## Premier Oliver Says Election Will Be Soon But No Date Yet Set

### tion of Railwaymen Makes Strike Settlement Difficult

Premier Lloyd George says negotiations were under way when indiscreet action was taken; discussions may be resumed

ON, October 22.—In the House of Commons last night Lloyd George said he had been engaged in a two days' conference with the parties concerned in the coal strike and that a settlement was favorable. He could not, however, hold from the House the fact that the precipitate action of the railway executive in threatening a strike had embarrassed him. "It is a misfortune, adding seriously to the difficulties," he said. "It was interference exceedingly rash, exceedingly ill-advised and apparently not desired by anybody. Action of that kind encourages irresponsible persons to go behind the responsible leaders."

Premier said he hoped the discussions would be resumed and that it would have been much easier if they had left the country to settle their own affairs.

to Ruin all Mines by Withdrawal of Men; Plan made to German Miners by British Labor

ON, October 22.—In the withdrawal of all labor from the coal mines, which are now kept in order by specially assigned forces, their withdrawal would render the pits useless on the resumption of work.

BERLIN, Oct. 22.—The leaders of the striking British miners have appealed to the Miners' International for assistance, according to the newspaper Vorwaerts, adding that the German miners have sent a message wishing the strikers speedy success.

At the meeting of the Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association held in the Board of Trade rooms last night officers for the coming year were elected, financial and other reports received in regard to the work of last season and plans discussed tentatively for the forthcoming winter. After considerable discussion it was decided to leave the matter of dues in the hands of the new executive, they being responsible for the financing of the Association for the year. A number of suggestions were made, however, and the discussion was decidedly profitable.

In his opening address Colonel McMordie stated that last year they had the problem of raising the finances in order to build a dressing room, put in shower baths and provide equipment. They had done this and they left with practically a clean sheet and with \$289 in the bank so the new management would have a good start. ### Premier Declares Election Very Soon

Private Meetings of supporters of the big parties have been held in Vancouver preparing slates for coming contest

MILNER, October 22.—In a three-hour speech before a large audience, Premier John Oliver declared there would be an election very soon, but as yet no date had been decided on.

After expressing surprise at the result of the plebiscite, Mr. Oliver said government control would mean that the money heretofore sent out of the province would now be kept within the provincial boundaries. He announced that he himself voted for prohibition.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 22.—Election rumors are already giving place to the referendum results in the public interest. Both the major parties have been holding private meetings with a view to getting out strong slates. Everywhere the Liberals are expressing themselves as confident that the Government will be returned with a good majority. Those who are not allied with either of the political parties say there is nothing else to do but return the present Government.

#### NO CARS SO THERE WAS NO FISH SALE

Nearly 200,000 Pounds of Fish Is Again Tied up at the Fish Wharves.

There were no refrigerator cars for the arrivals posted at the Fish Exchange this morning so the sale has been held over until tomorrow morning when three cars are reported to be arriving. The only sale was the Jean which sold 300 pounds of salmon to the Atlin Fisheries at 46c and 5c. The best being halibut boats have been held over.

### MANY REFUSED PREMIERSHIP

France's New Premier was President Millerand's Fifth Choice.

M. Georges Leygues has become premier of France. According to the "Matin," the French premiership was declined successively by M. Lhopiteau, minister of justice; M. Steeg, minister of the interior; and M. Jonnart before M. Millerand offered it to M. Leygues. Our Paris correspondent has said that it was also offered to M. Briand, so M. Leygues is M. Millerand's fifth choice. This unwillingness to accept the post on M. Millerand's conditions suggests that the apparent desire of the new president to be his own prime minister is not universally approved. It must be the first time in the history of the Third Republic that a prime minister has been appointed on the condition of taking over all his predecessor's colleagues, which means in effect that all the ministers are directly chosen by the president of the republic. Although he has held office six times—on the first occasion in the Charles Depuy cabinet of 1894 and on the last occasion in the Clemenceau cabinet of 1917—he has never been in the front rank of French politicians and was never looked upon as likely to become prime minister or minister of foreign affairs, still less both at once.

### SMITHERS BOY IS GIVEN LONG TERM AT OKALLA PRISON

Norman Kitson, a Smithers youth, was sentenced to serve 18 months at Okalla Prison Farm on appearing before Judge Young at an evening session of the court last night. Evidence was given by Constable John Kelly, of Smithers, as to the offences of the boy and his breaking jail twice, on one occasion taking another prisoner with him. The lad was clearly shown to have criminal tendencies. A short time ago he was before Judge Young charged with theft and was let out on suspended sentence.

