# ARRUTHERS ASHORE ON WHITE SAND ISLAND

## INDICATE REPRESENTING BRITISH GOVERNMENT AFTER GROUND HOG COAL

### negotiations with British Admiralty in Regard to Purchase of Ground Hog Coal

Proposal to Establish Enormous Bunkers near mouth of Nass River for Distribution of Coal to different points

### 100 Square Miles of Lands Involved in Deal

Smokeless Steam Coal Deposit in World may be opened up if Syndicate goes through with proposed plans.

VANCOUVER, October 13.—R. C. Campbell-Johnston, who is the Groundhog district, announces that negotiations are between a syndicate representing the British Admiralty and the owners of the Groundhog coal properties, for the purchase of square miles of coal lands. This area forms the largest steam coal deposit in the world.

Campbell-Johnston says the syndicate have plans showing coal bunkers on Portland Inlet near the mouth of the river with distributing bunkers at every port on the Pacific proposal is that the syndicate shall use its own coaling to supply the stations.

Campbell-Johnston is a mining engineer with a good record.

### JAMES PARKER PASSED AWAY

Father of S. E. Parker Died This Morning After Illness of Some Weeks.

After an illness of some weeks, James Parker passed away this morning at 4 o'clock at his residence on Second Avenue. The late Mr. Parker had been sailing for some time past and the end did not come unexpectedly.

Mr. Parker was born at Stirling, Ontario, on March 7, 1844, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Parker of Ay, Scotland. At the age of 24 he entered the drug business and continued in that work until 1914, during which time he was located at Stirling and Peterborough, Ontario, and Winnipeg, Manitoba, opening one of the first drug stores in that city. He was married in 1876 and three children survive him, Stanley E., and Edith, of this city, and Robert, of Texas, all of whom were born in Winnipeg and Selkirk. His wife predeceased him in 1889 and in 1892 Mr. Parker went to Chicago where he met with an accident which resulted in permanent lameness.

Mr. Parker came here from New Mexico in July, 1914, and was engaged in the transfer business with his son until last month when his illness confined him to his home. During his six years' residence here Mr. Parker became widely known and highly respected and his demise will come as a shock to many friends and acquaintances.

Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

Five Masked Men Got Away With Loot—Shot Man Giving Alarm.

WINNIPEG, October 13.—Five masked men blew a safe at the Union Bank, Winkler, Man., at three o'clock this morning and escaped with \$19,000.

W. E. Grefer, in attempting to give the alarm, with the town bell, was shot in the leg. The telephone, telegraph and electric light wires were all cut before the robbery.

### CHINESE COUP IS REPORTED

Rumor in Shanghai That Monarchy Has Been Restored at Pekin.

SHANGHAI, Oct. 13.—General Chang Tso Linz, governor of Feng Tien, has overthrown the Pekin Government and proclaimed a monarchy, according to current rumor.

The supposition is that the reported coup is an effort to restore the throne of the former emperor Hsuan Tung, son of Prince Chuan. The story is doubted.

Most of Property Reverted to the Government and Only \$17 Over Delinquent Taxes Realized.

Yesterday's provincial tax sale was a slow affair and there was only \$17 realized above the amount of the delinquent taxes by the auction. There were only a handful of bidders and the sale was over by noon. The only property bringing in any margin over the taxes were parcels bought by M. M. Stephens and A. W. Cameron.

### Crew of Trawler Carruthers Rescued

Vessel ran ashore at White Sand Island when on way to Halibut Fishing Banks; Surveyor picks up men

J. W. Nicholls, controller of the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., received a wireless message shortly before noon from the S. S. S. Surveyor saying that she had picked up the crew of the steam trawler James Carruthers and that the boat was ashore on White Sand Island. That is about thirty to forty miles from here. Four members of the crew are reported missing.

Immediately the trawler G. E. Foster and the fishing boat W. R. Lord were sent to the scene, W. Bell, port engineer, being in charge of the rescue operations.

The Carruthers left port last night at eight o'clock for the halibut fishing banks. She was in charge of Capt. Parsons and carried a crew of 30 men all told.

If any information in regard to the missing men is received during the afternoon after the paper goes to press it will be bulletined in the window of the Daily News.

### CARPENTIER KNOCKS OUT LEVINSKY

Clever Frenchman Badly Punished American Fighter Last Night

JERSEY CITY, October 13.—Georges Carpentier knocked out Levinsky, the American heavyweight, in the fourth round of a scheduled twelve-round bout. Both fighters were in splendid condition.

