# Country Inflamed Over Sugar Prices

## GOVERNMENT TO CARRY OUT WILL OF PEOPLE ON PROHIBITION QUESTION

### Rumpus Over Sugar Order caused Dominion Government To Back Down on Decision

will be Heard by Cabinet on October 20; Premier Postponed Western Tour owing to Importance of Matter

### Mackenzie King Launches Terrific Attack at Vernon

Publication of Names of Owners of Sugar Refineries; Manufacturers Give Their Side of Question

OTTAWA, Oct. 15.—The Governor General in Council hear the sugar case on October 20. Owing to the nature of the matter the Premier has postponed his tour one week. The Government's decision was made after a special meeting of the council held to consider the report.

On, C. J. Doherty set out the view that the regulation by the commerce board was very probably illegal and whether illegal or not was of a character never tested by the legislation establishing the board. It was shown that the order seemed designed to effect a purpose wholly outside the board's authority. On these grounds the Government declared the order was inoper-

**MACKENZIE KING ATTACKS ADMINISTRATION.**  
Vernon, Oct. 15.—Charging the Meighen Government being the tool of the big interests, one of which sugar order was designed to placate, W. L. Mackenzie, leader of the Liberal party, launched a terrific attack on the administration at a meeting here. He said: "In the public interest there should be an immediate disclosure of the persons who at the present time are within recent years have acted as members of the boards of directors of the sugar refining companies in Canada, the St. Lawrence refinery at Montreal in particular. They should disclose by whom and in what stocks in these companies are held. I challenge the Government to see that these facts are immediately given to the Canadian public."

Vancouver, Oct. 15.—Mayor Gale of Vancouver, the Great War Veterans, the Vancouver Liberal Association, and other bodies have sent telegrams of protest to the Government against the orders.

**REFINERS' SIDE OF QUESTION.**  
Montreal, Oct. 15.—Huntley Drummond, president of the Canada Sugar Refining Co., gives the case for the refiners saying, as a result of continuous Government control, the refineries have been left with commitments amounting \$60,000,000 which they were forced into. If they were forced to sell at the same ruinous prices as in the States the whole industry would be destroyed. He pointed out that Canadians, owing to Government control, had been able in the past to buy sugar cheaper than the price paid in the United States.



Curious Attempt  
To Keep up Prices.

The attempt of the Board of Commerce to keep up prices abnormally is doomed to fail. The same board failed to keep down prices. It does not seem long ago that the price was kept down to about fifteen cents, but the pressure from the refiners became too strong and the cost of this necessary of life soared. Now that it is well up, the board would keep it there.

The people of Canada will never stand for an attempt by the big interests to hold them up. They are often fooled and will be fooled again but this is too big a steal for them to get away with.

Serious Charge  
By Canon Scott.

Canon Scott makes a serious charge against the Dominion Government in regard to the Ross Rifle. If what he says is true, the Government should not remain in power another day. At the very least a Royal Commission should be appointed to thoroughly investigate and if anybody is guilty they should be punished.

When a man of the standing of Canon Scott makes a public declaration such as that of yesterday, the government should take quick action. If they fail to do so they will be accused, and rightly so, of trying to evade the consequences of their acts by keeping quiet.

Baneful Effect of  
Freight Rates.

The News was not speaking without the book when it prophesied the baneful effect of the new freight rates on the business of this district. Yesterday we told of the closing within a few days of the last of the operating mills on the Queen Charlotte Islands. By spring the owners expect the Government or the Railway Board will have seen the error of its ways and made a change sufficient to allow them to continue operation, or arrangements will be made for shipping lumber by steamer.

It is to be hoped that the Railway Commission, after seeing the effect the jump in freight rates has had on business, will stay its hand and not put into effect another check to business.

Can a Golf Course  
Be Constructed?

Is it possible to construct a golf course near Prince Rupert? Most people think not, but one visitor at least is of opinion that it might be done. Undoubtedly if it could it would be a great boon to many people and would be an attraction that would keep many visitors in the city during the good weather.

