Soldiers Critical at Meighen Meeting

PRINCE RUPERT COURTHOUSE TENDERS CALLED TO BE IN BY NOVEMBER 25

Premier Meighen Jeered by Soldiers at Vancouver

Hon. J. A. Calder heckled but Premier silences his opponents
by quick repartee; deals with all questions of the day

VANCOUVER, October 30.—At both the great ballroom at the Vancouver Hotel and the New Allen Theatre, Premier Meighen tonight made his initial appearance before Vancouver audiences under his assumption of his present high office. Many people turned away from both places. This was the premier's first speech during his present tour.

The premier promised to try to eliminate delays in sending the Oriental mails. He said his Government was considering the appointment of a customs officer at New York to facilitate the movement of goods to Pacific ports of Canada. This is an old question and in the past the Government has definitely refused to consider the proposal.

Meighen promised to consider the demand that the stamp collection machines be eliminated as a nuisance. Practically all the current topics of the day were dealt with by either the premier or Hon. J. A. Calder at the two meetings, including the tariff, settlement and pensions, establishment, the sugar on the National Railways.

He had an occasional interruption from the Government's opponents. The premier was given a good attentive hearing. A contingent from the Grand Army of the Republic marched to the theatre and badly heckled Calder, but the quick repartee of the premier made heckling him difficult. At times, however, the hecklers were monotonous.

Answers Accusation
In answer to the accusation that the Government was placing without calling tenders, the premier said, "I am quite sure, quite true. We need tenders and you need orders. If I had called for tenders you would have got the order to build the ships. Shipping in Vancouver cost \$10 a ton more than in the East. If we had called for tenders by tender the cost would have been \$10 a ton more. I believe the gratuities would enable the men to settle down quickly than the system proposed by the Government."

Replies to King
Mr. Meighen replied to the speech of W. L. Mackenzie King at Prince Albert on Thursday in which that Liberal claimed only one per cent of the Federal expenditures was devoted to agriculture. He said that the Government was expending \$5,000,000 on the development of agriculture throughout Canada. This was several times greater than the amount expended on the department when Mr. King was a member of the Government. This five million dollars did not include the program for agricultural development for the special benefit of returned men, on which alone about \$76,000,000 already had been expended and which ultimately contemplates an expenditure of about as much more.

Answers Question.
In answer to questions fired at him from the hall, Mr. Meighen said the Land Settlement Board

had cost the people of Canada only actual legal expenses and the cost of appraisal of the land. They had lately been able to reduce the legal expenditures to less than \$10 for each parcel of land handled. "I am sure that each lawyer here will realize how small that fee is," he added. Further reductions had also been made in the cost of operating by the use of returned men wherever possible, so that the average cost of actually placing the men on the land was only about \$150 each.

Mr. Meighen gave the average output per man who was assisted under the Settlement Act as \$2,500 while the percentage of men not successful for any reason was 3.7 per cent. The Government's security, however, was so substantial that loss from these causes was practically negligible.

SHIPYARD TO CLOSE DOWN

Notice Posted that Work will
Cease on Monday if Cash
Not Available.

SHOWDOWN WITH ERB OF NEW YORK

No Indication of What Step the
Government Will Take to
Complete Ships.

A crisis in the affairs of the Prince Rupert Drydock and Engineering Co. seems to have been reached. Notice has been posted on the gates that unless money to carry on is forthcoming by Monday evening the works will shut down.

While officials are reluctant to say anything about the state of affairs, it is known that not only are the wages unpaid for some time past, but also there is a large sum owing to local merchants, amounting to something like \$60,000. Some of this has been owing for a long time.

Is a Shutdown.

H. A. Butt, representing the Dominion Government, reached here recently and went over the plant and made estimate of the cost of completing the ships. Just what is intended to be done, however, no one seems to know. The general opinion is that the bonding company, which has a guarantee bond of \$320,000, will have to put up the cash to carry out the work. It looks like a showdown between the Government and Newman Erb.