From the middle of the first round the outcome was apparent. The Frenchman's blows were well delivered and effective. Levinsky's plucky replies were too light to do much damage.

Twice during the second round Georges sent Levinsky to the ground. In the third round he slowed up somewhat, but in the fourth he battered Levinsky into a neutral corner.

At the close Levinsky showed marks of being badly punished, but Carpentier was not marked when he left the ring.

Can Any Man  
Ever Be Fair?

Is it within the scope of the mind of man to be absolutely fair? Some people think it is quite easy, but it is not. In the newspaper profession this is realized more than in any other, for editors and reporters are continually being brought face to face with the problem. Usually reporters wish to be fair. Editors too, in spite of what is said about them, usually have the same idea in mind. The difficulty is to know what fairness is. There are so many propagandists in the world who see only one side of a question that, if you are not absolutely with them, you are bound to be against them.

Take politics as an example. There are papers who try to avoid taking sides, but they can't. They may do so between elections, but the moment there is a contest on, people become excited and see sinister meanings and sinister motives in everything. The same is true in the time of labor disputes.

There are some people who think it unfair if the paper takes sides. They would like a newspaper to be a mugwump. On the whole, however, the newspaper that goes out after something definite is likely to get less abuse than the one that tries to straddle the fence.

This is just mentioned to illustrate the difficulty of being fair or rather of being considered fair. We all have different viewpoints. We see things from different angles and sometimes this is caused by prejudice and sometimes through the possession of inside information. The great thing in life is to be tolerant of the other man's viewpoint.

As a rule men are more tolerant than women. They knock about the country more and meet more people. They learn to realize that there are almost as many different viewpoints as there are people and they respect them.

Interest Charges  
Continue to Rise.

In spite of the urgings of Socialists that capital is unrighteous and that interest charges are an abomination, the rates of interest continue to go up. In other words capital becomes more valuable. In discussing this matter of the rise in rates of interest the Royal Bank monthly business letter says:

"A natural corollary to the industrial activity and rise in prices of the last six years has been the rise in interest rates. Prosperity at any time stimulates the demand for loanable funds and the rate that borrowers are willing and able to pay for them; in this case the need of the Governments of belligerent countries for capital to finance the war acted as a further influence towards raising the price of money which, in the final analysis, is determined by demand and supply as are the prices of ordinary commodities. The great supply of, and broad market for capital, make interest rates less open to sudden changes or sharp increases. In approximate terms, Government and Municipal flotations which, shortly before the war, were sold to yield 4 per cent, now have to bring at least 6 per cent if they wish to command ready sale. Bonds of highly considered companies yield 6½ per cent instead of 4½ per cent, while the average bond yields probably 7 per cent, instead of 5 per cent. Standard preferred stocks give a return of 8 per cent in place of an average of 6 per cent before the war, when it was usual to see 7 per cent preferred stock selling at a premium. Interest rates on securities have therefore risen thirty to fifty per cent in this period, as compared to an average rise in the price of commodities of well over 100 per cent. Interest rates on bank loans in foreign countries have risen in much the same proportion as those on securities. In Canada, rates have remained almost stationary and the charges made by Canadian banks for accommodation are now less than those in force in any of the commercial centres of the United States or Europe."



**IN THE LETTER BOX**

**PERSONAL LIBERTY**

Editor Daily News—Your editorial of yesterday shows me that I did not get my idea to you and therefore to your readers. Put it this way:

Our forefathers fought for ideals of personal liberty, which Dr. Grant and prohibitionists now deny. Just as an illustration, our early closing bylaw is a piece of democratic tyranny. I have the right to run a store 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The community has no right to interfere with my business unless I injure or threaten to injure someone else. The community has the right to say that I shall not overwork my help, which brings us to the eight hour law.

We have taken the tyrannical method and issue licenses based not on service, but on when my store shall close. This is not right. The community has the power, but might is not right.

The prohibitionists have reached the stage of intolerance preceding witch burning or its modern equivalent. I have seen the operation of some of the vigilance committees in the west. These committees were true democracy, with high ideals of life, liberty, and property at the start.

Soon the average member became apathetic. A "ring" secured control and tyranny began. The result was prohibition gone crazy.

Our democracy has nearly reached the same stage.

We are none of us so good we can honestly interfere with the private life of our lowest citizen except for the protection of someone else, and those who try for any other reason place themselves still lower. The prohibitionist is a traitor.



