FARMERS LOOK TO THIS COAST
Freight Rates may make Shipping of Grain to Atlantic Prohibitive
Owing to the increased freight rates many Alberta farmers are considering the advisability of making inquiries about facilities shipping their grain west and are for handling at Prince Rupert. Cars that come here with grain would not have to return east empty as sometimes they have to do from the Atlantic seaboard. It is likely that some elevator or shipping companies will be investigating the local situation before long.

Railway Employees Get 25 per cent. Increase
Clerks, Freight Handlers, Station and Other Employees in Canadian National System to get More Cash
OTTAWA, October 5.—The clerks, freight handlers, station and other employees of the Canadian National system are to receive increases averaging 25 per cent antedating to May 1, as the result of negotiations between the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees and the representatives of the lines. A redistribution of wages has been arranged, resulting in increases up to 45 per cent in some cases and never lower than 15 per cent. The full amount of the increase will be included in the first October payroll. The advance announced some time ago amounted to 20 per cent so that this latest announcement is five per cent higher than the former one, which was not satisfactory to the employees.

AGREEMENT FOR NEW MORSE CREEK BRIDGE
Railway Company Submits Its Requirements to City Council; Left for Solicitor.
A proposed agreement drawn up by the Grand Trunk solicitors regarding the revised plans for the Morse Creek bridge was submitted to the city council last night and referred to the city solicitor. There are three clauses to the agreement, the first requiring that the railway commission give its sanction to the new bridge over the railway tracks, the second that the city remove the bents or any work interfering with the extension of the railway tracks at any time and thirdly that the agreement come into full effect without execution by the company.

VETERAN JUMPED OVERBOARD FROM THE PRINCE GEORGE
VANCOUVER, Oct. 5.—Patrick Bowler, a passenger on the Prince George from Ocean Falls, attempted to jump overboard when the vessel was entering the harbor yesterday. He is a wounded veteran and has been taken to the asylum.

WILSON URGES ENDORSEMENT OF THE LEAGUE
Says Nothing in It Impairing the Rights of United States Congress.
WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—President Wilson is urging the electors to give their endorsement to the stand of the administration on the League of Nations. He says there is nothing in the covenant at least interfering with or impairing the right of Congress to declare or not declare war. He says it is an absolutely false statement that other nations can, under the League, lead the United States into war. A motion asking that the action of Lowrie vs. J. E. Merryfield, J. A. Kirkpatrick, Paul Aivazoff and C. H. Thomas over the Usk townsite be dismissed was heard in the Supreme Court this morning by Mr. Justice Murphy and an order for dismissal was made, providing statement of claim is not filed by October 25. Alex. M. Manson appeared for the defence and B. O. Oughton, of Fisher & Oughton, for the petitioners.

BAR ASSOCIATION LOOK OVER PLANS
Some Sections Considered rather Small, but all pleased with Splendid Court Rooms
The Bar Association held an informal meeting in the Government Buildings yesterday afternoon to discuss the plans for the new court house, but, as yet, no definite recommendations have been made. It seems to be the opinion that many parts of the new building, especially the land registry, forestry, court registry and jail, will be too small, although all seem satisfied with the fine large court accommodations provided.

VALUATOR SENDS OFFICIAL REPORT
M. P. McCaffery Completes Appraisal of Local Railway Property for Board.
M. P. McCaffery, who is the official valuator here for the Arbitration Board, settling the prices to be paid by the Canadian Government for the railway property, has completed his report and forwarded it to Ottawa. When the board meets in Ottawa next month it will be necessary for Mr. McCaffery to appear there and justify the figures set by him, if necessary. It was an honor for Mr. McCaffery to receive an appointment of this kind, and speaks well for the citizens of Prince Rupert that a man could be found here with the ability to undertake work of that description.

ITALIANS ON HUNGER STRIKE AT ANCONA
ANCONA, Italy, Oct. 5.—Sixty people, who were arrested here in June during anarchist strikes, have started a hunger strike and workmen in the city have started a general sympathetic strike.

