

Canon Scott Tells Story Second Battle of Ypres

Soldier Padre, Idol of First Canadian Division, was well received at his lecture in Empress Theatre; presentation was made

Warmth of enthusiasm and kindly spirit are apt to work wonders among men and it is no wonder that Canon Frederick Scott, D. S. O., G. M. G., the soldier padre of the First Canadian Division, became the idol of the Canadian Army. In his lecture delivered before a full house in the Empress Theatre last evening these qualities were demonstrated to degree. The Canon proved to be not the ordinary public speaker but one vastly different. From the moment he stood up the entire audience entered into the spirit of his address and although he spoke an hour and a half there was not a person who was not as keen at the end as at the beginning. The story of France will always be sad, but Canon Scott provoked many a smile last night in relating it.

Col. G. W. Peck, V. G., M. P., was chairman and seated on the platform were Col. S. P. McMordie, D. S. O., Judge F. McB. Young, Canon G. A. Rix, Captain John McGregor, V. C., President J. H. Kelly of the G. W. V. A., and Dr. J. A. West. Accompanied by W. Vaughan Davies, J. Y. Fraser and Melv Davies gave well appreciated solos and the Westholme Orchestra played "Colonel Bogey" and "The Maple Leaf."

Before the canon was called upon to deliver his address, Capt. John McGregor presented him with a walking stick made by Alex Yule of Queen Charlotte Island whale bone with a tooth for a handle, on behalf of the local War Veterans' Association and the returned soldiers generally. Col. Peck, recalling some of the experiences they had had together in France then called upon Canon Scott.

Purpose of Trip.

The canon mentioned that although he was 3,000 miles from home he still met friends and that had been the case everywhere he was going on his tour. Showing the deeds of the boys in France with his own experiences as a lens to stir up a greater enthusiasm in the new Canadian era was the purpose of his trip.

He described his quiet life in the parish in the province of Quebec and of the latter days of July, 1914, when war was bruted and the great European conflict was about to be precipitated. As a chaplain in the Eighth Royal Rifles he had volunteered on August 2 and his son, a young Montreal lawyer, had joined up the next day. Both went to Valcartier and the padre received his first military training as a private.

Next had come Salisbury Plains with all their mud, rain and discomforts. He had been assigned to No. 2 General Hospital that was to remain in England, but he did not wish to stay in England so he smuggled himself aboard a channel boat and after landing at Chilcotin had a lot of box boards and a deck load of lumber.

Up to the time of cabling no arrests had been made in connection with the crime.

YORKSHIREMEN ARE ON STRIKE

Railroad and Transport Employees Elsewhere Continue Work; Confidence in the Government.

LLOYD GEORGE HAS CONFERENCE WITH MEN

LONDON, October 23.—The threatened strike of railroad and transport men numbering 35,000 expected this morning has been postponed.

In Yorkshire, however, several thousand men quit work. The public everywhere are expressing confidence in the food supply promised by the Government, no matter what happens.

Conversations between the Government and individual strike leaders were resumed this morning and also conferences between the premier and other members of the Government with the secretary of the miners' organization. While no definite results were attained, the way is still open for continued negotiations and it is possible that the next few days may see the end of the strike.

BIG VOTE IS EXPECTED ON IMPORTATION

Four Provinces to Decide Monday Whether They Will Cut Off Trade in Liquor.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 23.—Manitoba, Nova Scotia, Alberta and Saskatchewan are on Monday next voting on the question of prohibiting the importation of liquor into those provinces. The general impression is that all the provinces mentioned will go dry.

EDMONTON, Oct. 23.—Indications here point to a large majority on Monday for prohibiting the importation of liquor into the province. A persistent campaign has been waged by the prohibitionists throughout the province with most encouraging results to them. The liquor interests have been working more quietly but none the less persistently. Very little interest is being taken in the outcome and a big vote is expected everywhere.

What Will Young People Do in Life?

What will young people do in life? What do you expect your boys and girls to be? Are they being educated for the work they expect to take up? These are questions for all parents to answer. Most girls nowadays learn some business or profession by which they can earn money for themselves. A girl should be none the worse wife or mother for having been a good stenographer, teacher, sales girl or telephone operator. She may take up a musical career or go in for one of the learned professions. But after all the life work of the average girl will be housekeeping and raising a family. Most girls marry and most of those who marry have children. The normal girl likes children and looks forward to having some of her own. To what extent are the girls being educated in the art and science of caring for children? The man who employs a stenographer must be assured that she is able to do the work, that she is accurate and can write so many words a minute and transcribe neatly and correctly. There are other things also to be learned if a good job is to be obtained.