## TAXATION HERE NOT EXCESSIVE

Edmonton, Toronto and Victoria  
Pay Larger per Capita Tax  
Than Prince Rupert.

According to authentic figures published recently by the Citizens' Research Institute of Canada and figures obtained at the office of the city treasurer of this city it will be seen that Prince Rupert's per capita taxation compares very favorably with other larger and older cities in Canada. The total taxation levied by the municipality here in 1919, including general taxation and local improvement levy, was \$300,706, which, divided among a population of 8,000, makes the total per capita rate \$37.59.

In computing per capita taxation the local improvement taxes are not always taken into account but just the general tax. In that case the rate here would be \$29.90 for the total general taxation is \$239,216.





## PRICE OF FURS ON THIS COAST

C. H. French, Manager of Hud-  
son's Bay Company Dis-  
cusses Matter at Victoria

VICTORIA, Oct. 13—Conditions  
at present existing in the fur  
trade are notable for the absence  
of buyers, according to C. H.  
French, manager of the Hudson's  
Bay Company here and a specialist  
in the fur trade. In an interview  
Mr. French explained that, while  
prices of raw furs were still  
far above pre-war figures, the  
values attached to all grades of  
fur a year ago have completely  
collapsed and the market is now  
awaiting the resumption of buying  
by the general public before  
any considerable sales of raw furs  
can take place.

### Misleading Prices

Speaking of the results accu-  
ming at a fur sale held in Seattle  
on October 5, Mr. French said:  
"Without explanations these re-  
sults may cause trappers and  
storekeepers considerable loss.  
The prices quoted as being ob-  
tained by Messrs. Hibbard and  
Swenson were: Red fox, \$20;  
white fox, \$20; ermine, \$1.50;  
cross fox, \$35, and sable, \$80.  
Although these figures were quite  
correct, they are entirely mis-  
leading, as the goods sold were  
of Russian origin, their value  
being quite different to the values  
of British Columbia furs.

### Varying Fox Skins

"A few examples illustrate this  
point," said Mr. French. Red fox  
of central British Columbia origin  
are of a flat nature and light  
color, their value today being not  
more than \$12 for good average  
skins. Skins of Cassiar and  
Atlin origin carry much heavier  
fur of finer texture and are worth  
about \$1 for average quality.

"The furs from the Bristol Bay  
country are larger than those  
mentioned, but this is offset by  
having grey rumps. For dyeing  
purposes this class of fox is most  
suitable, provided the fur is  
heavy and of fine texture. As to  
the foxes originating from islands  
of the Pacific Ocean, these are  
large and very coarse and not  
worth more than half as much  
as inland skins."

### Best Foxes Known

As a comparison, Mr. French  
said: "The Kapuschaika foxes sold  
by Hibbard and Swenson, al-  
though perhaps a trifle small in  
size, are perhaps the finest pro-  
duced in any part of the world,  
carrying a deep rich red color,  
with a great wealth of rich silky  
fur. Therefore, while the quota-  
tion of \$20 for the Hibbard and  
Swenson skins was correct, it  
does not mean that British Col-  
umbia skins are worth this, but  
rather that the very most our  
dealers can expect to realize is  
\$15. I may add that, out of  
perhaps 5,000 skins offered at  
that sale, only about 500 were  
sold, showing that the trade is not  
able to absorb all offered, and  
therefore it is only reasonable to  
look for a further decline."

### Vagaries of Furs

Speaking of the market for  
marten, a line of much interest to  
British Columbia fur dealers, Mr.  
French said that these skins had  
had a pre-war value of about \$85 for  
average quality and retained this  
price through the two low priced  
years which followed. Last year  
they rose in value until they  
touched \$100 apiece and are now  
worth about \$15 or \$20 each.  
"We often see these quoted at so  
much per skin, without any men-  
tion of the location whence they  
came," said Mr. French. "Almost  
every hundred miles of our vast  
country produces a different class  
of fur and there are distinct  
values placed by buyers on this  
fact, ranging in the following  
order: Cassiar and Atlin, Upper  
Yukon, Lower Yukon, Central  
British Columbia, Cascade, Coast  
and Island. Each of these con-  
tains subdivisions that are made  
when close values are necessary,  
and, in addition, each section  
carries different values depend-  
ing on the color."

Mr. French cited in point  
Cassiar marten, a lot from this  
district carrying good color might  
sell for an average of \$80 each,  
while skins from the same sec-  
tion, but carrying less color would  
be sold for about \$15 apiece.
