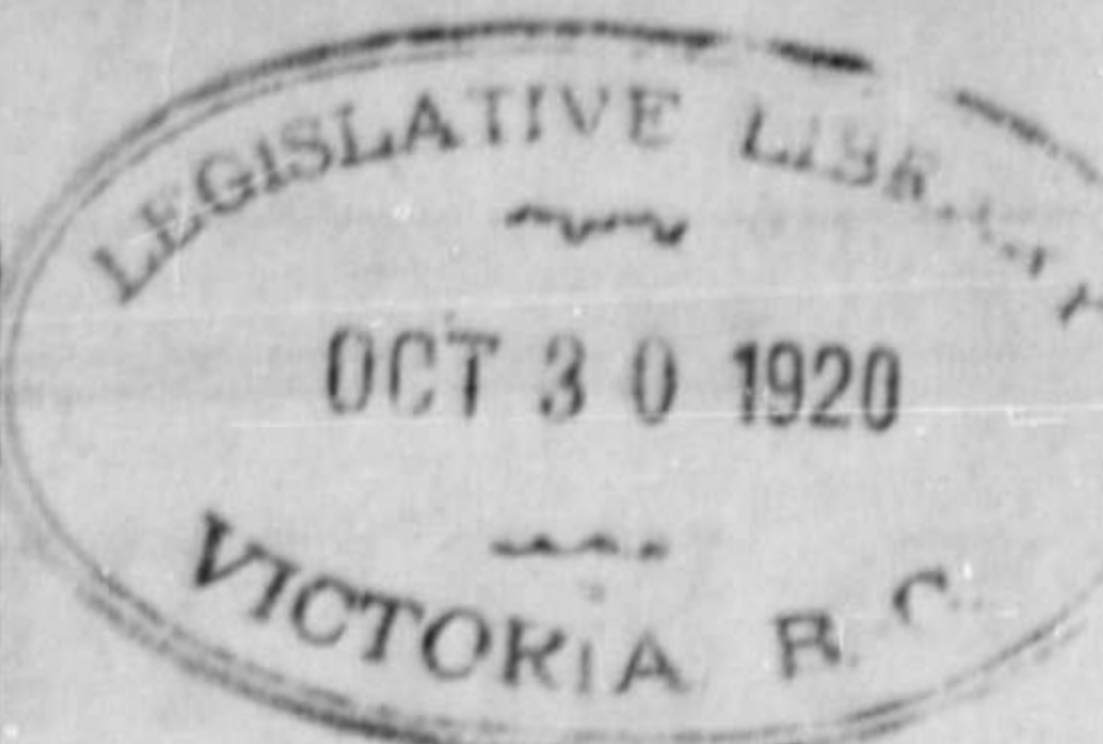

## ONE DRY PLEBISCITE CARRIES FOUR PROVINCES

## GOOD WORK BEING DONE BY PRINCE RUPERT YARDS, SAYS ENGLISH EXPERT

### Four Provinces Go Bone Dry Big Importation Plebiscite

Winnipeg gives large majority for wets, and most of cities follow suit, but all rural districts are against liquor

VANCOUVER, October 26.—Late returns indicate that Manitoba has gone dry although Winnipeg and other cities are wet by majorities. Alberta and Nova Scotia have majorities of the dry majority in Saskatchewan is about ten thousand.

WINNIPEG, October 26.—With formidable majorities virtually all the rural constituencies of Manitoba went bone dry, the city being around 15,000. Winnipeg had a negative majority.

HALIFAX, October 26.—The dry majority for Nova Scotia is estimated to be over 40,000. This is the only city that voted wet. Other places went dry.

EDMONTON, October 26.—In Saskatchewan the latest returns show a majority of about 10,000, Regina going wet by a small majority. Alberta has a 15,000 majority, even Calgary giving a majority for the stopping of importation into the province. The result of the vote is evidently that the four provinces are unanimous to stop importation of liquor or malt beverages from outside. The majorities are so large that there will be no question of a referendum. The feature of the contest is that cities almost invariably were wet whereas the rural districts were bone dry.

### CITY COUNCIL AND DRYDOCK

Committee Appointed Last Night  
to Discuss Financial Affairs  
With Government  
Representative.

