Lumber Order for United Kingdom ACTUAL COUNT GIVES 2,577 FAMILIES IN PRINCE RUPERT AT PRESENT TIME

Need of Assembly Dock for Lumber at Prince Rupert

Order received by local mill for high grade, but little market for other grades owing to high freight rates

An order has been secured by the Prince Rupert Lumber Co. for three quarters of a million feet of high grade lumber to go to the United Kingdom. This will be shipped to Montreal by rail. The order has been secured, in spite of the high railroad rates. Low grade lumber cannot be shipped that way and there is no demand for what is generally known as merchantable lumber. The order is for clears and will be sent through in two, three and four-inch plank.

In cutting this three quarters of a million feet of high grade lumber a quantity of low grade and merchantable has to be manufactured and the railway rates are so high that there is no market for these grades. The only hope for being able to sell them is to have an assembly dock here at which all the mills may assemble their lumber ready for water shipment. The rate on lumber to Montreal is \$32 a thousand and this is prohibitive so far as anything but ship planking or other high grade lumber is concerned. It could be carried by water, however, if there was a place at which the lumber could be assembled within reach of the ship's tackle. Without facilities for delivering at a foreign port the lumber market is limited.

Decide on Site.

When Mr. Hayes was in the city recently along with other Canadian National officials, the matter was discussed at length and since that time the question has been taken up through the local office. What is needed is to decide on a site and have the dock built at once so that the mills may be able to continue cutting. There are plenty of inquiries for shipments and orders could easily be secured if the lumber was ready for shipment or could be made ready within a reasonable time.

The Dominion Government is building a dock for this purpose at Vancouver to serve the mills on the rail. A dock is needed here even more than at Vancouver, to enable the smaller mills to reach the export market through this port. Lumber is what the people here have. Lumbering is a basic industry, and should receive all possible encouragement.

Competitive Conditions. Shipments could be made direct from here to United Kingdom points or to Australia or Africa at a competitive rate if there were a dock. The lumber must be piled within reach of the ship's tackle or it takes a second handling which is fatal to competition. The whole matter is receiving consideration and it is expected a recommendation will be made to the railway company at once if such has not already been done. In the meantime some of the mills are shut down and others are working under difficulties owing to the lack of accommodation.

NINE MONTHS' CRIME RECORD

Total of 152 Murders in Ireland since Beginning of Year, says Official Report

DUBLIN, Oct. 9.—Dublin Castle reports that between January 1 and October 2 there were 63 court houses destroyed, 672 constabulary barracks destroyed, 109 police killed, 174 police wounded, 16 soldiers killed, 61 wounded and 27 civilians killed. The report says that for all the shootings and murders of policemen the number of perpetrators could be counted on the fingers of one hand.

RAILWAY RATES MAY COME DOWN

Revision must be Based on Other Lines than Canadian National, Say Cabinet

OTTAWA, Oct. 9.—The understanding in regard to the recent cutting of the Dominion cabinet in referring back the railway rates to the Railway Commission is that the commission must revise the freight rates on a new basis. Instead of basing the increase on the conditions obtaining on the Canadian National roads, the cabinet tells the commission it must bring in a judgment regardless of the peculiarly unfortunate position of the Canadian National lines. As a result of this interpretation it is expected that the rates will be revised downwards very considerably.

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—Five were killed and five missing while a score were injured in an explosion wrecking the forward compartment of the British tanker R. G. Crowe.

Cleveland Indians Playing on Home Ground Beat Dodgers By 5-1 Score.

RUBE MARQUARD ARRESTED FOR TICKET SCALPING

CLEVELAND, Oct. 9.—Playing on her home grounds Cleveland completely outclassed Brooklyn in today's world series game and defeated the Dodgers by a 5-1 score, thus evening up the series, 2 for Brooklyn and 2 for Cleveland. O'Neill and Coveleskie were the opening batteries for Cleveland, while Miller and Cadore were for Brooklyn. In the third inning Cleveland made two scores and Brooklyn made the sole one she got in the same frame. Pitcher Mannaux pitched in the fourth for Brooklyn but Cadore was again out in. Cleveland got one run also in the seventh. Twenty-seven thousand people witnessed the game today. The city is crowded with ticket scalpers and pitcher Rube Marquard was arrested for that offence.