INLAND REVENUE SHOWS INCREASE
OTTAWA, Oct. 5.—The total inland revenue for the month of September amounted to \$11,921,287, showing a net increase over September of last year of \$7,218,367. Among the passengers arriving here by the Chelohsin this morning were several station men from the Wolf extension to the Dolly Varden mine at Alice Arm. The work is now suspended for the winter season.

NEW OFFICIALS CAN. NATIONAL
Two New Vice-Presidents in Connection with Maintenance and Construction
TORONTO, Oct. 5.—The Canadian National Railway department of finance and construction has been divided. President Hanna announces the appointment of M. H. McLeod as vice-president in charge of construction, and S. J. Hungerford, vice-president, in charge of operation construction.

STRIKE IS FAILURE
One Big Union Strike in Crow's Nest Pass Falls to Tie Up Coal Mines.
CALGARY, October 5.—The One Big Union strike in the Crow's Nest Pass country has proved a failure for this morning there was not a single one of the coal mines idle. Four hundred men out of 1,300 are out on strike.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 5.—Major McLaurin and party from the local air station flew from Vancouver to Esquimalt in 45 minutes yesterday. After interviewing Premier Oliver, the party flew back through thick weather, laying their course by the compass. They were delayed at the mouth of the Fraser River, having been compelled to make a landing and clean the petrol tank.

Important Visitors To This City.

Yesterday the leader of the Liberal party in Canada left on the east-bound train, continuing his triumphal tour of Canada. He certainly captured Prince Rupert. The people who attended the meeting all enjoyed his great effort and those who met him personally are enthused over the new leader.

The address of the leader was such as befitted the position he holds. It was on a high plane. There was no mud slinging. There were no injurious intonations. Mr. King discussed matters of policy but particularly the attitude of liberalism toward the problems of life. Very seldom, if ever, has there been an address which met with such general approval as that of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King at the theatre meeting Saturday night.

French Canadian Master of Rhetoric.

The French Canadian, Ernest Lapointe, was the most interesting talker of the evening because of the fund of pointed humor in his speech. He had all the vivacity of his race at its best.

Mr. Lapointe has been spoken of as one of the leaders of the party for some time past. He appeals to the imagination of the French Canadian people. Here he appealed even to the dull wit of the Anglo-Saxon and the reception he got from the large audience was thoroughly well merited. He is a master of rhetoric, not studied rhetoric, but a natural gift of oratory that comes only to the few.

Other Important Men Are Coming.

Tomorrow there are other important men coming. The ex-president of the United States, William Taft, Sir Edward Cassells and Sir Thomas White are all names to conjure with in certain circles. Sir Thomas would have been premier today if he had not absolutely refused to accept the job. It was pressed on him but he would have none of it.

At the Canadian Club luncheon Thursday, there will be an opportunity to hear these men speak and doubtless there will be a good attendance. It is an unusual occasion.

Library Meeting Held Tonight.

There is to be a meeting in the council chamber here tonight to discuss the formation of a public library in the city. The fraternal societies of the city are backing the move and it is to be hoped that something definite will be done in the matter. No one is opposing this proposal and the only reason we have not had a library before this is because of inaction and lack of initiative.

Simply a Matter Of Use of Word.

It has been suggested that the Daily News did not use the correct expression in speaking of some of those convicted of selling liquor as "convicts." We say a person who is conscripted is a "conscript," and surely a person who is convicted is a convict. In one of the new books published in the United States a group of persons convicted for playing baseball on Sunday in New York state and sent to prison for eighteen hours were referred to as "the happiest bunch of convicts the motorman had ever taken to the institution."

It is true that the most common legal meaning of the word is to indicate one who has been convicted of a serious crime. The word has degenerated with modern use and for that reason perhaps was not the best that could have been chosen under the circumstances. No one suggests that the men convicted of selling liquor contrary to the prohibition act are on a par with the man who kills another, even though the use of liquor does often lead to serious consequences. There happens to be no other word, however, which fills the bill and the one in question slipped in without thought of the second meaning which seems to have been taken from it.