A committee consisting of Acting Mayor Dybhavn and Aldermen Rochester and Perry was delegated by the city council last night to interview, in conjunction with Col. Peck, M.P., H. A. Butt, the government representative who is in the city, in connection with dry dock affairs. It is understood that Mr. Butt is here in connection with the adjustment of certain affairs in regard to the operation of the plant and the situation is considered to be getting critical.

"I have come to the conclusion," said Ald. Rochester, "that the time has come for an adjustment of affairs. Ever since Erb has had the plant there has been some dissatisfaction. Men have come and had to leave and things have been generally unsatisfactory."

Acting Mayor Dybhavn counseled that the mission of the representative be learned and it was on his suggestion that the committee was named.

### Shipbuilder Here for the Government

"So far as I can see there is no complaint against anyone locally in connection with the work at the shipyard," said H. A. Butt this morning in conversation with the Daily News. The people locally are not to blame for the condition of affairs at the yard. There is a capable staff and a good body of workmen. The yard is a good one and quite capable of handling not only the two ships there now but others. The management seems quite capable and everything, so far as the work is concerned, is going well.

Mr. Butt was outside manager for Camell Laird in the Old Country. He is a practical shipbuilder and knows what he is talking about. He came to this country recently and spent a few weeks at the shipyard at Three Rivers. Then he offered his services to the government and was sent out here to investigate with a view to making recommendations. He seems to be very pleased with the local end of the business. Beyond that he refused to commit himself. He will be in town for several days.

### PATTULLO WILL TOUR DISTRICT

Seen at Prince George in Vancouver Last Night Says  
Will Tour North.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 26.—Before leaving for the North last night on the Prince George, Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands and member for Prince Rupert, said that he expected to make an extensive tour of the northern part of the province. He said that there had been such a great deal of talk about an election that the cabinet had simply decided to go to the people at once to get the election over with before Christmas.

Questioned in regard to matters of policy, the minister said that, in his opinion, there were

many questions of greater importance than the moderation question. That matter had already been decided by the people.

### Strike Loss in England on Railways Very Great

Country loses two to three million pounds weekly as  
result of cessation of work by the miners;  
Conference continues

LONDON, October 26.—The miners held a meeting again today to discuss the strike situation. No conclusion was reached at the conference yesterday.

In the House of Commons, the minister of transport said the strike was causing a loss to the railways of between two and three million pounds a week.

The emergency bill providing for protection against public disorder was debated and referred to a committee.

### FISHERMAN CHARGED SUPPLYING LIQUOR

Harry Ross Makes Trips to Digby  
Island and Arrived Last Time  
With 12 Pounds.

Harry Ross, charged with supplying liquor to William Shaw, an Indian of the Kitkatla tribe, was in the police court this morning and was remanded until tomorrow to allow him to produce witnesses in his own defence.

Shaw and another Indian, Stephen Ridley, in giving evidence told of the accused offering to sell them whiskey and "jackie," lemon extract. Finally he had brought some of the extract to their room and left it there.

Ross said he had not met the Indians in question last night. He was a fisherman by trade and on the last trip had come in with a 12-pound catch. He and his partner had a small boat and fished for halibut on the other side of Digby Island. Their catches were not very large and they just got enough to do them.

William Shaw, himself, was charged with having liquor in his possession and was also remanded until tomorrow.

### MEIGHEN WAS INTERRUPTED AT WINNIPEG

Defended Course of the Dominion  
Government and Referred to  
"Jig Dancing" of King.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 26.—Numerous interruptions marred to some extent the speech of Premier Meighen at the meeting here last night. The address was featured by the defence of the Government's course during the past three years. He made an attack on what he called the "political jig dancing" of Mackenzie King in the present western tour. He also made a statement regarding the Government's policy on the tariff.

### GREEK KING PASSED AWAY

Died as Result of Monkey's Bite;  
Succeeded by His Brother  
Paul.

ATHENS, October 26.—King Alexander of Greece, who was recently bitten by a pet monkey, died last night and it is officially announced that the crown has been offered to Prince Paul.

Alexander was a son of Constantine, the pro-German who was forced to give up the throne and retire. He was born in 1893 and was a nephew of Wilhelm of Germany. He succeeded to the throne June 12, 1917, on the expulsion of his father.

Prince Paul is only nineteen years of age. His older brother Prince George, who was also older than the dead king, was excluded from the succession by the same ultimatum of the Powers that dethroned his father. He has three sisters.

