Reorganization of Athletic Association.

The Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association elected new officers last night and starts off the season with every prospect of success. The officers and directors are young men who are not only interested in sport but who themselves take part in games and athletic activities. They have energy and are men of high standing in the sport world. They should get the undivided support of all the young men of the city.

There are a lot of problems for the new directors to work out as they will be looked to in connection with the arrangements for all important events. They can, we think, depend upon the support of the older people, who are keen on seeing something of this sort prosper.

Prepare Now for Winter Skating.

While we do not get much weather in this city suitable for skating, it is usual for the thermometer to drop below the freezing point for a week or two some time during the winter and thus make it possible to skate. The nearest point is at the Salt Lake across the harbor.

Last year it was decided to make a skating pond by damming Morse Creek. The work did not commence, however, until after the frost commenced and the result was that the work was unsatisfactory. The pond still exists only in the imagination.

The cost of making a skating pond at this point would not be large and it would be a great boon to those who are fond of skating. It is so near that all would be able to use it and if snow came it could be kept clear much more easily than the lake across the harbor. The time to move in the matter is right now. Once the frost commences it will be too late.

No Long Waits At Jasper Junction.

There are to be no long waits for the train at Jasper. That is the announcement made by the railway company. The train will not stop for more than two hours awaiting the Vancouver section but will proceed if the other is late. That is good news, but it is hardly good enough. Two hours is a long time to wait for the Vancouver train. It is to be hoped that in the very near future the railway company will see fit to give Prince Rupert its own through train. Passengers coming this way in the day coaches have had to change and we are informed that the number who leave the Vancouver train is always larger than the number who remain in it. Why make a branch of the line which does the business and try to make the branch into a main line? Here is a new port where the railway can operate without competition. The wise policy would seem to be to try to build up their own port instead of making an effort to take business from the C. P. R.

Falling Prices In Great Britain.

The matter of prices is being discussed in Great Britain and the general opinion is that they will come down. The following is from an editorial in the London Times:

"The plain but unpalatable truth of the situation is that prices of commodities have reached a level which the existing volume of credit, or buying power, is unable to maintain. Prices must fall. The credit position is fully extended. A further resort to inflation for the purpose of enlarging it would only aggravate a disease from which the whole world is trying to recover. Proof of the fact that prices have outstripped buying power is to be found not only in the difficulty of obtaining fresh credit, but in the warehousing of high-priced goods which cannot be sold. If these goods were sold the credits which are immobilized in them would be released, and the banks would be able to lend the money again. Obviously, therefore, the solution of the present position is to be found in a reduction in prices, which will apply a fresh stimulus to demand."

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

MUCH TRAVEL LONDON-PARIS BY AEROPLANE

During 18 Weeks Air Service
Carried 3,500 Passengers
Between Two Capitals.

LONDON, October 22.—During 18 weeks recently about 3,500 passengers have travelled by aeroplane instead of by boat and train between London and the Continent.

In the last month, for which figures are available, the air travellers in and out, from the two "ports" of Croydon and Croydon, numbered just over 1,000. On a single day lately, the "air express" departing for, and arriving from, the terminal aerodromes of Paris, Brussels, and Amsterdam carried more than 60 passengers, in addition to mails and urgently-consigned parcels.

The recent reduction in the fare for the air journey from 15 guineas to 10 guineas, as between London and Paris, brought a material increase in traffic. For next spring and summer, when the single London-Paris fare may be only seven guineas, plans are being made already on the assumption that air passenger-traffic will be more than doubled.

Passenger Planes.

Specially designed passenger aeroplanes have lately been put on these Continental "airways," and have proved far more comfortable and attractive than the converted war machines with which the services began last year. One new "air express," placed lately on the service between London and Paris, carries a pilot and eight passengers at a maximum speed, near the ground, of 130 miles an hour. The passengers in this machine are accommodated in arm-chair seats, luxuriously padded. The saloon they occupy is totally enclosed, and quite draught-proof, and there are wide side windows from which they obtain a full view of the panorama below.

