GOVERNMENT WILL COMPLETE SHIPS IF GUARANTEE CO. FAILS TO DO SO

Harding Elected with Largest Republican Majority on Record

Gets 329 votes with 127 for Cox and 75 doubtful; prays God to make him capable of playing part; Coolidge says real job

NEW YORK, November 3.—The latest returns give Senator Harding a sweeping majority, the largest Republican majority in the history of the electoral college. Seventy-five seats are doubtful. Fifteen Republican senators are assured of victory with half of the 19 Democratic senatorial candidates struggling. Harding accepted the victory with the statement, "I pray to God to make me capable of playing my part."

Governor Coolidge sent the message to the president elect: "We've got a real job. We'll tackle it together."

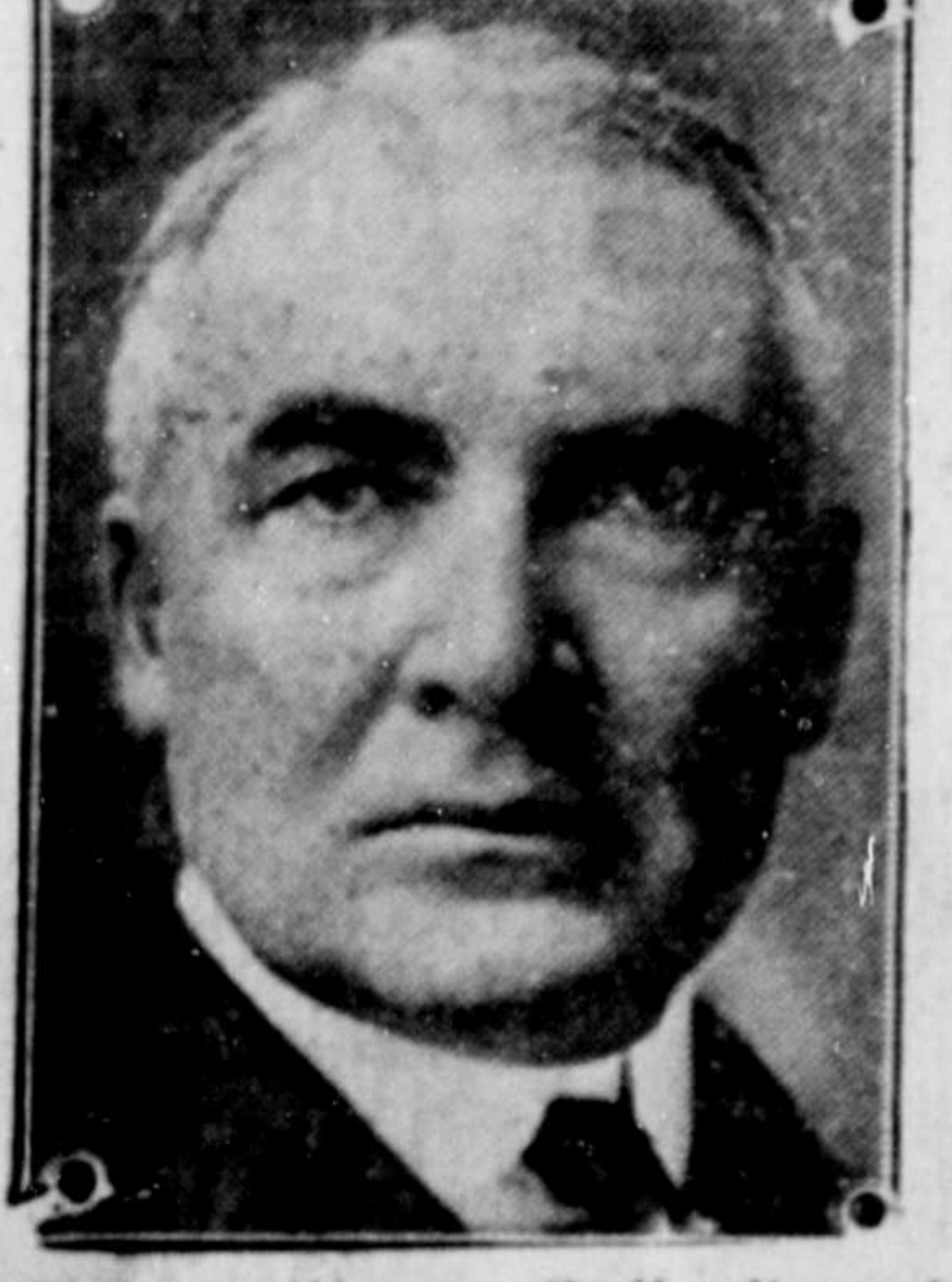

TRIED TO SELL STOLEN BOAT TO WARDEN BAILEY

Jack Thorsen was nervous in Police Court this morning when he was charged with the theft of a boat. He was committed for trial before Judge Young who will hear the case this afternoon. The boat is alleged to have been made from the Knox Hotel of a khaki overcoat, the property of Damase Sigouin, the janitor of the Besner Apartments. The arrest was "unusual" for a short time after Sigouin had made the report to the police. Warden Bailey was walking along the street when he met the accused who offered to sell him the boat for \$5. Recognizing the coat from the description given the police the officer took Thorsen along to the station. This morning Thorsen appeared in court and a more pitiful spectacle is not often seen. He was tremble from head to toe and kept asking in the cells for liquor. Warden Bailey, Chief Vickers and Sigouin gave evidence. The chief testified that the accused had admitted taking the boat by mistake.

ROUGH WEATHER AND HUNTING PARTIES

Parties on Nelsara and Starlight Had Experiences Over the Week-end

The tempests of the past day or so proved unpleasant for several week-end hunting parties and two of the distressed boats made port this morning after exciting experiences.
