated there and at Falkirk, Scotland. His father was a member of the Newfoundland Legislative Assembly. Mr. Duff came to Nova Scotia in 1895 and built up a large business as a fish merchant and ship owner. He has a wide and exact knowledge of these industries, which he shows in a marked way in discussions in the House. He was municipal clerk and treasurer for twelve years and has been mayor of Lunenburg, Nova Scotia, since 1916. He was first elected to the Parliament of Canada in 1917. He is a Presbyterian, a broad-minded and big hearted man, shrewd and endowed with a strong sense of humor. His speeches are clear and to the point and full of information. He has the bluff and hearty manners of a man brought up by the sea and makes many friends.

W. C. Kennedy
William C. Kennedy, M.P. for North Essex, Ontario, was born at Ottawa in 1868, has been educated in Toronto and moved to Essex, where he built up a large and successful business. He is an Irish Roman Catholic, holding broad and tolerant views, and as level headed in politics as in business. He addresses his constituents frequently on public affairs and is a strong believer in keeping the people thoroughly and constantly informed on the doings of the Government and maintaining a close touch between Parliament and the country.

Dr. Beland
Hon. Dr. Beland, M.P. for Beauce County, Quebec, is a type of the scholarly, eloquent French Canadian, whose style of speaking sometimes recalls that of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He has been in Parliament since 1902 and was postmaster general of Canada in 1911. He is a physician. Being in Belgium, the home of Madame Beland, when the great European war broke out, he volunteered for service in the Belgian army in the field as surgeon and while serving in that capacity was made prisoner of war. Dr. Beland's expression and manner are thoughtful and serious, but his trying experience did not destroy his keen sense of humor, which often breaks out in his conversation and his speeches. Altogether, his personality is most attractive and interesting.

Ernest Lapointe
Ernest Lapointe, K.C., member for Quebec East, is one of the younger French Canadians and has come to the front rapidly in recent years. He entered parliament as member for Kamouraska in 1904. In 1919 he resigned this seat in order to contest Quebec East, the constituency which Sir Wilfrid Laurier represented for many years and was elected by the very large majority of 3,939. He was educated at Rimouski College and Laval University. Mr. Lapointe is a successful lawyer and is town attorney and crown prosecutor for Kamouraska. He is fond of the study of political history and the constitution. His speaking is concise and forceful and his illustrations are apt and sometimes humorous. His political judgment is excellent. The west will find in him one of the best representatives of French-Canadian—a man of broad Canadian views.

Andrew Haydon
Mr. Andrew Haydon was appointed organizer of the Liberal Party in December of last year. He began life on a farm in Lanark County, and can still take a hand in farm work. Mr. Haydon was educated at Queen's University, from which he graduated in arts in 1893. At Queen's he was double medalist, and also won first class honors in history, English and political science. He also had a brilliant course as a law student at Osgoode Hall, graduating with the class of 1897. For some years he has been practicing his profession as a member of the firm of McGivern, Haydon & Ebbs. He is a trustee of Queen's University, and has served as a school trustee in Ottawa. He is well versed in parliamentary procedure and election law, and has been a close student of the political history of Canada. Mr. Haydon had much to do with the planning and organizing of the National Liberal Convention at Ottawa in August, 1919. He is a clear thinker, makes decisions quickly and is rapid in the despatch of business. He has a frank hearty manner and is exceedingly popular in Ottawa.

Constable R. Webster arrived from Atlin last evening bringing south with him Gus Brunich who has elected jury trial at the forthcoming assizes charged with attempt to murder Father Joseph Allard. P. J. O'Connor, Peter Gabrio, J. Taylor, Taku Jack and Father Allard are also on hand to give evidence when the case is called next week. Father Allard is at present on a trip to Fraser Lake.

