Municipal Laws Under Discussion

POLICE MAKE RAID ON HOTEL VANCOUVER, SEIZE WHISKEY AND ARREST MAN

Medical Changes in Municipal Law are Recommended

Union of Municipalities advise Govern-
ment to take over High Schools
and Hospitals and give
Control of Clubs

PRINCE RUPERT, October 7.—The Union of Municipalities convention
yesterday urged the Government to take over all high
and technical schools, and to operate all hospitals. This
was a considerable amount of discussion. The
Union condemned the action of provincial governments
in taking lands within municipalities free of taxation, claiming
it was a hardship to the municipalities and put the govern-
ment in a class along with land speculators.
Demand was made that the municipalities be given control
of the same as over hotels and that the police commis-
sioners should be compelled to have the same qualifications as
mayors.
The Union rejected the proposal that the provincial govern-
ment take over the entire police administration of the
provinces, but favored a two-year term for councils.

Arbitration Party Here Inspecting Properties

Ex-President Taft addressed Canadian Club this after-
noon at Prince Rupert Hotel; go south tonight

The party of official valuers of the Grand Trunk Pacific
Railway arrived last night by special train from the east after
having made the journey over the western lines by easy daylight
stages to give the officials the opportunity to see the whole system
properly. The last stop was made at Smithers where the train
remained Tuesday night.

This morning the party inspected the waterfront from one
end to the other, visiting the Swanson Bay car ferry, site of the
new salmon wharf, the drydock and other waterfront properties
of the company.

Tonight they transfer from their private train to the steamer
Prince George and will visit Vancouver. On Monday their private
train will meet them there and they will continue up the line of
the Canadian Northern, joining the Grand Trunk again at Lu-
erne. They will then go to the Great Lakes portion of the road
which yet remains to be inspected.

Changed Condition for Loggers on This Coast

Speaker at Vancouver Convention tells of improvement
as result of lessened traffic in drink and other causes

VANCOUVER, October 7.—Nearly a thousand delegates to
the Pacific Logging Congress are meeting here to discuss changed
lumbering conditions. They represent the industry in seven
American states and British Columbia.

At the opening session Norman F. Coleman, president of the
Loggers League, spoke of the new status of loggers today. There
was a time when the logger was satisfied with dirty blankets and
an unsanitary bunk. He now buys
eighty-five dollar suits, and
dresses up at night and goes to
places of amusement.

In one camp, the speaker men-
tioned, the employees own 27
automobiles, this being the result
of the decline in the drink traffic.
There being no opportunity of
having an old time convivial spree
in one camp, the representative of
a bank was given \$30,000 to put
into the bank on one day.

Dr. Tharaldson, head of the
league's sanitary department, said
the American camps had installed
shower baths, rain and fly proof
buildings, sanitary drinking foun-
tains, electric light, and the men
were given blankets, sheets and
pillowslips. Movies were provid-
ed and places for recreation.