In Two Hours.

Though the "schedule" time on the London-Paris airway is 2 1/4 hours, this new "express" flies so fast that it frequently makes the journey in two hours, or even less.

That these new fast "expresses" have appreciable money-earning power is shown by figures taken haphazard from a time sheet, which is typical of recent Continental flying. The machine in question left on the 9:30 a.m. service to Paris with five passengers, and came back the same afternoon with seven passengers on the 4:30 p.m. service from Paris, having flown about 480 miles between breakfast and dinner, and taken £126 in fares—reckoning each passenger at the present 10-guinea rate.

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE POSITION OF
ASSISTANT FOREST RANGER.

Object.
These examinations are for the purpose
of filling present vacancies and to enable
candidates to qualify for future vacancies
and increases in staff.

Assistant Forest Rangers.
Assistant Forest Rangers are employed
during the fire season (May to September
inclusive) of each year and this period is
extended where possible by working on
improvements such as trails, etc. Re-
appointment is made each year as long as
satisfactory service is given. Promotion
to the permanent staff is made by merit
and examination as occasion offers. The
salary is \$110.00 per month the first year
and \$120.00 per month the next year.
Travelling expenses are also paid.

Qualifications for Candidates.
Candidates must be British subjects
resident in British Columbia for at least
one year, of good character, good physical
condition and with woods experience.

They should have experience in fire
fighting, possess the ability to organize
work and handle men, and have knowledge
of the Forest Act.
The examinations are partly written,
partly oral and are designed to test the
candidates' ability along the above lines.

Mining News

HEALEY RIVER COAL

"A good grade of coal is now being mined at the junction of the Healey and Nenana Rivers," stated Woodbury Abbey, a United States surveyor, in Juneau recently. The quality is much better than that of last year and the vein is a substantial one. The mine, which is operated by the Healey River Coal Corporation, is quite close to the Alaskan Railway near Fairbanks and a tramway is used to deliver the coal at the railway tracks. Several other interests are preparing to move into the Healey River coal area and some enormous veins will be explored.

CHICAGOFF ISLAND

The development of the Lizianski gold mine at Falcon Arm near Juneau is to continue all winter, according to word brought to Juneau by officials of the Falcon Mining Company operating at Chicagoff Island. Fourteen men are employed on the property and 320 feet of 7 by 7 tunnel has been driven. Recent discoveries of new ledges have given the mine a very promising appearance and there are innumerable stringers lying on the claims.

CURIOS MINING

Prospectors are not usually reading men, but it is curious how many mines are named after some book or character in a book. The great Flin Flon copper mine in Manitoba is one of the most curious cases. It was Tom Creighton who first put his pick into the sulphides of the Flin Flon and later when the extent of the ore body had been indicated he named his mine. Some time before he had picked up on the trail a battered paper covered volume called "The Sunless City." It told the story of a world within a world where all things were reversed, where woman was in control, gold was so abundant it was cheap and tin was the precious metal. One character called Dr.

Flin Flon reached the real world and with the values reversed attained great wealth in the new surroundings. Hoping for such fortune and impressed by the story Creighton named his mine and it appears that his hope has been realized. Next spring he divides \$1,500,000 with his partner Johnny Mosher, the payment for the mine which was recently sold by the discoverers to New York and Toronto purchasers.

Meenach is Pleased.

J. D. Meenach has returned to Seattle from Alice Arm where he directed work on his property the Musketeer, near the Dolly Varden mine, during the summer. He returns south convinced that he has a property of primary formation and this view has been endorsed by experts. In speaking to the Alaska Dispatch at Seattle, Meenach reported considerable activity in the Alice Arm section and believes that it will become the greatest mining camp in the west.