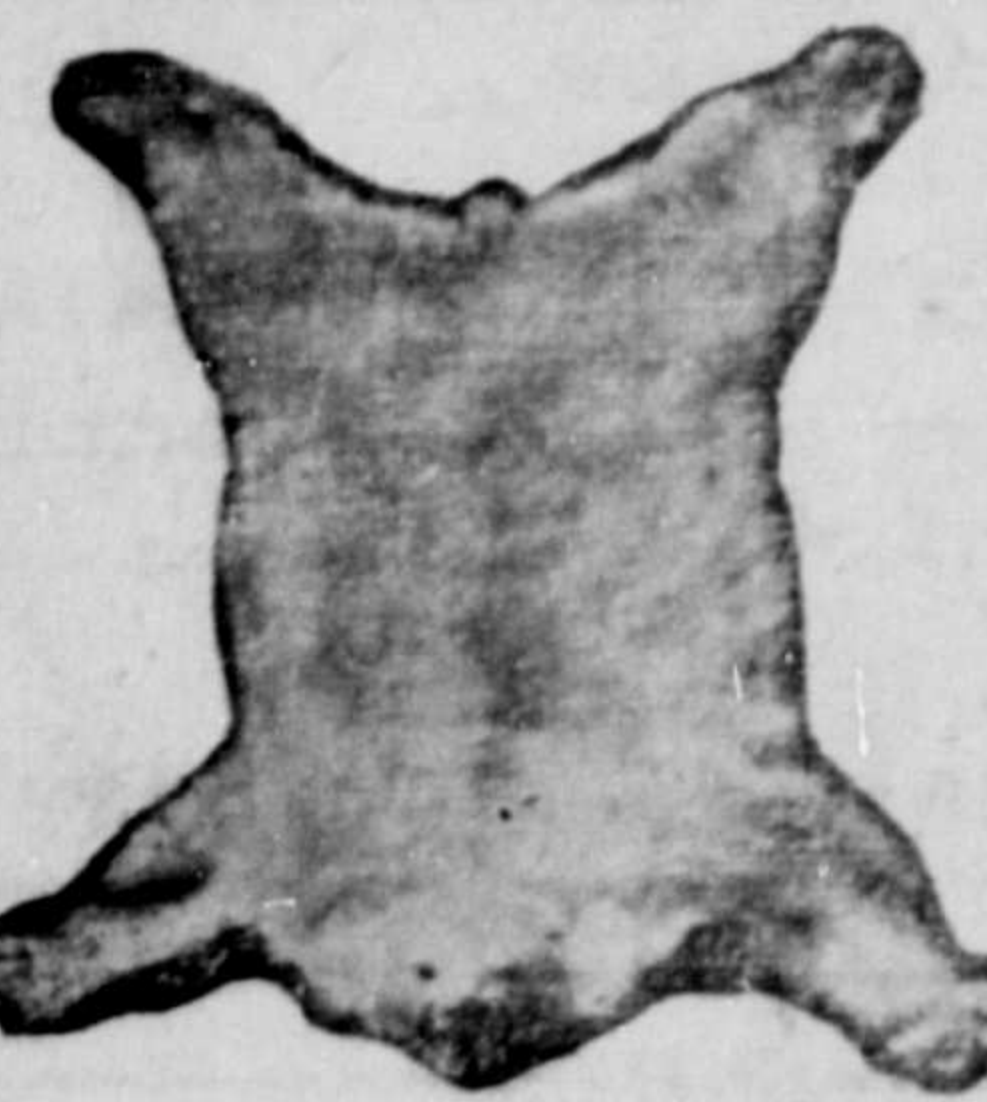

CHINA OBJECTS JAP ALLIANCE WITH BRITAIN

Protest Sent from Peking Against
Attitude of Both Powers.

PEKIN, Oct. 1.—The greatest
interest is taken here, both by
foreigners and Chinese, in the
question of the renewal of the
Anglo-Japanese Alliance. The
Chinese Government has taken up
the attitude that the alliance is
derogatory to the dignity of China
as a sovereign state. Moreover,
it is pointed out, China is a mem-
ber of the League of Nations, and
consequently, it is quite unneces-
sary for Great Britain and Japan
mutually to guarantee the "terri-
torial integrity" of China. The
misuse of the expression "terri-
torial integrity," by the way, ex-
cites irritation and derision
among thoughtful Chinese. If it
has any meaning at all it means
that the integrity of China's terri-
tory must be preserved, and
that, therefore, her authority over
her dominions is absolute. But
in Manchuria, Shantung, Fukien
and a portion of Mongolia China's
sovereignty is the shadow of a
name. Japan exercises sover-
eignty, and the Chinese maintain
with justice that the Anglo-
Japanese Alliance has in practice
enabled Japan materially to im-
pair China's territorial integrity
over a huge area.