Ill-Smelling Chemical

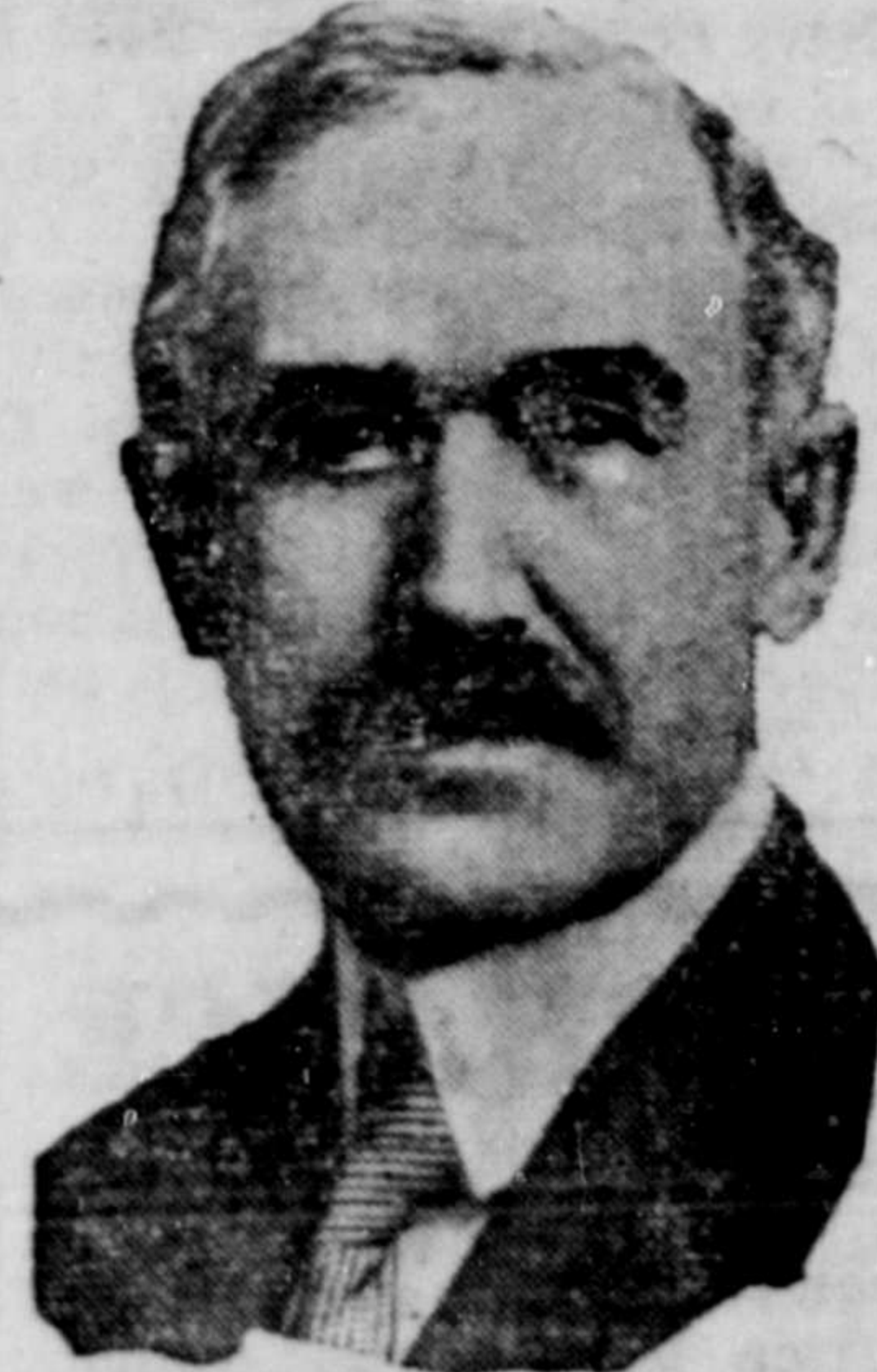
LONDON, Oct. 6.—Pussyfoot

Vital Question
In This City.

At the sitting of the Railway Commission yesterday, the chairman admitted that he was powerless to help Prince Rupert in the matter of ordering a better refrigerator car service. He cannot, we think, realize what a vital matter this is for the port, neither can he realize what this city and the country has lost through the failure during the last year to provide transportation for this product. The Government has money to spend for other things much less vital to the progress of the country than these few cars we need. It was able to advance the allowance of the members of parliament and of the ministers and this allowance would have purchased cars needed. What it is difficult to understand is why the railway does not realize the condition and the money it is losing through turning down this business which is offering.

Some Startling
Comparisons.

Seventy years ago Canada was the world's third maritime power. Today through lack of interest of Canadians in their maritime affairs she is in eighth place. Today the protection of Canadian trade routes is not given by Canada and her 8,700 ships, manned by 47,000 men are neither officered nor manned by Canadians. The value of this fleet is \$250,000,000, and the burden of the Canadian navy is 25 cents per head of the Canadian tax payer, while the British tax payer is burdened by \$17 per head.