A fine course could be made in Section 9, but possibly by the time it was in good condition, that part of the city would be put on the market and the course broken up. A lot of draining would be needed and it would cost a good deal to keep the links in condition, but as the enthusiast points out, it could be done if the people really want it.

New Hotel at  
Lakelse Soon.

Yesterday H. S. Johnston of Winnipeg was in the city and he told the Daily News of his plans to erect a new hotel at Lakelse. This will be a great thing for the district. It will probably commence with about fifty rooms, but can be increased from time to time. The lake should be one of the big resorts of the province that will bring tourists this way and with a big tourist hotel at Prince Rupert and a few attractions here we should be in a position to keep visitors for at least a few days instead of allowing them to pass on.

VETERANS PASS  
RESOLUTIONS

Urge Elimination of Orientals  
from Industries and Change  
in Fishing Regulations

VICTORIA, Oct. 14.—The Army and Navy Veterans unanimously passed a resolution urging the appointment of an advisory board in the province to gradually eliminate Orientals from industries. Another resolution was that similar loans be made to veterans in the fishing industry as to those going on land, and the elimination of drag seines, traps and purse seines in all waters between Vancouver Island and the mainland.

GREEK ELECTIONS

Voting to Take Place Between  
Sunrise and Sunset on Sunday,  
November 7.

ATHENS, Oct. 14.—The Greek elections are to take place on Sunday, November 7; the polls being open from sunrise to sunset.

Rev. Dr. Grant Addresses Meeting and Explains Doubtful Points.

Grant returned last night from Terrace after addressing a meeting in the interests of prohibition in Progress Hall. He says that in spite of the bad night there was a good turnout and much interest was taken in the issue. Rev. Mr. Young presided.

Dr. Grant explained for the benefit of the women voters how the ballot should be marked and urged that government sale would denounce the Government and would amount to no control at all. If the prohibition law was not supported there would be no chance of stopping importation.

Dr. Grant said that he was able to clear up a number of doubtful points for his hearers and he was assured that in at least one case a man who formerly voted against prohibition had said he would support it this time after reading the prohibition literature.



## DISCUSSION WAS HEATED

**D. C. McRAE Replies Emphatically to Alleged Statements of Ald. Perry Over Hospital Affairs.**

A committee comprising President D. G. Stewart, Secretary George E. Gibson and Alderman William Wilson-Murray was appointed last night at the meeting of the hospital board to investigate the differences between Directors J. B. Roerig and D. C. McRae on one side and Alderman C. G. Perry on the other, over hospital financial matters that resulted last evening in an open break and a burst of eloquence from Mr. McRae.

The matter was brought up by a letter being read from Messrs. Roerig and McRae demanding that the Hospital Board investigate alleged "slanderous statements" by Alderman Perry made at council meetings on September 13 and 20. These statements it was stated reflected both upon the personal characters of Mr. McRae and Mr. Roerig and on the hospital board. Directors Collison, Murray, Mrs. McLeod and Mrs. Parsons were all against the bringing of the hospital board into what was termed by Mr. Collison "a little squabble in the finance committee."

#### Perry Explains.

Mr. Perry then explained his position and apologized for anything he might have said distasteful or injurious although the facts still remained. They still had the appearance of being interested and he cited incidents that had been told him in the presence of others by the late secretary, Mr. Denholme. Mr. McRae had objected to a rubber stamp being ordered from Vancouver when McRae Bros. sold them and Mr. Roerig had objected to an order of meat from the Northern Interior store with the result that the orders had been discontinued. If they could show otherwise he would gladly apologize and would not have the matter carried on.

Mr. Roerig stated that it would be difficult to disprove he had made the complaint alleged for there was only his word for it, but he would admit that a man had been sent out to look over the books of the hospital with a view to improvement. This man had, however, failed to report and no new system had been installed.

