Preparations for Election on Dec. 1

BOTH LIBERALS AND CONSERVATIVES ARE BUSY LINING UP CANDIDATES

Government will Ask People for Renewal of Confidence

election to be held December 1 and Nominations November 10th; Expectation is Oliver Government will be returned by Large Majority.

VICTORIA, October 25.—At a full cabinet council meeting yesterday it was decided to make an immediate appeal to the people of the province for a mandate to continue the policies which have been so successful and to introduce new ones which are outlined to the people in the course of the campaign. The decision was unanimous in its decision.

The election day is set for Wednesday, December 1, and nominations will be received on November 10. It was the opinion of the cabinet that the people would prefer a short campaign to the long drawn out one which was the case in the election of 1917. A special dispatch to the Vancouver papers from Swanson Bay says that the decision to bring on the election as early as possible was made by the cabinet and that the ministers have agreed to meet their constituents and prepare for the election. The news of the election was received with great pleasure, it being the opinion that it was the best for the Government and the country for a renewal of confidence.

On Saturday it was announced that the Government will hold an election in the winter. The general opinion here is that the Government will be returned by a large majority.

Inspector Patterson who was on a rather extended tour of the interior has been busy with the opening of new schools and inspecting those already in existence. He was in the interior at the week end and will return to Prince Rupert in a few days. A new room has been added to the school building, this being the third school building in the district. New schools have been opened this year at Glenora, near Lake, while applications for new schools have been received from Kitwanga, Evelyn and other points. The number of pupils has been increased and the education department is busy providing for the new schools that come in.

Introduction of the Winkler cow scheme and Manitoba motion picture educational methods into the Saar Valley is to be undertaken by B. D. Waugh, formerly of Winnipeg, one of the international governing commissions of this German territory.

Provincial Bonds Go Up
 The bond market in British Columbia is showing a strong upward trend. The provincial bonds are being sold at a premium, and the market is expected to continue to rise.

POLITICIANS VERY ACTIVE

Full Tickets in Vancouver and Possibly in Victoria—Meetings Being Called.