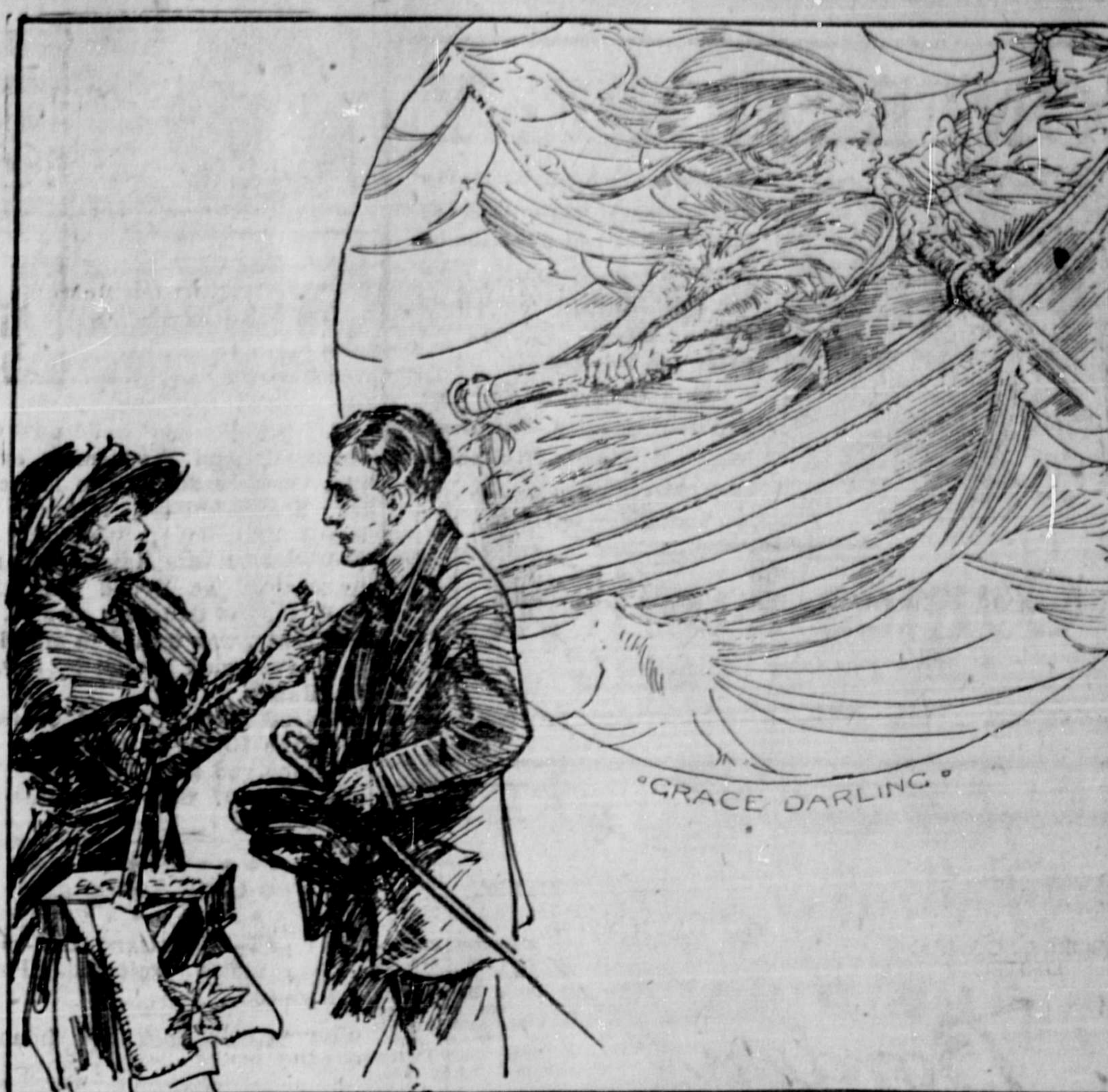
Inspired by Remark.