The general opinion seems to be that the Government will take over the yard and complete the ships or turn the contracts and the yard over to another concern.

Must Have Money.

It is impossible to continue further without money as there are no supplies available.

Had the yard continued for another three or four weeks, a ship would have been ready to take the water, and then the Government would have made a payment on account.

Tenders Are Called for New Court House Here

Plans and Specifications will arrive next week and bids must be in by November 25; Permanent Structure Arranged

VICTORIA, October 30.—Tenders are being called by the Minister of Public Works for the erection and completion of a court house at Prince Rupert, the tenders to include the heating arrangements in connection therewith. After November 4 the plans and specifications may be seen in the office of J. H. McMullin, government agent at Prince Rupert.

The tenders are all to be in by November 25 and it is expected that the contract will be let immediately thereafter.

It is understood that the building is to be a fine one of a permanent character. There have been difficulties in connection with financing this and other improvements, but the improved financial condition of the province makes it possible now to sell bonds above par, with the result that the work may now proceed. The deputy minister says the work will be rushed to completion as it is well understood in the Victoria office that the building is badly needed in Prince Rupert.

Burrough will Run for Labor in City

Nominating Convention last evening
gives him substantial support;
to spread propaganda of
revolutionary socialism

J. H. Burrough, general secretary of the Central Labor Council, One Big Union, has received the labor nomination for Prince Rupert riding in the forthcoming provincial election. This was the decision reached after a second ballot had been taken at the convention in the McIntyre Hall last evening. On the first ballot J. H. Burrough received 25 votes, T. R. McKay 24, Walter Shaw 14, and W. E. Denning 14. Mr. Shaw and Mr. Denning were left out of the second ballot and Mr. Burrough received 46 and Mr. McKay 39. Mr. McKay then moved and Mr. Denning seconded that the nomination be made unanimous. This was passed, there being only two dissenting voices in the meeting which numbered close to 100 and was quite representative of labor generally in the city.

Fred Shaw was chairman of the meeting and C. M. Smith was secretary. There was some discussion as to the method of procedure and the qualifications of the candidates that would be endorsed by labor. Mr. McKay, of Ocean Falls, was then called upon and he dealt at some length with the "closed town" question. His speech was punctuated with pre-quest statements as to "czar" rule of Ocean Falls where he has lived for four years acting in that time on various public boards. The present government was falling into the footsteps of the one it had succeeded and such men as G. S. Hanes, Dr. Sutherland and Dr. McIntosh, who had attempted to show independence, had become "political outcasts." When Hon. T. D. Pattullo had been at Ocean Falls with Premier Oliver he had cancelled a meeting there, hearing that he (McKay) was to be present.

Five Candidates.
Nominations for the endorsement of the meeting were then declared open and the following were named: J. H. Burroughs, moved by Mr. Smith and seconded by Mr. Ellis; S. M. Newton, moved by J. J. Gillis, seconded by Arthur Ellis; Walter Shaw, moved by Mr. Week, seconded by J. Prescott; W. E. Denning, moved by S. V. Cox, seconded by W. A. Pilford; T. R. McKay, moved by Wm. Adams and seconded by Mr. Wilson.

Later in the meeting some discussion arose as to Mr. Newton's qualifications for labor support and he, himself, stated that he could not pledge himself for labor on account of his original independent announcement. If he was not selected by the meeting he could not promise that he would stand behind the nominee chosen. His name, however, was voted out before the voting stage was reached.

Burrough Speaks.
The various nominees were then called upon to address the meeting, the first being J. H. Burrough. "I never entered my head until just last night," said Mr. Burrough, "that I might be called upon to stand, but if I am chosen I shall stand on the platform of the Socialist Party of Canada. I am not concerned with the opening of closed towns or the reform of conditions for wage slaves, but I would abolish the wage slave system entirely. I would go to Victoria to spread the propaganda of revolutionary socialism for that is the only remedy to present day conditions. If that

The Andrew Kelly arrived in Prince Rupert last evening with this pleasing report. The wrecked trawler was moved in the extreme high tide of yesterday afternoon and although on the beach at Randall Island it is in a safer and more accessible position than on the rocks of Whitesand Island. W. J. Nicholls, comptroller of the company, speaking to the press this morning stated that the Caruthers would likely come to the harbor on Monday under her own steam conveyed by the Zibassa and the Skugaid. The officials are very pleased with the success of the floating yesterday. John Gould, the underwriter's representative, returned on the Kelly last night.