Unique Document.

Now another significant indica-
tion of the sentiment entertained
by the Chinese people towards the
alliance has been supplied by a
unique document which was pre-
sented to Sir Beilby Alston, the
British Minister at Peking, before
his departure for England.
The memorandum was signed
by the following Chinese organiza-
tions:—The Educational Association
of Kiangsu Province; the
Shanghai City Chamber of Com-
merce; the Chinese Bankers' As-
sociation; the Chinese Cotton
Mill Owners' Association; the
Shanghai Educational Associa-
tion; the Shanghai Fire Brigade
Association; the Western Re-
turned Students' Union; the
World's Chinese Students' Fed-
eration; the Overseas Federation;
the Chinese Christian Union; the
National Association of Vocational
Education of China.

No Need for Renewal

The wording of the document
itself is commendable for its re-
straint, lucidity and conciseness.
After pointing out that, presuma-
bly, the primary object of the
alliance was to safeguard the in-
terests of Great Britain and
Japan in the Far East, and that
Russia and Germany were the
only two powers which might be
expected to impair these inter-
ests, it is argued that the prac-
tical elimination of those powers
from Far Eastern international
politics renders the alliance
superfluous. History had de-
monstrated America's disinter-
estedness in China, and there was
no probability that that power would
attack the Asiatic interests of
Great Britain or Japan.

The memorandum continues
that Japan contracted in 1905 and
1911 to preserve the common
interests of the powers in China
by insuring the independence and
integrity of the Chinese Empire
and the principle of equal oppor-

tunities for the commerce and
industry of all nations in China.
In spite of this specific undertak-
ing Japan, when her ally was at
death-grips with Germany, pre-
sented the notorious Twenty-one
Demands to President Yuan Shi-
kai direct, and insisted that China
should comply therewith without
delay. Moreover, absolute secrecy
in regard to the demands was to
be maintained by China. Natu-
rally, the fact that they had been
presented soon leaked out (the
full text of the demands was first
made public in "The Manchester
Guardian"). But, even while she
was compelling China, by the
threat of war, to comply with
these demands, Japan confidentially
informed the American
Government of the matters which
were under discussion and ac-
companied the information with
the assurance that Japan had no
intention of interfering with
either the political independence
or the territorial integrity of
China, and that nothing that she
proposed would discriminate
against other powers having
treaties with China or interfere
with the "Open Door" policy to
which all the leading nations are
committed.

The memorandum proceeds: Private Agreement

"With the formal ratification
by China of the Austrian Treaty,
which she signed with the Allied
Powers on the one hand and
Austrian on the other, we became
a full member of the League of
Nations.

"A renewal of the Anglo-
Japanese Alliance under the ex-
isting or similar terms, taken
with the previous interpretation
of the alliance, in practice, will
cause the Chinese strongly to
suspect that, when China takes
an appeal to the League of
Nations for redress of her griev-
ances, Great Britain and Japan
will be found to have made a
private agreement prejudicial to
China's case, and which may ad-
versely affect China's hope of
obtaining justice from the
League."

Peck, M. P., in his request to the
Federal Government asking for
the removal of the rock in the
middle of Seymour Narrows. The
Boards of Trade of Vancouver and
Victoria are also to be asked to
co-operate as well as the Ship-