The case was short and held between the arrival of the train at 9 o'clock and the departure of the Prince George at midnight. Constable Kelly continued the journey south, taking the boy to prison.

## Reorganization of Athletic Association.

The Prince Rupert Amateur Athletic Association elected new officers last night and starts off the season with every prospect of success. The officers and directors are young men who are not only interested in sport but who themselves take part in games and athletic activities. They have energy and are men of high standing in the sport world. They should get the undivided support of all the young men of the city.

There are a lot of problems for the new directors to work out as they will be looked to in connection with the arrangements for all important events. They can, we think, depend upon the support of the older people, who are keen on seeing something of this sort prosper.

## Prepare Now for Winter Skating.

While we do not get much weather in this city suitable for skating, it is usual for the thermometer to drop below the freezing point for a week or two some time during the winter and thus make it possible to skate. The nearest point is at the Salt Lake across the harbor.

Last year it was decided to make a skating pond by damming Morse Creek. The work did not commence, however, until after the frost commenced and the result was that the work was unsatisfactory. The pond still exists only in the imagination.

The cost of making a skating pond at this point would not be large and it would be a great boon to those who are fond of skating. It is so near that all would be able to use it and if snow came it could be kept clear much more easily than the lake across the harbor. The time to move in the matter is right now. Once the frost commences it will be too late.

## No Long Waits at Jasper Junction.

There are to be no long waits for the train at Jasper. That is the announcement made by the railway company. The train will not stop for more than two hours awaiting the Vancouver section but will proceed if the other is late. That is good news, but it is hardly good enough. Two hours is a long time to wait for the Vancouver train. It is to be hoped that in the very near future the railway company will see fit to give Prince Rupert its own through train. Passengers coming this way in the day coaches have had to change and we are informed that the number who leave the Vancouver train is always larger than the number who remain in it. Why make a branch of the line which does the business and try to make the branch into a main line? Here is a new port where the railway can operate without competition. The wise policy would seem to be to try to build up their own port instead of making an effort to take business from the C. P. R.

## Falling Prices in Great Britain.

The matter of prices is being discussed in Great Britain and the general opinion is that they will come down. The following is from an editorial in the London Times:

"The plain but unpalatable truth of the situation is that prices of commodities have reached a level which the existing volume of credit, or buying power, is unable to maintain. Prices must fall. The credit position is fully extended. A further resort to inflation for the purpose of enlarging it would only aggravate a disease from which the whole world is trying to recover. Proof of the fact that prices have outstripped buying power is to be found not only in the difficulty of obtaining fresh credit, but in the warehousing of high-priced goods which cannot be sold. If these goods were sold the credits which are immobilized in them would be released, and the banks would be able to lend the money again. Obviously, therefore, the solution of the present position is to be found in a reduction in prices, which will apply a fresh stimulus to demand."

MUCH TRAVEL  
LONDON-PARIS  
BY AEROPLANE

During 18 Weeks Air Service  
Carried 3,500 Passengers  
Between Two Capitals.

LONDON, October 22.—During 18 weeks recently about 3,500 passengers have travelled by aeroplane instead of by boat and train between London and the Continent.

In the last month, for which figures are available, the air travellers in and out, from the two "ports" of Croydon and Cricklewood, numbered just over 1,000. On a single day lately, the "air express" departing for, and arriving from, the terminal aerodromes of Paris, Brussels, and Amsterdam carried more than 60 passengers, in addition to mails and urgently-consigned parcels.

The recent reduction in the fare for the air journey from 15 guineas to 10 guineas, as between London and Paris, brought a material increase in traffic. For next spring and summer, when the single London-Paris fare may be only seven guineas, plans are being made already on the assumption that air passenger traffic will be more than doubled.

## Passenger Planes.

Specially designed passenger aeroplanes have lately been put on these Continental "airways," and have proved far more comfortable and attractive than the converted war machines with which the services began last year. One new "air express," placed lately on the service between London and Paris, carries a pilot and eight passengers at a maximum speed, near the ground, of 130 miles an hour. The passengers in this machine are accommodated in arm-chair seats, luxuriously padded. The saloon they occupy is totally enclosed, and quite draught-proof, and there are wide side windows from which they obtain a full view of the panorama below.

