BOLSHEVIK POWER BOTH ON SEA AND LAND SEEMS TO BE BREAKING UP

Soviet Ask Peace with Gen. Wrangel

General deposed by mutinous sailors in Baltic Sea; Red Naval Station reported captured by anti-Bolsheviks

PRINCE RUPERT, Oct. 12.—The Russian Soviet has sent a delegation to General Wrangel, the South Russian leader, to propose peace proposals to General Wrangel, the South Russian leader. It is stated that Generals Budenny and Semenov are prepared to themselves under General Wrangel. The chief Red naval station, is reported to have been captured by the anti-Bolsheviks. Mutinous sailors of the Bolshevik Baltic war-ships have deposed Admiral Raskhnikov, but the revolt on land has been put down by an armed force.

William Duff, M.P., declares Letting of Ship Contracts Illegal; No Tenders Called although law expressly provides for it

GARDE LOSES LENGTHY CASE

Mr. Justice Murphy This Afternoon Hands Down Judgment in Favor of Michelson and Others.

After lengthy argument of counsel in the J. Michelson et al vs. A. C. Garde case, Mr. Justice Murphy at 2 o'clock this afternoon handed down judgment in favor of the plaintiffs confirming their claim to two thirds interest in mining claims in the Bulkley Valley in which Mr. Garde had an interest. Mr. Garde's power of attorney is also cancelled. "I realize that the judgment I am handing down may be hard on Mr. Garde," said Mr. Justice Murphy, "but I cannot do otherwise for I find that he has overstepped the contract and made a legal mistake. Many men have been ruined by just such a mistake." This case completes the business of the assizes court here this fall. Justice Murphy and Stenographer Bryan are due in Prince George next Monday.

GOVERNMENT 23 IN PROVINCIAL ELECTION IN NEW BRUNSWICK

ST. JOHN, Oct. 12.—Unofficial latest returns in regard to the election say that the Government has 23 members, the opposition 13. Farmers 10, Labor 2. There was a very close vote in many of the constituencies.

Mr. Moore of the Soldier Settlement Board arrived here yesterday from Skidegate on the Prince Albert. He has been looking into the possibility of a settlement in that neighborhood.

W. H. Hale, charged with having liquor illegally in his possession, was dismissed in police court this morning and his liquor ordered returned.

CALGARY, Oct. 12.—An enormous crowd gathered last night to welcome W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party in Canada. Not only that but it was intensely enthusiastic.

William Duff, M. P., a member of Mackenzie King's party, made a scathing attack on Hon. C. C. Ballantyne. "We are asked to vote money and pass legislation after that legislation has been put into effect," he said, instancing the construction of 63 ships for the Canadian merchant marine by order in council. "Ballantyne's contradiction of Mr. King's statement made in Vancouver to the same effect was not true. I make the statement on my reputation as a member of parliament that what Mackenzie King said was absolutely correct and that Mr. Ballantyne deliberately intended to deceive the public."

Mr. Duff made the further statement that the contracts were not only made before the money was voted but that the whole seventy millions was spent without tenders being invited, although the law expressly states that no contracts for amounts over \$5,000 may be let without tenders being called.

NEWS PENNANT RACE MONDAY

Three Boats, Folly II, Violet III, and Sugu are Now Ready.

Three boats are ready for the News pennant race on Thanksgiving Day and have already been having their trial spins, the Violet F. III and the Folly II were out on Sunday, while the Sugu cavorted around the harbor this morning for a while.

George Frizzell, the owner of the Violet, stated this morning that his boat would be ready next Monday and the Folly is sure. If all goes well, therefore, there will at least be three entries in the race. The only thing that may delay it will be the weather conditions but all looks favorable at the present time.

MARRIED RECENTLY AT PRINCE GEORGE

The marriage took place recently at Prince George of Thomas Hughes of that city to Miss B. L. J. Jones of Liverpool, England. After the wedding Mr. and Mrs. Hughes left for Edmonton for a brief honeymoon trip and are to live at Mud River where Mr. Hughes has a ranch.

