NEW YORK POLICE ON TRACK OF WALL STREET CRIMINALS; ARREST WOMAN

Great Reception Given W. L. Mackenzie King at Theatre Meeting Saturday Night

Mr. King of Liberal Party expounds principles of Liberalism to people of Prince Rupert showing that it stands for progress and democracy as opposed to government for the big interests

PARAGRAPHS FROM MACKENZIE KING'S SPEECH.

Unless you send us men committed to see that our program is carried out, our hands are tied."
"Did any of you have a voice in the naming of this new National Liberal and Conservative Party? Or in the making of its policy and platform of this party? Or in choosing its leader? Are you going to be led like sheep and follow a man who was never asked to choose?"
"The Liberal Party believes in the right of the people to govern themselves. This is the cardinal principle of Liberalism."
"To try to see the best in others and to realize the best in ourselves is the work of the Liberal party."

When the speaker greeted William Lyon Mackenzie King at the Westholme Theatre on Saturday night, the hall was packed to the doors and keen interest was taken in his address. The Liberal leader gave an inspiring address, witty and sparkling speech by Ernest Lapointe. His "Liberalism" and he strongly urged the need of unity among the forces against the forces of reaction or Conservatism. Fred Stork presided.

Mr. King, the speaker said, lost a friend in the death of Ernest Lapointe. Following his accession to power in 1896, he accomplished the opening up of the middle west, and the creation of two new provinces. He had controlled railroad rates, the National Railway had been completed, to develop the new districts. The National Naval Service had been established. And he had proposed a scheme of reciprocity with the United States to gain markets and freer trade, by which Western Canada would be benefited. Most of Mr. King traced the Liberal policy step by step, and had accomplished up to the present. This policy was based on faith in the people, and had met their approval. "How do you like these policies," he asked Mr. King, "and how do you like Canada as suffering by these policies not being carried out?"

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program is carried out, our hands are tied. For the building up of Prince Rupert, there is every reason for your giving us your support. "The first thing we have to do is to carry out the great policies of our dear leader, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and we who have been trained by him, will see to it that his every policy will be carried out."

Essential Difference.

Mr. King pointed out the fundamental and essential difference between the two parties. Liberalism meant faith in the people, trusting the people and working for the people. Conservatism meant trusting in the few and in the making of fortunes for certain privileged classes. Just think! said Mr. King, "That is why Prince Rupert is now on a branch railway line." He drew a parallel between the state of affairs in 1896 and the present. Then was the infamous Family Compact. Now we have a small group of men controlling everything, and everyone else is a Bolshevik. But there is one power which is greater than privilege and that is the power of the votes of men and women at the polls. Mr. King showed how the Liberal party held open convention when the policies of the party were decided upon the broadest democratic lines. But the Conservative party held no convention, and had no democratic platform. Their platform was formulated from within.

Pertinent Questions.

"Did any of you have a voice in the naming of this new National Liberal and Conservative party?" inquired Mr. King. "Or in the making of the policy and platform of this party? Or in choosing their new leader? Are you going to be led like sheep and follow a leader who were never asked to choose?" Was that leader chosen without someone having a voice in it, or that platform written without someone having framed it? It is up to the people to choose between those who represent the privileged classes and those who represent the masses.

Russian Woman had Dynamite in Room

Zelanaka, when taken to police cells, said had only commenced work of destruction at New York

NEW YORK, October 4.—Renewed vigor was put into the investigation of the Wall Street explosion as a result of the arrest at Plattsburg of Floreen Zelanka.

After finding a suitcase filled with dynamite in a Plattsburg room, the police found Zelanka had left the Brooklyn room an hour before the disaster carrying a reddish brown bag that was formerly used by the Hercules Powder Co. and left a quantity of radical Russian literature in the room.

The authorities declare the clues may lead to scores of arrests. Zelanka said on entering the cell. "You see what we did in Wall Street. Next time it will be bigger and more terrible. The last attempt was only a commencement."

MACKENZIE KING AND PARTY ENTERTAINED

Visited Waterfront and Saw the Townsite—Left This Morning for Edmonton.