FURTHER STORY RUPERT FLIGHT

Lieut. Brown Spent Three Days and Two Nights Without Food or Drink

PLANS TO RETURN AND RECOVER PLANE'S ENGINE

Lieut. W. Brown, M.C., the daring pilot of the Pathfinder II, who made the adventurous though unsuccessful attempt to reach Prince Rupert by hydro-plane for the recent Exhibition, is now back safe in Victoria; according to First Lieut. J. W. A. Ligge-Willis, of the Aerial League at Victoria and the Canadian Air Force. Lieut. Ligge-Willis, who was in the air service with Lieut. Brown in France, is making a few trips as wireless operator on the Chelohsin and is in the city on that vessel today.

Speaking of Lieut. Brown's flight, Lieut. Ligge-Willis is able to give some interesting details that have not yet been made public here. According to his story gained from official reports at Victoria it was half an hour out of Alert Bay when Lieut. Brown had engine difficulty and was compelled to descend in Queen Charlotte Sound. Had the sea been smooth it would have been quite a simple matter for the machine to be repaired and the flight continued, but it was just choppy enough to make this impossible. Night fell and work was further prevented and with the night came a fresh breeze which pounded the plane against a barren island and forced the aviator to jump for his life. Here Lieut. Brown remained for a day and saw his machine pounded to pieces and sunk in about twenty feet of water.

Astride of Log

In the meantime all the flyer had had to eat was a few sea biscuits and as the island was absolutely barren he decided on the evening of the second day out of Alert Bay that there was only one thing for it and that was to take to the sea and get in the course of passing steamers. With a log for a craft and a piece of board for a paddle he gave up the island and took to the ocean. After he had paddled about in the icy waters of the sound for another night and day he was picked up in an almost exhausted condition by the cannery tug "Hidden Inlet" after three days and two nights with neither food nor fresh water.

He was taken to Nanaimo by the cannery boat and from there he returned by train to headquarters in Victoria. Although the machine is a complete loss, Lieut. Brown plans on returning to the scene of his mishap and recovering the engine of the wrecked aircraft. Lieut. Brown was formerly secretary of the Aerial League of Canada at Victoria and is now a member of the Vancouver Island Aerial Service, the company which owned the ill-fated machine.

STEWART HOSPITAL NURSES GO SOUTH

After Busy Season at Mining Camp They go to California University.

Miss Wade and Miss Aitken, nurses who have been in charge of the Stewart hospital during the summer, went south last night on the Prince Albert by way of Skidegate and other south island points. They expect to go to California and take a course in public health in the University of California.

The nurses say they have had a busy summer at Stewart. There have been seven births in the hospital in addition to numerous other cases. At one time there were three maternity cases and several men in the institution, with only the two nurses to look after them night and day.

Dr. H. C. Davies is still living at the hospital but there are no nurses to attend to patients.

MAY TAKE SIX WEEKS TO RAISE PRINCE RUPERT

VANCOUVER, Oct. 5.—Salvage experts on the steamer Algerine at Swanson Bay state that the work of raising the Prince Rupert may take six weeks. The interior of the vessel is so badly injured that the work of renovating will be a long job. It will probably be done at Vancouver or Victoria.