Prince Rupert Population is Eight Thousand People

Actual count places families at 2,577 outside of block 1; Express Deliveries in Sections 1, 5 and 6

The city census, based on the number of families, has been completed and the number, excluding residents of Block I in the vicinity of the cold storage plant, has been placed at 7,731. With the residents of Block I included it is estimated that the population of the city would be in close proximity of 8,000. The census was taken for the purpose of submitting the city's claim to the express companies for free delivery locally and the number of families in the entire city was put at 2,577. Computing three to a family, which is a conservative figure, the figure stated is the result.

According to the arrangement that has been promised the city by the express companies there will be free delivery in that part of the city between Eleventh Street and Hays Cove Circle and the waterfront and Ninth Avenue, Comox being excluded.

Details as to the arrangements for delivery are not, as yet, announced, but it is understood that the Canadian Express Company already has a truck here to take care of its deliveries.

MEIGHEN OPENS WESTERN TOUR MONDAY WEEK

OTTAWA, October 9.—Premier Meighen opens his western tour with a speech in Winnipeg on October 18 and Moosejaw October 19. The chief minister then will jump to Vancouver where he will speak on October 22, Victoria, October 23; Chilliwack 25, Grand Forks 26, Bentickon 27, Kelowna and Vernon 28, Kamloops October 29.

It is noticeable that four of the meetings are to be held in the Yale-Cariboo constituency where the ministerial candidate is being opposed by a labor man and a farmer-Liberal candidate. There is no arrangement so far in regard to Prince Rupert and other northern points.

MEMBER AGAIN COMING NORTH

LUMBER DOCK.

There is a great need here just now for a lumber assembly dock. There are mills all over the coast. At various points up the coast there are plants that ship lumber to foreign countries. The means of conveyance is by water. Across the coast there are a number of mills and merchantable lumber. Some of these are the Seal and Georgetown plants. There is a handicap, however, in the lack of an assembly dock where the lumber can be piled within reach of the ship's tackle. It can come here to load under present conditions, but it is too long to load a vessel and it is not profitable. The cargo is ready or nearly ready when the ship arrives, in order to get it on board. The successful export business is one essential is an assembly dock at which a ship can come up, and find a cargo within reach of her slings. Archbishop Du Vernet on The Universality of Law.

One of the chief reasons why there is so little conventional religion amongst us is because of the false conception which so largely prevails as to how God works.

The popular idea is that it is only as an external power occasionally breaking in upon us and interfering with the laws of Nature, like some mighty grappling-iron let down from the skies...

True Religion Has Unifying Influence.

God does not work upon us as an external mechanical force in some extraordinary manner. He works in us as a vital spiritual influence in accordance with the laws of the social life, the laws of the human mind, and the laws of the creative spirit.

It is far more honoring to God to believe that he is constantly working in us in a natural way, than to believe that He only occasionally works upon us in a miraculous manner.

Whenever we find a force which tends to estrange individuals, split up families, set class against class, or race against race, in selfish antagonism, whether this be a false nationalism or a one-sided unionism, or a sectarian denominationalism, or an ignorant Bibliolatry, or an ecclesiastical dogmatism—there we may be sure that the Spirit of Christ is lacking.

If instead of relegating God to some distant star and making Him a far-off languid Spectator of our human affairs we would only enthroned Him in our hearts and give the influence of His Spirit of Love and Goodness full sway in our souls, to work in us and through us in accordance with the laws of the human mind and the laws of the social life, such as the power of the attention, the force of suggestion, the principle of associated ideas, the sympathetic radiation of feeling, the inspiration of fellowship, and the interpenetration of personality, religion would become to us all the greatest reality in the universe.