The greatest vocation in the world is that of raising one's own children. The average girl goes into the profession with very little training and with no guarantee that she can do the work successfully or even that she understands the rudiments of the work. The result is easily seen.

What About

Educating the Boy?

The boy is going to be an engineer. He is apprenticed to the work after having completed, perhaps, a mathematical school education. He is taught everything necessary and he in time becomes a leader in his profession. Incidentally he takes up the greatest duty of life. He gets married. In these days there are few servants. People must do their own housework. There are times in married life when the man has to do the work of the house. What does he know about it? Can he cook? Is he able to carry on while his wife is laid up. If not, what is going to happen? These are questions to seriously consider. It seems as if there should be an examination in household science for every person contemplating matrimony.

Every Man and Woman Should Marry.

The married life is the natural life. Every young man and woman should marry. Those who do not are apt to become different. We sometimes hear it said that old maids are cross, and it is often true. Bachelors have not carried out the natural life work. All should marry, but all should be educated for marriage. It is no wonder that marriage is often a failure, considering the haphazard manner in which the duties are undertaken.

Sunday Sermon on Duty Toward the Race.

We know of no better subject for a Sunday sermon than this of the duty of young men and women to the race and to each other. Professor Alexander when he was here two years ago gave a lecture on "Love, Courtship and Marriage," which was the best attended lecture he gave. Young and old were there. So today people are interested in these problems of life. They are anxious for education but the teachers are few and often without experience in the subjects they essay to teach. Most of our clergy are married men and have experience in these matters. Why not look to them for help? This little preaching is for the purpose of drawing attention to the subject rather than of discussing it seriously. It is a good Sunday subject and worthy of the best thought of the best minds.

GRANBY GETS

MUCH COPPER

Not Quite as Much in September as Previous Months, says Report

CONCENTRATOR MAY BE ERECTED AT ANYOX

The Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Company produced 2,239,174 pounds of copper in September, according to a report received by Walter J. Nicholls & Company, says the Spokane Spokesman-Review. This is comparable with 2,471,200 pounds in August and 2,400,000 in July. A table issued in New York shows that the production in every month but one of the current year was in excess of 2,000,000, while six months of 1919 were below the 2,000,000 mark, although one month was above 3,000,000.

Half Year's Profit

The report received yesterday states that a net profit of \$443,586 was obtained after the deduction of charges, but not of tax, in the six months ended on June 30 last. In the six months ended on December 31, 1919, the gross profits were \$899,487 and the net profit \$59,900, according to a report.

Concentrator Proposed

From an unofficial source it is learned that the company has considered the installation at Anyox, B.C., of a concentrating plant having a capacity of 2,000 tons daily. Its cost is estimated at \$1,000,000.

For a year and a half an experimental mill of 100 tons daily capacity has been in service. It is reported to have demonstrated the responsiveness of Granby ore to concentration. The installation of the 2,000-ton plant will reduce the cost of producing copper and make available a large quantity of ore that does not reach the smelter, it is pointed out.

Ore in Sight

The Hidden Creek mine of the Granby Company has 41,000,000 tons of ore designated as No. 1 and containing 2.4 per cent copper and 14,000,000 tons designated as No. 2 ore, containing about 1.25 per cent copper, it is reported. Smelting is said to have been limited mainly to the No. 1 ore, but the No. 2 would become available after concentration. The ratio of concentration would be about 10 into 1, it is estimated. This alone is expected to save much smelting which entails a large consumption of coke.



CANON SCOTT TELLS STORY SECOND BATTLE OF YPRES

(Continued From Page One.)

St. Lazaire his war experiences began. Finally after making his way up the lines he reached Ypres shortly before the world-famous Second Battle.

Place of Honor.

The Durham Light Infantry with which he had become attached was assigned by General Smith Dorrien to the place of honor in worrying the Germans outside of the city. Remaining in Ypres it was not long before shells began to rip through the city, laying low the ancient and dignified buildings and the bombardment, which resulted in the devastation of the beautiful old Belgian city, had commenced. Soon the artillery began to retreat and it looked like a rout but this was only for the time and the Sixteenth Canadian Scottish marched up as reinforcement to the delight of the padre who had not seen the unit since they had been encamped on Salisbury Plain.

Here at St. Julien, almost in sight of the field of Waterloo, the Canadians were sent in on the memorable April 22 when the Germans launched their first gas attack, thereby violating all recognized rules of warfare.