Will Edmunds, Paul Aivazoff and W. E. Williscroft in the Nelsara left here Sunday morning early and anchored at the creek mouth in Big Bay where they went aground and ripped a big hole in the side of the boat on some jagged rocks. Instead of hunting they spent most of the time repairing their boat and finally made port this morning with a big zinc patch on the hull. They also had engine trouble and report one of the roughest trips on record. They brought in a few geese and snipe.
H. O. Crewe and V. Cowper Young were among a party on the Starlight at Spiller River. They ran out of supplies when it was too rough to return home and after having gone hungry for a day or so got back this morning. The provincial police boat My-fawny was to have gone to the rescue if they had not returned today.
Other boats also report thrilling adventures.

RUPERT COMING HERE TO DOCK

Big Three-Stacker Aground at Swanson Bay Should Arrive End of Month.

COL. PECK SECURES FAVORABLE ACTION

Underwriters Were the Stumbling Block and They Had to Give Decision.

Colonel Peck received a reply from Lloyd's yesterday in regard to the docking of the Prince Rupert, asking him to again apply to the owners. He wired Mr. Hanna last night and received a reply stating that he, Mr. Hanna, had given Capt. Nicholson orders to dock the Prince Rupert here and had received confirmation from Capt. Nicholson that the ship would be floated about the end of November and taken to Prince Rupert to dock.

BRITISH ELECTION MAY BE IN SPRING

LONDON, Nov. 2.—There is a strong probability of a general election taking place next spring. The opinions expressed seem to indicate that nothing but an election will quiet the present unrest.

Conservatives Elected Delegates Last Night

Bitter Division over Newton Candidature is Admitted; Likely No Candidate will be Chosen until General Convention

There was an undercurrent of excitement at the meeting of the Conservative Association last night which everybody seemed afraid to break. Not a mention of a nominee was made and, indeed, there would likely have been a row precipitated if there had been for the Conservative camp is, admittedly, divided into two bitter factions, one in support of S. M. Newton's candidature and the other against it. Delegates were named but it is likely that the nomination will not be mooted until the final convention next Monday night.