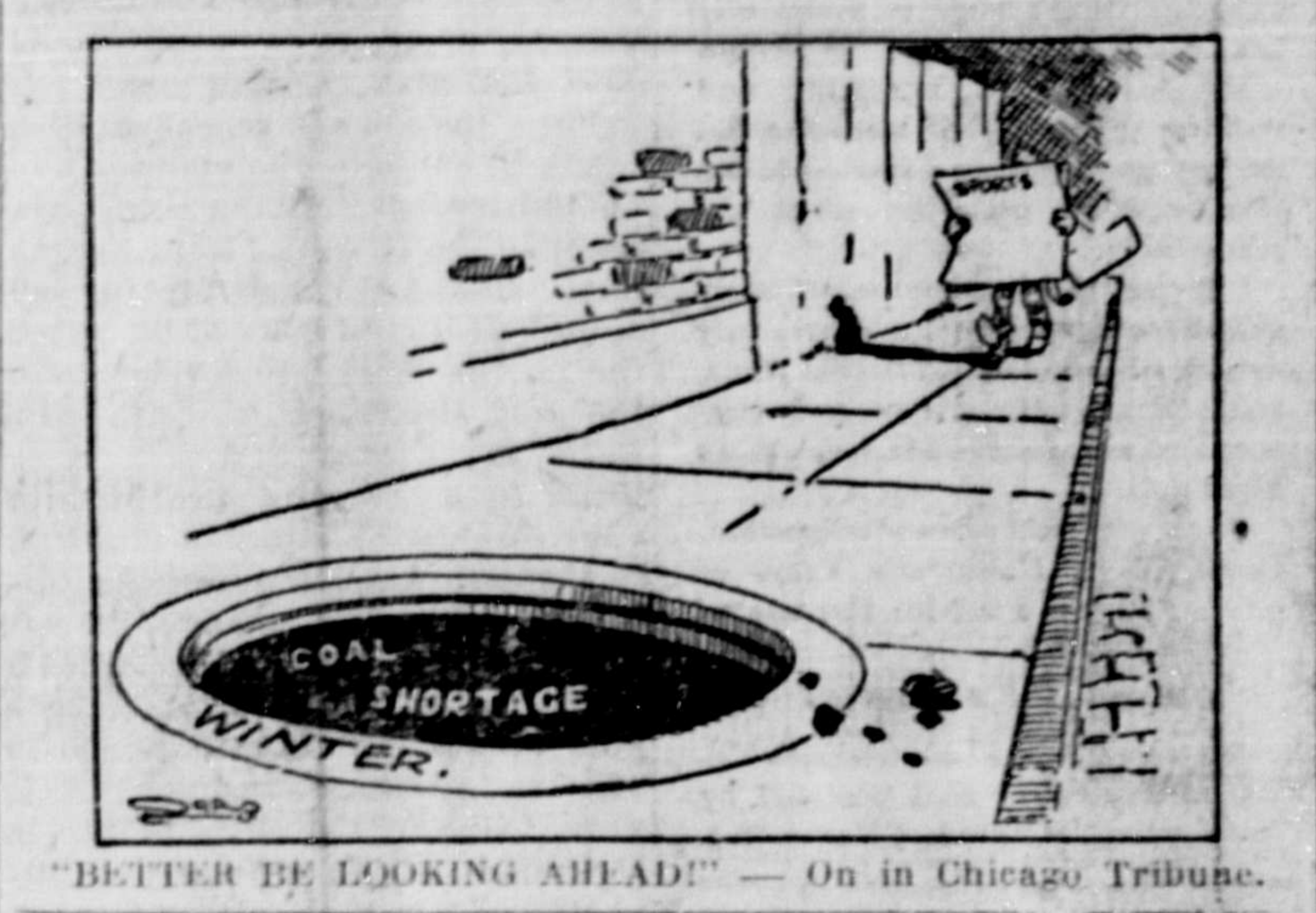
VANCOUVER, Oct. 25.—Both Liberals and Conservatives are very busy here arranging executive meetings and preparing for nominating conventions. A full ticket will be put in the field and it is quite probable that there will also be a full labor ticket. Word received from Victoria indicates that there is a similar activity, but whether labor will be fully represented there on nomination day is not yet known. Labor has never been very successful in that city except at the last Dominion election when Dr. Tolmie got the scare of his life from the Government. However, more than the interests of labor that caused the big vote. There was no Liberal in the field. The fight is largely one to decide whether it shall be Oliver or Bowser as leaders. There is no third possibility.

FOUND GUILTY OF DISLOYAL CONDUCT

Edmonton Alderman Presided at Meeting of Self-Determination League

EDMONTON, Oct. 25.—That Alderman James East was guilty of disloyal conduct when he presided, as acting mayor of the city, at the Katherine Hughes Irish Self-Determination League meeting held in the Pantages Theatre, was the finding of a special trial committee of three members of the G. W. V. A., which dealt with the charges made against Alderman James East by James Morledge. The trial result, coming before a general meeting of the Great War Veterans precipitated a debate in which members of the association lost their tempers and in which cross-fire arguments reached white heat. East, after a motion had been made that he be suspended from the association for a period of three months, and after amendments had been moved that he resign from the executive, was finally censured by the meeting as a punishment.

The charge made by Comrade Morledge of the Great War Veterans' Association was that Alderman James East had acted disloyally as a comrade of the Great War Veterans' Association at the Katherine Hughes meeting at which slanderous statements had been made against the British Army tending to create racial discord, and that Alderman James East in the capacity of acting mayor of the city, a member of the Great War Veterans' Association and as chairman of the meeting had evidenced approval of these statements by nods and gestures.



Conference Over Schedule of New Proposal to Miners

Lloyd George was discussing matter with experts this morning with a view to paying according to production

LONDON, October 25.—Premier David Lloyd George and members of his cabinet are conferring this morning with experts concerning a proposed new schedule. A proposal has been made for paying the miners according to production and this is being discussed and there is a possibility of its acceptance. In the meantime the miners are remaining on strike and there is a probability of the transport workers coming out unless something is done immediately.