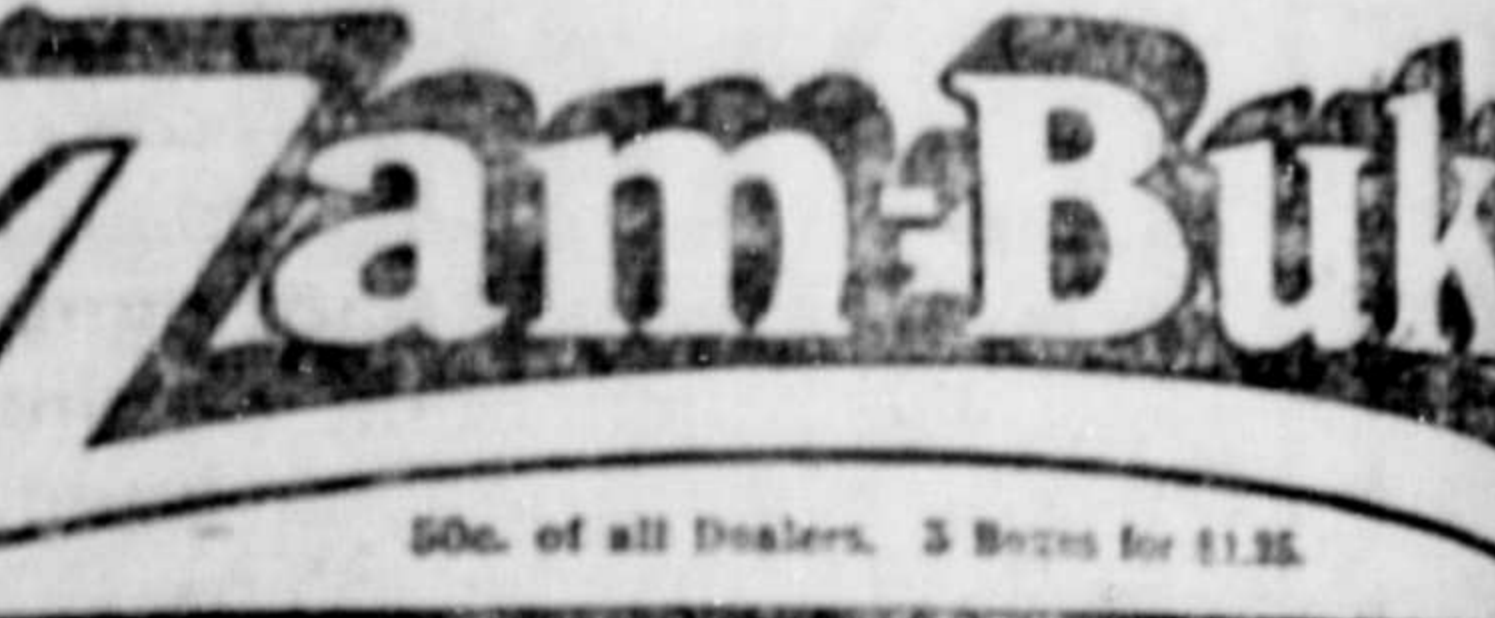

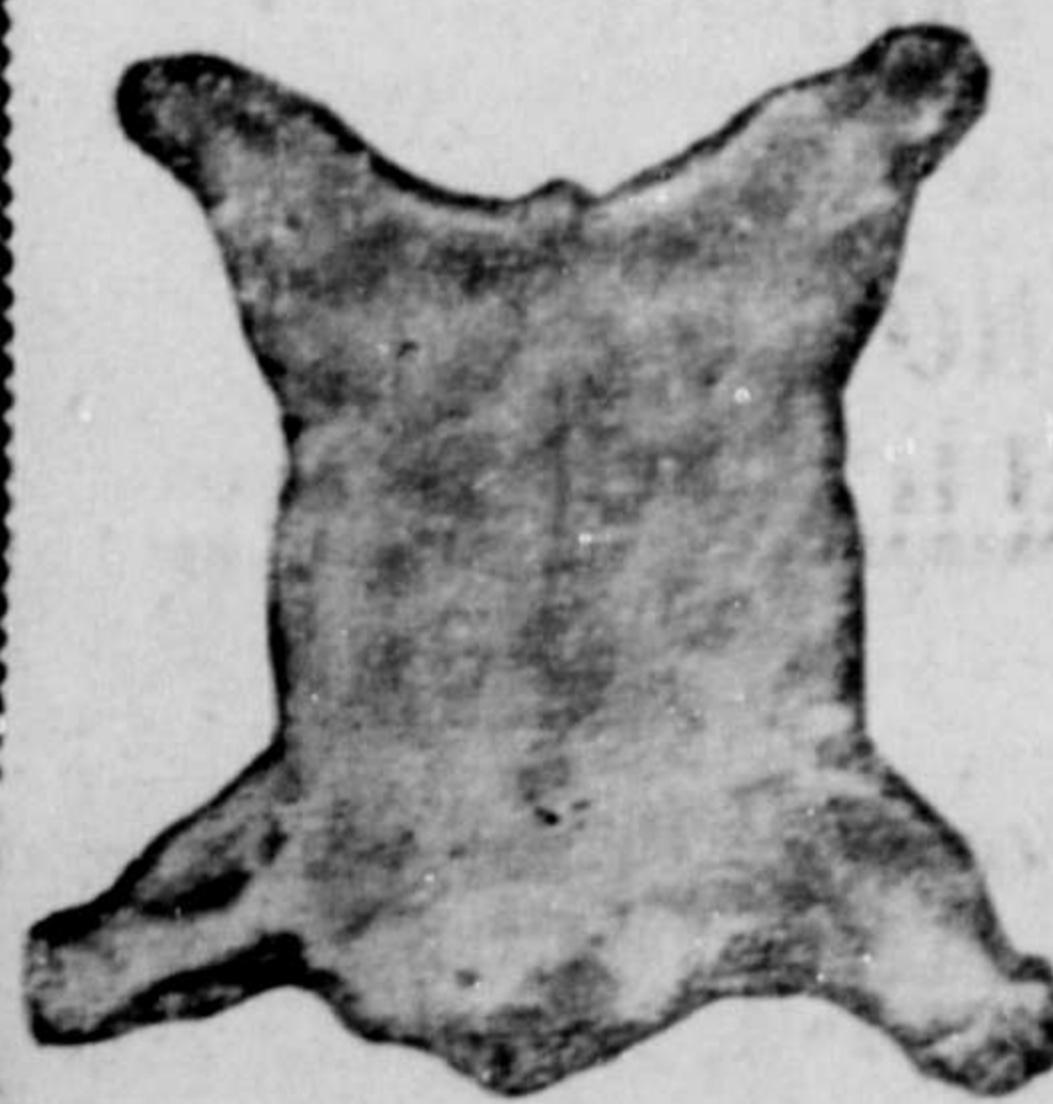

VANCOUVER HAS HUGE RAINFALL

Nearly Twice as much Fell in City to South as there was here in September

Prince Rupert had only 5.2 inches of rainfall last month as compared to 10.37 inches which Vancouver had in the same period. The precipitation during the month here was quite light and there was no steady storms, all coming in brief showery spells. Some people writing from Vancouver say that it was like a continuous downpour all the time there.

The warmest day here was on September 29 when the reading was 72, the lowest on September 24 and 25, 38. The mean temperature for the month was 50.7.

EDMONTON LABORERS ASK SEVEN DOLLARS

Harvest Work in Alberta Will Take Two Months and Has Just Started.

EDMONTON, October 5.—Farm laborers around the city of Edmonton are receiving \$6 a day with board and are now asking for \$7. The crops are exceptionally good and threshing has only begun. The work of harvesting will last about four months.

Light frosts were reported from many prairie points on September 28, but nearly all the grain had matured sufficiently to be out of danger.

Farmers threshing in the vicinity of Wainwright report a yield of 100 bushels of oats to the acre on some fields.

CITY COUNCIL HAS COMMITTEE TO MEET RAILWAY COMMISSION

A committee consisting of Acting Mayor Dybbavn, Aldermen Kerr and Rochester has been appointed by the city council to meet the railway commission on its visit here to present the city's case on various matters, among which will be the Cow Bay level crossing question. Notice was given by the Provincial Government at last night's council meeting that it had applied again for permission to put in a level crossing at Cow Bay leading to the government wharf.

