Rev. Dr. Grant in an address to a large congregation Sunday

ONTARIO JAILS CLOSE RESULT OF PROHIBITION THERE

TORONTO, Oct. 19.—As a
result of prohibition in the
province of Ontario, three of
the seven provincial jails have
been closed and the prison
population reduced from 1970 to about 1,000,
according to Brigadier W. H.
Fraser of the Salvation Army
in an interview.

"Before prohibition we had
a soup kitchen, but we don't
have to keep one going now,"
said Brigadier Fraser. "Be-
fore prohibition I used to
have sixty or seventy persons
lined up at my office door
seeking relief. There is none
of that now."

PRISONERS AT KINGSTON STRIKE

Refuse to Work when Tobacco
Supply was Cut Off by
Officials

KINGSTON, Oct. 19.—Between
100 and 200 prisoners in the
Kingston penitentiary are on
strike, refusing to work since the
smuggling of tobacco has been
stopped. The prisoners kept up
a continual uproar, shouting for
tobacco and hammering on the
doors and calling for tobacco.

part.

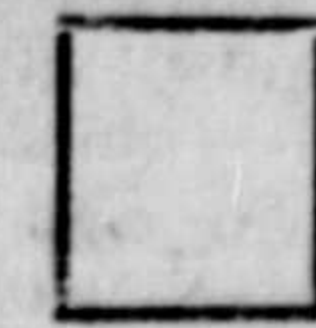
THE BALLOT PAPER.

Strike of Miners Ties Up Industry

Iron and Steel and Cotton Badly Hit;
Small Disburbance in South Wales
is Reported

LONDON, October 19.—The coal
mining industry is almost com-
pletely paralyzed by the strike.
At Ton-y-pandy, South Wales, at
midnight the young miners col-
lected and started to sing The Red
Flag, etc. The police interfered
and stone throwing ensued and
windows were smashed.

The eyes of all Britain are cen-
tered on the first session of par-
liament after the winter recess
at which the strike will be dis-
cussed.

All rumors of intervention by
other unions in the strike have
ceased for the present. The gov-

ernment has received large num-
bers of offers of volunteer help
but the necessity for the enroll-
ment of volunteers has not yet
been reached.

The strike is hitting the iron
and steel as well as the cotton in-
dustries severely. The blast fur-
naces at Middleborough are al-
ready beginning to dampen down.
Liverpool and Manchester an-
nounce impending suspension of
the tramway service. Frank
Hodges, representing the miners,
publishes minute figures showing
that the wages of the miners are
not commensurate with the cost
of living.

The following resolu-
tion was passed by the

We, as members of the
Vancouver Graduate Nur-

state: While it is difficult
to give exact statistics in
regard to the decrease of

the home is beyond estima-
tion. We therefore heart-
ily endorse the contin-
uance of the Prohibition
Act.

How to Overcome Chief Stumbling Block.

Some people say they will vote for government sale of liquor because prohibition has been a failure. There is an enormous amount of drinking going on and the Prohibition Act is powerless to stop it.

The only way to stop the present abuses is, not to allow more liquor to be sold by the government but to stop importation and that can be done only by voting for prohibition and then asking the Dominion Government to stop importation. The Dominion Government has promised to stop importation if we vote dry and then ask in the proper way. The process is simple. Vote for prohibition now and carry it. Then the Legislature will formally petition the Dominion which will put another plebiscite in regard to importation.

Sir Charles Tupper On Women.

At a meeting at Vancouver Dr. Ernest Hall recently emphasized the relationship between liquor and the social evil, saying they were inseparable and that women who voted for the retention of liquor allied themselves under the banner of the social evil. He characterized Sir Hibbert Tupper's statement that wine and women were both intended for man's comforts, as an insult to womanhood that should arouse every woman against the moderation platform. What do the women of Prince Rupert think of this?

It Means Suicide, Hands Off!

What about Saskatchewan? Hon. Walter Scott claims government control and sale is all right, but Attorney-General Turgon of Saskatchewan says "Our Government was in the liquor business once, but never again." Hon. George Langley of the same province says: "It means suicide. Hands off!"

WHO WILL RUN FOR PARLIAMENT?

Liquor in politics has never been a good thing. Somehow or other to submit the members of parliament to temptation does not seem to increase either their freedom or their will power, despite the Bishop of Durham. The good men don't care about handling liquor for the sake of the Vested Interests and the other type are not worth considering.

If the Moderation League policy carries every M.P. is in the liquor business in order to have liquor sold and also that the government may secure revenue. Who will run for Parliament in order that he may become an exalted bar-tender? Who will desire to represent the people when he must bow to the brewer and distiller?