ALEX. PRUDHOMME AGAINST MANSON

Alex. Prudhomme, rancher of Telkwa, has announced himself a candidate as an independent in Omineca riding against Alex. Manson. Mr. Prudhomme is well known here where he lived for many years. He is the president of the Interior Co-operative Association and owns the Savoy Hotel in this city.

BUSH OFFERS AS CANDIDATE

Would Contest Atlin Constituency in Interest of Miners and Prospectors.

VANCOUVER, October 25.—It is expected the Conservatives will hold their nomination November 2, and Liberals November 4. Mr. Bowser is making a tour of the Fraser Valley on the heels of the Premier. NEW WESTMINSTER, Oct. 25.—The Liberals of this city may ask Premier Oliver to be a candidate. D. Whiteside is not running. O. B. Bush is leaving for the north tonight. He promised a delegation of mining men and prospectors that he would be their candidate in the Atlin constituency.

BOWSER BUSY AT VANCOUVER

Says Conservatives Will Contest Every Riding in the Province.

VANCOUVER, October 25.—W. I. Bowser, leader of the Conservatives in the Legislature, says the Conservatives are contesting every riding. Grant of Nanaimo is opposing Hon. W. J. Sloan, and ex-Reeve Gordon of Oak Bay is opposing F. A. Pauline in Saanich. Clark will probably be opposing M. A. Jackson at Sidney and the Islands and in the Bulkley Alex. Prudhomme will probably be endorsed in opposition to Alex. M. Manson, member for Omineca. In Prince Rupert a candidate will be put up, probably a soldier.

MACSWINEY HAS PASSED AWAY

Died Early This Morning as Result of Long Continued Hunger Strike.

LONDON, Oct. 25.—Mayor MacSwiney of Cork is dead. He passed away early this morning as a result of a hunger strike which has been continued for 74 days. MacSwiney has been the centre of news interest for many weeks on account of his prominence. It was not expected he would live so long.

COFFERDAM IN CARRUTHERS

Trawler Expected to be Floated Tomorrow Night and Brought Here.

Work of salvaging the trawler James Carruthers is proceeding and it is hoped to get the vessel off tomorrow night and bring her here. A cofferdam has been built inside the fish hold which it is expected will enable the boat to float without difficulty. The damage to the Carruthers is rather serious. Several steel plates are altogether gone and other damage will have to be repaired. She will be taken out of the water here and a survey made by Mr. Gould, representing the San Francisco underwriters who is now in the city. Tenders will then be called for the work of repairing the vessel and the lowest tenderer will get the job.

Only Three Cars Arrived Last Night so Lots of Fish Goes to Cold Storage and One Boat Leaves.

