#### ARBITRATION PARTY HAVE GONE EASTWARD

Examined Wharves at Vancouver, Victoria and Seattle and Left Vancouver Today.

VANCOUVER, October 11.—The arbitration commission reached the city on Saturday from Prince Rupert accompanied by Captain Nicholson, general manager of steamships for the Canadian National Railways. They inspected the wharf and sheds briefly, left later for Seattle and returned this morning, going eastward at noon.

#### LECTURER SPEAKS TWICE LAST NIGHT TO BIG AUDIENCES

VANCOUVER, Oct. 11.—Nellie McClung, speaking for prohibition in Wesley Church last night filled the biggest theatre in town and also Wesley Church. There was much enthusiasm shown.

#### DR. GRANT ON PROHIBITION

Large Congregation Out to Hear Address at Presbyterian Church Hall.

To a large congregation which crowded the church hall on Fourth Avenue, Dr. Grant last night dealt at some length with the question of prohibition. He mentioned that the Moderation League represented the opposition to prohibition and that the issue was not between prohibition and moderation but between prohibition and no prohibition.

Dealing with the question of the success of prohibition, the preacher quoted statistics from different parts of Canada and spoke of ex-President Taft's recent pronouncement on the question in which he showed that it had been valuable and advising that under a democracy it was for the minority to submit to the rule of the majority and "play the game." Dr. Grant did not, however, consider that in British Columbia during the last year there had been prohibition. This would be remedied if the people voted for the law as it now stood. The Dominion Government was the only body that could stop importation and a way had been provided by which it could be done.

The speaker dealt with the personal liberty argument, showing that there was no such thing as personal liberty. There was only such liberty as the conventions of society allowed.

Dealing with the literature issued by the Moderation League, the speaker urged that it was not honest to put figures before the people which were misleading and those figures were misleading. In New Zealand, for instance, there was a table of jail sentences on one side as against convictions on the other. Most people would not notice the difference and would come to the conclusion that prohibition in New Zealand was a failure. This was not honest.

Dr. Grant dispelled the argument that the bootleggers were with prohibition. He said that no bootleggers had attended the prohibition rooms but the same could not be said for the other side. He urged his hearers not to be led away by any of the specious arguments but to vote for prohibition on October 20.

Next Sunday Dr. Grant will preach on the Moderation League.

#### SELLING WHEAT TO THE STATES

Great Britain Not Purchasing Much from Canada Just Now.

WINNIPEG, October 11.—Very little business in wheat is being done with Great Britain this year, that country holding off, apparently with the idea that prices are too high. The largest buyer at present is the United States, the barge now being down against that country and free export being allowed. Discount on Canadian money has a good effect on this export market.

At the present rate of export there is likely to be a change in the exchange rate, which has been gradually assuming a more normal condition.

#### TO PUT RUPERT ON EVEN KEEL

Barge Left Here Saturday and Another Earlier in Week for Buoyancy Purposes.

On Saturday a second barge went from here to Swanson Bay to aid in righting the steamer Prince Rupert. The other left earlier in the week. These barges will be used for giving the vessel buoyancy.

Once the Rupert is on an even keel the regular work of salvage will commence. It is expected that it will be next week before the vessel is in condition to commence the actual raising operations. It is a big job, but once the vessel is righted will not present any unusual difficulties.

#### Fish Price Today over Twenty Cents

Booth, Atlin and Royal paid 20.1c and over 11c for Halibut on open market; Car Shortage still on

At the Fish Exchange this morning the biggest price paid for fish since 1918 prevailed when three fish buyers paid 20.1c for first class fish and 11.3c for seconds. This figure was paid for fish in carload lots and there were only four cars in the yards, one for the cold storage and three allotted to the fish exchange.

Following are the arrivals and sales: Sentinel, 15,000 pounds and Beaver, 10,000 pounds to the Booth Canadian Fisheries at 20.1c and 11.3c. Fisher, 11,000 pounds; Inez H., 2,000 pounds and Agnes B., 10,000 pounds to the Atlin Fisheries at 20.1c and 11.3c. Sherman, 17,000 pounds and Gony, 5,000 pounds sold to the Royal Fish Co., at 20.1c and 11.2c. Roof, 12,000 pounds, Polaris, 60,000 pounds, Orient, 40,000 pounds and Atlas, 36,000 pounds were unsold at noon on account of the shortage of cars.