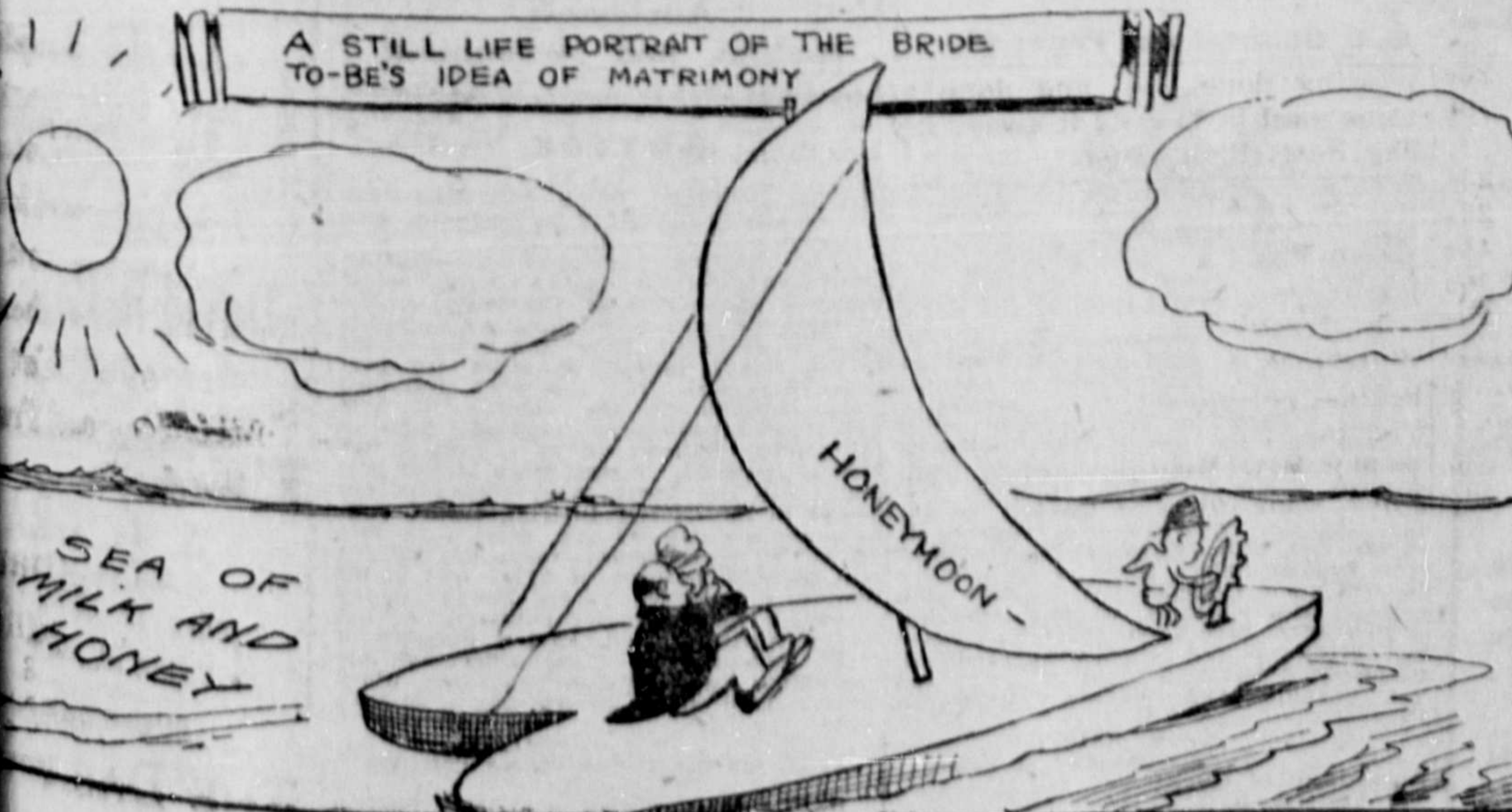

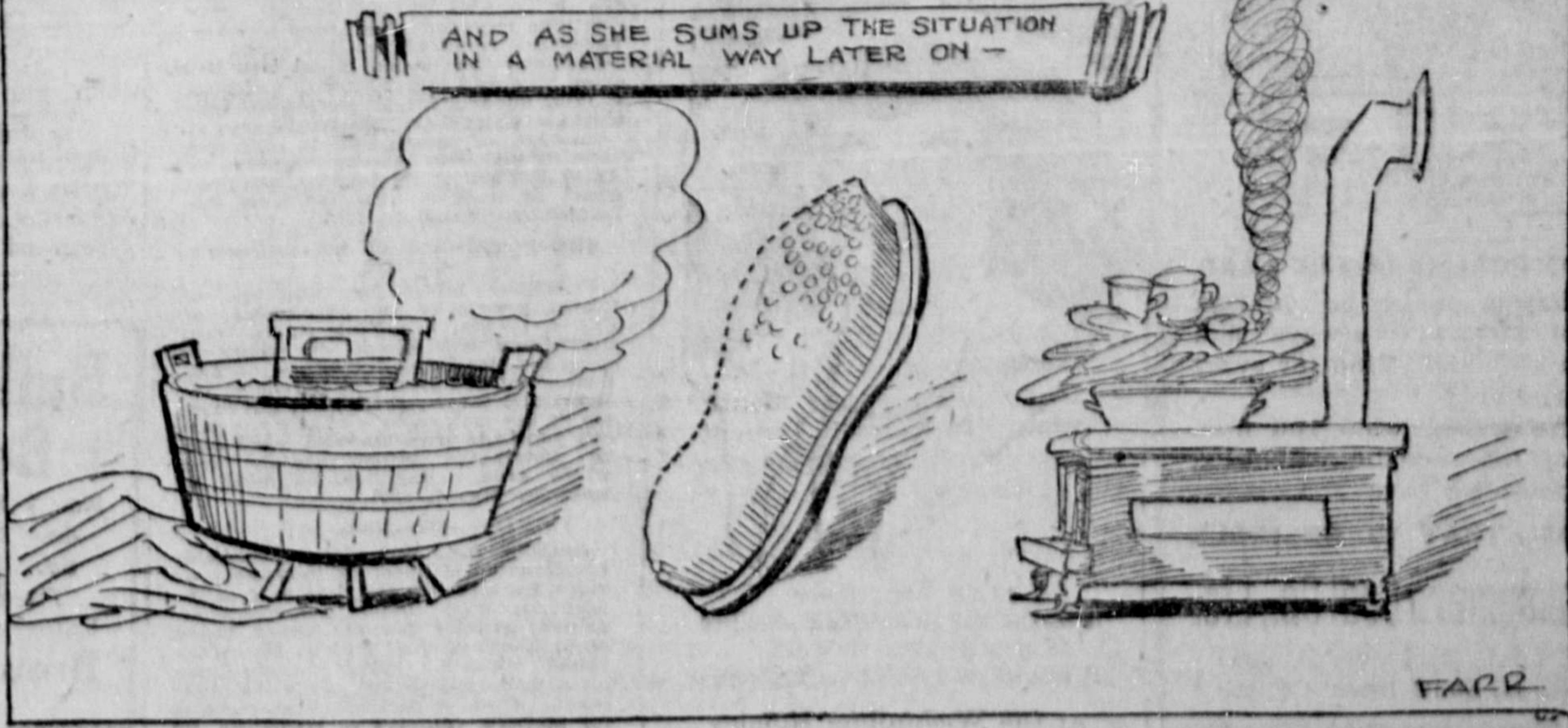

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$10 an acre; second-class to \$15 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-irrigated.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres, before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same within year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture of claim.

Records cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 3 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he desires to do so in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be leased, on conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased on condition of construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enlistment to March 31, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeitures, on fulfillment of conditions of conditions, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or specially fee, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

In the Letter Box

THE IRISH QUESTION.

As a native of "The most distressful country that ever yet was seen," I thank you for your sympathetic remarks and quotations in your editorial of Thursday's issue. Might I supplement these by a short synopsis of events in Ireland during the seven and a half centuries of British occupation and rule? During this period Ireland has been bludgeoned into submission six times, on an average once in each hundred and twenty years. By Henry, by Elizabeth, by Cromwell, by William of Orange, in 1798 and 1916. Now I think, Mr. Editor, you will agree with me that this shows either a love of freedom and independence or a fierce resistance to gross misgovernment unequalled in the history of the peoples of Europe.

And now in the twentieth century, after a great war for the self-determination of small nations, what do we find? The premier of mighty Britain which won the war advocates a policy of retaliation against the four and a half millions population of Ireland and special constables recruited from the slums of Great Britain, the "Black and Tans," are let loose to burn and shoot in Irish villages, which are under martial law, where no coroner's jury meets, and where all news is censored by the military authorities. This under Lloyd George, the renegade Liberal Premier who climbed to power largely through the help of the Irish party, before whom he stultified himself as Cromwell, the great Puritan leader, did in other days.