Three express refrigerator cars arrived on last night's passenger train but this was not sufficient to cover the fish arrivals offering at the exchange, so a number of the boats had to sell at cold storage prices and one, the Olympic, went to Ketchikan with 14,000 pounds. 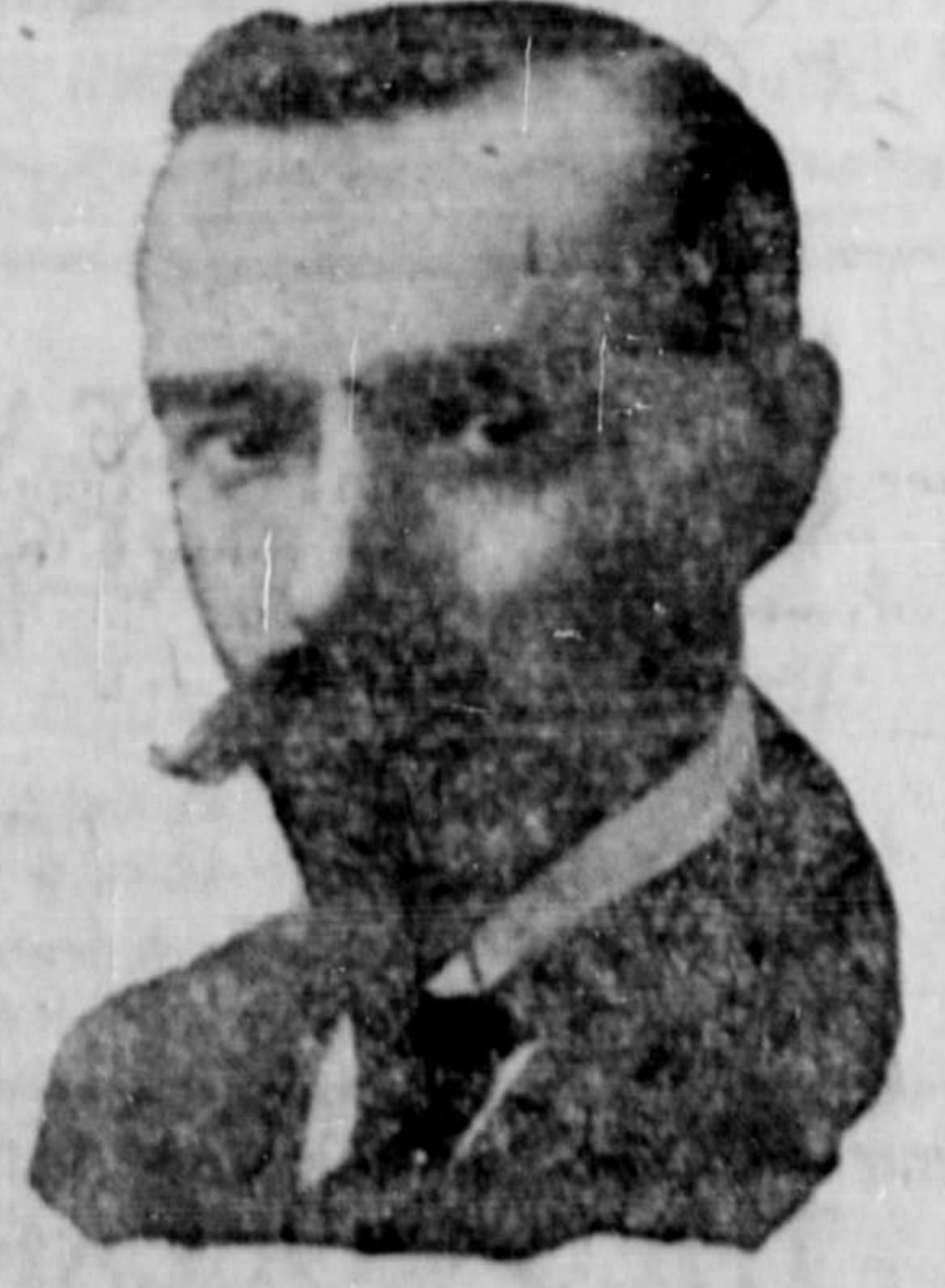
FEW DECLARE FOR THE VOTE

After October 30 No More Names Will be Taken for 1921 Municipal Voters' List

The same indifference in declaring for registration on the municipal 1921 Voters' List is evident this year as last according to City Clerk Woods. Although nearly 400 persons have paid their road tax and many of these, no doubt, are eligible to vote, only 25 have declared already. Last year there were 400 declarations in all.

It should be clearly understood that by paying the road tax a person does not automatically go on the Voters' List. Instead, all householders and licenseholders, as well as those persons who are holders of agreements of sale that are not registered at the Land Registry office, must make their declaration at the office of the City. This declaration must be made before 4 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, October 30.

Those who do not have to register are those who are owners of property in fee simple, those who are holders of registered agreements for sale and those whose names are registered on the city assessment roll. Their names go automatically on the voters' list. It might be noted that the act has been amended this year so as to include those persons holding unregistered agreements for sale and they have to declare like licenseholders or householders. The prime requisites, of course, to get on the Voters' List are that a person is a British subject of the full age of 21 years and has been resident in Prince Rupert since January 4, 1920.

**Provincial Election
 Is to be Held.**

There is to be another election and naturally one of the first things people will do will be to compare the two parties, their policies, their past records and their leaders. These are the natural things to consider.

The leader of the Government is John Oliver, the former premier, the man of the people, who took over the leadership on the death of the late Mr. Brewster and has guided provincial affairs through the most difficult period of history and has done it successfully. The leader of the opposition is W. J. Bowser, who took over the Government from the late Sir Richard McBride under curious circumstances and ran it to the ground. These are the leaders. There are no others.