#### Relic of Huge Monster Found at Mouth of River

Two immense bones, part of spinal column of antediluvian monster, being shipped from here by local Japanese

Lying in the Grand Trunk freight shed today are two sections of bone that are claimed to be relics from the skeleton of some antediluvian monster of enormous size. Inconspicuous and plain in themselves, these two sections of bone further carry out the theories that over North America thousands of years ago there existed creatures of stupendous size. In the bone itself there is nothing to show to the ordinary person whether it is of fish or reptile, animal or mammal, only that it has come from a huge creature's skeleton for it is, undoubtedly, bone.

There are two solid pieces which are similar in appearance. They are of round and flat appearance resembling sections of log and are about 12 inches in diameter by 15 inches in length and very probably are sections of a vertebral column. Some persons say that rather they are sections of a tail but the fact that there are three off-shoots from the sides at right angles to each other would credit that they are the sections of a spinal cord and the off-shoots would be the remnants of ribs.

There has been no expert advice as to the identity of the bones and there is much speculation among those who have seen them as to their origin and kind. They are on their way south for the purpose of research work. The bones were found on Kit-

#### PRAIRIE PROVINCES ARE CONFIDENT THEY WILL GO BONE DRY

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—(By mail.) Much interest is being taken throughout the provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta in the forthcoming plebiscite in regard to stopping the importation of liquor into these provinces. The plebiscite is one arranged by the Dominion Government prior to making the three provinces bone dry.

The vote is to be taken on October 25, five days after the British Columbia vote. The central committee here is confident of the prairie vote carrying, but they are wondering what British Columbia will do. If she votes for prohibition this time she will have an opportunity of shutting off importation in the near future.

Saskatchewan is the only one of the three provinces that has tried government control and she found it not workable. There is no chance of that province ever returning to such a system.

Resources Takes Siam at Prohibition.

"Resources," Weston Coyney's interesting little magazine, which is usually devoted to matters pertaining to development of the city and district, goes out of its way this month to take a fling at those who are anxious to have decent conditions in the community and are urging that people vote for prohibition of the liquor traffic. Incidentally it calls them "pussyfooters." Also it calls the people who are convicted "criminals." It says: "Bigotted sentimental tyranny has in the past many wholesale slaughters of the innocent to answer for; but in all history no device of the ungodly ever placed to its record such a long list of criminals and criminally-disposed persons as prohibition has made and proudly claims as its own." The article paints a sad picture of the "fisherman coming from work in a raging gale wet through and exhausted" and of course needing a nip. It also speaks of the miner in the bowels of the earth, the arduous toilers of the logging camps, mills and shipyards and the shattered and nerve-wracked veterans of the Great War who ought not to be deprived of such stimulant as may comfort them. These people will all recognize themselves in the picture and doubtless be sorry for themselves. Unfortunately the writer seems to have no sympathy for the "nerve-wracked" editor worn out from over-exertion in writing a lot of twaddle and having to resort to a little touch of two and a half per cent to keep him going in the same happy humorous vein.

Possibly the editor of Resources is not aware that these same "pussyfooters" of whom he speaks are among the best business men in the city and the most skilled of the workers. Had he taken a look at the list of subscribers to the prohibition campaign fund he might have thought twice before speaking of them in that way. However, his article will add to the merit of the community and that is worth something.

Train of Evils Imagination Created.

Resources speaks of the "train of evils" prohibition has created. This train of evils exists only in the diseased imagination. There is no train of evils except such as a few people who have no control over themselves conjure up. Perhaps it is an evil that jails have been closed, that people are buying clothes and shoes and other necessities of life in place of liquor. Perhaps it is a train of evils that women and children are receiving better treatment and are better clad, that children are born under better conditions and are given a chance in life. Place against these things the fact that a few people sell liquor contrary to law and that a few people erect stills and are sometimes punished for the offense. Where is the train of evils that Mr. Coyney sees?

Editor for Once Out of His Sphere.

Mr. Coyney is personally a fine man and the Daily News has always recognized the value of his magazine and given it such publicity as it merited, but when he sets out to read moral lectures to the community and to belittle the efforts of those who are trying to improve conditions, he is out of his sphere and he injures his magazine and his standing in the community. The humor of his article, however, to some extent makes amends for any objection that may be taken to it. It is really one more boost for prohibition.