These are facts that will bear careful consideration by all Canadians who take a pride in their country. There is no excuse for this state of affairs, for Canada is a much bigger country now than she was then. The appalling lack of mercantile shipping nearly ruined America's war effort and had it not been for Great Britain's assistance in furnishing ships to transport American soldiers and supplies, the United States would have cut a sorry figure.

Opinion of
An Expert.

"The start of all navies has been from the merchant marine service," said Capt. Donald Munro, C.M.G., R.N., recently, in discussing Canada's naval future. "I am convinced that the best thing for Canada to do is to get a sound sea instinct permeating through her population. This can only be done by training the young; the provision of fighting ships necessarily must follow afterwards."

Capt. Munro was chief adviser to the British Admiralty during the war on empire port defence, and at the present time is touring Canada under the auspices of the Navy League. He has sized up the naval situation in Canada and is endeavoring to show to all the British Dominions that definite contributions must be made to Great Britain by all outlying parts of the Empire.

Canada's future position as a naval and mercantile marine power is one of the things that will be strengthened as a result of the Navy League Campaign, which will begin throughout the Dominion on October 18. The campaign will last for a week and the sum of \$760,000 is being asked. Of this amount \$125,500 will be devoted to propaganda work for the promotion of national sea conscious spirit. Each of the four western provinces is being asked to raise \$30,000.