Royal Bar Given New Lease of Life, But Turns Down F. McGee Again.

F. McGee appeared before the city council last evening asking reconsideration of his application for a beverage license that was refused him last Monday night. After some discussion the council sustained its last week's decision, Aldermen Perry and Murray being the only ones to favor the granting of the license.

There was a good deal of discussion as to the beverage licensing generally in the city and Ald. Rochester in opposing the granting of the particular license in point stated that there were 19 bars in the city now, whereas under the old licensing system there were but seven. Moreover the present system was getting right back to the old tavern days when there were saloons all over the place. In this particular case it appeared that one man was trying to create a monopoly by getting three licenses in one building. An exorbitant rent of \$300 a month was being charged McGee and with such conditions as these, honest business was being squeezed out by the beer business because the lessors were able to pay such high rents where it was impossible for an ordinary business man. Moreover, these people were just fly-by-nights—here today and gone tomorrow. They were no unit in the building up of the city. Alderman Perry supported the application on the ground of fairness but was in favor of some limitations on the business.

New Company.

Ed. Matson also appeared at the meeting asking for a license for the Royal Hotel which was granted. L. W. Patmore was present on behalf of the applicant and explained that a new company called the "R. H. Co.," of which Matson was the manager, had taken over the Royal Bar. It was a new concern and S. A. Corley, who was recently convicted under the B. C. Prohibition Act, had nothing to do with it other than being the landlord of the premises which were rented to the applicants at \$175 per month. Matson, personally, promised the council that the taxi drivers would not be allowed to have a telephone there and an endeavor would be made to have them stop dumping drunk men around the premises.

TWO OF THE DREDGES BUSY AT M'NICHOll

Tug Fearful took One across from Dry Dock Yesterday Afternoon

Two of the dredges brought to this city by Grant & McDonald, of Vancouver, are now busy digging across the harbor at McNicholl Creek for bottom material for the new Grand Trunk wharf, the last of the three having been towed over from the dry dock by the tug Fearful yesterday afternoon. This will keep the Fearful almost constantly busy bringing the gravel across the Bay, and the work is speeding up. The first dredge was brought to the dock this afternoon for repairs.

The dredges are moored to dolphins and new piles that have been put in and there is also a houseboat which provides a mess house and sleeping quarters for the men employed. Some of the employees do not come across the harbor at all.

Your Railways and the Cost of Living

BEFORE the Privy Council at Ottawa protest against the new Railway Rates has been made on the grounds that the giving of the new rates would raise the cost of living by a percentage many times higher than the percentage actually charged by the Canadian Railways.

It was pointed out that the numerous middlemen who act as the distributors of goods would each add his percentage of profit to the freight rate, so that although the railways might only receive, say, 40 cents additional freight charge on a shipment, the public would be forced by the distributing middlemen to pay many times that amount.

The managements of the various Canadian Railways desire through this, their Association, to draw the attention of newspaper readers to the highly significant fact that the recent increase in United States Railway Rates --- an increase similar to the increase in Canada---HAS ACTUALLY BEEN FOLLOWED BY A DECREASE IN THE COST OF LIVING IN THAT COUNTRY.

Furthermore

a great Canadian Manufacturer recently made public without any solicitation and without the previous knowledge of the Railway Managements ---figures which prove that the retail selling-price of a yard of plain white cloth in Winnipeg, after being hauled from Montreal to Toronto, would be increased only one-half a cent, EVEN

AFTER THE WHOLESALER HAD ADDED 20 PER CENT. PROFIT TO THE NEW FREIGHT RATE AND THE RETAILERS ANOTHER 50 PER CENT.

He showed that these distributors, whether rightly or wrongly, added 15 cents to his mill price of 16 cents per yard.

Yet the railways carried the raw cotton for this yard of goods from Texas to Montreal and the

finished goods from the mill to Toronto, and Toronto to Winnipeg for one and one-half cents.

One and One-half cents as against 15 cents.