NORMAN YARROW VISITING THE CITY

Head of Esquimalt Shipyard Inspects Wreck of Grand Trunk Steamer

Norman A. Yarrow, the superintendent of Yarrows Ltd., who came north to inspect the wreck of the Prince Rupert at Swanson Bay, reached the city this morning by gasoline boat and will return to Victoria on the Prince George Thursday night.

Mr. Yarrow just recently returned from a trip to the Old Country where he visited the father, Sir Alfred Yarrow, on the Clyde. Speaking of affairs in the old land gained from his trip, Mr. Yarrow states that although British shipping tonnage has dropped a point or two from pre-war days Britain still maintains the lead in the world and in a few years will, no doubt, regain her old position.

FINED \$250

H. R. Wismier Pays for Having Liquor and Resisting Police at Prince George.

PRINCE GEORGE, October 12.—Charged with having two bottles of whiskey in his possession in the streets, M. R. Wismier was charged under the prohibition act before Magistrate Daniell and was fined \$200 and costs or in default two months imprisonment. It was admitted by the accused that he had been previously fined for a similar offence. Arising out of this charge Wismier was further charged with obstructing Police Chief Sinclair and resisting arrest. The chief, upon coming across Wismier, who was loaded with a bottle in each hip pocket, had his suspicions aroused by the accused beating a hasty retreat. The chief gave chase, and when overtaking accused he saw him break two bottles, hoping to obliterate the evidence. He was placed under arrest but refused to go to the jail. A struggle ensued, the accused trying to kick over the liquor in the bottoms of the broken bottles collected by the chief after coming upon the scene. This little melee cost Wismier an additional \$50 and costs. Both fines were paid during the day. P. E. Wilson prosecuted and Mr. Oaston defended.

BROUGHT BACK MANY GEESE AND DUCKS FROM PORTLAND INLET

Joe Greer, Alex Meltae and Ollie Rogers returned Sunday night on the Lois M. after a most successful week's hunting trip to Semtime Arm and Winter Harbor at the mouth of Portland Inlet. They all brought back bags of game consisting of ducks and geese and state it was the finest trip they ever had. Weather was most auspicious and there was only one badday, Saturday, all the rest of the time being fine, clear and cold. No deer roam the wilds of that country, so their hunting was confined to ducks and geese which abound in the inlets and lagoons.

THINK SPEECH WAS DECLARATION OF WAR

LONDON, Oct. 12.—Leaders of the Sinn Fein movement say they regard the speech of Premier Lloyd George as tantamount almost to a declaration of war.

CONDITION UNCHANGED.

LONDON, Oct. 12.—The condition of Mayor MacSwiney of Cork, who is on a hunger strike, is unchanged. He has been abstaining from food for 61 days.

PREMIER SAYS MUST ENFORCE ALL THE LAWS

Proposal to Take Over all Police of Province by the Government

VANCOUVER, Oct. 12.—Speaking on his return from the Nelson municipal convention, Premier Oliver said the Government's position in regard to prohibition was that it wanted to be relieved of the irritating position of having to administer an act the enforcement of which lies with the municipal police.

Replying to questions he said that the Legislature would next year consider the Government's taking over of the policing of the province. The municipalities might possibly resent having the policing powers taken from them, but something would have to be done. They could not have two sets of police, but the Prohibition Act would have to be enforced if it was decided to continue it.

Mr. Oliver said he was in favor of having a conference with municipal heads and putting the matter straight up to them.

CLEVELAND WINNER OF THE SERIES

Defeats Brooklyn by 3 to 0 in the Final Game at Cleveland.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 12.—Cleveland won by 3 to 0 against Brooklyn today, thus clinching the world series pennant.

The feature of the game today was when Manager Speaker made a three-bagger in the fourth inning.

There were 26,000 people cheering as the home team won.

Covelskie was pitching for the Indians and Grimes for Brooklyn.

NEW OFFICIALS OF WHALEN CO.

T. W. Garry is New President, but General Manager Not Yet Appointed

VANCOUVER, Oct. 12.—T. W. Garry, former provincial secretary of Ontario, has been elected president of the Whalen Pulp and Paper Co., succeeding Sir George Bury. The other executive directors are I. W. Killam of Montreal; Alexander Smith, M. J. Haney and W. D. Ross, all from the east, and M. R. Higgins of San Francisco. No general manager has yet been appointed.