Mackenzie King and his distinguished party visited the Prince Rupert waterfront from one end to the other and saw the cold storage plant, Prince Rupert Sawmill, Dry Dock, proposed fish dock, salmon wharf and proposed ocean docks. Yesterday afternoon they were driven all over the city and gained an idea of the townsite. They expressed surprise with many things they saw and were pleased with the prospects of Prince Rupert generally and impressed with its possibilities. Yesterday was spent in a social and private way for they were the guests of honor at the homes of some of the leading citizens. Mr. King had luncheon at the home of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Patmore and in the evening Mr. King, Mr. Lapointe and Mr. Hayden were entertained at dinner by Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Dawson, while Mr. Kennedy, Mr. Duff and Mr. Giguere dined with Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Stork. All attended church in the morning. Messrs. King, Duff and Hayden going to the Presbyterian Church, while Messrs. Lapointe, Giguere and Kennedy attended the Catholic services.

This morning the whole party left for Edmonton on the regular train. They had intended catching a fish special out yesterday, enabling them to speak at Prince George, but this was impossible, so the trip will have to be made direct to Edmonton. Later they will return to Southern British Columbia and among other places will speak at Kelowna, Vernon, Penticton and Nelson.

SALVAGE WORK IS PROCEEDING

Steamer Prince Rupert is Being Examined by Divers at Swanson Bay.

The salvage crew from the steamer *Algerine* is working on the *Prince Rupert* at Swanson Bay. On Saturday divers were busy examining the condition of the hull and the work is still continuing, and will continue with all haste.

COURT HOUSE PLANS ARRIVE

All Government Officials Looking Them Over Today With Keen Interest.

The proposed plans for the new court house to be erected on Market Square by the Provincial Government reached the city this morning and were being looked over with interest by the government officials. From the judge to the humblest clerk they were out with rule and tape-line measuring and comparing the new rooms and offices with what they have in the present buildings.

The new building is a substantial structure of two stories and basement and will be built of brick with cement foundations. It is of a solid massive appearance and has the appearance of giving ample accommodation. All the officials seem pleased and the only part that is thought to be a little small is the court registrar's office.

On the basement floor are the boiler rooms and the police offices, in connection with the latter is the jail which contains two cells and a cell room. This jail will change the present plan of having provincial police prisoners in the city jail.

On the main floor are the government agent, land registry, assessor's, forestry and school inspector's offices as well as others.

The second floor is devoted almost entirely to the court accommodation. The court room is a fine large building with the necessary judge's room, jury room and chambers. On this same floor is the court registrar's office.

The approved and complete plans will reach here in about fifteen days' time.

One Big Union Nothing Like as Large as Claim

Only 19,510 Members paying per capita tax says Calgary news despatch; Prince Rupert 414

CALGARY, October 4.—That the One Big Union in Canada during the first five months of this year was receiving the per capita tax on 19,510 members instead of the reputed 41,500 is the authoritative information conveyed to the Canadian Press regarding the inner workings of the union.

The statement further says that no per capita tax has been paid in many cases since June 1, following the withdrawal of the British Columbia lumber workers from the convention owing to differences of opinion with the executive. This meant a decreased membership of over 9,000.

Vancouver has paid no tax since January when it had a basis of 2,790 members. Prince Rupert paid to June on a membership of 414.

AIR SERVICE WITH ALASKA

New York Report of Recent Flight says Regular Route to be Established

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The first official account of the flight of four army airplanes from New York to Nome, Alaska, has been released by the Manufacturers' Aircraft association co-operating with the army air service in co-ordinating the reports of the officers in charge of the most significant aviation event on the western hemisphere this year.

The continuation of the expedition from Nome to Cape Prince of Wales and possibly across the 50-mile channel to Siberia means the North American continent will be linked with Asia, that instead of being an isolated possession of the United States, Alaska will become an important junction in commercial trade between this country and the orient.

Reports just received state that the Alaskans are determined to bring about regular communication through the air. Prevented from establishing highways and railroad facilities by reason of the rough country between the state and the territory they look first to the government to foster the new project, and failing to secure such co-operation, plan to underwrite the initial expense by popular subscription.