In the matter of records, possibly the most essential difference has been in the matter of finance. Under the Bowser regime the financial condition of the province went so low that no one would lend the Government money. Under the Oliver regime the financial condition has steadily recovered until today a good price is obtained for provincial securities and the provincial credit is as high as that of any other province.

In regard to future policy it will be better for Premier Oliver and his associates to speak for themselves. They will doubtless do so within a day or two.

**How Will Women
 Vote at Election?**

When W. H. Taft addressed the Canadian Club, he quoted an opinion regarding women in politics to show that they were much the same as men. That is what we think, only better. In many things women have much better judgment than men. They have a sense of intuition that guides them where men blunder. That is why it seems reasonable to think women will vote for John Oliver and the present Government.

**Several Candidates
 Likely in Rupert.**

There are likely to be several candidates in this constituency. Undoubtedly Hon. T. D. Pattullo will again be in the field and everything points to his re-election. He will be formally endorsed by the Liberal party of the constituency, unless all signs fail. His good work in the past will recommend him for the future.

Another candidate who has announced himself without the formality of a convention of his supporters is S. M. Newton, leader of the Newtonites. He will use his paper as the lever with which he hopes to pry himself into the legislature. He will doubtless announce his policy in the near future.

Who the Conservative candidate will be is not known. When Mr. Bowser was here he practically gave instructions that a successful business man was to be chosen and sent to Victoria to help him legislate for the successful. It is to be assumed that a convention will be held very soon and a man chosen by the Conservatives, either a successful business man or some other person, just as the convention pleases without reference to the leader of the party. It will be interesting to see on whom the mantle of William Manson will fall.

There is also the possibility of labor candidates being in the field and there may be other self-nominated men and possibly a woman. No one can tell how many may feel themselves called on to help save their country. Several farmers live in the constituency, so there is the possibility of a farmer candidate. The political pot is scarcely simmering yet, but it will boil soon. Developments will be watched with great interest.

**U. S. Election
 Is Next Week.**

On Tuesday of next week, November 2, the United States people will decide who is to be the next president. In the meantime the two big parties are striving hard for the mastery. There is little doubt who will win, however. The Republicans are in the ascendancy and Harding, their nominee, is almost sure to be elected. All the appeals of President Wilson and the desire of many people to see the United States join the League of Nations will not save Cox, an estimable man but on the wrong side this time.

**PRODUCTION OF
 GOLD FALLING
 IN THE STATES**

Canada Holds Own According to Operators in the East.

PORCUPINE, Oct. 25.—Gold mine operators in Northern Ontario do not appear to share the views of certain interests in the United States that a bonus on gold is feasible. Yet, through fortune of circumstances, the gold mines of the Province of Ontario are now receiving a premium of more than a million dollars a year on the gold they produce. That this remarkable situation is causing a certain amount of worry in the United States is quite evident, and that the British policy in regard to its fostering of the gold mining industry of Africa is causing considerable envy, is also apparent.

For instance, representative Louis McFadden, Chairman of the Committee of Banking and Currency in the House of Representatives of the United States, and author of a gold bonus bill, asked the pertinent question relative to the gold situation:

"Is the United States to continue to ignore the problem of gold production, thus permitting the British Empire to gain an unquestionable supremacy?"

Mr. McFadden points with alarm to the decline in America's gold output from \$101,000,000 in 1915 to less than \$50,000,000 this year. One of the chief points in the mind of this outstanding advocate of a gold bonus appears to be that it is highly important that the gold mining industry should be kept alive for fear that with greatly reduced production there will be difficulty in retaining the gold standard during a popular campaign for credit restriction, accompanied by declining prices.

As regards the situation in Canada, and more especially the district of Timiskaming in Northern Ontario, it is a noteworthy fact that the gold output is being increased rather than undergoing a decline. The production of the gold from the Porcupine and Kirkland Lake fields alone is equal to nearly one-quarter the total gold output of the United States. Not only this, but with sufficient workmen available this output in Northern Ontario could be quickly increased another fifty per cent and be made equal to more than one-third of the total United States production of this metal.