Majority Rule On Prohibition.

On another page is an interesting letter from our old friend Capt. Hoopes K. Freeman in regard to the prohibition issue. He seems to assume that a section of the community is acting in a high handed manner and trying to force prohibition on the rest of the people in an autocratic manner. This is not correct.

In this country the majority rules. Theoretically that is true, although we sometimes find that it does not work out in practice. Just now one of the laws made by the majority is being questioned and another vote is to be taken to see if the people still are of the opinion that the law shall remain on the statute books. If they vote for it, prohibition will remain and an effort will be made to stop importation into this province. If the people so decide, the prohibition law will be repealed at the next session of the legislature. All depends on the people themselves.

Judging from the people one meets on the street, there is a marked division of opinion. A number of the business men are with prohibition and a number are against it. The labor unions have declared for it, although in the case of the Trades and Labor Council it was carried by a bare majority. Everywhere there is division of opinion. The only way to settle it is to take a vote, and the minority will have to abide by the decision of the majority, because this is a democratic country. No one wants to force on the people a law which the people do not want, but everyone has a right to urge the people to adopt any law which they think would be for the benefit of the people. That is the position in regard to prohibition.

Free Publicity For Both Sides.

We are glad to give publicity to Capt. Freeman's letter, because we want to give both sides a chance to be heard. If anyone else has anything to say on the subject they can do so in the same way as long as the letters conform to the usual rules of debate.

When Ex-president Taft was here a few days ago he emphasized what is the crux of democratic rule, the necessity of the minority bowing to the will of the majority. They have done that in the United States where the whole country has gone dry. They have done the same in a good many of the provinces of Canada. British Columbia if she goes wet will be the only spot west of Quebec and north of Mexico where the sale of liquor is legal.

People Who Will Settle Question.

The men who are going to settle this prohibition question are not the business men or the "respectable" people of the community as Capt. Freeman calls them. They are the fishermen, the miners, the laborers, the shipyard workers, the store clerks, and more important than all others, the women of the country. It is the women who have to suffer from the immoderate use of liquor and it will be the women who will have the say, very largely as to whether or not there shall be prohibition. If they say "no," then we shall allow the government to sell liquor over the counter just the same as the grocer sells tea. It will be open for purchase by everyone and we shall have reverted very largely to the condition which obtained before the prohibition law was passed, except that liquor will not be on sale in bars.

The News is giving a good deal of prominence to this question just now because it is one that most people are talking and thinking about and it is one that should be decided right. There is only another week to decide what shall be done. We ask everyone to study the question for himself and not allow himself to be persuaded or stampeded. This is too important a question to decide on the say so of someone else.

HAS A MARRIED WOMAN ANY COMMERCIAL VALUE?

Has a married woman any commercial value?
 According to the decision of a judge in eastern Canada she has none. A man sued a railroad company for compensation for the death of his wife, who had been killed in a railroad accident, and the verdict was awarded to the defendant company on the ground that a woman has no commercial value. But helpless fathers, who found it hard enough to finance with the help of a wife, may have a different opinion as they struggle alone.

During the mother's life she is uniting in her labors on behalf of her family, and they do not realize how much she does until she has been called away. The father who wishes to keep his children with him must pay a housekeeper's salary, and must pay larger bills due to her lower efficiency. If it was hard to make both ends meet during the mother's lifetime, how is he going to manage when left to care for the family alone.

Raise at Home.
 This question was put recently to a superintendent of dependent and neglected children, who replied that such fathers often appealed to him for help. Many children are now wards of the government solely through the failure of parents to provide for the adequate protection of their children, he said. "It is a calamity for the child to be reared in an institution, no matter how well managed," he said. "It keeps two well informed parents busy solving the difficulties and answering the questions of one small boy or girl, and the soul of the institutional child is often warped because he did not understand and was not understood."