### MURDER CHARGE

Bitter Speeches Made in Ireland  
Following Death of  
MacSwiney.

LONDON, Oct. 26.—Following the death of Mayor MacSwiney there are reports from Ireland of bitter speeches charging murder by the English. No serious disorders are reported.

Register Now  
For City Vote.

Those who wish to vote in the municipal election in January must register now or they will find themselves disqualified. The local elections have nothing to do with provincial affairs. The lists are quite separate, the qualifications for each being on a different basis.

Those who own property in the municipality do not need to register, but all others should do so. The necessary forms can be filled out at the City Hall. Everyone should remember to do this at once. It is bad policy to leave it till the last minute.

Treatment of  
Prince Rupert.

It is the usual history of the struggle of a comparatively small place for recognition, that Prince Rupert is going through. She has to fight her way. We may be divided on matters of politics and also into wet and dry camps, but when it comes to standing by our city and her rights there is no reason for dissension and there is none.

The Canadian National Railways apparently have two time tables. One of these practically ignores Prince Rupert, putting her on a branch line. The other gives her prominence. Which of these has the large circulation and which the small, we do not know. It is certain, however, that those who get the yellow folder will find it difficult to realize that Prince Rupert is the terminus of a transcontinental railway.

Elections Bring  
Much Billingsgate.

The election will bring out a flood of Billingsgate or something very closely approaching it. Reckless charges will be flung by irresponsible persons whose former charges have been shown to be without foundation. There are people who must always be attacking someone. Those who have lived here a good many years are used to it and do not mind. They find it a subject for levity. Newcomers may wonder what it all means. For their benefit we may mention that it is the fruit of a disordered mind. No man in his senses would ever be guilty of such lingual lapses. Billingsgate is for old country fish wives. Do not mind it. It does not hurt anybody and only reacts on the one who uses it.

Liquor Fight  
Now in Scotland.

In view of the fight against the use of liquor in the Old Country, the following from the London Times is interesting: "The people of Scotland are to vote on the liquor question. The campaign foreshadows the sharper struggle that may follow in England, sharper because the law under which the poll is to be taken in Scotland is nine years old. The act was designed to 'promote temperance,' and it offers the choice to voters of having no change, of reducing the existing licences by 25 per cent., or of abolishing licences. But even if 'no licence' is adopted by an area, the licensing court is still to have the power of granting one or more certificates for an inn or hotel; and there is no provision against the private consumption of liquor, the possession of liquor, the sale of liquor for such consumption, or the transport and manufacture of liquor. Meanwhile opinion has hardened. The stringent conditions regulating the sale of drink, introduced during the war, were accompanied by a great reduction in drunkenness. But many other factors were involved, such as the absence of a large proportion of the adult male population. Since 1918, although the relaxation of the regulations has been slight, there has been a disquieting and apparently progressive increase in convictions for drunkenness. Finally, the drastic American experiment has inflamed the aspirations of those opposed to the consumption of alcohol and has heightened the anxiety of all others. On the one side prohibition is being openly advocated; on the other, reasonable freedom zealously defended. Whatever be the result of the present poll, it will be followed by a vigorous campaign for prohibition in the absolute sense, and if England comes to have the drink problem submitted to a popular vote, the issue presented will be more definite."

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

## BRINGING UP FATHER



## EARLY CLOSING BYLAW CHANGED

City Stores Close 6 O'clock After November 15—Special Late Hours Fair Week.

At last night's meeting of the city council a new bylaw regulating the closing of city stores was put through the various stages and passed. The bylaw follows a petition submitted by 69 out of 79 city merchants and its passing was compulsory to the council as the petition represented more than the necessary 75 per cent. of the city merchants.

Under the new ruling stores shall, after November 15, close at 6 o'clock on the ordinary week evenings, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. This, and a provision for the remaining of stores open till 10 o'clock on the nights of fair week each year, mark the only changes from the bylaw which is, at the present time, in effect. Stores shall remain open till 10 o'clock on Saturdays and the nights before holidays as before and for the ten days before Christmas can stay open as late as desired. Special note was made in the bylaw that this shall not interfere with the provincial Half Holiday Act.

