

The obligation to provide for our merchant sailors' dependents was undertaken by the people during the war, and must be maintained by them, until the need for it is no more.

After this year, however, the League expects to cease asking for funds for the relief of the Canadian dependents of Merchant Sailors who were killed on active service. With the Trust Funds now in hand, together with the sum set aside in the Budget, to be raised by public subscription this week, it should be possible to establish an endowment, the income from which will be sufficient to provide these dependents with a pension equal to that granted to the dependents of Naval men killed on active service.

As many of these dependents are young children, the endowment must continue for a number of years, until the children become self-supporting.

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

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HOW CONTROL LIOUOR TRADE

Government Helpless in Many Respects when Dealing with this Business

Here is a definite analysis of that Government Control can and

ON THE NEGATIVE SIDE

(1) It cannot control ownership. The vested interests will own and control prices.

(2) It cannot control importa-This is a federal matter and the B. C. Government has no word to say except the will of the people call for it.

(3) It cannot control manufacture. This also is a federal matter and the provincial government cannot interfere.

(4) It cannot control bootlegging. If the police find it hard today to stop bootlegging it will be harder to discover whether a man is drunk on Government, imported or home-made whiskey.

(5) It cannot control the worst kind of vice behind locked doors. which liquor in the home means. It must not be drunk in the place. of sale, but where governmental control is at a minimum-out of

ON THE POSITIVE SIDE

(4) It can control sale to the extent that anyone who is, or appears to be, of the age of 21 can have a permit-to buy as much as such a one desires.

(2) It can control quality of liquor and this is the only control it has. But with the increased opportunity for bootlegging that will be created, this control does not stand for much. The bootlegger is not in the business to make bad whiskey; what he is after is easy money.

(3) The amount of control is so limited that the Government has not been willing to state its platform. The mere, abstraction termed "Government Sale and Control" shows the paucity of possible control.

(4) Government Control is controi of the Government by brewer. distiller and vested interests.