There are to be 23 delegates named for the convention, 17 men and 6 ladies. Last night the men were chosen and the ladies will choose at their own meeting tomorrow night. The Orme (lie), J. R. Railway Company has Made Application to Fill Cow Bay Again

Application has again been made by the Grand Trunk Pacific to fill Cow Bay and lay tracks thereon, according to advice received by City Clerk Woods from the east this morning. The information was accompanied by a plan of the cove dated July 3, 1917, and is the same plan as has been seen here often before with the same proposed warehouse sites, tracks, roadways, freight sheds and roundhouses. There is nothing shown as to the crossing which has proved such a bone of contention. The application will no doubt again open the vexed Cow Bay question but Frank Garvell, the chairman of the Railway Commission, on his visit here a month ago gave the assurance that permission to fill Cow Bay will not be granted or turned down until the commission has had another session at Prince Rupert. At the time this last commission sitting was held here the application had not been made by the company. Ten years ago the railway company were granted permission. After they had filled it the order was countermanded and the company had to take out their filling and open the cove up again.

NEWMAN ERB CONSIDERING SITUATION

Will Arrive at Decision This Afternoon Regarding What to Do.

The dry dock situation remains practically unchanged this morning although many wires are going backward and forward between here and Ottawa. A telegram received by J. H. Pillsbury, superintendent, from Norman Guthrie, the solicitor representing the Erb interests at Ottawa, stated that the situation was now under consideration and it was hoped to reach some definite decision this afternoon.

The special committee of the Trades and Labor Council is having frequent meetings and arrangements are being advanced for the relief of any in distress. Time check scalping was emphatically denounced at a meeting last night. The Board of Trade and the Trades and Labor Council committee have a conference at 5 o'clock this afternoon to deal more fully with the matter.

Guarantee Company May Complete Ships

If they do not, the Dominion Government will do so, says Hon. C. C. Ballantyne in telegram to Col. Peck and Board of Trade

S. E. Parker, president of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade this morning received a night lettergram from Hon. C. C. Ballantyne which reads as follows: "Have sent following telegram to Colonel Peck:—
"My department received word this morning from the department's representative that work on the vessels at Prince Rupert had ceased. The guarantee company was immediately advised by telegram that the department regarded this as a default under the contract. The conditions of the bond are that the guarantee company has the option of proceeding to complete the contract.
"If the guarantee company does not signify its intention of completing the contract within a reasonable period, the necessary action to that end will be taken by the department. Officers of the department believe that sufficient funds are available including the guarantee to take care of wages and accounts for all supplies that have entered into construction of vessels."

Harding Elected President of U. S.

Harding is elected president of the United States. It seemed like a sure thing, even before the election but elections often bring surprises. No one can be sure what the electors will do. This time they have fulfilled the prophecies and have chosen a Republican instead of a Democrat. They have in other words chosen a Conservative instead of a Liberal, a high tariff man instead of a low.

What effect, if any, the change will have on Canada is not clear. It is the end of any idea of reciprocity for the time being, and may mean the erection of higher tariffs against this country. There is nothing for us to worry about, however, for Canada is every year becoming more self-contained and is learning to depend on herself for production of goods which she uses.

Bowser Still Rules the Party.

At the Conservative convention last night it was announced that the local Conservative Association was instructed to select a candidate to run in this constituency. Accordingly those present proceeded to choose delegates, but did not instruct them for whom they should vote. Apparently "instructions" to that effect had not arrived.

It seems curious that a group of men who are always looked upon as intelligent and many of whom are successful business men should be willing to take instructions from W. J. Bowser. As a matter of fact Mr. Bowser still rules the party as he formerly did. He is the little czar still. He sends out his orders and his henchmen do his will. Even though these men know that the municipality is served better by Mr. Pattullo than it could be by any opposition member or by any member that the Conservatives could elect, because Bowser says so, a candidate has to be chosen. Some of the members of the party would even drag the old party in the dust to such an extent that they would have endorsed men of the standing of S. M. Newton or T. Ross McKay, who wobble about from one faction to another and do not care what they stand for as long as they think they can get back at the Government that has refused to pander to them. Also there is a longing for the holiday at Victoria and the chance to write M.P.P. after their names and at the same time draw the sessional indemnity. May the good Lord deliver us from such a calamity.