ANOTHER BABINE MINE

The Steamship Mining Company, non-personal liability, was recently gazetted to develop claims in the interior known as the Babine Group. The incorporators are P. J. Higgins, A. D. Davis and J. J. Driscoll, and the property shows a strong vein traced at a width of some 34 inches for 3,000 feet with ore running assay values of \$236.50 in gold, silver, lead and copper. The adjoining property to this, the Babine Bonanza, recently made a big strike and expects to be on the shipping list next season.

MILLION DOLLAR SHIPMENT

More than a million dollars' worth of ore will be shipped by dog teams and sleighs from the Premier Mine this winter according to recent arrivals coming out for the winter. Glowing reports of other finds are also made and the road building both by the Canadian and American governments into the Salmon River mining fields is the source of much satisfaction to all the mining interests in that section. General Lockie has let a contract for the continuation of work on the Hercules throughout the winter, and D. W. Racey has some good ore stacked at the Silver Tip awaiting shipment. This property is closed up for the winter.

MOOSE MINE ACTIVE.

Work is now proceeding on the work of development on the Moose Mine at Alice Arm which was recently bonded by a Vancouver syndicate headed by W. R. Ross, examiner of lands. The Moose is located about four miles from the Dolly Varden up the Kibsaunt river from Alice Arm and has long been looked upon as a mine with great prospects. During the past summer D. W. Cameron, the discoverer, conducted development operations but a month or so ago let the property to the bonders, P. W. Racey, engineer in charge, was recently in town getting supplies to take in over the Dolly Varden Railway before it may be closed up by the heavy snows.

In the Letter Box

REPLY TO FORMBY.

Editor Daily News:—Permit me to congratulate the vice-president of the Moderation League, Capt. Formby, for his excellent eulogy on self-control and other virtues, in your issue of yesterday. It appears that the captain has taken exception to certain remarks of mine regarding government sale of liquor, and I take it that his letter is intended as a reply. If that is the case, it is rather unfortunate that the writer altogether avoids the point at issue, making a flanking movement around the subject, he finally winds up in Germany.

It may be my lack of education or just natural stupidity, but I am unable to see any connecting link between the atrocities of the Germans on the battlefields of Europe and the desirability or otherwise of government sale of liquor in B. C. Might I humbly suggest that a march into Germany or any other distant part appears to me to be an error in strategy on the part of Capt. Formby, exposing as it does his rear and seriously endangering his lines of communication. And if the Moderationists hope to top the poll on the 20th they had better try and keep their zealous commander nearer home.

I would like to ask Capt. Formby how he squares this sentence in his letter: "For it has been recognized for thousands of years by men infinitely wiser than the average prohibitionist that there is virtue in wine and distilled liquor," with the fact that distilled liquors are a comparatively modern invention, and why he does not trot out his authorities? But speaking of philosophers and wise men of old I beg permission to quote one on the subject. He said: "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." When one reads the platform of the Moderation League the truth of this statement is brought home to one with tremendous force.