## In Two Hours.

Though the "schedule" time on the London-Paris airway is 2½ hours from Croydon to Le Bourget, this new "express" flies so fast that it frequently makes the journey in two hours, or even less.

That these new fast "expresses" have appreciable money-earning power is shown by figures taken haphazard from a time sheet, which is typical of recent continental flying. The machine in question left on the 9:30 a.m. service to Paris with five passengers, and came back the same afternoon with seven passengers on the 4:30 p.m. service from Paris, having flown about 480 miles between breakfast and dinner, and taken £425 in fares—reckoning each passenger at the present 10-guinea rate.

#### Meenach is Pleased.

J. D. Meenach has returned to Seattle from Alice Arm where he directed work on his property the Musketeer, near the Dolly Varden mine, during the summer. He returns south convinced that he has a property of primary formation and this view has been endorsed by experts. In speaking to the Alaska Dispatch at Seattle, Meenach reported considerable activity in the Alice Arm section and believes that it will become the greatest mining camp in the west.

#### Inspired by Remark.

Shepard of Juneau, part owner of the Lizianski gold mine on Chicagooff Island. A few weeks later Shepard set out for Chicagooff Island and after ten days came back with a twinkle in his eye. In September the news became public; Shepard and J. H. Cann had found a gold mine. The mine was bonded promptly and next spring it will be in the shipping class.

#### CHICAGOFF ISLAND

The development of the Lizianski gold mine at Falcon Arm near Juneau is to continue all winter, according to word brought to Juneau by officials of the Falcon Mining Company operating at Chicagooff Island. Fourteen men are employed on the property and 229 feet of 7 by 7 tunnel has been driven. Recent discoveries of new ledges have given the mine a very promising appearance and there are innumerable stringers lying on the claims.



## LIGHT CRUISER FROM BRITAIN

Aurora will sail from Devonport as soon as ready for Canadian service

LONDON, Oct. 22.—The light cruiser which the Royal Canadian Navy is to receive as a gift from the Imperial Government is the Aurora, which will leave Devonport as soon as she can be got ready, in company with the destroyers Patriot and Patrician, which are also being transferred to Canada.

As long ago as March 27 it was announced that the Dominion Government had decided to replace the obsolete cruisers Niobe and Rainbow by a light cruiser and two destroyers offered by Great Britain.

### Fast Boat

Launched in 1913, as one of the original vessels of the Arthusa type, the Aurora was the first oil-fired cruiser to be launched for the British Navy, and served in the Harwich Force during the war. She has a displacement of 1,500 tons and is armed with two 6 in., six 4 in., and lighter guns, with four torpedo tubes. Turbine engines of 40,000 horse-power give her a speed of 30 knots and her complement includes 270 officers and men. The Niobe was a much older, larger and slower type, with a displacement of 4,000 tons and a speed when built in 1899 of 20½ knots. The Rainbow, launched in 1891, was of 1,600 tons and a speed of 19½ knots. The full crew of the two vessels numbered 690 and 273 respectively.

### Borrowing Men

The Canadian authorities need the services of 50 ratings from the Royal Navy to man the Aurora, Patriot and Patrician, 30 in the cruiser and 10 in each of the destroyers. Ratings selected will be required to serve in the Royal Canadian Navy for two years from the dates of commissioning of the respective vessels and while lent will receive pay and allowances at Canadian naval rates. On being returned to the Royal Navy they will receive full pay, foreign service leave at Canadian rates according to the length of time served in the R.C.N., the period of such leave being determined in accordance with the King's Regulations.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for land and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant. Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 2 years, and has made improvements to value of \$10 per acre, or otherwise, he may be granted intermediate certificate of tenement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be leased, provided applicant has improvements to value of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 10 years, and improvements of \$100 per acre, including cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption for his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Ungranted areas not exceeding 20 acres may be leased as homesteads to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 640 acres may be leased.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stampage.

Land having meadows inaccessible by existing roads may be purchased conditional upon construction of a road to road, not exceeding half of cost of road, for payment of purchase price, is made to the defendant.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving in the Canadian Forces. The areas within which the heirs' devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may file for title under this Act is extended from for one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

No fees relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 26, 1918.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Agreements on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from entitlement to March 1, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from purchasers, involving future fulfilment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRADING ACT, 1919, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for assessment of lands under Commissioner's administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for established owners. Stock-owners may apply for range management fees or partially free, or lease land.