Insurance.
 Hence, if a mother's death means not only sentimental loss, but financial loss great enough to wreck the home, should not the mother as well as the father be insured for the benefit of the family? Few women seem to know that many companies will insure them at the same rate as men, or that for a small extra cost, a policy may be written covering both husband and wife. One wise mother, after the birth of each of her two sons, took out for each a 15-year endowment policy. If she is taken away from her children, there will be money to provide for their care and education. If she is spared, the policies will mature at the end of 15 years, and she will receive the money invested, plus interest. Few women realize that in this way they can protect their families while the children are small, and at the same time, provide a competence for themselves when they reach middle life.

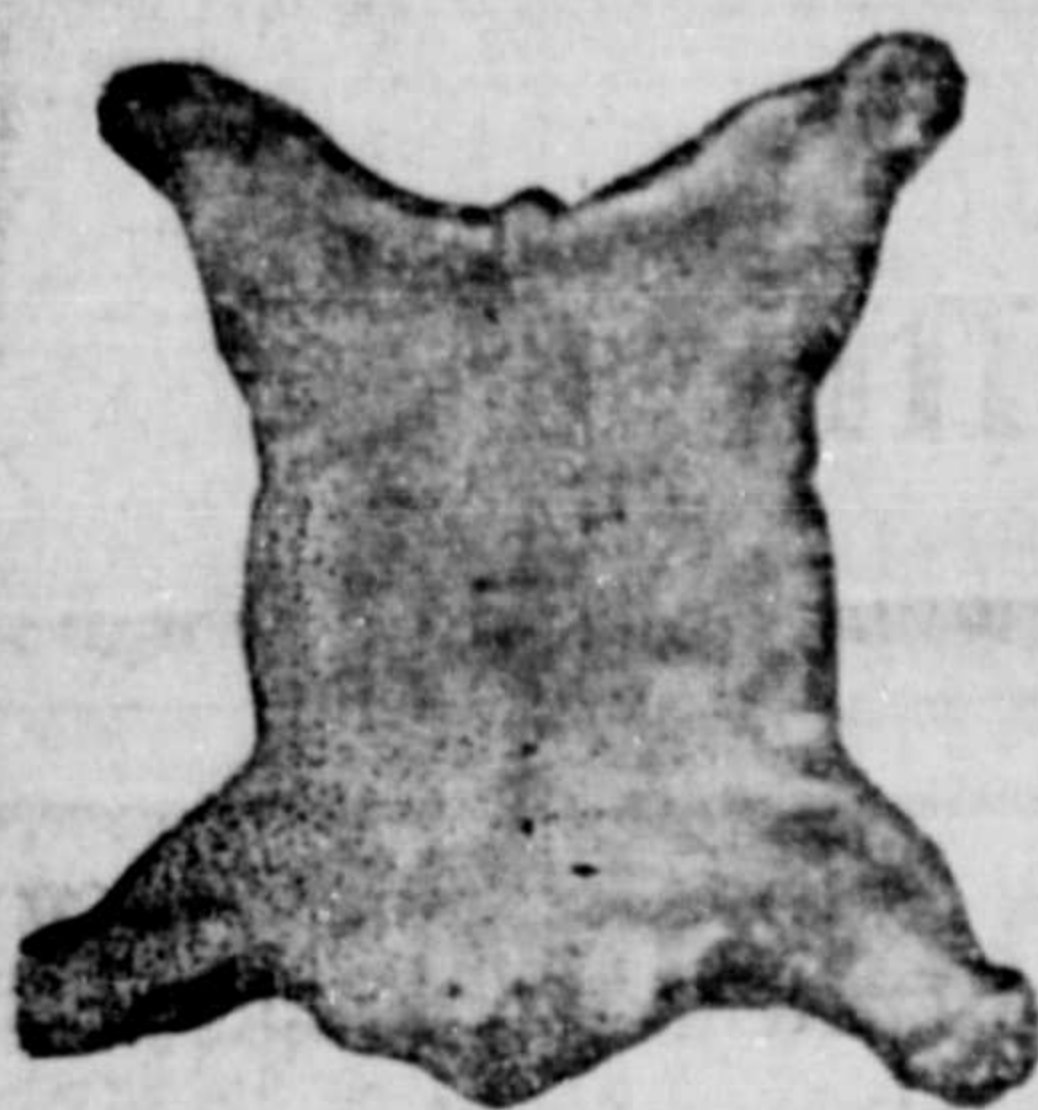

Major Bullock-Webster Tells of Launching Canadian Traveller

In view of the fact that the first of the big ships being built here will take the water soon, L. Bullock-Webster, formerly of this city and now connected with the Harbor Marine yard at Victoria, writes most interestingly to this paper telling of the launching of a similar ship at Victoria. He says:

To the public in general the launching of a big ship is a very wonderful and incomprehensible affair and though at a certain moment the spectator sees the huge mass come to life as it were, and move first slowly and then with ever-increasing speed until it takes the final plunge into the water, the active manner in which human ingenuity contrives this thing is seldom explained or understood.

A few details concerning the "Traveller," which was so successfully accomplished by the Harbor Marine Company, may therefore be of general interest.

She is an 8,100 ton boat, and up to the morning of the launching her huge weight was carried on one central row of steel blocks resting on the rocky bottom of the slipway, supplemented, of course, by shoring on each side.

The launchways had been placed in position and the cradles adjusted, and about four hours before high tide hundreds of black-leaded wedges were driven in by hand on both sides, so as to bring the weight of the ship on to the launchways and relieve the pressure on the keel blocks. Then at a given signal from the naval architect the central blocks were split and knocked out and everything was ready.

2,650 Tons Weight

In the case of the "Canadian Traveller" the actual weight to be moved was approximately 2,650 tons. Careful calculation is needed to be sure that this weight can be safely carried. It is never wise to have more than two and a half tons to a square foot at the surface of the launchways. The Harbor Marine Co. was on the safe side. The weight was distributed over 350 feet of the length by 3 feet width, doubled. That is to say, the 2,650 tons were borne on 2,100 superficial feet, or approximately one and a quarter tons to the foot.