The condemnation of Government Sale and Control is that where it has been tried such governments either have given it up or are now seeking to do so.

HAS PROHIBITION BEEN A SUCCESS?

1. The abolition of the saloon and consequent death of the practice of treating reduced drunkenness and improved the homes of many by increasing their savings and money for necessities.

2. The prevention of the individual from obtaining good alcoholic beverages in small quantities in an ordinary law-abiding manner has created a host of law-breakers, and a huge market for the boot-legger, the blind-pigger and sale of foul adulterated liquors.

The endeavor to suppress the latter evils in the U. S. A. has cost (as stated by Dr. Grant) the Government of that country \$14,000,000.

The first, that is the abolition of the saloon, is an integral part of the policy of government control to the exclusion of the second.

The second, that is, the prevention of the individual from obtaining alcoholic beverages in a lawful manner is the essential part of the prohibition program. Does it not seem wise to keep the good part and eliminate the cause of the bad, by the open control of sale, instead of keeping a large police force to hunt the illicit vendors.

We think we hear your exclamation. You want to forget the war and all its aftermath. We are with you in your desire to forget—but we must not, in forgetfulness, bury the solemn obligations undertaken in the days of sacrifice.

Canadians have bounden duties to those who must bear a burden until the "graves are opened and the sea gives up its dead"—who must forever carry the memory of sons and husbands and fathers who went down to the sea in ships and never returned.

As many of these dependents are young children, the endowment must continue for a number of years, until the children become self-supporting.

FRIZZELL WON NEWS PENNANT

Made Record Speed Yesterday
With His New Boat
Violet III.

TOMMY HOOPER DID 4 MILES IN 11 MINS.

Japanese Boat S. & T. Had Engine
Trouble After Making
Good Start.

George Frizzell's speed boat Violet III won the race yesterday afternoon, covering the twelve-mile course in 27 minutes, 10 seconds. Tommy Hooper's Folly II was so far behind that she did not finish at the post, but the official time would have been about 33 minutes, or the same time made by Wayward Girl when she raced at the time of the Fall Fair. Folly made the first two laps in 11 minutes each exactly. That means she was travelling at the same rate as the Wayward Girl.

Promptly at two o'clock, the buoy boats having been anchored in mid harbor about two miles apart, Capt. Freeman's Narbe-thong took her place at the starting point and two of the racers were there within a minute or two. The Japanese boat was delayed owing to the pump not working well and this disability kept the S. & T. from taking much part in the race. She led off on the first half mile but soon it was seen that her engine was giving trouble and she dropped out altogether after covering about two miles.

Frizzell's Violet III forged ahead before reaching the first buoy and kept the lead all the time, gradually outdistancing the Folly II. Her first lap was covered in 9 minutes, 15 seconds, the second in 8 minutes, 45 seconds and the third in 9 minutes, 10 seconds, a splendid record. The engine worked well, never missing once. Kenny Reed was in charge of the Violet with Howard Frizzell aiding. Tommy Hooper ran his own boat.

A large crowd turned out to witness the race, the day being a perfect one with the water calm and the sun shining.