Good Men Among Delegates Chosen.

Among the delegates chosen there are some excellent men and if they are left to themselves without interference they should be able to do the right thing. The difficulty about politics is that people do things for expediency rather than because it is best for the province or the district. During a political campaign people see things through colored glasses. The party name distorts their vision and they do not see things as they are.

If we were very religious we should pray that the delegates might see the light, that the party scales might drop from their eyes and they might recognize the desirability of refusing to act at the behest of Bowser or any of his myrmidons but place the interest of the district before party and support the Liberal nominee. Not believing in the efficacy of prayer in a case like this, we can only hope that the party will choose a man who will uphold the traditions of the great party and will not drag it in the mire by backing any man just on the forlorn hope of downing the man who really has the interest of the district at heart, who is in a position to help it and do something more than make inflammable speeches or write rambling, humorous editorials.

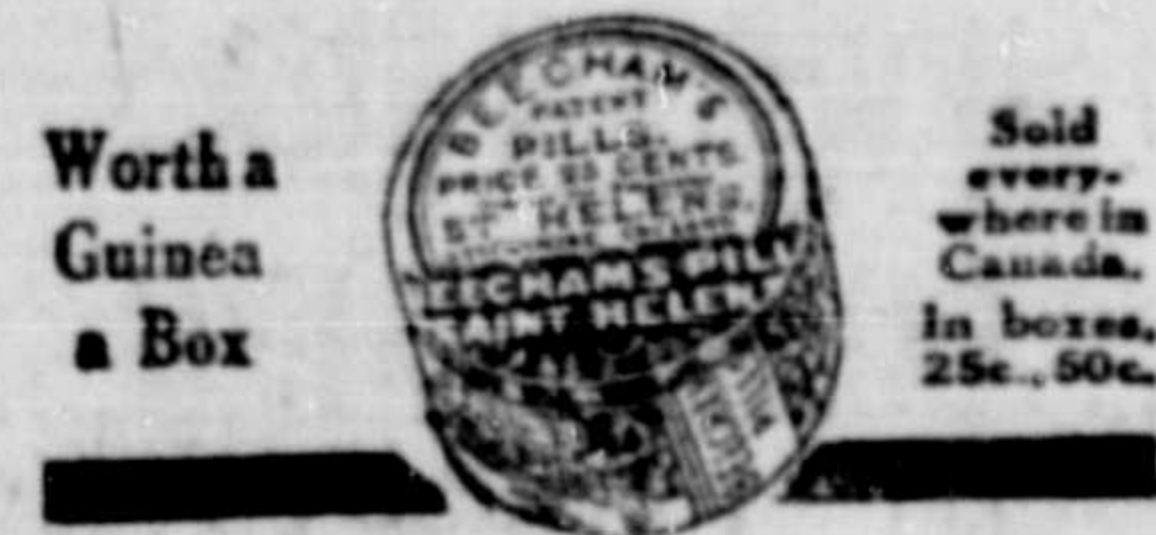

London Municipal Society Discussed Matter Yesterday, Lord Hamilton Presiding

LONDON, Nov. 3.—A meeting was held yesterday of the London Municipal Society, presided over by Lord George Hamilton, for the purpose of considering the whole matter of municipal taxation. It was pointed out that the rates in every municipality in the country were tending to become oppressive. New social legislation was responsible for this. Every time the rates increased the cost of living went up just that much. In London boroughs where there are labor majorities the advances have been very large during the last year. MORE MEN AND FEWER POSTS

There Will be Unemployment During the Winter Unless Work Starts.