Labor Convention Here Last Night.

J. H. Burrough, general secretary of the One Big Union and organizer for the loggers' union, was chosen by the labor convention last night to contest the constituency. As a result T. Ross McKay drops out.

Mr. Burrough is an able man. As he said in his address last night he does not believe so much in reform as in the change of the whole system. He is a revolutionary socialist and as such urges that there shall be production for use instead of for profit. Just what that means he may possibly explain. Most socialists do not know. The whole socialistic scheme is more or less in the air. Nothing has been definitely worked out to the satisfaction even of its own votaries. The main feature is that all property will be owned by the state and individuals will own nothing. It will be absorbed, or, as some people call it, confiscated.

Mr. Burrough is an able exponent of socialism. He has done excellent work in organizing the One Big Union in this district, in fact much of the success of the O. B. U. here has been due to his efforts. He is an enthusiast and is widely read along his particular line.

S. M. Newton's Name Was Before Convention.

The name of S. M. Newton was before the labor convention last night. The difficulty with Mr. Newton was that he was willing to take everything but to give nothing. He would have been glad to get the support of labor but was not willing to drop out if defeated and back the man who was the choice of the convention. As a result of this dual position the convention refused to allow his name to be considered.

Mr. McKay was in a somewhat similar position. He had previously announced himself, but he took his medicine like a man and dropped out of the running, even though he had an idea that the cards were stacked against him. He took the honest position that the will of the convention should be carried out.

It looks now as if the proper thing for Mr. Newton to do would be to drop out and back Mr. Burrough. The meeting was really pledged to revolutionary socialism for the successful nominee stated he would not be a candidate unless they backed him in this. Possibly before this is published Mr. Newton will have withdrawn. That seems to be the only position for him to take.

West Welcomes Premier Meighen.

Vancouver yesterday extended a hearty welcome to Premier Meighen on the occasion of his visit to that city. If he comes here we will all turn out and give him a good reception. He is the first citizen of the Dominion and as such demands our respect.

Mr. Meighen must not, however, interpret this as being in any way a condemnation of the Conservative policies. It does not cover the multitude of sins that the Government has committed. As premier we are glad to see Mr. Meighen, but we shall none the less take a fall out of him when the opportunity occurs. Some of the recent sins such as the sugar fiasco are so fresh in our memories that it is difficult to forget them long enough to extend the glad hand.

Biggest Grievance Against Government.

The biggest grievance the people of Prince Rupert have against the Dominion Government is the failure to supply fish cars to carry our product to market. We could forgive many things, but not this. The deliberate killing of our fish market is one of the darkest stains on the present administration, so far as Prince Rupert is concerned. The cabinet members are full of promises but they forget the performance. There is nothing political about this grievance. We are all agreed about it. Liberal and Conservative as well as labor must be disgusted. We have waited for years and all we get is a promise.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

RETAILERS TO USE STAMPS

Change in Regulations Goes into Effect on Monday next

Commencing on Monday retailers are required to furnish sales slips to all customers purchasing taxable articles and this slip must have on it a stamp for the amount of the tax. This is a new regulation and seems to be designed for the purpose of making it impossible for anyone evading the tax. The following is a list of the new regulations:

1. All retailers selling articles subject to the Luxury Tax must take out of license to sell such articles. The cost of this license is \$2.00.