GIVE UP STARR SEARCH

Heavy Snowfall Ends Immediate Hope of Finding Brother of Local Man

With the return to Seattle late Tuesday of three police officers, all search for William H. Starr, Seattle hunter, missing in the Lake Serene country near Index since a week ago Wednesday, was abandoned, says the Seattle Times. Lieut. George H. Comstock and Patrolman Harry F. Mull and K. H. Gustafson, who had planned a search of their own for their former friend, returned with the news that two feet of freshly fallen snow blocked any attempt to find Starr's body for the present.

W. H. Starr is the brother of C. E. Starr, manager of the Pacific Fisheries here. Mr. Starr went south on Tuesday evening last.

**FEARS RATS AS WELL
 AS LICE MAY SPREAD
 DISEASE IN CANADA**

REGINA, Oct. 23.—The westward movement of rats involves considerable risk of an epidemic of bubonic plague, in the opinion of Dr. Seymour, Commissioner of Public Health for Saskatchewan. "What might happen," asks Dr. Seymour, "if a million gophers became infected with the disease?" Rats, he pointed out, were already reported half-way between Winnipeg and Regina.

Dr. Seymour also declared medical men were much concerned as to the possibility of an epidemic of typhus being introduced into Canada and America by an infected house, with southern European immigrants as the agency. Dr. Seymour's alarms were voiced on his return from the annual convention of the American Public Health Association in San Francisco.

BRINGING UP FATHER

URGE WORKERS INTO POLITICS

Mrs. Rose Henderson Says They Are Capable of Administering Affairs of Country.

The desirability of workingmen taking an interest in politics and having their own representatives in parliament was the principal theme of the address given last night in the McIntyre Hall by Mrs. Rose Henderson, lecturing under the auspices of the Women's Auxiliary of the O. B. U. She said that there were two functions in society, one was to eat that they might live, and the other to live that they might eat. In order to carry out these functions it was necessary to produce and distribute. Production should be looked after by the industrial arm of the Government and distribution by the political. Labor, she declared, was not only fit to govern but was going to govern in the future.

What is Wrong?

In opening she said they were present that evening to find out what was wrong with society and to how to put it right. There were but two classes, one that owned the tools of production, the press, the schools and colleges and the land, while the others were the wage earners. Some people said there would always be rich and poor, but evolution taught that there was nothing staid in society. She told of a visit to Germany nine years ago where she had seen the evolution of man illustrated by means of skulls. We were not fallen angels but were evolving upwards and there was still room for great improvement, and that improvement was still going on. The light of science had been brought to bear on every phase of life. There was progress shown on every hand. Industries were filled with the genius of men.

Being Robbed.

The lady lecturer asserted that the workers were being robbed and they must decide how to stop the robbery. Science came to their help and showed how it could be done.

Mrs. Henderson asserted that civilization was collapsing and nothing could bolster it up. As the ripe fruit fell and rotted so civilization was rotten ripe and must fall in the same way that other civilizations had fallen. She quoted Babylon, Egypt and Rome, where all the property was in the hands of a few and she asserted that 26 men in Canada owned the country body and soul. There were today millions of people who had no place to lay their heads. There was an army of wage slaves who had nothing but their labor to sell and when they could not sell that they had nothing to do but lie down or revolt. The masses were rising and revolting in every nation.

Use Intelligence.

Mrs. Henderson said labor not only produced but could administer more efficiently than any government had yet done. She told of the ability of labor men in Great Britain. In Italy and Mexico labor was taking part in the Government. She urged her hearers to use their intelligence and liberate themselves and all humanity.

Songs were given by Mrs. Swanson accompanied by Mr. Fanthorpe.

On Saturday night Mrs. Henderson addressed a well attended meeting and she also spoke to the women in the afternoon of Sunday. On Thursday next she will address the League for Self-determination for Ireland, at the same hall.

ALICE ARM LOST ROAD

When Engineer Carruthers Commenced Building Indignation Meeting was Called as to Location.

ALICE ARM, October 25.—Work on the government road between Alice Arm town and the wharf was commenced by Engineer A. L. Carruthers here a couple of weeks ago but came to a sudden suspension.

Men were all ready to start the work and the plans had been all drawn up for the building of the road on the flat above the railroad track between the wharf and town when an indignation meeting was called down town. Representations were made that the proper place to build the new road was not above the track but on the water side of it. The people said they would rather have no road at all than have it above the track.