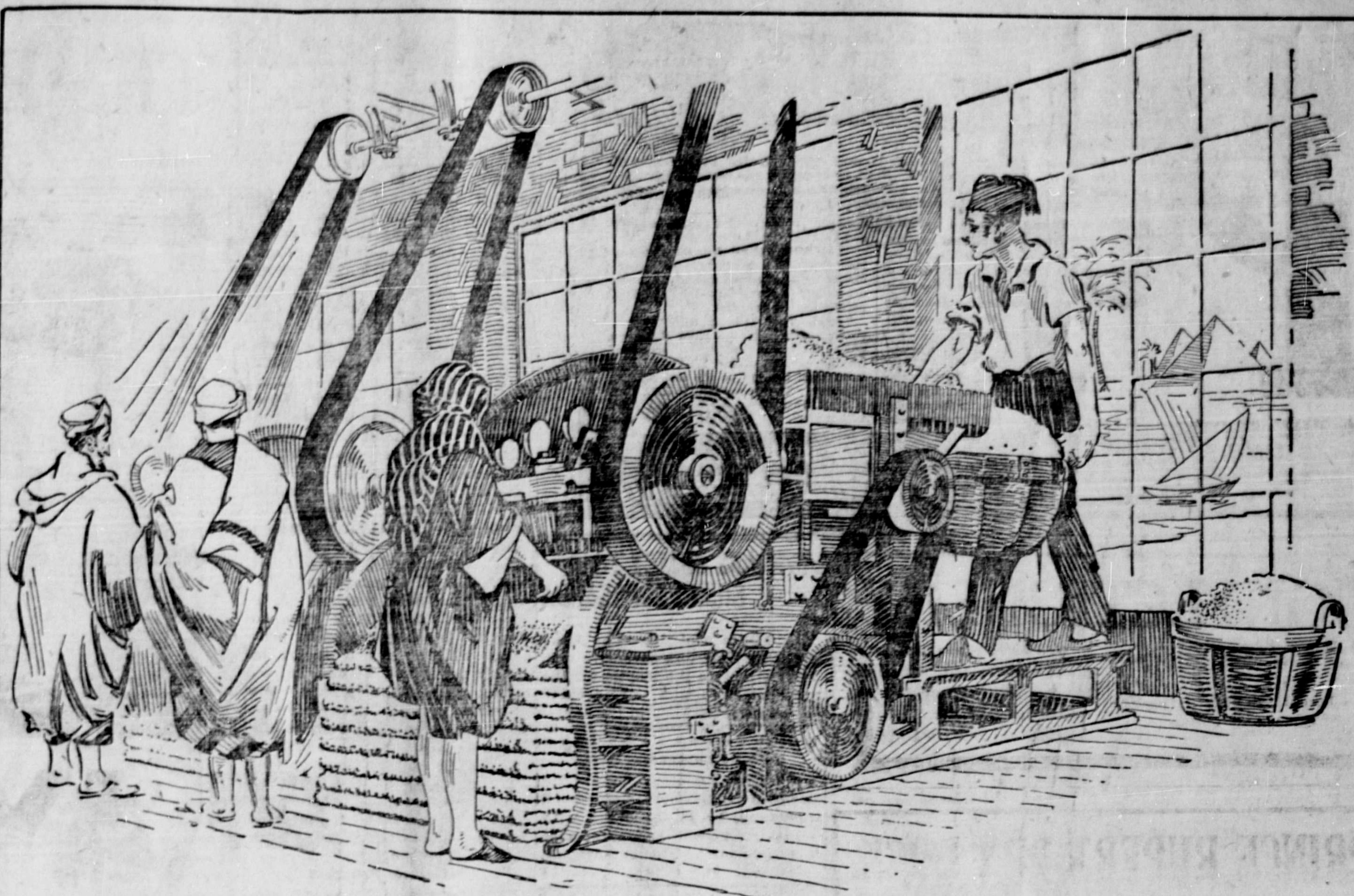

"The Public (Government!)

to me 'You recall that during the
first years of our Banish-the-Bar
Law with Public Shops, we boasted
that we had to close our jails;
there were no occupants. We have
ceased boasting. Under total
prohibition our jails are all
crowded—filled to the roof with
boot-leggers. For every one of
them that we catch two new ones
seem to come into being.'"

"The Government Shop pos-
sesses one certain value at all
events: What is sold therein is
real liquor, not concocted chem-

icals.

"Indeed the Bone Dry Acts in
operation in many States are more
honored in the breach than in the
observance."

"Maine has been Bone Dry by
law for three generations and IN
MOST PARTS OF MAINE WHIS-
KEY IS QUITE OPENLY SOLD
AND CONSUMED."

"Any tinsmith is able to make
a still and there is scarcely a
product of the soil from which
whiskey can not be made."

"Law does not alter human
nature; does not abolish appetite,
nor will law prevent men making
whiskey as long as there are other
men with appetites and the money
to satisfy them."

"But law may keep the jails
full of boot-leggers, it may make
law-breakers of hundreds of fair-
ly decent citizens; it may foster
hypocrisy to a deplorable degree

while at the same time it is fail-
ing to promote temperance and
lamentably failing to fulfil its
aim."

IN THE LETTER BOX WILL VOTE DRY

Editor Daily News—It is very gratifying to note the increase in the interest being taken in the great question to be decided on October 20. A matter of so vital importance to the state certainly demands the deepest and sanest thought of every individual. Then let us all have the betterment of our country at heart, think seriously and get the real facts of the question before we vote.

Here is a fact which is a good one to begin our reasoning on: Look back over the history of mankind from the earliest ages down to the present and we find a steady growth of that spirit which gives better protection to the weak by the self-denial and sacrifice of the strong. Indeed we view this as an indication of the height of civilization to which such a people have attained. This advance is still going on and must continue till, I suppose, the "millennium" has been reached. It is surely futile to think of trying to stop it. We may retard its progress while we are trying to satisfy our selfish desires, but we cannot change the plan of the universe. Temperance sentiment which has grown so strong is one phase of this progress and it is expressed on a very large part of this continent in the form of prohibition laws. Therefore we must conclude that this form of law best meets the aims of an advancing people.