2. Retailers selling taxable articles must furnish purchaser at the time of sale with sales slip, showing cost of the article and amount of tax, as a separate item. Before delivering this sales slip the retailer must affix to it a stamp or stamps to the requisite denomination to cover tax. The retailer must cancel these stamps AFTER they have been affixed, and not before, by authorized perforator supplied by the government.

3. Failure to carry out this regulation renders the retailer liable to a penalty of not less than ten times the amount of the tax, the minimum being \$50.

4. All retailers must keep on hand sufficient stamps to meet their requirements. Failure to have stamps available will not be accepted as an excuse by the Department of Inland Revenue.

5. The right to inspect sales slips held by the retailer or the customer is vested in the Department of Inland Revenue, who may employ inspectors for such purpose.

6. Firms or corporations before selling a retailer goods which are subject to luxury tax must be in possession of evidence that such retailer holds a retailer's license under these regulations.

MAKING HEADWAY ON PARLIAMENT'S TOWER

OTTAWA, Oct. 30. — Rapid headway is being made with the massive tower of the new Parliament Building, but there is no prospect of it being completed before the next session of the House. The present plan is to close the tower in for the winter on a level with the third story and resume construction in the spring. This means, however, that the main entrance to the building will be available before the session opens. — Much progress is likewise being made with the interior of the big structure, more particularly the Senate chamber, while the decoration of the chamber of the Commons in blue and gold is being carried out by a corps of artists.

PARIS BEGGARS GOING TO WORK

PARIS, Oct. 30. — The lack of small coins has done away with beggars in Paris. "Before the cost of living went up," said Paul Gaulot, a student of social conditions, "a beggar used to make as much as the average working man. He lived well and happily by simply sitting down in the street and waiting for coins to roll into his hat. Now the few who give to beggars do so according to pre-war tariffs, and Paris beggars have had to go to work."

EXAMINATIONS FOR THE POSITION OF ASSISTANT FOREST RANGER.

Object.
These examinations are for the purpose of filling present vacancies and to enable candidates to qualify for future vacancies and increases in staff.

Assistant Forest Rangers are employed during the fire season (May to September inclusive) of each year and this period is extended where possible by working on improvements such as trails, etc. Re-appointment is made each year as long as satisfactory service is given. Promotion to the permanent staff is made by merit and examination as occasion offers. The salary is \$110.00 per month the first year and \$120.00 per month the next year. Travelling expenses are also paid.

Qualifications for Candidates.

EDISON AND HEREAFTER

Does Not Believe Personality
Exists After Death; Com-
municate with Spirits

Thomas A. Edison, inventor and scientist, does not believe that the human personality exists after death. He reasoned the problem out and came to this conclusion in the presence of an interviewer, Austin C. Lescarboura, editor of the Scientific American.

Yet after he had wound up his argument and stated the finding which apparently dooms hope for a hereafter, he added with a smile that notwithstanding his brief for nothingness beyond death, he still was working on his apparatus for communicating with the dead.

"I do hope that our personality survives," said Mr. Edison. "If it does, then my apparatus ought to be of some use. That is why I am now at work on the most sensitive apparatus I have ever undertaken to build, and I await the results with keenest interest."

Mr. Edison would not describe the apparatus, but he compared it to a valve which, turned by the comparatively puny human hand wielding only one-eighth horsepower, releases the energies of a mammoth turbine with 50,000 horse-power.

Unusually Delicate

The apparatus will be some unusually delicate instrument, capable of magnifying the most minute presence thousands of times.

"The slightest effort which it intercepts will be magnified many times so as to give us whatever form of record we desire for further investigation," explained Mr. Edison.

"But if this apparatus fails to reveal anything of exceptional interest, I am afraid that I shall have lost all faith in the survival of personality as we know it in this existence."

The inventor made light of the ouija board and table-tilting methods of communicating with the beyond and asserted that if there was any foundation for the belief that a life beyond existed, the methods for communication ought to be placed on a scientific basis. He said:

"Why should personalities in another sphere waste their time working a triangular piece of wood over a board with certain lettering on it? Why should certain personalities play pranks with tables? The whole business seems so childish to me that I frankly cannot give it serious consideration. If we are to make any real progress in the field of psychic investigation, we must do it with scientific apparatus and in a scientific manner."