A solo game jest was the inspiration for the discovery of what Alaska mining men predict will become one of the richest gold producers in the northern territory according to H. R. Shepard of Juneau, part owner of the Lizianski gold mine on Chicagoff Island. Early in the spring of last year a party of friends were on a hunting and fishing trip on Taku River not far from Juneau. Rain and snow commenced to fall and the party was forced to shelter. In the course of a solo game which was played to while away the time, Shepard had very bad luck and one of his companions made the remark that "he was about as lucky at cards as he was at mining." The retort soon came, "I'll find a half million dollar gold mine before the end of the year." A few weeks later Shepard set out for Chicagoff Island and after ten days came back with a twinkle in his eye. In September the news became public; Shepard and J. H. Cann had found a gold mine. The mine was bonded promptly and next spring it will be in the shipping class.

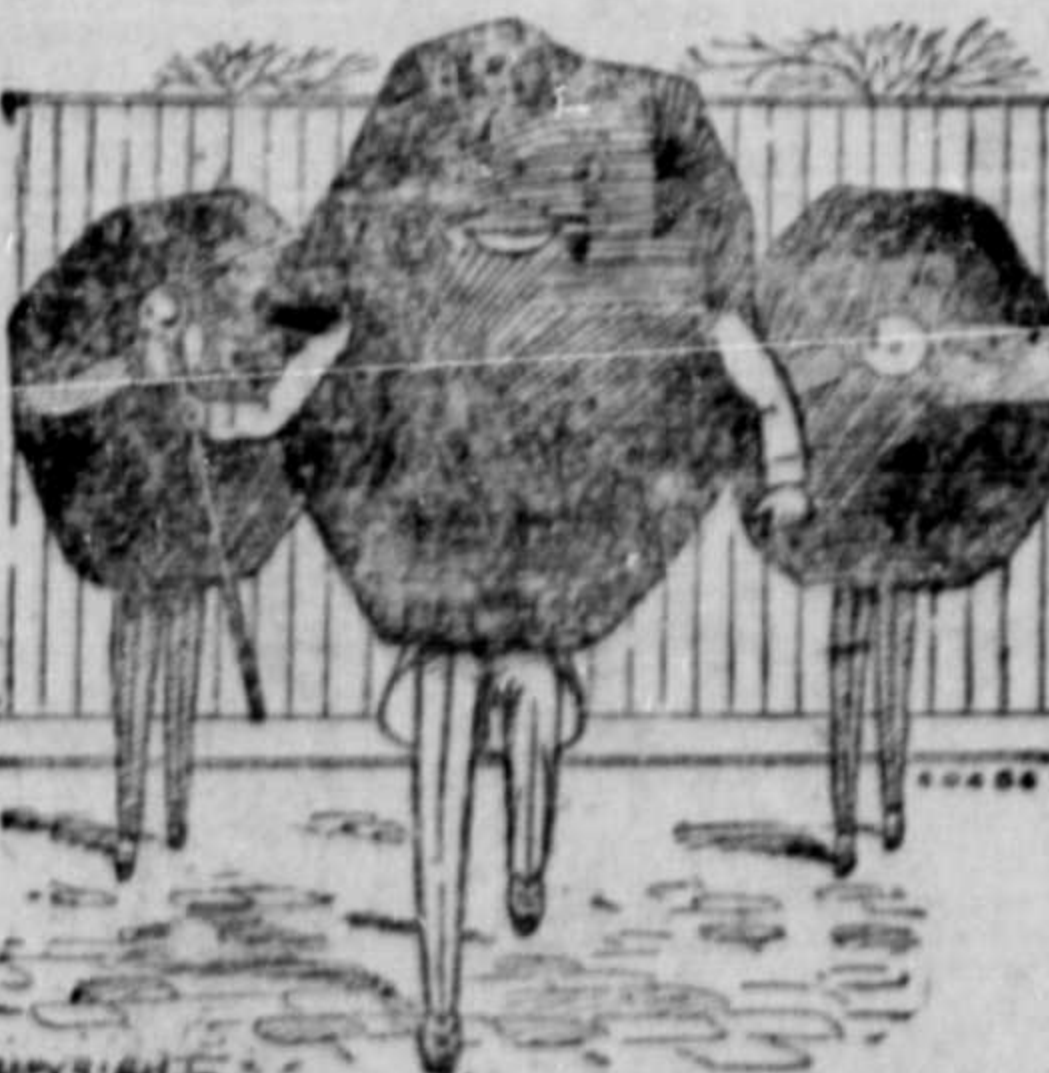

NAVIGABLE WATERS PROTECTION ACT.