## ALDERMAN M'LENNAN COMMENDS THE PRESS

The item in yesterday's News regarding the protest in regard to the apparent ignoring of Prince Rupert in a C. N. R. timetable was the subject of brief discussion at last night's council meeting having been brought up by Ald. Kerr. "I have not seen the timetable in question," said Ald. ## CITY SOLICITOR HAS GOOD REPORT

## Proposal to Fly to Recently Discovered Oil Wells from Edmonton

EDMONTON, Oct. 26.—The establishment of an aerial route from Edmonton to the oil fields of Fort Norman on the Mackenzie River is the latest talked-of development in connection with the pressing transportation problem existing as a result of the Fort Norman point being so far removed from the business centres of Alberta.

Edmonton aviators are entering into negotiations for such a service with a zest indicating that as little time as possible will be wasted in the preliminary arrangements.

It is understood that the matter has already been discussed by local flying men with officials of the Imperial Oil company, the concern which has made known the valuable Fort Norman oil strike. The proposal is a big one in that it calls for the establishment of landing stages at intervals along the line of route, and the transportation, in the first instance, before flying, of gasoline and other essentials for the successful operation of flying machines.

### 900 Miles as Crow Flies

Fort Norman is situated about nine hundred miles north of this city, as the crow flies. The span is not a great one, as applied to flying distances, and three or four days at the most would be sufficient to accomplish the distance when once a relay service of planes is established.

The whole idea is looked upon with favor, and while its introduction might not become an accomplished fact until the spring of 1921, anticipations can be held that such a service will become actual with the spring of next year. Some talk exists that a few trips could be made during the present season of good weather.

## Ten Years Ago

Navigation on the Skeena is about closing for the winter. The Islander is to make one more trip to Hazelton, and the Hazelton will go to Harderabble. The Distributor and the Omineca are going to Digby for the winter and the Port Simpson will also be laid up. The railway camps are well supplied, according to Vernor Smith.

The Kitsumkalam River bridge has been completed and Superintendent Mehan expects that trains will soon be running as far as Mile 100, near Vanarsdol.

Council Pleased with Document  
Submitted Last Evening—Aid.  
Perry Compliments.

"The city is indebted to Mr. Hooper for this report," said Ald. Perry. "It is a most interesting and creditable one and meets my idea of what a report ought to be."

In laying the report over for a week Acting Mayor Dybbavn stated that the rest of the council would doubtless concur in Ald. Perry's remarks.

## FRANK SALTER WANTS MATHEISON'S OFFICE

Resignation and Application for Building Inspector Job Received by City Council.

The resignation of Building Inspector W. A. Matheson has been accepted by the city council and a letter from Frank Saller making application for the position was last night referred to the board of works on motion of Alderman Rochester and Alderman Perry. The application of Mr. Saller was also qualified with a separate recommendation from the Great War Veterans' Association who urged that the city needed the office of building inspector to be carried on.

In speaking of the suggestion that the office of building inspector be allowed to lapse, Mr. Salto suggested that the city could ill afford to do this. Even if there was little new building there was, nevertheless, much inspection work that should not be neglected.

## MINING ENGINEER VISITS BONANZA

J. B. Galloway, district mining engineer, came up from Hazelton to Smithers on Saturday and made a trip out to the Babine Bonanza to inspect the showing opened up by Mr. Cronin in the course of the development of that property. He returned to Smithers on Monday and to the Interior News he stated that Mr. Cronin had opened up a great vein. He was hopeful that the final success of Mr. Cronin on the long tunnel he had run would result in turning the eyes of the mining men to this district. Mr. Galloway states that is a result of the visit of the Spokane men who are interested with Mr. Cronin in the property it has been decided to continue drifting on the vein by hand, pending the arrival of machinery. The roads to the mine are in wretched condition following the recent rains and it is almost impossible to take in supplies. As the stock of provisions is running low the continuation of operations will depend on an improvement of the roads, but to this end the government is giving every assistance and a crew is now at work fixing up the worst spots.

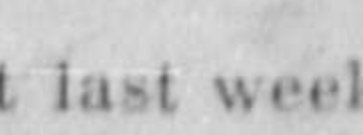

### ASK DESIGNS FOR NEW TRAMWAY CARS

Prize of \$5,000 Offered by London County Council

The London County Council is inviting engineers and others possessing the requisite technical knowledge to submit designs for a new type of electric tramway-car for use on its system.