We venture to believe that, whatever the explanation or the justification may be, the same serious additions to cost by the distributing trades will be found in relation to almost every article of common household use.

This is not to attack distributors. They may themselves be victims of a bad system or of an overcrowded trade. But it is to point out that if they add whatever percentages they, as a trade, find convenient, **THE RAILWAYS CANNOT HELP EITHER THEMSELVES OR THE PUBLIC.**

The oppressive results of these practices should not be charged against the Railway Managements, nor cited as reasons for holding freight rates down merely because railway rates can be held down while other prices soar as the various trades find necessary.

RAILWAY charges always must be a serious item in determining cost of production. But the Management of your Railways urge upon your attention this fact, that antiquated, overloaded and wasteful systems of distributing goods are much more properly subject for public anxiety.

CANADA CANNOT PROSPER WITHOUT PROSPEROUS RAILWAYS. CANADIAN RAILWAYS CANNOT PROSPER UNLESS CANADA PROSPERS.

In all sincerity, let us suggest that the people of Canada beware of those who would restrict and even strangle the Railways **SIMPLY BECAUSE CONTROL EXISTS THERE AND IS NOT SO CONVENIENT IN OTHER DEPARTMENTS OF COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY.**

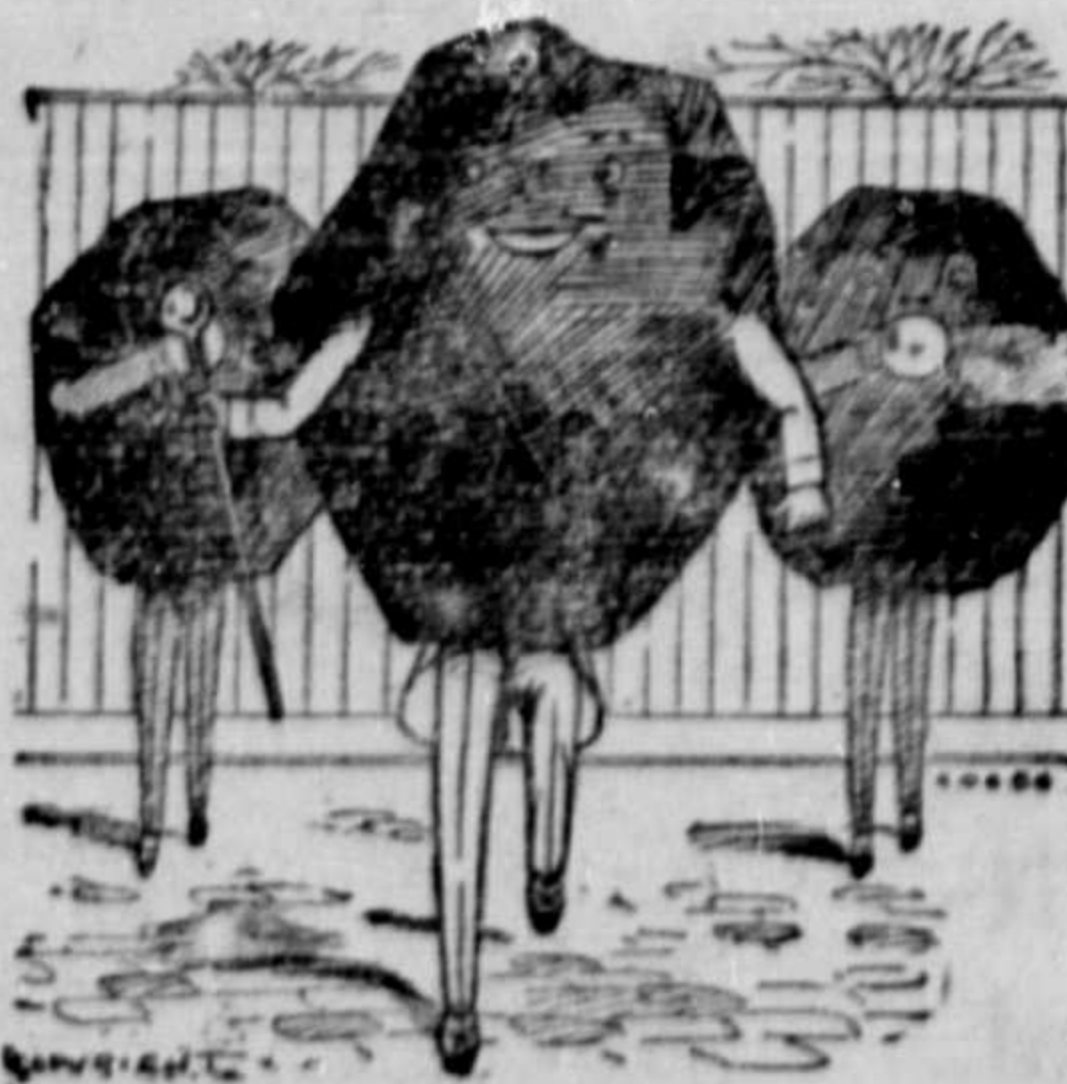

In the Letter Box

USE HEAD AS WELL AS HANDS
IN HORTICULTURE
TERRACE.

To the Editor,—
Having taken time to investigate conditions generally in this beautiful and fertile fruit valley I beg leave to offer a few suggestions in the hope that they may prove beneficial. If not in their application, then through the regulation of my conclusions.

There are many men of ability in this district but their efforts and attention have been directed along lines other than gardening and fruit growing. They have to the present been concerned only with the pioneering duties of a new country where primitive conditions have been hard to conquer. With the influx of new settlers that is now setting in and the consequent clearing and development that is following new conditions arise.

Inevitable Condition.

Generally in new districts the homesteader or pioneer moves out and the practical farmer, gardener or fruit grower takes his place. We are anxious to avoid this, but is inevitable in the Kitsumkum and Lakelse districts as elsewhere unless we take immediate measures along properly directed lines to fit ourselves for this new order of things.