War's Horrors.

The story of the horrors, of the dying and wounded men with gaping and mortal wounds lying on the cold pavements on the night of the first day was told vividly. The moonlight falling softly on the great battlefield with the rifle fire going incessantly and the smell of gas in the air marked the night of the first great Canadian engagement when for three days and nights the Canadians hung on like grim death and foiled the German attempt at the channel ports and the probable gaining of the Hun object, world control. In the hour of horror he complimented the doctors, the nurses and the stretcher-bearers who had worked on the horrible wounds with their arms in many instances red with blood to the elbows.

At the end of the battle when the Germans had been repulsed congratulatory messages had come from the King, Lord French and the whole world.

Bought With Blood.

If Canada has a grand place in the world it has been bought with the blood of these brave men and not by the millionaires who stayed at home. It is the men who risked and gave their lives who have saved Canada.

Now we find ourselves at the turning point, the commencement of a new era. Canada is an independent nation with 8,000,000 people owning the greatest and richest country in the world. We must play the game like the boys did in France and show that same comradeship and sympathy they did out there. Let their deaths be an inspiration to bury our animosities and join with one giant handshake from sea to sea, making love the dominant note in making a better people."

A vote of thanks was moved by Judge Young, seconded by Colonel McMordie and heartily voted unanimous with three cheers, a tiger, a cougar and a grizzly bear.

SOVIET STORY FROM TORONTO

Financial Post Tells Interesting
Yarn in Connection with
Russian Trade

SAYS CANADIANS ARE BEING EASILY FOOLED

The Financial Post of Toronto declares that all the trade proposals of the Russian Soviet are simply propaganda schemes. The latest issue of that paper tells the story as follows:

"The Financial Post has persistently fought all efforts to do business with Soviet Russia or Soviet agents. When these agents announced through the press and by circulars two or three years ago that they had \$200,000,000 in gold with which to buy, for cash, enormous quantities of Canadian manufactured goods, we pointed out the agents were fakers, that they had no money whatever for this purpose; that their work was not to buy goods but to stir up strife, particularly in the British Dominions and between Canada and the United States; that they were responsible for the Winnipeg and many other big strikes.

Gigantic Scheme
It was known that, under alleged appeals for charity, they were actually taking money out of Canada to meet expenses of their propaganda. One of their Toronto agents raised \$8,000 in this way—and he is still at it—among Labor Unionists. But it was not alone the misled workingmen who were caught in the meshes of this gigantic scheme. Business men and financiers were continually drawn into their meshes. One of the latter headed a group which interested hundreds of quite reputable persons in Canada, desirous of aiding in good work, to raise a very large sum of money. Whether this man knew the purpose for which this money was being raised or not, we cannot say, but it was taken by a Canadian to the same Soviet headquarters in Chicago that financed the Winnipeg strike and from Chicago the money went to Mexico to finance revolutions. In fact it is still being used as the basis of a very important big deal that has been under way for some time.

On several occasions the Financial Post was threatened with libel actions. Proceedings were actually started in one case against us, but the arrest, conviction and imprisonment not long after of the chief complainant stopped proceedings.

German Finn

All this work, as has frequently been pointed out in these columns, was directed from New York nominally by Ludwig Martens, but actually by an extremely clever German Finn going under the name of Santori Nuorteva. Martens is not a Russian, but a former German officer. Back of them is an important group of Internationalists—but this is another story. The Winnipeg strike, having awakened the Canadian people to the rottenness in the direction of our Intelligence Service, started investigations which confirmed suspicions that there were actually men occupying Canadian public positions who were aiding this campaign. Such a splendid old public servant as Sir Percy Sherwood broke down in health and gave up in despair.

Montreal Headquarters

This led to a demand for the reorganization of our Dominion police and our domestic Intelligence Service. It has now become more difficult for the International Soviet to carry on Canadian propaganda from New York. Then loyal American stirred things up and a shipload of the Soviet workers were deported to Russia. More were arrested, so that Martens and his agents thought Canada safer and it was decided to establish new American headquarters in Montreal. The usual methods were adopted. That is, the propaganda offices were called a Trade Bureau. An intensive press campaign was carried on orders which they wanted to place with Canadian manufacturers. Representatives of important Canadian manufacturers and even prominent financiers went to Montreal and sat outside or entered, bat in hand, the gold-lined Soviet offices. Nuorteva himself came up to direct affairs. He went to Ottawa, where Cabinet ministers and leading financiers entertained him at the Rideau Club. He said the Canadian Government had officially recognized. All this was carefully wired to the States and alleged manufacturers began protesting at Washington that Canada was getting the business and that something must be done to please the Soviet.