The competition is open to persons of any nationality whether resident in Great Britain or not. A prize of \$5,000 will be awarded to the competitor who sends in the design which is decided by the assessors to be the best. A. L. C. Fell, general manager of the company's tramways, and an engineer nominated by the president of the Institution of Civil Engineers will act as assessors.

### ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION

Surgeon of Sir Edward Shackleton's Party Goes to Southern Regions

A new British Antarctic Expedition is now on its way to its base at Port Stanley, in the Falkland. The commander, John L. Gope, who was a surgeon with Sir Edward Shackleton's party, left London. At Port Stanley he will join the rest of the party, consisting of Captain Wilkins, M.C., W. T. Bagshawe, geologist, M. C. Lester, navigator and surveyor to the party, and a seaman of the Royal Navy.

From the Falkland Islands the expedition will be taken by a whaling vessel to the Weddell Sea, and there landed on the ice during January. The party hope to survey hitherto unexplored regions, but no attempt will be made to reach the Pole, the expedition being purely geographical and biological. A cinematograph camera is included in the equipment of the expedition. At the end of 18 months or so the party will return to England, by which time a specially-built ship and a large aeroplane will be ready for a further expedition, which is expected to be of five years' duration.

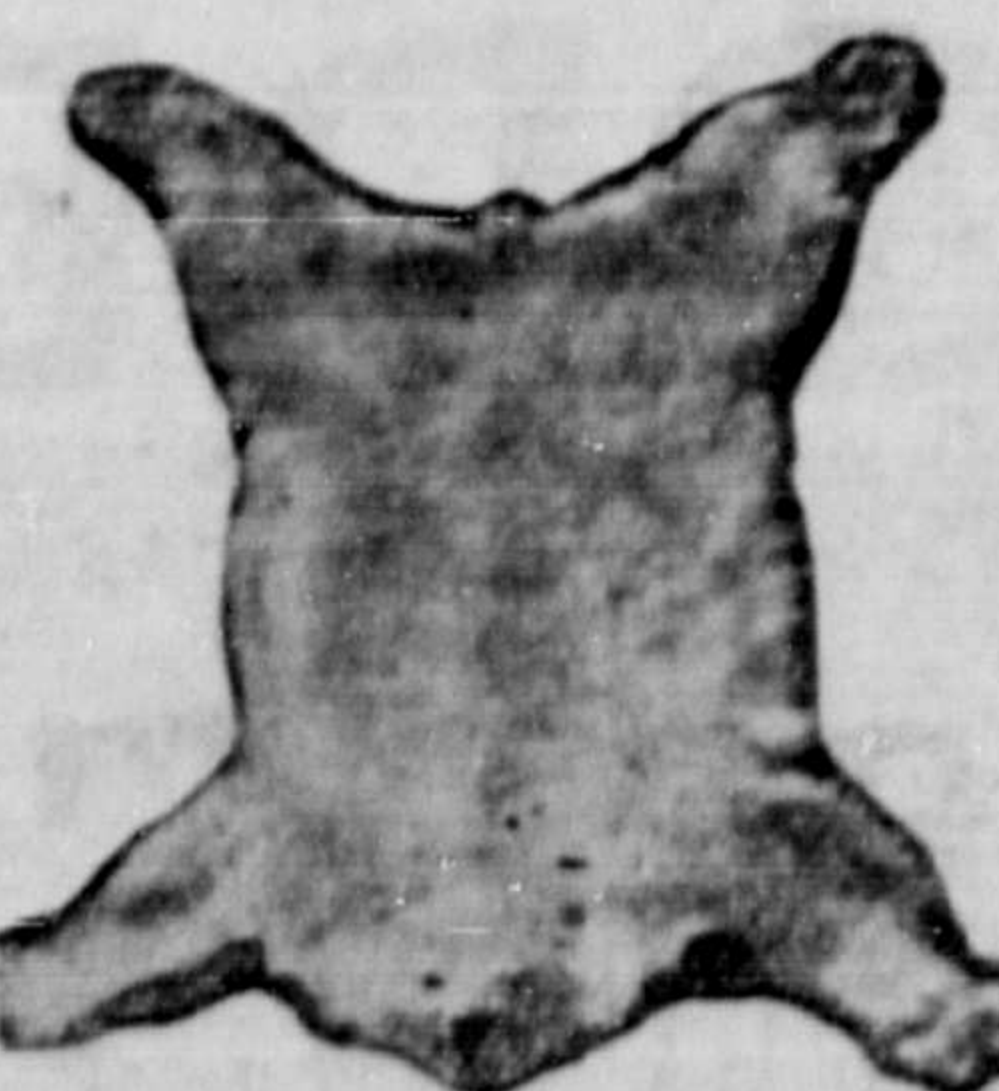

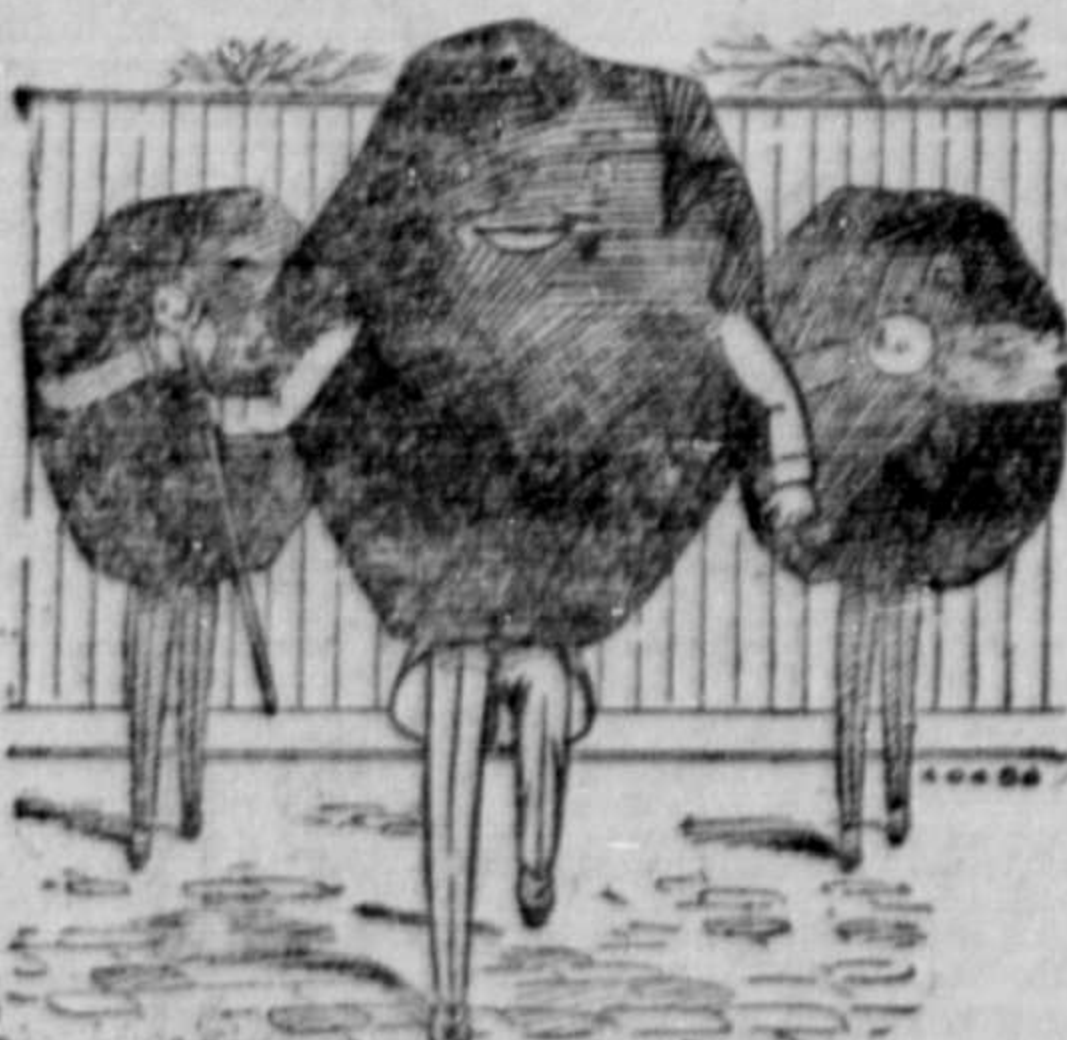