More men seeking employment than there are jobs offering represents the situation at the Provincial Labor Bureau now making a reversal of the state of affairs over what it was at the first of last month. During the month of October many of the Queen Charlotte Islands logging camps have closed down and many men have flocked across the straits to this city. Although most of these have gone south to Vancouver, many have remained in Prince Rupert seeking further employment in the north. The closing of the drydock, although perhaps temporarily, has made an unusual number of job seekers during the past day or so and J. M. Campbell, the officer in charge, is at a loss to know what to do with all.

Partial Relief.

The situation, however, may be somewhat relieved by the starting of work on the ocean docks and the new provincial government buildings during the winter. The only places that are still running as usual are the tie camps up the line and the coal mines in the Mountain Park district. Men are still being taken up there for certain classes of work, but at present it looks as if the supply of men will be greater than the number of jobs during the winter.

Actual figures for the month of October show 286 applications for work with 250 placements. At the first of October there were 190 jobs open and 226 new ones came in during the course of the month, but against this 213 were cancelled so that the demand for men fell off very greatly.

WILL KEEP THE BOYS ON FARM

E. J. Moore Provides Varied Activities at Terrace, Including Fox Farm.

A good many people have been interested in the fox farm at Terrace, started recently by E. J. Moore. A representative of the Daily News visited the farm recently and found that there were two pairs of fine silver foxes, these being the special charge of one of Mr. Moore's sons.

Mr. Moore has 180 acres of land which he will clear and cultivate in order to keep the boys at home. He has a family of eight, the ninth having lost his life overseas. It is his idea that by going into different lines of farming and having the family take an interest in the various lines he will keep them at home.

Last year Mr. Moore sold three foxes for \$1,600. The two pairs he now has are very valuable. They did not breed this year as they were being moved, but next year he hopes for good results.

NO OIL SUPPLY

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3.—Supplies of fuel oil have been suspended for six months, the Imperial Oil Co. announces.

SURVEY LINE INTO THE PAS

Work to be Done by Canadian National and Paid for by Province

WINNIPEG, Nov. 2.—Survey for a railroad into the mines north of The Pas will be undertaken this winter by the Canadian National railway system and financed by the provincial government, according to authoritative information secured today. The reason for the C.N.R. conducting the survey is due to the fact that they have all machinery at their disposal for carrying out such work. The estimated cost is \$15,000.

The provincial government will shortly approach the railway officials to carry out the work it is said.

The project of constructing the railroad will also be placed before the Canadian National system. Before any action is taken for building the road the Government wants assurance that sufficient tonnage will be provided from the mines to operate profitably. The province does not favor going into the railway business from an operating basis, but should any substantial proposition be placed before the legislators it is probably that the legislature might consent to financing the construction of a railway providing the Canadian National railways lease and operate it.

A preliminary survey has already been made by the provincial department of public works.

PRICE OF EATS IS ON THE WANE NOW

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3.—The restaurants here are reducing their prices. The reductions in the price of bread and other commodities are having their effect.

MOUNTIES TO HAVE CONTROL OF TRAFFIC INTO OIL DISTRICT

EDMONTON, Nov. 3.—As the result of the passage of a new ordinance at Ottawa the Royal Canadian Mounted Police have been given full power to regulate all traffic during the coming winter into the MacKenzie River district, where the oil strike reports are expected to attract many.

The ordinance, of which word by wire has just been received by Inspector Jennings, has been passed by the Commissioner of the North West Territories and provides:

"No person shall enter the provincial district of MacKenzie (this includes the whole of the Northwest territory north of the Alberta boundary) unless he satisfies the officer commanding the R.C.M.P., at Edmonton, Peace River, Fort Fitzgerald, or Dawson that such person is physically able and properly equipped and is not likely to become a public charge while in that territory."

Inspector Jennings points out that this gives authority to have all parties report to the R.C.M.P. and provides that they may be forcibly detained if found to be not eligible to enter the country.