Have we not a British statesman, "A stiff strong man in a blatant land, who could do and who dare not lie," like the late Henry Campbell Bannerman who has big enough to undo the work of Joe Chamberlain to give the Boers self government, and to transform them from rebels into a contented and useful unit of the British confederation of free Nations? It is to be hoped such a one will soon appear and succeed the Lloyd George of later days, one possessed of the spirit of true manhood, not to mention the spirit of a greater leader, and who will be ashamed to advocate "retaliation."

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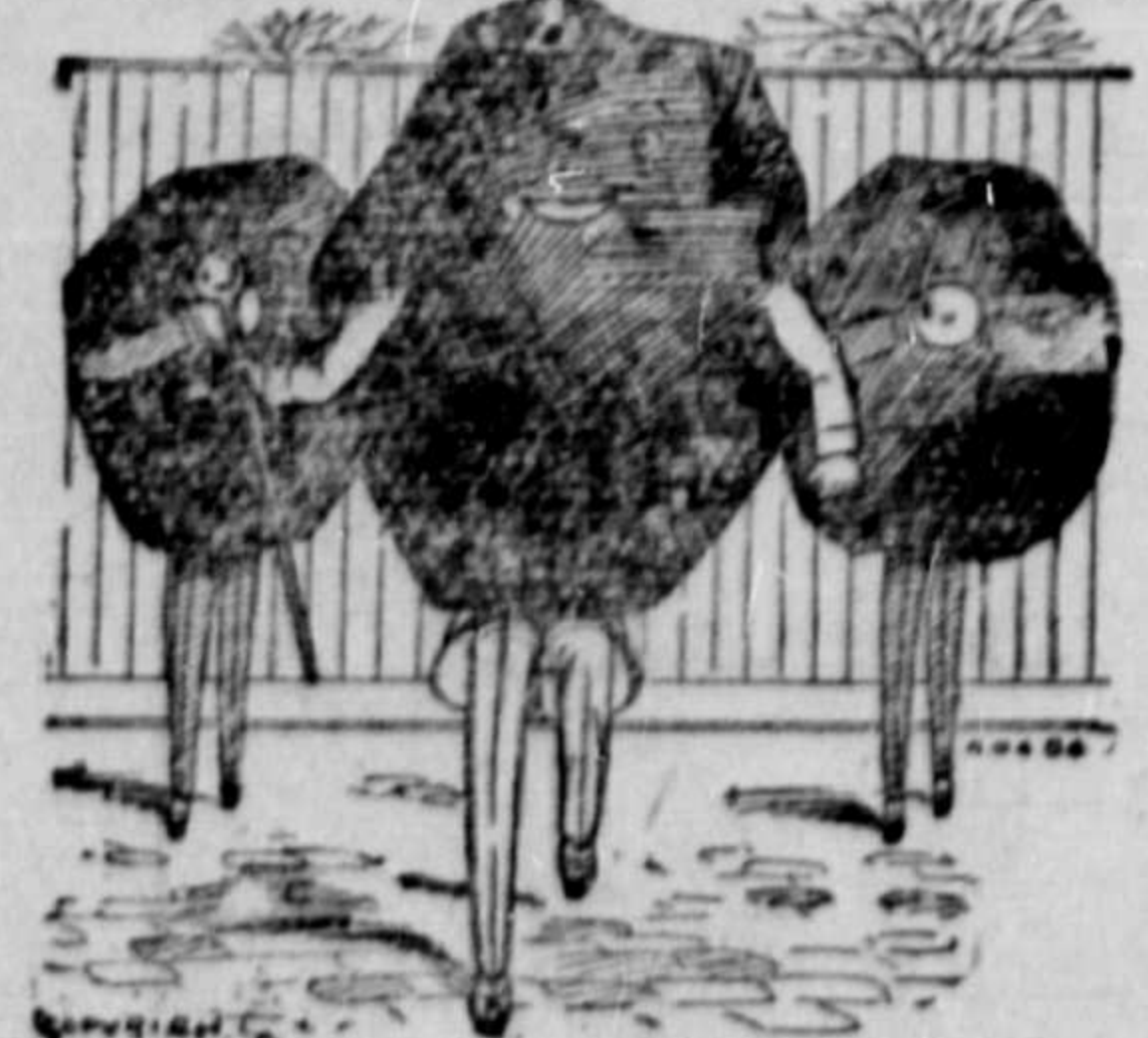