Retarding Progress

If we should try another law, especially one that has been tried and found a failure, we are simply retarding our progress to that extent and of course also we must pay the penalty of our mistake.

We have tried a certain measure of prohibition and with wonderfully good results, but we see that other legislation is necessary in order that it may have a fair trial. Therefore the only logical thing to do is to vote for our present law once again and then demand the legislation which is needed to make our law effective.

Moderationists Sincere.

No doubt a large proportion of Moderationists are sincere in their own minds that Government sale is in the best interests of the people; even though they are working hand in hand with the liquor interests and the boot-logger. But surely it is good reasoning to assume that there will be much more indifference and dissipation under a law that allows liquor to be sold in any quantity and to anyone over the age of 21, than there would be under a law that allows only 8 ounces and that only by a certified prescription.

For the Boys

Any parents who have boys in the "teen age" would surely be more uneasy when their boy was down town with his chums knowing that any one of them may lawfully have a little on him for social purposes than they would even under our old prohibition law.

So let us think seriously and vote to retain our present amended law on the 20th and then by having this law still in force we will be in a position to take advantage of the pledge of our government which will enable us to secure the needed legislation.

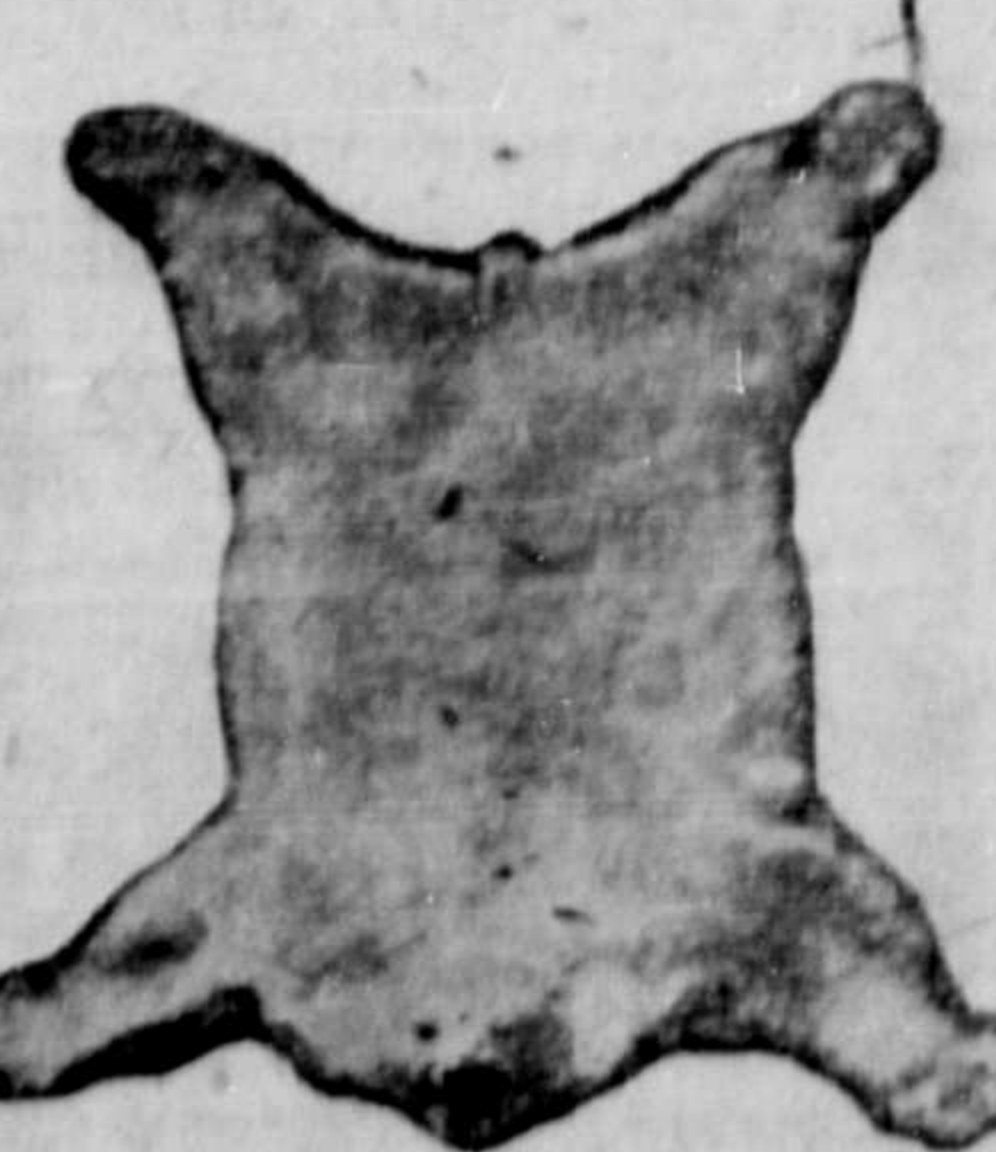

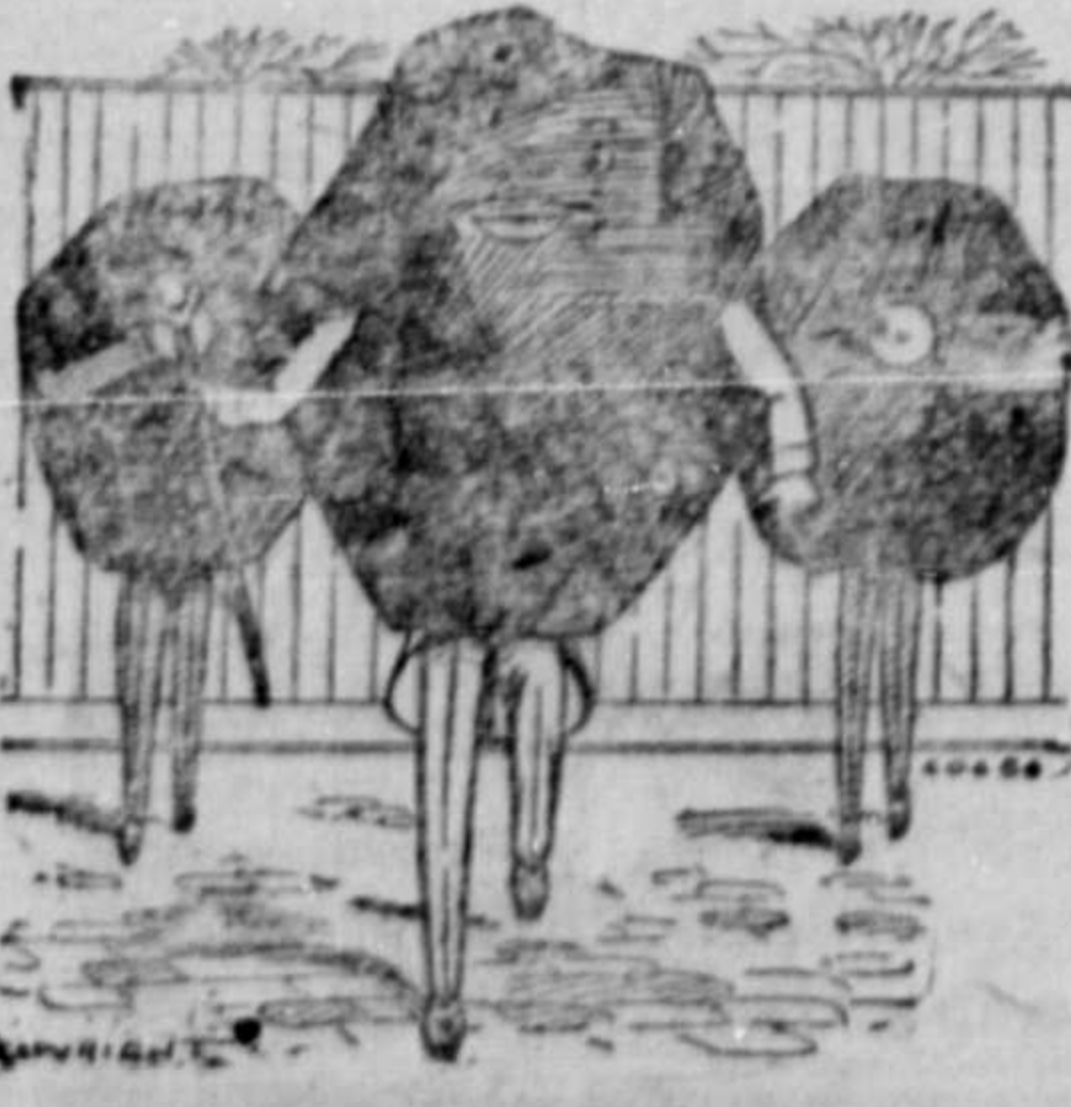