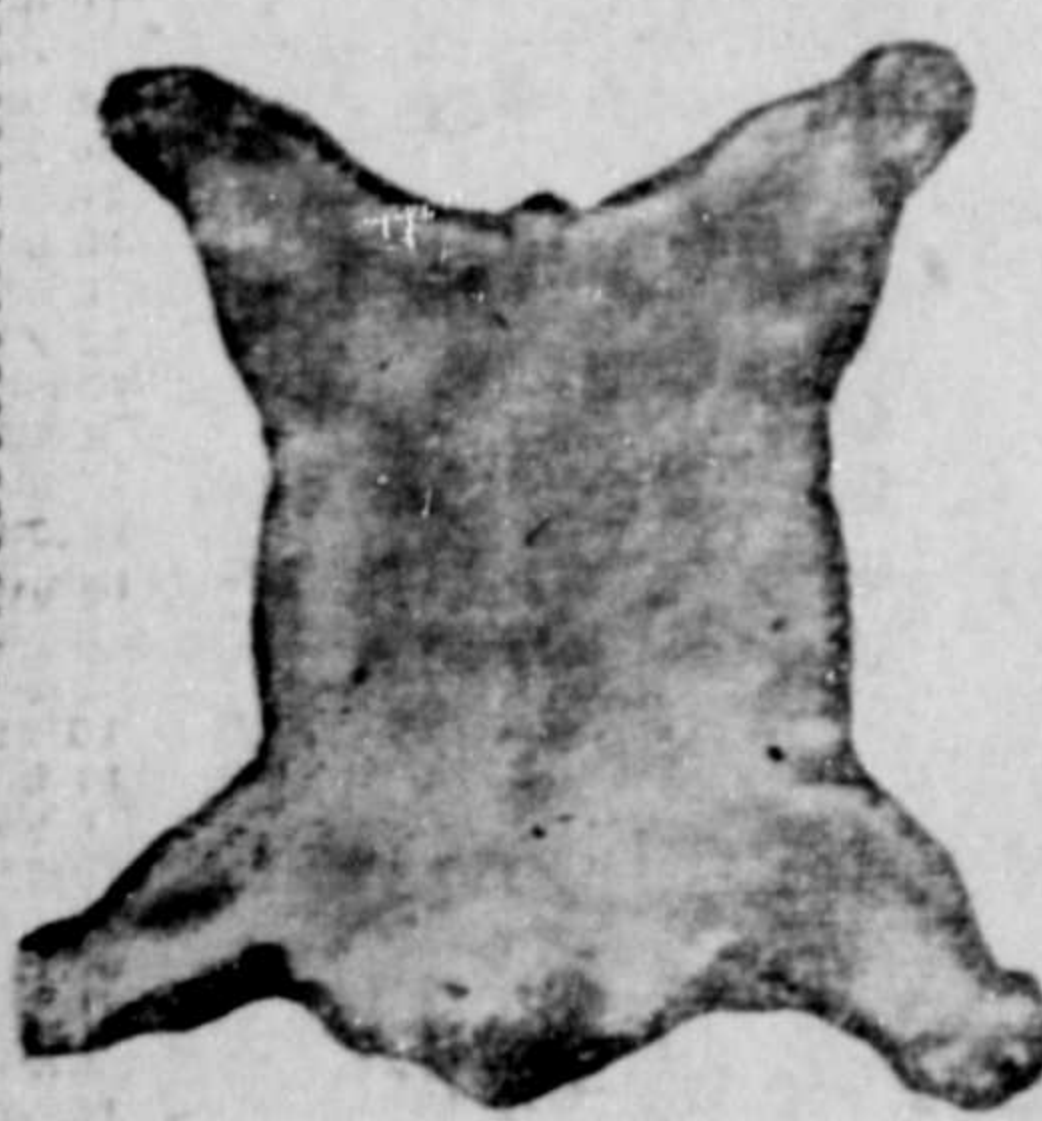

PROHIBITION A SUCCESS.

To the Editor:—If a partial Prohibition Act can accomplish what there is herein stated, is it not reasonable to suppose that with the privilege of importation cancelled we might hope for still further progress? Read what a Catholic clergyman has stated: "The homes of my people have improved and are more prosperous. The Catholic Children's Aid Society at its last annual meeting reported that cases of destitution and delinquency among children are distinctly diminished owing to prohibition legislation," and if you are really interested in getting at the facts of the case, read on. Others have an equally satisfactory testimony. The Anglican Bishop of Kootenai says: "The groups of loafers hanging around the hotel bars are noticeable by their absence." So much from two representatives of two great churches.

Police Record.

Now, let us hear from the mayor of Victoria. "The police records show a gratifying decrease. I know of many families that are having a happier existence." The mayor has substantial reasons for this statement, as the chief of police in his last annual report states: "In 1914 there were 887 drunken persons arrested, while in 1919 183 cases of drunkenness were brought before the courts." And now from the superintendent of provincial police: "On account of the small number of persons arrested, it has been deemed advisable to close three of our jails, (now four are closed)." And lastly, from the Premier: "There is a greater volume of cash business, and the collection of old accounts, that were considered no good, has been a noticeable feature of the coming into force of prohibition. The consensus of public opinion will be found unfavorable to any change which would have in view of relaxation of the present restrictions regarding the sale of liquor. I do not hesitate to affirm that I align myself uncompromisingly on the side of prohibition."

Too Successful.

Who can be believed if not the authorities above quoted. To say that the present Act has been a failure is to speak contrary to the evidence produced. It has been altogether too great a success for our "Moderation" friends. It has been all too immediate in its results in cleaning up our province and evidently decreasing revenues derived from brewery stock. It is beginning to pinch. The hope of their gains is being demolished, while our mothers are being protected and the kiddies are getting a better chance to fight the battle of life. Let me repeat, the present Act is altogether too successful for those who from the house-tops decry its effectiveness.

To the Editor:—The letter "Alluring Picture" in last night's issue of the News is another sample of the product of the minds of those people who mind everybody's business but their own, and take for granted that the rest of their fellow men like they themselves have little or no self-control.

No one will deny that it is

wrong to get drunk and all decent men will do what is within their power to improve social conditions, but no one has a right to say what a man shall eat or drink in his own home, and no one can honestly say that a beverage is essentially evil because it contains alcohol, for it has been recognized for thousands of years by philosophers and men, infinitely wiser than the average prohibitionist that there is virtue in wine and distilled liquors. The strange thing is why these people who are so bent on improving others do not devote themselves to encouraging the observance of existing laws, practising self-control, trying to be sincere and cheerful and look for the best in mankind. Thus we should make progress, unhealthy minds would be eliminated and the evil of intemperance be killed at the root.