with a slight curve dipping to the water. Instead of a straight slope down, they formed an arc of a circle with a curve of about 24 inches in their entire length. The keel blocks were arranged with a fall of 7-16ths to the foot at the fore end and an inch to the foot at the lower end.

On Solid Rock

This curve is given for various reasons. For one thing it gives better control in holding the ships. It also guards against any danger of made ground or soft ground sinking as the weight of the ship comes over it and thereby causing a dip in the launchways. However, at the Harbor Marine there is no risk of this occurring as the bottom of the slipways are solid rock.

This makes it all the more difficult to hold the ship until the appointed hour for launching. Therefore special arrangements had to be made to enable the ship to be controlled.

The forward bilge blocks were retained in position, using canvas bags of dry sand against the hull of the ship instead of the usual timber. The dog shores were also arranged on an entirely new principle, adopting dry sand to automatically release at the moment the sponsor cut the ribbon of the guillotine. This arrangement is the invention of J. S. Clark (the Naval Architect). He wished to overcome the risk of a repetition of what happened when launching the "Canadian Winner."

It will be remembered that a craft entered the fairway, causing obstruction just as the "Winner" was beginning to move. She could not be released for fear of colliding with the incoming craft. The result was that the dog shores jammed and had eventually to be cut out with axes.

The new invention (which was very simple, as many great inventions have been) consisted in replacing the usual solid chock—which is bolted to the standing or ground ways to hold the dog shores in position—by a heavy steel box about 4 feet in length and 8 inches square, internal dimensions, heavily secured to the ground ways.

Box of Sand

Into the box was fitted a sliding chock of iron-bark (a hard wood from the Philippines) with a housing of about 24 inches. The rest of the box being filled with fine dry sand heavily compressed before the dog shore was fitted in position. In the bottom of the box at the rear end is a good sized hole blocked with a chock supported by a shore which can be easily knocked away. At the right psychological moment the sand is allowed to run out through the hole, relieving the pressure on the chock, as the sponsor cuts the ribbon with her dainty scissors the guillotine falls and cuts a cord which releases a 28 lb. weight, which falls on the end of the dog shore, knocking it down, and the ship slips gracefully down to the water.