Difference in Cost.

As there is a natural plateau above the track, roadbuilding would be quite a simple matter and a crossing to town could have been made near the railroad depot. The total cost would quite likely come within the appropriation of \$15,000 for the work. On the other hand to build the road on the sea side of the railway would necessitate deep filling all the way and Engineer Carruthers felt that it could not be done for less than \$45,000.

There was only one thing to do and that was done. Roadbuilding operations were immediately suspended and the men and materials taken out. The Alice Arm people still have no road from the town to the wharf this year. The road plan on the upper side of the track has been abandoned, but it is likely that the road will ultimately be put in below. Minister of Lands Pattullo has expressed himself as hopeful.

RAILWAY CONTRACTOR HAS OPENED OFFICE

S. S. Magoffin Takes Big Quarters in the Hays Block

S. S. Magoffin & Co., railway contractors are opening up their Prince Rupert office in the commodious quarters in the Hays Block at the corner of Second Avenue and Second Street recently vacated by David H. 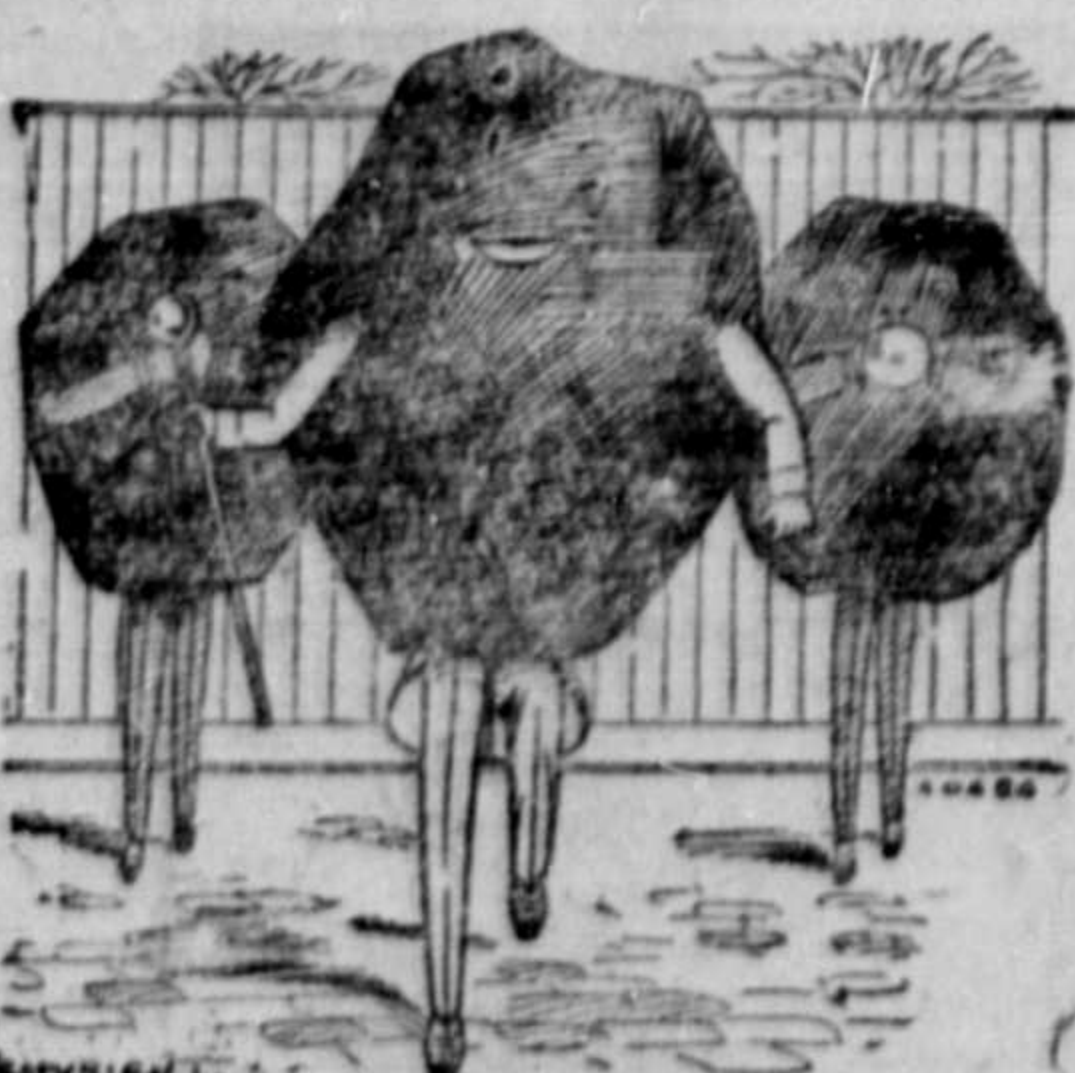