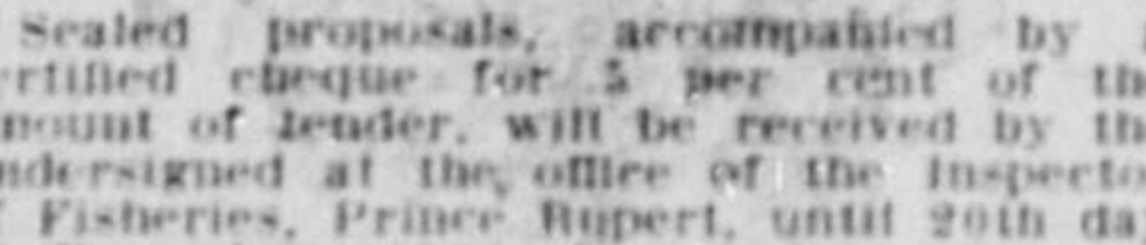
An agitation is now on foot in certain circles for a through trunk road from Hazelton to Prince Rupert.

VANCOUVER CONSERVATIVE NOMINATIONS

VANCOUVER, Nov. 3.—The Conservatives last night nominated six candidates from twenty proposed at the convention here last evening. The list is made up of W. J. Bowser, S. L. Howe, Miss Edith L. Patterson, Dr. J. W. Mahan, Capt. George Black, and Lt.-Col. B. W. Warden.

In an address to the convention Mr. Bowser said the moderation bill should have been submitted to the people at the time of the last election so that people would have known how to vote. He intimated that a bill had been drafted and was now in the office of the attorney-general. In Victoria Premier Oliver was trifling with the people. The bill he claimed should be placed before the people. He was asking the people to sign a blank check. Mr. Bowser promised that if elected he would put into the consolidated revenue fund all monies from motor licenses, game licenses, motion picture tax, liquor profits, income tax, personal property tax, and real estate tax and give each district an amount proportional to population.

MIXED BATHING IS TO BE REVIVED AT BATH IN ENGLAND

LONDON, Nov. 3.—In his crusade against mixed bathing councillor Clark, of Tunbridge Wells, has sustained a setback by the action of the Bath Mineral Baths Committee. Hitherto opposed by male and female bathers separately, the Royal Hot Mineral Swimming Bath is in future to be the scene of mixed bathing.

For the moment this joint occupancy of the bath is to be limited to one afternoon per week, but it is a beginning and the time may come when the sexes may intermingle as freely as in the days of Beau Nash, who, though an opponent of mixed bathing, was very severe upon any bather or spectator who was guilty of any breach of propriety. In close proximity to the Royal Bath is the more famous King's Bath, which Beau Nash's day always furnished an animated spectacle with society notables of both sexes indulging their gambols in the sight of an interested and sometimes critical assembly. It was on such an occasion that the Beau, overhearing a flippant remark by a gentleman with reference to a very buxom lady in the bath, took the cautious gentleman by the heels and lifted him over the balustrade into the water, to the surprise and consternation of the sporting bathers.

"Nash's rules regarding bathing dress were very stringent and would bestride any swimmer who failed to observe his decrees. Councillor Clark may be satisfied that Bath today will not be less exacting and that revived mixed bathing will be marked by the utmost decorum.

PRINCE GEORGE

The case of Rex vs. Nolan was disposed of at the assizes last week, when the accused was acquitted on a charge of attempted murder. Stuart Henderson pleaded the case for the defence.

A building bylaw has been enacted by the city council along the lines of the bylaws in larger cities. Among the requirements is that those proposing building will have to get a building permit from the city authorities.

Wood is selling here at a cost of 812 a cord. The labor situation and the poor condition of the country roads has caused a shortage in the city and the railway is to be asked to assist in bringing in supplies.

A fatal accident occurred at Hutton Mills on Wednesday when A. E. Bennett, a loader, fell off a cartload of lumber, striking his head on a rail.

Trains arriving over the G.T.P. at Jasper when the C.N.R. from Vancouver is more than four hours late will run right through to Edmonton, according to an announcement made here last week.