Even now, as a result of the air service flight, an aerial route has been photographed and charted diagonally across the United States, across Canada and Alaska—a highway approximately 25 miles wide, with tentative supply and service station sites. With the data and charts of this flight in his possession an aviator can traverse the route with ease and

comparative safety, and in the quickest possible time, surely more than a mile a minute. That there was need of pioneering work such as that just completed may be assumed from one of Captain Street's reports to Major-General Charles T. Menoher, director of the air service:

"In general, the fliers consider the route across the eastern states as having few landing fields, and those not ideal in any instance. The middle west and Canada as far as Edmonton along this route are ideal for flying. The Rocky mountains, northern Canada and southeastern Alaska are rough and forested. The expedition sighted innumerable glaciers. Rain, low fog and clouds were prevalent. There was some snow. Yukon and Alaska are rough and partly forested, affording no natural landing places except on river bars. The Seward peninsula has absolutely no landing places except on the beach as prepared at Nome. The route from Wrangell to Nome is ideal for water planes."

Exciting Background. time administration. The war is over two years but yet this same administration is clinging to office, for the sake of power and patronage. And they say we can't have an election now for the people are all Bolshevists—the people who are working men, farmers and soldiers. This present government is a group of men who will trust no one but themselves. The Liberals say send any man you like but not to represent any one class. Send a woman, but not to represent women only. Send a working man, but not to represent his class only. Let them go as citizens to represent the whole constituency. Send a soldier by all means, but not to fight again only for soldiers. When it comes to large questions like reciprocity, naval defence or the railway policy, the people's representatives should be consulted on the policy before it is carried out, for after all, the government is only the executive of the people.

The G. T. P. In the matter of the purchase of the railways, this will cost \$500,000,000 and you people have got to pay it. Meantime you have got to pay the interest on the sum. Before any big transaction like this takes place, Parliament should be dissolved and you people in Prince Rupert and elsewhere should have the right to say whether it should have been purchased. If the people are going to govern, they should have the right to decide such questions. But not even the members of Parliament knew the terms of this agreement when it was brought into the House. We could not alter the terms, although the bond holders and share holders in England had that right. There is the difference between Toryism and Liberalism. Was it not the duty of your representative to say "I want to know what this agreement is, before it is signed, because it affects my people." We in the opposition did so. But the representative of this city voted with the government against having the details made public.

Unity of Purpose. Mr. King also touched upon the question of the cost of living, economy, reduction in duties, profiteering, labor policy and foreign relations. Concluding, he appealed for the goodwill of the people and their solidarity in the right. To instill confidence between individuals, between those who voted for the Union Government and those who opposed it at the last election, between class and class, between race and race and between French and English speaking Canadians, to try to be the best in others and to realize the best in the race, that was the work of the Liberal party. We must be united. Separate we lose, united we win, united in purpose, class and section, race and creed.

T. McKendrick, special police agent on the railway, is now making his headquarters at Smithers.



ASK FOR FUNDS FOR RED CROSS

Effort to be made to Combat Disease in Stricken Europe this Autumn

An appeal for funds for the Canadian Red Cross to combat disease and distress in the war-stricken areas of Europe is to be made during Armistice week commencing November 8 to 13. Famine conditions prevail over wide areas there, while disease is rampant. There is real danger that typhus may break all bounds and overwhelm portions of Europe during the coming winter.

End of Resources

Some twelve nations, many of them allies during the war, are very near the end of their resources to fight disease, and almost helpless in the matter of helping themselves. A recent report says that in these countries millions of our fellow creatures are lying stricken of disease, distress and despair. The plague, typhus, the most loathsome of fevers, is killing off men and women and children like flies, and threatens to overcome Europe next winter. Poland and Galicia appear to be in the worst plight of all. Typhus was had enough in 1916, but the disease has spread until it is at least seven or eight times worse than four years ago. In Galicia the schools are closed, business is at a standstill and civic life is crippled. There are no doctors, no nurses and no beds. The miserable typhus stricken patients lie unattended upon the bare floors. In almost every hut there are several cases of typhus, and in many instances whole families are stricken with the disease and are perforce left to die unattended. It has been calculated that there is only one doctor for every 150,000 inhabitants. In places the mortality has reached the awful figure of 60 per cent.

The Council of the League of Nations has issued the following statement signed by Hon. Arthur J. Balfour: "Men, women and children are dying by thousands, and over vast and civilized areas there are neither medical appliances nor medical skill sufficient to cope with the horrors by which we are faced. Governments have in certain cases done all in their power to bring relief, but there remains a vast field for charitable enterprise which can be dealt with only by voluntary effort."