Had No Money

As The Post pointed out, there was no money available, but Nuorteva represented that he was going to England to meet the Soviet mission and arrange for

the immediate transmission of millions of gold to Canada. Aided by his powerful Canadian friends, with fictitious passport, he was smuggled on board an ocean ship a few minutes before it sailed from Quebec. But the vigilant Allied Intelligence Service never let him out of their sight and immediately he landed in England he was arrested and thrown into prison. He claimed that he was a Finnish subject.

Finnish Method

"All right," said the British officer, "we will deport you to your own country."

"My God, don't send me there, they will shoot me!"—for the Finnish Government make short work of these world revolutionists whenever they turn up, and that is just what would have happened.

Then Moscow cabled that if he was landed in Finland they would shoot British prisoners in Russia. However, he was shipped, and then once more came the same hidden hand—one of the most important of its members died the other day—that, with its friends and agents in Washington and Ottawa, caused the release of Trotsky from Canada; that was responsible for so many extraordinary happenings in the war. It set to work in behalf of Nuorteva and before he was delivered to almost certain death at the hands of the Finnish Government he was taken by friendly authorities and started back for England. For a time he was lost to sight. Even the Bolsheviks could not find him. But about ten days ago Martens claimed that he was free and in Moscow. Evidently he is, for once more we are beginning to have the plausible stories of the underground propaganda being spread abroad by such decent newspapers as the Montreal Gazette and Toronto Mail.

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





NO POLITICS RAILWAYMEN

Employees of Canadian National
May Not Run for Political
Office.

Announcement by President D. B. Hanna, of the Canadian National railways, that employees of these railroads would not be allowed to run for political office, the penalty being dismissal from the road, aroused a storm of indignation and protest at the morning session of Division 4, department of Railway Employees, A. F. of L., which is in convention at the Labor Temple here, says the Winnipeg Free Press. It is the intention of the railroad employees to press to the limit for a cancellation of this order, for which they can see no adequate reasons.

The order issued by President Hanna regd at the meeting was contained in a wire sent to J. A. Robinson, of the Independent Labor party, Moncton, N. B. It was as follows: "Under no circumstances can an employee continue as such with the Canadian National railways and become a candidate for legislature, provincial or Dominion. The moment that he does so he automatically severs his connection with the railway. The reasons are too obvious for discussion.—D. B. Hanna." The last phrase of the message is puzzling to the employees, who do not admit the obviousness of the reasons, claiming that such is very far from the case.

Not Government Ruling.

This matter was taken up with Senator Gideon Robertson, minister of labor, who informed the employees that it was a ruling made by Mr. Hanna as president of the Canadian National and could in no way be interpreted as a ruling of the government. The division declared its determination to get a ruling in the matter so as to protect the rights of the workers on the system. The employees claimed that in working for the railroad they should not be called upon to surrender any rights whatever. It was stated that if the ruling of Mr. Hanna is maintained it would affect 60,000 workers throughout Canada.

The morning session was largely taken up with the preparation of rules and regulations for the new agreement. An effort will be made to establish a weekly pay system, payments being made in cash, instead of bi-monthly payments with cheques as at present. Election of officers will take place at the afternoon session.

SAME COMPANY TAKE ESPERANZA WHO ARE WORKING MOOSE MINE

W. A. Williams, Former Granby Superintendent, at Alice Arm starting New Operations.

W. A. Williams, formerly manager of the Granby Company's operations at Anyox, has gone to Alice Arm to superintend the planning of further development work on the Esperanza mine which was recently turned over by Pedro Salinas to a Vancouver syndicate. It is planned to start work almost at once and on account of the proximity to transportation, shipping will commence for the mine has already shipped some quantities of ore to the Granby smelter and at present there is a lot of ore lying sacked at the mouth of the tunnel.

Important Officials.

Discussing the deal which was recently reported in the Vancouver papers, Mr. Salinas said this morning that the property had been taken by the same interests that recently took over the Moose from Don Cameron. This company has taken the name the Moose Mining Company and P. W. Bacey, engineer in charge at the Moose, made the preliminary examinations for the sale just completed. E. W. Sylvester is the president and W. R. Ross, M.L.A., is the secretary. Speaking of the price, Mr. Salinas stated that the figure \$75,000 reported in Vancouver is not the real price as he did not get so much. He declined, however, to give the exact price.