All So Simple

Any sand bags that are holding too securely are lanced with a knife. The big ship is pulled up by cables cunningly arranged beforehand, which exert a gradual pulling influence in various directions.

It all looks so simple when you see a ship such as the "Canadian Traveller" slide off with perfect precision at exactly the right moment and without a hitch of any kind. One is apt to forget the vast experience needed to make and superintend the necessary preliminary arrangements.

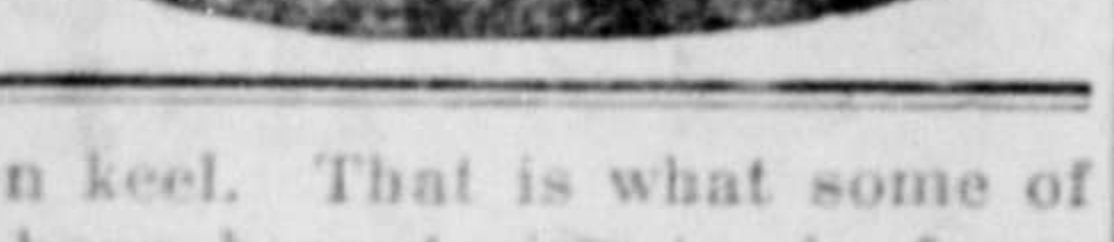

AGAINST PROHIBITION.

Editor Daily News,— I have read with interest your story of Dr. Grant's lecture and also your editorial on Resources advocacy of government control. I have done my best to point out the trend of our prohibition laws, back of which you claim are the most respectable business men of the community.

As Marc Anthony says: "They are all honorable men." Before the fall of Phoenicia, I have no doubt the same cry went up. Nero as the leader of the respectable group burned Rome. The French Revolution, Garibaldi in Italy, Britain's Magna Charta, and Russian revolution were all forced by the respectable people of their times. Here in Canada, the respectable people fought for the old "family compact."

The prohibitionist seems to fail to take into account human nature. Every tribe in the world has manufactured some alcoholic drink since before time began. All efforts so far have failed to do anything except make it more desirable.

The prohibitionist who desires to rob me by force of law of the rights God has given all men, is talking treason.

Dr. Grant has the right to drink or not drink. He has no right to say that anyone shall drink or not drink. I have the right to attend church or stay away as I choose, but I have no right to force anyone else to attend or not.

Both Dr. Grant and myself have the right, if we feel so inclined, to express our views and even to try to influence by reason to do as we do, but we neither have the right to force anyone to do as we wish. The community has the same right, but the community has no more right to force un-

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE POSITION OF ASSISTANT FOREST RANGER.

Object. These examinations are for the purpose of filling present vacancies and to enable candidates to qualify for future vacancies and increases in staff.

Assistant Forest Rangers. Assistant Forest Rangers are employed during the fire season (May to September inclusive) of each year and this period is extended where possible by working on improvements such as trails, etc. Re-appointment is made each year as long as satisfactory service is given. Promotion to the permanent staff is made by merit and examination as occasion offers. The salary is \$115.00 per month the first year and \$120.00 per month the next year. Travelling expenses are also paid.

Qualifications for Candidates. Candidates must be British subjects resident in British Columbia for at least one year, of good character, good physical condition and with woods experience. They should have experience in fire fighting, possess the ability to organize work and handle men; and have knowledge of the Forest Act.

The examinations are partly written, partly oral and are designed to test the candidates' ability along the above lines. All statements made by applicants as to experience, education and fitness are subject to verification by the examining board. Preference is given to returned soldiers with the necessary qualifications.

THE EXAMINATIONS. The examinations will be held at the places and on the dates named below. Each intending candidate should apply to the District Forester of his district for application forms and for information regarding the hour of the examination and the building in which it will be held. Application forms should be filled out and mailed back to the District Forester in time to reach him before the date of the examination.

Dates. Hazelton Friday, November 5th. Prince Rupert Monday, November 8th. Apply to the District Forester at Prince Rupert, B. C.