For the first time, India, the Dominions and the Crown Colonies of Great Britain are being invited to make common cause with the Mother Country in an unselfish campaign to save these unfortunate people, many of whom were our allies and associates during the war.

NEED OF UNITY IN THE COUNTRY

Ernest Lapointe, M. P., Says There Are More Things to Unite Than to Divide.

FRENCH CANADIAN'S INTERESTING ADDRESS

Says Members of Government are Bolsheviks Because Governing Without a Mandate.

One of the interesting features of the big Saturday night meeting at the Westholme Theatre was the masterly address of Ernest Lapointe, the leader of the French-Canadian section of the Liberal party in Canada. It was full of life, it sparkled with humor and the points were driven home by means of strong contrasts. He announced himself as a plain unadulterated Liberal, not a Liberal Conservative.

Mr. Lapointe explained that the existence of Prince Rupert was the result of the work of the greatest Canadian that ever lived, Sir Wilfrid Laurier. His work, however, had been minimized by the party that followed him in power and now the transcontinental line to this port had become only a branch. It was the policy of the Liberal party to see that Laurier's work was finished.

No Mandate.

The speaker said that when the body was sick, the doctor had no right to be indifferent, and when the body politic became sick the people who were the only ones who could provide the remedy, had no right to be indifferent. The present government was a weak one and was not in harmony with the majority of the people. Its purpose had been achieved, its mandate had expired. It was a breach of faith to use the mandate obtained on a totally different question, namely the winning of the war, in order to carry on now. Arthur Meighen had appealed to the people to stay with the Union Government until it had achieved its end. The end was now achieved and the people should be asked for a new mandate.

At the time of the last election a circular had been sent out to all the military camps stating that the only question before them was selective conscription. They had never discussed any other problem. In the Yukon the candidate was not nominated until a month after the soldiers had voted for him. "Is it fair and is it just to the soldiers who are called upon to vote in such special circumstances to use the power then given them to deal with matters which have nothing to do with those discussed at that election?" he asked.

Fourteen candidates, the speaker said, were elected by the mili-

itary vote overseas and of these Col. Peck was one. Mr. Stork was defeated in that way. The speaker said he had nothing against Col. Peck, however, who was a gallant soldier, except that he was keeping bad company at the present time.

Liberal and Conservative.

Speaking of the formation of the new party at Ottawa, the National Liberal and Conservative party, Mr. Lapointe asked was it sincere to choose such a name. A man could not be both Conservative and Liberal. There was as much difference between them as between vice and virtue, beauty and ugliness, cold and heat, the square and the circle. The Liberal Unionist had no more right to the word "Liberal" than the smuggler had to the title "free trader."

Not only was there a new party formed at Ottawa without consulting the electorate, but there was a change of leadership. Borden and Rowell, the two strongest men of the cabinet, had gone out. It was the same party with the same men except that the good ones had gone away. Robert Rogers, whom no one could accuse of being a Liberal, had said the cabinet was "a cabinet of tinkers, jobbers and second-hand dealers." Meighen had become premier and had enunciated a new doctrine, that of "nation builders."

Bolsheviks and Fakirs.

At Portage LaPrairie the whole community had turned out to welcome Mr. Meighen after his elevation to his present position and he had spoken smoothly and talked of unity. At a Conservative picnic farther east, however, he had changed his tune and had referred to the Liberals as Fakirs, Bolsheviks and I. W. W. In fact if dirt was trumps he would hold a good hand.

In every country, Mr. Lapointe said, the program of reform had been associated with such epithets as Bolshevik. They were not Bolsheviks although they believed that a larger number of the people were entitled to a larger degree of happiness. He told the story of the bat which was sometimes a bird and sometimes a rodent. When with the birds at Portage Mr. Meighen sang with the birds and said "see my wings." When at the Conservative picnic, however, he claimed to be one of them and shouted: "Long live the rats!"

As a matter of fact the Liberals were not the Bolsheviks. Bolsheviks were those despised people who cling to a mandate which does not belong to them any more.

The Government, the speaker concluded, had appealed to all the racial and religious prejudices in order to keep office. What the country needed, however, was unity. They may have differences but there were more things to unite them than to divide.