We have many who call themselves vegetable growers in this district but one family took nearly all the prizes in that line at the Prince Rupert fair. Why? It is true that the vast majority who did not and could not compete sit up and take a lesson. Nature is prodigal in her gifts, but we do not know how to receive those gifts and through lack of information in that particular line our efforts may hinder rather than assist the giver.

Study Books.

Briefly then I would suggest that every one who expects to plant a garden next spring get some good books on the subject and read them carefully during the winter months and be prepared with more than hearsay information. It is not necessary that every man be an experimenter, the government does that for us. They have stations in B. C. as well as elsewhere and their reports and instructions are free for the asking. Those who are making a success of gardening I have found very willing to instruct and advise beginners. It is a pleasure for them to talk on these subjects. Use your opportunities.

Co-operation.

It has been pointed out to me that this is not a district for large farms. It is best adapted to small farms of from two to ten acres. I am not so sure of that. In fact I take quite the opposite view. Just as the success of large factories has been brought about by a combination of capital and superior talent, so I believe it will pay the average man to work at good wages on the farms of the successful gardener rather than to make a failure on his own small plot. The spirit of communism or even of extensive co-operation is not made manifest by the actions of many of those who are in the habit of dreaming these Utopian dreams. If farms could be made large enough to be self contained, to employ their help on a percentage basis, and to ship their produce direct to the wholesaler or elsewhere, being uniform in quality and pack they would soon set a market worthy of their efforts.

As long as you sit idle with a paltry patch cleared around your door you will get nowhere, and the homesteader will leave disgusted. Get out and expand, let your head help your hands, if you have not means enough of your own, then encourage capital to invest in development work and if the returns are more than a hundred per cent the first year for work as I have already seen in this valley, then don't deary the man who's invested. The opportunity was yours and you would not take it.

Let me also state that the arrests for drunkenness in Victoria have fallen from 887 in 1914 to 183 in 1919. An act that can produce such results cannot be working very badly.