As an example of the result of a nation being controlled solely by laws leaving no scope for the development of individual character, remember what the Germans (those people ruled by the word "verboten," forbidden) did, when this control was removed by the circumstances of war in 1914. Believe me the reports of their atrocities were not exaggerated and can mainly be attributed to tendencies engendered by an excess of prohibitory laws.

I, as a free subject, have a right to drink wine, beer or spirits and nobody has a right to make me a lawbreaker for doing so. Moral progress can never be achieved by making crimes of innocent actions and laws already exist for dealing with drunks.

CARVELL TELLS OF CONDITIONS

Little Use Railway Commission Give Orders for Grand Trunk Without Government Supply Money

"It is practically hopeless for the Railway Commission to use its powers over this railroad at the present time," said Hon. Frank Carvell, chairman of the Board of Railway Commissioners, yesterday, speaking of conditions generally pertaining to railway affairs here, on account of the unsettled condition under which the Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Express companies are acting, as far as finances are concerned. The position of the commission is really humiliating, but much more so is the position of the company itself. "At Prince George the Board was severely castigated for its apparent inaction in dealing with the Grand Trunk Pacific and I was compelled to answer severely to a man there who has been writing letters censuring this board."

Conditions Bad

"As everyone knows the G.T.P. railway is in the hands of the receivers and little good it would do for this board to give orders unless the government gave money so that they were carried out. For the past two or three years conditions have been very bad, but we hope that in the very near future these will be improved."

"The road is still under the control of the Railway Board and we intend to treat it just the same as we do the C.P.R. or any independent road and until parliament takes that control away from us we will exert our jurisdiction and will not relinquish our authority."

Other Railways

"Our hope is that the Transcontinental and the Intercolonial, which is not now under our control, will be brought under our jurisdiction as soon as the Canadian National lines are established. For its operation in the best interests and for the benefit of the people it should be so."

CARVELL FAVORS LEVEL CROSSING

Provided Protection is Given and Speed Under Ten Miles at Cow Bay.

The Cow Bay level crossing question came up at the meeting of the Railway Commission this morning and the witnesses heard were S. E. Parker, president of the Board of Trade, and Aldermen Dybhavn and Rochester. Mr. Parker spoke in favor of the level crossing. Alderman Dybhavn explained the city's position and Ald. Rochester spoke against the crossing stating that the city council had never gone in favor of that as a whole.

Mr. Carvell explained that the Board could make no order till the railway company itself had been heard on the matter. He saw no other way of having a road cross the railway here unless it was by level crossing. The present plan of overheads was in his opinion a waste of space that could be used better in affording waterfront accommodation to businesses. Together with Mr. Nantel he had gone into the question and they were in favor of granting permission to put in the level crossing.

The matter of protection would be one that would have to be carefully considered. The provincial government, on whom the expense would devolve, would no doubt want a bell because it was cheap, while the city would want the highest degree of safety if they were not in favor of a level crossing at all. The railway company on whom none of the expense would come would want gates, no doubt, the most expensive installation.

G. W. Nickerson thought a bell would afford sufficient protection for some years, and Ald. Rochester opposed the bell idea saying that many accidents happened by them going out of order. Ald. Dybhavn felt that it would be the duty of the commission to see that the fullest measure of safety was provided. Mr. Carvell stated that he thought a bell would be ample provision if the trains did not pass at a speed of greater than ten miles. Its initial installation would cost about \$700 or \$800 and after that the upkeep would be little. Mr. Carruthers reminded the commission that the provincial government would qualify its expenditure but Mr. Carvell reminded him that it was the provincial government that was making the application.

EXPRESS DELIVERY FOR CITY ASSURED

Representations to Express Company Officials Have Met With Success.

Speaking to the Daily News this morning, Acting Mayor Dybhavn intimated that free express delivery to the central portion of town, at least, has been granted by the officials of the express companies on representations made yesterday in which the necessary maps and figures were submitted. This delivery will be brought into effect as soon as all details have been arranged.

Things will be in shape by next Monday evening when a detailed report of the arrangements will be submitted to the city council.