William Duff, M. P.

William Duff, M. P., who is interested in fisheries and is looked on as the marine man of the party, said he was impressed with the possibilities of this part of the country from a fishing point of view. He said it was a pity that in the department of fisheries at Ottawa there was only one practical fishing man. He considered the fisheries should be free for everyone and the license should be no higher than in the lobster and mackerel fisheries of the east. He favored the employment of gas boats, just as they did at other places. In Nova Scotia, every fisherman operated his own gas-boat and they should do the same here.

In conclusion Mr. Duff said the Government would fall short of its duty if it did not develop the ports in order to market the products of the farms, the mines, the fisheries and the other industries of the country. The ports both on the Pacific and Atlantic should be developed, and in order to secure that, he advised this community to return a man sympathetic to Mr. King who would be the next premier of Canada.

PAYS FOR G.T.P.

OTTAWA, Oct. 4.—The protracted negotiations between the Saskatchewan and the Dominion Governments for the refund to the Province of money advanced by it to meet the interest falling due on the Provincially guaranteed bonds of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway lines were completed when a cheque for \$862,252 was turned over by the Dominion Government to Hon. C. A. Dunning, Provincial Treasurer at Regina.

REV. A. E. COOKE ON PROHIBITION

Well Known Preacher Who Was Here Saturday Gives Good Reason for Supporting Act.

Rev. A. E. Cooke, the prominent Vancouver preacher and lecturer, was unable to remain here to address the public in the interest of prohibition and returned to Vancouver on the Prince George Saturday night. He was asked, however, for an article supporting the movement which follows:

"Plainly stated the real issue between the people in the plebiscite of October 20 is simply this: shall we have real prohibition or go back to the booze shop?"

"To vote for the present prohibition act does not mean more liquor and worse conditions than we had under licenses, although the moderationists and the liquor advocates argue it does. In spite of the fact that unscrupulous doctors and 'bootlegging' outlaws have done their utmost to break the law and so discredit it, prohibition has wrought tremendous benefits to the whole community. Drunkenness has decreased by 92 per cent and four of the five provincial jails have been closed. Business has benefited immensely and thousands of homes have been redeemed from squalor and misery. There are facts that no moderationist sophistry can deny.

Act as Amended.

"But the present Prohibition Act as named on the ballot paper means the Prohibition Act as Amended in 1920. That is, it is the act rewritten in the light of three years' experience, so that the abuses by unscrupulous doctors and others cannot be continued. It has now become a real prohibitory law which in the last four months has proved to be thoroughly effective to the limits of the power vested in the Provincial Government.

"In addition to this the government is pledged, if the plebiscite carries in favor of prohibition, to submit a prohibition referendum which will give the people the opportunity of stopping the importation of liquor into this province from anywhere else. So that a vote for prohibition on October 20 means a vote for real prohibition.

Agent for Liquor Men.

"On the other hand, a vote for government sale and control means a vote to have the government go into the whiskey business not simply to sell liquor for medicinal purposes as it does today, but for beverage purposes. This is not 'government ownership' for the government will not own anything except what it buys from the brewers and distillers. In other words it simply means that the government will become the agent and distributor for the liquor interests. New liquor stores will be opened all over the province for the sale of liquor for drinking as a beverage, and the government officials in these stores will act as new style bartenders for the distillers and the brewers. The government will be in the business of making men drunk and then fling them into jail for being drunk. The government will control nothing at all but the retail trade. It cannot stop the manufacture or importation, nor can it control the drinking in workshops, offices and homes of people where the 'sealed packages' or bottles will be taken by the purchasers.

"The draft bill of the moderationists who are leading the fight against prohibition provides that all persons, male or female appearing to the vendor to be of the age of twenty-one, can procure liquor at the government stores. The result of that will be that the whole community will be debauched, and conditions eventually worse than under the license system.

"Remember that 'government sale and control' has been tried out in Saskatchewan, Carolina and Carlisle, England, and has been wiped out by the people as utterly insufferable.

"Don't be fooled by the foolish arguments of those who want to bring back the booze shop, regardless of consequences to the welfare of others. THE ONLY ISSUE BEFORE THE PEOPLE IS REAL PROHIBITION OR BACK TO THE BOOZE SHOP."