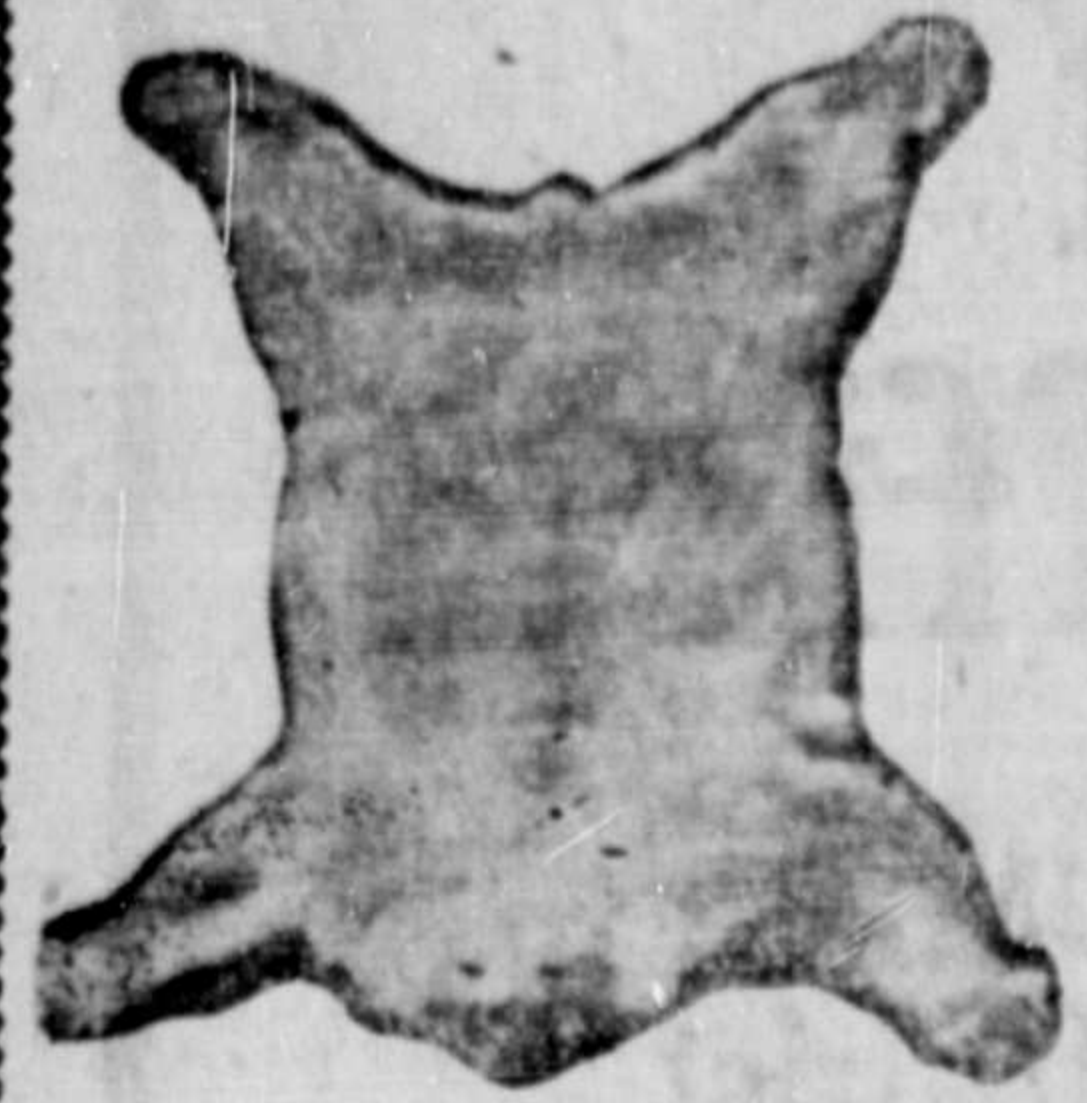

### Surf Inlet People Want Better Communication


Great Improvements being made at British Columbia's Largest Gold Mining Camp but place is Isolated

SURF INLET, Princess Royal Island, October 11.—The people here are anxious to secure better communication with the outside world. At present they have a call from one steamer a week and there is no other way of communicating with the world. They are isolated more than any other place in British Columbia with a similar population.

If there was a wireless station at this point, it would relieve the condition very considerably. People here point to the fact that at Hyder, Alaska, on Portland Canal, where there are only about 50 people living, a wireless station has been installed by the United States Government, even though there is a telegraph service by Canadian Government wire to Stewart, close by. Here however is a town of 300 inhabitants, a permanent settlement, yet the government has not thought fit to install a wireless station, and there is but the one boat, and that not a direct boat to and from Prince Rupert. A wireless station would relieve the situation wonderfully and a direct boat with Prince Rupert would be a great boon.

### The Mining Camp

Belmont Surf Inlet Mine is the largest gold producing mine of the Province. There are resident within the borders of the camp about 300 people. The homes are modern, having hot and cold water, baths and electric light. A more modern form of bunkhouse for the single men of the employment is being erected, and the antiquated single room building is being eliminated. These buildings are divided into good sized single rooms to accommodate two men. They are plastered, electrically lighted and furnished with modern toilet and hot and cold water.

### Improvements

During the present summer and fall great improvements have been made by the management to the camp. A large spacious hall has been erected at a cost of about fifteen thousand dollars, the purpose being to give the employees the necessary provision of good entertainment. In the lower part of the building three billiard tables have been installed, a room for reading purposes and a canteen. In the upper half the room is fitted up with a screen and a moving picture is shown twice a week. The management has built a number of modern houses during the present summer and they expect to further continue building as soon as the spring comes.

Plans are under way for the laying down of a system of roads that will facilitate easy travel. The camp in every way is now being made a model mining camp.