#### Vilest Slander.

"I am surprised at the presumption of Mr. Perry in addressing this meeting after he admits he did not know about hospital affairs and still has made the vilest slander against us," said Mr. McRae. "If he is a man of honor he will either prove his statements or withdraw them. He then proceeded to read the statements that Mr. Perry is alleged to have made at the council meeting and Mr. Perry immediately denied making any such statements. "If what Mr. Perry says is true Mr. Roerig and I should be in jail and if it is not true he should be. Mr. Perry, I am not afraid of any exposures you can make and my honor is worth more to me than a position on the Hospital Board. It is my opinion, however, that Mr. Perry has meant nothing personal but has simply gone off half cocked."

The discussion was brought to a close when President Stewart called for Mrs. McLeod's resolution asking for a committee of investigation, which was seconded by Mr. McRae.

## LLOYD GEORGE AND TYRANNY

Letter to Candidate at Ilford Gives Interesting Light on British Events

A letter recently written to a Unionist candidate at Ilford by Premier David Lloyd George gives an interesting side light on the conditions in Great Britain and the way in which these conditions are viewed by the greatest statesman of the day. The letter follows:

"Dear Mr. Wise—I rejoice to hear of your resolute fight at Ilford for the supremacy of Constitutional Government. The British democracy has nothing to gain and everything to lose by abandonment of constitutional methods by means of which, during the last twenty years, it has been freed from the material hardships and anxieties entailed by long hours, low wages, old age, ill-health and unemployment; has gained other numerous advantages and now controls the powerful lever of a very wide franchise whereby it can give effective expression to its aspirations in a land which there is no freer under the sun.

### Lost in Night

"In no country does Labor enjoy conditions comparable to those that obtain in this country. If the extremists in the Labor party were to get their way the solid attainments of a generation would be lost in a night. My unfaltering faith in the good sense and judgment of the British nation, however, gives me confidence that counsels of prudence and wisdom will prevail. Soviet Government in Russia has reduced that country to conditions that remind one of the Dark Ages. Property is confiscated and Labor is enslaved. The lot of workers is worse than ever before. Their houses are haunted by hunger and such freedom as they enjoyed under the old despotism is completely taken away by the new tyranny.

"This country must withstand all those forces which menace its existence. The electors of Ilford cannot afford to throw away their votes on side issues of more or less moment, but should concentrate on a great and overwhelming attack on forces of unreason and disorder by voting for the Government candidate and returning you as their member."

### Moderates Stampeded

Mr. Bonar Law has also written wishing Mr. Wise success. He says that for the moment even the moderate leaders of the Labor party have been stampeded by the extreme section and by the Council of Action, and in other ways are making a claim that control of the policy of the country should be in the hands of a section and not directed by the chosen representatives of the whole nation.

No issue could be more direct or more vital than this, and he feels confident that the electors by returning Mr. Wise at the head of the poll will show clearly what their view on this controversy is.



## Triple Island Light and Fog Alarm Nearing Finish

Fog Alarm is one of largest on Coast and light will be visible for 25 mile radius

Work is rapidly nearing completion on the Triple Island fog alarm and light station and Contractor J. H. Hilditch is now finished with all the outside work. What yet remains is the interior and the Marine Department at Digby Island expects that the whole plant will be in operation by the end of December. J. H. Nicholson, the fog alarm and light engineer, is now on the ground superintending the installation of the apparatus.

The fog alarm is a most complete and modern one and is the same size as the one at Langara which is the largest one in operation on the coast. It is operated by three gasoline engine units of 15 horse power each.

These drive a compressor and the compressed air is forced into a tank and transmitted to the diaphone which makes the sound signal. The interval and length of sound is regulated by a timing device.

The light device will be similar to those now in operation at Cape St. James at the south of the Queen Charlotte Islands. A special grade of coal oil will be used in it and will be forced in a vaporized state to the mantle. The intensity of the light will be increased by a round lens. The flashing characteristics have not yet been decided upon and neither has the fog alarm. These will be announced later in the official notices to mariners.