R. S. C. CHAP. 115.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$1 an acre; second-class to \$1.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is not timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may make joint pre-emption, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$500 per annum and records same each year.

Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years.

Pre-emptor holding Crown Grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead; title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mills, factories, breweries, etc., on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to them. Relief of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include a person joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces, or time within which the heirs or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under the Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 25, 1918. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Interest on return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 31, 1929.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1929.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.

LIGHT CRUISER FROM BRITAIN

Aurora will sail from Devonport as soon as Ready for Canadian Service

LONDON, Oct. 22.—The light cruiser which the Royal Canadian Navy is to receive as a gift from the Imperial Government is the Aurora, which will leave Devonport as soon as she can be got ready, in company with the destroyers Patriot and Patrician, which are also being transferred to Canada.

As long ago as March 27 it was announced that the Dominion Government had decided to replace the obsolete cruisers Niobe and Rainbow by a light cruiser and two destroyers offered by Great Britain.

Fast Boat

Launched in 1913, as one of the original vessels of the Arctura type, the Aurora was the first oil-fired cruiser to be launched for the British Navy, and served in the Harwich Force during the war. She has a displacement of 1,500 tons and is armed with two 6 in., six 4 in., and lighter guns, with four torpedo tubes. Turbine engines of 40,000 horse-power give her a speed of 30 knots and her complement includes 270 officers and men. The Niobe was of a much older, larger and slower type, with a displacement of 41,000 tons and a speed of 18 knots. The Rainbow, launched in 1891, was of 1,600 tons and a speed of 19 1/2 knots. The full crew of the two vessels numbered 600 and 273 respectively.

Borrowing Men

The Canadian authorities need the services of 50 ratings from the Royal Navy to man the Aurora, Patriot and Patrician, 30 in the cruiser and 10 in each of the destroyers. Ratings selected will be required to serve in the Royal Canadian Navy for two years from the dates of commissioning of the respective vessels and while lent will receive pay and allowances at Canadian naval rates. On being returned to the Royal Navy they will receive full pay, foreign service leave at Canadian rates according to the length of time served in the R.C.N., the period of leave being determined in accordance with the King's Regulations. Names of volunteers are being forwarded through their commanding officers direct to the Acting Director of the Naval Service of Canada, at the High Commissioner's Office, 19 Victoria Street, S.W.1.

COUNTY COURT CASES FOR MONTH NOVEMBER

Only Four Suits Pending to be Tried Before Judge Young

There are only four cases set down for hearing by Judge Young in the County Court during the month of November. The first handed out from the office of the court registrar this morning is as follows:

Gus Hagen, a laborer at Port Clements, vs. James O'Dea, a clubhouse manager. Plaintiff claims \$100 as a loan extended to the defendant, who denies the claim. Fisher & Oughton have the case for the plaintiff and Patmore & Fulton for the defendant.

Brackman & Kerr vs. Campbell and Smith, Port Clements merchants. Plaintiffs claim \$190.36 payment of account and defendants alleged that the amount is incorrect. Williams & Manson are acting for the plaintiffs.

P. J. Higgins, a Smithers prospector vs. D. J. McGillivray, a Spokane prospector. A claim of \$776 for assessment work done and payment received is set forth by the plaintiff. The defendant denies the indebtedness. Williams & Manson are appearing for the plaintiff and Patmore & Fulton for the defence.

James Martin, a Massett merchant, vs. John Thomas, a Vancouver laborer. The plaintiff claims the indebtedness of the defendant of the amount of \$108.26 for an account for merchandise. The defence is that the defendant does not owe the money and the cause for action came up in 1914. Patmore & Fulton have the case for the plaintiff and T. B. Hooper for the defence.