PRESS RIGHTS ARE UPHELD

Mr. Justice Morrison Says It is One of the Penalties of Holding Proceedings in Public.

VICTORIA, Oct. 25.—The right of the newspaper press to make any legitimate use it chooses to do of what actually is said in a public court room was affirmed by Mr. Justice Morrison, during the course of an application, in Supreme Court Chambers, in connection with the pending suit of Finlayson versus Martin. The learned judge remarked on an account in a Vancouver newspaper of the adjourned Chamber proceedings in the case last Monday, that it seemed to be a correct report of what counsel had said; and he added that press publicity was one of the penalties of holding court proceedings in public.

The matter was brought into court by C. S. White, counsel for Mr. Justice Martin, of the Court of Appeal, who said that a great deal of publicity had been given in the press of the country to a slanderous statement reported to have been made by M. B. Jackson, K.C., counsel for Miss Finlayson, who is engaged in litigation with Judge Martin in respect of five mortgages she holds on certain Victoria property belonging to the judge.

Counsel's Statement.
Mr. White said that Mr. Jackson was reported to have said in court that Mr. Justice Martin did not want any lawyer to act against him. Counsel contended that this was a very serious statement. It was a wanton attack on his client; who was not in a position to defend himself from it. It had been one-sidedly reported, and made much of, in a Canadian Press report, which had been widely circulated throughout the country, and which was injurious to the interests of Judge Martin. Mr. White asked that the learned judge should require Mr. Jackson to withdraw the statement.

Could Not Repress.
Mr. Jackson was about to reply NAVIGABLE WATERS, PROTECTION ACT.

LABORER GOES TO TRAIN VOICE

Leaves Toronto for Academy of Music at Naples as Result of Discovery

TORONTO, Oct. 25.—Fame—or at least the beginning of it—has come to Domenico Narduzzi, a local Italian laborer. Narduzzi left for New York on his way to "the land of the azure skies," where he is to take up studies in music and vocal development at the world-famous Academy of Music of Naples.

Narduzzi, who served during the war in Bersaglieri Regiment, returned to Canada at the beginning of last year. According to some of his fellow-countrymen, he was always considered a splendid singer, but it was while on a trip to Detroit, when he sang at an Italian charity concert, that his remarkable tenor voice was recognized at once as one of a potential master by a fellow-Italian who has made a fortune in the fruit business in Detroit.

Paid Expenses
The rich compatriot promised to assist Narduzzi, and the result is that the singer left for his native country, the expenses of the trip and the studies to be borne by the Detroit man.

When the reporter called last night at the rooming house on Adelaide Street West, where Narduzzi lived, he was surrounded by enthusiastic countrymen, who later in the evening accompanied him to the station.

Sang for Reporter
On request Narduzzi took the floor between the rows of beds which crowded the room and began to sing with considerable ardor and dramatic effect. His hearers listened and watched him with keen interest. In the confused and manifestly enthusiastic comment which followed the selection, the reporter could only catch the words, "incomparable" and "grandiose."

The Italians went to the Union Station and bade "Addio" to Narduzzi, who smiled happily as he received the embraces of many friends.

PRINCE RUPERT NOT ON RAILWAY MAP

Business Men of City Take Exception to Manner in Which City is Treated.

Some of the business people of Prince Rupert are worried over one of the new time cards of the Canadian National Railways which bears out all that the opponents of nationalization of the G. T.