Mr. Edison discussed the problem of life and death slowly, reasoning out every step leading toward the depressing conclusion with great care, turning frequently to the interviewer for corroboration.

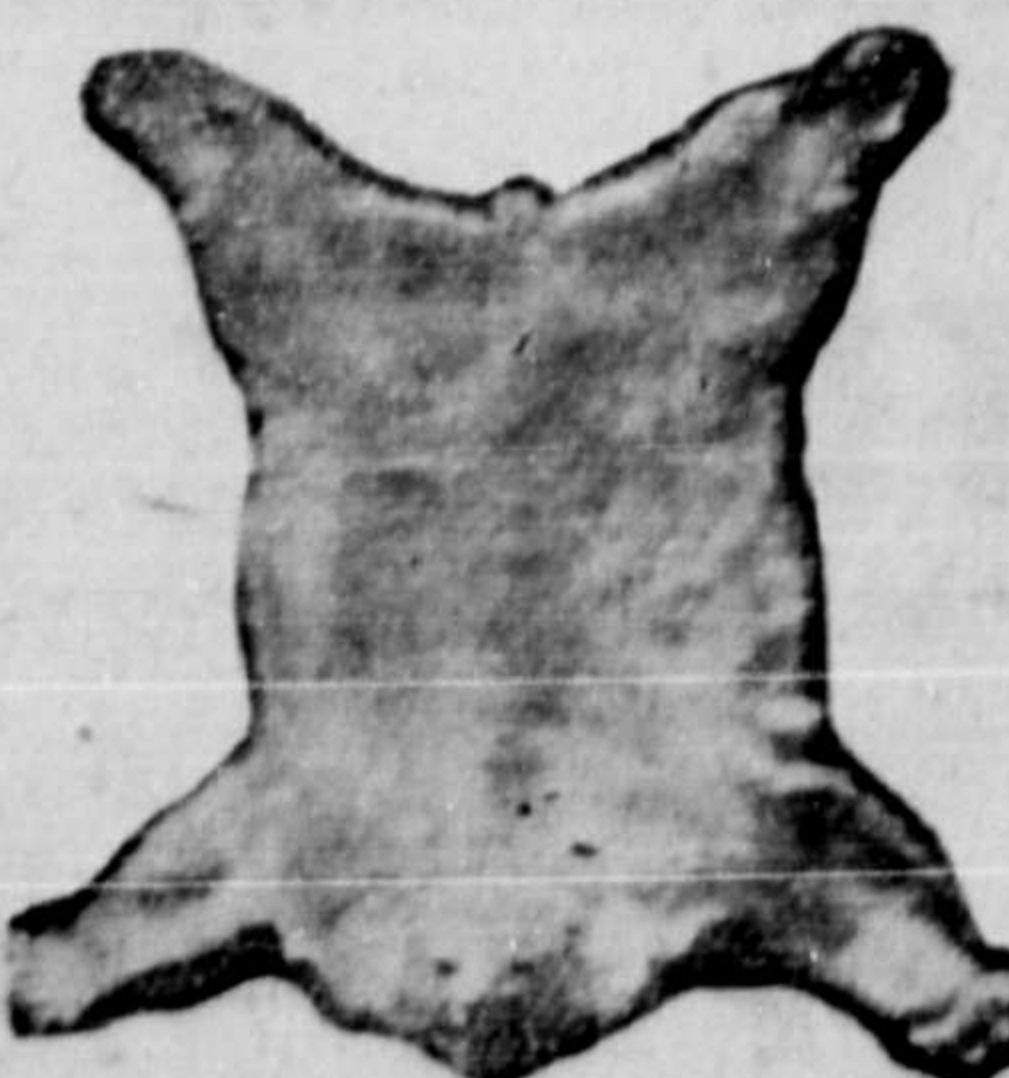