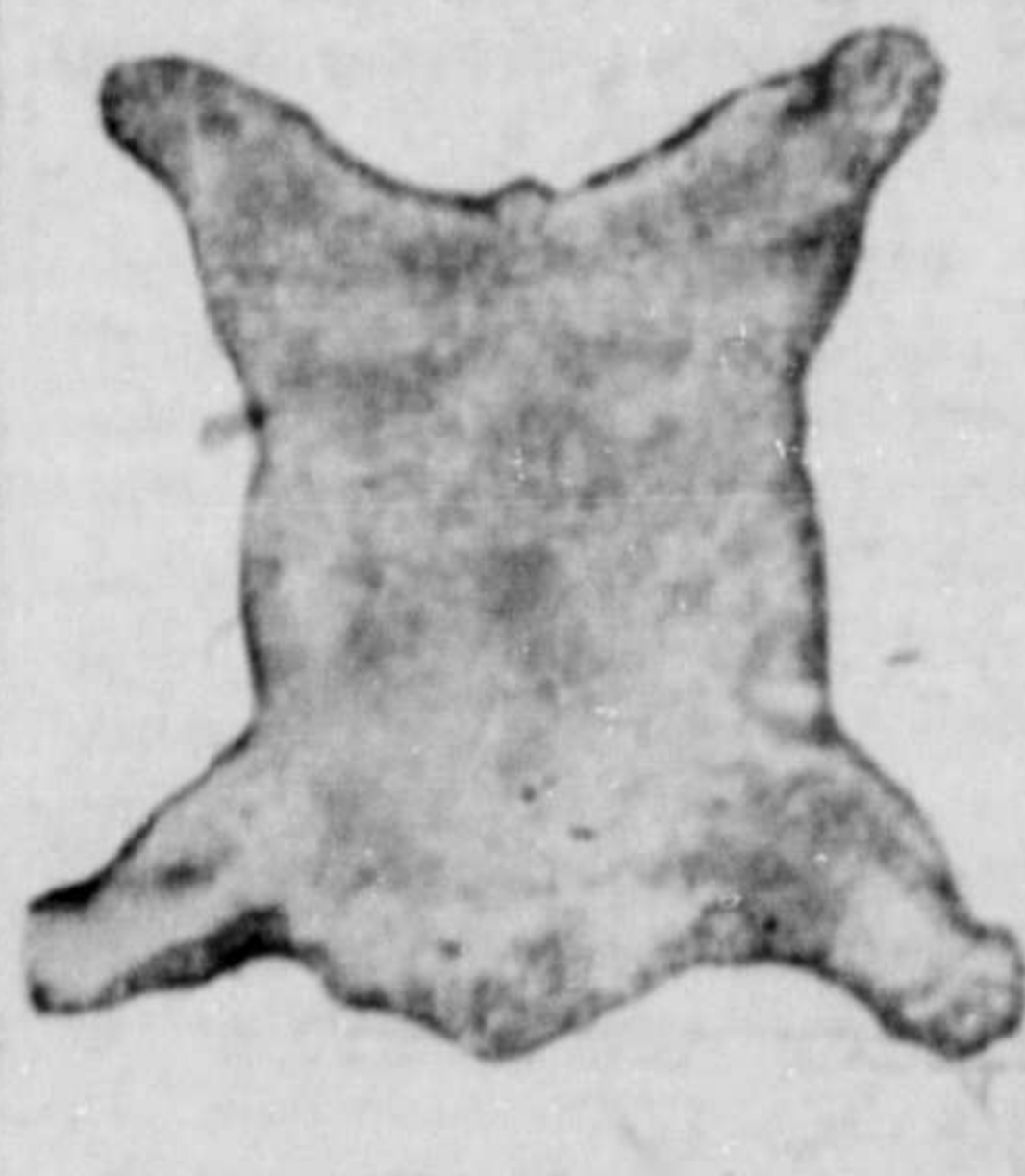
